VERBATIM MINUTES

- All right your good.
- Okay. We'll call the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board to meeting. We'll first take roll call.
- Looks like everybody's logged in. I don't think I have to send any of these so, move on.
- Oh, okay. All right then, we need an approval of the agenda from the May 8th, 2019, meeting.

- So moved.
- Second.
- All in favor.
- Still waiting for Heidi.
- Mike, nothing popped up.
- Nothing popped up? Do you want me to manually do yours?
- Sure. That's a yes.
- Okay. Alright, passes unanimously.
- Okay, then we need an approval of the minutes from April 10th, 2019 Sex Offenders meeting.
- I'll make that motion.
- Is there a second?
- Second.
- All in favor.
- Aye.
- I say aye.
- Did that pop up for you Heidi?
- Uhuh, this is the one I had last time.
- Are you voting yes?
- Yes.
- Alright, vote passes three approve and one abstention.
- Alright, we will get to regular business. The first person that we are going to hear today is a Michael Perrigo which we need to make a phone call.
- Baker, Lindsey.
- Hi this is Heidi Michel with the Green Bay Sex Offenders Residency Board. We're here to have a conversation with Michael Perrigo.
- Yes, I have him on speaker phone in my office.

- Okay. Michael?

- [Michael] Yes.

- Hi, you're with the Green Bay Sex Offender Board, right now. We are going to hear your appeal, a couple of things, when you talk about your crime, we ask that you not refer to the victim by name or relationship.

- [Michael] Okay.

- And when we discuss your treatment, you have the opportunity to go in closed session or remain in public session.

- [Michael] Okay.

- Do you know if you'd like to do that, make that decision now.

- [Michael] We're fine just the way we are.

- Okay, alright so, you're looking to move to 1206 Marshall Avenue, is that correct?

- [Michael] That is correct.

- Okay, do you want to tell us about, what you were convicted of.

- [Michael] Commercial sexual exploitation of a child.

- Can you explain that.

- [Michael] I posted a picture on the internet and she was, I found out pretty much after I had met her that she was a 15 year old runaway. She had told me she was 18, she was on adult websites, she trying to get from the location she was at, in Newton, Kansas, to Kansas City, Kansas. I told her I would help her out, 'cause she said her mother had kicked her out. And I said after a couple of hours of chatting with her, I would come and get her, she said she would stay at my house until Saturday, I picked her up on Wednesday night. Nothing sexual happened 'til the night before she left. And that was, she had given me oral sex. Again, I had no clue she was a 15 year old girl. I would never do something with a child, it was not the way I was raised. And three months later, as I said, I got a knock on my door, and it was the Andover Police Department, and they had a search warrant. They took every electronic device I had, and searched them for any child pornography, or movies, or videos, or anything like that, pictures. There was nothing on any of it, that's the gist of it. I served eight months or seven months, I believe it was in county jail, two months in out RDD Unit, and then six and a half months in Lansing Correctional Facility.

- And how old were you?

- [Michael] I was, it was a year and a half ago, so I would have been 46, 47 sorry, I think.

- And so you, did you know this girl?

- [Michael] No I did not.

- So, how did you obtain a picture of her?

- [Michael] I was on an adult website and she was on there and she messaged me asking for help to get to Kansas City.

- Okay.

- [Michael] And she had profile pictures on there and when she got to my house we took a picture together. Just sitting there on the couch. And that's how I had a picture of her.

- Okay. So, how did it, how were the police notified?

- [Michael] I honestly do not know that. The only thing I can tell you about it is, she was involved with a sex trafficking type situation out of Wichita, and I found this out when I was sentenced. And three gentleman are actually in prison for life because of that. I'm assuming she got picked up as a runaway and had my picture on her phone and that was how I got involved in it.

- Can you give me a little bit more information about this type of the website that you were on, when you made contact this individual.

- [Michael] It was called Meetme.com. It's just a general social site, like, almost like Facebook I guess.

- No, it's not like Facebook, it's not Facebook.

- [Michael] No, it's not Facebook, it's just a general,

- No. you can send people private messages.

- Okay, what is the purpose of this website?

- [Michael] To have conversations. It is not a dating website or anything like that.

- What's the reference to "meet me"?

- [Michael] I'm assuming, make new friends. I was just on there, I've been on there for a couple of years. Talk to people all over the world.

- Okay! And so you'd never met this young woman before, correct?

- [Michael] I did not.

- And you drove, how far to pick her up?

- [Michael] Another half hour or so.

- How many miles?

- [Michael] Maybe 35'ish, 40.

- Okay, and never knowing her before you decided to go 35 miles and pick her up and allow her to stay in your home.

- [Michael] I did yes.
- Did anyone come with her?
- [Michael] No, she was by herself.
- And did she remain in your home for those entire three days?
- [Michael] I was working, but my office at the time was connected to my apartment. So, she was alone by herself for a few days, not like for hours and hours on end, but I mean I could walk in back and forth between my office and my apartment.
- Okay, I'm not asking about where were you, I'm asking about where was she the entire three days.
- [Michael] In my living room, or sleeping in the bedroom. I mean she could do what she wanted. I just had a little one bed apartment.
- And during that period of time did she have any visitors?
- [Michael] She did not.
- Did she have any contact with anyone else?
- [Michael] She talked to people through her phone.
- Okay. And, even though, she told you she was 18 years old, correct?
- [Michael] Yes I did.
- And you were 47 at the time.
- [Michael] Yes.
- And she looked like she could possibly be 18 years of age?
- [Michael] She looked like she could have passed for 25, to be honest with you.
- To your knowledge, is everyone truthful on those dating sites?
- [Michael] No, not everyone is truthful and that's what caused me this situation.
- Question for you, I let you.
- No, you go right on ahead, I got a question.
- When was the last time you were in the Green Bay area?
- [Michael] I moved to Kansas, so it would have been 21 years ago. I seen my mum once, I believe it was nine years ago.

- So, when was the last time you were in the Green Bay area.
- [Michael] 2010, I believe it was.
- And was that just a vacation or did you stay here for an extended period of time?
- [Michael] No, I just come to visit my mother, well my family, and then I came back to Kansas for my job.
- Okay, and so you've been gone for approximately 21 years. Have you maintained contact with anyone in the area, besides your mother and brother?
- [Michael] I have not.
- Do you have any work lined up?
- [Michael] I'm sorry?
- Do you have any work lined up, for when you move here?
- [Michael] I do not, not at this present time. That would have be something I would have to find when I get there and that's just due to the fact that I don't know if I would get the interstate compact or not.
- And what about treatment, sex offender treatment.
- [Michael] I did complete sex offender treatment in Lansing, I do have a certificate of it. I actually completed that three days before I got out. So, that's why you probably do not have a copy of it. I do have a copy of it on my phone, if it needs to be text or emailed, it can be done.
- Have you made any effort, I'm sorry continue.
- [Michael] But I did complete sexual offender treatment.
- Have you made any efforts to find out what additional treatment you can find while you are here in Green Bay.
- [Michael] I have under my conditions, I'm sure I will some sort of aftercare. At the present time I have not made any arrangements. Due to the fact I wasn't sure if I'd be approved. If I am approved I guarantee you, I will make arrangements and attend classes that I need to attend. I have no problems doing whatever I have to do, to make it back to my family.
- I don't have any further questions., thank you.
- [Michael] My brother and mother should also be there somewhere.
- We are.
- It looks like we do have a letter that was dated March 26th, that you were anticipated to finish Honor about April 22nd, your treatment.
- [Michael] Correct.

