VERBATIM MINUTES

- Okay I'm gonna bring to order the sexual offenders meeting of previous sexual offenders residency board for November 14th. I'm gonna start off just with role call myself, Renee, Kathy, Heidi, and Ed Dorff as a alternative for Melissa.

- One moment. Alright.

- First thing to do is approval of the agenda for this meeting. Anybody wanna make a motion?

- I'll make that motion.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second it.

- We'll post unanimously.

- Okay second item is approval of our minutes from our October 10th meeting. Could I have a motion to approve those minutes.

- Make a motion to approve the minutes.

- I'll second that.

- We'll post unanimously.

- Okay we're gonna go ahead and move forward to our first appeal which is Tammy Bonifas, and this is gonna be on a phone call.

- [Automated Phone Message] Please dial one, press the area code--

- [Woman On Phone]

- Uh yes this is Dean Gerondale with the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board, I'm looking for Tammy Bonifas.

- [Woman On Phone] Oh okay, I'll transfer you to her.

- Thank you.

- [Tammy] Hello?

- Tammy this is Dean Gerondale with the Green Bay Sex Offenders Residency Board.

- [Tammy] Okay.

- We are here to hear your appeal today.

- [Tammy] Yes.

- Looking to move to 1745 Eleventh Avenue in Green Bay, correct?

- [Tammy] Correct.

- Alright, just wanna let you know you are in a public meeting at this time, so as we go over your case just wanna make sure you refer to the persons involved as the victims and list by personal name of affiliation.

- [Tammy] Okay.

- And second of all if we do want to talk about your treatment programs you do have a right to have it done in a private session or a public session. Which would you prefer?

- [Tammy] What is that concerning?

- So in other words if you've gone through any treatment programs since you've been incarcerated for the crime, or counseling, you have the right to do that in a private session. In which we'd clear the room and go into a private session that wouldn't be on our minutes. Versus a public session where everybody can hear it.

- [Tammy] No that's fine It can do whatever public, that's fine.

- Alright thank you. Okay, so at first like to start off with, tell us a little bit about your crime and what you were doing and how you got caught doing it.

- [Tammy] Okay, to begin with is I had got charged with human trafficking of a child. The way things had happened was I was dating a gentleman who had brought over a female friend, that his friend was dating and they were a temporary date that we can tell, they had got on her page. They were staying for quite a while and then she had brought it to my attention that she advertised herself on Backpage, or whatever, for purposes of making her ends meet. Then from there I was trying to assist her in to getting away from what

she was doing. And then there was an event where she had asked me to translate something, that I speak Spanish, to put something Spanish for and I yeah. There was a couple times where she had asked for a ride from me to go get Visas, prepaid Visa card, 'cause she was not old enough to. That's how that had occurred. Basically at a time when it ended up going on, I did say, well 6 months prior I had sent my son to go live with his father, 'cause his behavioral issues. The lack of respect he had for me and all of his sisters. So my judgment was pretty poor that moment at the time. I don't know where else to go from there--

- Sorry, are you saying that you were like a sidebar person to her, in selling herself for sex? Or were you actually involved in setting appointments for her and things like that?

- [Tammy] No I did not set any appointments for her. What had occurred, like I said, the only thing that had happened was, is I translated, what she had asked me to in Spanish for her.

- Okay.

- [Tammy] I had never took anything from the victim. Maybe it's a bad, and like said it's a bad judgment which knowing now what I didn't know back then I should have went ahead and contacted somebody to get her help the right way. And I didn't, I was trying to help her. What I thought was helping her on my own.

- Okay. Does anybody have any more questions on her understanding of what the crime she committed?

- No.

- No.

- So in regards to the facts of this case, do you believe she's telling the truth in terms of what she was convicted with.

- According to the internal complaint, she didn't help facilitate meetings, and threatened some of the underage girls to participate.

- That she did?

- She did.

- More than one girl?

- Yes.

- Okay. So we have an officer here that has reviewed the case file and he's indicating that you were more complicit in, not only the act of this one girl, but with several others. And you're saying that that's not the case?

- [Tammy] I didn't even get in the topic of the other girls, I was just talking about the girl that was living with me at the time.

- Okay.

- [Tammy] And like I said what I took part in, like I said, is I translated for her, part of the page that she had put up. I went ahead and like I said, I admit to going to get these cards, Visa cards for her, because she was under the age 'cause she couldn't obtain those herself without an ID.

- What did you do for the other girls then?

- [Tammy] It was, these all were friends of hers and they were just riding along with them. And basically it was the same thing because they were together.

- So my question is, if that's the case then why did you plead guilty to keeping a place of prostitution?

- [Tammy] 'Cause I was scared. The attorney that I had, what the DA was coming at me with, with the time in to time outs. Me having nobody close to verify my story, besides those victims that were around--

- Mm-hmm.

- [Tammy] I was scared I mean where else do I turn to, what to do, I mean I got into the district attorney's attention, to look into other people, other adults and because the victims did not claim them as being a part of this, they would not look into it.

- Okay.

- [Tammy] In 2017 my ex that I was dating, he had got arrested on some other charges, and the female, one of the victims, the one that was staying with me, she had basically given a statement as to stating that I was trying to help her, She had made a statement against him, that I was not committing to trying to harm her or trying to sell her. I tried to fight that, not that long ago, before to try to get my time cut. But the public defender that I had, advised me just to let it be. So I take full responsibility, like I said, for acts that I done, I take, I mean I don't know the word, how much more I have to say I'm sorry?

- Okay.

- [Tammy] Realize that you've met the cost.

- Right, understand. Okay, any other questions relating to her crime?

- No.

- Okay, just real briefly in regards to the time you spent incarcerated, it looks like you haven't had any chance, or you didn't apply, for any sexual offender treatment, is that correct?

- [Tammy] They had an honor to tell me here. They never stated that it was mandatory.

- Okay. So being here exhibit assault two program, and when they evaluated me, there was a statement saying that certain things exhibited, 'cause they as far as my understanding, so it isn't right. I was trying in the things I had felt that if I would have taken the class here, and went into that with other people that had different types crimes or even more details, then that would probably hurt me even more.

- Okay.

- [Tammy] someone's actually physically doing something, you know what I mean, to a child or someone, just to anyone. I mean I think some point here, other work, I've tried other things, while I'm in here to better myself. I'm also now on psych medication too as well.

- Okay so, who are taking to live with?

- [Tammy] That's my mother's address I provided to you.

- Okay is your mom having anybody else, live with you besides your mother?
- [Tammy] My three girls will be there and her boyfriend.
- Your mom's boyfriend?
- [Tammy] Yes.
- And your three girls?
- [Tammy] Correct.
- Okay and how old are your girls?
- [Tammy] I have a daughter who's 17, another one who's 14, and then my youngest is nine. And I do have a son but he is relying on his father.
- Okay, so when you scheduled to be released?
- [Tammy] January 22nd, of 2019.
- Okay. Any thoughts about when you get out what you wanna do?
- [Tammy] Yes I just recently been talking to my mom about plans. I'm currently disabled, I get disability for half the conditions I have. I have mental also have seizures. But I have gotten my GED while I'm here so I plan on going into some type of schooling to further my education. To try to get a better paying job.
- Okay. Alright does anybody else have any more questions for her?
- No.
- Anybody? Okay, is there anybody that wants to speak, for her or against her in this location? Okay, looks like no one wants to speak either for or against you ma'am. So, go ahead.
- [Tammy] There's a time I had get me children. They had been coming up here to see me. I had explained to them, what had occurred, the details and things, and how what the schedule's gonna be, not just from being in here, but as far as coming home. They are very well aware of that.
- Okay.
- I've got one question.
- Go ahead.
- Could you tell me why your mother was not able to come and speak on your behalf today?
- [Tammy] My mother is working.
- And she's not able to get off for couple hours?
- [Tammy] No, and she had to pick up my youngest daughter around this time as well.

- Okay.
- Okay does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to Ms. Bonifas residing at 1745 Eleventh Avenue?
- I'll make a motion to deny Ms. Bonifas to 1745 Eleventh Avenue.
- Alright is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Alright is there any discussion anybody wants to give, either for or against this motion before our vote? Okay go ahead and start the vote please.
- Motion to deny passes three to two.
- Okay Ms. Bonifas you've been denied to move to 1745 Eleventh Avenue in Green Bay. At this particular time you do have the right go back to this board at some time in the future, in terms of a different address or this one, depending on if you're circumstances have changed. So just wanted to let you know, alright?
- [Tammy] I just have a question, before you go.
- Go ahead.
- [Tammy] That is my only address I have to go to, so--
- So at that particular point you're gonna have to work out with your parole officer in regards to what other potential options you do have. So I can't tell you what you can or can not do, it's really up to your parole officer, okay?
- [Tammy] Okay, thank you.
- Alright, buh bye. Our next person on our docket is Mr. Thomas. Sir why don't you come on up.
- [Richard] Pardon me?
- Why don't you come on up.
- [Richard] Oh sure.
- Mr. Richard Thomas.
- [Richard] Sure.
- Okay, Mr. Thomas you're looking to move to 1655 West Mason Street, is that correct?
- [Richard] That's correct, yes.
- Alright. And you're currently living at 1301 South Military?
- [Richard] Mm-hmm.

- Alright. Today again, we're gonna go over your particular crime. We ask that you just refer to the person as the victim, when you talk about it.

- [Richard] Yeah.

- Alright and again you have a right if you wanna talk about your treatment programs, if you wanna do that in public or private. Which would you prefer? So again if you wanna talk about any treatment programs you've had, you have the right to do that either in private session or in a public setting.

- [Richard] - Well public is fine.

- Public is fine, okay. Okay so it looks like, back in 2016 if I'm reading this correctly, that you had an issue with a victim at age 16 and 17. Is that correct?

- [Richard] Yes.

- Alright, tell us about what happened and what you did and how it came about that you were convicted of this crime.

- [Richard] Well what it involved was indecent exposure on my part.

- Okay.

- [Richard] It was outside the window of my, I was in the building where I was living, it was in the window and it was about 6:30 in the morning. And it was still not really light out it was so partially dark. And this person walked by on the road and that person reported it.

- Okay.

- [Richard] That it see me.

- Alright, okay. And it was your intent to expose yourself in front of that person?

- [Richard] Not particularly in front of that, I mean, I just, it was something that I did, it was wrong. But I don't know who the person, at that time I had no idea who the person was, even now I don't know, I mean I could not identify that person by name or anything.

- Okay.

- [Richard] So it was sort of anonymous in that respect.

- Okay. So again, looks like in 1993 you were convicted again, in regards to, again, exposing yourself. Is that correct? Back in 1993?

- [Richard] Yeah well that was about 25 years ago.

- Yup, okay. So in regards to what you're doin', do you know why you're doing that? Or what's you're driving motivation on that? Why are you exposing yourself to people?

- [Richard] Well that only happened, I say made that long 25 years ago, and no it never happened otherwise.

- But those were the times you were convicted, did you do it at any other time? Stand in front of a window,

exposing yourself?

- [Richard] No.

- So why did you do it this last time?

- [Richard] Well sometimes it's hard to verbalize these things, it was just part of my, I don't know how should I even put it? Part of my urges and impulses that come from, you might say as my therapist indicated to me, part of simply when we went over the entire, my whole sexual history, in the sense of the feelings and emotions that I had during my life that I never acted inappropriately at other times. But somehow this was, is a result of that. And that's what I'm making amends for now and in a sense, I feel like I'm gonna be making amends the rest of my life, as regards to what's wrong. Like I said I'm, you have my age there, I'm an old person you know, I'm 81 years old now. And why some of this would have come about, even later in my life, it just hard for me to try to as I said before, to verbalize all this. But it all had to do with my sexual history that is part of my entire life. But I never acted out at any other time with regard to these and that's what I've been working on with my therapist for, I was in therapy now for over two years.

- Mm-hmm.

- [Robert] And I believe what I submitted to the board, previous to this meeting, was a report from him. And then as recently as yesterday, he did have a follow up for me that in essence is saying that I continue to make progress via the treatment process. I'm now in what he calls aftercare. I said this follows about--

- No he said he was okay with public session, yup go ahead.

- [Richard] About two and a half years of treatment with my therapist and now after that length of time, I'm not in what he calls aftercare. So I still meet with him. So that--

- How often do you meet with him?

- [Richard] Well now I'm seeing him once a month.

- Okay.

- [Richard] But this is a continuation of the treatment program is what he now calls aftercare.

- Right. Now are you gonna be living with anybody?

- [Richard] No.

- And why are you looking to move to this particular location?

- [Richard] Why am I?

- Why do you want to move to this location?

- [Richard] Well as I also submitted to you in my, in what I submitted to the board previous to today is, this person there is willing to rent to me. He's fully aware of my situation, he knows everything about it that I've indicated to him, and he did indicate by signing his name and address, that he's willing to rent to me.

