- Okay, we'll call to order the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board Meeting. We'll take roll call.
- I'm getting there. May have to
- Okay, the next item is the approval of the agenda, if we can get a motion for that.
- I'll make a motion.
- Second.
- Okay, all in favor.
- Do we have to press save?
- Yes.
- Okay, approval of the agenda.
- If I can get an approval for the minutes from the April 11th meeting.

- I'll make that motion.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second.
- All in favor.
- [All] Aye.
- Who will initiate the motion? Second. Should be all the vote. All right,
- Okay, we'll get to regular business. The first appeal we'll hear is Steven Gittens requesting to move to 3569 Satellite Lane.
- Hello.
- [All] Hello.
- I'm Sean Linnan, L-I-N-N-A-N, appearing on behalf of Steven.
- Do we have your address for the record?
- Oh yeah, 1008 Tacoma Beach Road, Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin.
- Okay, Mr. Gittens, you've been here before the board, and you're requesting to move to the Satellite. Could you tell us why you'd like to move to that address?
- Yes. Okay, can I hand a letter to y'all first from Julie that owns the residence? Okay, here.
- Do I have to read this out loud?
- Heidi?
- Yes.
-
- Okay, so right now we have a letter from Julie Wrightmaester, who is Mr. Gitten's girlfriend and the place where he will be residing at if approved. She mentions how he does cleaning there. As of right now when he's at the home it's stressful not knowing if someone's gonna call the police department thinking that he's living there. She indicates that he's come a long way since he's been before the board, mentions changes that he's made, he's got a job, his apartment, helping mend relationships in the family. Okay, let's see. Steven plans on staying in his apartment, but is seeking your approval to be a my home on a flexible basis. This as you can see will benefit me greatly. We both agreed on having this apartment. A job played a big part in all the positives things happening in his life. Living together is something we would like to do in the future because it would help us both financially. Please consider approving him. He has really worked hard to turn his life around. Okay.
- Okay. I have my apartment on Cherry Street, which I wanna keep. Julie and I have talked in the past about my residence on Cherry Street, and I wanna keep it until I'm done with probation. I have eight months left of probation. I've held my job for over a year. I've been extremely between my apartment, Julie's house, my shop and my job and stuff. I'm just, I'm mainly asking for approval to be there on a flexibility type of basis. I can even talk this over with my agent if approved, and we can try to maybe set something up. They can still do home visits and stuff like that. So that's mainly why I'm here is to seek some flexibility. I have one neighbor that's bothering me, and everybody else is minding their own

business, and they haven't complained about me or nothing, and they all see what I'm doing around there. I've had compliments from my next door neighbor about what I've done in the yard and stuff around the house.

- When you say that, are you talking about the Satellite address?

- The Satellite address, right, right.

- Okay.

- I understood that.

- Okay, good.

- Well yeah, flexibility I mean I got my apartment, so I'm going back and forth. Right now I stay at my apartment mostly on the nights that I work. Sometimes I work three nights, sometimes I work two nights, so it just depends. I can only work a certain amount of nights per week because of my disability, my SSDI, so I can only make so much per month, so that's why I can only work so many nights per week.

- Okay, so when you're talking about a flexible basis, like how many nights are you wanting to stay there?

- I wanna come there and go as things need to get done. If it's a point where I have to stay a couple of nights or something like that, I don't want someone to see me out in the yard, specifically my neighbor that's been causing the problems. I was actually out there working yesterday, and my neighbor did come home for lunch on her lunch break, and I know she saw me out there working, but I didn't make no eye contact or nothing because I was busy working. Nothing happened, so--

- Have you had any police calls to that Satellite address?

- Yeah, there is a citation that I'm working on right now with my attorney, but that was ... She ended up creating a log showing that I've been at that address doing stuff, but that log all started after the fact. I was already living on Cherry Street. I moved into Cherry Street in April, and she started the log in June.

- Captain, is that correct do you know? For the police?

- I don't have information on here.

- Okay.

- The city attorney requested this too because of the citation.

- Oh, I see.

- Do you as the lawyer have any information on this?

- Yeah, so basically what it is is the city, there was a complaint filed about a year ago with this allegation that he was living at the residence, and it was in violation of the rules, and it was dismissed before the first hearing because of course the statute doesn't prevent somebody from coming and going or getting lawn care. He didn't have a job, so he was coming and going all the time. And so the city at that point said well yeah, he could stop by five times a week if he wanted to because as long as he's not claiming residence at this place, and that's that. So he has this Cherry Street address, and he pays \$475 per month plus utilities, but he's not allowed to drive the car except to go to and from work, and he's not allowed to park a utility trailer at his apartment. So the car largely stays at Julie's house, and then she gives him rides because he's not able to drive himself back from her house once he gets there because he's gotta be coming or going to work. Or the trailer's there, and she wants to use one or the other of these things. So long story short, one of his neighbors has kept this log and logged, you know I saw his car there, I saw the car there,

it looks like the car was overnight there. But in a span of almost four months, she had actually logged him physically present 13 times, and doing yard work I think all but one time, maybe two times. And I guess the issue has been that that's completely permissible, so we're dealing with this again. And so the city said go down to the appeals court and see if you can get this straightened out so we're not down here every. And that was the impetus of this because Steven was like I don't wanna go back, I don't wanna be rejected again. And I said well, she's asking that we come down and do this because the city's in a bad situation, and I can't speak for the city, but from my perspective the city's in a bad spot because they wanna be responsive to the neighborhood. At the same time it's gonna be a heck of a case for them to prove residency when all of his mail goes there, his driver's license is there, paying an apartment there. Except for the fact that he's a felon, he'd be registered to vote there. I've been to this building more than he's been to her house, and I don't live here, and that's the case, right? And so that's why he's here largely.

- Okay. For the board's purpose, do we need Mr. Gittens to go over his crime. He's been here, I don't know, Ed, if you're familiar with--

- I read up on it.

- Okay, okay, so we'll go in with any other questions if people have anything.

- This is the violation.

- Oh, I see.

- That indicates what he was cited for violating.

- All right, so we have from the alderman here one, two, three, four, five citations ranging one from 2015, three from 2016 and one back in November of 2017 for sex offender residency violation.

- But remember, a lot of those were either, well the one is still pending from November. The one from 2016 was tossed out, and the other ones, they didn't realize they could even fight them. There was a ticket, so they paid it, but you know, it is what it is.

- Okay, does anyone have questions for him? Do we need to talk about treatment?

- Yeah, I don't have questions.

- No, no questions, no treatment questions?

