VERBATIM MINUTES

- Okay, we'll the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board to meeting. We'll take roll call first.

- I'm just checking to make sure that everybody's connected. Kathy, it's not showing you on yet so I am going to show you as present and Okay.

- Okay. All right, if you wanna move on to the agenda.

- Okay. We need a motion to approve the agenda.
- I make a motion to approve the agenda, the April 10th meeting.
- I'll second that.
- All in favor?
- Aye.
- Did the vote come up on yours, Kathy?
- No.
- I don't think this is working.
- Okay, passes unanimously.
- We need an approval of the minutes from the March 13th meeting.
- I'll make that motion.
- I second.

- All in favor? Did that work?

- I just sent them out.

- Okay, Kathy, you might just need to tell me.

- Aye?

- Aye.

- Passes unanimously.

- Okay, the first PO we're going to hear is Noah Polega. And we need to call him.

- You have reached the California Corrections.

- Please wait while I transfer your call.

- [Correctional Facility Employee] Hello, Main Correctional Facility.

- Hi, this is Heidi Michel with the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board. We're looking to speak to a Noah Polega.

- [Correctional Facility Employee] He's right here.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Noah] Hello.

- Hi, Mr. Polega. This Heidi Michel with the Green Bay Sex Offender Board. We're here to hear your appeal today.

- [Noah] Yes.

- Is this your first time appearing before us?

- [Noah} Yes.

- Okay, I'll just give you a couple rules. Right now, there's a room full of people here.

- [Noah] Okay.

- We have two other Board Members that are present and we are going to ask you several questions. What I do ask that when you talk about your victim, you don't talk about your relationship, whether it was a daughter, niece, whatever.

- [Noah] Okay.

- And then we ask that you refer by not calling them by their name.

- [Noah] Okay.

- Okay?

- [Noah] Yes.

- So it looks like you're requesting a move to 921 and a half Howard Street. Is that correct?

- [Noah] Correct.

- Okay, and you're currently at Kettle Moraine?

- [Noah] Yes.

- And what is your expected release date?

- [Noah] Excuse me?

- What is your expected release date?

- [Noah] April 24th, or I mean September 24th.

- On your application, you indicated that you might get out between July 30th and October.

- [Noah] Yes.

- Something.

- [Noah] Yes, July 30th is, I got a parole in June to see the Parole Board to possibly get out July 30th. But as of right now, officially, my release date will be September 24th.

- Okay. All right, so why don't you go ahead and tell us what you were convicted of and the circumstances surrounding it.

- [Noah] I was convicted of three counts third degree sexual assault. I was 17 years old and it was the summer and I met up with my victim and we had oral, she gave me oral sex and we had sex twice. Yeah, that's really about the gist of it.

- And did you know her or did you just meet her?

- [Noah] I just met her.

- And did you know how old she was?

- [Noah] Yes.

- And how did it come about? How did you get arrested?

- [Noah] She was at school talking about it and a social worker overheard her or something like that and asked her about it and she admitted it. And then police asked me about it and I admitted it and then they arrested me.

- And what was your total sentence for that?

- [Noah] On count one I got two years in, but eight years out. Count two, I had four years in, four years out. And count three, five years in, five years out. And I've served about almost 15 years of it today.

- Were they all consecutive?

- [Noah] Yeah, they were all consecutive. I got revoked on the first one once before so.

- And why did you get revoked?

- [Noah] Drinking violation.

- And this occurred in Washington County?

- [Noah] Yes.

- And why are you looking to move to Brown County?

- [Noah] My fiance lives up there and there's, they did a drop near here and I think it was November or something. And there was a lotta companies up around that area that interested me. And I've contacted My Brother's Keeper and they're willing to mentor me and basically groom me to be a mentor along the way.

- Do any of you have questions regarding his crime?

- Was this a one-time, when you met her, was it one time or over the summer did you say?

- [Noah] It was over a period of a week.

- A week? Okay. That's the only question I have.

- Well, done on the first one, but then not long after, you committed another offense?

- He had three counts so they're all from the same timeframe there. Three counts of third degree.

- Or are you talking about the 2006 ones?

- Right, yeah.

- Possession of firearm.

- Oh, that's what you wanna know about?

- Yeah.

- Oh.

- Can you hear her?

- Is he there?

- Hello?

- Noah?

- [Noah] Yes.

- Oh, okay. There's some more questions from the Board.

- [Noah] Okay.

- So what about the other things that you're convicted of?

- [Noah] The firearms?

- Yes.

- [Noah] I stole, I stole the guns for money. And that's really, I just, I basically just stole guns 'cause I wanted to sell 'em for money. And I had a bad attitude about my PO. And she was gonna give me a lie detector test and I had to pay for the lie detector test.

- So you stole the guns for money.

- [Noah] Yeah.

- Are you saying to pay for your lie detector test?

- [Noah] Well, that was part, that was part of why I did it. And then just to pay for other stuff.

- I have a question regarding your address. Does your fiance, she lives there now?

- [Noah] Yes.

- And has lived there for a while so that's why you coming for us now?

- [Noah] Yes.

- Because it'll still be available?

- [Noah] Yes.

- Okay, so what's different now then when this happened? What have you learned?

- [Noah] Well I learned that I was very immature. I learned that I didn't like to take responsibility for the things that I caused back then. I've grown up a lot since then. I don't see, I don't view the world as like against me kinda like I did back then. I know that I created my own problems and I feel that as far as my prison time goes and my sentence that I'm serving my time and I paid for my shortcomings in life and I'm ready to move forward and be productive. 'Cause the truth of the matter is I've been around less than stellar people for a very long time and I wanna be better than that. I was raised better than that.

- Okay.

- Is this, what he's telling us is that what you have?

- Based on his information packet that he provided us, we didn't give criminal complaint for But he signed his packet, yes.

- Okay, any questions regarding that? Now we'd like to talk to you about your treatment programs and you have the option to do that in closed session or remain in open session. What would you prefer?

- [Noah] We can keep it open. It don't matter.

- Okay. So it looks like you have not received any sex offender treatment. Is that correct?

- [Noah] I was in sex offender treatment on the street until I got revoked and put back in prison. But no, as far as in prison, I have not had the opportunity to.

- And so you've been in prison for 15 years and you haven't had the opportunity to do that?

- [Noah] Almost 13 years. But yeah, they wouldn't let me enroll in the program until I had like 18 months, or 18 months or less on my sentence. And then I was transferred to Kettle Moraine and here they either don't have it or they haven't implemented it yet for sex offender treatment, so.

- All right. Is your PO out of Brown County?

- [Noah] No, right now, Washington County.

- Okay, thank you. So what have you been doing with your time while you're in prison?

- [Noah] I did a vocational for office assistant. I did another vocational, but didn't get full credit for it because the teacher quit. That was for the electrician apprenticeship in Green Bay. I've been involved in sports, athletics. I've held a job pretty much the whole time I've been incarcerated. I've kept trying to reestablish relationships with family and friends. And just working on myself and evaluating what I wanna be when I get out and. I have a second chance at life so I'm just focusing on that.

- Okay.

- As far as on your appeal form you wrote for work, was the local electrician's union, were you electrician before also or?

- [Noah] No, I just did the apprenticeship in Green Bay and I really liked it and I wanted to get into a union of some sort and that's the first thing that I definitely wanna try to get enrolled in.

- Okay, so all right.

- When you did your treatment while you were on the streets, where did you do that at and how long were you in it for?

- [Noah] I was in for three or four months and it was in Washington County at the PO's office. I think it was, I think it was called Hannick Enterprises. I could be wrong on that, but it was once a week.

- So you got maybe about 12 sessions in?

- [Noah] Yes. And I'm more than willing to do it when I get out, so.

- Did you ladies have any other questions?

- I don't have any.

- I don't either.

- Is there anybody here who would like to speak on his behalf? Okay, you can step forward. You can have a seat. You just need to state your name and address for the record, please. Right there.

- My name is Amber Clemons. I'm Noah's fiancée. Currently, I reside at 921 and a half Howard Street. I just wanna appeal to the Board that since Noah and I have been together, all he's talked about is how he wants to better his life when he gets out. He's a very determined person and he's very motivated to make an impact, a positive impact, in whatever community he's released to. Since we've been together, he's made me a much better person. He's helped me lose 97 pounds to this date. He's helped me train physically, mentally. He's made me a stronger person. And he's someone who would give his life for anyone he's close with. He's a very caring person. He's very empathetic about what he's done in his past, but I truly believe he's learned and he has used his time to better himself so he can better the community that he's released to. I truly believe that he would be a great member of our community and that he serves no risk to ever re-offend again. Personally, for myself, I'm a very straight person. I've no criminal past so I'm more than willing to help him in any way, shape, or form that I can. And he also has a very strong support system from both my family and his family. So I believe that he'd be a great addition to Green Bay and I hope that what I say and that he says can be a great factor in your decision.

- How long have you been dating?

- Three years.

- And did you know him prior to going to prison or did you meet him while he was in prison?

- Our families knew each other beforehand briefly. His stepdad and my dad used to run the same trucking paths. And then after my dad passed away, I kind of reconnected with his stepdad and was asking about Noah. And so we kind of struck up a friendship that led to romance.

- And how often have you, do you visit him at Kettle Moraine?

- Every, every week.

- Really?

- Yeah. Like I've not missed a week of visits since we started talking like almost three years ago.

- Do you have any children?

- I do.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- All right, thank you.

- Thank you.

- You can go.

- No, you can go.

- Okay, yeah.

- Is there anyone else who would like to speak on his behalf or against? Would anybody like to make a motion?

- You're asking to come far in the future for September.

- [Noah] Right.

- I'm not sure I'm willing to approve now for something that far in the future. Not that I wouldn't want to approve you at a later date.

- [Noah] Well the whole reason that we put it in so soon is because on that chance that I wouldn't be approved, I'd have to have my dad find me an apartment before I got out. But the release, the release like setup starts six months before an inmate is released from prison. Whereas a social worker has us do release plans and helps us get our photo IDs, gets in touch with our PO so the whole transformation from my PO and Washington County having to set up a transfer to Green Bay would be a process and everything else. That's why we set it up at this point to make sure that we have enough time to get everything in place.

- Yeah. And there's probably no guarantee that the Brown County Department of Corrections would accept you as a transfer. Or is there a guarantee?

- [Noah] My PO in Washington County said that I'd have to get approval from you first and that usually what the Board approves, they'll usually approve. But no, there is no 100% guarantee.

- Is there a way we can make a motion. 'Cause, okay, there is September, but it's possible he could be out in July.

- [Noah] Right.

- So if we could make a motion that he would have to approve him, but he would have to come to the next meeting after his, so he would have a place to stay for the week or two until the meeting? You know what I'm saying? And then, talk to him. But how would you make a motion when you don't know the date?