- Okay.
- Mr Perrigo, you have prior convictions for domestic violence offenses, is that correct?
- [Michael] I do have domestic battery and domestic assault, eight and 10 years ago, yes.
- Okay, and do you have any children?
- [Michael] I do not.
- Do you have any, are you married at this time? I'm asking this question.
- [Michael] I am not married, I am single. And I'm not looking to be with anybody at the present time.
- Sorry, I wasn't asking for those reasons. I was asking to determine whether or not you are gonna have family move with you to Wisconsin, to Green Bay, if you're going to move back.
- [Michael] I'm sorry, the only family I have is sitting in front of you I believe. My mother and my brother. They should be there.
- Yes, thank you.
- [Michael] You're welcome.
- How long are you on probation for, if the interstate compact agreement goes through?
- [Michael] I have lifetime release. So I would be a lifetime I would be monitored and have to check in as often as they want me to.
- Do you know if you're going to be required to wear a GPS?
- [Michael] I am not, my probation officer's actually sitting and she's shaking her head no, that I would not be required. I am, I guess, considered by the court a low threat, from the tests and stuff that I have taken. I'm considered a low threat. But if that is something you require for a period of time, than I will do that.
- That's generally D.O.C who will require that.
- [Michael] Okay.
- Does anyone have any other questions?
- Yeah, I have a question. I'm not sure if I understood this, or if you said this, but what type of business did you have when you were in Kansas City?
- [Michael] I was managing a storage facility at Newhall. and I lived on site.
- Okay.
- [Michael] So, basically like I said, my office was just through a door. And I was able to have free run back and forth to my apartment for lunch and stuff like that. It was just through a doorway.

- Okay, thank you.
- Like he did kinda talk about his treatment. Are you good with his treatment?
- Yeah.
- No further questions from us?
- No.
- Any of you wana speak on his behalf?
- [Michael] I do have Micelle Rodriguez here. She would like to speak if that's okay?
- Parole officer?
- [Michael] No, she's not my parole officer, she's my best friend.
- She's there, in the prison with you?
- [Michael] Yes she is. Well no, I'm not.
- He's not in prison.
- [Michael] I'm in my parole officers office.
- Oh!
- [Michael] Yeah, I been released last Wednesday. So, I'm living at a hotel right now, due to the fact I have no place else to go. And I don't have the money to get an apartment or nothing like that, at the present time, my mother arranged for me to have the hotel until this hearing was taken care of. If I'm approved I'll be going back home.
- Can she speak over the phone?
- Yeah, we can pick it up.
- Okay, your friend Michelle can speak, but she just need to state her name and address for the record.
- [Michael] Okay.
- [Michelle] Michelle Rodriguez, 2625 Southwest Street, Lot 68, Wichita, Canada, 67217.
- Okay, what would you like to say.
- [Michelle] This, what Mike was arrested is not a typical like the way it is. He's been around my 14 year old daughter. Since she's been 10 years old and he has never once tried anything, he has been like a step father to her. Guiding her, stuff like that. But he's not like that, looking for children. That's not like him.
- Okay.

- How long have you known him? It'll be five years, this November.
- And what is the context of your relationship? Is it a prior dating relationship, platonic friends?
- [Michelle] In the beginning we dated. We decided that we were better off, just really good friends. So, we just been good friends. We go out to dinner, when we were able to, stuff like that. We did family things, up until the point where he was never able to do that, and was taken away. And now he is back, it's just been me, trying to help him out a little bit down here. With his mum living in Wisconsin.
- Thank you.
- [Michelle] You're welcome.
- Alright, anyone else want to speak on his behalf? Okay, you can come and step up here. And then you need to state your name and address for the record.
- My name is Bev Seifert, 1206 Marshall Avenue, Green Bay. I'm Michael's mother.
- Okay.
- I'm nervous.
- It's okay, it's fine. We're all laid back here.
- I feel that Michael would have a very good support system in Green Bay. He does have his own room, I signed my house over to my son for various reasons. He knows about Michael and what's going on. I would really like to get him in to Green Bay. I have a few health problems and I'm hoping that he could help me a little bit around the house. What he did, was not the way he was raised. And I'm hoping that, we can get him here.
- Are your neighbors aware that he would possibly be living with you?
- No, I'm a very private person. If I see a neighbor I will say "hi" and that's the extent of it.
- Do you have children in your neighborhood?
- There's a few. I pretty much stick to myself. I have a fenced-in yard and I have a deck back there and that's where we would be spending a lot of our time when he is home and not working.
- Okay. Any questions?
- No.
- Okay, thank you.
- Thank you.
- Oh, I'm sorry Mrs Seifert. Can I ask you a quick question? Do you have any rules in mind? For your son.
- Nothing that isn't the rules he has to follow. No taverns, no drinking. I am not a drinker myself, so I wouldn't expect him to be in my home. I would expect him to go to work everyday. I would expect him to find a job.

That's mandatory in my opinion. Other than that, help me around the house a little bit, with the things that were more difficult for me to do. I'm sure there is more I can think of as time goes by. But not right this second.

- Thank you.

- You're welcome.

- Either of you?

- No, no.

- Her home was approved, she did have someone come in and do the inspection.

- From D.O.C?

- Yes, from here, from Brown County. That was a prior approval, that was done and everything, and passed months ago already, correct?

- Yeah.

- Do you happen to know the name of that agent?

- I have her phone number at home, but I don't have it with me.

- Okay.

- It goes through the D.O.J, right?

- As far as I know?

- It should have been the Department of Corrections.

- Department of Corrections.

- Okay.

- Did you want me to call and.

- No.

- Okay.

- That's not necessary thank you. Okay, does anyone have any questions, or comments, or would like to make a vote?

- No comments.

- Can I just ask, why did you move to Kansas?

- [Michael] I moved here with a female and got a job here, that I was dating at the time. She's actually back in Wisconsin, I decided to stay here, 'cause I really enjoyed it here.

- Okay.

- [Michael] So that's why I'm here.

- Okay, thank you.

- I have one quick question. What type of job would you be looking for?