- Oh, well I do wanna talk about that.

- Mr. Gittens, we'd like to talk about your treatment. Would you like to do that in closed session or open session?

- Open.

- Okay.

- In your letter you say that you're going to Circles of Support when your work allows. How often is that?

- I was there recently, maybe about a month ago, and I go as my work schedule allows it. Sometimes I work on Wednesdays even though I'm part time. I have to go. They have slow times and they have busy times, so I have to go when the work is there so I can pay my bills. So I do go if I'm not busy. I mean since I've got my apartment and since I got my job, I've been a lot more busier than I have been in the past.

- So is it once a month? Once, approximate.

- I think I was there last month. I don't remember what day it was, but they're held on a Wednesday, too. But yeah, I know I was, I don't recall the exact date, and I do plan on going in the future as my work schedule allows it. And they all know that, and they all know me there.

- Okay, okay.

- And I even work with people that have been from the group, and I associate with them at work, and I talk to them and stuff.

- Okay. You've completed sex offender treatment, is that correct?

- Yes, I did

- Okay, just confirming.

- Any other questions from the board?

- I don't have any.

- Do we have anybody who would like to speak for or against Mr. Gittens?

- We do have another that have signed up already. I'll just--

- You'll call them up?

- Yeah, I'll call them up. Ali Winiecki.

- [Ali] Where would you like me to come?

- Come up here, take the chair. And each speaker will have three minutes to speak.

- I am a resident of Satellite Lane, and would like to speak on behalf of myself and others that are here. I have seen Mr. Gittens reside at this place that the committee had denied him back in September of 2016. Over the past year and a half, Mr. Gittens has been observed being outside multiple, multiple times, parking his vehicle in Julie's garage, and then being there still the next day. I don't understand how he can say that he visits when this seems more of a residency already. Through my own observations and the observations of others, Mr. Gittens has been cited two times in 2016, one of which was only one month after he was denied from this committee. I understand that Mr. Gittens was approved at the Cherry Street apartment. However, please don't be swayed that he actually does reside there. Since that April meeting when he was approved, myself and other neighbors thought that this problem would be put to ease. Yet he continued to still be on Satellite Lane. In November of 2017, Mr. Gittens was again cited for another sex offender--

- I'm sorry, could you repeat the date?

- November, 2017.

- Thank you.

- Mr. Gittens was again cited for another sex offender residency violation. This came from the log that he just described.

- Oh, okay.

- He continues to defy what this committee has set in place. This now brings the official Satellite address total of four violations, as the first was at his old address on Wiggins Way. Since the citation in November,

2017, our neighborhood has received sidewalks. In my opinion sidewalks are intended to keep children and people safe and off the road.

- Three minutes

- Do you have a letter or something that you'd want the board to consider?

- I'm just reading. I just have like a half a page left. These sidewalks have now caused my own child and other neighborhood children to be closer to this man when he's outside. I have talked to my child and I have no explanation for this situation and the man he knows shouldn't be here. Please consider what Mr. Gittens character, actions and personality that I just described that have been over the last year and a half. He shows no remorse, rehabilitation, and no concerns for anyone but himself. He has been deceitful, secretive, and downright disrespectful to this committee, the Green Bay police and the city of Green Bay. I'd ask that you just look at the totality of the circumstances and his flexibility request, and deny his petition.

- Thank you.

- Thank you.

- Next we've got Amy Joski.

- Hello. I live on Satellite right between Mr. Gittens and Ali Winiecki, and I just agree with everything she said. Everything she said is how I feel he is there all the time, and he may have an apartment on Cherry Street, but that's all it is is he pays the rent, gets his mail sent there, his social security, whatever, but he resides from what we can see on Satellite. He's there all the time. I come for lunch, I go to bed, I wake up, he's there.

- Can I just ask you, do you ever see Julie driving him in the car?

- I probably can count on one hand. He's already there when I wake up and leave. I don't know, and his car's in the driveway or the garage.

- Okay.

- Maureen Rasmussen.

- I live around the corner, so I don't see a lot of what's happening, but as a concerned parent, as a lot of people are on these streets, I myself have six-year-old daughter, and my neighbors have a nine- and 11-year-old daughter as well, daughters. We all, I understand it's a hard situation. I have heard a little bit about what he was actually charged with, and that it was typically a victimless crime, but I've also heard that, and I've not been able to read the transcripts of what occurred, but that if we had or we were able to read what actually had occurred for him to be convicted, we would not feel, we would feel the need to be more protective of our community, of our neighborhood. So I think this whole thing has been dragged out a little bit too long than it had to be. Obviously there are a lot of families in this neighborhood that feel very strongly that someone with the potential of causing harm should not be living in this area. And they're putting more, they're actually building right behind us in a field, so they're adding more homes to the area. There right across the street within one mile is a church that has a daycare, and that's just kind of right smack dab in the middle of where we wouldn't want to see someone who might have the potential of causing problems there. The fact that he has not been honest from the beginning. He was introduced to one neighbor as her brother, I believe, when they first started living there, and there were other stories about his relationship with Julie that were kind of brought up. So I think we all just are a little frustrated that we think that something has been resolved and that he has an apartment, but now still possibly coming out there more than we would like to see him. I mean I understand visiting, but from what it seems like it just seems like it's more than overnight, permanent residency.

- Thank you.

- Those are all the preregistered speakers.

- [Barb] I'm Barb Dorff. So some of you have been on this board for a while, so may know the history where it started in District One on Wiggins Way, and then there was asked to leave Wiggins Way. We thought things were gonna be solved in District One, but instead it just moved over to Satellite. And so now, I work with Officer Mathini, numerous times we get emails from there neighbors. Work with Captain Florence, talk with the city attorney, and I know it all kind of rests on you, and it's a very serious responsibility that you have. But this has been a problem for over two years now in my district, and it seems that there are things going on that are really not truthful. He's not being up front. I believe that he is not living at Cherry Street. I believe the neighbors when they tell me that he is living on Satellite, and just as he lived at Wiggins when he was there, and he knows he's not supposed to. He knew he wasn't supposed to be at Wiggins, and he turned around and now he's living on Satellite, and he shouldn't be living there either. He should be living on Cherry Street. So that's just the testimony I wanna bring forward, and I hope that you can make a decision for the neighbors in District One. Thank you.

- Can I ask a question?

- Sure.

- Has he caused any trouble that, you know, in that area thus far since he's lived on Satellite?

- I think his presence causes trouble because parents are afraid, afraid for their children, and I think that is a legitimate fear that they have. So in that sense I would have to say yes, he has caused trouble.