- But I mean right now at 1301 Military Street, what is that location?

- [Richard] Well that's the Bay Motel.
- The Bay motel, okay. And you've been livin' there for almost two years?
- [Richard] No, I've been living there most of this year.
- Okay so where we're you living prior to that?
- [Richard] Well I had been over at a place called extended stay, which is by the airport.
- Okay, okay, alright.
- [Richard] Well I had asked actually, let me see, through most of 17 I lived with a classmate of mine up in, he just lives out of Oconto.
- Okay.
- [Richard] And I had lived with him, I say for about six months and that would have been in 2017. No I'm sorry, yeah, in 2017.
- Okay so just in regards to his particular crime, is that accurate in terms of what his account was?
- The internal complaint states it occurred on five days in March. The same victim he was exposing himself to, the same victim and the later dates he attempted to get the attention of the victim by yelling hey, and shining a light, possibly a flashlight, out the window to get his attention.
- Okay, alright. Do you believe that is accurate? Did you do that?
- [Richard] I don't ever recall anything about yelling. I don't know, that I can remember the yelling part. That or calling, or saying anything, that I don't remember at all. Because my, my probation officer had asked me about that too and I said I don't recall anything that I called out or yelled or anything like that. That part, I don't remember that.
- Well you originally told us this happened once, and he said it was five time in March. So which one is correct?
- [Richard] Well I was only charged twice.
- Okay so how many times have you done this before, not being charged?
- Or caught?
- [Richard] Well I mean that's in my case, I was charged by the district attorney's office for two counts.
- We understand that, okay, the question we're asking is, you're charged with two different counts of it, okay? But the record shows that you exposed yourself on five different days, is that accurate?
- [Richard] I was never, I never had anybody's attention during those other times that I might have stood in the window.
- Okay but, you did stood in the window more than two times?

- [Richard] Yeah.
- Okay. Do you know how many times you did? Or don't you know?
- [Richard] How many times?
- How many times you stood in the window?
- [Richard] No I don't recall exactly how--
- Was it a daily thing? Was that something you did every day?
- [Richard] No.
- I have another question, when you're describing how your victims were affected. The first one you say may have been startled or afraid and the second one you say he wasn't offended, he didn't appear to be. How do you, why is there a difference?
- [Richard] You mean the--
- The victim.
- The victims, you wrote down on the paper. How did this affect your victim? How did they feel about what you did?
- [Richard] Yeah.
- And so the first one you said was startled or afraid.
- [Richard] Well that would have been my feeling that he was maybe--
- But you didn't think your first victim was startled or afraid.
- [Richard] My first victim?
- Yeah the one in '93, you write, I did not believe the person was offended, he did not appear to be.
- [Richard] Yeah well that was an adult and he didn't appear to be offended.
- Could you talk about that offense because you didn't really say what happened, you just said that was 25 years ago. Was it standing in the window again?
- [Richard] No.
- Okay could you talk about that one please?
- [Richard] Well that was at a wayside at night where I was. And I exposed myself to this person and he didn't appear to, I mean he didn't, see it was an adult, he didn't seem to me to be offended by that or anything, as much as what I can remember. So that's, but that was I say 25 years ago.
- Do you know why you did that at that time? When you were outside?

- [Richard] I guess it was just part of my feeling about myself and somehow I had this urge to act out in some way. Nothing ever happened from that time until this thing of two years ago now, so.

- Okay. Alright anymore questions relating to the crime itself?

- [Richard] Did you have any, I guess maybe, you had made copies of what I sent you--

- Yup we have it in front of us.

- [Richard] You've seen it, I said I had an addendum just as of yesterday from--

- I don't have that addendum if you wanna show it me I'll take that.

- [Richard] This first page goes back to the original and then he had some, well there's really three addendum on there, the most recent one, there was two others previous to the one of yesterday.

- Can you just tell me what some of your triggers would be? That you have to address in your prevention? Like what, it says here you're aware of healthy legal boundaries and its related triggers to a relapse prevention plan. So do you have any feelings that would make you think that you need to do this?

- [Richard] Well not anymore, there were times when I felt there were certain things that activated my urges or compulsion, you know. But through my treatment process I've gotten to the point where I don't, I'm not conscious of anything now at this point in my life. Where there any things that I feel are going to compel me or have an urge to act out.

- Okay.

- [Richard] I think the treatment is helped to change all of that, you know. And that's what amongst everything in these past two and a half years that I've been working on with my therapist, these are all the things that we've addressed. And I feel my thinking and my whole state of mind is changed with regard to all of this.

- How often do you go to treatment?

- [Richard] Now?

- Mm-hmm.

- [Richard] I see my therapist every month, this is in aftercare, after two and a half years of treatment where I saw him, initially I was seeing him every week. And then eventually he said now I think we can go to every two weeks and that's what we did. And all of this, but even, see my treatment took place, started even during a time that I was incarcerated. And I was at the Huber Center here and I was allowed to go down to leave there and go down from my treatments with my therapist even during the time I was incarcerated, to go. They allowed me to do that.

- So what are you doing with your days?

- [Richard] My days?

- Yeah what're you doin'?

- [Richard] Well I do a lot of reading, I do a lot of visiting with my friends and those that have stood by me and everything with all of this, and I watch a lot of TV, particular the news, I'm kind of a news person. Other good

programs on TV that are on channels like Hallmark, and History, and National Geographic, and those. But I watch a lot of TV that regularly with regard to news, a science channel, I'd say plus I do a lot of reading and so my days are, I keep myself occupied in that way and busy.

- Okay.

- [Richard] With everything that I do now, and everything. And all of that, all of this, through all my treatment, my therapist knows all about this and he encourages me. And he always asks me, how are your days going? What are you doing now and everything? And I think he's been very affirming of me with regard to what I've been trying to do now to keep myself occupied and busy and everything with things, too.

- Okay.

- [Richard] So I believe, really, that my life has changed quite a bit since all of this occurred. Like I said, I don't have the urges and the compulsions that I feel I had before, in spite of-- I'm sorry I forgot to turn this off.

- No, no problem.

- [Richard] That I somehow feel that I've changed with regard to all the things that probably were triggers for me in the past that might, like I would feel like oh with times that, I never acted on a lot of things but there was a time when my therapist would say to me, well do you, have you felt in the past sometimes that you were out of control with regard to some of these things? And I said, I suppose I would have to say yes that there were times. He said, how do you feel now about all of those things? I said, well I think I've had quite a turnaround in my life where a lot of these things, you might say are not, I don't believe, are an issue for me anymore with regard to acting out inappropriately because of all of the treatment I've had. And I would say at times, my treatment was pretty intense. I realize that it's all for my good and all for my benefit. And he mentioned somewhere, even in my original report from him, he says that he felt that I have worked hard with regard to my treatment, that I've taken it seriously. All for me to continue, that I said, I don't wanna keep repeating myself to you, but that I've continue and I feel I will be making amends the rest of my life.

- Okay.

- [Richard] And I would also say too it isn't just that I made all this progress, that he feels I've made, simply because of the legal consequences. It's also with regard to I don't want to be the person I was before and all this treatment has helped me to be, I'm not a different person, but there's something about me that's different. In a way a lot different. And like I say it isn't just the legal issues, it's me with regard to wanting to be a better person, spiritually and emotionally, and all of this shall improve because I'm getting along in my life. And I've been in reasonably good health but yet in my age, I'm 81 now, I don't know how much longer I might be in this world, I don't know.

- Right.

- [Richard] All of those things are the things that I continue to reflect upon and there isn't a day that goes by, since all of this happened, that it doesn't come to my mind now. I don't know if that seems unusual or I kind of think that it helps me to realize what I did, and that I'm remorseful for, and that I'm sorry for, and everything. And maybe the fact that, even though I mean it's not something that preoccupies me all through the day or anything like that, but it's something that in some way I think it just enters my mind, even if so very briefly, maybe I don't know if I would say every day, but very frequently. And I think that's been all to my benefit too because it helps me to reflect on what this is all about, and what happened to me, and that this is not gonna happen anymore.

- Okay.

- [Richard] And my therapist has said, he said I really believe now, he said you are not a danger and you are not a threat to anybody.
- Okay, appreciate it.
- [Richard] That's what he says your honor.
- Okay. Alright did anybody have any more direct questions for him?
- I have a question.
- Go ahead.
- You're still on probation, correct?
- [Richard] I will be on probation, it's less than a year now.
- That you have to go?
- [Richard] Yeah, my probation will end in October of next year.
- Okay, since you've been on probation have you gone to jail for any rule violations?
- [Richard] There was only one instance where it was, how should I put it? I picked up someone, to take him and his daughter because he couldn't drive. And he had been, his probation had been revoked or something because of an offense that he had. And so I should not have done this--
- Did you know his probation had been revoked when you took him?
- [Richard] No.
- Okay.
- [Richard] But it had been and as a result of that I was put on a probation hold, and I was in jail then for two days, and then my probation agent had me released. And he simply wrote this off as a minor violation.
- Okay.
- [Richard] He said, you might have had the right intention, but your judgment was wrong. I said, well I admit that and I guess I said that was, I certainly never intended to knowingly or consciously violate my probation 'cause I've always taken my probation very seriously. And I've never had any other issues with regard to my probation and my--
- Is that accurate too, that he's only had one instance as far as--
- Yeah it looks like about a year ago, October.
- [Richard] Yeah and my PO gives me a good report, and he wrote this off a minor violation, he didn't, that's the way he put it.
- Okay, is there anybody else here that would like to speak either for or against this gentleman?

- [Richard] Yes there is, there's--

- I'm talking about, is there anybody?

- [Donald] Yeah I would, yeah.

- Sir why don't you come on up, if you can and just again, just make sure we have your name as a record.

- [Donald] Yeah you do, Donald Coenen.

- Okay go ahead sir.

- [Donald] I known him for 25 years. I wouldn't be a deacon in the Catholic church if it wasn't for him. When my mother died he was there for me. He's been part of our sun. I can't say a bad word about him, he's been really, really good to us.

- So why do you think he did what he did?

- [Donald] I don't know, I don't know. I don't know if it was somethin' that happened to him at home or what, I don't know.

- Okay. But he's never done nothin' in all the years I've known him, anything, that wasn't good and wasn't positive.

- Do you think he's at risk for doing this again?

- [Donald] No.

- Why?

- [Donald] I think he's a changed man, even when you talk to him on the phone now, I think he's more positive, I think he's more caring, I think he's more, he's just totally different. It almost seems like it's lifted and it's gone.

- Okay.

- [Donald] I think he's, the burden he's had probably all his life, is he's so changed. He's just a totally different guy.

- Alright thank you for your time.

- [Donald] Yup.

- Sir why don't you come on up. Just have your name.

- [Steve] Steve Becker.

- Okay, Steve.

- [Steve] My wife's, and I, and our family have known him for about 20 years. We consider him a friend. When this instance happened about two years ago we basically, he came over to our house. We do have, we host

international students and they are minors, so we made it very clear that if at all our students were offended or objected to having father come over visit we would not, we would have ceased it right there. And we would have maybe kept our relationship outside of our home. I feel that at this point in his life and he, like I think Deacon Donald has said, that he's changed. I don't know, we didn't know the history before hand with the first offense, but the second offense we basically sat down with Richard and said, okay as long as you continue on your meds and you see your therapist we will support you. And I feel at this stage of the game that he needs to get a place of his own and move to this different residence with the help of you all.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Steve] You're welcome.

- Alright is there anybody else? Go ahead, come on up ma'am.

- [Suzette] I'm Sue Becker, Suzette actually on there. I just want to mention that when we met Richard we have two boys and they were pretty young at the time. And there has never been anything that went on with our boys and him, this came as a shock. But I do remember him saying, when he talked to us afterwards, that he had been feeling depressed at that time and this all just took over. And so that's why we did say to him, long as you stay on your meds and therapy and stuff, this would be a good thing.

- Okay, alright thank you.

- [Richard] Oh I should mention that I've suffered a lot of anxiety and a lot of depression through all of this and I still have those feelings. But my doctor has, my doctor knows my whole situation, and he has me on an anti-depressant right now. To help me cope and deal with all of this too, so I should have mentioned that. That's the only meds that I take with regard, my other meds are just regular meds that are prescribed for me to take.

- Okay, alright, unless somebody has any more questions for him does anybody wanna make a motion?

- I'm gonna make a motion to deny Mr. Thomas to 1655 West Mason Street, Green Bay.

- Is there a second? I'll go ahead and second that motion. So we're gonna go ahead and unless anybody wants to speak we'll go ahead and take that vote. Go ahead.

- The motion to deny fails three to two.

- Okay so the motion failed to deny you to that particular location. Is there anybody else, anybody that wants to say or make another motion? Or else we're gonna go ahead and move on without a decision.

- Doesn't that mean he gets to live there?

