VERBATIM MINUTES

- Okay, I'm gonna bring to order the meeting of the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board here for August the 8th. I'd just like to start real quick. Do we have to go through the roll call or not? Okay, roll call. Dean Gerondale, Renee Keehan is here, Kathy De Cremer, Melissa Cheslock is here. And it looks like Heidi Michel has called in where she cannot be here today. First item on the agenda is the approval of the August 8th meeting notes. Does anybody want to make a comment on them or make a motion to approve?

- I make a motion to approve.

- I'll second that.

- Okay, the vote's coming through.

- Okay, our--

- Kathy, Kathy just waiting for your vote. Okay I'd say it's passed.

- Okay we're gonna start with our first appeal which is for--
- No minutes, there are minutes for the 11th and--
- Oh I'm sorry. The second is the approval of our minutes for the July 16th special meeting.
- July 11th was the first one.
- July 11th? Oh dang it, it just kicked me out. Okay, the first is to approve our meeting minutes notes for the July 11th meeting.
- I'll make that motion.
- Seconded.
- All right, vote should be coming. Unanimously passed.
- All right, next we have our meeting notes from our July 16th meeting. Anybody want to make a motion in regards to that?
- I'll make the motion to approve it.
- Seconded.
- Checking the vote. Unanimously passed.
- Okay we're going to move to our first item on the agenda, which is the appeal of Michael Gryske. Is Michael here?
- Yes.
- Michael would you please come up?
- Michael would you please come up? Michael we're gonna be talking about your case today. As we do talk about it I wanna make sure that you understand kind of what we're gonna go through today. First, is when we talk about the particular victim, just refer to the person as the victim, not by a proper name or as my daughter, or aunt, or whoever it may be.
- [Michael] Okay.
- Second of all, we may talk about your educational treatment programs. And you have the right for that to either do it in public or private session. Which would you prefer?
- Public's fine.
- Okay, great. We're gonna get started here. Michael currently you're living at the TLP at 17621 Shawano Avenue?
- Correct.
- All right, you're looking to move to 1681 Deckner Avenue, apartment number nine, correct?

- [Mic] Yes sir.
- All right. First I'd like to start off with, tell us about your sexual assault back in 2003 against a nine year old, what happened there?
- [Michael] It was, do you want like details?
- I want details. What happened?
- [Michael] I forced her to touch my penis, to masturbate me.
- On more than one occasion?
- Correct.
- Okay.
- [Michael] For about one year.
- How did it come to light that you were abusing the victim?
- [Michael] She informed her counselor.
- Okay, and then you were arrested after that?
- [Michael] Correct.
- How did you in your case, how did you plead?
- [Michael] At first, not guilty.
- Okay, and then when it went to trial did you plead guilty, or you went through the trial and was...
- I was convicted.
- All right. Question for you. Did you actually commit the crime?
- [Michael] Yes, I did.
- Just from the standpoint of the case, is that correct in terms of what he originally pleaded not guilty and then what he did to the victim?
- As far as the plea, I'm not sure, but that is a description of the event. It's accurate from what I have.
- Okay, all right. Sir, so I guess the first thing is what was going through your mind as you were abusing this girl?
- [Michael] I was selfish. I wasn't thinking of her feelings or anything like that. I was thinking more of my gratification, my self gratification. Which was wrong at the time.
- How old were you?
- [Michael] I was 30, 27, eight.

- And how much time did you serve again?

- [Michael] 13 years.

- Okay, and during that time you didn't have a chance to do any SOT training?

- [Michael] Correct, I asked for it repeatedly. Saying, when can I get my program. I was told that I was on the list, I was on the list, and come to find out I was never on their list for the program. I mean like I said, I have all the documentation showing that I asked for it. They failed to get me the program and currently I'm on the waiting list now for it.

- Okay, when were you released?

- [Michael] April 18th this year.

- Okay, does anybody have anymore questions in regards to his conviction and the crime he committed?

- I do.

- Yes ma'am.

- With the way that you described the crime you said that it was for you own selfish gratification and you weren't thinking about the child victim. Any point in time it crossed your mind that it was inappropriate simply because of the age?

- [Michael] Yes.

- But, you continued to do what you did.

- [Michael] Correct, I was out of control at that time.

- Now is there any other, did you have any other victim that you were not convicted of, that you assaulted during this time frame or before?

- [Michael] No sir.

- So, if this was your only time, what lead you to this particular victim and what you got out of it versus a normal relationship?

- [Michael] I took advantage of her. It was more or less a thrill thing, that I forced upon her. I guess I took advantage of her trust in me as an adult.

- Okay. So are you currently employed sir?

- [Michael] Yes I am.

- Where are you employed?

- [Michael] Valley Transfer.

- Okay, and what do you do for them?

- [Michael] I am a truck driver.
- A long distance truck driver?
- [Michael] Local.
- Local?
- Yes sir.
- Was that your profession before you were convicted?
- [Michael] Yes sir.
- Okay. Any other questions for him?
- I have one question.
- Yes ma'am?
- Pretty much coming forward with everything, why did you plead not guilty?
- [Michael] That was the advice of my lawyer at the time, counsel. I expressed that I'd like to plead guilty and I was naive to the justice system. I didn't know how it worked and he said, well you don't wanna do that, you wanna plead not guilty and go through the trial. And go through that process, so that's what I did.
- Under support you have a, you name your wife, but when you say who you live with she's not listed. Are you--
- Correct. She lives in Florida.
- You have a question?
- Yeah, question here is any, does your wife have children?
- [Michael] Yes.
- How old are the children?
- [Michael] They are 19 and 25, and 13.
- And 13. Is there any plan in the near future for her to move here with the 13 year old?
- [Michael] No.
- It says here in terms of your, when you got out here that you also have to maintain obtain full time employment, which you have. Undergo psychiatric or psychological evaluation. Has that been done yet?
- [Michael] Not yet.
- Okay.
- I'm sorry, what part exactly, it was a compound question?

- It was just basically under his conditions of release. Which is basically maintaining full time employment and then psychological treatment, undergo psychological or psychological evaluation.

- Have you undergone the evaluation?

- [Michael] I did an assessment. I don't know if it's the same, it's included in the sex offender treatment program. So, I don't know, I guess so.

- So, if that was the evaluation assuming that,

- Correct.

- Then it's only the treatment that you're not undergoing now?

- [Michael] Correct, I'm currently on the waiting list for it.

- With who?

- [Michael] Addict Services.

- Okay, are you currently on GPS?

- [Michael] No.

- Okay. Upon your release from the TLP will you be on GPS?

- [Michael] No.

- Okay. Any other questions?

- Yes. Do you have a no contact with the victim?

- [Michael] Correct, yes I do.

- Do you have any other family here in town for support?

- No, I don't.

- So, why should we let you live in the city of Green Bay? Obviously, you haven't had treatment yet, which under what you're telling us, you've applied for it, but you didn't have it yet. So, tell me why we should take a risk with you being here.

- [Michael] Because I'm just looking for a second chance. I'd like to, as far as giving back to the community, I think the way that I can do that is maintaining my full employment, paying my bills, getting my treatment, having a place to live that would help my rehabilitation. Like I said, this is my first time ever being in prison, going through things like this. I've learned my lesson. I'm just looking to rebuild my life and try to make up for my past mistakes when I was selfish. I'm not the same person I was back then. I think I would be a good candidate to move into the city.

- You can understand my trepidation here is I'm just meeting you now. I don't know what you were like before versus what you are today. And that's why the evaluation and psychological treatment in terms of SOT training carries a lot of weight here. Just from the standpoint of potential risk of re-offense.

- [Michael] I had the assessment done while I was in prison and everything came back then, my re-offense was low, everything was low.
- Do you have a copy of it?
- [Michael] I do not. I wish I had that copy. The only documentation I have as far as my appeal is to get into the treatment program while I was in prison.
- Okay, all right.
- [Michael] I was asked the question, well how are you not going to re-offend again? And my answer was because the price I paid the first time, was too high. I lost friends, family, my self-worth, everything else. And that's the answer I can give is that I can't afford to re-offend again. I just can't. I'm not that same person again. I'm just looking for a second chance to rebuild my life.
- Okay.
- I have a question for you. There was a prior offense in Oregon for harassment?
- Correct.
- Okay, is that where you're from originally?
- No, I'm originally from Green Bay.
- Okay, and you have no family, no relatives, no friends here?
- I have family that lives North of Green Bay, but that relationship is no longer there. I lived here and then I joined the military. I was gone and I got out and I lived out in Oregon at the time, and then I moved back to Wisconsin.
- Okay.
- I have one more question. In regards to your victim, you said it affected her horribly. But, with therapy she was able to overcome that. How do you know that?
- [Michael] Because I'm in contact with her mother.
- Okay.
- [Michael] And she's like I said, she's doing great, she's doing well. So, I'm happy for her.
- All right, does anybody have anymore questions if not, unless you have anything more to say?
- I don't.
- Okay.
- Do you have anyone here to speak for you?
- [Michael] Yes, I do.

- Who would like to speak either for or against him? Raise your hand please. Sir, why don't you come on up. I just need your name and address for the record please.

- [Roger] My name is Roger Shiltz.

- And where do you live Roger?

- 2339 Forest Widows Court.

- Okay just want to let you're limited to three minutes, go ahead sir.

- [Roger] I just wanted to let you know that I'm a life long friend of Mike. We met about 37 years ago in grade school. He's always been a great guy, stand up guy, and he's never had a anger issue, substance issues, nothing like that. He's just always been a great guy. His family was basically my family. I think I ate dinner at his house more than I ate at my own house. We were very close growing up. Even when life took us in different directions we still kept in contact. He's a hard worker, just all around great guy. I would have no issues with Mike moving into my own neighborhood. He made a huge mistake, I don't deny that. But, I think he deserves a chance to try to rebuild his life. And he has support with me and my girlfriend.

- Okay, all right thank you.

- I have a question. So Mr. Shiltz,

- Yes.

- Do you have any children?

- [Roger] Yes I have two daughters.

- Okay, how old are they?

- [Roger] 15 and 10.

- Knowing what you know, would you have a problem with your friend living with you?

- [Roger] No, I wouldn't have a problem.

- No further questions.

- Thanks a lot. Okay, if there's nothing else, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to the appeal of Mr. Gryske to, what's the location here, sorry?

- 1681 Deckner, apartment nine.

- 1681 Deckner, apartment nine.

- Motion to deny.

- Okay, is there a second?

- I will second that motion.

- Okay, any discussion? I think the only thing that I wanna say sir is that in my opinion, I think for me, I would be more willing to look at your appeal to live here long term and start that life over, knowing that you had some sort of sexual offender treatment. I know you're on the waiting list so to me it doesn't mean that if you're denied here that you can never come back. But, my own personal feeling is without lack of knowledge of what that assessment's gonna say and what your treatment's gonna go through, for me it's gonna be very difficult. So, I just wanna let you know that in turn before we vote. So we, unless you want--

- I agree, I wish you would've had that evaluation, that we could've saw that to see what they did say about you. That would be the one thing.

- Okay, so we have a motion to deny him to move to 1681 Deckner Avenue. So we're ready to take a vote.

- It's a two to two vote, so motion to deny fails.

- Okay, just for the board to know by voting yes on that, that you agree with denying. If you voted no, that means you

- Agreed,

- You agree,

- Against it.

- against it. So, just to make sure everybody know that. So, right now we're at a tie so the motion fails. So we're back in discussion. Does anybody want to share their vote as to why they did what they did? And are they willing to change it or make another motion?

- Actually, I did it the opposite.

- You did the opposite?

- Yeah.

- Okay, so I'm gonna make a motion to deny Mr. Gryske to 1681 Deckner Avenue, apartment number nine, again. Is there a second?

- Seconded.

- The motion to deny passes on a three to one vote.

- Okay, sir so what your next options are here is first of all you can't live within the city of Green Bay. It doesn't mean you can't come back with another location. But, in terms of what I told you before I think the best time to come back to, if you want to live within the city of Green Bay is that you complete your SOT training. Okay? All right thank you. Our next appeal is Michael Wesolowski. Okay Michael looks like you are living at 17, excuse me 7681 on Kaiser Road in Oconto Falls?