- [Michael] I can do pretty much anything. I would like to get back into management again. That's what I did for that past five years, when I was at the storage unit. So, I've had 15 years of management experience. Past couple of jobs I've had were all manager jobs, so I would like to get back into that. But I would take any job I could get. To make sure I'm able to help support myself and not have my mother support me the whole time.

- Okay.

- Would anybody like to make a vote?

- Just as a comment. I'm usually less approving of people moving into Wisconsin.

- [Michael] I will do anything I have to.

- Well the thing is, this is a concern of mine too, but so, if he moves in with his mum. That's probably just fine. But at some point he is probably gonna want to move somewhere else. Which is why he come before us. However, it could be hard, its difficult for anybody, any sex offenders, that are living in Green Bay to find a place. So that is going to be a problem.

- [Michael] Can I comment on that?

- Sure.

- [Michael] I will live with my mother until she passes away then if something happens then, I would either, if I am able to stay in the house or if I have to, I would move back to Kansas. But I will stay with my mother, until something happens to her. It doesn't bother me if it was one year or 40 years, I would stay there. Where I belong, doing to help my mother in her age as she passes.

- Can I ask, with your sentencing, were you given any restrictions, like not being on the internet, not having an iPhone, anything like that?

- [Michael] I am not allowed around children. As far as the internet goes, I am not 100% sure. I was told I can't do Facebook and dating sites and stuff like that. But I have no problem staying off all of that stuff. That's not a big deal to me. I do have of course, other restrictions. I'm not allowed to go to parties and stuff like that. General type of offender rules. General type of offender rules. That's no problem, abiding by them rules.

- Do you know, if you are approved, how long the agreement would take for you to get back here?

- [Michael] I'm not a hundred percent sure on that. My P.O is shaking her, yes, My P.O is shaking her, it would be most likely be an immediate type situation. I would have to ask for a couple of days Like an oil change, rotate tires, stuff like that. The engine, rotate tires, stuff like that. It will take. I will be there no later than

Saturday if I was approved. And registered, I would register that day if that was even possible on the weekend, I don't know. I could try to make it on the Friday and register then, if that was the case. I am going to make a motion to approve, address specific, to 1206 Marshall Avenue, for 90 days. That's my motion.

- Alright, I'll second that motion.

- Can I ask a question.

- Not while we're voting. My box didn't pop up. But I'm a yes.

- Motion passes, three to one.

- Okay, Michael you're approved to Green Bay. Address specific for 90 days. After 90 days you'll have to come back before the board. I guess I'm gonna suggest you come back with job information, treatment information, and your probation rules for Brown County.

- [Michael] Thank you so much.

- Okay.

- You answered my question.

- Okay. All right, thank you.

- [Michael] Thank you.

- Bye bye.

- May I ask, what he does when he gets here.

- I'm assuming that his Department of Corrections agent is gonna give him all of the instructions and rules. So, whoever did the house inspection, I would probably contact them.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- Okay, thank you very much.

- Thank you.

- Alright, next on the agenda is, Chester Flowers.

- Come up here?

- Yes please, have a seat up here. Chester, have you ever been before us before?

- No.

- Okay, so, you heard me tell the previous gentleman, when we ask you about your crime, we ask that you not name the victim or the relationship of the victim. So, we'll go ahead and, well let's see first, you're requesting to move to 1065 Bader Street, number 3.

- Number 2.

- Number 2?

- Yes.

- Is that a problem?

- We can make amendments, when you make the motion we can use the correct address.

- Okay. Alright, so if you could go ahead and tell us what happened, what you were convicted of, and how it came about.

- I was convicted of second degree sexual assault of a child. My victim at the time, her age was 15, or around that age, at the time. She was a runaway, she was hanging at the house of my nephews. I made a poor choice, that's the bottom line. I knew it was something THAT I shouldn't do. At the time I had daughters at that age and I would want nobody to do that to my child. So, I take full responsibility for what I did and I'm shamed of what I did.

- And how old were you.

- I believe at the time, because my birthday is in July. I believe I was 49 at the time, going on 50.

- And what did you actually do to her?

- I had sex with her.

- And how did it get reported to the police?

- She left with some people, I don't know their names, I know one of them's names.

- We don't need the names.

- But they took her I think to Marinette, that's up north right?

- Yeah.

- They took her to Marinette and I think her father or somebody lived in Pembine and they took her to the school and the school reported it to the Green Bay Police Department.

- And when the police confronted you about it, did you admit what you did?

- Yes, the police they came and picked me up. They didn't pick me up at home, they picked me up at the Brown County Jail and took me to the Chicago Police Department. And we talked about it and they told me that they had witnesses and things about it. So I signed the statement. I been in treatment basically for the last 18 years. I was in treatment.

- You have the opportunity to discuss your treatment in private, a closed session or public session. Which one would you prefer?

- Public.

- Okay, I just wanted to give you that option. So, before we get to that. So, that offense, I'm guessing that's the one that occurred in Cook County in the 70's.

- No.

- Which is that one, you just told us about. Because it appears you have three separate offenses listed on your application.

- Yeah.

- So the one you just told us about, what year did that one happen.

- In, I think it's 2000 wasn't it.

- Okay.

- But it happened here?

- Yes.

- And they took you to Chicago.

- No.

- Oh I thought you said the Green Bay police department took you to Chicago.

- No, some people took her and then I met.

- Okay, I think we're a little bit. Officer do you have anything on that?

- So, yes, the Marinette Police Department did contact the Green Bay Police Department. I think he misspoke when he said they brought him down to Chicago police department, it was actually Green Bay Police Department that he gave his statement.

- Okay. And everything's accurate as to what he said?

- Yes, what he has said so far is accurate.

- Okay, Alright. Then it looks like you have two convictions in Cook County.

- Yes.

- Can you tell us about the one that occurred in 1981. That one you listed as "attempted deviate sexual assault".

- Is that the one I said, attempted deviate sexual assault.
- And what is that, what did you do?
- It was attempted, they said I, when I attempted to have sex with her. I'd been out drinking and I wanted to have sex with her.
- And how old was she?
- I don't know.
- Okay.
- I think I was about 30 something years old, probably.
- And then you had something that happened in the 70s.
- In 1971, I believe it was in 1971 or 70.
- And what happened there?
- Me and another guy, we sexually assaulted two women. One night after drinking and doing drugs.
- So let's go back to the Brown County case. You were only sentenced to four years.
- Yes.
- For that offense.
- Yes.
- But you're currently on supervised release?
- Yes.
- Is that correct?
- Yes.
- Okay. And that's going to be lifetime for you?
- No.
- No?
- No.
- So if we approve you you're done and off supervised release?
- If I'm approved to live at the address or live in Brown County, yes I'll be off of supervised release.

- Okay. Does anyone have questions about his crimes?

- I do, you say "I feel she was shocked and felt betrayed. "I feel she could have developed PTSD." Can you explain that?