- No, basically, yeah I said we have a right to make another motion, if someone wants to make another motion.

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Thomas to 1655 West Mason.

- Okay is there a second?

- I'll second it.

- Okay we're gonna ahead to, we have two motions to approve to that location 1655 West Mason Street.

- Motion to approve fails three to two.

- Okay, I don't know what happened there sir. So I just wanna make sure, does everybody understand the way they voted in regards to both the first and the second? Okay? Alright because both motions failed, obviously one person changed their vote in regards to first denying you and then when we asked to approve you someone, three out the people said no as well. So at this particular point, unless no one plans to change their vote, then you've been denied access to this particular location. So does anybody wish to change their vote to way the last vote was taken or not?

- Can I make a comment?

- Sure, go ahead.

- I've been on this for a while and I don't think I've seen anybody come in with the amount of treatment that you have done. I mean that's a lot of dedication, two and a half years, a lot of people are only in there for less than a year. And for me that was a huge factor, and for you to still continue to go, when this incident happened two and a half years ago. And that's for me a very important feature. So that's why I voted for you to be able to stay there.

- Alright.

- Okay so here's your alternatives at this particular point. Okay you've been denied to move into this particular location, doesn't mean you can't come in front of the board again. With a different location or at a different time to reapply to move into a different location. But for right now you've been not approved to move to 1655 West Mason Street, okay?

- [Richard] Is there some reason with regard to the location or is it--

- Again I asked for comments from the board and you only had particular comment in terms of positiveness for you. The board doesn't have to comment on their vote and obviously they, no one wants to at this particular time. Okay?

- [Richard] Well all I can say is that I think this is a terrible injustice to me. I've tried for how many years now to try to find a place to live. No one would accept me and the person who was agreeable was an approved, was on a list that my probation gave me.

- Yup.

- [Richard] And so I have no, the Beckers here consider me a part of their family. Where am I supposed to go now? I have no place to go, I can't continue to stay there because of the cost.

- Mm-hmm. You know only I can tell you sir is that I didn't put you in front of, in this position. You put yourself in this position by your crime. Okay? You know you're gonna have to look for other places, either outside the city of Green Bay to live, that's willing to rent with you, whether it's Ashwaubenon, Howard, De Pere, or someplace within Brown County or where your parole officer will let you do that, that's gonna be accepting you. But at this particular time the city of Green Bay is not going to let you live at this particular location. So.

- [Robert] Well I consider this, I consider this a punishment and I don't think, I can all say that I don't think the punishment fits the crime. I'm not saying this wasn't, this didn't happen, and that it wasn't wrong.

- Mm-hmm.

- [Robert] But all I'm doing, that I had been doing all this time, is something positive.

- You know I'm not gonna comment on it--

- [Robert] No, but?

- I can understand your feelings, but again, I didn't put you in that chair. So were tryin', this is a citizen board made up of individuals that don't get paid by the city, we're just members of the town, and we're trying to make the best decisions we possibly can. So again it's doesn't preclude you from the right to come back to us with a different location but you can't live at 1655 West Mason at this time, alright? Okay, thank you. Next up is Leo Sanchez-Basulto. Mr. Basulto?

- [Leo] Yeah?

- Oh, come on up sir. Okay, Mr. Basulto you're look to move to 154 Berger Street, is that correct?

- [Leo] Yes.

- Okay you're currently at the 1761 Shawano Ave which works in the TLP correct?

- [Leo] I was previously but I am now officially recognized as homeless.

- Okay, alright. Okay so again we're gonna kinda start with your initial crime, I want you to talk about the victim not referring to 'em by personal name or affiliation. And then afterwards if we wanna address some of your treatment programs, you have the right to do it in public session or private session. Which would you prefer?

- [Leo] Public is okay?

- Public is fine, okay good. So why don't you tell us a little bit about what happened. It looks like you had first degree sexual assault of a three year old. Tell us what happened.

- [Leo] Yeah, essentially I was babysitting my brother's kid 'cause he wanted to go out and have drinks at the bar.

- Okay.

- [Leo] And initially I was adverse to the idea I was gonna go out myself that night and hang out with my friends, but he then offered me a bottle of liquor to watch his kids. And--

- And you were how old at the time?

- [Leo] 19.

- Okay.

- [Leo] And then, 19 or 20, one of the two.

- Okay.

- [Leo] And then I said yes and then we started drinking, him and I, and then eventually he left and he said he would be back within the hour, 'cause that's when the UFC fight he wanted to watch would be over, about. And so he laid the kids down to sleep and I was sitting there watching a movie until he came back. But one of the kids woke up and she wouldn't go back to sleep. So I put her on the couch with some blankets and pillows, put a movie on, said watch the movie 'til you fall asleep. She got up to grab some juice and I kicked my feet up on the couch to notice that it was wet. And then I asked her if she peed, she said no, but there was no water or anything spilled, so. I asked her again, she said yes, and I said okay well go clean yourself up. To which she went into the bathroom and turned on the bathtub faucet and I heard this, I was still watching the movie. I thought she would just get changed or like just wipe herself off, I don't know. And then I heard the bathtub faucet on and I was concerned 'cause I wasn't sure whether or not she knew how to take herself a bath or anything like that. So I walked in there to make sure she was doing okay and I see her just cupping the water from the bathtub faucet and just throwing it at her face. And I found this to be humorous so I pulled out my phone and recorded a video of it so I could show her parents when they got back. Okay after this had happened she cleans up, I help her clean up 'cause she's not cleaning up correctly and then I help her get dressed and after that her parents didn't end up coming home until like three am, really late.

- Okay.

- [Leo] Yeah and then I forgot to show them the video 'cause I was really drunk by the time they actually got home. 'Cause I started drinking again in anticipation that they would be back already, and they didn't get back. But when they did get back they got into an argument and a fight and he pushed her, I guess, oh his way leaving 'cause she did not wanna let him leave and he was trying to leave. And then she came and woke me up 'cause I was asleep and she asked to use my phone to get ahold of somebody. And I disabled my lock and I gave it to her and then she went through my phone and she found the video, of course concerning. And she called the cops on me and I forgot to show them the video. I was, as soon as they got home, I passed out.

- Okay.

- [Leo] And that's why I went to prison.

- Again how much time were you incarcerated for?

- [Leo] Three years.

- Okay. And did you plead guilty?

- [Leo] Yes.

- Okay. Is that the facts of the case?

- Oh yeah according to the complaint he bathed the child three years ago. Videoed the bathing of the child but also the video showed him touching her in the vagina area. Seemed to focus on the buttocks and the genital area of the child.

- Okay. Is that your recollection as well, or not?

- [Leo] I don't exactly recollect where I was aiming the camera, I do remember doing that though.

- Okay. Alright, does anybody else have any more questions regarding the crime?

- You remember touching her? What do you remember doing?

- [Leo] I remember helping her clean up cause she wasn't doing it correctly.
- Okay.
- Okay and when were you released?
- [Leo] I was released July 17th of this year.
- Okay. Alright and you're currently in SOT training?
- [Leo] I was but then I had my hours changed at work and I was told I could get put into the PM classes, so I'm on the waiting list for that.
- Okay so how many sessions did you attend prior to having to move to the new time setting.
- [Leo] A little over a month, so like five, around there.
- Okay. Can you tell me what you learned during those five sessions?
- [Leo] Well yeah of course I learned accountability for your actions and you gotta learn to stay out of mind traps and cycles that'll get you doing what you are not supposed to be doing. And it's pretty much been just that, like staying away from dangerous thinking and learning to make better choices and keeping yourself busy.
- Alright. Who you gonna be living with?
- [Leo] My mother.
- Okay. You currently have, what job do currently have right now?
- [Leo] I was just at American Foods.
- Okay what happened there, you're not there anymore?
- [Leo] Yeah no, they have a point system. So if you miss so many times, or you're late, they fire you and I had stomach flu. So they had to let me go and I couldn't work so.
- Okay how long did you work there?
- [Leo] I worked there for about a month and a half.
- Okay.
- And when did this happen? That you were let go?
- [Leo] Two days ago.
- How many days were you off with the stomach flu?
- [Leo] Three. Well I called in late one day and then I went in, realized that was a terrible idea, called in the next two days and still didn't have points.
- Okay. Any other questions for him? Any statements for us? Did you have a question?

- Yup, so where are you working now?

- [Leo] Right now I am unemployed but I am going to go to a temporary agency and get into the next job as fast as I can.

- Okay. Does anybody wanna speak in your behalf that's here?

- [Leo] Yeah.

- {Amanda} I do.

- Come on up ma'am. Did you register prior to or not?

- [Leo] This? Yup, she did? Okay, you have it?

- [Leo] I forgot to hand it to her I wasn't sure what to do.

- What's your name?

- [Amanda] Amanda Sanchez.

- Okay go ahead.

- [Amanda] I felt of course this whole charge is absurd but my brother, I think very highly of him. He's my younger brother, I myself am a young mom, I have two children, one of my children is 17. And growing up I've watched all of the kids as my own and never questioned my kids around him. Never, when he was charged with this, my oldest I had explained to her and asked her questions if she ever felt comfortable, what not. And she thought it was absurd that I was even asking her this and I said yes but--

- Right.

- [Amanda] I wanna know. And I'm biased 'cause I'm his sister but I know that the charge and the case are very severe. I understand they're in place for reasons but he's been out since July. He's, this is his second job, his first job he was at probably like three months. And I've seen him constantly continuing on even with the luck that he's had with the whole situation. And I think that he's very young, he has his whole life ahead of him and I want him to have a bright future. And I know he was at the wrong place, wrong people, wrong time, and contents taken out of, her thing, out of proportion. But I don't know exactly, is this just for his address?

- This just for the address we're talking about. So I guess the question is, in terms of where he's gonna be living, what's the whole life gonna be like with him living with his mother?

- [Amanda] I think that would be very helpful because right now he doesn't have a car. The last three months he saved, got a car, car didn't, it's not drivable. So he knows the first day he got it registered so now the last month he's been working and now saving money for the same thing. He's been catching rides, skating, walking, whatever he can, winter is coming around the corner. But I think my mom would be able to help him as well as getting back and forth, keep an eye on him, make sure he stay on task that would be positive. I think that having the family support he's missed three years of life, not life but, outside, and I don't think there's any concern with him. They've checked with the apartment manager, there's no kids in the area. I feel like he's--

- So does his brother support him? The brother that--

- [Amanda] My brother, our brother?

- Yes.

- [Amanda] We stopped talking to him because of the situation, he's a meth addict, him and his wife are split up. And they would find babysitters on craigslist. My mom let them move in with her at the time of the situation because they lived in Utah, then they lived in Idaho, they came back. He left initially 'cause he used to steal from my mom. For drug money. My mom said fine, come back you and your wife, your kids, stay with me but you have two months to get your shit, you stuff together and you know get a place. Well during that time they were spending their money drinking, partying, always needing sitters. I didn't wanna intervene I always said I was busy because I didn't care for their lifestyle and the wife, we just met her at that time.

- So as of right now he still, he doesn't have any relationship with his brother?

- [Amanda] Him?

- Yes.

- [Amanda] No, not that I know of.

- Alright.

- [Amanda] I don't either.

- Okay, alright. That's what I needed to know, thank you.

- [Amanda] You're welcome.

- Anybody else that may have questions for her?

- I do not.

- Alright is there anybody else that wants to speak either for or against him? Okay. Anything you'd like to tell us before we ask for a motion?

- [Leo] Yeah, while I was incarcerated I kept myself very busy and proactive. I, as soon as I got to the prison I was gonna be at for my main time, I immediately filed to get put into any program and any treatments I did need. And then I also filed for college courses and a job. And I got all of those things except my treatment was wait-listed because it was full, and I had to wait to get into it. So while I was on the wait-list I completed customer service and customer service management through Microsoft Office and I got that certificate with presidential honors. I was a tutor the whole time I was there, I also was part of the grounds crew. I did pretty much everything there was to do at that institution. I filed to leave, to go to another institution to pursue more education, but that was denied because I was too young to move to another institution. So I kinda got stonewalled there in terms of my goals and what I could accomplish. But now that I'm out I have plenty of goals and plenty of things I would like to accomplish. One of which is securing my own place to live that's stable and then getting a vehicle and then saving up money because I do want to go back to school and I would like to do that as soon as possible.

- Okay, alright does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to Mr. Leo Sanchez-Basulto? Anybody wanna make a motion? I'm gonna make a motion in regards to Mr. Basulto to move to 154 Berger Street, for a period of 90 days, at which time he has to come back and let us know that he's back in the treatment program, and understand where he's at with that.

- I'll second that motion.

- Alright we do have a second, so let's go ahead and vote on that particular motion to approve you for 90 days pending your return, at which time you'd have to present that you're actually back in the class.

- [Leo] Sure.

- Motion passes four to one.