- [Michael] Oconto Falls, yes.

- You wanna move to Oregon Street, 1192?

- [Michael] Yes.

- All right, again we're gonna talk about your case. And just refer to the person as the victim. Second of all, again if you want to talk about your treatment programs you have the right to do it in public or private. Which do you prefer?

- Public's fine.

- Public's fine, okay great. So, it looks like you were convicted of possession of child pornography is that correct?

- [Michael] Yes.

- Okay. And you basically got your three year prison term. You served three years, then you got three years of supervision?

- [Michael] Yeah.

- Okay, and when were you released?

- [Michael] July 18th.

- July--

- Of last year.

- Of last year?

- Yeah.

- Okay. So, what brings you to Green Bay?

- [Michael] I wanna get a better job.

- Where are you currently working right now?

- [Michael] Working on my farm.

- Working on your farm? Do you have a job here yet?

- Not yet.

- Not yet.

- [Michael] The farm I work at it's a difficult situation because I'm living at the farm. And he told me if I go get a different job somewhere I can't live there, so then I'd be homeless again.

- Gotcha. So tell us in terms of your crime here, what began your reason that you started looking at child pornography?

- Well, I was introduced to porn by my father as a child and it became an addiction. And it just escalated. Four years ago I got caught.

- How did you get caught?

- [Michael] My ex went on my email and found an email that contained the kind of pictures. That's when the police made up a report and filed charges.
- Okay, and how did you plead to that case?
- [Michael] At first my lawyer told me to plead not guilty because we didn't have a discovery or any paperwork on the case. After that, I pled guilty.
- Okay. Any more questions related to his crime that anybody would like to ask? Is that how you see the case too?
- Yeah, it was under age photos of a girl, 10 counts.
- 10 counts? So, is that one count per picture?
- Yes.
- That's how it was done, okay.
- [Michael] Five were charged and then five were read in.
- Okay.
- What were the ages, that you were looking at? All ages?
- Around like 15 or so.
- Under age of 16.
- Under the age of 16, okay.
- Thank you.
- Okay so I guess my, you've gone through SOT training right?
- [Michael] Correct.
- So, tell me about that training, what you kind of learned from that.
- [Michael] That porn's an addiction. Every time a photo is viewed, that person is victimized. It's all over the internet, everybody views it so they get victimized all the time. They've got relapse prevention plans, all types of other stuff.
- So, you've been out for a year. Have you viewed any type of pornography since you've been out?
- [Michael] No.
- Okay. Do you have access to the internet?
- [Michael] No.
- Okay. Is that part of the condition of your parole?

- [Michael] Yes.
- So you don't own a computer then?
- [Michael] No.
- What is your plan for relapse?
- [Michael] Personally, talk to your family and everything. Be open with everybody and if I need it go get help. Relapse, or having a problem thinking of relapsing. Call my probation officer. Return to another treatment program, whatever it takes.
- How often do you meet with your parole officer?
- [Michael] Every two weeks.
- Here in Green Bay?
- No, in Oconto.
- In Oconto? Okay, has Brown County accepted you to move here yet? Do you know? In terms of, did you commit your crime in Brown County or Oconto County?
- [Michael] Brown County.
- In Brown County.
- [Michael] I was originally released from prison here in order for me not to be homeless I had to be transferred to Oconto County.
- Okay, all right. So, this being the town where you wanna live, until you get a job, how do you plan to pay for your apartment?
- [Michael] Well, I have a job.
- At the farm right?
- Yeah.
- So, you still plan to then commute from Green Bay?
- [Michael] No. The second you guys approve me to live in Green Bay I have to tell my probation officer in Oconto County. He'll transfer paperwork to Brown County, the second I'm approved I can find a job here.
- I thought by reading that was a part time job.
- [Michael] It's a little more than part time. I work there six days a week.
- Okay, any other questions for him?
- Do you have any job prospects, out this way in Green Bay?

- [Michael] Once it gets approved I'll guaranteed get a construction job building houses again, or siding. Last year, a guy wanted to start me at 15 dollars an hour to run a siding crew. But, I was at the farm, and I ran into the problem I just couldn't go because my home was there.

- And where does your family live?

- [Michael] I've got family that lives in Green Bay, Gillett, Oconto County, Sobieski, all over.

- Do you have contact with them?

- My family?

- Yeah. All right, any other questions?

- Is the person that you're gonna live with a male or a female?

- [Michael] A female.

- And what is your relationship to that person?

- [Michael] Friend.

- Is that friend the person that's already on a rental agreement or does that person own the residence?

- [Michael] Owns the residence.

- Okay, any other questions? Does anybody wanna speak either for or against Michael? Please come forward.

- [Gail] All of us at one time?

- Well if it's different people one at a time.

- Yeah, we've got six people who plan on saying something.

- Okay, so one at a time then.

- [Gail] I can go. Ma'am I just need your name and your address. Just to let you know you're limited to about three minutes.

- Gail Coleman.

- Okay.

- [Gail] 362 Beaumier Lane, Sobieski.

- Go ahead.

- [Gail] Michael is my great nephew. He's made mistakes and he's admitted to 'em. He's a good guy and he's a hard worker. He does a lot of maintenance work and he does a lot landscaping and yard work. I had him do work for me and he's compulsive about getting the job done right. He's very reliable and I think that Michael has learned a lot through this whole process. I've seen him start to come out of his shell and to blossom as an individual. I think that given the circumstances of what has transpired and what he's gone through he's done

nothing but learn from this process. I don't see any problem with Michael living anywhere. He's a good young man and he is growing into who he is. So, that's about as much I can say for him.

- All right, thank you. Next person. Anybody else wants to say anything? Again, I just need your name and address please.

- [Noell] I'm Noell De Bauch. 321 North McKenzie street in Gillett. I'm Michael's mother. Again, I will divulge that he has learned his lesson. I'm getting emotional. He won't do anything to anybody.

- Why do you think he did what he did?

- [Noell] Because of my ex-husband.

- Okay. And you think he's got enough through his training--

- He'll be the first person there to help you. Whether you're family, a neighbor, a friend. He'd take off the shirt on his back to help anybody.

- Could you tell us, this is one of my concerns. So far we have family that lives in Gillett, then Sobieski...

- Who's gonna--

- [Noell] And Green Bay.

- Okay we haven't heard that. Who's gonna be there for him when he needs somebody?

- [Noell] I can be there 24 seven.

- But do you understand there's the geographical issue?

- [Noell] Right, I'm only a 30 minute drive away. He knows where I live if he needs help, I'm there. And he knows that. He's hard working. He is a man of his word. I couldn't be more proud of him. He grew up in a bad situation.

- Okay, is there anything else? I understand that you're emotional.

- Yes.

- Okay, thank you.

- Is there anybody else? Sir come on up.

- [Glenn] Glenn Coleman, I'm his grandfather.

- Okay, address sir?

- [Glenn] 1351 Hannah Street.

- Okay, go ahead.

- Where is that city?

- Green Bay.

- Okay.

- [Glenn] And it'll be three blocks from where he's moving. So... I can see the change in him. From childhood to now. Before he went in and since he got out. He's changed 100%. I've had him at my house helping me out and he's just a totally different person.

- Does he have what you consider normal relationships with other people his own age and that or is he just, more kind of sticks to himself?

- [Glenn] He's more outgoing now. Like my sister said, he used to be in a shell. He'd look down, he wouldn't look you in the eye. Now he looks you in the eye, he talks to you, he's outgoing now.

- All right, anything else?

- No, he's just 100% better.

- Okay.

- Thank you.

- All right, anyone else? Come on up Ma'am. Hi, your name and address please?

- [Debra] Debra Hickey, 612 North Locust Street.

- Here in Green Bay?

- [Debra] Here in Green Bay, yes.

- Go ahead.

- [Debra] 3/4 or 8/10 of a mile away from where he wants to live. I've know Mike since last October. I think he is one of the smartest people I've ever met. I just, I thought it when I met him. I didn't know him from anybody else. And I took him in kind of as my third child. He spent a lot of time in our house. There is nothing I've seen that he can't do. He was quiet when he first came. But, then the more you get to know him, the more he opened up and he's really been a delightful person. We've shared holidays with him. Actually, 1192 Oregon Street is my daughter's house.

- So, is that how you got to know him through your daughter.

- [Debra] No.

- Okay, so tell me how did he interact with you in terms of that first time?

- [Debra] Putting a roof on our house. There's nothing he can't do, nothing he can't do, I call him Mighty Mike. He's handy, he's giving, he's caring, he's just, I've never seen anybody work so hard in my life. Because he'll work at the farm and will come over and help to work on our roof until whatever time it was. And I'm proud to know him. I understand that I've seen a lot of kids go through a lot of things. Young adults grow up and do things that they really wish they wouldn't have done, and totally understand, he's explained it to us, and totally believe in him 125%.

- Okay, thank you. All right, anybody else? All right. State your name and address please.

- [Cora Mae] Cora Mae Hickey.

- Okay.

- [Cora Mae] My address is 1192 Oregon Street.

- Okay, go ahead.

- [Cora Mae] I am Mike's girlfriend. I've known him since, about November, but I've known of him since October. My Mom I moved to Green Bay into my house from Manitowoc. I hadn't even met Mike yet, but he was already fixing things on my house, and stuff for my parents because they owned it before me. He helped my Dad, move all my stuff from Manitowoc up here, and still had never met me. And they weren't even paying him for it or anything. Then one day I finally got to meet the guy and after just spending time with him a couple of times with my parents we kind of just meshed together right away. I have an amazing connection with Mike. I know a lot of people probably don't get to see the side of him that I do, but he's really sweet and kind, and loving, and respectful to me. We would like to live together and go forward with our relationship.

- Okay, thank you.

- I have a quick question. If Mike was denied today, his ability to move. And say, he's able to find a job within the next couple of weeks, months, can he still move back in with you at your home?

- Oh yeah, absolutely.

- All right, does anybody have anymore discussion with him? Or sir would you like to say anything before we ask for a motion?

- [Michael] No.

- Okay, go--

- I will tell you my concern is that you don't have a job lined up yet. I understand that the moment you get a job, where you're living right now on that farm he will evict you basically. But a lot of places when you get a job they'll give you a prospective or update out in the future for a start date. That would give you time, or some people tend to be a little more flexible in letting you work out your situation, moving and all that. So, my concern is that you don't have a job right now.

- [Michael] Okay. You guys do these appeals what, every month?

- Mm hmm.

- [Michael] There's no job gonna guarantee a job a month out. They're looking for an employee to work now, not a month from now. The position needs to be filled. And if I go get a job lined up they're gonna want me there in two weeks. That doesn't give me enough time to come again, to come and see the board. Then, I'd be homeless for two weeks before I'd see the board again.

- Would you be homeless, or would you have the opportunity to maybe live with your grandparents, your mother?

- He can't do that. The ordinance doesn't allow for it.

- His mom doesn't live in...

- Oh she lives in Gillett right.
- [Michael] My probation won't let me live with her.
- Okay.
- [Michael] Because they have a gun safe.
- Okay, what about the other relatives that you have that are here, that are not in Green Bay?
- [Michael] It's all the same thing. The second I'm homeless, I'm out on GPS bracelet, I have nowhere to go. I'd be out of everything until I come see the board again.
- Okay.
- That's why it makes it very, it's complicated.
- And you're still not guaranteed to come back into Brown County. You still have to be accepted by Brown County right?
- [Michael] Yes, but in order for that to happen I have to be approved through you guys first.
- Okay, all right, okay.
- When you say Brown County do you mean probation, parole, or okay.
- Yeah.
- They have to approve the transfer Oconto County back to Brown County. Which that's no guarantee.
- Right.
- So... Okay, does anybody want to make a motion?
- I would make a motion to approve for a period of 60 days and then have him back to show whether or not, 30 days I'm sorry, 30 days come back and then tell us whether or not Brown County's accepted him, and he has a job.
- Well I think that from a standpoint of is that he wouldn't be able to move if Brown County didn't approve him. I think if you're--
- I don't know when they meet.
- Yeah I don't know when they meet either. So, or how often, when he submits the paper how long it even takes. To be honest with you I have no clue.
- Right, but what I'm getting at is, I don't feel comfortable going out beyond 30 days simply because even if Brown County approves him, does he have a job?
- Right, I'm with ya. We've actually gotta file upon the motion. So, we have a motion to approve him for a period of 30 days, at which time he'd have to come back and let us know if he's been approved to move into Brown County, as well as to see if he's got a job. That's the motion, is there a second to the motion?