- About my victim here in Brown County.

- Correct.

- I felt that way because, personally, when I was a kid I was sexually assaulted multiple times, and the thing it about with post traumatic stress, it kinda never leaves you, it kinda haunts you. And there is a great ripple effect to that. And I feel that, the ripple effect of how her parents, how she feels, and on how her kids feel today, and she feel when strangers or somebody like myself comes around her children. And I feel with the PTSD, she needs treatment. I know I need treatment. Probably for the rest of my life.

- Okay.

- Mr Flowers, may I ask a question?

- Go on.

- Okay, I wanted to make sure I wasn't interrupting-. Mr Flowers, it looks, like you from the certificates you provided us, that you were at Sand Ridge.

- Yes mam.

- As far back as, or as recent ar 2016.

- Yes mam.

- Can you tell us a little bit about that as part of your treatment if that's okay.

- About the various and different certificates I've had?

- Right, and also why did you go to Sand Ridge?

- It's part of a, after I did my prison sentence, they take you back to court, take you before the judge, and you become civically committed.

- Okay.

- And when you become civically committed you have to go to Sand Ridge.

- Okay. So do you know how long you will be on supervision? When that end date is?

- When you asked me about the four years. I was sentenced to a total of ten years. My probation ended in 2011.

- Okay.

- So I was through with my time about me being civically committed. I been incarcerated over the past 18 years.

- Okay, that makes, thank you.

- Have you been released previously? Put out on supervised release or conditional release from Sand Ridge?

- Yes.

- And when was the first time you were out?

- 2014.

- And why did you get sent back?

- I went back to Sand Ridge because of some rule violations. I was going to church and I had a relationship with on one of the ladies at church. I thought my agent had approved it and that's what I was under the impression of, and so, I come to find out it was an unapproved relationship. It was age appropriate and consensual.

- Okay, and how long did you stay in there for that visit?

- When I went back, I had some programs I had to do. I had assignments I had to do and went in a dug in. I did assignments and finished them in about a year and two months. But it took a extra three of four months to get released back into the community.

- Okay, so you got released roughly 2016?

- November the 1st, 2016, yes.

- And you haven't been back?

- No mam.

- And where have you been staying? At 1744, South Norwood Avenue on the west side.

- So, that's outside of the residency isn't it?

- I would have to check the map.

- I know there's a section of Norwood that is not part of the boundary. And were you placed there by the Department of Health and Human Services, or the Department of Corrections?

- Originally I was placed at, I think it is 1735 11th Avenue. The two people that was originally living at 1744, they got into some type of scuffle and so they took me out of that house and they put me at 1744.

- Okay.

- And why are you moving?

- Pardon.

- And why are you moving? Why do you want to move?
- So I can have a place to live.
- Did I miss something?
- Well I'm guessing, are you trying to apply for discharge? You're discharging from supervised release? Is that what you are trying to do?
- I went to court of leaving, it was in September, and I received my discharge.
- Okay.
- They called it a delayed discharge.
- Okay.
- And by the end of this month I'll be discharged, from being a sexually violent person. And I don't have no place to live, and I don't have no place to stay.
- Okay. Does that make sense to you?
- Yes.
- Okay. I'm guessing both of those addresses were outside of the boundaries.
- I'm looking at the Norwood one, it looks like the Norwood one may have been outside the boundary. Yeah, the Norwood address was outside the registration.
- Okay, alright. Okay, so you're okay to talk about your treatment in public. So, obviously you probably did all of your treatment through Sand Ridge?
- I did some in prison as well.
- Which prison were you at?
- I was at Waupun and I was at Oshkosh.
- Okay.
- I did anger management, I was in the domestic violence program, I couldn't get in the sex offender treatment program at Oshkosh because they said I had four years and the program extended, when I got there I think I had about two and a half years left.
- Okay.
- And so all my other treatment I turned in the certificates it was all done at Sand Ridge and I'm in treatment now.
- And where are you doing that at?

- I'm doing it in Grand Chute. I have a therapist, her name is Mary Kathryn. Is it through ATTIC?
- ATTIC takes me there.
- Okay.
- They take me there. She used to be through REACH.
- Okay.
- And now, I think she's in another place called the healing place.
- Oh, okay.
- And we have discussed about my options. I discussed it even when I was at Sand Ridge about my continuing treatment. Even after I'm discharged, because it is my personal belief that I need it. I need something to fall back on. I'm also planning on, because I had a problem with drugs, most of my adult life, to also get in A.O.D.A program. And I have a certificate even from A.O.D.A when I took that at Sand Ridge.
- Why don't you tell us you have learned about the sex offender treatment. What are your triggers, how are you gonna stop things.
- Well, one of the most important things I learned at Sand Ridge, was a couple of lessons, I don't know if you ever heard about a "cup of tea"? You heard about the "cup of tea"? That impressed me a great deal, because in a scenario, if a person consents to have sex with you and change their mind, you don't go into force yourself. If you a woman agree to have sex with you and she is passed out, you don't go in there and force yourself upon her. The other one was about coercion. You may have a girlfriend, and you lay on her kind of like a guilt trip, and she's telling you "no, I don't wana have sex" and you are laying a trip on her about you don't care about me, you don't love me, all you doing is thinking about yourself. And she really don't wana have it, but coercion is a way of force also. Through my experiences at Sand Ridge, we had to do, tan lines, and I kept everything like bottled up inside me, and when it happened to me in my life, and they had me bring it out. Various sexual assaults that happened to me.
- You write down for work and church, Pastor Linda. Do you work at the church, is that?
- I work for Manor for Life.
- Okay, and Pastor Linda is there?
- Yeah, and I attend a Manor for Life church.
- So, obviously you've been incarcerated for a long time.
- Yes.
- How do you think you are going to be on your own without supervision?
- I feel I do pretty good. I had a lot of time to meditate, and that is another programs I took, was mindfulness. And you know, to rely on treatment. I don't have that desire to drink anymore. I don't have that desire to do drugs in my life again. I don't hang with the crowds, I don't want that no more. That was one of my biggest problems living in Chicago. The reason why I came to Green Bay was to get away from the things that was

going on in my life in Chicago. And I came here thinking I left that garbage back there, and I brought that garbage with me to Green Bay. Something I regret, because of the way I was treated, people treated me like I never been treated, they welcomed me. I think I do good on my own, I think I do good. I'm doing good living by myself, now I been living in that house now for 15 months now, and I haven't had no problems and no issues.

- Correct me if I'm wrong, when you go out in the community, do you have supervision? Is someone with you all the time?

- No.

- No.

- No, they drop me off at work.

- Okay.

- I shop by myself.

- You do? Okay.

- I work by myself. Everything I do, they just drop me off. When I go to treatment, they just drop me off.

- Do they come in and check on you periodically?

- Every once in a while they do at random. But they haven't been doing it frequently, not lately.