- That's a problem.

- I think I'd rather see him come back closer when he gets out and then come to us. Would make more sense.

- [Noah] Absolutely.

- Because they won't release him or call me if they say don't say yes.

- [Noah] Yeah, if the Board doesn't approve me to go to Green Bay, they won't release me at Green Bay. So that's the, that's the kind of catch-22 in this whole situation. I'm more than willing like if the Board is willing to approve me and then I get approved by the DOC to go out there and everything's good with the house and this and that, I'm more than willing to do another meeting, like an amended meeting to see you face to face. But the Board, basically the Board has to approve me before my PO or anybody can make any type of transfers. And those transfers'll be taking place within the next probably three months.

- Well, I'm gonna be perfectly honest with you. I don't really know you other than what you've just said.

- [Noah] Right.

- But my issue is your crime was in Washington County and we have a difficult time right now finding housing for our own Brown County residents. So I typically am not in favor of transfers coming into Brown County. So that's where I kind of stand.

- [Noah] Could I maybe try to change your mind with me because like everything, I've geared everything and set everything up for a successful reintegration into Green Bay. And I have plans to get mentored by My Brother's Keeper and then become a mentor myself. So I really have ambitions to get back and be a productive member of society. I'm not just, I've served a lot of time. I've had a lot of time to think about a lot of things and I really believe, I'm very confident that I'll be a very good member of society for Green Bay. I'm a Green Bay Packer fan. Just everything about Green Bay resonates with me and that's, that's on top of having Amber to help me out and all that stuff. And I'd consider it a blessing if I could go up there.

- Well, my preference would be that you go back to Washington County, you live there for a while, be a productive member there, and then bring that information back to us here. That is my preference. But, you wanna make a motion on your original? You can.

- No, 'cause I really can't 'cause we don't, I don't know how to do it without a date. So you can make your motion.

- I totally agree with you.

- Well, I'm going to make a motion to deny you to live at 921 and a half Howard Street. Is there a second?

- I'll second that motion.

- All in favor?

- This is a motion to deny so a yes vote means that you're supporting the denial. I can, I can put his name on. Motion to deny passes two to one.

- Okay, so Noah, you are denied.

- [Noah] 'Kay.

- So you can try to petition us at a later date and time.

- [Noah] All right.

- All right, thank you.

- Thank you.

- Next on our agenda is Sovann Soun. Oh.

- What?

- Oh good, I hung up.

- [Corrections Employee] Department of Corrections, Sylvia Marcourt.

- Hi, this is Heidi Michel with Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board. We're hear to speak with Sovann Soun.

- [Corrections Employee] Yes, he's here.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Sovann] Hello?

- Sovann, this Heidi Michel with the Green Bay Sex Offender Board. We're here to hear your appeal. You are asking to move to 560 Menlo Park. Is that correct?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- Okay, have you ever appeared before us?

- [Sovann] No.

- Okay, what we're going to do is we're gonna ask you some questions, but first we ask you to tell us about your arrest. We ask you when you talk about the victim to not mention the victim's name or relationship to you. And we'll go from there. If you wanna tell us what you were arrested for and what happened?

- [Sovann] I was arrested in 1994 on a second degree sexual assault of child.

- What happened?

- [Sovann] What happened? In high school, I was 18 and the victim was 15. And we ended up having two kids together.

- So

- Go ahead.

- So was this a relationship?

- [Sovann] Yes, it was.

- And her family and your family knew that age difference?

- [Sovann] Yes. The guys come told police I was involved in the relationship.

- Okay.

- [Sovann] When she became pregnant.

- And you didn't get arrested the first time you had a baby together?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- Okay.

- [Sovann] That was the 1994.

- So the first baby was in 1994? When was the second?

- [Sovann] '95.

- Are you still in a relationship with the mother?

- [Sovann] No, no, we're not in relation no more.

- Do you see your children?

- [Sovann] Yes, I do.

- And so you got, what was your sentence for that?

- [Sovann] 30 days jail and 10 years probation.

- And it looks like you were revoked?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- And why were you revoked?

- [Sovann] Driving alcohol offense.

- Okay.

- And when was that?

- [Sovann] That was '98.

- Is that what you have on your?

- He has a number of alcohol-related offenses.

- It also looks in like in 2001, you were convicted of another sexual assault with a child.

- [Sovann] Yes. That's, that's same child.

- The same victim?

- Victim.

- So they charged you once in 1994 and then they waited six years to charge you again?

- [Sovann] Yes. A misdemeanor one because she was 17.

- Okay, I'm confused. Did she have a baby in 2001? 'Cause it says pregnant.

- [Sovann] Yeah, she had a baby in 2000. In '94 and 2000.

- Oh, all right.

- Oh, I thought you said '95.

- That's what I thought too.

- [Sovann] And '95.

- Well how many children do you have?

- [Sovann] Three.

- Three? Okay. So one in '94, one in '95, and then another one in 2000?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- All from the same victim?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- If you knew you got in trouble the first time, why did you continue the relationship?

- [Sovann] For our kids.

- Okay.

- What are you currently sitting in prison for?

- [Sovann] Not putting in a bail registry.

- And what, you just didn't register or you were living somewhere you shouldn't have or what was that?

- [Sovann] I was homeless.

- Okay. How old are you?

- [Sovann] 23.

- When did you actually go back to prison?

- [Sovann] 2016.

- This might be as three years.

- Extended supervision.

- Okay.

- So looking at your criminal history here, it looks like in 2009 you were sentenced to 18 months in the state prison for a 5th OWI. And then you were discharged on January 22nd of 2014. Does that sound right?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- And then basically two weeks later, you were arrested again for operating while revoked?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- And then another operating while revoked a year later.

- [Sovann] Yes.

- Were you living in the Sheboygan area at that time?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- Okay, why do you wanna come to Brown County then?

- [Sovann] 'Cause my family is there and my mom, my brothers.

- Okay.

- Do you have family in Sheboygan County?

- [Sovann] No.

- You were just there?

- Okay.

- [Sovann] When we were there in Sheboygan County, the family lived there. When my dad passed away, they moved back to Brown County.

- And do you have a Brown County PO?

- [Sovann] No, I don't.

- Where's your PO out of?

- [Sovann] Sheboygan County.

- And have they approved you to move to Brown County?

- [Sovann] Yes.

- They have?

- [Sovann]

- [Corrections Employee] What you did was you gave her your plan for Brown County.

- [Sovann] Oh, I gave, okay.

- [Corrections Employee] And she said that they have to give That's when they would transfer.

- [Sovann] Oh, they gotta. Yeah, only if it approved.

- Okay. Do you have any other questions about his crime or?

- Mm-mm.

- Okay. So we'd like to talk to you about your treatment. Now you will have the option of doing that in closed or open session. What would your preference be?

- [Sovann] Open.

- Do you understand what that means? Right now there's a room full of people sitting here.

- [Sovann] Yes.

- That would be open. If you wish to go into closed session, we'll ask everybody to leave and you'll only listen to the Board.

- [Sovann] Oh, no, it could be open.

- Okay. So what kind of treatment have you gone through?

- [Sovann] AODA, anger management, substance abuse program, and social skills. That's about it.

- You've never had to do any sex offender treatment?

- [Sovann] No. 'Cause about the me, I'm not, I'm not bonding to do assessed treatment.

- The what? The prison didn't want you to?

- [Sovann] So see the Department of Corrections.

- They did not want you to?

- [Sovann] Yeah.

- Why not? What was the reason?

- [Sovann] They, they just say it's done. I don't know. They just say it's not an option. First it was I didn't have enough time to do a treatment. And when I came out in August, it's been so long, the years that I didn't re-offend so they don't feel the need, I need it.

- Do you have any documentation that you've-- Oh, you just enrolled in, I'm sorry, Sovann enrolled in it.

- When was the last time you've had a drink?

- [Sovann] December, right, I arrest at December 10 of 2015.

- And before being in prison right now, have you been in any AA, any alcohol treatments beforehand?

- [Sovann] I went to a That's actually when I went to Old Milwaukee.

- Okay. Do you guys have any other questions?

- I don't.

- Okay, is there anyone here who would like to speak on his behalf? You may step up. You need to state your name and your address for the the record, please.

- My name is Olie. Last name is Soun. And my address 3078 Best Drive, Green Bay. I'm Sovann's brother and that's my mom, my stepdad, and my brother, and his girlfriend right there. And we're all here to support Sovann. He has really not for his sexual assault case, but more of his alcohol case he has a problem with. He has nobody in Sheboygan that he can depend on. Everybody lives here in Green Bay. We're all willing to be here to support him through all his AA classes, whatever classes he needs to take. Yeah, if he stays in Sheboy, he's gonna, he won't have any kind of support and it's hard for us to get down there because my mom, she can't really drive and this is where we're all at. So nothing more I can say about that. Because nobody's, nobody residing in Sheboygan. All his support is here.

- Are you concerned about his drinking history?

- He needs help with, he needs help with his drinking problems and that's why we wanna be here to support him. His whole family is here to support him on that. And Sheboygan, like I said, he's not gonna have any kind of support there.

- What are you gonna do to help him? What would you do?

- Be his mentor, support him through, if he's feeling down about something, I can be there to talk to him, be there to pick him up and take him wherever he needs to go, his AA meetings. Also, my mom would help him, my brother. Support him through any kind of emotional, mental problem that he has.

- Can I just ask like what kind of support did you give when he was in Sheboygan? And now all the jail time and were you aware of that?

- They, they, he was on probation in Sheboygan and was, and he was living by like he said homeless. He didn't have nowhere to go and we couldn't, we couldn't take him outta Sheboygan County to come to Green Bay because he was supposed to reside in Sheboygan so that's why he couldn't get that support that he needed while living in Sheboygan.

- You think coming here, he could possible be a good member of the community? Would be productive and give him a home, job, and things like that?

- 'Cause with that family support, I know he could do a lot better. Because he had no support before and that's why we're all here on his behalf right now.

- Did he ever work before?

- He has to get his immigration card. And he could get that when he gets out to get a job. His green card. But that's, sorry.

- That's okay.

- That, we'll work on and when he gets out 'cause that's, he has to go to Milwaukee, right, to get that done?

- Okay.

- Okay.

- Thank you.

- Does anyone else?

- They don't know how to speak English too well.

- Oh, okay.

- Did you want to speak?

- No, that's.

- Is there anyone else? No?

- Oh, oh, oh, sure.

- I'm the alderperson for district two. So I'm just here on behalf of residents who have reached out who are against Mr. Soun moving to Menlo Park because of its proximity to Edison Middle School. It's right behind Menlo Park as well as its proximity to Problem Park that he has re-offended knowing that the person was underage and the issues of drinking. They are against it.

- Okay. Thank you.

- Thank you.