- Not from me.

- Not from me.

- Motion fails. Okay, is there another motion?

- I'll make a motion. To approve him to live at 1192 Oregon Street for a period of 90 days, because I think it takes a long time to get these things done, looking for a job and stuff. So, he doesn't have to float out of there right away. And of course, upon approval of Oconto letting him live here. And then he can come back to see us in 90 days.

- I just wanna kind of repeat this so we can make sure we got it. So you're putting in address specific to move to 1192 Oregon Street for a period of 90 days at which time he has to come back and prove that he's got approval from Oconto County or Brown County to live in Green Bay, as well as have a job.

- Correct.

- Okay. Is there a second to that motion?

- I will second that motion.

- Okay, any discussion? Okay, let's go ahead and vote on that motion.

- The vote passes three to one.

- Okay sir, so what you've been approved for is that you can go ahead and you know, obviously you can't move until you get Brown County accepts you. But, then for a period of 90 days in which you have to come back to this board and then show proof of employment within Green Bay, or wherever you have a job. Okay, if you do not show up you'll automatically be denied. And then they'll come knocking on your door and ask you to leave. Now where would you like this approval sent? You can send it to your current address. Or you can send it to the Oregon Street.

- [Michael] Just have it sent to Oregon.

- Have it sent to 1192 Oregon Street. Okay.

- I have a quick question?

- Sure.

- [Michael] If I can't get a job in Brown County right away, 'cause I know when I was first released I had a very hard time finding like, a factory job, this and that. I applied every where just because you're a sex offender, they won't hire you. But, no matter what I will have a job. But it has to be in Green Bay.

- No.

- No, no, no, no. No, I think we wanna make sure you have a job so you're not just sitting doing nothing.

- [Michael] Oh no matter what I've got a job at the farm.

- Well, if you have a job there, and your commuting back and forth okay, but the whole point of you wanting to come here is to get a job here.

- Get a job here.
- Okay.
- All right, thank you.
- Next up is the appeal of Hector Sanchez. Okay, Mr. Sanchez we're here to hear your appeal to move to 1108 North Roosevelt Street Upper, correct?
- 118.
- 118, 118.
- 118, got it. 118 North, okay. And you're currently living at the TLP?
- [Hector] Yes sir.
- Okay again, we're gonna go over your case. Again, just refer to the person as the victim, not by their name, or that you were related to 'em, or anything like that. So, why don't you tell us a little bit about what happened in your conviction.
- He's a returning applicant.
- Yes.
- [Hector] This was 30 years ago.
- But from the standpoint of I don't know if the last time he was here I think it was a while ago, not everybody was here.
- [Hector] I lived in Howard and I moved to Eastman Avenue.
- That was in '13.
- Yeah, go ahead.
- [Hector] I was just involved with a 15-year-old girl and I was following her and that was the nature of that. So, I got arrested for that.
- Shh.
- He's gonna shut it. Go ahead.
- Apparently I got arrested for following a girl that was under 15 years of age, I mean she was 15 years of age turning 16. So, I got arrested for that. That was the nature of that, that was it. So, they gave me 10 years, I served seven out of that. And I finished my time in Arizona back in 1992.
- Okay.
- [Hector] So this is like I got out in 2001, 1999, so this like 30 years ago almost. I moved to Wisconsin in 2001. Yeah 2002, or one. I went to work for Pop's Tires for nine years, and I ended up meeting my girlfriend, Holly. I moved with her to Howard and I went over to, and I met you guys to go to Eastman Avenue.

- Mm hmm.

- [Hector] Now she passed away on me and I was incarcerated for my fifth DUI.

- Was that due to--

- Which now I'm out,

- Was that due to what happened to Holly? I know it's a tragic accident.

- According to what happened it was in January the 12th. Apparently she must have had an accident during the night or somewhere down the line. I was incarcerated for my fifth DUI, so what I got was that she had an accident and apparently during that night it was cold So she kind of like, most people froze to death. So now I'm ached up. So now I was gonna parole out to that place, Eastman Avenue. But since now that she's gone, this is her daughter, her son-in-law, and my...

- [Sara] My sister, sister-in-law. And that's my girlfriend's daughter.

- Okay.

- [Hector] So anyway, now, I couldn't parole out where I was going because she passed away. So now I'm in a position where my PO put me at the TLP I'm in. So now I'm working at American Boots. I've been there for three months now.

- Full time?

- Full time already, as it is. I've always there since I've been in Wisconsin, thanks to God. Now, I'm in this position. So now she's got a place for me, like I just told you guys. Here's my family that I got. All my family's all in Arizona, nobody here just myself. But I did have somebody very special but she's gone.

- Okay. Any other questions for Mr. Sanchez?

- I have a question. So what made you go off the wagon?

- [Hector] I think, beyond this will be my fifth, you talking about my fifth DUI?

- Mm hmm.

- [Hector] Hmm. I think I just lost it. I think somewhere down the line I kind of like thought I was just Hector, you know. But it didn't work that way. I put myself in a very bad position and now I'm willing to put it back to where I was supposed to be. I've done pretty good so far as I go out now. I'm by myself. I don't have nobody to guide me, and all that. I've been doing by myself pretty good, but, I like to consider them my family 'cause they've been there for me the majority of the times now and before after it. I'm doing pretty good and I feel I haven't gave them any problems I--

- How often do you meet with your PO?

- [Hector] Huh?

- How often do you meet with your PO?

- [Hector] Every week on Monday.

- How often are you tested for alcohol?
- [Hector] She hasn't done that.
- She's not tested you since you've been released?
- [Hector] She hasn't test me, so I guess I'm fine. I haven't had anything to do with the alcohol or anything else.
- Just for clarification purposes. You've had another OWI after the fifth one. You had a total of six, right?
- [Hector] No. They're considering like I had, okay I had two in New Mexico before I came to Wisconsin.
- No, I'm sorry, let me. Since the passing of Holly, you had--
- No.
- Let me finish. You were in custody at the time Holly passed. That was your fifth OWI, correct?
- Yes.
- After that, you had another one. Correct?
- No.
- No?
- [Hector] No. But what happened is that I had two in New Mexico, 2001. Those two DUIs I had in New Mexico. When I got my first one and my second one and my third one here, they brought those two over here and they made it my fifth. That's all it was. So I should have three here in Wisconsin, actually.
- Actually, no.
- [Hector] But they don't work that way.
- No they don't.
- [Hector] Correct, I know. I found that out.
- Now are you in any programs, AA, anything like that?
- [Hector] Yes, I'm fixing to start going as soon as I take care of this matter with you all guys. Other than that my PO knows that I'm riding a bike, I'm not driving any vehicles whatsoever, and I've been traveling by bike for three months to my job. Three in the morning or whatever, four miles every day morning and afternoon. So now, I'm trying to get closer. If I get this place it'll be five minute drive with my bike there.
- Mm hmm.
- Okay. Any more questions for him? Anybody want to speak on his behalf or against? Come on up, ma'am. I just need your name and address please.
- [Sara] Sara Naze and my address is 703 Northern Avenue. I've written a letter,
- Sure, go ahead.

- So I'm just going to read it to you guys.

- Go ahead.

- I said I'm here to attest to the character of Hector Sanchez and to appeal for him to be allowed to live at 118 North Roosevelt Street. I've known him for roughly 14 years. He dated my mother from 2004 until the time of her death in 2018, in January. I also lived with him from 2004 until 2009. We both at that time lived with my mom at her house in Howard on Elmview Drive. During that time I had no issues with Hector being inappropriate with me in any way. Furthermore, the apartment that he wishes to rent on Roosevelt Street is owned by my sister-in-law, Tracie VandenAvond. I wouldn't petition for him to be allowed to live in the same dwelling as my family members if I believed he would do them any harm. He's been nothing but kind to me and my mom, and my sister, my husband, my in-laws since we've known him. His indiscretions are in the past and I firmly believe that he poses no harm to anyone. Like he said, he hasn't been driving. He's been taking his bike. This apartment that my sister-in-law owns will get him closer to work so when the weather gets nasty, it won't be as rough a commute for him.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Sara] Thank you.

- Anyone else?

- There was a letter

- Oh that's me.

- Turned in for Tracie.

- [Tracie] Yep, that's me.

- Okay. Ma'am, just your name and address again.

- [Tracie] I am Tracie VandenAvond of 118 North Roosevelt Street. So I would, I live in the lower.

- Sure, go ahead.

- [Tracie] I've known Hector for around 11 years. He has been a wonderful person to our family. He's been very helpful. I think he'd be a good asset to be at my house. He came over a couple weeks ago and cut my lawn and helped with landscaping and I've never, ever had any issues with him. He's a very kind person. I think he deserves a good, a chance to be close to his work and be in a good environment.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Tracie] Mm hmm.

- All right, anybody else? Okay, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to Mr. Sanchez?

- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Sanchez to 118 Roosevelt Street, address specific.

- Okay is there a second?

- I'll second that motion.

- Any discussion? All right, that's roll.
- You guys, this is
- The vote passes. Three yeas and one abstention.
- Okay, sir, you've been approved to move to the location that you had requested at 188 North Roosevelt Street. Where would you like that sent?
- [Hector] To that address.
- To that address, okay. That's it, you're done.
- [Hector] Thank you.
- Next appeal is Mr. Kevin DeVillers. All right Mr. DeVillers you are looking to move to 1913 Eastman Avenue. Is that correct?
- [Kevin] Correct.
- All right, and you're currently living at 1646 Cormier?
- [Kevin] Correct.
- Okay, let me just check something real quick. Sir, the last time we had you here, back in '09, was to approve you, at that time we had to approve anybody that went to the TLP at 1761 Shawano Avenue.
- [Kevin] Correct.
- So my question is, is you're living at Cormier right now, which is in Green Bay. We don't have you coming in front of the board--
- That's actually Shawano
- It's Shawano? Okay, all right. Good. Okay, so why are you looking to move?
- [Kevin] Been living with my mother. She's now tired. She's looking to move in with her other children so she can save up more money, go on more trips. She's tired. We lost my dad three years ago so now it's time for her to branch out and do what she wants to do.
- Okay.
- [Kevin] Landlord was going to let us stay there, but he decided to rent it to a doctor, so we have until September 1st to get a place to live.
- Okay. Are you currently employed sir?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Where are you employed at?
- Ace Manufacturing Incorporated.

- Okay.

- And you state, I'm sorry. When you say we are you talking about your best friend and your best friend's wife? Who is the we? We were gonna stay there, you said.

- [Kevin] Oh, my other sister and I are moving as well.

- Okay.

- [Kevin] But she doesn't have enough room for this.

- Oh, got it. Got it, okay. Thank you.

- Okay. Obviously you came back when you several of you were not here on the board. Anybody on the board want to discuss this case in particular?

- I would like to discuss the two recent, you had the underlying convictions felony, I guess they were just two misdemeanors in 2005 and 2004. They were convictions?

- Those are all the same.

- Right. Now what about the two more recent convictions? One in 2017 and 2013.

- [Kevin] Both those were prostitution convictions. I was in a bad spot, mentally and physically just couldn't handle it so thought of a way to get attention, seek attention. Most recent one in 2017 I was with my girlfriend for three years and found out she had another man and it was all the same day as I just lost it. I knew that Brown County was doing stings. I knew if I contacted a prostitute I would get locked up. It was a way for me to self-sabotage myself. So I spent four days in jail on that. My PO came to see me and she got down to underlying issues and got the ATR, went to the--

- What ATR?

- [Kevin] Alternative to Revocation.

- Okay.

- [Kevin] She did not think that putting me back in prison was the right option for me. She said we need to get you the treatment that you need and address the issues that you have. So I then went to the Sex Offender Thinking for Change and I completed that successfully. I handed in a copy of--

- Yep, we have it.