- Do you know what Maureen had mentioned about misrepresentation about who he was? A brother or a relative of--

- I never, I did not know that. I mean I had not heard that before, but no. Okay, that's all I have, thank you.

- I would just like to make a statement. As a board, when we make a decision, we have to look at whether the person will re-offend, if they show remorse, and what they've done for treatment. So those are the factors that we need to consider when we make a decision, so I just want everyone to understand that.

- So I mean basically that's, the history of this case is so, it's grandstanding is what it is. Every time we come back here it's the same, like conjecture and speculation, and there's never ever a substantive objection except well, we think he's staying there, and that's in violation of your rules. Now if you had given him permission, 99% of the complaints would have just evaporated except for the one where I don't want him in my backyard. That neighborhood Satellite Lane is on is new construction. It's super low density. In fact, I don't think there's a place in Green Bay that's lower density than that neighborhood, which means that if he moved any other place in Green Bay, he'd be likely closer to more people. So this idea that well, there's new construction, there's people that live there, of course there are. I wouldn't want a sex offender necessarily to live in my neighborhood either, but these are citizens. They need to live somewhere, and the criteria that you've enumerated, they are relevant, and that's why they're laid out. Mr. Gittens is gonna be off probation in eight months. The probation agent has given his thumbs up to moving to this address on numerous occasions. He has nothing but good things to say about his treatment history, having done his time, paid his fines, you know, basically paid his due to society. I would think that if he were at, at some point it's going to be legal for him to live there regardless of what anybody says about it, and I would think that it would be best do that now when they have, the folks that live there, they have eight months to talk to the probation agent about anything that isn't going well. But at the end of the day, these witnesses calling for legal conclusions about whether he is or is not a resident, that's an extremely important distinction here. That's not something like well, I think he lives there. I go to my mom's every single day because my kids get off the bus there, and the fact that they get off the bus there makes it more my residence than hers does his, but that doesn't have anything to do with anything. He's there for legitimate reasons. All of the logs that have been done, they all say the same thing. I saw him mowing the grass. I saw him hauling something into the house. I saw him parking his car. In fact, there's only two that say I saw him like

drinking coffee, and one was sitting on the deck, but that's in a four-month span of time where the immediately neighbor is watching him like a hawk. I get it, they don't want him to live there, but that can't be what this board considers the most important piece of information. And yes, he's been cited four times, but the first two times he didn't have any representation, had no idea what residency even meant, paid the fine like it was nothing, and walked away. Now Officer Mathini was here at the last meeting, and he's talked to all these neighbors, and he's talked to the other woman, and I get that. But he has something personal in my opinion against Mr. Gittens because last time he was here, he went, I mean really red in the face. He was angry about this man's criminal history. And I went and got his criminal history, and but for the incident we're here for, it reads like this. 2002 was the most recent thing prior to this occasion. Seat belt violation. 2002, traffic citation for speeding. 1994, tail light broken. 1990, tail light broken. 1989, traffic citation of speeding, and it goes on and on all the way back into the mid-'80s. In fact, it ends because it says that there was no, the history was pre-computer at that point. Mr. Gittens has been, he was given a to do list by the city attorney, he was given a to do list by probation, he was given a to do list by this committee. Go get a job, do this, participate, meet the neighbors, do the best you can to fit in, and he's done every single one of those things. I'm asking the court to approve this--

- Are you trying to listen?

- I'm asking this committee to approve him because none of the complaints that have been raised thus far will be alleviated by him being rejected. He'll be there tomorrow mowing the grass, and he'll be well within his rights to do that. So if the argument that the neighbors have is that he's causing problems because he's breaking your rule, I can tell you that that's not happening down at the court house. We didn't even go to the arraignment on the last one. And with Officer Mathini, the entire weight of the police force behind that complaint, that's where it ended up. So I'll leave it at that, thank you.

- All right, does anyone on the board have anything further to say? Anyone would like to make a motion? Any comments from the board?

- Thank all of you for coming today. I know it's not easy. And like Heidi said, we do take this very seriously, but I am gonna make a motion to approve him to live at 3569 Satellite Lane.

- Is there a second?

- I will second that motion.

- Okay, we'll take a vote.

- The motion passes on a three-to-one vote.

- Mr. Gittens, you've been approved to going to Satellite.

- Thank you. Thank you.

- Okay, next on the agenda is the appeal of Craig Brunette requesting to move to 1218 Sandstone Place. Yeah, anywhere is fine.

- We're not using the algorithm recorder because it's video recorded.

- Oh, okay, gotcha.

- Oh, okay.

- Okay, Mr. Brunette, you're asking to be Yeah, you were approved, and we gave you 90 days the last time you were here, and we asked that you provide us some updated treatment information and employment documentation. Before we talk about that, do you want to discuss your treatment in public or in private session?

- This is fine.
- Okay, all right, so do you have the documentation we requested?
- Actually no I do not, not at this time because it is with my girlfriend Is there any way that I can Well, she is the one who providesbecause I don't have my driver's license yet. I didn't know she was gonna get called in to work this morning. When I left my dad's house this morning, she was already gone. Sometimes she goes to Sturgeon Bay, sometimes she stays here because they got homes all over the place because she's the manager of extremely autistic and bipolar residents.
- What information did you have for us?
- Well, I had the letter from my work, and then I just had like a piece of paper signed from my AOBA from when I had behavioral health to say that I was doing my treatment, my AOBA to stay within the boundaries to get my driver's license, which I can't afford to get, but I just take the bus. And I just had that letter from my boss, my supervisor, Bob.
- What about the sex offender treatment? You said the last time that you were enrolling in it. Have you done that?
- No, once I get done with my AODA, this is from my agent, once I get done with my AODA, then I'm going to treatment. Other than that I have not had any problems. I have not, no violations, no, no nothing. No police contact.
- That was back in February we saw you, correct?
- Um hmm.
- My dad, you know, he's not getting any better. Now he can barely walk. You know, his legs are, so I just mainly help him. That's what I do. So I have been off of work for the last three weeks, three and a half weeks until my doctor gives me 100%. Otherwise my job won't take me backphysical.
- Where is it again that you work?
- CA Laughton, the foundry in DePere. I work 12, 14 hour days, and right now we're so understaffed that my boss calls me every other day. Hey, did you get your. I don't know why they can't keep guys up there, but apparently hard work nowadays is ...
- Did you say when you're gonna be done with AOD?
- It's be about four months.
- Four more months?
- Yeah, only because of my past history with alcohol and drugs. So you know, when we talked about it she's like I think you should stay a little longer, so that's fine. I'll do what I have to do to keep doing good. Now I don't wanna go backwards. Tired of going backwards. I'm 39 years old. I should have my own home and all that stuff by now.
- You kind of put us in a difficult situation because we specifically asked for that documentation. We gave you that 90 days. I don't know how everybody else feels about that.
- Is there any way--

- I could have my boss call you. We both work third shift, so it's really hard. I mean there's times where somebody doesn't show up for a shift, and we gotta stay until 8:00, and we're done at 4:30. You know, that's 16 hour day, you know, so you get tired. You know I did ask them, they didn't put it in the letter, and I understand it's my responsibility, and I do apologize for that.