- All right, anybody wanna make a motion? Further discussion?

- I'm gonna make a motion to deny Mr. Soun to 560 Menlo Park.

- I'll second that motion.

- We'll take a vote.

- Motion to deny passes two to one.

- Okay, Mr. Soun, you were denied. So you will have to reapply if you'd like to consider moving to Green Bay.

- [Sovann] Okay.

- All right, thank you.

- [Sovann] Okay.

- So you can cause more problems like that.

- Next on the agenda is Ryan Fish. Hello.

- How's everyone doing?

- Good, yourself?

- Very well, thank you.

- Okay. Have you appeared before us before?

- I have not.

- Okay, so you kinda heard how things go.

- Yes, ma'am.

- You are looking at moving to 334 South Chestnut Avenue. Is that correct?

- Yes, ma'am.

- And you are gonna live by yourself?

- Yes.

- Okay. Do you wanna tell us about your crime and what happened and how it came about?

- It was October of 2016. I was online using a timeline dating app, Grindr, and amongst the conversations I had started with various people, one of them eventually identified himself as being underage and said he was almost 16. And for some reason, I agreed to meet up with him anyway. At the meeting place, I was taken into custody by law enforcement and was put as a sex statement so I was charged with child enticement. Use of the computer for child sex crime, and possession of And I was taken into custody and I then I served two years. I'm currently in the middle of just starting five years extended supervision.

- Okay, so when did you get out of prison then?

- October of last year.

- Okay, and where have you been living since then?

- I'm homeless right now so I've just kind of been couch-surfing on different friends' couches, staying where I can until I can get approved.

- Since October?

- Since I've, well I was in the TLP when I first got released from prison. I was there for three months. And then when they kicked me out, that would have been February-ish. I've just been kind of floating around since then.

- Knowing that he was underage, why did you meet him? You said oh, I just sorta, but.

- Yeah, I don't have a good answer. 2015 to '16 was a really dark time for me. I was living a very reckless lifestyle. There was a lot of drug use. I don't remember a lot of it, but it was a lot of drug use, a lot of many sexual partners. Sometimes daily. A lot of poor choices back then. Since that time, I've been clean completely of drugs and alcohol for two and a half years and with a lotta healthy coping skills to deal with life in general. But it was that time when I made that decision, it was just about that moment right there. It was kind of a time base, there was a yes, let's do this, so I did.

- Okay. Any further questions? He does.

- No, I don't have any more, do you?

- What do you, do you have anything lined up job-wise? Or do you?

- I'm currently employed. I work through Seek Careers and Staffing. They have me at a temp position with SoftAmerica I've been there since November working full-time. This week I'm actually, they cut back on hours a little bit, but it, the next week, I think we'll swing back by next week. I'm looking probably to go full-time there. I got offer that should be coming up soon, so.

- Thank you.

- Then we'd like to discuss your treatment. You know you have the option to do that in closed or open session.

- Open is fine.

- Okay, so it looks like you're currently attending SOT.

- I am, I have a letter for the Board.

- Okay, perfect.

- It's original. That is from Rebecca, the Facilitator of the SOT program.

- All right, so this is from Attic Correctional Services, Rebecca Curstein. Let's see here. You are in, which group are you in here? So you start at, you must-- are you in like SOT one?

- I think it, I think it's two.

- Two?

- One or two.

- And so you started that on January 7th and has completed 12 sessions, perfect attendance, and homework completion. Actively participate and willing to self-reflect. Followed all your rules of supervision, appear to apply concepts into your lifestyle, take responsibility for your sexual offense, and do not minimize, deny, or place blame elsewhere. You understand your risk factors and healthy coping skills. Do we need to keep that or you want that back?

- If you guys wanna take a look at it then

- So, that's what she tells us. Why don't you tell us what you've learned.

- Healthy coping skills for sure, dealing with stress without using drugs or alcohol, use of positive power. It's rather than drugs, alcohol, and innovative power. And it has been a lot of things I've learned. Obviously, appropriate sexual encounters, but really, the more meaningful relationships are underlying to them. The effects that it could have had on that young man had we actually met, the psychological in particular, how detrimental that can be, and then not only to him, but to myself, to be healthy, making healthy choices for myself with like relationships and sexual encounters and that kind of thing. I'll extrapolate a lot of that from Becca during the time I've been. It's only been 12 weeks, but she's really been a big help.

- And how many sessions are you required to go to?

- 60.

- Okay.

- So a stressful day. When you get home, what, how, what is something you, what's an example of your coping?

- I've learned that working out really is a great way to release the stress. Come home and like a shower and workout, maybe cooking 'cause I really enjoy cooking. It would involve something that I enjoy doing versus just running to drugs and alcohol and the choice that kind of come from that. So like right now, to answer the question, a stressful day, I'd come home, I like to work out, clean the house, do some housework. But the one friend I stayed with has cats so I enjoy playing with his cats and kinda just anything fun that can be distracting.

- And then you also have written down Circles of Support.

- Yes, I haven't attended as much lately because of my work schedule and I wasn't able to get to their meetings. But I have been going religiously from right when I got out of prison and I still make it when I can. They've been a big help as well so as a support meeting on Wednesdays. And it's great for people coming from prison, as you know. They've just been very, very helpful. I have one of the volunteers is here with me today. But they've been helpful not only in offering bus passes and clothes and things, but just that peer mentorship and that support for like affirming that we can do this

integration thing without having to go back into that dark place with drugs, alcohol, and poor choices, and the recidivism that kind of tempts a lot of people back into prison.

- All right. Sorry, this is taking me. I guess I would allow that.

- Before the computer, had you ever met with an underage person before then?

- No, no.

- Any further questions?

- Is there anyone here to speak on your behalf?

- Yes. Name is Roy DeRuyter. Circles of Support. Like he said, he attends whenever he can. He's got a rotating shift, 12 hours, and different days and. But he does participate and he shares, he contributes to what we talk about there. So he's participating as much as he can.

- And how long do you think he's been going there?

- Well, he, right when he got out he started coming.

- Okay.

- I think he was, you were recommended right out of

- Right out of prison, yeah.

- Right.

- It was within a week, I think.

- Yeah, he came right in. That I do remember.

- Okay.

- All right, thank you.

- Yep.

- Okay, does anyone wanna make a motion or anything to talk about?

- I'm gonna make

- Oh, go ahead hon.

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Fish to 334 South Chestnut Avenue for a period of 90 days.

- Is it address-specific?

- Address-specific, yes, for 90 days and then come back and we'd like to see how you're doing at that time.

- Okay.

- Is there a second?

- I will second that.

- Okay, all in favor?

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, so you're approved. You'll have to come back in, let's see, that's April, May, June, July, for our July meeting. Do you want him to? Are you just gonna send him a letter?

- I'll send a letter.

- Okay, and would you like her to send that letter to the 334 South Chestnut?

- Yes, that would be perfect.

- Okay, perfect.

- Awesome, thank you very much, ladies and gentlemen. Have a good day.

- You too.

- Thank you.

- Next appeal is George Santos. Okay, Mr. Santos. It looks like you are, well, it looks like you're currently living at 1713 Amy Street. How long have you been living there?

- 10 years.

- 10 years? And you're just now coming before us?

- No, I ran into some trouble for disorderly conduct about arguing with my wife. And she put me in jail and now I'm here.

- How long were you in jail for?

- Two, three days, I guess three days. I'm out there too.

- Have we ever approved you before to live there?

- Once, I guess. I don't remember that. It was too long ago.

- No.

- No, he had, he had this as his first time appearing before the Board, according to the master spreadsheet.

- Oh, okay.

- And recently, a community police officer told him he couldn't live there. We received his application, but I don't have any record of him ever applying or appearing before the Board.

- Okay. What was your, what was your offense? You didn't fill that part out. I mean this application is pretty blank.

- 1992?

- 1992, first degree sexual assault of a child.

- Okay. George, do you remember what happened when you were arrested for that?

- Oh, I thought it was a birthday.

- Okay, just remember not to talk about the name of the victim or the relationship. Okay, thank you.

- It was my son's birthday and I invite my neighbors. But they got a little upset because this neighbor wanted this middle house to his brother. But I had the money in my hand to get the house. And the owner of the house was there too. And he told the other guy, do you got the money for the deposit and the rent? And he say no. And he told me, what about you? Yeah, I got the money. He well, first come, first serve. So my son, two years birthday, I invited my neighbors. They came home, all came up. And I thought two, two years old. So that girl we're taking care of, like babysitting. The only thing I did to that person is hugged her. And that's all it took.

- You hugged her? And then what happened?

- Nothing, but it happened then. So they went into a, then I got arrested. But I was working at Larson's Company, years ago, Larson's. And when I got home, because I work days, and my wife, my ex-wife worked daytime. So the only thing I did to the girl to thank you for taking care of my son, and that's all I did. But I was sitting down on the bench and they were playing so I hugged a girl with my mom was there, everybody was there, even my neighbors were there. So the whole, but nothing happened until after work when I came back about a week ago from work, to come here a week. And I say to policeman, come in you're under arrest. So I went to jail. I did my time.

- How much time did you get?

- I think it was 18 months.

- In the county jail? Or did you go to prison?

- I went to prison, yeah.

- And how old was the victim?

- I think she was around 10 or 12, I don't know.

- And how old were you?

- Think about 30 something.

- Well, so does that sound right?

- So again, this case was so old from the early 90s.

- Yeah.

- Yeah, so the complaint, I was unable to get it right away. With all the criminal we won't

- Yeah. I just have a hard time to believe that you'd get 18 months in prison for just hugging someone.

- I don't remember what. I don't, I went, but I did the time.

- Uh-huh.

- And I've been living there in that house for 10 years. I don't go out anywhere. I don't bother nobody. I don't go out anywhere, mainly with my wife to the grocery shopping. I just stay in my house, make coffee, watching TV all night, all day.

- So you don't work right now?

- No, I'm, I have heart surgery and I'm taking medication for the operation and high blood pressure.

- Oh, you don't have to talk about your medical stuff in public, you, we'll get to that in just a moment here. Officer, do you know why the community police were like involved?

- So he was a domestic disturbance. Wait, it's on the application. Disturbance and they found out that he was a sex offender, name's not registered. I'm questioning whether or not he has lived at that address prior to the sex offender ordinance.

- He would come in? Sure. I'm trying to look up and see what we have.

- Address on Amy Street since 2007

- When his PO contacted me, I looked at what the dates were for being grandfathered in and he had not lived there long enough to be grandfathered in prior to the ordinance passage. I just don't have the dates right in front of me. That's what I'm looking for.

- The charge of first degree sexual assault of a child from '92 would certainly be more than a hug.

- 2007 it looks like he had Sentence 2010.

- So we show October 18th of 2018 was when you had your domestic situation with your wife, okay? Let's see. He must, do you have a son that is in trouble?