- [Kevin] That and I also have, I'm still in after care voluntarily. I choose to go for more support, getting to know myself better, my triggers, my relapse prevention. Getting the skills and tools that I need to stay out of trouble.

- So I guess a question that's running through my mind when you said, hey, you know you had a breakdown and you self-sabotaged yourself into getting arrested and obviously you've gone through Thinking for Change. You're going through additional treatment through Addict Correctional Services. So, what's to, if you have another issue where a girlfriend breaks up with you or whatever it may be, what happens if you go to re-offend with a like someone under the age of 15 because you're acting out, looking for attention? What's gonna prevent you from doing that?

- [Kevin] That would never happen again. I mean I was 17 when both my crimes happened. I didn't know any better. It was a Romeo and Juliet thing.

- Yeah.

- [Kevin] And I know that underage is wrong. You have to be 18 to consent. It doesn't matter if I'm consenting, she's consenting. If she's not over the age of 18 she can't give consent.

- But again, my question was, you acted out and you tried to engage in prostitution. So my question is okay, prostitution is one thing, is it another thing sexually hurting someone under the age?

- No. I mean, going through the Thinking for Change and being in the after care, it's really taken me out of my comfort zone and put me into a different comfort zone where I know that I'm not a burden to my family and I know I can speak to them openly, honest. I can be open and honest with my PO, Barbara, who knows everything. I don't hide anything from her. As long with Rebecca in group. Being open and honest, transparent, making sure if I have an issue it's on a table. If I'm feeling down that day I talk to someone. I've, April's a hard month for me 'cause that's when we lost our dad, and as keeping myself close to my support group, keeping myself close in group. I text Barbara, I call Barbara whenever I need something and she's always there for me. That's the main thing that everybody has driven in my head, is no matter how much of a burden you think you are to us, you're not.

- Okay.

- My other, if I may follow up on that, you also have another prostitution conviction from 2013 down in Outagamie County.

- [Kevin] Correct.

- What led to that?

- [Kevin] Same thing. Bottling up all my emotions. Not being transparent, open, honest. Hiding everything. Not sharing my feelings.

- Was this a sting operation as well?

- [Kevin] Yes.

- Do you understand that doesn't always end up being a sting operation and you could be with somebody that is an actual child?

- [Kevin] Yes. And I know that now.

- Okay. Go ahead.

- This living arrangement that you're, would like to enter into. These people are friends?

- [Kevin] Yes, I've know them since I was eight, nine.

- Have you ever lived together before?

- [Kevin] No.

- And is this a couple?
- [Kevin] No, it's my best friend and his mom.
- Okay. You've never lived with them before and according to the document that was submitted by the owner of the property, he refuses to put you on the lease or agree to that. Correct?
- [Kevin] Right. He doesn't want to do any more lease agreements. He's fine with me living there, he just does not want to redo the lease.
- Okay. What happens, again this is kind of a not very stable situation. You've been in a stable situation for quite a while, now you're going into a very unstable because you're at their whim. If you do something wrong and the mom is unhappy, she can kick you out at any point in time.
- [Kevin] Correct. It's another way of, they've been there for me through thick and thin, and I know if I mess up then I'm gonna be homeless.
- Did you try to find an apartment on your own?
- [Kevin] I did, but with the time frame that I have, there's no way I can come up with first month's rent, security deposit.
- Do you want this to be short term or do you want it to be long-term?
- [Kevin] It will be long-term until I can get my own place. I just don't know how long that's gonna be.
- Right, but your goal is to get your own place?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Okay.
- When I look this address up there is a sex offender already living at that address.
- [Kevin] That's Dennis, correct.
- So how many apartments are there in this building? Is it?
- [Kevin] It's one big house. It's just it's one house. Dennis is her son.
- Your best friend?
- [Kevin] No. He's, well I've known him for the same amount of time.
- Okay.
- So now you, 'cause when you write down who you plan to live with, you wrote 35 best friend, 33 best friend's wife. But really, it's... You're not in your own separate, you three are not in your own separate apartment. It's--
- [Kevin] It's a house with a basement would be just be mine. I'll have my own living space in the basement.
- Is there anybody here to speak on your behalf?

- [Kevin] Yes.
- Ma'am why don't you come on up. Or, yeah, I just need your name and address please.
- [Christine] 1913 Eastman Avenue.
- Your name?
- [Christine] Christine Pontow.
- All right.
- Did you fill out a slip?
- [Christine] Excuse me?
- Did you fill out a slip to speak? Okay, go ahead.
- Go ahead.
- [Christine] I've known Kevin since he was seven, eight. Somewhere around in there. No problem with him. He comes over all the time. I have no problem with him over at our house. The house is big, it's a big house and that's why, I can be at home and they can be upstairs and I won't see 'em for the whole evening. So it's not like we're all running into each other and whatever. It's me, my youngest son, my oldest son to start out with. When my husband died my kids moved back in. Well, I should say we all kind of moved together. It's where we've been. But Kevin's come over, he's there a lot and there's no problem whatsoever with him.
- Okay. All right thank you for your time. Is there anybody else?
- [David] David Pontow, 1913 Eastman Avenue. I've known Kevin for pretty much my whole life. Everybody, my girlfriend's aware of what his crimes are. The worst, I mean, there's not at one point nobody not home. There's always someone there. We'll never just randomly be stuck in the same room all day. We're always running around and stuff, so it's not like he can't just go into his own room in the place, he can. Yeah, he's been no problem.
- Okay, great, thank you.
- [David] Yep.
- All right, if there's nothing else we want to ask him, does anybody want to make a motion?
- I want to make a motion... I'm torn because there's already a sex offender living there that it just...
- [Kevin] My probation officer and the supervisor are well aware of that. He's completed his treatment, he's completed his probation. He had pretty much the same situation I had. He's a little bit older, but he got his before I got mine. He was with a girl and got her pregnant. They now have two children together. So it's not like he's an untreated and unsuccessful sex offender and my PO and the supervisor are well aware of it. They've already approved it. We're just waiting on the Board to approve so I can move.
- Okay. I'm gonna make a motion to approve you for 1913 Eastman Avenue, address specific. For, 120 days, four months, just to see how things are going.

- Okay, is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Okay. Any discussion? All right, let's vote.
- Motion passes on a three to one vote.
- Okay. Sir, would you like that sent to 1913 Eastman Street?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Okay. You will have to appear in front of us again in 120 days and let us know how things are going.
- [Kevin] Okay.
- All right, thank you.
- [Kevin] Thank you.
- Next, Mr. Ronald Tiber. Mr. Tiber, you're living at 321 South Washington Street, right now?
- [Kevin] It's a hotel.
- It's a hotel?
- [Kevin] Mm hmm.
- What hotel is that?
- [Kevin] It's a Quality Inn.
- Okay.
- [Kevin] I moved from a hotel downtown.
- Okay. You want to move to 1240 Harvey Street?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Okay. Again, we're gonna go over your offense. Just refer to the person as the victim. Second off we want to talk about your treatment programs. You can do that either in public or private.
- [Kevin] Public's fine.
- All right, go ahead.
- [Kevin] What would you like to know?
- So I want to know what happened. So you had child enticement. So tell how you were arrested--
- [Kevin] I was here on business. I was having a bunch of home issues. So I posted an ad on Craigslist and was involved in a police sting.

- Okay, did you know at the time you were going to meet that person that they were under the age of 16?
- [Kevin] During the course of our exchange they had brought it up, yes. I didn't say no.
- I'm sorry, you weren't living in Green Bay? You said you were here on business?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Where are you from?
- [Kevin] Originally New Jersey. At the time of this incident I was actually living in North Carolina.
- Okay. So you knew that the victim was under the age of 16, and you still went anyway to have sex with that person, correct?
- [Kevin] Yeah.
- Okay. Looks like you got probation for this offense, is that correct?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- All right.
- Is that?
- News was there, ICAP.
- I'm sorry?
- It was an ICAP sting.
- Okay.
- So obviously you have to stay in Green Bay now for the four years probation, correct? Or in Brown County.
- [Kevin] Yeah, three years left. Today is the first year done.
- Okay. And you've been moving from hotel to hotel for a year?
- [Kevin] Pretty much, with my car in between.
- Okay, and where are you currently employed, sir?
- [Kevin] I'm not currently employed. My family pays for my rent. I was employed at the time. During the trial I was employed, but due to the conviction of a felony, the company I was working for had to let me go. Actually they put me on a five-year suspension. So I've been collecting unemployment for a short time and I've just been looking for work. With this home would allow my family to save money, because hotels are very expensive. So this would all us to save a lot of money and give me a permanent place to work out of.
- Until you go to court.

- [Kevin] I did actually start at work at American Foods for two days, but I was released because of a medical problem.

- Okay.

- [Kevin] I suffer from bad diabetes and I had a low blood sugar incident. I'm working with doctors to control that now.

- Okay. So, right now in Green Bay you don't have any family or anybody?

- [Kevin] No sir, I do not. I tried to get to South Carolina, North Carolina, and New Jersey, but none would take me at this point. So I'm here.

- Okay.

- [Kevin] I do have support. I have my mother, brother, and aunt who are all supporting me financially and emotionally. I also have Rebecca the counselor and Nicki my probation officer, and I belong to Circles of Support, who are very, very good group of people.

- Okay, are you in any treatment programs at the time?

- I have completed my program.

- You did?

- I did submit a

- Yep, I see it.

- [Kevin] Certificate there.

- Tell me what you've learned from the program.

- [Kevin] A lot, actually. I learned a lot during the time between my arrest and my sentencing. I went through psychological treatment, with two different people and found out I was suffering from PTSD from a traumatic experience in my past and made Rebecca aware of that. She helped me deal with those things and bring them, teach me some coping mechanisms. Taught me how to be more able to cope with those kind of things.

- Okay. Does anybody have any more questions for him?

- I'm just trying to find, I have notes that you were to do community service.

- [Kevin] Yeah, I'm working on that. I've not done them yet.

- You've not.

- [Kevin] Yes. I actually was scheduled for Paul's Pantry, but then the sugar issue stopped me from doing the work. Right now I'm working, I spoke with the people at Humana, and I'm waiting for her to call me back to schedule times. So I am actively pursuing that.

- Okay. Any other questions for him? All right. Sir would you like to say anything else before I ask for a motion?

- There's someone here to speak.
- Yeah I have some friends here to speak for me.
- All right. Let 'em speak. Sir, just come on up. Give me your name and address.
- I'm Eriki Gaiouniki. 2766 Viking Drive, apartment 1C.
- Okay, go ahead.
- [Eriki] So Ron has been coming to the group for about four months now. He has only missed one meeting in that time. He has been very open with us about the issues that he deals with. We've worked hard to help him with those. He's been very forward, very diligent in his work. Also, not only does he come in and do that, which is what we ask that you come in and share your issues with us and we try to find solutions to them. He's been willing to help our other participants in terms of rides to appointments or to interviews and stuff so we really appreciate having him there. He's been a pleasure to work with.
- Do you see any reason why he would re-offend?
- [Eriki] No.
- In your opinion?
- [Eriki] No.
- Do you see that he understands why he did what he did?
- [Eriki] Yes.
- What did he tell you?
- [Eriki] Well, it was just it was the one day, it was a stupid thing on a business trip and it was a mistake he made. He learned from this. He went through all the treatment and stuff. He understands how big a mistake that is, and he wouldn't ever put himself in that situation again. To risk so much.
- Did he say that he's ever tried to solicit prostitution or underage sex before?
- [Eriki] No.
- Okay. All right.
- Thank you.
- Any more questions for him? All right, thanks.
- [Eriki] Thank you.
- Anybody else here to speak for him? Sir, why don't you come on up.
- [Roy] My name is Roy De Ruyter. Address 1079 Verna Lane, Oneida.
- Okay.

- [Roy] Since I've known Ron, he's a quality person. He attends the meetings. He goes, I feel, above and beyond as far as what our requirements as a participant is. He's not employed but he's having application after application. He's 700 or something?

- 700 or something like that.

- He's very qualified in his position, but his offense is kind of like his stumbling block to getting a position. Our people like him. That's just what, you know when I, that's what he's saying, but I believe him.