- Okay.

- When I go to church, I go by myself now.

- Okay. Anymore questions?

- No.

- Do you have anyone here to speak on your behalf? Pastor Linda, Pastor Jim, they were supposed to come, my therapist Mary Kathryn, said she was gonna come, and Alex from ATTIC, they say they was coming, but they working people, so.

- Sure, okay. Questions, or anyone wana make a motion?

- Mr Flowers, do you have any other support system, besides Pastor Linda and the other people that you mentioned?

- Yes mam. I have siblings. You mean in the Green Bay area?

- Yes.

- I have nephews. I have cousins. Lets see. I have like a bunch of nephews, I can't name them all 'cause the grew since I been incarcerated. My cousins been moved here, I think it was, four or five different families that have moved here. I have kind of large support group. You know, that's what they said at Sand Ridge and in the

prison support system. That I had this here support system. That was kinda large, plus my sister's that's in Topeka, and two sisters in Chicago and my daughters, they support me.

- Do you have frequent contact with them?

- My children?

- Your support system here in Green Bay?

- Yes, yes, because of the restrictions, we are only allowed a certain amount of people, on approved, yes.

- Okay, thank you.

- The reason why I grimace is I just had surgery Monday, and that's why I kinda stiff.

- That's okay.

- Do you have anybody here? That wants to speak for you.

- No, he just said that.

- Oh.

- Is what you have, what he's been saying as far as.

- Accurate, yes.

- Okay.

- Yes, anybody wana make a motion or?

- Before we get to the motion, I just wana clarify the address one more time. The application and the landlord letter both said number three, 1065 Bader Street, number three. Are you saying it's number two.

- Yes, I don't know what you, it's kinda like a duplex with two in the front and two in the back. The people did move out of the one in number three. So the people moved out of number two and they preparing that house, apartment for me.

- I think that we would need to have approval from the landlord for that, for that unit.

- Specific unit. Is it permissible to do.

- A phonecall?

- We could call.

- Call?

- Yeah.

- Yeah.
- One, two, O, two, six, four, three, six, four, three.
- You would probably have to call Jesus.
- The what?
- Three, four, six, three.
- That's who we are calling.
- Okay.
- [Jesus] Who's calling?
- Is Jesus there?
- [Jesus] Yeah, it's me.
- This is Heidi Michel with the Green Bay Sex Offenders Residency Board. We have Chester Flowers in front of us right now. And you signed a letter that he could live at one of your apartments, is that correct? Is that correct?
- [Jesus] Chester? Oh yeah the guy, yeah.
- Okay, the information we were provided said it was 1065 Bader Street, Number three.
- [Jesus] It's number two.
- It is number two.
- [Jesus] Yes.
- Okay, we just wanted to confirm that, thank you for your time.
- [Jesus] Okay, thank you mam.
- Okay, bye bye. Okay, that's good enough then.
- Yes.
- Okay. Alright.
- Mr Flowers, one quick question. How long have you been at the Norwood Street address?
- Totally, five years.
- Five years and that was upon, was there any interruption?

- What we had talked about.
- Okay so, most recent period of time. How long have you been there?
- Two and a half years, a little over two and a half.
- Okay, okay. Motion to approve, address specific, to 1065 Bader Street, number two, Green Bay.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second.
- Alright, all in favor.
- I'll send the vote. Vote passes three to one. Okay, so you're approved to move to 1065 Bader Street, number two. Would you like us to send your letter there?
- 1744.
- Okay. I'm not permitted to move out until the judge said at 12pm.
- Okay.
- On that day. So I appreciate it, thank you.
- Okay, just so you know, if you do decide to move from that location you would need to come back before us.
- Yes mam.
- Okay.
- Thank you.
- All right, good luck.
- Thank you, I really appreciate it.
- Next on the agenda is Andrew Hines-Kaplan.
- Good evening.
- Hi.
- Hi.
- Alright, you're requesting to move to 2241 Imperial Lane, number four, is that correct?
- Yes.

- Alright, and have you been here before?
- No.
- Okay, so as you heard me explain when we ask you about your crime, we don't want you to name the victim or the relationship. Then you have the opportunity to go into closed session, if you wish to talk about your treatment. Would you like to go into closed or remain in public?
- I'm alright.
- Okay, so first of all why don't you tell us about your offense.
- On about February 20th, 1999, I assaulted a 14 year old boy where I put my hand up and grabbed his penis without his permission. Count one, count two is, a 15 year old boy that I got on top of, humped and ejaculated, and he ran out of the building.
- Okay, two counts.
- Yes.
- And how old were you?
- I was 33, 32 actually. My birthdays tomorrow.
- Okay. And you were only given 20 years probation for that? No jail time?
- No, no, no.
- Oh, okay.
- Two different counts. Two different sentences. Count one for the 14 year old boy did 20 years in prison.
- Oh, okay.
- Count two, for the fifteen year old, is the 20 years probation that I'm serving now. I just got out of prison on February 20th, 2019, after serving the 20 year sentence for count one.
- What made you do that?
- At the time I was drunk and immature, and kinda just did what I wanted to do, and didn't have any regard for other peoples feelings.
- Okay.
- Purely self gratifying behavior. Destructive.
- In your appeal.
- I'm sorry.

- It's hard to read.

- I understand.

- You did some, something damage to him, and then your finished.

- I feel I did some irreparable damage, because the victim on count one is up in prison, while I was in prison. That I know just because you have S.P.N's. And I didn't have problems with other people in prison, while I was in it, so I knew just put two and two. I'm a pretty smart individual, I figured that he was in there, so. Part me, I believe, besides whatever he did or did not do, I believe I had a part of in that due to what I did to him. So, I take responsibility, there's responsibility for him being in there. I don't know the parameters of the other things he did, that doesn't have anything to do with me. But I feel that I probably, or did actually, play a part in that, his criminal behavior.

- Okay.

- Mr Hines-Kaplan, in your paperwork that you submitted, it shows that, what ties do you have to Green Bay?

- At the time I was here, none.

- Okay, what about now.

- Well, besides my agent and I have some people from the veterans, people helping me out, and supporting me. And I'm working now and I'm in treatment and I'm doing things, I mean I just got out, I only been out two months so. The working is great, but it's a little struggle to navigate the 21st century since last time I was out, it was the 20th century.

- Where are you working now? I don't think we have that information.

- At A.K Pizza Crust, it's on Walker Drive, 3050. Which is part of the reason why I wanted to move to the area I'm asking about because it's closer to the, where I'm at now is T.O.P and that's like, if I walk it'll take me 20 years to get there. So, sorry but, you know, I just want somewhere close in case I have to walk. That would get me there in not three hours.

- So, So you're, am I correct, you're originally from California?

- I'm originally from San Francisco, yes. And I tried to, when I got out, to go back. But because I didn't have enough time with the D.O.C and all that, I was sent back here.