- Junior.

- Born in 1970?

- Mm-hmm.

- Okay.

- But he's, he's in jail.

- Okay. It's just gonna take a while to scroll through some of these here to find you. 2007. So in 2007, you also had a domestic violence, disorderly conduct.

- 75 days in jail So another one. Whoops.

-in 2006. Does Seek App not even go back to 1992?

- No, it wouldn't. They would have, they would have purged

- The records.

- The records after, I think it's 10 years.

- Yeah, and then that Auto Gaby has like '92 for civil stuff, but. All right, so it sounds like the officer said that you are not registered as a sex offender. Is that correct?

- I don't know, ma'am.

- Well, he did get a fail to register at one point. I saw that in here.

- Yeah.

- Yes, the first name is spelled differently in '92. It's spelled J-O-R-G-E.

- Oh,

- That's why you're not finding it.

- Oh, okay, well let's take a look there. There we go. Okay. So it looks like you actually had two counts of first degree sexual assault of a child. You took it to trial and you were found guilty.

- Yes, ma'am.

- 42 months in the state prison is what you got.

- What did, you said you hugged her. What did they say you did?

- That I touched her on the wrong things, wrong parts.

- And did you?

- No, ma'am. No, I didn't do that. When the time come to be in the courthouse, those people left the country.

- The victim left the country with her family?

- Yep and they didn't show up to court. Anyways, but I got

- Okay, just a second.

- How long have you been on probation for? How long has Miss Delane been your agent?

- For I think about a month. I think so.

- A month?

- I think so. But now I got another probation.

- Agent Delane reached out to me at the end of January regarding Mr. Santos. So it's been at least since the end of January.

- Okay.

- Well, do you guys have any questions? This is a very unique situation here. I don't even know where to begin, to be honest. Maybe, I wonder if we talk about some of your treatment. Are you okay talking about that in open session or closed?

- About my medicines or what?

- Well, about your treatment, any treatment programs that you might have been in.

- Yeah, yeah, I'm going.

- Yeah, but do you wanna talk about that in open with everybody here or do you want everybody to leave? You have the choice that you can talk to just us or you have the choice where everyone here is gonna be here. What would you like?

- I don't think he understands it. If he speaks espaniol?

- Yes.

- He'd rather have it closed.

- Okay, we'll have to have all of you step out.

- You want my wife to be your translator for him or what?

- Well.

- I have my wife over there too.

- Yes, please. Did you do that?

- Yeah, so.

- Does your wife not interpret?

- She doesn't speak English either.

- Can we have her do this? What, he wants it in closed session.

- He's, my wife's a translator. She speaks both English and Spanish.

- Yeah.

- She doesn't know English.

- But there's like HIPAA violation.

- He's, it's up to him. If he wants her here to translate, then she can be here. If he wants it closed session, then we have to have her step out. And he can speak, he can speak to us the best that he can in closed session or he can have her here if he wants.

- Okay.

- Recollection of what really happened back in 1992?

- No.

- There's not a lot of information that we can obtain on that. It appears, based on your criminal history, you really haven't done much of anything in the last

- 35 years.

- Yeah. And you just pretty much stay at home and watch TV.

- Every day.

- Drink coffee.

- Drink coffee, watch the TV, eat. I don't go, I don't go anywhere like I used to go I don't want, I don't wanna get outta the house. Like in my house, in my house, it's a house, it's a house.

- Okay, how often do you see your probation agent?

- Every Wednesday.

- Every Wednesday? And are those going good?

- Yes.

- Yeah, okay. Do you have a bracelet?

- Yes.

- You do wear a bracelet? GPS? On your ankle?

- Yes.

- Is it lifetime?

- My new, my new agent, his name is George.

- Jomas?

- No, I got it right here. I don't know it. George ...

- Yeah, okay. There you go. Okay, so he's who you see every week?

- Now, I wanna see right now.

- Oh, you have to go tonight?

- Yeah, he called me.

- Okay.

- Yeah, as soon as I'm outta here, I gotta go to him.

- Okay.

- Well, I'm looking at the landlord, whether they've rented for 10 years, they've paid on time every month. He's never had any problems with them. We don't know anything about 1992.

- Nope.

- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Santos to 1713 Amy Street, address-specific, for 60 days, 60 days. Just to see how you're doing. Then you come back.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- Okay, all in favor?

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, so George, we're gonna approve you to stay at 1713 Amy Street for 60 more days. But then you have to come back here. And we just wanna know what you've been doing.

- Okay.

- Okay?

- 60 days is a month?

- Two.

- Two.

- Oh, two months.

- We'll send you a letter to that address reminding you.

- Okay.

- Okay?

- Yes.

- All right, thank you. You're good to go.

- Oh, okay.

- Yep.

- Thank you.

- Okay.

- Sorry people.

- Thank you.

- All right, next on our agenda is Kristopher Wade. Hi.

- Hello.

- Have you ever been here before us?

- No, ma'am.

- Okay, so it looks like you're trying to move to 3117 Tobermory Drive. Is that right?

- That's correct.

- And you're going to be living with?

- My mother.

- Okay. And where are you currently living?

- I'm currently homeless, but I've been staying there just to transition.

- Okay, all right, well as you heard us say, we're gonna ask you to tell us about what you were convicted of, how it came about. We just ask that you don't give any names of the victims or the relationship.

- All right, I didn't have a relationship with any of my victims. I was on the internet and I was on a file sharing website, came across pornography, downloaded it, and the persons depicted in those videos were of underage status. And the police came and came inside my house and said that we know that you are in possession of these items, searched my computer, and charged me.

- Was that a one-time deal that you looked at these files? Or had you been perusing through them?

- I had not even finished downloading all of them completely and they were, there was enough information on the computer where you could see what it was, I guess.

- And was it of child pornography or was it adult?

- No.

- Everything?

- Everything, it was all mixed in there.

- And is that what you were searching for was child pornography?

- I was just looking for pornography in general. I just got, they got mixed up. There was some of it was in there and some of it was legal and some of it was illegal.

- Officer, is that correct?

- Yeah, that's correct.

- Thank you.

- And what did you receive for a sentence for that?

- I was charged with four counts, two to be dismissed and read in and two to be charged.

- And how much time did you get?

- I served four and a half years and I'm currently on four and a half years extended supervision.

- Okay. And when did you get out of prison?

- October of last year.

- And where have you been staying since October?

- I lived in the TLP for a little over three months and then I was forced out and just stayed where I could and ended up asking my mother if I could be there and my probation officer said I needed approval and I am now here.

- Okay. And are you working?

- Yes, ma'am. I currently work at Alive and Kicking Pizza Crust on Walker Drive, which is very close to the address I am asking to be approved for.

- Where exactly is that address?

- It's

- Well, this is Mason. It's, oh, 'cause here's, do you know the east side?

- Yeah, a little bit. I see Challenger.

- Isn't that actually like Alloway Belleview.

- No.

- No?

- Okay.

- Then, yeah, so it's off of Ontario and.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- Any questions for Kris? I'm sorry I'm gonna ask again 'cause I don't remember. Have you looked at child pornography before? Or was this?

- Before my arrest?

- Yes.

- No.

- Have you any pornography?

- I've viewed pornography before I got arrested, yes.

- This was the first time on the computer?

- This was the first time at all. I never had anything outside the computer to look at for pornography.

- Okay. Okay, so then we'd like to you about your treatment. And you have the option to do that in closed or open session. What would you prefer?

- Open is fine.

- Okay. So what kind of treatment have you received, if any?

- At Kettle Moraine, I took a cognitive thinking program, and when I was Red Granite Correctional, I took the SOT treatment program.

- Do you have any documentation that you did that there?

- Yes.

- Is that on there?

- Oh, okay. You gotta scroll so much.

- I know.

- Excuse you.

- God bless you.

- All right, let's just take this one moment.

- Oh, go ahead.

- Did you say we could do this in open?

- Yeah, he did.

- Okay.

- On your SOT, you say Mr. Wade-- They say, Mr. Wade has contact with his mother and brother, but is not sure how much he can rely on them. Why is that?

- Our relationship was sketchy for a while, which is another reason why I turned to pornography for just support or whatever. And I have reconnected with them and working through some of my emotional problems. I'm also in therapy for bipolar disorder and working through that with counseling over at the Community Outreach Center.

- Is your brother older or younger?

- He is younger than I am.

- And are things okay with your mom now that,

- Yes.

- To live with her? And you said you were in a relationship. Are you in a relationship now or no?

- No, I, well, I haven't been in a relationship for over a decade.

- Okay, when was this done?

- What should I write on the back? I'll put this one. That's 2019.

- So when they say you were in, that was a while ago?

- Yeah.

- Okay. Doesn't say that. Okay. Just a second, just gonna read this here.

- Are you in any treatment here in the community?

- I was going to join a group. I have to get more information from my parole officer, but it was something like an after care type of thing and I was looking into that.

- But at this point, it's not mandated for you to go?
- No, it's not mandatory because I completed the treatment center.
- Okay.
- And are you working full-time?
- Yes, ma'am.
- Is that first shift, second?
- I work third shift.
- Oh, third.
- All right.
- Any other questions?
- Do you have anyone here to speak on your behalf?
- My mother is here.

- Okay. You just need to state your name and address for the record, please.

- Sandy Wade, 3117 Tobermory Drive.

- Why don't you tell us about your relationship.

- Things are good now. I was horrified by obviously what happened. I'm here to anybody. I wanna throw him to the wolves, but he's been doing everything he's supposed to do. He's working, sleeps, eats, goes back to work. Yeah, not doing anything he shouldn't be. He's getting treatment. I believe he has a correct diagnosis now and he's been home

- Did you have contact with him while he was in prison?

- Yes, I did.

- A lot or how often would you say?

- We wrote regularly. I went down. I had physical problems so I didn't get there as much, but yes I went to the first one

- Okay. Do you have a father in the picture?

- He's deceased.

- Okay, sorry. The relationship with the brother?

- A little strained. He's taking his time with it. We're all, we're just devastated by this.

- Okay. Okay. Anything else? All right, thank you. All right, if anyone wants to make a motion or have any further discussion?

- I have another speaker.

- Oh, I'm sorry.

- Nope, that's fine.

- Yeah.

- Veronica Corpus-Dax, District two Alderperson. I've had neighbors reach out to me that they are uncomfortable with a sex offender moving into, moving onto Tobermory with the amount of families that live in the area as well as the proximity to McCauliff park. So I'm here representing them.

- Okay. Are you aware of that? How the people in your neighborhood feel? Do you communicate with any of your neighbors?

- I had no idea. I didn't even know there was a park in that area.

- Okay.

- I'm sorry, as a mom, do you, are you aware of neighbors that are concerned?

- No one's said anything to me. I have no idea who knows.