- All right. Any questions?

- Sir what is your main profession?

- [Ron] I'm an IT business analyst and an IT project manager.

- Okay. And I'm assuming that during your probation period you're not allowed to use a computer.

- [Ron] I am allowed to use a computer.

- You are allowed to use a computer.

- [Ron] Yes, the judge wrote it into my paperwork.

- Okay. All right, is there anybody else that'd like to speak? All right.

- If I can just speak

- Go ahead.

- One comment.

- Sure.

- [Ron] About re-offending. I've lost so much due to this. My wife, my son, my house, my career. I could not stand to lose that kind of thing again and that's why I'm trying to work back into this. I want to finish my next three years and try to get back to my son and re-establish my life with him. So I can't afford to screw up. My son just turned 11 last month, and I'm not gonna be able to see him until he turns 14. I can't wait. I need to keep going on the straight and narrow. I can't afford to play with that.

- Are you able to speak to him over the phone?

- [Ron] When he wants to and when his mother will let me.

- Okay.

- Is that why you cannot see him right now?

- [Ron] He's in North Carolina.

- So--

- But he could come here.

- [Ron] Yes, if his mother... Based on my offense, you know mom's not gonna do that very readily.
- Okay. All right does anybody want to make a motion?
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Tibor, address specific, to 1240 Harvey Street, Lower.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that motion.
- Any discussion?
- My only thing is that we do have someone else wanting to move onto Harvey Street also, coming up. But when I did drive by there was a community police, just right down the corner.
- [Ron] Four houses away.
- Yeah.
- Okay. All right. Okay, ready for a vote.
- Just waiting on one more vote, Kathy.
- I punched it in.
- Okay, motion passes unanimously.
- Okay sir you have been approved to 1240 Harvey Street, Lower. Would you like it sent there?
- [Ron] Yes, please.
- All right, we'll send it there. Good luck to you.
- [Ron] Thank you all very much.
- Next appeal is Mr. James Randall.
- [James] I'm getting there.
- No problem.
- [James] I'm still getting used to the electric wheelchair. Can somebody--
- Do you mind grabbing one of the chairs? All right, Mr. Randall. Just looking through your file here. You're currently at the TLP?
- [James] Yes.
- All right, and looking to move to 1176 Harvey Street, number two, right?
- [James] That's correct.
- Okay.

- [James] This is actually the first apartment I've been able to find to rent, thanks to NewCap, for three years I've been homeless.

- Okay. I'm sorry this is taking so long.

- [James] It's all right.

- Okay. So we're gonna go over your offenses, and I'd like you to again, just refer to the person as the victim, and tell us what happened in each particular instance. So why don't you tell us about the first offense here, Listed here with a five year old, back in 2005.

- [James] Yeah. That's when, right after I ended up in a wheelchair. I'd slipped back to drinking. Some marijuana use. I went from being a man who did everything, motocross, skydiving, cliff-diving, all that, to someone who felt like I was absolutely worthless. I went from being completely independent to having to depend on everybody for everything. I ended up at a friend's, staying with some friends that I met at the hospital. They set me up to babysit for the woman to increase my income so I could pay for the little things. I also babysat for them to pay for my staying there.

- So what did you do to the victim?

- [James] Hmm?

- What did you do to the victim?

- [James] According to the conviction, I put my mouth over her underwear.

- You said that's according to the conviction. What did you actually do?

- [James] It's, it's complicated because there was more to it than that.

- Well, we're here to listen.

- Yep.

- [James] All right. As I was saying, I was babysitting for them. I grew to love the kids and I fell in love with the mother. We got intimate, which has been my biggest problem. Quick intimacy, fast relationships, always bad relationships. I asked her to marry me, she said no because I was crippled and broke. She had four kids to take care of, she didn't want to take care of a cripple. So I separated myself from her. I didn't babysit as often. Ended up with another woman. She confronted me and told me that that was unacceptable. I couldn't be with another woman and watch her kids. When I told her that she no longer had the right to say anything because she's already turned me down, she said I'd regret it. A week before my wedding, police knocked at the door, informed me that I'd been accused of sexually assaulting her daughter.

- And did you?

- [James] No.

- Okay.

- [James] Four kids stayed with me that night. All four of her kids. The oldest was 13. Two girls and a son.

- Okay.

- [James] The first was, the first to make the accused was the five-year-old. A year later, the 13-year-old did. Well, the officers proved the 13 was lying. It was just basically me doing something I've done my whole life, which is fall fast into bad relationships without thinking.

- What about the other two convictions for sexual assault on children?

- [James] The first one was a misdemeanor.

- Okay.

- [James] Unfortunately for that one, I can be blatantly honest I was too drunk and stoned to know anything. I was 19, she was 16. I'd just been married, had a brand-new kid. I was finishing three bottles of liquor before lunch and at least five joints. My life back then was absolutely stupid. I'd been on my own since I was 15. No guidance, no help.

- Okay, but what I want to get to is the victims.

- [James] Right, I'm saying that.

- This is not about what I'm asking you. What I'm asking is what was done to the victims?

- [James] That was, I guess, they call it a Romeo and Juliet type thing. I was married but I was trying to date this girl.

- Okay.

- [James] Like I said I was 19, she was 16. I didn't see the age difference as a problem.

- Okay, how about in 2001? That 11-year-old.

- [James] 2001 was 100% my fault. I let something go beyond what it was supposed to go. As an adult I should have said no.

- How old were you at the time?

- [James] 2001? That would make me like,

- 31.

- [James] Yeah, something like that.

- 33.

- [James] Again, I was in a bad relationship. I married in her in hopes of making the relationship better I didn't realize that her son had already been messed with by his original father. I was drinking still, doing some drugs, when it happened I didn't stop it. Then, when we got divorced was when, when I filed for divorce was when she made the claim.

- Okay, just following up on these convictions. The one in the 1980s is, do you have that as the victim being--

- The one I have is the '07 one. That was the Green Bay one.

- Okay.
- It doesn't, I mean there's quite a bit of detail and it doesn't match what I'm hearing here. It's touching all over the body of underage girls.
- Okay. All right.
- If I may ask was there any independent corroboration?
- No, just the, well the disclosure to Child Protection and then we hear views at the Child Advocacy Center.
- Was that a plea, or was that a jury trial?
- [James] Plea. Thinking...
- He's gonna answer.
- I'm sorry.
- Yeah, it looks like there was a plea.
- Okay, thank you.
- Okay, so what are you doing right now? Are you completely stable or you not have a job, or what are you doing?
- [James] I can't work anymore. I'm 100% disability on Social Security. Right now I'm working on getting self-employed as a nature photographer, which has been approved by my probation officer. I've completed, I don't have all the paperwork, this was kind of rushed on me or I'd have people to come forth. I completed Cognitive Thinking, I believe it's called, through the Addict, and I'm half way through SOT. I'm living--
- Can I, I'm sorry to interrupt, but you just said you were rushed into this.
- They found a place for me to live, but it's condemned right now. The landlord has to completely redo it and then get it uncondemned and then he can rent it. They're worried, because I'm going through NewCap for the place, they're worried that if we wait for him to get it completed that he'll rent it before I can get in. Since this is the first place they've found for me to be able to rent in three years, because my health is now far worse than it was, et cetera, they wanted to get me before the Board with a provisional approval and then once the place is complete and I've got the letter from him saying I can rent and the application taken care of, then I come back before the board for the actual approval.
- When would you expect this location to be complete? Do you have any idea?
- [James] He said we're looking at least two to three weeks, so September, around September 1st, September 3rd. But they didn't want to wait until September for me to go before the Board, because if he completes it before then he can't wait for me, he's gonna rent it out, and then I'll be as of September 3rd out on the street, living in a parking lot actually. The first two years out of prison I lived in my van, after the TLP. My van was hit by a train. I then applied to live with a friend in Bellevue and it was going to be approved, but a reporter got a hold of the minutes from the meeting. Word got spread and even though I'd been there for six months provisional, I was forced to move even though I didn't violate any rules and I didn't break any laws. So I got put back in the TLP. This is the third time they've had me in the TLP because I'm homeless, living on the street. My health is getting worse.

- You said that as of right now you have completed,

- [James] I've completed Criminal Thinking. I'm half-way through SOT. I didn't get a chance to get that paperwork from Rebecca to bring it in, which is why I'm asking for provisional until next month and then I can bring all the paperwork in, I'll have people to back me up. You know, people to speak for me. I'll have pretty much a better hold on everything. They're just worried that if I'm not approved right now that he'll rent it out and this is, like I said, the first place they've been able to find in three years. Before this, it wasn't my criminal background that stopped me. I only get \$454 a month for disability and SSI because child support takes \$320 of it. So I don't have the money to rent normally. I'm also disabled. Those two put together have killed me across the board for renting. I've never got to my background. So now, this guy knows the background, I'm going through NewCap so, NewCap rents it, I pay NewCap 80 bucks.

- Gotcha.

- [James] So now I can afford to move into a place of my own through NewCap. I've worked with every agency in Green Bay. I've worked with ADRC, the Micah Center. I've worked with Circles of Support when I first got out. Great group. I'm going through treatment right now and I'll tell you what I absolutely did not know who I was until I started SOT. My life was, in my mind, most of my young history that was just normal because that's the way I lived. That's the way my family lived. Out of 14 kids I'm the only one that's now sober and clean. My dad was abusive, alcoholic. So it's what I grew up with, so I thought that was normal.

- Okay. Does anybody have any more questions for him?

- Yes, I do.

- Go ahead.

- Where do your support people live?

- [James] Andrew Seitel lives in Bellevue. Billie lives right here in Green Bay. She's my case-worker for NewCap. My brother and mom just live up in Marinette County, so it's not that far away. They usually come up to see me on the weekends. I can always call and text 'em. And then, believe it or not, my biggest supporter and greatest help is my PO. My first PO, we didn't get along. Since I've met Barbara, I've learned more about myself and have made more advances in SOT than before, because before Barbara I looked at it as they're on this side of the wall I'm on this side of the wall, they can't be trusted. All you can do is hate 'em. She basically told me, she goes I'm gonna be fair, but I'm gonna be by the book. Since I've known her I've gotten approval to use a regular phone. I've got approval to do my photography. She's working with me to... Because I've been isolating myself since the crime. Before I met Barbara all I wanted to do was to find a little nice hut out in the woods and never see humanity again. That was my way of solving the problem. Just absolutely get away from people. Now I realize, I don't have to do that. If I got a problem, there's people I can call. But like I said, before I was in the wheelchair, I didn't depend on anybody and I wouldn't have asked help from anybody.

- Can I just ask why you needed approval to use a regular phone?

- [James] The rules list no internet. My first PO said all new phones have internet so you can't have one.

- Oh, okay. I'm thinking regular phone landline, not okay, got it.

- [James] So...

- What about, is this the first time you've taken a Sex Offender Treatment programming?

- [James] Yes, in fact it's actually the first treatment I've ever had in my life. I quit drinking on my own. I quit drugs on my own. Everything, I've basically lived on my own since I was 15. I've never went to any agencies, any psychologies, any help. In fact from the age of four to the age of nine, I was in state custody. That's not criminal state custody but multiple foster homes, multiple places. This is actually my first time I've ever gotten a place of my own.

- Okay. All right. There's nothing else. Does anybody want to make a motion?

- Are there any people to speak on your behalf?

- [James] Like I said, I just found out about this Monday, and I knew absolutely nothing about it, so I didn't get a absolutely to contact the people that I would have had, which is why I'm asking for a provisional acceptance, until next month when I can bring these people forward and they can speak for me. I'll have the paperwork showing what I've completed as far as the statement from Rebecca for how I'm doing in SOT.

- I make a motion that we table this until next month. I know I don't feel comfortable without having people to speak on behalf of the applicant, or any supporting documentation.

- I think my concern is too, is that I don't have documentation that you've completed the one course, the Critical Thinking course, as well as what, if you're involved right now in SOT training usually we get some sort of letter saying hey, this is how many sessions you've attended.

- [James] Actually I contacted Rebecca and she has 'em but I don't have a vehicle so I, cost and time wise, because I just came from my PO, I didn't have time to go to her and pick 'em up and then come back and be here on time for the meeting.