- Okay, sir you've been approved to move to 154 Berger Street for a period of 90 days. We will send that notification there, also along with the next, after 90 days you have to come back to us. You're gonna have to prove that you're back into a treatment program and that I would also bring any documentation that you have that you're either back in school too or you got a new job or whatever it'd be to help support where you're at. Okay?

- [Leo] Alright, I appreciate your time.

- Thank you.

- [Leo] Thank you.

- [Amanda] Thank you.

- Next up is Mr. Payton Stewart. Mr. Stewart have a seat. Okay Mr. Stewart, you're looking to move to your 2713 Humboldt Road?

- [Payton] Yeah.

- Okay and you're currently homeless?

- [Payton] Yes. Well that's 2713 Humboldt Road, number five.

- Yup, that's what we have here, yup. Okay again we're gonna talk about your crimes, just make sure you refer to the person as the victim and then in addition to that if we wanna talk about any of your treatment programs, you can either do that in either public or private session, which do you prefer?

- [Payton] Public.

- Okay, alright great. Alright so why don't you tell us what happened in 2015 with your victim?

- [Payton] Well I had many victims because I was just downloading hundreds of files at a time.

- Child pornography?

- [Payton] Yeah, it was intermittently, sometimes I would go two or three months without looking at it, sometimes I'd look at it twice a week. And the program I used automatically uploaded it so the sheriff's department downloaded it and then they got a warrant to find out what IP address this belongs to, and then they arrested me. But I would download child porn and then masturbate and then feel really guilty and ashamed and I'd delete it all.

- Okay. So how long were you doing this before you got arrested?

- [Payton] Since I was like 14.
- How old are you right now?
- [Payton] 24.
- Okay. How did, and from a standpoint, who are you planning to live with again?
- [Payton] My Father.
- Okay.
- And was this child pornography all ages?
- [Payton] Yeah it was of all ages except I deleted the younger stuff right away.
- But anything from two or three year olds?
- [Payton] Anything from like 10 and up.
- Okay. Alright in regards to your treatment programs it looks like you took SOT training, is that correct?
- [Payton] Yes.
- Alright why don't you tell us what you learned through SOT training.
- [Payton] Well I learned the difference between being passive, assertive, and aggressive, and how to be assertive, you know? I also learned coping mechanisms and what triggers my urge to look at porn, pretty much.
- Okay. So how long were you in the program?
- [Payton] I was in SO2 for 11 months and I was in SO1 for like four or five months.
- Okay. And when did you complete the program, I'm thinkin' in this year, of 17th?
- [Payton] Hmm?
- When did you complete the last program? Just this year, correct?
- [Payton] Yeah.
- Okay.
- [Payton] I completed SO2 in prison and I complete SO1 when I got out.
- Okay and are you currently employed sir?
- [Payton] No, I'm disabled.
- Okay what's your disability, if I may ask?

- [Payton] Paranoid schizophrenia, OCD, Depression, Anxiety, kinda that.
- Okay are you on any medications for those?
- [Payton] Yes.
- Okay. Do you believe that if you weren't taking your medication, that you'd repeat this offense?
- [Payton] No, I'm gonna tell you this, I still have nightmares about looking at child porn. It terrifies me in my sleep, I don't know.
- So you think regardless of if you didn't stay on your medication that you wouldn't be lookin' at this stuff?
- [Payton] Right.
- Why do you think you're afraid of it now?
- [Payton] Because I had a really bad experience when I got arrested and I never want to go through that again.
- Okay. Anybody have any more questions for him in regards to the offense or his treatment programs?
- I do. In your relapse papers you had to list five people that you could talk to, did you talk to any of them? You say you could talk to them about, there's nothing you couldn't talk to them about, and you could talk to them about everything. So did you ever talk to 'em about your downloading of child porn, or anything like that?
- [Payton] I'd speak to some of 'em about that. Not everyone on the five people I listed but I'm sure I know my mom has read the thing, the discovery so she knows about it. My friend Tyler knows about it. My friend Krysta knows about it. I probably should let everybody know the whole truth though.
- Like I said I was thinking back at the time when it was going on.
- [Payton] Oh, I was completely isolated from the entire world during that time. Because I, well I didn't know I was schizophrenic so, but I'd go outside and I'd have a panic attack and paranoid thoughts, and then I'd have to come back inside. So, and then, I really didn't talk to anybody during that time.
- Okay I'd read in the report too that you thought of killing people and eating them. Was this happening during this time? Or when was that going on?
- [Payton] Oh that was going on in prison when I was on a bunch, a bunch of meds. I was taking 21 pills a day.
- In prison?
- [Payton] In prison, yeah. So my thoughts weren't entirely rational.
- And how long have you been discharged?
- [Payton] What do you mean?
- From prison, how long have you been out?

- [Payton] I've been out since January 16th.
- So eight, nine months here.
- [Payton] Yeah.
- And where you been living gernerally?
- [Payton] I've been couch-hopping between my friend's ex, my friend Joe's, and my uncle, my uncle's place.
- So if you're gonna live with your father why didn't you, I guess, why didn't this occur earlier? In terms of having this opportunity to live with your father.
- [Payton] My father doesn't have, we just found a place that would let me live there.
- Okay. So the place he was living before wouldn't allow you to live--
- [Payton] Right.
- Okay, alright. Okay doesn't anybody else have any more questions for him?
- What kind of stuff do you do throughout the day?
- [Payton] I read, non-fiction, and I take notes, sometimes I'll watch like a DVD, I talk to my friends a lot, I'm always talking to my friends now. Because like I realized that the most important thing in life is like friends, family, and happiness. You know? So I try and talk to them, all my friends.
- Like several times throughout the day? Several times a week?
- [Payton] I called like three different friends a day. Just to chit chat.
- Okay.
- Alright. Anymore questions for him? Does anybody want to speak either for or against him? Sir why don't you come on up. What's your name sir?
- [Roy] Name is Roy DeRuyter.
- Okay go ahead sir.
- [Roy] And I'm a circles of support volunteer and he's a participant.
- Okay.
- [Roy] And he comes and he participates he's not there all the time, but he's there quite a bit of the time. He's a very determined young man, that's what I get from him. Keeps goin' with his challenges and stuff like that.
- What does he do at circle support for ya?
- [Roy] Well it's a sharing group we come in and talk about your weekend and try and help 'em with, achieve

their goals. And a lot of it actually comes from the other participants, helping out, but you know we help him.

- And what do you think his goals are?

- [Roy] Well he wanted to have a job before he had disability, and he still wants to do some work if he can find somethin' that's gonna fit in with his disability. So, but that hasn't worked out for him.

- Okay, why do you think he's a good risk to live within the city of Green Bay.

- [Roy] 'Cause he, like I said, I think he's determined not to make those mistakes again. I just see a determination with him. He talks about his medications and everything, and there was times where they were changin' his medications and things were difficult for him. And he'd come and express that and how he wanted to, he didn't feel comfortable with what the doctor was doing but this was happening, that was happening, and he was working through it, you know. We kinda counseled him a little bit, as much as we can as volunteers. And he's got himself, I don't know, he must feel comfortable where you're at right now with your meds, you know. So, yeah you know, it's just where I'm sittin'.

- Do you think that him living with his father, and you met his father?

- [Roy] No I haven't met his father.

- Okay. So you don't know if this is going to be a good thing for him or a bad thing for him?

- [Roy] No.

- Okay. Does anybody else have any more questions for him? Alright thank much for your time.

- [Roy] Welcome.

- Alright does anybody have any more questions for him? Is there anything before we ask for a recommendation?

- [Payton] Hmm?

- Would you like to say anything more before I ask for a vote?

- [Payton] Oh yeah. Something.

- You don't have to feel that you need to, force you to.

- [Payton] I can't think of anything off the top of my head right now.

- Okay. Alright does anybody wanna make a motion?

- I'm gonna make a motion to deny to 2713 Humboldt Road, apartment five.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- Okay all in favor of that motion let's go ahead and vote.

- Motion to deny fails three to two.

- Okay so the motion failed in terms of denying you that particular location. I would like to make a motion to approve you to 2713 Humboldt Road, for a period of 60 days, at which time I would like to also hear back from circles of support in regards to your personal situation with your father, and I'd like your father here too. What I wanna determine ultimately is, is this a good place for you to be and try to understand that. I also from my particular standpoint if there's any information relating to your health as regards to the medications and issues whether you stay on them longterm, or off. That would be important for me to understand again. So again my motion is to approve 2713 Humboldt Road, Apartment five, address specific for a period of 60 days. Is there a second?

- I'll second that motion.

- Payton what's your father doin' these days?

- [Payton] He is working maintenance.

- Where at, do you know?

- [Payton] I don't.

- Alright let's go ahead and vote.

- Motion to approve passes three to two.

- Okay you've been approved to move to 2713 Humboldt Avenue, apartment five, address specific it will be sent there. Our meeting within 60 days which will January 9th you gotta come back, if you don't show up, you'll automatically be booted out, okay?

- [Payton] Alright, I have to bring my father?

- Yup and as much information you can in regards to your current health situation, okay?

- [Payton] Alright.

- Alright thank you. You have questions?

- [Payton] I was gonna, I wanna write it down, but.

- You'll be sent a letter to that location.

- [Payton] Oh yeah, okay.

- Okay. Next up is Mr. White. Alright Mr. White, we're here to hear your appeal to move to it doesn't say.

- [Nathania] 1620 Forest Glen Drive.

- Well that's the address you're living at is where you, okay, he's there already.

- Okay so you want 1620 okay, Forest Glen Drive, correct?

- [Nathania] Right.

- Okay. How long have you lived there sir?

- [Nathania] Since June.

- [Faye] June 20th.

- Okay you know you're in violation of the ordinance at this point.

- [Faye] We understand that. So I am his legal guardian, he is in protective placement, that address is a group home, run by Guardian Hearts. So he was deemed incompetent to manage his affairs and placed in protective placement in that group home, in June. So before he was assigned a probation officer in Green Bay just recently. And so when he met with the probation officer that's what were instructed to do, is then file for permission for him to remain in that group home.

- Okay, alright, thank you for the background on that. Okay so again, what we're lookin' to do is talk about your sexual offense back in 2015. Again if you refer to the person as the victim, if we talk about it, okay? And just don't refer to them by their personal name or it was it was my sister's kid or anything like, just refer to them as the victim. Second thing is if we do wanna talk about your treatment programs, you have the right to do that either in public session or in private session, which would you prefer?

- [Faye] Private.

- Private, okay. So let's get started here, first of all, can you tell us a little about the offenses that you committed against the kids? Can you tell us what happened on the first one back in November of 2015? Can you tell me what happened?

- [Nathania] I had sex with a underage person while I was underage, 17 years old, and I've gotten pictures of her private parts.

- Okay, so you were 17 and she was 15? Or 12 years old, looks like 12. Did you know the victim prior to this?

- [Nathania] Yes.

- Okay. How did it come about that she alerted the authorities, do you know?

- [Nathania] Her mom did.

- Her mom did, okay. So can you tell me why you did what you did?

- [Nathania] Honestly I don't know why I did, I found out I was a sex addict, so that might have been the reason I did it. 'Cause I was lookin' for sex anywhere.

- Okay.

- Was she your only victim?

- [Nathania] Yes.

- But it happened multiple times?

- [Nathania] Once, well I.

- Go ahead.

- [Faye] So he was charged in tribal court and then there were charges dropped in tribal court. So he was charged and convicted in tribal court for having had intercourse with her on tribal land. He did a year in jail for that. And then those charges that were dropped, that were the images on the phones, because they both sent pictures back and forth to each other, were picked up by Shawano County. And those are what was lead out just recently and so that is why we find ourselves before a Green Bay probation officer because he is a resident of Green Bay because he's in a group home in Green Bay.

- Okay so the different offense--

- [Faye] It was the same girl.

- Oh so all these offenses here listed for basically there was three different offenses listed here. Exposing genitals, this was all to the same victim?

- [Faye] Same girl.

- Okay is that how you see it officer?

- Yeah that's what I haven't answered.

- Okay does it say in the course record if he did this only at one time, all these things? Or was the course over multiple times?

- You know based on what I have, which is a complaint that's from Shawno County, it was a one time offense.

- Okay, alright thank you. So I guess the next question generally I have, is why is he deemed incompetent?

- I think that needs that to go one private.

- Oh it needs to go private section in terms of medical? Okay, alright. Does anybody have any more questions related to his crime? Okay, alright pursuant to Wisconsin's code we are gonna move into a private session. So I need a motion to move into private session.

- I'll make that motion.

- Okay we have a first and a second. All in favor? [Board] Aye. Hang on a quick second folks, we just have to take a quick quote for this.

- Okay back in public session.

- If you wanna, officer can you? Oh she's got it, okay.

- You can prop the door open. Can you prop the door open?

- Are you a family member?

- [Faye] I'm his granny.