- Okay.

- Do you talk to the neighbors? Do you know them?

- I haven't communicated with anybody besides my mother. I never had reason to. I go grocery shopping and go to work. That's pretty much all I do.

- Are you on any bracelet?

- Yes, I am GPS monitored.

- GPS, okay. All right. Does anyone wanna make a motion or continue talking?

- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Wade to 3117 Tobermory Drive for 90 days.

- Is there something you want him to do in 90 days?

- Well, I guess it just gives time. Maybe you can talk to some neighbors if there's any concerns, just to see how you still are doing with your job, living with mom since things were tough.

- I don't want, I don't want to make them uncomfortable and I feel that if I would approach them with my issues and they have families that it would just be more.

- Well, I guess I'm not saying going up to the door and hi, this is. I wouldn't do that. But just to be maybe open or weather hopefully will get nice and you'll be outside or just to wave hi and whatever. Just, you know what I'm saying, just. Yeah, I don't want you to be going to their doors and not that at all.

- I think if somebody casually walks down the sidewalk or something like that, just acknowledges.

- I'll try and be more open or more, I don't know, seen, noticed.

- Yeah.

- I would just recommend to have that conversation with your PO.

- Okay.

- That she's comfortable with that.

- Well, yes, yes.

- Okay, so that's the motion. Is there a second?

- Yes, I'll second that.

- Okay, all in favor?

- Motion to approve passes unanimously.

- Okay, so you're approved to stay with your mom for 90 days. We will send you a letter reminding you that you have to come back here in 90 days, which I think, what did I say, June, July. July meeting. And we're just gonna check on you, see how you're doing.

- Okay, do I have to put in another review slip.

- Nope, nope, we'll just send you a letter, yeah. If you have enrolled in any kind of treatment or anything like that, you might wanna just bring documentation, all that kind of stuff. Okay, you're good to go, thank you. Okay, next on the list we have Chong Vue. And Chong, have you ever been here before?

- Okay. All right, so looks like you're looking to move to 3191 Windland Drive and you want to live with your mother.

- Yes.

- Okay, I'm sorry. Did I ask you if you've ever been here before?

- No, oh yeah, you asked.

- All right, so we're gonna ask you what you were convicted of and how it came about. So if you would like to tell us.

- Okay, I was convicted of child pornography. It was 10 counts. I did four years in and be six years on paper. Basically what came about is I moved back to Green Bay from Oklahoma. I went there for school and when I was working at my job, one of my coworkers was having a hard time so he told me to go out and join him at the bar, which I haven't been at a bar for two years during that time 'cause I stopped drinking. So I had one drink, one drink and then the bartender, he knew her so she started giving me more drinks. And then that's how I got my DUI. I lost my car. Well, I just stopped driving. And then basically, I was home alone all the time, more depressed. I wasn't going out, doing

anything else. And then I started viewing more pornography. And then I started downloading pornography and before you know it, I had stumbled across child pornography. When I was done downloading, it popped up and basically first few times, I was kinda like I'd delete it and wouldn't look at it, but got curious and took over. And then basically the cops showed up.

- Okay, is that accurate? Okay.

- Yes.

- Here's the letter that she wrote.

- Okay, we'll get to the treatment. We'll ask you that in just a moment. So So how long are you on probation for?

- Six years.

- Six years. So you got out of prison when?

- It'd be in June.

- Last June?

- It was January I think. January, yeah.

- Was it of this year? January of this year, you think?

- Yeah, it was January 15th when I got out.

- Okay. All right. And so what have you been doing with your time then since you've been out. Where have you been staying?

- I've been floating around. First, I was at the TLP when I got out, and 30 days there. I went to my mom's to stay for a bit. And now I'm currently staying at my sister's. And I'm trying to look around for a better job so I could get, start paying for like hotels or I guess try to find a place of my own.

- And are you working now?

- Yes, yes.

- Where are you working?

- I'm working at Pioneer Metals. I'm only making \$11.50 right now.

- Is it that your mom doesn't want you to stay there? Is this something that why you're willing to go to a hotel?

- No, I, it was just during that time, I was kind of floating around. But, yeah, she said that she, she's okay with me staying there at her house.

- Oh, okay. Okay.

- All right. All right, any other questions about his crime?

- No.

- No.

- Okay, so we, we'll ask about your treatment and you have the option to do that in closed or public session.

- Oh, I'm okay with open.

- Okay. All right, so you provided us a letter here from Attic Correctional Services dated April 10th stating that you're in the SOT group. You've only attended two sessions of after care. You've been fully participating. You take responsibility for your offense and do not minimize or place blame elsewhere. Do you know how many groups you're gonna have to go to? That you can either go to 16, 20, or 60.

- I'm not sure. I think it's 16 right now.

- 16?

- Yeah.

- Okay. All right, look at that.

- I'm currently going to like a center for, to see a therapist too.

- To what?

- To go see a therapist. My family said it would be good to open up a little bit more.

- Yep.

- And I completed my SOT so.

- And you did that in prison?

- Yes.

- You have documentation there?

- Yeah, I sent for it.

- Oh yeah, yep, okay.

- So you finished that last June?

- Yes.

- Well, can you tell us what you think you've learned through all the treatment that you've received?

- It kinda opened more my eyes to more like reality. I was kinda stuck in my own fantasy world. Basically, when I was viewing those pornography, I didn't see as a vic, like a real person. But I started reading the victim witness letters, I started feeling a little bit more like it's a real person. And basically, when I was going to class, I learned a little bit more about myself. Basically, I was, when I was viewing

it, I was re-offending them. And basically started taking more ownership of what I had done, which was really wrong. At first, I didn't think that so started to open my eyes.

- Okay.

- And besides the pornography, have you been in any other trouble?

- No.

- Any other questions?

- No.

- Do you have anyone here to speak on your behalf?

- No, it was kind of short notice. They all wanted my.

- Okay, you just need to state your name.

- My name's Chris Oatman. I used to stay with him at TLP and I also work with him. So I just kinda wanna, like he said, he's trying to work hard and stuff and find a job and stuff. He was talking to me at work about maybe getting a different job to help pay and stuff. 'Cause he knows I'm staying at the hotel and my whole paycheck's gone so I'm having trouble too. So I just wanted to.

- Kinda going through the same situation.

- Same situation as him so I know how it is and stuff. So it's nice that he has family here where he can stay at. I don't. My family's in Michigan and stuff so I have to stay at a hotel. So it's nice to have family and stuff to support and stuff like that.

- All right, thank you. Okay, would anybody like to make a motion?

- I just wanna, Alderperson.

- Oh, sorry. Sometimes it pops up, it doesn't sometimes.

- Again, here to represent the residents in the McCauliff Park area. They're against a sex offender. No sex offender moving into the area because of the amount of families that live in the area as well as proximity to McCauliff Park. And that he downloaded, deleted some, and then got curious looking at others is concerning.

- Okay, thank you.

- He is sort of just opposite of where So it's justso it's just that the

- Okay, a motion from anyone?

- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Vue, address-specific for 3191 Woodward, sorry Windland Drive for a period of 90 days and then if you could come back and we'll revisit and see how things are going for you in your classes and

- Okay.

- Where you're at, if you got a new job.

- Okay.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second that motion.

- I'm having technological difficulties sending your votes.

- I haven't gotten mine yet.

- I'm not sure this was the best.

- Me either.

- I prefer the paper copies. I write notes all over it. You can tell we're We're just waiting for that to see what happened.

- Three or four page.

- So the motion was?

-these addresses.

- Who initiated the motion?

- Cathy.

- Okay.

- All right, the motion should go through.

- I'm beginning to think it's me

- Has your vote popped up?

- No.

- You wanna do a voice vote?

- Yes.

- You're voting yes?

- Mm-hmm.

- All right, motion passes two to one.

- Okay, so you're approved to stay there for a period of 90 days. Right, 90? And then you're gonna have to come back here and we'll wanna see how you're doing, how you're doing in group. So make sure you bring us some documentation for that, okay?

- Okay.

- All right then, Deanna will just mail you something in the mail.

- Okay.

- All right, thank you.

- Thank you.

- Okay, next on the agenda is Christopher Oatman. Oop, what happened there? I think just saw something pop up like you wanted to vote. Oh, okay. All right, Christopher, you've been here before, correct? Okay. So you kinda, when was the last time you were here?

- 2015, I think it was.

- Okay. And we approved you to live where at that time?

- The same building that I'm trying for now, but a different apartment.

- Okay, and what happened? Why did you not, why are you not in that apartment anymore?

- Because I got revoked for breaking the rules so I was, bought, took pictures of neighbors and other people like in a store and stuff and then I had pornography and I was, had a cell phone I shouldn't have had. And that's how I got so.

- All right. Why don't you tell us what you were originally convicted of.

- First degree sexual assault in 2001.

- And what happened and how old were you?

- I was like 30. It was a step-daughter.

- We don't want relationships.

- She was, I think it was 12 years old. And before, when I, 'cause I met at my wife and stuff and at first there was no connection or whatever, but having being comfortable around her a lot and stuff, I got too comfortable and then just. We used to play video games and all that stuff so I got more connected, which I crossed the line and stuff. And I ended up going into her room when she was asleep and masturbated and videotaped her while she was asleep and touched her.

- Okay. Was that a one-time deal?

- Well, yeah, at that time yeah. But before, like I said, the grooming and stuff and just playing a video game with her and getting comfortable.

- And then how did that come about? How did you get arrested?

- She ended up seeing the video tape and she told one of her friends at school and her friend was, I think her dad was a cop or something.

- Okay.

- And how was it found out for your revocation this time with the video tape being in the.

- Oh, I had a tamp on my bracelet, but it wasn't. And I got for the jail time. For like three days, called my PO came out Monday and they brought me home and they're gonna take me off of it, but then when I got home, she was gonna search the room, and I told her everything. Well, I told her I had underwear there and I wasn't supposed to have that. And then the phone rang and that message fell out the phone.

- How long were you out before you got revoked?

- About a year.

- Okay. What made you do it the second time?

- Well, at first, it started off just to have a phone and to get ahold of my family. They said they're not so that was the main purpose. And then, I just got the internet so playing video games and stuff and then it just progressed.

- And have you gone, well, hold on. Any other questions about his crime? Okay. Can we talk about your treatment in public or private?

- Yes, ma'am.

- Okay. So you've gone through sex offender treatment?

- Yes.

- And how long have you gone through that?