- What brought you to Green Bay?

- Back in '98, jobs, you know, out there was hard to find work, and I wanted to kinda start over. I was in my early thirties and I had, you know, my goal was to come here and try to start over, I had had some issues out there with other convictions of burglary was the first crime I ever did, so I was kinda thinking, this is inappropriate, I keep getting in trouble, even if it's minor misdemeanor stuff, then I want to try and start over.

- Have you had any programming, excuse me, since '99? Treatment?

- Yeah, I did A.O.D.A in 2001, I had a certificate I submitted that. I did anger management, I submitted that. I did a deniers program, which is to start to talk about the crime that I had committed.

- But that was all back in 2001, right?

- Between 2001, 2002, yes.

- Anything since then?

- I did, had an attempt to do the offender program while I was in and at that time I wasn't ready to deal with those issues at that time. And since I've been out, I've started a program within the last month, and I'm in a program with Kirkpatrick and Associates which meets at the Micah Center every Thursday. It's ran by a guy that works closely with my agent and stuff. So, I pay 30 dollars a weeks, so I been doing that. And then I go to a Circles of Support group which is other offenders trying to help navigate the world, and I have people at the job center, they are too trying to help me to deal with the issues of being reintegrated into the community.

- How long were you in the military?

- About a year and a half.

- And when was that?

- Between 1990 and 91.

- Okay. And was that during the.

- It was the beginning of it.

- Okay.

- Where did you spend the majority of your prison sentence at?

- Oshkosh Correctional Institution, the last 12 years, yes.

- Okay.

- That's the majority.

- Because I'm not familiar with any of the certificates that you got, the location.

- Well because I was, when I first came in I had 20 years, and they sent people back then, they had contract with out of state facility.

- Oh, were you in Tennessee?

- Yes, those were all done in Whiteville, Tennessee.

- Oh, okay.

- And I did a couple of vocationals in Appleton, Minnesota.

- Okay., that explains it.

- So yes, they were sending people there. My first five years in prison were spent out of state.
- Okay.
- Until 2004.
- Okay.
- Then I sent to Kettle Moraine, and then I went to Waupun, and then I spent the rest of my time in Oshkosh, until I got out.
- Okay.
- Just recently.
- Alright. Anybody have any other questions for him? Anyone willing to make a motion?
- I'm catching up.
- Is there anyone here to speak on your behalf?
- Yes, I have several people.
- Oh, I apologize. Thank you.
- That's okay.
- Whoever's here to speak on his behalf, you can step forward.
- I did.
- I know, I apologize for that.
- We thank you. I said where's the other part.
- He's got a crowd.
- Yeah. Just go ahead and state your name and address for the record.
- My names Roy DeRuyter, address 1079, Butternut Lane, Oneida. And Circles of Support, he comes, he attends all the time. He speaks, he contributes, he does very well there in the group.
- Okay.
- My name is Katrina Nelson. I'm the area manager for the Center for Veterans Issues. What we do is provide assistance for veterans, we provide a security deposit up to the first three months of rent. I would also like you to know, I'm the former supervisor for ATTIC correctional services, supervising the sex offender treatment program. So, I do see through that lens as well. What would I like you to know. When I first met him on the phone, I was very impressed because he had already off the ground and running. He had found a job within weeks of his release, and he started working right away. Which is always a good sign when we talk about recidivism. He had already looked at several apartments, he was very motivated, and we did talk about

treatment, because being from that realm, I understood that, that's one of the precursors for recidivism, so he was very open to talk about treatment, he was very forthcoming about his crime. Took responsibility from the beginning, and I was very pleased to see that and he's been very easy to work with. He's been compliant from my program. His paperwork has been organized, he's on the ball, and complies as he's asked to. So, I been working with him for a month or so.

- Okay.

- My name is Thomas Beverly, I work at the Job Center at Wisconsin over here. I'm a global career development facilitator. Short word, I'm a job coach. Our credentialing allows us to assess a special group, a target group, veterans. Disabled veterans, veterans that are homeless, at risk veterans. So I been doing that for a good number of years. So, a lot of what we do is try to find out what skills do they have, through Kelsy testing, through some RIASEC testing, and Holland code. Just getting down and talking about those issues. Why are you here, now you're a vet, you're qualified, you have your core values, I spent 26 years in the Navy. So we kind of go there first, just to develop a relationship. We try to dig into what that is that causes them to sped off, that is part of what we are to do as job coaches and case managers. But with him, I just found out that he was very energetic, he had a vision, something that he had thought about. I see with veterans all the time, a lot of veterans I meet don't have any vision. He had already knew what he wanted to do. He just needed to know how to get there. So I wasn't certain, so I tested it. So I gave him a Hollands test and he scored high in enterprising and realistic careers which was culinary. Then I gave him an Interests profile and it was culinary again. So he says, I told ya. So he wants to cook. So we started down that journey. I wanted to see if he would be prompt and comeback. He wanted to share his crime with me the same day. We spoke for three hours maybe I think. So, that day he wanted to call his probation and parole officer. So he said call Kim, like right away. I go where they let me go. So we talked to Kim for another half hour. I wanted to know what his boundaries were. Because he was talking about college, can he go to college, because of his crime. He's very remorseful, second appointment he go cut up, choked up, so we he let that go, and we got back to the business of what are you going to do for the rest of your life. So he talked about to echo, Katrina says a lot of it, he's very compliant, he's prompt, he discusses his crime right away, he completed all of his job search requirements, he completed his own resume out on a Job Center computer. He said he didn't have a lot of job skill, but I don't know how he learnt how to use a computer so quickly. So, he wanted to get a job search, he says my goal is to get my dignity back, faith, and have my mother proud of me before I die.

- I'm guna have to.

- Sure go right ahead. So that is three things we talked about. So I said if you are ready to start work, I do need a couple of days, 'cause you're a vet, so I sent him over to the C.V.S.O's office. He is a service connected vet, 30%. So he's got back pay coming. So I needed to start that paperwork, the veterans needed to know he was out of prison. They only allow him to 10 percent while he's incarcerated. So he's got a few years of back pay coming at some point. Probably the 90 day mark, get him enrolled in the V.A.

- Service connection for guys that don't know, it's a disability.

- it's a disability.

- And the military rates it by percentage rate.

- Sure.

- And then the C.V.S.O, the County Veterans Service Officer.

- I'm sorry.

- That's okay.

- We're in it somewhere. They kind of help coordinate the veterans and their services once they're released because a lot of veterans coming out of the service don't know what their benefits are.

- So he does have G.I. bill benefits as well, to go to school, so we're looking at, our career plan was set in two phases. Because he said he needed to have a job for a certain period of time, we worked that in, now we're looking at September him entering the culinary degree program.

- Okay.