- I think the major, well I'll speak for myself, the major concern is about the treatment, you know. You could tell us that you've done that, but we really need to see something that you have been in some kind of a treatment.

- Okay.

- So I don't, Renee, did you have an idea?

- Well, I was just wondering if you would be able to bring it in, or do we, I'm just trying to figure out what timewise. Because is that something you could do, like if you brought it in tomorrow?

- You would have to look at it, so you know.

- Yeah, does somebody wanna make a motion maybe.

- I'll make a motion.

- I second that.

- I think we have to play the motion.

- What is the motion, the 30 days?

- I'll make a motion to deny at this time for 30 days until you bring treatment.

- So you don't want him to stay at this address right now for the next 30 days? You're denying it. I'm just trying to understand.

- You're already there?

- Yeah, I been there for three months.

- Well, if he's already there. If you don't have it next month, then I think we should deny him, right? Or he's gotta move or something.

- Okay, so what is the actual motion?

- To approve him for 30 days pending bringing into the next meeting his information of treatment.

- Okay.

- All right, is there a second?

- I'll second.

- Okay.

- We might want employment stuff, too.

- I can bring that in.

- You want
- Okay, we'll take a vote.
- The motion passes on a three-to-one vote.
- So in 30 days you don't need to resubmit your application, but you need to come in, and you need to provide us that documentation.
- Okay, not a problem. Thank you.
- Okay, next on the agenda is the appeal of Clifford Holmes requesting to go to 816 Madder Street.
- Hi.
- Hi.
- Give us a second. Did you fill out a piece of paper She's got like an old agenda that keeps
- It keeps going back to the last one.
- I think you might be
- I apologize to everyone. We are starting to go electronic, so this is our first meeting, so we're learning as we go. Okay, Mr. Holmes, have you ever been before us?
- No.
- Okay, so what we're going to do is we're going to ask you to talk about what your crime When you talk about your victim, we ask that you don't refer to the person by relationship or name. Just say the victim. So you can go ahead and tell us.
- In October of 2006 I was convicted of second degree sexual assault of a child. I groomed my victim by using a friend relationship with her. She wanted to use my clothes for Halloween and stuff like that. She had a conversation with, the girlfriend I had at the time, her daughter, they were classmates, and she had a conversation with her over the phone saying that she wanted to have sex with me. So once I heard that, I used that as my way in to eventually assault her. So when she told me to stop, I stopped, and that was it.
- And how old were you?
- I was 22.
- And she was how old?
- Fifteen I believe.
- And you knew she was 15.
- No, I didn't find out until after the fact that she was 15.
- How old did you think she was?
- I thought she was 18.
- And then how did it come about that this happened?

- I believe someone mentioned it to the lady I was dating at the time, and she went to confront the girl, and that's how it came up.

- And when it went to court, did you plead guilty?

- Yes.

- And it looks like you're from Milwaukee and were convicted in Milwaukee. Why do you wanna come to Green Bay?

- Honestly I wanna get away from Milwaukee. I met someone back in 2013 when my life was going kind of crazy. I had just separated from my wife, my ex-wife at the time, and I needed a fresh start. And so when I met her, that was my fresh start. And so not knowing the rules before I came up here, not knowing that I was supposed, there was a process. And so within not knowing a lot of stuff happened, and we got into it, and I received disorderly conduct because we were arguing, and then on top of that I had a ticket for because I did know. So after all of that I'm like this time I'm gonna do it the right way. I have two kids with her now, and I want my life with her. I wanna be back, I wanna be with my kids and with her and continue to move forward like we started to.

- How much time did you get for that case?

- Six years altogether.

- Two years confinement, four years under standard supervision.

- And are you off paper now?

- Yes.

- How long have you been off?

- Since 2012.

- You have a job.

- Not currently, no. I help my mother out because that's where I'm at. When she needs me, I help her. And sometimes I come back and forth, so I spend time with my children.

- Are you seeking to find a job? Are you doing applications?

- Here, once everything's approved I plan on working here so I can help my fiance out and everything like that because she's on this fit second because she has SSI, so there's only so much she can do with the two kids, and her money is stretched very thin at the moment.

- Have you been before to us before?

- No, I had an appointment prior, but I didn't know the date because I have smaller brothers and sisters, and so a lot of times when they get the mail they tend to put it up, and then it gets lost. And so I end up missing, I believe I missed a date last month or March, I believe.

- Okay, that's what, yeah.

- Okay, just have a question then regarding the landlord, whether it's dated February 3rd of 2017.

- Um hmm.

- A year ago?
- Okay.
- Why do we have a landlord letter from a year ago?
- I think she just misplaced the date because when we talked to her prior to, she filled one out before for that March 1.
- Because he didn't get the letter.
- Oh, from that one.
- She had put the date on there prior to for the, she wrote the letter before because I had filled it out, but I didn't submit the paper.
- A year ago?
- Correct, so she was like if we could find the letter, we could still use that. Hopefully we could still use just that letter. That's what she had explained to us, so that's why I sent a note with that letter.
- I called the landlord, got a hold of her and explained the letter, that it was an old letter. She said that she did write that letter in 2017, that she is aware he's a sex offender, that he's kind of been there on and off already, but she did approve him. She told me that verbally that, okay, she did do another letter, she did do another letter.
- Okay.
- But this one was from a year ago.
- Who's there Azra?
- My fiance that I was just--
- Oh, okay.
- Does anyone have questions about this crime? Okay, we'd like to talk to you about treatment. You have the option to do that in closed session or public session. What would you prefer?
- Public is fine.
- Okay, so we'll ask you, have you received treatment?
- I have not. When I was released from, they had me in the SOT treatment. I did that before my whole time on extended supervision.
- Where did you do that at?
- Hanger Enterprise LLC. It was downtown Milwaukee. I don't remember the exact address.
- Was that this Focus Family Services?
- No, that was my AODA.
- Did you provide us any documentation on that? I've not seen-

- No, I didn't have, they didn't give any certificates upon completion. They said they wasn't that type of treatment facility. Compared to the other two that I have previously, they didn't have no certificates upon completion. I was in there until I was off supervision, then that was it.