- Right.

- [James] In fact, I just found out from my PO where the meeting was and what time it was. So it was, like I said, it was a rush job to keep me from losing the apartment.

- Did you actually fill out the application? Or did somebody else fill it out for you?

- [James] She filled it out with me, across from me.

- Rebecca?

- But you signed it, correct?

- [James] I don't have a pen or I would have. If I can get a pen I can sign this.

- No we just want to look and see if it has the signature on it. We have it here but it's a copy. Yep, it shows a signature. Somebody signed it.

- [James] Okay, that was mine. They admitted they transferred the first one.

- Is that your signature?

- [James] Yes, sir. And then my PO and I redid it. This is actually her writing. Mine's not quite so neat.

- Well, is this your writing on here?

- [James] Yeah, that's my writing. Like I said, I'm not as neat as hers is.

- Looks fine to me. So, this was--
- I'm Billie from NewCap.
- [James] Oh, I didn't even see Billie over there.
- Just go ahead and finish your question.
- So my concern is that this was dated on July 30th. We have the same board meeting, the meeting is the same Wednesday, same week every month.
- [James] But I knew absolutely nothing about the meeting. I knew that I had to come before the Board, but I didn't know the actual process or--
- Your PO didn't go over it with you?
- I sent you a letter. Did you get the letter?
- [James] No ma'am, I never got a letter.
- I sent it to Shawano Avenue.
- I didn't get it.
- You're Mr Randall, right?
- [James] Yes.
- Okay.
- [James] I didn't get the letter, otherwise I would have--
- Because it says you were at the TLP.
- [James] Yes, I am.
- Okay.
- Okay. Any more question for him?
- No.
- No.
- Ma'am if you want to come up and say something, you're more than welcome to.
- [Billie] I just, sure.
- Just need your name.
- [Billie] My name is Billie Duquesne, I work with NewCap, and the address there is 1540 Capital Drive.

- Okay.

- [Billie] This apartment came up, I've been searching for James for an apartment which is difficult with the sexual offense and the wheelchair. I talked to the landlord and he said he can't give me the commitment letter but he does rent to sex offenders so we discussed this process and I talked to the, I forgot her name, the lady at the city attorney.

- Right here, Mary.

- [Billie] Okay, sorry. I asked her could we get on today's agenda because the landlord said he's not gonna hold the apartment for us if he gets the approval, then we can continue forward with the landlord, so that's kind of the situation.

- I said I could put you on the agenda but I wasn't sure,

- Yep, exactly.

- What the Board would do with it.

- [Billie] So I did meet with James at St. Mary's in the lobby so that he could fill out the application and then I called him as soon as I got the email confirming that we were on the agenda.

- Okay. So here's a couple issues. The first issue is that we do have a process and one of them is that the landlord has at least signed knowing that the person they're potentially going to rent to is a sexual offender. So obviously that's not in this application.

- Well he does state in the email though, although I'm open to renting to people who are registered sex offenders, so he would know he is. Right, he's saying that in the email, right?

- But that doesn't--

- No, I know that's not saying, but he knows he is. But okay, I'm sorry.

- Yeah, okay I mean I get what you're saying. But usually it's I'm willing to rent to him, period. So anyway, the second part of it is that we don't really have a provisional process. It's either you're approved or you're approved for a length-term. So there is no come back, you've got provisional approval. We either grant for a certain amount of time, or indefinitely, or we don't grant it. So there's not a provisional process in place. I just want to lay that out. So we've heard all the information, unless anybody has more questions of him. So at this particular point someone has to make a motion as to whether they want to allow him to move to this location or not. Or any other provisions related to it. So does anybody want to make a motion?

- Can I just ask a question first? Just reading through this email and it says, without having a completed application. The landlord has an application and a background check that needs to be done.

- He doesn't have a full application I have a release from James so I gave him his full name and date of birth that he could do his preliminary. He said he would have to fill out the complete application.

- The landlord's application?

- [Billie] Correct. But he does know that he's a sex offender and he knows the different counts.

- Okay. Does anybody want to make a motion?

- I move that we table this. I think that was actually,
- Yeah that was your motion.
- Yeah it was my motion. Table this til next month.
- So is there a second to that motion?
- I will second that.
- Okay. Any discussion? Let's vote on that motion.
- So the motion to hold it open until next month passes on a three to one vote.
- Okay. When is our next meeting scheduled? Just want to check the calender here.
- September 12th.
- September 12th, okay. So, I know this puts you in a tough position, and he may not hold it, but the Board has basically voted to table your motion at this point.
- [James] I understand.
- So we will put you back on the agenda for the September 12th meeting. Here's the other pieces of information you will need.
- [James] Can I borrow a pen? Thank you.
- We'll need again, just for basics, obviously you're gonna need proof that you completed your one program, you'll need where you're at in your other program, I think. You're gonna need approval from the landlord.
- I believe that Ms. Banks already sent that information. The documentation that you've mailed. All the requirements or what he should consider bringing.
- Oh, it's on the appeal form.
- Oh, it is?
- [James] And I didn't get it, that's why I didn't know anything about it.
- I see what you're saying, okay.
- Do we have something in hard to give him or not?
- So are you staying at the TLP or not staying?
- [James] Yes, I'm in number 17 at the TLP. I just--
- because I did send the letter there.
- [James] I didn't get any letter from you.
- Okay.

- [James] I've had three roommates since the beginning of this month so one of them could have grabbed...
- But the application was filled out.
- [James] I got the application from Billie.
- So that tells you what you need to bring.
- Yeah.
- It's pretty--
- usually under each section it says this is the documentation that you're--
- [James] Oh, okay.
- So again, you'll be added to the agenda for the September 12th meeting. The meeting again starts at 2:30.
- So the big thing is a letter from the landlord saying that he knows you're a registered sex offender and is willing to rent to you.
- [James] Right. See I had met with him Friday and he told me he couldn't give me the application or a letter until the city had cleared the condemned off the building. That made it able for him to rent. That's what he told me.
- Well...
- Is it not rented out at all now?
- [James] No, the whole building is condemned. He's got to completely redo the whole building before he can rent.
- And he'll be done with it,
- Before he can even hold out advertising for it.
- [James] Right.
- Which means he shouldn't even offer yet at all.
- [James] He said it'd be around two to three weeks. He's hoping to have it done by September 1st to 3rd. Somewhere in there.
- But after that he's still got to get it looked at by the city.
- Right.
- So in other words, we're putting the cart way before the horse.
- It could be the middle of September before he actually gets occupancy permit. Okay, so that's where we're at right now, okay?

- [James] Thank you very much.
- All right so we'll see you here on the 12th.
- [James] All right, thank you very much. I appreciate it.
- Next is Mr. James Gosse. Hi, Mr. Gosse.
- Hi.
- We are here to hear your appeal to move to 1655 West Mason Street, apartment number four.
- [James] Yes, sir.
- Okay. Right now you're currently homeless?
- [James] Yes.
- Okay. We're gonna start again with your conviction here.
- [James] Okay.
- And again, no personal names or any of that, so why don't you tell us what happened here. It looks like it was a sting operation.
- [James] Yes. I wrote this stuff down
- Go ahead.
- I hope that's all right. I responded to an ad on Craigslist about wanting to share the air conditioning with someone. We communicated for a while before she told me she was 15 years old. We continued with contact that led to, which led to a sexual conversation. She asked me to meet her at a place and I stupidly agreed to meet her at the place she decided on. When I got there I was arrested. I do know now that what I did was wrong and take full responsibilities for my actions. I should have known better than to keep in contact with someone that's too young for me. I've never been interested in younger girls or minors in the past nor am I now. I know this will never happen again 'cause I know better. Lastly, since I last seen you, I have been going to see my agent weekly. I've been going to my SOT classes weekly on time for two months.
- Okay, and you're okay with talking about your treatment programs in public?
- [James] Yeah.
- Okay, just want to make sure.
- [James] Yes. I got a job working on a dairy farm, which I love doing. I've learned in class how to be responsible. I'm not in denial of my actions. I have been being responsible by staying away from computers, keeping to myself, staying away from areas where minors may be like parks, malls, trails, and schools.
- Okay. Just from the standpoint in terms of his conviction, is that correctly stated it was a sting operation?
- Yes.
- Okay, is there questions for him?

- My question is you work in Seymour, correct?
- [James] Yes ma'am, that's correct.
- Why are you looking to live in Green Bay? That's quite a distance away from where you work?
- [James] I'm fine with the drive, it doesn't bother me at all. I used to live in Green Bay for over 10 years, and still did when the occurrence happened. So I'm quite fine with driving that amount of distance.
- And did you look for other places to live in and around Seymour?
- [James] According to my agent is that Seymour has an ordinance, I think it's an ordinance, for sex offenders that they do not allow them there, because of the school and the parks.
- Did you try Shawano County where the crime occurred?
- [James] No, I have not. That's, in my opinion, that's too far from my parents.
- Where are your parents?
- [James] They live in Seymour.
- Okay. Go ahead I'm sorry.
- That's okay, I'm just figuring out the mileage to Green Bay.
- I've worked with people who've done that commute.
- Question for you. This incident. Were you living in Green Bay at the time?
- [James] Yes ma'am. And then you drove to Shawano County and that's where they arrested you, correct?
- [James] Yes, ma'am.
- Okay.
- Now you said you'd never ever been interested in 15-year-olds but yet then when you were reading that you said nor will I be nor was I. But you must have been.
- [James] Curiosity just got the best of me. Pretty much. I just wasn't thinking straight at all. Was in kind of a rough situation at the time, and...
- What situation? Describe what your situation was.
- [James] I had a bad relationship that ended badly, and that kind of resulted in my action.
- Okay, I just want to follow you through that map. So you had a bad relationship.
- [James] Yes.
- It made you do this?

- [James] Yeah, because I was lonely, sad, and depressed.
- Okay. But as you had already said, driving to Shawano County is not a short distance.
- [James] No, it's not and I was stupid and I shouldn't have even driven that far.
- But to get that far, that means you have to go on Craigs, get on a computer, look at Craigslist, look at the ads, look at the types of ads, so you kind of were looking for something so, I mean as far as personal responsibility is concerned, it's not so much what happened to you, it's what you did to get to that point. Do you follow me?
- [James] With my learning problem, no.
- What is your learning problem?
- [James] I have ADD.
- Okay. I do too. I have ADHD.
- [James] Okay.
- I don't know if this helps. This was like a five day conversation before the arrest took place. So it wasn't like,
- Spur of the moment?
- Spur of the moment. Yeah.
- So you definitely tried to form some sort of relationship with this girl, who then you thought was a 15-year-old girl.
- [James] Yeah.
- But she was an officer on the other side.
- [James] Yes.
- But right away on the first day you knew she was 15. That came out right away?
- [James] I'm not sure if it came out right away in the first day. I think it might have been the second day.
- Second day.
- Okay, just looking at his, ATTIC Correctional Services too, complete all assignments and ask questions, get more counseling, you also took feedback from your peers. After care, you're considered low-risk it looks like here. From this ATTIC Correctional Services. Okay. Is anybody here that wants to speak?
- [James] My mom wasn't able to make it. She had to work.
- Okay. All right, does anybody want to, any more questions for him? Anybody want to make a motion?
- Quick question.
- Go ahead.

- Where are you currently staying?
- [James] My parents are generous enough to let me sleep on their couch at the moment, until I can get my own apartment.
- And where do they live?
- [James] They live in Seymour.
- Okay.
- [James] I just would like to move on with my life and get an apartment so I can get off my parents' couch.
- So let me ask you this. Have you looked at other apartments in the Seymour area at all?
- [James] No.
- Okay.
- [James] Not after my agent had called them. I don't know who she talked to, and they pretty much told her that they don't want sex offenders living there.
- Okay.
- [James] I guess because of the schools and the parks and stuff.
- Yep, that's a thing you have to live with. Okay, does anybody want to make a motion here?
- I make a motion to approve Mr. Goss--
- [James] Gosse.
- Gosse.
- Yes.
- 1655 West Mason, address specific.
- Is there a second?
- Okay, the motion fails based on the fact there is not a second.
- Does anybody want to make another motion?
- I'm making a motion that we deny Mr. Gosse the the application.
- To 1655 West Mason?
- That's correct.
- Okay, is there a second?