- So he does have G.I. bill benefits paid for, he's all set. I didn't have to do anything, he just showed up ready to go. So whatever he was doing, professional wise is all I can speak to, his character's been golden. Never been late, always on time, sharp, very good hygiene, which says a lot to me about a veteran. He is not a rigid thinker, he is very crystallized in his beliefs. I think he'll do well.

- Well, let me ask, so once he gets approved, I mean are your services going to continue, this isn't just because you're coming here?

- No, the services continue through his life.

- Okay, he comes with you, like how often?

- He calls me all the time, typically like once a week I'm great with, but I mandate at least once a month. Typically call me every week. Our program is 90 days, with the possibility of a re-certification depending on how they're doing financially and how their financial planning. So I kind of serve the person in environment because I have a social work background, we look at his financial stuff, his employment, all that, so he's getting case management from me directly.

- Okay.

- Case managed as well as supervised. So he can be possibly, he could re-certify for case management if he so chooses.

- Okay.

- Which I probably am going to do, 'cause I'm trying to, I did it wrong the first time, I want to do it right this time. So, I'm working on doing it right, I work with my agent every week and we talk about stuff that I can start to be able to do, you know the rules, I can't go to the park, can't go to the mall, can't do social media, but I don't even remember, I went to prison I have a hard time working this phone. Some times I just want to throw it away. But I gotta keep it, I'm just telling you the truth.

- Yeah.

- Some days I just want to throw it in the garbage can, and say can I get a phone that just does this. But unfortunately the way the world operates today.

- Sure. Everything happens through this, so I'm getting used to, but as far as meeting people, I know very few. 20 years in prison, I'm kinda just dealing with the help I get to support system, I haven't really.

- I have checked on him and his employer, and that's part of what we do, his employer wished they had 20 of him. He's willing to work overtime, but can't. He does the extra things around the job that people don't want to do. And they see in that in that particular career field, that's what he want to go to school for. They would allow him time to go to school, because of his performance. I don't think they have an issue there. I've seen lots of vets before over the last five years, this is the first time you've seen me, so that is a testament to what I believe about him.

- Okay. Any questions?

- Can I ask why were you only in the military a year and a half?

- Probably the same reason why I did what I did. My mindset knows I was young. I wasn't making the right choices It was a good choice to get in there, but I was making wrong choice in my life.

- He did get an honorable discharge.

- I got an honorable discharge, I just wasn't ready for that, you know, I wasn't making, I was immature, which is no excuse to do what I did, no excuse, I'm just saying my mind was not the way it is today. I've learnt a lot about me, about behavior, about what caused, you know, I was a person that things would go good and I would figure out a way to destroy it. And I'm working very hard not to do that.

- For full disclosure, it was an injury, a medical condition.

- A medical discharge?

- Yes.

- Okay.

- But you know I'm working hard, you know, things are going well now so you know I have a good system. So when I'm having issues I talk with the group, I talk to my agent and I do homework and all that so. She let's me call her anytime there's any issue or something that I'm not sure of, 'cause I'm not sure of a lot of things these days. I call these people and I get the advice I need, so I can keep chugging right along.

- Okay. Anymore questions for these guys?

- No.

- No, okay. Thank you I appreciate it. Anymore questions for Andrew or anybody would like to make a motion?

- I'll make a motion, to approve Mr Hines-Kaplan, 224I Imperial Lane, number four, address specific, for a period of 90 days, and then I'd like to have him comeback and see how he's doing, at that point with everything.

- Okay, that's fine.

- Is there a second?

- Second.

- Okay, all in favor?
- Nothing popped up for me.
- Vote passes unanimously.
- Thank you.
- So, you're approved. You'll have to come back in 90 days with the documentation she's requesting. Do you want us to mail you that letter to the ATTIC, or to the new address?
- You can mail it to 1761.
- Okay, no problem.
- Thank you very much.
- Yep.
- That's just I'm sorry.
- Just to see how things were going, okay thank you. You guys have a nice evening.
- You too. Next on the agenda is Albert Ruleford. Is this your first time before the board?
- Yes it is.
- Okay. You're requesting to move to 1240 Harvey Street, number two.
- Yes.
- Okay, and as you heard me explain to everybody else, we'll ask you about your crime, just don't name the relationship or the name of your victim. So what were you convicted of?
- I was convicted of child enticement in 2013, and what it involved was, I posted an ad on Craigslist, soliciting sex.
- Listening?
- No soliciting.
- Okay, sorry. Okay.
- Soliciting sex.
- Okay.
- And underage 15 year old male responded, when I agreed to meet him it ended up being a sex sting. Then I was arrested, then I had a hard time with that. Whatever that, okay, forgive me, I'm nervous too as well. But then I was arrested at that time in 2013.

- And how old were you?

- 28.

- And you knew he was underage?

- Yes, unfortunately, when I originally read the message I thought it might have been a typo. That's no excuse for it, I should have left it alone at the time. But then after corresponding with him with text message. Then I realized he was 15, yes.

- And what was your intent when you went to go meet him?

- I was going back and forth, originally it was just to hang out and see what happens. Then we had talked about sexual contact with each other. He mentioned about bringing a friend with, and bringing weed with, and then so I agreed to meet him. He had told me he had used his money that he had got for his birthday to get a taxi over to the area. So I felt guilty that he was using his money and then went to go meet him. Not an excuse, I can't make any excuses for it. It was poor judgment, I was high on Adderall also. I know that drugs are a major thing for me, so.

- And what did you get for a sentence?

- Originally I ended up getting 10 years on probation. I ended up getting revoked in 2016, in March. And then it was a withheld sentence, so they sentenced me to four in and four out, and then I just got out in February. Then I have four years of probation.

- Why did you get revoked?

- Drug usage. Then unapproved sexual contact with adults. They weren't approved relationships from my P.O.

- And what about the 1998?

- I was 12 years old at the time.

- Oh, I'm sorry, juvenile, I didn't see that.

- Oh.

- Never mind.

- Okay, we won't talk about that. And so, you have the option to talk about your treatment, in closed session or public, which would you like to do?

- In public.

- Okay, so have you received any kind of sex offender treatment at this point?

- I'm disappointed to say no. When I originally got revoked I was in treatment, I was in it for, I don't remember exactly how many sessions it was, but it was roughly about half way through. Attempting to find housing was really getting to me. I hadn't even got this far because it was so hard to find a landlord unfortunately rent to sex offenders. Which I understand. When I was in prison, they changed the standard, something about they went to a different metric, I don't exactly understand it, but instead of me doing the treatment there, I ended

up not having enough time to do treatment and then when I talked to my P.O about it, they said they're switching from the ATTIC correctional, to a new provider, something about, contractual obligations, and the lowest bidder. When I was in prison I tried to get into treatment, I wrote them numerous times trying to get information, about like if I could take the program and then when I got out take more treatment. I have no issue with treatment, because as far as I'm concerned there is always room for improvement. And there is always room for, you can never have enough coping skills, I guess is the best way to put it. Like I said, I know that drugs are the major thing, and when I got revoked it was the drugs and sexual contact, and the housing thing. And I really wanna start attending school again. But before I can do that I wanna be able to have a place I know I can go to, I wanna start over, and I wanna make it right.