- Well, I completed in my first, when I first got locked up in 2002, somewhere around there. And it was kind of a like coping emotions. And i did the homework and all that stuff and I learned like what not to do and what to do and stuff in situations, but I didn't apply it to my life. And then when I got out, I did the Jim Drake Family Services. And with that group, I always kind of felt like he was trying to get me to say stuff that didn't happen or he was like real strict towards everything so I didn't open up. It was more like attacking me, how I felt. And I've talked to my PO and stuff. They all know that I'm not good at that stuff. So I feel like when I get defensive, I don't say nothing. And so I still did that. I did the after care after that when I got locked up. And then I also completed, well not completed, but I did the Attic whatever we was doing last time, but I only did it for a couple weeks and then that's when I got arrested. And then now I'm in the SOT four in Appleton with Marshall. I've been there, I think, four Mondays now.

- Why you going all the way to Appleton?

- Because they don't have enough people in group to have one here at Green Bay so I have to travel. And with my stay at the Economy Inn and stuff, it's kind of hard for, I have no money.

- Okay.

- So I have to pay for gas. 'Cause I talked to my PO like when she first put me in group and stuff. 'Cause now that I have a job, she put me in group and stuff. And I told her, I said well, I just can't do it. If I'm living at the hotel, that's my whole paycheck. How am I going get food, gas? I mean there's just no way i can afford this. And right now, my mom and my dad and stuff are helping me with money and stuff so. Otherwise I would be on the streets too.

- Any other treatment questions?

- I'm just having a hard time knowing you've been through so much treatment to then start to videotape and do all that again.

- And like I said, it's, I didn't apply it to my. I could go through treatment for the rest of my life and they're gonna tell me the same things of how to deal with it. But once I apply it, that's when it starts working and that's what I'm doing now. My PO, everybody that you can, my family, everybody that you talk to, I'm more open, and I'm discussing it, and bringing up stuff, and it's not like I'm hiding it. So that's what I've changed prior to this. And that's a change, not just for me, but for everyone I see.

- Okay, I'm sorry. How long have you been at the SOT four?

- About four weeks. 'Cause I had to wait for me to get a job and then I got

- Are you on a bracelet?

- Yes.

- It looks like now you're on life time.

- Supervision.

- Supervision?

- That was after I did my

- Revocation?

- First sentence of the four and the 10 After I did that, then I went into lifetime supervision. So them are all discharged, or not discharged, but my mom just

- You're looking to move to Badger Street.

- I live there.

- You did live there before, yeah.

- This is the third time renting same landlord. If he's willing to, I've been, like I said, paying rent on time and stuff, kept the place clean and stuff. That's what he liked about me. That's why he's gonna rent to me again. And also, in the past, I didn't know this until now, he said the last time, 'cause I'm an SPN, so the neighbors ended up painting his house or something because of me. That's what he was told. That's what he, like I said, I don't know if they got caught or whatever, and that's why they didn't wanna rent this time. But he said I've talked to 'em and everybody's on my side and stuff and PO and stuff. So everything's, so he's willing to rent to me a third time. And he said it's the same apartment, or the same building, just a different apartment 'cause somebody's occupying that one right now so. I told him, like I said, I'll do the same thing, cleaning and stuff and 'cause I was vacuuming hallways, picking up the garbage, and sweeping and stuff all outside and took care of everything. They got a basement. I was like mopping the whole basement and everything. So I wanted to dust

- Just for you guys to know, there is already a sex offender living in that apartment building. And then we do have somebody else who wants to, a gentleman coming in later, that same apartment building.

- I'm just gonna be honest. I have some reservations. You did exactly what you did to get arrested the first time and it didn't take you long to do that. I always feel that if someone's willing to rent to you, I like to be able to give you that benefit of the doubt 'cause I know how difficult it is.

- Yeah, very difficult to find and rent. And this from, you know everybody.

- I know.

- There's just nobody.

- But that's the part that makes me nervous is that you did the videotaping and then all of that. But I do understand about you have to be able to accept the treatment versus anybody can tell you to go to treatment and if you don't take it for what it's worth, you're not gonna get anything out of it. So I'm glad that you're at least able to recognize that now. That's kind of my two cents right now.

- And then I have a letter.

- Oh, you have something there.

- Well, I got one from my pastor, my uncle, my brother, my mom, and then a friend of mine, the family. It's my dad and my friend that's been always here too.

- Okay. Do any of you wanna speak on his behalf?

- I think that Chris is correct in saying that

- Could you come up?

- Yeah.

- Sure.

- Give your name.

- Here, I'm gonna just pass these down.

- My name is Joe Hornier and the letter you have in hand right now is the one that I wrote.

- Okay.

- And I can speak to the fact I've know him all his life. And he's had some, I would say, the psychological issues in his life have been more, led him to where he's at today. And I think he's recognizing that. And he's taken God as his partner. And I think that's steered him pretty well. He's more outward now with things and he was inward before. That may have been what led him to what he did.

- Okay.

- And I haven't seen much of Chris, of course, because he's been incarcerated some time so, but I do notice a marked difference in him.

- Okay, thank you.

- Anyone else speak?

- No.

- So right now, we're just reading letters that he has provided us from various people talking about his character.

- As they're reading those, let me just ask you-- So, I'm sorry, who are the other people with you here?

- My dad and his girlfriend.

- Oh, and you live in Michigan? Okay, okay. So you have no family members here in the Green Bay area. Okay, all right.

- That's why I'm living at the hotel.

- Okay.

- Yeah, I was at the TLP for the 60 days or whatever and then I got two extensions. So I was there for a couple months.

- Okay.

- So they all, so they liked me there too 'cause I kept everything and stuff so that's not the issue.

- Yep.

- And then she also said if I have a hard time finding something down the road or whatever, that they might be able to take me back at TLP. So if this doesn't work, that's where I'm headed. I can't afford to stay at the hotel.

- No, I get that.

- I'll be honest. It's just ... To go through all of it and then to do it again is just it's hard to take you serious even though you look serious and it's a serious situation.

- As I said, it's what I'm doing. And I said, what he said, and they all saying that they see it in me, but before I don't know if they saw it in me or not so. They shouldn't have I'm opening up more and I'm trying to get this right so. And also two of my pastors have set up for them to come and see me weekly so. Also they said in group and open up to everybody. I think I wanna They're probably sick of me calling and stuff, telling 'em what's going on every day so.

- No, they probably mean that.

- I talk to everybody all the time. For the little things, it's not happening big things that I work towards And I like said I've never done any

- That's important.

- It is.

- I'm reaching out to my support group 'cause I have lots of support. And they're all still

- I don't know what to do.

- You've been another very unique situation. As you've kind of heard, we've kind of done some approvals, where they're, we do them for certain period of time, but then that kinda puts you in a rough situation when you sign a lease and

- But I did it last time too so.

- And then you lose out on that.

- That's why I said, I don't want that anymore. I've done all that stuff. I'm tired of doing it.

- How many apartments are in that building?

- Eight, four upstairs and four downstairs.

- So half of them would be with registered sex offenders?

- Well, three 'cause he's gonna take-- This gentleman apparently moved out, moved to here so he's-- You're going to apartment two, right?

- Yeah.

- Oh.

- So he's there. He's listed as being when he's not. So it would be him, if we approve the third guy.

- There is one already.

- Can I ask why that would be of concern?

- Well, we generally don't want-- That's part of the purpose of the Board is so that not one particular area in the city is congregated with sex offenders.

- 'Cause I gotta say it's hard if there's only so many landlords. You only got so many buildings.

- Yep, I know.

- It's hard.

- It sure is. It gives you one more reason then.

- That's what I'm saying.

- It's serious if we make a mistake and approve you, get revoked again.

- Take all that into consideration.

- Okay, I speak for him. He's been a really good.

- You might as well come up here.

- Well, he's been actually a pretty good support group. He's been kinda guiding me through the whole situation right now. And really, I don't really have anybody else that's actually been doing that that's actually knowledgeable enough. And for him to do that, go out of his way and actually kind of help me out, that actually goes pretty far for what he, he's actually a pretty generous guy. So you know. Yeah, and also he's doing all his treatment. He's actually pretty good right now.

- Okay, thank you.

- I'm sorry, where are you working at again?

- Pioneer Metal

- Oh yeah, that's right, 'cause you work with him.

- Is that?

- It's on Broadway by the

- Oh. And I did get hired full-time as of Monday.

- You did?

- Yeah, they were really.

- What shift?

- Third shift with him.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- That's how I communicate

- Do you currently own a cell phone?

- Yes, and it has no, they took the camera out and there's no data on it. My PO's approved it already.

- Okay.

- So that's what I wanted the first time, last time. I'm not saying that I wouldn't have got in trouble still, but I think that would have helped 'cause then, like I said, I have this now and I don't need to go on the internet whether I got the phone for what I need it for, family and all that stuff.

- So what are you gonna do to keep yourself busy so?

- I've got plenty of stuff to do. I've already said that I read the Bible and stuff. I got correspondence classes that I do and stuff. I'm working third shift. See my PO during the day. I do stuff during the day for like-- I like sports and stuff. I watch sports. I do sports stats and just sitting in my room and doing stuff.

- Okay, how often do you see your PO?

- Once a week.

- Office visits, home visits?

- No home visits 'cause I'm not.

- Doesn't go to the hotel?

- Well, she actually, she came to the TLP, I think, two or three times. One time was, I think, scheduled. The other time she just popped in to see how I was doing.

- All right. Does anybody have anything?

- I'm gonna go out on a limb and approve, make a motion to approve you to 1713 Badger Apartment two.

- Thank you.

- Address-specific. For 60 days, come back, show us that you still are getting your treatment.

- I'm gonna second that.

- We'll take a vote.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Great, so for 60 days.

- Thank you.

- Okay. All right, next we have Branden Neidl.

- How many times have I been in front of you guys already?

- I don't even have to ask. So you are looking at moving to 1191 Velp.

- Correct, three bedroom. I just got full placement of my daughter, Nicki, last year. I'm still fighting in the process of getting sole custody of her, my oldest daughter, and that's my wife right there. We have two beautiful children. We just had our other one. She's about to turn two this year, Isabella, so.

- So you need a bigger place?

- Yeah, I'm currently living in a two bedroom townhouse right now on 1809 Shout Avenue Number 10 and I need something bigger. It's got a yard. The landlord told me I can, I could put a fence around the yard for my kids to go play, so the, because the road's so busy right there. I need to put something around there so.

- The one on Velp, you mean?

- Yeah.

- Okay, okay. All right, so when was the last time we saw you here?

- Last year, I think it was in February.

- Okay.

- Or March, February or March. February, Valentine's Day.

- Yep, so fill us in on your little girl's almost two, what else have you been up to?

- My two, my other two, Nicki, the one that's my oldest, okay, she's gonna be four July 1st. About to get her into school this year. My, our first daughter together, Sophia, will be four October 2nd. And my daughter Isabella will be two on September 27th so.

- And do you work?

- I'm on social security.

- Disability, that's what I thought.

- And I work a part-time job with my boss, which is now her boss. She's gonna start working through him now too.

- Okay.