- Okay we're back in public session, we did have a chance to speak with Mr. White in regards to his treatment

programs and his current situation. The board asked several questions relating to that and got more background as it relates to it. Is there any other questions that you have for him in regards to his current status? Anybody? Okay, does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to Mr. White?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. White to 1620 Forest Glen Drive.

- I wanna second that.

- Okay, before we vote on that, I'm against this, in just the way you had the motion. I'm okay with him living at 1620 Forest Glen so long as his current care situation is in place. In other words, so in other words, if his protective custody would end, then I'm not okay with it. In other words then he'd have to come in front of us again. So I just wanna just let you know, I'm gonna vote no for this because I think that's very important.

- I don't think that this is the type of facility that he could live in if he wasn't in protective custody.

- Well he's in protective placement, that gets renewed every year. You have to go in front of the court system.

- Correct.

- And that's, I don't know if you need a paper sent to you guys yearly?

- Nope. No, no, no, no. So my point is, in regards to this particular motion--

- Sure.

- So she, and her question is, if he wasn't under protective custody could he still live at this group home?

- Yeah I have clients are not in protective place, we prefer 'em protective place, because they come back, they will come back to our facility if they were in elopement risk. That's pretty much what a protective placement is. Correct me if I'm wrong, if they take off they just come back, that's part of it. But there's a greater dynamics of it. But like I said I'm not an attorney or nothin' like that but Patty could probably explain that more.

- Well I guess maybe can you explain it so that if I have to address my motion.

- The protective placement basically says that the court has, when he was deemed incompetent, and a guardian was assigned also said that he needed to be protectively placed outside of the home. So at this point until the court would change that he is protectively placed. What happens is that every year there's what's called a Watts review and that Watts review basically would say, oh he's not in need of protective placement, he can be returned home. That would be, and he would be taken out of the group home at that point.

- When does that end? What is that one date?

- It's June 19th that he was, the guardianship and protective placement went into effect. The protective placement doesn't ever end, it's just a Watts, it's not renewed every year. It's a Watts review, which basically says we will continue with this or he's going home. Or he no longer needs protective placement. So I don't want to confuse you by saying every year he's again protectively placed. He is protectively placed for the entirety, at this point, it's just that the protective placement has to be reviewed by the court every year. To say that this protective placement is this working, we have to tell the court what's happening. But the protective placement really isn't a year by year thing, does that make sense? Am I being clear, or not?

- Yeah and no. Well just because I like to then say once that review happens, but I'll never know when that review happens.

- Every year it has to happen by--

- Every 12 months basically.

- Every 12 months, probably in the month of June. I can't say for sure by the 19th, but I would say that every year there's a Watts review. Basically the protective placement will continue until there would be an order from the court saying that he needs to be placed, that he no longer needs to be protectively placed.

- Yeah, okay.

- So the protective placement's in placement much longer than a Watts review. If the Watts review--

- It says it doesn't need to be in a group home he's protected but he can do it at home.

- Right. So I guess what I'm saying is, he's still under guard, he's under permanent guardianship, he's under permanent protective placement. The Watts review is just a check letting the court know where does he stand with this placement because of course least restrictive, if somebody no longer needs to be in placement, you wanna send them home. So it would be going down, not--

- So I guess how I kinda look at it is your--

- I gotta reword it.

- I think.

- You think?

- I think So do we need to withdraw it, or we need to vote?

- Cause there was a second.

- Oh was there?

- Yup.

- Oh.

- Yeah I think we need to vote.

- Okay so go ahead and let's vote, okay. And then we'll come back with probably another motion. So right now the motion is to approve him.

- That vote passes three to two.

- I don't think you people understand the voting process.

- So alright well, you are approved to 1620 Forest Glen Drive, okay? Address specific, if you do move from this location then you would have to come in front of the board again.

- [Nathanial] Okay.
- Okay that's it, thank you.
- [Nathanial] Thank you.
- Okay going forward with that length because there's been several confusing votes tonight, there's some misunderstanding in regards to what we're actually voting on, and what a yes means and what a no means.
- Okay.
- So what I'd like for the rest of this meeting, for sure, and the next one, is that before we vote you say, I'd like you to repeat what the motion is and what a yes vote means and what no vote means.
- Fair enough.
- Alright? Great. Next up is Mr. Nathan Shei.
- [Nathan] Hello.
- Hello.
- How are you?
- [Nathan] I'm good, how are you?
- Good.
- Alright. So you're currently at 2670 University Avenue?
- [Nathan] Correct.
- And you wanna move to 1115 Cherry Street, right?
- [Nathan] Correct.
- Okay, why do you wanna move?
- [Nathan] The 2670 is a halfway house.
- Okay.
- [Nathan] So I'm in, I get discharged from that the 27th of this month. And then I will have basically nowhere to live. So I found a landlord after about two months of searching that was willing to rent to me, knowing my offenses, and that's the main reason I wanna live there. That and it's close to where I can still get to work.
- Okay and where are you workin' at?
- [Nathan] I work at New Tech Metals in New Franken.
- Alright. It's kinda slow.

- Can we talk about his offense when you're waiting?

- Yeah sure, why don't we start with your offense, again just make sure your refer to the person as the victim and don't refer to them by, as my brother's daughter, or anything like that. So why don't you tell us a little bit about your offense?

- [Nathan] The current offense I'm on, right now?

- No the sexual offense.

- [Nathan] Yeah, I have two. So you want me to start with the current one?

- Most current one, yes please.

- The current one I'm on now I was contacted by a girl, I believe it was on Myspace. Sent me a friend request, probably typed some kind of message, hi how are you, or whatever, I accepted. On the profile it said the girl was 18 years old. We chatted online for, I don't know, multiple times for weeks. At some point she told me she was not 18, she told me that she was 17, but she turns 18 in a few months. I didn't really think a whole lot about that. We continued to chat, I don't really know the timeframes, I know it was, we probably chatted for three months total. But over the course of the three months every so often she'd tell me she's not really that age, that she's a year younger. And that went on a couple times until she told me she was 15 about to turn 16.

- At that time did you already have intercourse with her?

- [Nathan] No. No we were just talking.

- Alright.

- [Nathan] She had said that she had moved from Florida and that she was new in the area and she didn't have any friends. And she was like freshman, sophomore in high school I think. Ironically I was in a similar situation, I had moved from somewhere up to Michigan, when I was freshman in high school and I kinda, I felt a little sorry for her 'cause I remember going through that when I was that age. And not having any friends at a new school. So eventually, go ahead.

- No I was gonna say, so what was the, did you eventually have intercourse with her?

- [Nathan] No it was actually an undercover police officer.

- Okay so you went to meet her.

- [Nathan] I went to go, yeah, she asked me to meet her and I went to go meet her.

- Okay.

- [Nathan] And that's--

- And you were ballpark 33 at the time?

- [Nathan] 32 yeah.

- Alright is that?

- On the Michigan offense I have very little but what he's saying answers the little I have.
- Why did they charge you federally?
- [Nathan] Because it was a computer, it was interstate.
- Across state lines.
- [Nathan] Interstate thing with a computer.
- 'Cause where was the girl? Where were you supposed to meet?
- [Nathan] She was in Lewashawanco.
- Okay.
- Yeah across state lines.
- Okay how about the case in 2000?
- [Nathan] The case in 2000. It was a long time ago so I'm gonna do my best.
- Okay kinda confused with, isn't that what we were just talking about?
- Nope.
- No that was the 2010.
- [Nathan] That was 2010.
- Go ahead.
- [Nathan] It was like March, 2000, I had been at a friend's house drinking, you know drugs, LSD, cocaine, alcohol. Anyway it got to be I think about three in the morning and he wanted to have some alone time with his girlfriend. So I left, went back to the place I was staying, in an apartment building and I tried to go to sleep but if you know anything about drugs, LSD, cocaine, not so much with sleep. So I laid there for a while and I decided to get up and take a walk. And I went outside, I walked around the neighborhood, and when I came back to the apartment building I got the idea to start checking doors, to see if any were unlocked. And mainly my purpose in that was to find stuff to steal.
- Okay.
- [Nathan] I found an apartment that was unlocked that actually was right down the hall from where I was staying. And I had seen the girl that lived there. So I closed the door and I went back to where I was staying and decided that I was gonna go and rape this girl. I don't really know what I was thinkin' at the time but I got everything ready, grabbed some duct tape, a knife in case I needed it, and I went back to the apartment. I opened the door, I got maybe a few steps in the door, and I was confronted by her. I think she asked me what I was doing in there. I took a step towards her and she ran for the bedroom. She ran, I chased her. Forced the bedroom door open. I pushed her on the bed, I sat on her I think stomach, and like restrained her and she was screaming so I put my hand over her mouth. And at that point, normally what I tell people, is at the point she made had made so much noise that I was afraid and I got up and ran. But the real truth is, even though she didn't really have much clothing on, I realized that none of that was, anything that was happening, was sexually

arousing to me at all. Like I just, I don't know I--

- So did you leave?

- [Nathan] Yeah I immediately just got up and ran out of the apartment. I'd had like fantasies about that kinda thing, like growing up I think I saw something on TV once, or something, and kinda I had that fantasy and I tried to act it out that night. And in the midst of it realized that that's just not something that I'm capable of doing. Anyway I ran out of the apartment and was later picked up by the police.

- Okay. Any more questions on his assault? Okay one of the things I didn't ask you is that if we do wanna talk about your, any treatment programs, you have the right to it in public or private session.

- [Nathan] Public's fine.

- Looks like you had outpatient sex offender treatment. Is that correct?

- [Nathan] Correct.

- Okay did you complete it?

- [Nathan] Yes.

- Alright. When did you complete it again, to back up your certificate?

- [Nathan] It would have been 20, like 2007.

- Okay. Alright. How long have you been working at your current job?

- [Nathan] A little over three months.

- And what do you do for 'em?

- [Nathan] I'm a welder.

- Okay. Anybody have any questions in regards to his treatment programs?

- I do.

- Okay I'm gonna just be real honest with you. Tell me why we should let you live in the city of Green Bay? I kinda need to kinda hear it from you. You were very honest in regards to your crime and how violent the first one was. So I'm, granted they were 10 years apart, these things, but it doesn't give me a great feeling that you repeated it, in essence by, going online and potentially having sex with a 15 year old. So tell me what you've learned in your treatment program and tell why we should give you an opportunity to live in Green Bay, versus livin' in New Franken.

- [Nathan] Well let me start with saying that, I mean Green Bay is like the greatest city, right? Home of the Packers. But aside from that, my probation is set up here, my treatment is gonna be set up here. I've looked everywhere outside of Green Bay, to try to find housing in the area and I looked for two months. There's really, just isn't anything. I feel like I can be an asset to the community. I'd be willing to do anything that I can to prove that.

- Well what are you doin' right now? Obviously you got a job, what are you, it looks like you're gonna be,

gonna live alone. As I look at your, let's just get back down here, looks like you have some family within town. Is that correct?

- [Nathan] They actually live in De Pere.

- Okay well, De Pere, okay. So it looks like you got some support here. Well what do you think you can do within the community to make it better?

- [Nathan] I can start volunteering.

- Okay.

- [Nathan] I just recently started going to church and I wanna get more involved in that but I think volunteering would be a good thing for me too.

- Okay.

- What kind of volunteering?

- [Nathan] Anything that I can actually do being a sex offender, I guess would be the criteria.

- So what shift do you work on at the metal company?

- [Nathan] First shift.

- So like seven to three or six to?

- [Nathan] Six AM to working 'til 4:30 right now.

- Okay, alright.

- When did you actually get out of prison?

- [Nathan] July 10th.

- Of this year? And then you went straight to the halfway house?

- [Nathan] Yes.

- Okay.

- Alright anybody have anymore questions for him? Anybody wanna speak either for or against this gentleman? Come on up please.

- [Sueanne] So there's not a paper up there for me to fill out but my name is Sueanne and I'm the federal case manager at Marshall House which is at a correctional service.

- Okay.

- Sueanne, what's your last name?

- [Sueanne] Skinkias, s-k-i-n-k-i-a-s.

- Thank you.

- Okay, go ahead.

- [Sueanne] So Nathan is currently a BOP inmate until his release date on 11/27. So for him to leave the halfway house before then he would have to meet all the requirements for home confinement, which we found that he has. He has done very well at New Tech Metals. He was originally a temp through Seek and has now been hired on. I have many conversations with New Tech Metals, monthly, sometimes weekly, depending on what his schedule is. He always doing exactly what they want. He's working overtime, right now they're in 10 hour shifts, and sometimes that includes weekends. He's had no major incident reports while he's been at the facility. Part of being ready for home confinement is budgeting, saving money, and he's done that. He has also bought a car, he's been, so you have to meet the requirements to do each thing. So he did everything he needed to do to have a vehicle, so now he has that. He has completed transitional skills, it's a nine week required program through the BOP. So as far as me looking at what he's done, he's ready for home confinement, which would be him living in the community and not the halfway house.