- They couldn't send you anything?

- They told me that last day that they don't make certificates, they don't, that's not proof because if I have to go back. They said basically anytime I'm on, I commit another offense I have like sex offender probation or I would be held to those rules, so once I could have to go back into treatment, so they never gave me a certificate when I completed because if I commit another crime, I go back on, it's like ongoing treatment. That's what I was told.

- Did you do anything while you were in the institution?

- No, because how my sentence was structured.

- So short.

- Yeah, and so that's why I had intake upon release, and then I had actual after the intake it was probably two weeks, two or three weeks of intake, and then I was actually put in the group where I just did that my whole four years on extended supervision.

- All right, can you talk about that, what is it, folks?

- Focus.

- Focus treatment, what was that all about?

- That was because I was on probation for my disorderly conduct I had two dirty UAs, and so my probation officer at the time put me into my AODA group, and that's why I was in there.

- Are you clean now?

- Yes.

- How long have you been?

- Two and a half years, since I finished the group.

- You also indicate that you attended this Nevermore Batters--

- Yeah, that was the batters innovation for my disorderly conduct.

- What'd you learn from that?

- For me it was more of a refresher course. I learned that not every argument I have to win. I also learned that even if something is thrown at me, I don't need to react to it. I could walk away, or I could just say nothing. I also learned that I need to stop raising my voice every time I get upset because that's how it started in the first place. My voice got loud and then, so I have to learn that watch what I say, especially in front of my kids. More and less, that's what I learned the most out of it.

- What kind of work would you like to do if you were in Green Bay now?

- I have a certificate for, I went to a class for probably four or five months as far as cleaning where I'm able to, I learned how to clean up blood and eco-friendly products and stuff like that, so I'm very equipped with

that. I know how to wax floors, strip floors, everything like that I learned from that class, and that's tools I didn't have before.

- You put your address as 3722 N. 23rd Street, Milwaukee. Do you actually live there right now?

- Yes, with my mother and my stepfather and my brothers and sisters, my younger siblings, yes.

- How many days a week are you there?

- Probably like two to three now because of my fiancé, and she has, we have two kids now, so my baby is five months, so I'm here a lot more and trying to help her because like I said, it's a lot, and I've been through being raised by a single mother. My mother has done that for me, so I don't wanna give her that same burden if I don't have to.

- And so you just worked in Milwaukee when the letter was sent to you for the last meeting?

- I was out, and then when I came back, you know like I said my brothers and sisters, they received the mail, and they put it up, and then it's like where's the mail at? I don't know, that type of situation.

- Have the police been to the Mather Street address?

- I've seen them once.

- To check on you?

- I was up here visiting. I received a ticket for failure to register, but like I told them, I was here visiting. I think it was a Saturday I got the ticket. I came to see my kids. They came to the house, they told me there, and they was like well, we were told you stay here. I'm like no, I'm just visiting. They gave me the ticket. I have to go to court in a couple days for it.

- Was that March 31st?

- Yes.

- Okay.

- I think we were asked about March meeting, and we did issue a citation. However, you should know that going back as far as 2014 he is listed 816 Mathers rather than Again in 2015 and then in 2018 I believe he was cited for the violation obviously March of this year. Also sex offender registry violation March 14th or 15th.

- At first I didn't know that. When I first came up here back in '14, I didn't know I had to fill out, there was a way of doing this. I just came up here, and so that's what this as far as the first ticket, and that after disorderly conduct. So when I was incarcerated for that, I got the ticket here as well. I went back to Milwaukee, paid the ticket and everything like that, so.

- Sir, when did you go off paper?

- For disorderly conduct or the sex offender?

- The sex offense.

- 2012.

- Okay.

- Do you have a driver's license?
- Yes.
- Do you have that on you?
- Yes.
- Can we see your driver's license to see what your address says? Do you have it listed in Milwaukee or here?
- Milwaukee. That's the address that's on the ticket that I received on the 31st. Because like I said that was where I was at prior to coming up here not knowing everything, that was my last address.
- So that's your mom's address.
- Well, I haven't recently changed, I haven't updated my address because I figure once they expire, then I will go and do so. But I have all my notes you will see at my mom's address.
- As of April 30th he last registered, he listed Mathers Street as his address, April 30th of this year.
- That's not correct. I actually put my mom's address because that's the address I was staying at. Look, I have a paper here when I was here visiting, and so I know they're from here. And so I don't know, that's probably why they used this address, but I never put 816 Mathers as my address.
- I'm just currently looking on the Wisconsin Department of Corrections Sex Offender Registry website.
- How come your name was on the mailbox on the upper level?
- The Cooper Holmes, because my daughter's last name is Cooper Holmes as well.
- On Mather.
- Yes, my two-year-old daughter with my fiance, her last name is Cooper Holmes, so she put it on to make sure she gets here mail, so they know that.
- Okay, this just says Holmes.
- Yeah, the website also indicates the 816 Mathers Street like the captain indicated, so.
- I never use that address for that because I'm registered until I find out here what's the whole switching with them.
- Does anyone have any further questions for him?
- No.
- Okay, do you have someone that would like to speak on your behalf or against you?
- Yes, I do.
- Yeah, we do.
- Oh, we have some people registered.
- We do, so we've three speakers that are registered, and I'll start with Adnan Zebic.

- Okay, sir, you'll have three minutes.

- Okay. I actually live downstairs. My sister lives upstairs, and she's with Clifford. They live on 816 upper, I live on 816 lower. I just wanna say well I'm talking their behalf. I mean I never had any problems with nothing. I have two daughters, is 11, Gracie is eight. I mean they consider him as an uncle pretty much part of the family. I know he's more now involved than he was before. Officer Beezer is one of them that gave him a ticket. I believe that was like two or three years ago I believe or something like that, I don't remember, but he's the one who suggested to do this. The paper was filled out last year, but because he could never get a job down here or nothing, I was gonna get him a job at Sears. We couldn't do that because he has to appear in here, and I wasso much for that. But my sister has a newborn right now, too. And I mean I just wanted to say that I never had any problems or nothing like that. And I know he's staying now more than what three or four days right now. It's only that because he does have kids upstairs. I was helping out my sister, my dad was helping out my sister, but it's good to see more than a picture now, than before. I mean, I could never see him before.

- So you say he stays there about three or four days a week?