- For a cashier.

- All right.

- So.

- I'm sorry, I forgot to ask if anyone wanted him to kinda go over his crimes. All right. If we wanna talk about your treatment, do you wanna do that in open or closed?

- It's fine if it's open.

- Open, okay. Are you still doing any kind of SOT treatment?

- No I've completed SOT, SOT after care. I've done Thinking For A Change. And that's the three programs I did.

- And did you do that through who?

- All at Attic Correctional.

- And you do Thinking For A Change anywhere?

- No, I completed that and graduated from that.

- And since we last saw you, have you been back in jail at all?

- Since the last time you saw me.

- Here.

- Last February.

- Yep.

- I haven't been in jail since, no, not at all. I've been out of jail.

- Good, good.

- I have downhill once a month now so.

- In jail?

- Oh, I'm down to once, I'm down to once a month and seeing my PO. And I've been out for five years now. Well, August 5th will mark the date I've been out for five years so. I've come a long way. I've been married for two years now. And even my PO could vouch for that if she could be here. I've come a long way in the last two to three years as a person because I'm more open. I'm able, I take care of my kids, I fight for my kids. I do things that other parents out here that won't do. And yes, I've been convicted of the sex crime, but I'm not out here looking for to do that anymore. I'm looking out here to become an established family, take care of my family, and be the man I'm supposed to be, and be a good role model for the community. I don't wanna be one of them people, 'cause I spent seven years in the penitentiary, to go in and out institutionalized. That's something I don't wanna show to the community because there's so much of it happening. And I've seen it in my seven years being in there. Nobody, everybody that was in there expected me to be back and forth through the, through the jails and everything and I haven't. I'm doing what I'm supposed to, follow my rules, I take care of my kids. I do what I'm supposed to.

- Good.

- And that's the thing, like treatment's brought me a long way because it's made me develop all my coping skills I have. With my mental health issues and everything I do have, I got my wife, that's my support right here. Been married two years March 23rd, just passed so.

- I have a really good support network and that's what keeps me going. I got my mom, even though she moved to South Dakota, I got my little sister, Cassie, even though she lives in Marquette, and I have my dad. He's here in Green Bay, even though he's going through health problems right now. After he quit smoking, it's weird to say this, but like even if you do quit smoking, you still could die.

- We're all gonna die.

- I know, but it's inevitable. So I've been through my rough patches in life. I'm 32, I was convicted when I was 20 years old. I'm about to be 33 this year. And you know sitting in seven years of prison, I'll tell you, changed my life, honestly. 'Cause I had to think about everything. What do I wanna do? Do I wanna be in and out of this place or do I wanna be out there making a family and having my own kids? I'm gonna tell you this, I didn't have the mindset, thinking like I'm gonna come out here. I came out here and I was honest to each one of my girlfriends I've ever been with about my crimes and my past and everything. And I didn't expect to find one that would wanna spend the rest of their life with me because I have that type of crimes in my background. I didn't expect that. I didn't expect to have a family, but look at me now. I've been married for two years, I have three beautiful daughters, and I'm fighting in court for full custody of my oldest daughter right now. So I think I'm doing very well.

- You've come a long way.

- I have.

- Okay, last year, you received a ATR from your parole for having, go ahead.

- Which is Thinking For A Change. That's what I did.

- Well, it said because you had a 11-year-old relative.

- Yes, my wife's brother. Yeah, because okay, you remember Erin. Erin Merkel. Yes, so she understood the thing is when everything transferred over, like 'cause I had everything. Like, Erin

knew about him coming over. Just like she had no problem with him coming over. It's, I've been through so many different POs, like eventually, it ended up stopping and they didn't know so I ended up forgetting about it and I was honest about it and they ended up sending me to jail for that. And I did Thinking For A Change and I ended up doing that ATR and I completed it and ever since, I've been doing what I'm supposed to. I call her every day if I have to. If I have problems, I'm calling her. If not, then I'm doing what I'm supposed to if something happens.

- You haven't had any more since then?

- Since that ATR, no, not at all.

- Okay.

- Not at all, not at all.

- Anybody got any other questions?

- No, I didn't.

- Does anyone wanna make a vote or a motion?

- I'll make a motion.

- Okay.

- To approve, I don't remember that name.

- Branden Neidl.

- Neidl?

- Yeah.

- The e is silent.

- Okay. To live at 1191 Velp Avenue, lower, address-specific.

- I'll second.

- Okay, all in favor? It comes up for her. So she has to tell.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- All right.

- All right, can I get a piece of paper at least, 'cause my parole, or Dawn's leaving tomorrow. I'm not gonna be seeing her anymore after tomorrow. I need something showing that I was approved through the Board, if possible. Today, before tomorrow at 11:00 a.m., I have to go see her.

- I can have it for you in the morning, if you can stop by.

- Like what time?

- I can have it for you by 8:30.
- That'll work.
- Okay.
- I'll be down here. Where do I meet you at?
- Second floor.
- Second floor?
- Law Office.
- Oh, right where I met you before, okay.
- All right, good luck.
- Next on the agenda is James Gosse, Goss?
- Goss-see.
- Goss-see, sorry, I apologize.

- That's all right.

- I wanna say something. Because the friend that this man had here couldn't stay here 'cause he does have some issues freezing up and I do wanna say something on his behalf. He does have some issues freezing up, but please take into account that he's trying to speak. So his friend had to leave 'cause he had, he had to be at work at six o'clock.

- Okay.

- So I thought I'd say something.

- Thanks, Branden.

- No problem.

- All right, James, have you ever been here before?

- Yes, ma'am.

- Okay, and let's see. So you are looking at moving to the 1730 Badger Street number six, gonna live by yourself.

- Yes, ma'am.

- And can you tell us what you were convicted of, what had happened, what happened?

- Well, it was child enticement that I got written down here. If that's all right.

- Sure, do you wanna read it to us?

- Sure.

- Okay.

- I had responded to an ad on Craig's List about wanting to share the air conditioning with someone. We communicated for a while before she told me she was 15 years old. He continued his contact, which led to a sexual conversation. She asked me to meet her at a place and I stupidly agreed to meet her at a place she decided on. And when I got there, I was arrested.

- Okay. When did that happen?

- I believe back in 2015, 2016.

- Okay. And do you recall what you got for a sentence on that?

- Four months in jail.

- How long on probation.

- Five years.

- Have you been in jail in any other trouble?

- No, that was my first time and it's my last.

- What were you thinking that you wanted to do when you met this person?

- I wasn't thinking at all.

- Did you think you were gonna do something? Plan on doing something?

- I thought something would happen, yes.

- Okay.

- All right, so you were actually convicted out of Shawano County.

- Yes.

- How come you're here in Brown County?

- Because I have employment here.

- Okay.

- Is that the curative?

- Yes, ma'am.

- All right, so we saw you back in April and August, 2018.

- And then you just, you started working there in December? Is that correct?

- December 10th, yes.

- Okay.

- What else do you do besides work?

- I spend time with my parents, go for walks, and play video games, and keep doing about anything to keep me occupied and.

- Do your parents live here in Green Bay?

- No, they don't. They live in Seymour.

- Okay.

- I'm kinda confused as to what actually happened on August in '18. Did he, he was denied?

- Right, I approved him and then no one seconded and then they denied.

- Okay. All right.

- Can I just say one thing? I am currently living out of my car for like two months now. So it would be really nice to have someplace to call home and get my life back on track and back to society.

- Do you know either of the gentlemen who were here today that wanna go to that address also?

- No, I don't. I don't know either one of 'em.

- Does anyone, oh do we wanna talk about treatment? Did we talk about that?

- Do you have a?

- Yeah, so we'll ask you some questions about treatment. Do you wanna do that in open or closed?

- This is fine.

- Open is fine, okay. So are you in any treatment? Have you completed treatment?

- I have not completed treatment yet. I have, I am in treatment though for unfortunately for a year now.

- And what kind of treatment?

- Attic treatment for sex offenders.

- Okay.

- Why unfortunately?

- Because it's taking me longer than I expected it to.

- And why is that?

- Because I'm trying to, trying to learn everything and get support and stuff from everybody.

- And are you discouraged? Is that why you're saying that or?

- A little bit. I shoulda had it done with by now.

- Yeah, but I mean they could do classes all the way up to 60 classes.

- Oh.

- So, I mean there are people who do them for, what is that, I don't.

- Over a year.

- Yeah.

- I did not know that, okay.

- Do you feel that they're helping you, the classes?

- Yes, I do feel that that.

- All right, I mean it seems like where Becca says you're consistent in your attendance and that you do ask questions to gain an understanding of the concepts.

- Yes.

- Do you like 'em?

- Yes, a lot.

- You're just discouraged 'cause it's taking long. Is that it?

- Yeah.

- But if you like 'em, why do you care?

- I don't know. Good point.

- You work from 2:00 to 7:30?

- Yes.

- Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday?

- Yes, right now until I finish classes and then it would be including Thursday.

- Okay.

- Does anyone wanna make a motion or discuss any further?

- Oh, hold on a second.

- Is there somebody here who wants to speak on his behalf or against him?

- I think that was the guy that had to leave.

- Oh, yes, that's right Andra, okay. Okay, do any of us care to make a vote or.

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Gosse.

- Yes, ma'am.

- To 1730 Badger Street Apartment six, address-specific.

- Is there a second?

- I will second that.

- Okay, we'll take a vote.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, so you're approved to live there at 1730 Badger Street Number six. If you choose to move from there, you do have to come back and see us again.

- Okay.

- Okay?

- Thank you guys very much.

- All right, good luck.

- You don't know how much it means to me.

- All right, next on the list is Christopher Jamroz. And have you been here before the Board?

- Yes.

- Okay. So it looks like you're currently living in Denmark and you wish to move to 119 South Maple, second floor? Is that correct?

- Right.

- Okay, let's see, what was the last time you were here?

- About a year and a half.

- And do you remember where you were living at the time?

- On Chestnut.

- And we approved you for that?

- Yes.

- And then why did you move to Denmark?

- I did get revoked. I was at the gym. I met a woman by the name of Sally. She had, to become, she's never been in trouble. She was in the Army Reserves to be a cop. I thought it would be a really healthy relationship. She had a three-year-old. I notified my agent. My agent was okay with me being with her as long as I didn't have contact with her child. I ended up basically falling in love with Sally. I did end up staying at her house. Basically they incarcerated me for that based off of her brother

wrote a statement to my PO and I refused to give a statement. And that's ultimately what ended up me getting revoked.

- And how long did you get for that?

- 14 months.

- And do you still have a relationship with Sally?