- Okay. Alright, anybody else have any more questions for her? Alright thanks. I have one more question, go ahead.

- Well other people will need to talk.

- Oh I'm sure, okay. Who else would like to speak, either for or against him? Sir come on up.

- I'm sorry.

- No that's fine I didn't see him.

- [Robert] I'm Robert Herman, I'm with the Federal Probation Office here in Green Bay.

- Okay go ahead sir.

- [Robert] Did you guys get my letter I can post to?

- Yes it's in the, yup.

- [Robert] So, yeah, I mean essentially everything that I know about Nate I kinda summarize it in there. But I guess long story short I think there's a lot in place that we can do to mitigate his risk to the community. He's actually got a GPS bracelet on as we speak. He was deemed an SPN case, so he's gonna be lifetime registrant for that. He'll have computer and internet monitoring while he's on supervision with us. He's gonna be on paper with us for 20 years. As he noted he's working, so that's great. He's going to be in monthly sex offender health treatment here in Green Bay. He's subjected to yearly polygraphs. So I think there's a lot of things that we can do to mitigate him, of course, re-offending.

- Okay, thank you very much, we appreciate it.

- I have a question. Has he taken a polygraph test already?

- [Robert] No so he comes on paper with us officially the 27th--

- Oh after, okay.

- [Robert] So once we get him signed up that'll be one of the first things that we do.

- Okay.

- Your letter says that the residence, the proposed residence, does not appear to be close to parks, schools, or daycares. It actually is, it's three blocks from East High School, are you aware of that?

- [Robert] So I spoke with his landlord, or his proposed landlord, and I believe that's past the 1,500 foot rule, so we were comfortable with that. There wasn't any families or minor children residing in this complex, so that was also something that we could consider as well. So I guess that's another, I think, positive attribute for Nate. Is he's got a willing landlord, which I think is a huge hurdle for a lot of our folks, that are trying to obtain housing here, so.

- Okay. Thank you. One other question I have is, you completed your SOT training in 2007 you said?

- [Nathan] Yes.

- But your last offense was in 2010, right?

- [Nathan] Yes. I took some more treatment in the BOP as well.

- So my question relates to, okay, you completed the treatment in 2007 but you still went ahead and went to potentially re-offend.

- [Robert] Correct.

- Even though you went through the process of looking at the issues that gotcha there in the first time. So what drove you to throw that out the window?

- [Nathan] There was several things, but I think the biggest one was I was focused on not like forcing myself sexually on somebody. And at the time, in my eyes, also I was using marijuana too, when I was on this one, and that does cloud my judgment, which I am aware of, obviously I won't be able to do that probably ever again. When I have probably weekly UAs for the next 20 years. But at the time I was thinking that if the person was willing then it wasn't really a sex offense. Does that make any sense?

- I mean no, but yes I understand.

- [Nathan] I mean I was focused on not going out and forcing myself on somebody and I kinda let that one slide in the backdoor. And it wasn't really, my focus wasn't on that.

- Mm-hmm.

- [Nathan] So, I mean I guess, that's probably my, gonna be my answer on that. Like I wasn't really trying to harm anybody.

- Right, okay.

- [Nathan] But now I realize the potential was there to harm somebody.

- Mm-hmm, okay. Anybody else have any more questions for him? Anybody wanna make a motion? Just some general thoughts here, I'm kinda torn here, between I don't really trust you sir, I'm gonna be honest with you, okay? The question I'm debating in my mind, is the way your probation works, is that good enough of a

comfort in my mind that you're not gonna have that potential to re-offend.

- [Nathan] Can I say somethin'?

- No let me finish, let me finish. So I, and the reason is, because you had that opportunity to have sexual offender treatment and it tells me that you felt, okay this person was a willing participant, regardless of their age, so if they were 10 years old was that willing participant? It means they wanna have sex with you. I mean where do you draw the line, okay? So I'm not sure you're there in regards to where you need to be mentally, to not have this again. So that's where I'm kinda sitting at this particular time, so I'm kinda weighing the safeguards that the federal government's putting in place for you, the fact that you do have a job, versus the fact that I'm not comfortable with where you are at, right now. So I don't know what everybody else's thoughts are.

- [Nathan] Can I add one thing?

- Go ahead.

- [Nathan] I just wanna say that when I was on a state probation, or parole actually it was, I did two years, never had any incidences, never a single writeup, nothing. I do very well under supervision. I did eight and a half years in the BOP, never had one writeup. I did take some more sex offender treatment while I was in the BOP and I've learned some more things about myself that I didn't know back then.

- Right.

- [Nathan] I'm 10 years older now, I'm a little bit wiser. I know that when I get to a place, where I'm depressed, where I'm feeling hopeless, that's a big trigger for me. That's where I was when I committed this recent offense.

- Mm-hmm.

- [Nathan] I lost my job, the recession of 08, my marriage was falling apart, things were in a bad place for me. I was using a lot of drugs, not saying that any of that is an excuse, but just kinda giving you where my mental state was at the time.

- Okay.

- [Nathan] I also found out that when I was in the BOP that, my thyroid is off, and I found out that that can cause depression. I started meds in the BOP, since I've been on the meds I haven't been in that deep dark low that I would get in sometimes.

- Mm-hmm.

- [Nathan] I try to have more of a positive attitude, I try to think positive, I try to use my tools from treatment which is mostly just that, if I have thoughts that are negative to put that in my mind and try to think different thoughts.

- Okay. Alright does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to him?

- I wanna make a motion to approve Mr. Shei to 1115 Cherry Street for, 120 days and just to report back on how things are going.

- Okay. Address specific?

- Yes 1115 Cherry Street.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Any comments? Okay let's vote.
- Alright so this is a vote to approve Mr. Shei. Approve vote supports him living at that address for 120 days. Motion passes three to two.
- Okay so you've been approved to move to 1115 Cherry Street, address specific. You will have to come in front of us again within 120 days to see how you're doing. I'd also make sure, if you have any documentation when you go through your lie detector test, and so forth like that from the federal government, you bring that as well. Alright if you don't show up you'll automatically be deemed to not be able to live there anymore.
- [Nathan] Does the apartment number have to be on there too?
- There isn't one, so I guess anywhere within that building then.
- [Nathan] It'd be apartment 16 if that's where they're gonna send that.
- Okay apartment 16. Okay thank you very much.
- [Nathan] Alright thank you guys.
- Next Mr. Nicholas Godwod.
- [Chris] Sir is it okay if I come up as his attorney?
- Sure go ahead.
- [Chris] Attorney Chris Froelich.
- Okay Mr. Godwood, alright. I'm looking here where you wanna live. Oh it's same place?
- [Chris] Yeah he wants to continue living at his mom and dad's house.
- So that's 3483 Charlevoix? Okay and how long you been livin' there?
- [Nicholas] 20 years.
- No since your offense.
- [Nicholas] Oh a year and two months.
- Since you've been out?
- [Nicholas] Correct.
- Okay.

- [Nicholas] Spent two days in jail.
- Alright. So I'm assuming you had no clue that you were in violation of the ordinance by living there.
- [Nicholas] Correct. September 21st was the day--
- [Chris] That was the day of sentencing, before Judge Kelly.
- [Nicholas] And then I was recently put on probation the first or second week in October.
- Of this? So okay--
- [Nicholas] I was put on probation like a month and a half ago.
- Okay so this conviction date looks like it was July second?
- [Chris] That's the day that he entered a plea, correct. To the charge, to the two charges.
- Okay.
- [Chris] And then he was sentenced on September 21st, of this year.
- Alright. Okay, alright. So again before we start, again just wanna make sure that you just refer to the person as the victim and not by a particular name, even if you had it was my sister or it was my cousin, or anything like that. So why don't you tell us a little bit about your conviction and what happened.
- [Nicholas] So I was 17 dating a 16 year old in high school.
- Okay.
- [Nicholas] And we had a consensual relationship for five, six months I believe.
- And she was 16 at the time?
- [Nicholas] Correct and I was 17.
- Okay let's stop there for a second. So it's my understanding that the law indicates that if it's 16 year old or older that's not a child sexual offense. Am I wrong in that?
- A child under 18 cannot give consent.
- I thought it was under the age of 16 cannot give consent?
- No, no he's not charge with sexual assault.
- [Chris] Right he was convicted of capturing an image of nudity, a felony--
- [Nicholas] Under the age of 18. And then one count of possession of child pornography, it was a person under the age of 18, so two felonies.
- [Nicholas] Can I say one thing real quick?

- Go ahead.

- [Nicholas] This is, I'm not quite sure we're supposed to be here because in plea negotiations with the DA and the judges comments and everything, he didn't specifically say anything about registry. So we were kinda surprised when my PO said you had to register, so this kind of like a shock to us but--

- Okay.

- [Nicholas] We know we have to do this until--

- [Chris] Sex offender registry wasn't ordered but the judge, correct?

- Oh it was not?

- [Chris] It was not.

- [Nicholas] We're actually going in front of the Judge in January to see what he's gonna say, either yes or no, because it wasn't given at the time of sentencing.

- Okay.

- [Nicholas] If that makes sense.

- I thought we only hear cases that are 948s, which is one of them--

- Which is one of them.

- Possession of child pornography.

- Correct.

- Right. Yeah so that itself should put him on the registry.

- [Chris] Well that wasn't ordered by the judge.

- I understand that, I'm just writing from the law.

- [Chris] Right, I understand. I have a copy of the transcript if you--

- No, no that's fine.

- So you see anything that from your record standpoint that the judge didn't recognize this as a, well with the child pornography?

- Yeah I just printed off, you can see the sentencing talks about the jail time, and you know sentencing. There's times it would state nothing about registry.

- Okay.

- [Chris] He got 60 days jail, imposed in state on each count, to be used at the probation agent's discretion. So the agent has the power to put him in jail.

- Right, yup, okay. So I guess we're gonna continue, so go ahead and finish in regards to your relationship with this girl.

- [Nicholas] I was 17, she was 16, consensual relationship. We had sex quite a few times before this happened. And then when this happened she was laying on her stomach on the couch, we had naked, I took a picture from above her and showed her butt and her vagina.

- Okay.

- [Nicholas] And I believe there's a couple other pictures that were sent to her, or sorry, were sent to me from her. And I believe there were a couple other ones that were non-nude of her as well. And these were found on my laptop. I didn't acquire that laptop until the beginning of 2016, and all this happened in the middle of 2015, on an ipod touch at the time. I'm not quite sure how everything got on there but unfortunately I did what I did, kept the pictures which is unfortunate for me, and I'm paying for that now.

- How was it found out that they were on your computer?

- [Nicholas] So my brother's girlfriend at the time, this was summer beginning of summer 2017, was looking at my laptop. I believe it was her, brother, and a friend of ours we're kind of all using it and they saw some other things on there, some actual child pornography on there, and that's what got reported. And then during the investigation they found a couple pictures of her as well. And that's how that came about.

- [Chris] Okay just to add something real quick, if I may? He had a friend friend named Hunter Vandise who would come over and use the computer a lot, and then other people had access to the computer. And so the child pornography charges, there were six charges, those were dismissed and then amended to these two charges involving captured image of nudity and possession of child porn by a person under age 18. It related to the victim who was a former girlfriend.

- Okay.

- [Chris] So that's how that all came about.

- Alright. So it looks like again, one of the things we can talk about your treatment programs, either in public or private, which would you prefer?

- [Nicholas] Public's fine.

- So it looks like to me that you're signed up to get some sexual offender treatment. Is that correct?

- [Nicholas] Yeah I had a meeting with Rebecca Attic yesterday, and I saw her today to get a letter from her about future treatment.

- Sorry were you signed up, or?

- [Nicholas] She's putting together a recommendation to my PO and the court and I believe the next time I talk to my probation officer, which is next Wednesday, I believe she'll get that started there.

- Okay.

- [Chris] We also have, just a copy, you've authorized making it in writing.

- [Nicholas] Yup.

- [Chris] I call it a psycho-sexual evaluation, psychological evaluation, by Doctor Sherman, or Caplain excuse me, Doctor Caplain, Sherman consulting. And he provided some opinions that my client doesn't meet the criteria of a sex offender, so.

- [Nicholas] And that was back in September of 2017.

- Is that the one you sent us?

- Yes.

- Okay.

- Yup.

- You can have those back. So I'm just reading this case in regards to his make-up. Okay.

- I don't know what to do, we do have that one there.

- Oh you do have that one there? Okay, alright. Does anybody have any more questions for him in regards to his either treatment programs or the conviction?

- [Nicholas] And I did see--

- Hang on a second. I just wanna see if anybody else has anymore questions. Anybody? Okay go ahead.