- Correct, yes, right now because we were all, I mean it's too much. I mean I have two daughters downstairs. I mean you know kids upstairs, I mean it's hard to help, it really is, and that's why we wanted to get this going a long time ago, but he could never get a job until the fine was paid off. And now they gave him another fine, so everything is kind of hectic. Landlord is fine. No neighbors ever had any problems with him. I mean never, but that's pretty much what I wanted to say.

- Okay, thank you.

- Azra Zebic.

- Hi.

- Hi.

- I just want to talk on our behalf. We just want to have a life together, and just to be able to be with our kids and have our family, and for him to work and be a man, be the man that he wants to be for us and for his kids. And this has been like stopping him for a long time just because it's such a, it's got such a like stigma for it, you know, sex offender, register, you know, but it just, he's had a hard time with it. So I mean we have just been kind of like back and forth and back and forth, and we didn't like, we didn't join in the paper. We were scared the first time, and it was just a lot of different things, but we just want our family together. I mean we don't wanna be in Milwaukee. It's dangerous for our kids. I don't want my kids to grow up there. I've been here my whole life since I came here like from Bosnia in '95, so this is where I been all my life. I mean and this is where it's safe, you know, and I feel like we've never had, as much as he is up here back and forth, and like he does stay three or four, I mean he does. And we've never had any complaints about him. We've never had anything except the citations that he's gotten. I mean we've talked to the landlord numerous times. She's okay with everything. We just basically just wanna live our life, and wanna do it somewhere where we can be able to do that, where he can do that where it's legal, where it's, you know, where he doesn't have to get in trouble for it. That's pretty much it.

- How long have you been together?

- Since 2013.

- Okay.

- Thank you.

- B Tally.

- Bertha Tally.

- Could you spell that name for me?

- B-E-R-T-H-A T-A-L-L-Y.

- Okay, thank you.

- Hi.

- Hi.

- As Azra has stated, I been wanting him to be here as well given the fact that he does spend a bit of time here trying to help. And not only that, the area that I'm living in right now is, we're trying to move from there now. It's just ridiculous, and I prefer him to not get in any trouble, and you know, it seems to been working for him, you know, back and forth here and not having any, I worry about all my kids that I have there now, you know, because I have sons growing up and everything like that. My son, he will be graduating, the 18-year-old will be graduating this year, and he's going off to the Air Force, and I already have one in the Army. So I just want him to be safe. I know it's like Army safe? Yeah, right, you know, half way safe, but I feel that they're safe, and I'm worrying about, you know, a man, a Black man in Milwaukee, and it I just prefer him to be here with Azra helping her and everything like that. Just really, he really wanna get a job, but he can't get a job because I been, you need a job. Maybe if you had a job. Mom, I can't get a job because, you know, I can't register here, and I don't wanna live, you know, really, really live here. And I understand that, you know, and I really do want him to be with the family. And if that's possible, oh god, please you know, mothers, you know, you want your kids safe. And what he did, you know, was wrong. He admitted it, and you know he's been paying for it, and I just want him other just really become the man that he needs to be. And if you guys will allow him to be here, I'm quite sure he will. That's all.

- Okay, thank you.

- Thank you.

- That's it for the pre-registered speakers.

- Okay, does the board have any questions, comments? Anyone like to make a motion?

- I would move to approve his request.

- Address specific.

- Oh, I'm sorry, okay. 816 Mathers Street, move to approve Mr. Holmes request to move to 816 Mathers Street.

- Is there a second? Okay, so at this moment the motion has failed, so we maybe need to do some discussing.

- I'll make a motion to approve him to 816 Mathers Street for 90 days just to see how things are going, how it's, that's my motion.

- Is there a second on that one?

- I'll second that.

- Okay, we'll take a vote.

- The motion fails two-to-two vote.

- Okay, so we need to discuss. Obviously the board is split right now. I will tell you I voted no, the reason being is I really need to know about your sex offender treatment. I understand that your crime happened a long time ago, but I don't know what you know from what you learned, and so that's the reason. That's one of the criteria that we take into consideration when we approve you, and so that is the reason why I did not approve you.

- As well there seems to be some confusion, saying this and saying that, and that's I have a problem with without seeing anything on paper actually of what you've been involved in as far as treatment. And also we'd like to see you actually, there's employment out there, there's a lot of it out there, and I know you have a difficult time, more trying time as a sex offender, but there are places hiring all the time.

- I understand there's places in Milwaukee hiring, but my thing is trying to get up here, too.

- Well, there are things here, so we'd like to really see you at least, you know.

- I think where he's coming from is he's not looking for a job here, right, because you don't live here.

- Exactly.

- You're not here full time.

- I see, I see.

- So therefore I can't have employment here if I don't live here. That's why I have--

- But if you're here a couple days a week, you could at least throw some applications in somewhere, and then eventually get here, you know? Come back before the board.

- Come back before the board with a job and not being able to live here--

- Well, I'm not saying that's all the criteria, but that would be really good if you could do that. If you're coming down here three and four days a week anyway, you certainly have time to put some applications in.

- I have no problems putting the applications. It's just the fact that I don't live here, and if I do get a job, how would that work then? You know, I'm with her, I'm here at my fiancée house to help her with our kids. And for me to go and work and not stay here, and then I have to put that, you know I have to put that on paper for the registry that I have a job here, but I live Milwaukee, then that's So I'm trying to understand how--

- We wouldn't expect you to commute. At that time you would come back before us with, you know, at that time you have a job hopefully. If not, at least you're coming back with your paperwork that shows you've been in classes, you've done your homework what you've learned from it.

- I could tell you what I've learned from my SOT treatment.

- We have to see something, we have to see it.

- Yeah, so I know that you said they don't give out any kind of paperwork, but if you did that while you were on extended supervision, I know you're not on paper anymore, but the Department of Corrections has to have some documentation that you've done that. So I guess my suggestion would be that you try to get that documentation. I will make another motion that would include that information.

- Okay.