- I asked her to marry me. She became my fiance and that's when I went to Dodge. Her and I broke up. I went through my storage unit within the last two weeks and found the ring and it was really hard for me. She gave me a bunch of boxes of my clothes and stuff and I really started crying. But she said she met somebody else and I guess it just wasn't meant to be. I learned, obviously, it's probably a better idea to find somebody without kids. And I learned from my mistakes. And if I do have a relationship with somebody with a kid, obviously I need to go through the proper steps to get it approved.

- Do you guys wanna hear about his crime?

- Yeah, just give.

- Yeah, do you wanna give us refresher on what you were convicted of.

- I was charged with five counts of, five counts of child pornography and attempted third degree sexual assault. I did not sexually assault this woman. I did plead to a misdemeanor because my attorney told me at the time that I would have to take all the charges to trial 'cause they consolidated 'em all together. And I didn't wanna go to trial so I took a deal. I fully admit I had 136 images, I believe, that went to that child exploitation. And they found that five of them were actually of a child. And I had been sexually attracted to the images and I did, I went through-- Well, don't you have to do the treatment thing?

- Well, yeah, if you. Do you want to talk about treatment in public or private?

- Yeah, it's fine. I'll just talk about it openly. I did complete SO two at RS unit. I also completed anger management and this was at Kettle Moraine. This was just recently. I also, I think that you've got copies of all these too. I was an alcoholic for a number of years and I think that's probably a big thing of what led to all the pornography and I really fell down a heck of a slope and I'm going through the proper things to try to change my life. I think I have a totally different output. I just, I'm actually fighting my case under certain things. I got my internet back. They took my internet away from me completely. I petitioned Hank Fish and I asked him if I could have internet with agent's consent so I can use the internet to advertise my roofing business. I've been, I've been roofing since 2010. Before that, I was a welder so. I do have my driver safety plan completed. I took AODA off of Hershland Drive.

- 'Cause you have some OWIs on your record? Is that correct?

- Correct.

- And yeah, it's been a long time since I've had a drunk driving. In fact, I haven't had a drink since 2012.

- Very impressive.

- Are you still tested for drugs and alcohol, or not, yeah, alcohol?

- Oh yeah.

- You are? Okay.

- If I was drinking, you'd know. I'm that type of drunk that blacks out. I wouldn't make it a week at the most.

- And are you still going to the gym?

- Yeah, I re-upped my membership. I'm currently at Anytime Fitness. I ran into a whole bunch of people that I was working out with before. All the personal trainers are still there so I'm making friends fast again. I would assume that they're gonna wanna put me back in after care and I'm 100% for that.

- Okay.

- But that's always good at building skills and I've learned all this stuff like I use the API model the most, which is to be like aware of what's going on around me, to predict the harm that any situation that you would put forward of how it affects the people around you and to intervene on whatever the situation would be.

- Okay.

- As you, I do have somebody behind me. This is Steve Finlay. He is gonna be my landlord. Him and I have been best friends for a number of years. I've done many roofs. In fact, he hooked me up with Eric, who was my previous landlord off of Chestnut. And then he hooked me up with Mike Wizcoff who is in a different real estate agency than him, but I've done, I think I did four jobs for him last year when I was out and I was doing really well. In fact, they kicked me off of after care when I made, I don't know, it was a lot.

- Good.

- They booted me, you gotta go

- Yeah, okay. Well does anyone have any questions? Or does he wanna come up and speak on your behalf?

- Sure.

- Hello.

- Hi.

- My name's Steve Finlay. I'm at 555 Van Avenue in De Pere. And I've know Chris's family for about 15 years and Chris a little bit less than 10. We all know he's made some very poor decisions along the way, but I do believe deep down he's a good person. And I know for a fact, he's a very hard worker and I'm here to give him a chance. I believe in him, otherwise I wouldn't be here. And I certainly wouldn't open up the door to an apartment on one of my properties to have him live if I didn't believe that. And I do have a partner on this property and he was here earlier for a little bit more than two hours, but he had to leave.

- Okay.

- And I currently have a delivery set on Tuesday in Cecil, Wisconsin. And Mr. Finlay has got the apartment that I'm moving into needs about a half a roof so I will be doing that shortly after I get this one in Cecil done.

- Right, and I guess along those lines, I know people from time to time that needed services and so I'm able to get him work along those lines as well.

- Okay.

- And I'll say, I guess, to that point, when he was previously, there were several jobs that I had gotten him and 100% was done properly, accurately, and to the satisfaction of the customer without any complaint.

- Good.

- Good, yes.

- I will say that a parent in my previous landlord said that he received text messages from prior tenants that were living in my unit saying that they were worried that I was a sex offender and that they were worried because there were actually two families living in my apartment building that you approved. After about six months of living there, they actually texted Eric back saying that he's a great guy and we trust him 100%. In fact, I've been in contact with Eric. He's got a roof for me up in Oconto I gotta go look at and it's just a little section and I guess it's like right across the street from the Fire Department.

- And Eric has confirmed that with me. He's a personal friend that owns rental properties and he said he would not hesitate to rent to Chris in the future should the need arise.

- Okay, thank you.

- Thanks. All right, does anyone wanna make a vote or motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve, Jam, how do you say your last name?

- Jamroz.

- Jamroz, thank you, to 119 South Maple, address-specific.

- Second floor.

- I'm sorry?

- Second floor.

- Second floor, thank you.

- And is there a second?

- I'll second that.

- Okay. We'll take a vote on that.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, you're approved.

- Thanks a lot.

- Yep, good luck.

- Appreciate it.

- Okay, next on the agenda is Anthony Kohel. All right, you've been here before.

- Yes.

- All right and you are looking-- Oh, you're currently at 1315 East Walnut?

- Correct.

- And why are we, are we seeing you again? Did we ask you to come back?

- Yes, you asked me to bring a letter from my probation officer.

- When was that?

- Last month.

- Oh, okay.

- I've been performing employment also.

- Okay, all right, let's see what you got.

- The letter, I was not able to get so this is all.

- Okay, what did we ask for? A letter?

- How can we not see that on here? Like what we asked for?

- It's in his, the letter line

- It says that and so we should have that.

- Yeah, you should have that. It should be very first.

- Is that the first letter?

- Please bring documentation of employment as well as a letter from your parole officer.

- I never read that, sorry.

- I know, I just look at the address. Okay, well, and I, your agent wouldn't give a letter?

- No.

- Yeah, I think that the DOC does not really want to. I think there's some guidelines that they can't. Okay, but so you have a 45 day review here from his employer.

- And I had just recently, yesterday matter of fact, had my 90 day review and with that came a raise, but I wasn't able to get that because it went straight to HR after I signed it. And I wanted to bring that.

- Okay, so now we have a letter, a 45 day review from services, plus his date range of punch in and punch outs from January 2nd to April 8th, and then direct deposit slips.

- Okay.

- And I'm also enrolled in the benefits package that they offer, both me and my daughter so she's covered as well. 'Cause I mean she's into a lot. She takes gymnastics at the Croc Center and her mom, I mean, her mom gets, I think, it's Badger Care or whatever, but now with my employment and my insurance, if something were to happen, God forbid, she would be covered.

- Okay. So that was all we needed. Okay, do we need to revote then?

- Yeah, 'cause he was only approved for 30 days.

- Oh, I see. Okay, does somebody wanna make a motion then?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Kohel to 1315 East Walnut, number three, address-specific.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second that.

- Okay, all in favor?

- Motion passes unanimously.

- All right, good luck. If you decide to move from there, you do have to come back.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- Thank you very much.

- Thank you. Next we have Alex Beard. Alex Beard? Okay, does someone wanna make a motion?

- I will make a motion to deny Mr. Beard 1840 10th.

- Was he just coming back to be approved?

- He's requesting to move to.

- Okay, then I deny 1840 10th.

- Is there a second on that?

- I'll second that.

- All in favor?

- Aye. I can't help it.

- So this is a motion to deny. A yes vote is to deny.

- Yes.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Daniel Konshak.

- Hello.

- Hello.

- Hi.

- You've been here before, correct?

- Correct.

- And let's see, you are looking to move to 1241 and 1/2 Cedar Street.

- I'm living there now, yes.

- Oh, you are living there?

- It's just a recheck, isn't it?
- He was approved for 90 days back in January.
- Oh, okay, all right. So what did we need to check here? The letter didn't say it.
- The letter did not say.
- You just wanted to.
- I wasn't at that meeting so I don't know.
- Oh.
- And it wasn't in the minutes.
- Okay.
- It was just because I was revoked so you wanted to give me 90 days just to see how I adjusted, settled in and adjusted.
- All right, well how have you been settling in and adjusting?
- Pretty good.

- What have you been up to?

- I've met a few of the neighbors and they've been all right with that.

- Okay.

- Have you been in any trouble in the last 90 days?

- No, I'm still working full-time.

- And where is that at?

- American Foods.

- Okay, good.

- Working 55 to 60 hour weeks and I go to Circles of Support on Wednesday nights. And I go down to Appleton on Monday nights for SOT.

- Wow, okay.

- And as soon as Marshall can find a place in Green Bay, he's gonna move the groups to Green Bay. He just can't find a venue to hold 'em. He has the same problem with finding a meeting place as we have finding apartments. Not if he says they're for sex offenders, well, we don't have any.

- Oh.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- Anyone wanna make a motion?

- So I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Konshak to 12

- Keep going.

- 1241 Cedar Street.

- And a half.

- And a half.

- And a half, yes.

- I'll second that.

- We'll vote.

- I hit the wrong button. Can you tell that? Can you tell I hit the wrong button? I gotta join the meeting now.

- Oh, okay.

- Yeah.

- Do you wanna give me a voice vote then?

- Yes.

- Yes is your vote or yes, you'd like to?

- Yes is my vote.

- Okay. Motion passes unanimously.

- All right.

- Thank you.

- Good luck.

- Have a nice night now.

- See, I did it again.

- Do I gotta? Okay, somebody gotta call the meeting to dismiss. Hold on, where am I at? I gotta get back in there again.

- Next meeting date is May 8th.

- May 8th?

- At four o'clock.

- Four o'clock?

- Same place. And then we need a motion to adjourn.

- Can I first make a request?

- Yeah.

- On the landlord letters, could we have a date? Sometimes there's no date. Like could we, they'll do their own landlord though, don't they.

- Sometimes we get their own. I don't what their-- Sometimes I do get a letter just typed up.

- That form letter is from DOC. They give that to their clients.

- I've just noticed that some don't have a date on them so when did they sign this?

- Yeah.

- I almost wonder if they revise the application and do that.

- There are some changes that they do like to make to the application so we can work in for the landlord letter. You're looking for the date that the landlord is signing.

- Yes.

- Yes.

- And maybe another suggestion too is like with that, was it George Santos, like nothing was spelled out.

- Yeah, it was weird.

- Could we just deny that right off the bat? Like we don't even put him on the agenda?

- If there's no description of the offense, that should.

- Yeah, I know, I know, I understand.