- I'll second that motion. So we're gonna go ahead and vote.
- Vote to deny passes on a three to one vote.
- Okay. Sir you have been denied to 1655 West Mason Street. Doesn't mean you can't come back to us. And so, I don't know if anybody wants to list their reasons why, but right now you can't live at 1655 West Mason, okay? All right.
- [James] Thank you.
- Thank you. I'm locked out again.
- I think I got kicked out for a minute. Okay.
- Third time.
- Okay, Mr. Holmes. Okay Mr. Holmes, we're here to hear your appeal.
- I think this is a 90-day review.
- Yep, this is a review. Sorry, just trying to bring this up here. I apologize. Okay, so just before we begin I just want to make sure you're okay with talking about your treatment program in public.
- Okay, go ahead.
- [Clifford] About my offense?
- No, no. We just want to talk about your treatment documentation, and where have you reported to?
- The last time I was here I was told to contact 'em because they didn't give me anything upon completion.
- Right.
- [Clifford] So, I wrote to them and this is what they sent back.
- Okay. Do you also, by the way, have a job now?
- [Clifford] Yes.
- And where do you work?
- [Clifford] Stanley Steamer.
- How long have you worked there for?
- [Clifford] A month or so.
- Okay, so according to this information from the Wisconsin Department of Corrections, you were enrolled in SOT. But you did not complete it because you were moved to a different program for--
- No, the top part was the first time was the end of my supervision 2012, the second part is when I caught the disorderly conduct in Brown County and I was sentenced to probation here but because I couldn't stay up here they transferred me down to Milwaukee and because I was already, because I had the Sex Offender

Treatment, or I was on sex offender probation before, it was debating whether or not they should put me on it again.

- Okay. So in other words you didn't come do any SOT, but you did complete DV, Domestic Violence.

- [Clifford] The second for the disorderly conduct, yes.

- For the disorderly, but it says at the time of your discharge from supervision in 2012 you were still enrolled in SOT training.

- [Clifford] Yes, because I had one before my actual release date.

- In summary though, you haven't completed SOT.

- [Clifford] I completed it when I applied for completion of my first probation, well my extended supervision in 2012. That's what, and then they asked...

- I'm just reading right from, it says per your request below, case notes made by your supervising agent regarding SOT at the time of your discharge from supervision in 2012 you were still enrolled in SOT.

- [Clifford] That is true.

- It doesn't say that you completed it.

- [Clifford] But like I said, they didn't hand out certificate upon completion because I was on the extended, I was in the group until I finished supervision.

- Understood, but in their chrono, in their chronological file, while you're in custody and then transferred over to probation-parole, they will list if you completed it.

- [Clifford] Well I finished my last group, which was the, August 20, I think it was the 26th or 22nd. I don't know what day it says on there because I finished extended supervision August 29th, 2012.

- Yep, that's what it says.

- [Clifford] So my last group was that Saturday before that.

- But it doesn't say you completed it.

- Yeah, it just--

- [Clifford] It's not gonna. There's no completion in that.

- No, everybody that does SOT, I'm not talking about a certificate. What I'm talking about is if you completed it, they would have said program was completed.

- [Clifford] Well I don't understand. If I'm on supervision and then they say I'm in the group until I finish supervision, and then I go to my last group before I complete supervision, how am I not completed with it, if I'm no longer on supervision?

- Then that has to be taken up with your parole agent, probation and parole. They're the ones who determine whether that you completed it.

- So the question is, do you see in his in his paperwork upon his release that he had to complete SOT training as part of his condition of his parole? I'm asking if you see that or not.
- No, I'll go through the paperwork here again, but that's not something I usually look for.
- Yeah, I understand that. That's why, I didn't know if it was, because based on what I see here we don't have his original paperwork online, so I can't see if that was a condition of his parole. Because if it was a condition of your parole and release, then I'm gonna--
- I can't see honestly how they let me off extended supervision then,
- See it wouldn't tell that.
- [Clifford] How they let me off extended supervision if I didn't complete the SOT treatment.
- Would CCAP?
- If it was part of the original sentence, CCAP would have it on there. But if it was just a term that was added by the probation officer,
- then that would not be
- then it wouldn't be there.
- Okay.
- [Clifford] This paperwork was already with the Madison Division. First time I applied.
- Okay, so basically just for the record, he has successfully completed No More Battery Intervention Program. So I just want to make sure everybody's got that.
- I do have the sentencing.
- Okay.
- It was very difficult conditions. Complete Sex Offender Evaluation, EODA, suspect cooperate with treatment programs. No contact with any drugs, no drug paraphernalia, drug dealers, drug users, or drug houses. Submit drug screens. Full-time employment. No contact with the victim. That's basically what they got at sentencing.
- Okay, so they basically, the sentence says yeah but it doesn't say it has to be.
- Right.
- All right. Just one other quick question for you. So far he had another citation. Anything else that has come up?
- No, nothing. I checked last week, nothing new in Green Bay.
- Okay.
- [Clifford] I just go to work and I come home. That's it.
- All right.

- Just for clarification, it merely says as part of his sentencing, that he's supposed to complete the Sex Offender Evaluation and then cooperate with treatment programs.

- Right.

- It does not specifically state that he must

- Complete one.

- Complete the Sex Offender Treatment Program.

- So again, what we're just looking for, because you don't have, the letter doesn't say that you completed it, and you're saying why as part of my supervision release that I had to complete it. Well, on your sentencing it doesn't say that you had to. All you had to do is have an evaluation.

- [Clifford] And I did.

- That, that--

- Which just says that before I was released on probation that I had another SOT group. And then this is saying they don't know if I completed it. But I didn't need it for the disorderly conduct that I had.

- No, I understand.

- [Clifford] That's what I'm saying, that's what this is saying.

- Yeah.

- This right here is saying I had SOT, I went to it and the way I wouldn't re-offend is my family and at the time my wife, or my fiancée will be my support system.

- I get that. But I mean--

- this is what they said to me after the last time I was here. They said that I need proof that I, complete that I attended SOT.

- It says you attended it. It doesn't say you completed the program, though.

- [Clifford] I don't understand, 'cause like I said this what specifically I was asked to bring, and this is--

- No, so this is all you have. We understand that. That's fine. You got what you got, that's fine.

- Yep.

- You can't give us something that wasn't there.

- [Clifford] Well that's directly from them, so if they said this is what something, saying that I had SOT treatment--

- No, you got something from the State, I mean that's, we know where you started from. So, okay, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to his current address and extending it or terminating it or any motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve him to 816 Mather Street.
- Address specific?
- Yes, address specific.
- Is there a second?
- Seconded.
- Okay, we're gonna have a vote.
- Vote passes unanimously.
- Okay, so you have been approved to that location. Apparently you want the letter sent to that location?
- [Clifford] Yes.
- Okay, there you go. Good luck.
- [Clifford] Thank you.
- Mr. Steven Loomis?
- [Steven] Yes. Hello. One thing I would like to point out, the address they have listed is the 1179 is my current residence but it's in Alice Drive. My address there is 1930 Eastman.
- That you want to move to?
- Yes.
- 1930 Eastman.
- Yes. That is, but on the agenda sheet it has 1179 Eastman. So I just wanted--
- On the application it does say 1930.
- [Steven] Okay.
- All right. So again we're gonna go over your application. Again just want to not refer to any personal names. Can we discuss your treatment programs in public or private?
- [Steven] Public's fine.
- All right. So why don't you tell us about your conviction? What occurred and how it happened.
- [Steven] Well, basically, I was in a really bad place in my life back when that happened. I established unhealthy boundaries with my victim and I had repeated counts of sexual assault with said victim. Basically I went on a trip with my victim to Indiana. I wanted to go home early, it was, it all just came out in the wash. I called for help treatment. I spent eight months in it was a psychologist and I went through a book called The Road to Freedom, which was a sex offender book. That was before I was ever convicted of everything. Spent five years in prison. Got out. Started seeing the Circles of Support. Been going every day since. I got right here's my

certificate for the SOT. I completed my program. I've already started my After Care, and that's kind of where I'm at.

- So how long were you assaulting the victim?

- [Steven] I was for a year.

- And how did it come out that she brought it to light?

- [Steven] Basically, in the police report, it's got that I was trying to ruin her fun by going home. It was just that, we took a five day trip. I wanted to go home early instead of be there until Tuesday. It was a Sunday and I said we're going home. So then it came out that I was assaulting her at that point. In the police documentation it was why did you come out now? He was trying to ruin my fun. So basically that's how it came out, but everything that's documented is based on what I told everybody. So I pled no contest. It's how this thing is. I wrote down my three offenses that occurred between us and that's where that happened.

- So is that what you see?

- Yeah, that was cooperate with the head from the Police department.

- Okay. So, tell us why you did it. And why you--

- I was in a really bad place. My marriage at the time, my wife before she had an aneurism was really horrible to me and it would just put me in a really bad spot. It was just that. And it was easy and convenient. I had built no boundaries. I took advantage of a teenager and that's really what it was. It was stupid.

- So you knew you were doing something wrong.

- [Steven] Well, I did and I didn't. At the time, before I went through treatment to understand things, a lot of states and things have those kind of age groups as acceptable, so I believed it was right until I got to my program with Rebecca to unravel everything, to understand that what I did was completely wrong and boundless. I had no boundaries established. I allowed things to happen around me, and I just took advantage of a very easy situation. Reflecting back on that, it bothers me and if, I don't know if you guys read the news but Nicole Eggert made a statement about Scott Baio and when I was in treatment I read this, and how it reflected on what happened with me and what I did. I go, wow, I took advantage of a teenagers hormones in those situations and that's what occurred with me.

- How old were you at the time?

- [Steven] 40.

- Okay.

- And the victim was how old?

- [Steven] 13.

- So we're not talking about...

- [Steven] Right.

- Yeah, we're talking about very young teenager.

- [Steven] Yes.
- Okay.
- Were you released in 2015, about two years ago?
- [Steven] No no no. I was released last year, March 7th of 2017.
- Okay. And where are you currently employed?
- [Steven] Office Max. I've been there for about a year and a half now. I'm a Customer Service manager.
- All right. And are you looking to buy this location?
- [Steven] Yes.
- Okay, so that's based on what you have here.
- [Steven] I'll be living there with my two children, both 12 and 11.
- So you would be living with your two children?
- [Steven] Yes.
- Okay. And are you still on paper?
- [Steven] Yes, I have nine years left.
- So obviously your parole officer's okay with that.
- [Steven] Absolutely. I have no, I can live with my children, everything. I don't have any restrictions against my two biological children.
- Okay. All right. Any questions, more questions for him? Anybody want to speak either for or against him? Say your name again.
- [Eriki] Yeah, Eriki Gaiouniki. 2766 Viking Drive, apartment 1C. So Steve's been coming to group since March 2017. He's only missed one meeting in that time, which we enjoy ribbing him about but honestly that's very impressive considering all the responsibilities that he has. It's not just that he comes to group, it's that he is very willing to share any issues that come up. Any sorts of struggles and we work things out. He's willing to help out other group members. If I, he has some information or any things can help, he's more than willing to share it. I think it shows a lot about his commitment to change.
- Okay, thank you.
- [Eriki] Yeah.
- All right, sir did you serve in the military?
- [Steven] Yes I did.
- Did you want to speak also?

- [Dean] Yes.

- You can come up.

- Your name sir?

- [Dean] My name is Dean Edict the second. I live at 1363 Mason Drive.

- Go ahead sir.

- [Dean] Green Bay, Wisconsin. Personally, I don't feel it's such a good idea. I know the victim and there's more than one but the problem is they won't come forward because of threats. To put this individual in an area where he can have contact with children is a very, very bad situation. After his conviction, he was actually at his kids' school, which part of his conviction was no contact with minor children. There were other kids that were at that school in that playground. It took four parents going up to the principal's office to finally let him know he is not allowed there unsupervised to pick up his children.

- May I interrupt?

- He does what he wants.

- May I interrupt? What is your relationship to the applicant?