- [Nicholas] I did see Caplain five or six times after that, just cause he was a really good therapist. I've seen four to five different therapists and he was the only one I really liked a lot, I haven't seen him in about five months 'cause he took a leave of absence, he's gone until the middle of October. And the middle of October is kinda when we found out that I had to register in this whole kerfuffle.

- Okay.

- [Chris] And he's been ordered to participate in SOT treatment, sex offender treatment with James Drake at family services and that process is under way. Hopefully he can get into the programming soon, but he needs the help of his agent, to get that started.

- Alright.

- [Chris] But he's open and amenable to any kind of treatment that comes his way.

- Okay.

- [Chris] And one other thing. He's lived basically at 3483 Charlevoix Court all his life, he lives with his mom and dad, he's not married, he has no kids. The mom and dad are here, they don't have any kids in the whole family, so there wouldn't be a concern about him having contact with children. Children don't live in the house, and children don't come to the house.

- Okay, do you have a job?

- [Nicholas] Yes.

- Where do you work?

- [Nicholas] I work at Nor Door Sports and Cyclery in Fish Creek Wisconsin. It's like an hour and 15 minute drive each way.

- Right.

- [Nicholas] And I've been there for four-ish years, I've was working summers, seasonal summers, but now I got promoted to full time up there. So I work in the summer like April to September, I work 6 days a week, 55 hour weeks. Now in the winter I'm working 4 or 5 days a week, 30 to 45 hours a week.

- Okay, alright. There's no more questions anybody wanna speak either for or against him?

- Why don't you come up one at a time.

- [Chris] Cliff Lapp, his father, I-a-p-p.

- Got 'em right here. Go ahead sir.

- [Cliff] Yeah hi, I'm Nick's father. My wife and I have been married, we moved here in '93. We've been married since '94 and so he's lived with us the whole time. And when he was, he was first happened when he was arrested, I was like I knew from knowing him and his behavior and what he said, that he was not a pedophile. So we paid the money for his bail, which was for us, was a lot. And then we've paid the lawyer, for us it was a lot of money, and if I thought he was a pedophile I would have said no we're not paying anything. You know because we can't really afford it and it's like I wouldn't do it anyway. When I was about 10 years old, I was abused by my grandmother's friend, who was Methodist minister and it turned out later, I found out that he abused my sister and my brother. I think after me, I didn't know about that. And you know I've read that pedophiles, I think they said on average they have like a 120 victims, each person. So if I thought he was pedophile I would be like no, we're not gonna support him, because this is not right. When I knew he was not, and that's why we've been supporting him like this the whole way.

- Okay.

- [Cliff] I was gonna mention that he did see Dr. Caplain prior to, I'm sorry, Jim Drake prior to sentencing and he had an evaluation with him there. But he's lived with us the whole time and in the, from Dr. Caplain, he said his main problem was he was suffering from some depression and he needed like a stable environment and I think if he lives with us that would be the most stable thing for him. His bedroom is adjacent to ours, the upper level, and his bed is actually, I've measured it, his bed is actually 12 feet from our bed, like through the wall. So he's in the bedroom right next to us and I just feel that that would be the easiest for all of us.

- Okay.

- [Cliff] If he kept living with us and we just kept being together as a family versus him living somewhere else, I don't know where.

- Alright, I appreciate it, thank you.

- [Cliff] Did you have any more questions for me?

- Nope, thank you.

- [Cliff] Okay, thank you very much.

- [Chris] Mother, Jolata Godwood, goes by Jola.

- [Jola] I do have a letter from my best friend who was visiting us from Toronto Canada. who's known Nick his whole life and unfortunately she had to go back to work, so she was here all of last week.

- Sure go ahead.

- [Jola] And my comments are basically sort of like my husbands, we've been living on a cul-de-sac, there are no children at all, underage, anywhere near us. He's been a wonderful child, we're all sort of surprised that all this happened. And we've all been learning as well as Nick seeing his counselors and we sit down and chat a lot. He graduated from Pebble with a 3.0, ACTs were about 29, he used to go to university up in Calgary Alberta for a whole year. So when he came home he was planning to be home for the summer and then he wanted to go to a school out in Wood River Oregon. Where his grandmother and uncle currently live but when all this happened he was unable to apply or do anything like that. So he was planning to like I said, stay and work for the summer, at Nor Door. And then he decided to take the year off and all of this has sort of been, I guess, continuing for the last year and a half. And now we know he's on probation for the next four years, so we're trying to just get him onto some online classes when he's available to start using the internet. At least further his education. And then hopefully he'll be able to go to school full time, somewhere.

- Okay.

- [Jola] Okay.

- Alright thank you, appreciate it. Your name ma'am?

- [Karen] Karen Steingraber.

- Go ahead.

- [Karen] I'm a little bit--

- You have about three minutes, okay? So I don't know if you wanna paraphrase it, or, go ahead.

- [Karen] I'm here today to speak on behalf of Nick Godwood. While I understand this hearing is to determine residency for Nick, I'm compelled to share some personal observations with you, as I hope they will be relevant to your determination regarding this decision. My comments won't be lengthy. Many times in casual conversations with friends we discussed topics where I find myself saying I'm glad I was a teenager when I was, and not now. It was much a much nicer and easier time to be a teenager growing up. We didn't have the internet and all the devices available to monopolize our time. We interacted with each other face to face. Five years ago the press gazette printed a full page article on how Rhinelander Wisconsin was experiencing and epidemic in regards to sexting. What was that? Then I experienced it first hand when a colleague I worked received a phone call and ran out of work crying. A friend of her daughter called her to say she thought her daughter was going to commit suicide based on a text she received from her. It was good her friend called, my friend's daughter received the help that she needed. The point I want to make here is that device technology has evolved so much and so fast over the years. That a 17 year old teenage is still just that, a 17 year old teenager trying to figure out what the world is all about and how it affects them. But now they have all of these devices at their disposal, as most of us probably know from experience, many times as teenagers we didn't make the best decisions that we should have. That's because we were just 17. I have known and interacted with Nick since he was born. From babysitting him, sorry, first days of school, summer camp, proms, graduation, and many things in between. At 16 years of age Nick attended and graduated from Barnett

Bicycle Institute in Colorado Springs Colorado, as a certified bicycle mechanic. With this expertise he has worked for the same employer in Door County for four years. I believe that this achievement and length of employment at one job at Nick's age is a testament to his enthusiasm, commitment, and character. I live two miles from a neighborhood that is a designated area for registered sexual offenders to reside. I don't drive down any of the roads through that area. What if my car broke down? I would be scared to death of who might be walking by and why they're in the neighborhood at all. Nick has lived at home his whole life. This experience has taken a toll on Nick. It is my firm belief that he should continue to live at home with his parents. It's important for him to have the loving support of family through this time. There are no children under 18 where the family lives. Nick's not a threat to anyone. Requiring him to live where he would be surrounded by convicted sexual offenders is not in Nick's best interest. It does however potentially place Nick in harm's way. I believe he should be allowed to live at home with his family, thank you.

- Alright, thank you. Alright is there anybody else? Okay you can have this back, I've got your mom's. Alright does anybody want to make a motion?

- I'll make a motion for Mr. Nicholas Godwood to move to 3483 Charlevoix Court, address specific.

- Alright is there a second?

- Second.

- Any discussion? Okay let's go ahead and vote. Sorry I didn't give you a chance, to say what we're voting on. Hopefully we got it right.

- The motion passed unanimously.

- Okay, Mr. Godwood you're gonna be allowed to move at 3483 Charlevoix Court, okay. I think that this is a good opportunity for you don't waste it, you made a mistake in your life and just kind of move forward, alright?

- [Nicholas] Thank you.

- [Chris] Have good one, very much everybody.

- Yup. Next Mr. Randal. You wanna grab, oh thank you.

- [James] After 14 years I'm getting the hang of it.

- Okay you're looking to move to 1212 Lore Lane, am I right?

- [James] Yes, I just found out the address today.

- Okay.

- [James] And I've just found out there was a place about a week ago, so I was unable to contact anybody to come speak for me. They're kinda rushing me cause of my health and the fact that I'm living on the street. So things are moving really fast and I kinda last one to know. I'm not from Wisconsin so I'm not sure exactly where this is either, other than it's at somewhere on the west side.

- So did, who found the-

- [James] I'm working through Nucap.

- Okay.

- [James] I've been out of prison for three years. At first I lived in my van until it got hit by a train. I was then living with someone in Bellevue and I was going to get pass to live there but a reporter found out, spread the word, and every body started calling my PO and I was forced to move, even though I didn't violate the law, or break any rules. Because of the unanimous amount of people calling they forced me to move. Although I did everything I was supposed to, working to stay there, going before the board and everything. My PO said that she didn't mention that I had been living there for six months without problem, most people said oh we didn't know that, but needless to say, I was forced to move.

- Okay. First question, was this actually published? His address? Okay so we're good there. Okay, in regard to your sexual offenses we're gonna go over them real quickly here, again just make sure you refer to the person as the victim and not by personal name or affiliation, okay?

- [James] Yes we did this last month.

- Yeah, alright. Does anybody have any questions, 'cause I know you were here last month, in terms of you have any questions regarding to his offense? No?

- No.

- Okay, alright. Does anybody have any questions, just overall, in terms of his offense?

- I'm confused you were here last month, but we don't see anything--

- I think they withdrew or something?

- [James] No what happened was is they had set me up with a building that was condemned and so it was put off to this month. But that particular place is still listed as condemned so they had to find me a new place.

- So did we talk to you last month?

- I don't think we did.

- No, I've never really--

- Okay so I would like to verify the offense, if you could tell me what happened.

- [James] Do you want the--

- So you have three separate offenses, okay? So let's talk about the offense listed here with at 15 year old back in 1988. Cause you have three offenses, one in 1988, 2000, and 2007. Yes the '88 she was 15, I was 19. At the time I was having the drugs and alcohol and to make matters worse I just married and had a kid. I had absolutely no clue what I was doing. I have no focus as to where I was going, I was kind of blatantly overwhelmed, which increased my drug and alcohol use. And I thought, my at the time was 26, I was 19, in my family the male was usually much older than the female. It's what I grew up with, same thing with my brothers and sister, my dad was 20 years older than my mother. At the time I was 19, she was 15 so, in my mind we were both kids. I think I was trying to, I realized the responsibility that I now had, and I was trying to escape it. I was very immature at the time.

- So what did you do?

- [James] Well I don't remember most of it. I remember that I heard somebody crying in our backyard. Asked her what was wrong, invited her in, but like I said I was so drunk and so stoned I don't remember much of anything. The only thing that I remember from that particular point was that the judge stated he didn't know what happened something probably happened, but because the complaining party was a police officer of that county, he had no other recourse but to find me guilty of 4th degree misdemeanor. And gave me 90 days I believe in jail. That's about all I remember of that particular incident.

- Okay what's your second offense in 2000.

- [James] That basically, I let that go more than I should have. That was, my major problem has always been stupid decisions when it came to women. I married a woman thinking it would improve our relationship, she had two kids. The 13 year old was already on drugs, the 10 year old was violently out acting. So I thought if I married and solidify everything, pull everything together, and make everything right, I was wrong. Well it was constant fighting between us.

- So the victim in the particular case, was it someone within the house?

- [James] Yes.

- Okay, what did you do to that victim?

- [James] It wasn't more of what I did, it's what I allowed to happen.

- Well sir that's not the case, I mean you're convicted--

- [James] Well I'm trying not to list the victim, as you said.

- Well it says sexual battery, which is what you have done here.

- [James] The thing is, I went to, we were getting ready to go through a divorce. A violent divorce and I had already went to the police and because she threatened me with several accusations and filed a report. When I had, after that was done, both boys came to stay with me, temporarily. And it was more of a hugging, more of a, I don't know what you call it, the youngest was kind of like clinging and the older brother told the mother and that's where that came out of.

- Okay how about the last offense in 2005.

- [James] That one I'm fighting because it didn't happen. That one blatantly didn't happen.

- But you pled guilty on it.

- [James] Yes the reason being is I was in jail my family came to me and they told me if I didn't take the deal, that they said, they were going to make sure I never saw daylight again. I've always had a distrust of the justice system and I bonk it standing up against it. If you look I'm always taking the deal, it's more of a, low self-esteem thing. But they had offered me five in and three out. That was the deal. I had a wife and kids, that I had to take care of, and everything that was going on, my attorney said, and I quote, if you don't take the deal I'm walkin'. He said cause they're gonna bury you. And so I took the deal.

- Okay so what's the facts of ultimately on this last one?

- Pretty much what he's saying. Disclosure of a very young victim, somewhere around four years old.

- What did it say that he did?

- He was babysitting, children were dropped off at his place, they were talking about her privates. He touched her vagina, that's what the child disclosed. We investigated, Mr Randall denied that he did it.

- Okay. Is there any more information on the second one in 2000?

- No, I don't even have a 2000 case file.