- Okay. All right, so I'll make a motion to approve you to 816 Mathers Street for 90 days, but you must return with documentation on your sex offender treatment.
- Okay, I could do that.
- I'll second that motion.
- Okay, we'll go for a vote.
- Still waiting for one more vote to come through. That motion passes on a three-to-one vote.
- Okay, so you'll have 90 days. You don't need to resubmit an application to come back. You'll just appear, you'll receive a letter, but you need to bring that documentation.
- Okay, thank you.
- Would you like that letter mailed to the Milwaukee address or to the Mather address?
- The Mather address.
- Thank you.
- Thank you.
- Okay, next on the agenda is the appeal of Robert Hass moving to 617 Kellogg Street. Okay, Robert has been here before on lots, many occasions, correct?
- Yes.
- Okay, and why is it that you are wanting to move? Well, it looks like we approved you before to an address.
- I was approved for the 421 Cherry Street address.
- Yeah, and now you're currently at the TLP, is that correct?
- Yes, ma'am.
- All right, so what happened to the other address?
- I end up being put on appeal hold, given a 44 day sanction because I had a violation misuse of the internet at NWTC accessing Facebook, and I had in my possession a smartphone without prior approval and knowledge, and I was using the internet on there for adult porn, Facebook, like ordering stuff for an ex-boyfriend of mine that's still in prison. So I told my P.O. that back in December, and I got locked up January 4th, and I got sent to Sturgeon Bay Door County Jail like 13 days later. I got out March 2nd.
- To the half way house?
- No, homeless. I was homeless like four days. I was on the--
- Hold on a second, we're having some difficulties. Okay, go ahead, I'm sorry.
- So I was homeless from March 2nd to I think March 6th Within like a week after I got back in the TLP I land myself in another jail because I had lost my American I actually have last week pay stub here, because I get paid weekly, so the--

- Let me just tell you what we're looking at. We're looking at what looks like a check stub from Arrowtech. Looks like we have 31 hours at \$11.50 an hour, direct deposit in Chase Bank. Anyone wanna look at that? Okay, is that a temp agency?

- Yes, ma'am.

- Where do they have you located?

- I work at Wisconsin Plastics in Ashwobeno. I was trying to get a more recent pay stub, but when I checked the Arrowtech website yesterday they didn't have it because my direct deposit didn't hit until like overnight last night. I do have couple letters on my behalf from my case manager, Kathy, as well as my SOT facilitator.

- Okay. First of all, when we discuss this treatment stuff, is it okay public or private?

- Public.

- Public, okay.

- Top one is from Kathy, the bottom one is from my facilitator, Rebecca Curtis.

- All right, we'll just so we have a letter from Adic, the case manager at the half way house. Basically she says he attends all meetings with him. Made efforts to follow through on working that will help him ensure his growth. Didn't have a job. Now he's maintained a job. Engages in groups and treatments, SOT and circles of support. All right, this other letter is also from the Attic, from the sex offender treatment specialist. So March 8th you started sex offender treatment two and completed seven sessions. You identified social skills you would like to improve on and ways to do that, and you discussed stressors and asked for feedback from the group. Okay.

- I know I was supposed to come and see you guys back in February in regards to the Cherry Street address, and I was given some stipulations in regards to documentation from my SOT provider. The most recent pay stub as well as the completion of Thinking for a Change. I do have the certificate for T for C.

- Okay, that's dated November 9th of 2017.

- And then I had a, last year when I came here the first time, I had forgot to bring some certificates I had had done while I was in prison. I don't know if you guys wanted to see them or not.

- The what, I'm sorry.

- Certificates of like house and stuff that I did while I was in prison. I've got--

- No, personally I don't need to see them. What about you guys?

- Okay, but I am currently waiting to hear from Brown County Mental Health. Rebecca had put in a code for me, and as of Thursday last week she hasn't heard anything yet. But I do have my copy of the receipt of the thing for it if you guys wanna see it.

- What's gonna happen at the Brown County Mental Health?

- I got diagnosed by the Army back in 2008 with anxiety depression, and I also wanted to be emailed for like bipolar, ADHD, like anger issues kind of thing because I deal with that. So I deal with panic attacks like constantly, like maybe 15 a month maybe. And it's like my agent told me last week I'm putting like too much stress on myself. So I don't know. Was being back at the TLP trying to find a place, find a stable job before my 90 days because my 90 days is up on June 6th for the TLP, and if I don't get approved for this residence, I'll be homeless again if I don't get an extension. So that's where some of the panic attacks

have come from was stemming from trying to find a residence because I was trying find a place in Ashwobenon, but my agent told me they don't rent to sex offenders. So that shut the door on me.

- Can you just explain to me having gone through Thinking of Change, you enrolled in WTC, then why did you start doing the Facebook and the pornography on the phone? And why would you do that having gone through all this?

- Because I was arrogant. I started to not care about my freedom. I wanted to reconnect with family. I was like, I acted like horny all the time, and that's why I reverted to watching porn.

- When did you join Facebook?

- When I was in high school I had a Facebook account. I don't remember the username or password.

- Well, how did you get on Facebook then again? I don't belong to Facebook, but I thought you had to belong to it to be able to see what's on it.

- Yeah, that's true. I was on it when I was at NWTC, and I was using, trying to get onto Facebook. I was actually in the process of trying to break my court order of no contact with my victim's older sister because I, in my belief and my viewpoint, I feel like her and I like bonded, like actually like brother and sister, and I wanted to explain everything and move on, but what I need to do is focus on myself. I got three years and like four days left of before I'm discharged from supervision. And the rate that I'm going with that stuff, I won't see it. I'll land myself back in jail, possibly prison. That is why I would like to get a place of my own so I'd be able to just go home, shut the door, like exclude myself from people and just focus on what I need to do to be successful. Not just on, but life beyond the mess I put myself in.

- Does anyone have any further questions for him? Okay, it appears we have a speaker, on his behalf or against, I'm not sure.

- This is Erik Gajovnik.

- I'm a group facilitator with Circles of Support, and he's been coming to group since I believe since March 28th, and he's made every one of our meetings in that time, and he's been an active participant,

- Thank you.

- Sure.

- That's the only pre-registered speaker.

- Anybody else wanna speak on his behalf? Okay. Oh, yes.

- We just need you to state your name and address for the.

- Name is Roy DeRuyter, address 1079 Butternut Lane, Oneida.

- Please spell your last name.

- D-E capital R-U-Y-T-E-R.

- Thank you.

- I basically wanna state just to back up what Eric said, he does participate, he comes to group.

- You're with Circles of Support.