- [Dean] I have a child with his wife.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- His ex-wife, I'm assuming.

- [Dean] No.

- His current wife.

- [Dean] Correct.

- Okay, go ahead.

- Okay.

- [Dean] When this all started, he wouldn't even allow her to let me see my child. So his thing with the way his wife treated him is a crock because she called me crying because of the way he was treating her. She would have to sneak my daughter up to me or he would get mad at her.

- [Steven] I--

- Wait, just let him finish, okay? Then you'll have a chance.

- I have a question here because I'm not even sure if this is appropriate getting into this. I don't think this is appropriate. If we could get into it, find out. Because how would this, whether you have personal grievances about something else, what we need to know is your input as to your personal

- [Dean] You're putting a child at risk by allowing him in that area. You are putting children at risk.
- Do you live in that area?
- [Dean] I have three friends that live in that area. Alyssa tried to make the meeting but she don't get done with work until six. When she found out she was livid because she also knows his wife. She was livid that he's coming. She tried in vain, I was messaging her, she was trying to get off from work from her supervisor. She is mad that he's moving there
- Okay.
- [Dean] While she's at work.
- This is when they're scheduled.
- Because this is the third--
- This is when they're scheduled. Do you have any other information about whether he completed these programs or anything like it?
- Since his conviction he has not completely followed the rules. Like I said, he's been to his kids' grade school unsupervised after his conviction. The principal was approached by several parents--
- Okay, but you stated it.
- I guess my question, if he violated the terms of his parole, wouldn't that have gotten back to the parole officer?
- Did you call?
- [Dean] It has been noted. Officer Viser was also notified about it. He was actually,
- Who is Officer Viser?
- [Dean] Officer Jim Viser. He's a retired Green Bay police officer. He was notified about it, too. The problem was that everything fell through the cracks because he wasn't he wasn't sentenced yet. It was between his conviction and sentencing hearing.
- Okay, that we're talking about way in the past.
- Five years ago.
- Right?
- This is not recent. This is over five years ago.
- Six, over six years ago.
- I'm just asking here.
- [Steven] You have no recollection with what's going on with me right now.
- I don't think--

- I doubt it.
- We're just trying to hear his testimony. So this was five years ago, between his conviction--
- Okay, I'm gonna be honest with you. It fell through the cracks. God gave me proof. One of the victims was also my daughter and she has been, because of him, she hasn't even lived with her mom since she was 13 years old.
- We can't get into the identity of victims.
- Well, I'm not giving her name.
- It doesn't matter.
- You're talking about relationships.
- So you're saying--
- Because the thing was is my daughter was living in Marinette County but she was forced to come and visit him in Brown County, but the transition was in, the transfer was in Oconto County. There was a discrepancy, who was going to charge him and they dropped the ball.
- So did you, just so I get your testimony and we'll let you go, you're saying that there was more than one victim than in his conviction.
- Correct.
- Okay. That's the first thing. So that's just saying what his testimony is.
- Do you have any information since he's been released from prison?
- [Dean] He's been over, I know he's been over by his kids because I have another friend that lives literally right around the corner.
- Okay, we know this. That information in the pack, what we have. He has two children. If there are any violations, have you contacted his probation or parole agent?
- [Dean] I have tried contacting probation and parole. They will not tell me who his agent is.
- Okay.
- [Dean] It just gives a general number and then you call that general number and they will not give the actual name of the agent. They just tell you you can leave information.
- And you have left information?
- [Dean] I have left information.
- Okay. All right. Thank you very much. So if you want to comment, you're more than welcome to comment on his. I'll be right with you, man. Just let him get one and we'll go to the next one. Go ahead.
- [Steven] I, I

- You don't have to.

- [Steven] No, I don't.

- Okay. Ma'am do you want to come up and testify?

- Yes, I'm sorry I didn't fill out a slip to do that.

- I'll need your name.

- My name is Marilyn Loomis and I live at 1179 Alice Drive. He is my son. I am also his sponsor, or whatever they call it. My husband and I both are. I have to say that Steven has followed the rules to the Nth degree. So much so that he is super cautious if he puts himself in a situation or he could put himself in a situation where he would be with other children, he makes sure that we're with him. He has called the schools that his children attend and asked them, the principal, can he attend. I've gone with him so, as far as taking his children and dropping them off at the home, the other home where the other victims live, he always makes sure that he doesn't drop them off in front of the house. It's always down the street, around the corner, and I have gone with him on numerous occasions. He's very careful about getting himself in any kind of situation that will send him back. He does not want to be separated from his children. He is their dad and their, he's bringing them up to the best of his ability.

- Do you have custody of your children?

- [Steven] Yes.

- [Marilyn] Yes. So he does--

- [Steven] Heres just sort of a clarification. I am still married, but when I went to prison my wife lived with her parents so I've been living with my parents. Tomorrow, actually, we're gonna go to marriage counseling and I'm living, she's got the dynamics of what happened with my case and the situation that was brought up, they all live on that side of the town. Once everything is situated. Now we're gonna try to wean her into living with me, but right now it's just me and my children. So we are fixing the marriage and everything else, so that's now 13 years.

- One other quick question for you. There's nothing in the file that the victim or anybody else saying there were other victims?

- No, I don't have that. I can do additional research, but I can't--

- [Steven] There is none. I will

- You won't find anything else.

- [Steven] Trust me. I've passed polygraphs and there has been no issues and no anything else. I came forward with my crime and that is one of the reasons where everything went down.

- Okay. Thank you ma'am. Ma'am can you actually just grab a sheet. I think you want her to fill out the sheet.

- We got it.

- You got it, okay, all right, you're good.

- [Marilyn] Okay, thank you.
- Okay, does anybody have any more questions for him? All right, does anybody want to make a motion?
- Motion to approve address from the applicant's request, address specific.
- To 1930 Eastman Street, right?
- Yes.
- Okay. Is there a second?
- I will second that.
- All right. Now we'll vote.
- Motion does not pass. There's a two to two vote.
- Okay, so the motion failed. So now we go back to the discussion because it was a tie vote at this particular time. Does anybody, in terms of their vote of not approving him or approving want to state their opinion just so the rest of the Board can hear it as to what their reasoning is? See if there's a reason to take another vote, or if we're at an impasse then we're at an impasse. No comments from anybody? Okay. Sir,
- Can I just state?
- Go ahead.
- I would really, is there anything else that this applicant could do that would change the minds of the other two individuals?
- Well, that's why I tried to get the discussion off. No one wants to say anything. Go ahead.
- [Steven] Other than what just came up, I've never missed a meeting in my SOT program where Rebecca says I've never had anybody never miss a meeting. I was there all the time and I've done everything anybody's ever asked. Before I even got sentenced to prison I paid out of pocket to go to therapy to understand what I did wrong, so I wouldn't have to go to prison. I want to win. I own a car, I have my kids. I'm doing everything I possibly can. I can't fail. I told my PO when I came out, I want to win. All I want to do is win because I don't want to lose my family. I don't want to lose this. I have too much to lose. I have a good full-time job as a customer service manager, and I have all these placements in play that I have Britney who I'm completely transparent with. Anything that would come up I tell him. I've passed my poly. I talk to Rebecca. I have my family and friends. I would throw literally everything away to ever offend again. I will never. It's so unfathomable. I will never offend again. I have too much to lose. My life, it's weird to say that, with losing my life five, six years ago, and being where I'm at now, I'm in a better place. My head is focused. I mean, I have credit cards. I never had credit cards because I couldn't balance my money. So I have credit to get a house. If you think about that, is that I have over 700 credit. Last December I was at a 500 and I'm up to 700. I got a VA loan approval, nonetheless, to get a house. In that respect, to throw it all away for stupidity. My mother, my whole family will cut me off for the rest of my life. I'll lose my kids. I don't, you know.
- Sir. I have one question. So you're currently living at Alice Drive.
- [Steven] That is my parents' house, correct.
- Okay. And you've been out for about a year, right?

- [Steven] A year and a half, yes.
- And a half. We don't have record of him coming in front of us to move at this location, do we?
- [All] That's in Ashwaubenon.
- Okay, all right. Just was great to ask.
- Oh, yeah.
- Okay.
- [Marilyn] And his kids are living in our basement and all he's trying to do is give a better life to his own family.
- [Steven] My daughter's been dying for her own room and I have this opportunity to give them what they want.
- Well, unfortunately, we have a member of our board here that's not here. That's why we're on a 4-4 tie. And another person that is a substitute officer couldn't be here. So I mean, we're at a 4-4 tie, if no one's willing to change your vote at this time, it doesn't mean you can't come back next month.
- [Steven] But I don't know what I can do. I guess if something--
- Well what I'm telling you is that if we have five people on the board, you know, and there's a 2-2 tie right now. The fifth member if the board is either gonna, basically say no or gonna say yes, that's what I'm telling you.
- Based on, what somebody did an anonymous approval based on I've done everything you could possibly imagine for somebody getting out in a year and a half, full time job, has the finances, has this, that. To say no and then go, I never miss a meeting at circle support. Never missing anything, I have immaculate record. It's the only crime in my entire life ever. So outside of the fact that I have this crime, that I'm having this conversation with anybody in this room, I am no different.
- But sir, sir, I'm gonna disagree with you mildly here. You're marginalizing this crime.
- [Steven] Oh no, absolutely not.
- You just said I've never done anything other than this crime.
- [Steven] Well, it's a big crime.
- You affected someone who is 13 years old or younger at the time. And you of your own fruition did that. Now you're taking responsibility for it which again is a big step. But I'm sorry, you're here because of you, not because of this board.
- [Steven] But my question is, what is it I need to do? What pinnacle for that person to say okay, I'm okay with this, do I need to do? I guess that's my question.
- Well I mean, again. This is a board that's not paid. We're just a citizen board. And people are trying to make the best decisions possible.
- [Steven] Correct.

- Okay. So at this particular time, you have two people that felt that you were a good risk to live in the city and two people that don't, okay? All right. Because we're at a tie, a 2-2 tie, and no one's willing to move on their particular vote at this particular moment,
- Does that still stand, or? Within this conversation, if somebody came?
- Well again, you know, if we want to take another vote, we can do that because we were at a tie so the motion fails. Okay?
- Does someone want to entertain that motion again because we did do that earlier for another applicant?
- Yep, we can definitely vote again if someone's willing to. But again, if you know, because our votes are anonymous, I don't necessarily want to initially tell the person that voted no, of the two people that voted no, to basically say hey I voted no. I mean, the question is, we can ask for another motion. If it ends up in a tie, I'm not gonna allow another vote after that. Okay? So you know at this point in time if someone wants to make the motion again, you're more than welcome to make the motion again.
- I'll make the same motion that I made earlier to approve Mr. Loomis' address specific to 11, oh that's,
- 1930.
- 1930 Eastman Avenue, Green Bay.
- Address specific?
- Address specific.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Okay, so we're gonna vote again. But again, even if it ends in a 2-2 tie, again, if we have five people next time, you can apply again next month.
- Motion passes, three to one.
- Okay. So you are approved to 1930 Eastman Street, address specific. Where would you like that sent to, the Alice Drive?
- 1179, yes.
- Okay. All right.
- Thank you very much.
- All right.
- [Steven] Have a great day.
- It was a tearjerker.

- Okay, our next meeting is Wednesday, September 12 at 2:30. Is there any other information or anything else anybody would like to add to today's agenda?
- No.
- No.
- Does anybody want to make a motion to adjourn?
- I'll make that motion.
- Do we have to vote on this one?
- Yes we do.
- Seconded.
- Okay, I can take it. Always runs to. So is there a motion for the next meeting being September 12?
- Yes. And there was a second.
- Okay, so Kathy, you had motioned and Melissa second?
- Yes.
- Is everybody voting yes?
- [Dean] Yes.
- I just mark, I can just mark all as yes.
- Okay.
- Okay, the motion passes.
- [Dean] Motion for adjournment. I make the motion to adjourn.
- Yes.
- Second.
- Aye.
- [Head] All in favor?
- [Everyone] Aye.
- All right, motion passes.
- [Head] All right, thank you guys.
- Just, I don't know if anybody caught this on the way out.

- Way up?
- Can I stop?
- Yes.