- Okay.

- [James] That was in Tennessee, by the way.

- Okay. Alright if we wanna talk about your treatment programs can we do that in public?

- [James] Oh most definitely. I am very proud of my treatment actually.

- Yup I read the treatment that you've gone through. Tell me what you've learned from that treatment.

- [James] Well I have nine left of 60 from this SOT treatment and actually I finally found out who I was. I had no clue that I was, I guess, the way I saw myself, and the way actually I was were two different things. I didn't realize I had so many weaknesses, I didn't realize that the way I thought, and what I thought was socially acceptable was so violently off. I grew up in a very violent, sexually abusive, physically abusive life and it came to a point where I thought that that was normal. And since the police wouldn't intervene I thought it was legal, so my whole concept of life was totally totally tweaked. The second day, or second session of SOT, we started talking about our views. And I started looking at what was proper and what was improper and I found that most of my life, the way I viewed life, was listed as improper. I've had to reevaluate the way I look at life and how I deal with people. And it's not easy, I'm 50 years old. And to discover that most of your life your brain was warped, to say the least, and the way you viewed life is more than disconcerting.

- So what do you do right now with your time? Are you completely disabled, are you working?

- [James] I'm completely disabled, I live on the street. But I play guitar and I do nature photography.

- So how do you intend to pay for this apartment?

- [James] I get disability and SSI, 532 a month. Prior to this, working with Nucap, I was trying to find a place of my own, it never got to my criminal offense. My disability and low income killed me across the board. The place they found me actually was built for a handicapped person, it has a ramp, the rooms are all setup for handicap. This is the first one in the three years that I've actually found, that I can move into, and the landlord has accepted. And like I said, most of the time, it never got to my criminal offense, I couldn't find one that I could get into.

- Right.

- [James] So this is like a miracle. I'm facing a lot of physical challenges, which includes two spinal surgeries coming up. And I'm suffering from first stage chronic pneumonia now. Which is why my voice is so crappy. Basically in order for me to move forward, in order for me to advance, and cause I wanna go back to school and just get an occupation I can do from my wheelchair, because I can't do any of my original occupations which was construction, welding, heavy equipment operation, mechanic. I'm gonna have to learn a whole new trade, a whole new way of life, and I need a stable place to do that from, there's no way I'll be able to do it

living on the street.

- In terms of support system, who do you have?

- [James] Well my brother and family live up in Marinette County, so they're pretty close. But I also have Billy, who's my case worker for Nucap. My PO, Rebecca who is the head of SOT, I'm actually volunteering after my SOT for the aftercare. Because I don't think I'm done learning who I am yet. I need to learn to, 'cause right now, I'm actually isolating myself from humanity, I'm getting to the point where I don't want to deal with people. Just because I don't want to make any mistakes. And Rebecca said that the aftercare will help me work through that so I can deal with people, without the fear and anxiety that I'm gonna make a mistake.

- Okay. Alright does anybody have any questions for him?

- [Group] No.

- Alright does anybody wanna make a motion?

- I just have a request, could you look that address up on the chart?

- Sure.

- It's right across from Franklin middle school just down the street from Notre Dame.

- Okay.

- [James] I still have no clue where it is.

- Does that maybe to Mason, and Webster-

- Between Mason and all the--

- It's about about a block and half up from outside the boys and girls club.

- Yup he's right on it. So it's basically across the street from Franklin Middle School. It's not a good place to be sir.

- [James] Like I said I didn't find that--

- Right I'm with ya.

- [James] And it's the only place available.

- Okay, alright does anybody wanna make a motion? I'm really straining, because this is right across from the school, I'm just really struggling with it.

- [James] What I was going to suggest was a brief acceptance. maybe something where I have to come in and check in every so often until you're comfortable with me being there, like the first time 30 days. Maybe the second time 60 days, just not an open out yes, but enough time for me to prove that I can do this without, 'cause I've been out three years, I've had no violations, no breaking of the law, nothing.

- What's anybody else's thought?

- Is there any way you can live with your brother? You said--

- [James] No that's in Marinette County and I'm not allowed out of Brown County. And my brother--

- Have you asked for a transfer?

- [James] I could but my brother is right now supporting not only himself and his wife, both disabled, but my oldest sister and his youngest daughter and her kids. So that's not a possibility. And my mother is in assisted living, so, I'm basically as far as that goes on my own.

- I just have the issue with the proximity to the middle school, literally across the street. I know the apartment, I know the apartment building.

- [James] That's why I thought maybe come back in 30 days, I'd do whatever it needs to prove that--

- How long have you been in your current physical situation in terms of the wheelchair?

- [James] 14 years, it's gotten much worse in the last year. I have to go into two spinal surgeries because it's gotten much much worse.

- So in terms of the last offense in 2005, you were in a wheelchair at that time?

- [James] Correct. But I was, like I said, that's one I've been trying to fight because it didn't happen. Essentially she got pissed off because I married another woman. That's where the original came from.

- I can't take that into account sir, I have account the sentence and what you pleaded, and that's matter of fact, right?

- [James] I understand that.

- Alright does anybody wanna make a motion?

- I'll make a motion to deny Mr. Randall to 1212 Lore Lane, #B.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second that.

- Okay we're gonna go ahead and vote.

- How are we voting?

- Yes how are we voting?

- So a yes indicates that you agree with the motion.

- Correct a yes is a motion, or it's agreeing with the motion to deny. A yes is deny, a No is against the motion.

- Motion to deny passes four to one.

- Okay sir you're denied to move to 1212 Lore Lane, this is a tough decision, I don't know, I mean again you can come back in front of the board, I think the big thing was the school.

- [James] Unfortunately I understand what you made, the decision, but I'm not gonna live that long. Not living on the street in the winter, in my wheelchair, so this'll probably be the last time I'm here, thank you for your time and consideration, have a good night.
- Scott Heinritz, is that correct?
- [Scott] Heinritz.
- Okay you're at 2070 University Avenue right now?
- [Scott] No I'm actually homeless right now waiting on the approval for this apartment.
- 904 Farlin Avenue, #2.
- [Scott] 19.
- 1904, sorry. Yeah it's 1904.
- [Scott] I was actually at the 2670 up 'til the 26th of last month.
- And how long were you livin' there?
- [Scott] Four months. It's the transitional living program, actually the case managers were all here earlier for another gentleman.
- Okay. Okay so we're gonna go over your offense, again just refer to the person as the victim, so tell us about the offense.
- [Scott] 2000, I got out of prison in September 2003, I ended up meeting a girl from Manitowoc I hung out there quite a bit. The victim was actually a friend of a friend I had picked up on evening in Manitowoc and brought back to my grandparents house here in Green Bay. I violated her by touching her--
- Did you know how old she was?
- [Scott] Yes, I did.
- Okay.
- [Scott] We had intercourse, it was found out, it came to light I believe the next day when I left the house that she told her friend and I believe that the friend told her mother, and then her mother reported it.
- Okay. So you were released when?
- [Scott] From prison?
- Yup.
- [Scott] Oh jeeze, I don't even know, I couldn't tell you the date.
- He's been here several times before.

- Right.
- You can quickly look at the other minutes if you want.
- Yup. It's been a while though since he's been here, right?
- Yeah, '12?
- [Scott] Yeah about 2012, what was that, 14th ave?
- Lavern Drive.
- [Scott] Lavern 634 B, yeah Lavern, yeah.
- And you've had no other instances in terms of any offenses with the law correct?
- [Scott] No, well in 2014 I had delivery possession, delivery of THC, possession with intent to deliver schedule three narcotics, prescription of Vicodin. I just told them basically if they paid for the prescription, they could have the pills. Dumb on my part. Child neglect and keeper of a drug house.
- So what made you go those routes?
- [Scott] What routes?
- Drug house.
- [Scott] The drugs I went from the sex offense to the drugs I don't know, obviously I wasn't a very good burglar back in the '90s either, so. Sorry trying to make a little light of the situation but I don't know, it was just I smoked weed, a friend of mine came to my house, he asked for a little bit of it, he purchased it, it was actually a sting. It was like 3.96 grams of marijuana the DTF was involved.
- Are you working right now?
- [Scott] I am.
- Where do you work?
- [Scott] I work at Carboline.
- Carboline?
- [Scott] Carboline yeah it's on Elizabeth by miracle foods.
- Full time, part time?
- [Scott] Full time. I work through a head, been there about two and a half months now before that I worked at Al's Hamburger. I was in jail two months before that and before that I actually worked at Angelina's and the Cannon, I had two jobs before I went to jail.
- Alright, does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to him? Unless there's anything else you'd like to say?
- [Scott] Well actually there is, I mean I'm 40 years old, the last few years have been hard for me I guess. My

case is fairly old, 2004, 14 years ago. I did complete sex offender treatment, they were supposed to refer me for aftercare. I don't know why that never took place from my agents, I didn't see it as a big need, it was just recommended that I do enroll in aftercare. But at 40 years old, I actually, since the TLP, the transitional to Marshall house that I left, it was probably the biggest turning point in my life. If you would have told me two weeks in to the program that I would have been the one leaving there with a car, an apartment, a decent job, I'd have told you you were full of shit. But there was a lot of things, well not really a lot of things, I guess the thinking for change program that they have there helped me a lot more than like the mental health duo diagnosis and AODA did just because it gave you a better understanding of why you make some of the decisions you make. So actually for the first time in my life, at 40 years old, I've like acquires this stuff all on my own, just by working and saving. Like I said I just left the Marshall house on October 26th, I was there for four months. I had already paid, I mean I gave the landlord 990 bucks for a security deposit, 495 dollars to hold it for this month. I bought a car, I mean now I'm just, I'm actually just trying to be a father. Like I didn't realize the severity of the offense when it happened, now that I have another three and a five year old daughter, that I've actually had the chance to be a father of, it kinda make me, kinda feel sick about myself that I made decision to actually do this, but.

- Okay. Alright, does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to him?
- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Heinritz to 1904 Farlin, number 2, address specific.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Okay, let's go ahead an vote.
- So yes vote is to approve Mr. Heinritz to live at that address, a no vote is to deny him living there.
- [Scott] Gotta do that it at work sometimes too, gotta dumb it down a little bit.
- Motion to approve passes four to one.
- Okay sir you've been approved to move to 1904 Farlin Avenue, apartment number 2, do you want it sent there?
- [Scott] Please.
- Okay, alright see you later.
- [Scott] Thank you very much guys.
- Well there's one person left. Michael?
- [Michael] Yeah.
- Mine keeps going to--
- I cannot get him, mine continually goes up to--
- Yeah, same as mine.
- Okay then you just return it.

- Right that's what I thought.
- Use this, it's the only thing I have just--
- Okay I'll just read everybody, so back in August of this year, we approved him to go to 1190 Oregon Street for 30 days. Address specific, that failed, and then the 90 days at which time we'd have proof of acceptance to transfer to Brown County probation, and proof of employment is requested. So do you have proof of employment? Okay. And who is this with?
- [Michael] Kurdleson Construction on Onieda.
- Okay so you just started this job?
- [Michael] Yeah this Friday is payday, it'll be either, my fourth week?
- Fourth week? Okay. And this is, so the time we met ya back in August is this your first job since then?
- [Michael] No I've been working at the farm last time.
- That's right, I know you said you were gonna move over, right?
- [Michael] Yeah I had that important paper for that.
- Okay, alright and you did get transferred right?
- [Michael] Yup.
- Okay make sure. Okay you're gonna wanna take a quick peek.
- Thank you.
- Okay you can have it back then. Alright does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to him?
- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Wesolowski, sorry if I didn't pronounce it correctly, to 1192 Oregon Street, address specific.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Alright vote to, upvote yes is to approve him living there at that address, and no vote is a vote to deny. Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay we'll go ahead and send that to ya and good luck to ya.
- [Michael] Thanks.
- Alright. Okay so I just need, our next meeting is December, and we're back here.
- 12th.

- I2th alright, does anybody have anything else?
- [Group] No.
- Okay need a motion to dismiss.
- I'll make that motion.
- I'll second.
- We're making a motion to go home.
- I think we all get this motion.
- If it's denied there will be probably a problem here.
- Yeah.
- That's it, alright.
- Can't believe you'd vote yes to this.
- Yes, yeah no I wanna stay here all night.
- There we go, motion passes unanimously.
- Alright thank you.
- [Kaitie] I'm Kaitie, I'm with channel two.
- Okay Kaitie.
- [Kaitie] I was here for Richard Thomas and I just wanted to get some of your names, 'cause I did have the table line when he was talking here.
- The panel's on the website, with the names of the board members.
- [Kaitie] Right but I just wanted to make sure I had the faces with the names
- Oh sure Dean.
- [Kaitie] Dean you said? D-e-a-n?
- Yup.
- [Kaitie] And last name?
- Gerondale, g-e-r-o-n-d-a-l-e.