- I'm with Circles of Support, excuse me. And he does open up and speak to us about his concerns there, which is what we wanna him doing. And you know, that's why, we're trying to assist him in his moving forward, you know, so that's basically what I wanna say.
- Okay, thank you. Okay, is there a motion?
- I'm just between ... Having done what you did, I'm having a hard time allowing myself to allow you to live at another address. That's my thinking right now. I just am not, I don't know. If any of you have anything.
- That is true, but he'll be on the street otherwise, too.
- Yeah, that's my concern though, too. So you have a job now at this other job, so is it gonna terminate at a certain point, or is this temporary until you get something different?
- I got maybe like 41 days left with the temp agency. I'm placed on 90 day grace period of whatever with the company. My supervisor loves how I work because I've been talking with Keith McCain from Arrowtech, my recruiter on the phone for almost every week or every other week, and he tells me that they like how I work because I'm a good worker. So with that he thinks, and I've, and they will possibly hire me.
- That must give you a little more confidence in yourself.
- Yes. I love the job Wisconsin Plastics. Once I get hired on, I am going to be applying for the material handler position because I am a material handler by trade, and I when I was working at what is now SPG, which was Handsburg, which was a McDonald's bag and Subway items And then that's why I picked up on that trade, and I love doing that kind of stuff.
- So you're looking into the future. Why do you wanna turn back with these other things? Why can't you just keep looking forward? What's stopping you?
- Because I hate being alone. This is actually gonna be my first time. I'm 28, going to be 29 in September, and this is actually gonna be my first apartment if approved by myself. I always used to be living with friends, family, and I always likegrowing up, so I never really learned how to cope like being by myself and talking until I hit high school, and I was put back in foster care and I was slowly coming out of my shell.
- But if you're living alone, and you don't like to be alone. Are you in any other treatment beside the Circle of Support?
- SOT, those two.
- And you're still going to that, but you've been to seven, okay.
- I'm just doing that for right now, two for right now because I don't wanna put too much on my caseload to see if I was interested. I can talk with her about it and the group tomorrow morning because I meet Thursday mornings for SOT. So that's some plan. I may go into some more like mens' groups or support groups at some point, but right now I just don't want to like overload over myself, especially with trying to find a place to live and keeping up with Jack.
- Explain your current living condition for me, please. You're at.
- The Attic Correction Services. It's a transitional living program for people that come out of jail or prison. I have given a 90-day grace period so to speak until I find a place to live and a job.
- Okay, and is there a possibility of extension?

- I would have to talk with my PO and the case manager about that because I don't know what the, because there's a list of people for the Attic, so I don't know if there's anybody like coming on the waiting list, so I don't know.

- I'm just gonna say my two cents worth. So I denied you in the past, and the reason why I defied you in the past is because basically we both agreed at one point that you were defiant and you didn't wanna follow rules, and I asked you what changed, and you said going to prison and you matured. You've gone through all of this, and you still went back and violated your probation rules. And not just going on Facebook, but going on porn, so I have serious concerns about that. And the fact that you said you wanted to contact the victim's sister, all in violation. That's defiance in my opinion, so that's where I stand at this point. I just want you to know. Does anyone wanna make a motion?

- I'll make a motion. I am going to make a motion to deny to move at 617 Kellogg Street, address specific.

- Is there a second?

- I second that motion.

- We'll go for a vote.

- The motion is to deny. If you run, I can't change it.

- You can't.

- I can.

- Okay, do up there, right?

- Okay, so the motion to deny passes on a three-to-one vote, so he's denied. His application's denied.

- Okay, so you're not approved to live there. You'll have to find something else.

- Thank you.

- Okay, next on the agenda is the appeal of Pascanell Cheatam, requesting to move to 1904 Bastion Street, number three.

- Mr. Cheatam, you, right, it's Cheatam?

- Yes.

- You're kind of laughing like I'm not saying it right.

-can't even get it right.

- I believe you've been here before, correct? And are we just having you come back because we needed something?

- I was told that in order to move to another place I gotta see you guys.

- He was here to get a different address. Now he wants to move to another one.

- Oh okay, okay, so let's see here, the last time you were here was back in 2015. Do we need to go over his offense? Do we want that captured? Okay, so you've been living at the 9th Street address, which we approved you back in 2015, and you're moving, was it because they sold the place or something?

- My reason for wanting to move is because as you can see it got a one-year-old now, and she's trying to do some walking, and the place is just too small.
- Okay, so 1904 Bastion. That was the one above the thing, right?
- Yeah, because this one is the old one. It's the same holding company, but it's for the 9th Street, but this one shows up black on our packet.
- Oh, okay.
- Deitrich Construction owned it and sold it to SY Holding, both of their properties.
- All right, and are you on paper anymore?
- has been completed.
- All right. And are you currently working?
- I'm on social security at the time.
- Is that permanent?
- Hopefully, depending on our president. He did talk about doing away with social security.
- So this is your child with your fiance, but you had two other children, correct, that were adopted. And if I remember correctly those people came to speak on your behalf, correct?
- Yes.
- And do you still have a relationship with those children?
- Not really because the new baby, so it is what it is. I can't do nothing about it.
- Is that because you choose not to do anything about it.
- They're mad because he had another child.
- They just basically just don't wanna see anymore because I have another child to tend to, and they have the right to tell me you can't see them because they're no longer your kids, they're our kids.
- Okay. How long has that been going on? Since she's been born?
- A few months before she was born actually.
- Okay.
- Does anyone have questions they wanna ask him about anything, treatment? okay, and then we have somebody who would like to speak on his behalf.
- We've been together for the last two years. I've been living with him. We had her. There's never been a police contact. Like he went and got his license. He went through a treatment program, got his driver's license back. Everything's been really doing actually good.
- Okay.
- I failed the test the first time.

- That's all right. Would anyone like to make a motion?
- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Cheatam, address specific, 1904 Bastion Street, number three.
- Second.
- Okay, we'll take a vote on that.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, you're good to move to Bastion Street. Would you like us to mail this to you there or to the 9th Street address?
- The 9th Street address because the apartment's not gonna be ready until the first. It's supposed to be the 15th, but they got so much stuff they gotta redo they said it's not gonna be ready by the 15th.
- All right, we'll send it there then. Okay, thank you. Next on the agenda is the appeal of Jack Kanzenbach. However, we did receive an email that he has to withdraw his application for that. So could we make a motion, do we need to make a motion for that?
- I make a motion to deny.
- I'll second that.
- It was on the agenda, we should have a motion.
- To withdraw him or to deny him.
- For the time being to deny.
- Okay, I make a motion to deny.
- I'll second that motion.
- Okay, we'll take a vote on that. Sometimes they come in color and sometimes they don't.
- Okay, motion to deny was passed.
- Okay, next on the agenda is we have our next meeting date scheduled for Wednesday, June 13th at 2:30 in this room. Public hearings. Okay, we're good on that. And would somebody like to make a motion to adjourn.
- I'll make a motion to adjourn.
- And second.
- I'll second.
- And we'll take a vote.
- You hit the wrong one.
- Everybody voted, passed unanimously.
- Good.