- Can I just ask, did what he said about his crime is that correct?

- Yes.

- Okay, perfect. Alright. And are you working right now?

- Yes, when I was in prison I actually wrote to my previous employer. I think it was like a month before. They told me to come in and fill out the application. So that same, the week that I got released, I think it was the next day or day after, because I had to stay at a hotel, because I'm currently living at the T.O.P. So that Wednesday or Thursday I think it was that week I got released. I went to my previous employer, filled out the application, they did the interview then, and they said they were excited to get me back. And then they sent me out for the drug test, passed it. And then, they got me working since then.

- Where's that at?

- Pioneer Metal over on Globe Street.

- Okay.

- They're talking about promoting me to a different position. It would be more responsibility and that's another reason, I'm trying to get the housing situation done, because I really don't want to have that stress on me.

- It says have you lived in Green Bay before, you write not, have you?

- I lived in De Pere.

- Okay.

- I didn't know if that was, I understand it's all one area, but I've never had to go in front of the board that's why I put no for that.

- Okay. I lived in De Pere for five years. From 2013 to 2018, when I moved over to Howard.

- So you do have family here?

- I don't have any family, but I do have friends. I do have a good support network at work. I have no issue talking about my crime because, honestly, if I deny it, all it's going to do is cause me more stress. I'm very open and honest with my P.O. I don't like hiding stuff from people, just because it cause me too much anxiety having to deal with the added stress of lying about something. I can't lie, I have a horrible time lying. So, I have my friends, Jessica, her mother Jeri who is here to talk for me. I'm very motivated to make things right. So, I just really want the opportunity to prove myself.

- Okay. Any questions or motions?

- His family wants to speak.

- Oh there are people here who want to speak on your behalf?

- Yeah.

- Sorry, I keep forgetting that. I should see that on the little board here. Okay, who's around her for his behalf, come on up.

- I have a fractured hip.

- If you can just state your name and address for the record.

- My name is Jeri Wolf and I live at 6034 Main Street, apartment 206, in Green Bay.

- Okay. And what would you like to.

- I would like to state that Albert is very ambitious and very kind and generous kind of a person. I met him through my daughter, we've known each other now about five years. I contacted him quite a few times while he was in prison. We got to know each other pretty good. So I consider him another son. And he does call me mum Wolf, so. I think he's very ambitious and I think what he really needs right now is his own place to live and he's very, I wouldn't say outgoing, 'cause he's real kind of to himself, but I think if he had his own place, he would be able to, the place he is looking at anyway, he would be able to get around the city a lot better, because it's closer to the main station, the bus station. He goes to work everyday, he's been very friendly at work with my daughter. She's known him quite a few years. That's all I can say, he just a great person.

- Okay. Any questions for her?

- No.

- Alright, thank you.

- I have one question. Are you in touch with your family at all?

- Oh my gosh yeah, I talk to my dad like weekly. Unfortunately, he lives in Florida. He's been trying to talk about getting up here. He's been saying that for like six years, and he's getting older, so he's like 64 now. If I get the two room apartment, I been trying to figure out, if he would be willing to move up here. I want him to be closer to his family. I talk to my sisters, they are coming down Monday to talk to my P.O.

- They're all in Florida?

- No, they're up in Michigan.

- Oh.

- I'm originally from Michigan. I moved down here for better job opportunities, because Menominee at the time did not have much of anything back in 2013. I mean, I don't really talk to my mum that much. I talk to my step mum, my dad passed away a few years ago. I'm adopted so, I know everybody, so it make it a bit confusing talking all of it. My birth mum lives in California. I don't have her number and I been trying to get a hold of her. So I haven't been able to talk to her in like two years now, since I went back to prison. I mean, my family is very important to me, I mean if I could get my dad to move up here, I totally would, just to get him off on the right foot. I know that he wants to, I know he's talking about getting back with my mum. So if I can get him back up here, to make things happen for him. I'm trying, so.

- Alright. Anything else?

- On Family Watchdog there already is an offender living in the lower of this.

- I talked to them, because Akia wasn't in last week, and I talked to Barbera about it. Which was the P.O that I saw, and she said that, she said that it should be fine, she just said there shouldn't be an issue with it. As far as I know there is one, Bo knows about it, because Bo said, I'm talking about the landlord, she said that, she wants to give everybody a second chance. So, obviously I don't think there would be any contact between us, because I don't, you know what I mean, I don't know who he is, I don't know.

- Part of the reason is, we don't want to have a lot of people in one area.

- No I got it, I got you I understand.

- So, I just wanted you to be aware of that.

- One question I have back in 2010, you were extradited?

- Yeah, unfortunately when I moved down here from Michigan. Because of my juvenile case I had failed to register in Wisconsin. I didn't realize that I had to, and I ended up getting, I don't know what that is called, but basically where you don't register in a state, and they end up issuing a warrant for my arrest and then I ended up getting arrested.

- And you were extradited back to Michigan?

- Yeah. And then I got, I think it was three days time served, and I had to pay a fine.

- Okay.

- And then Du Pere, when I talked to Du Pere police officer, he said that, fortunately, they were going to anything, as long as I got registered, got on the roll, and just taken care of the situation.

- Okay. Are you, you may have addressed this, sorry if I may have missed this, are you in treatment now, have you contacted anybody so that you can begin? I'm currently waiting on the referral. My P.O is in the process of allocating it, she said they are in the process of switching everybody over to the new treatment. So, like I said before, excuse me, I was in treatment before I got revoked and I was in there for roughly about six months for I end up getting revoked. I guess that I want treatment, I'm not trying to get out it or anything, it's just right now the transitional period from the ATTIC to the new provider that they have. And I am just waiting on my P.O to get it confirmed, through the new provider.

- Okay.
- And I guess that too like, you can never have too many coping or too much, too many, too much help in getting stuff taken care of.
- There it is right here.
- Oh.
- Back this way. Right here, this is Harvey, with these people.
- Did somebody come to speak on your behalf.
- Yeah, Teri was just up here.
- I'm cold medicine I apologize.
- Do you know the person that lives below you?
- I don't know 'em.
- Okay.
- That looks familiar.
- Okay. Does anyone wanna make a motion?
- Motion to approve, address specific, for a period of 90 days, to just to come back and provide proof that you're in treatment.
- Okay.
- And everything is going well.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that motion.
- All in favor.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Thank you so much guys.
- Okay, you just need to come back in 90 days, with the documentation that's she's requested.
- I'm guna get a letter in the mail then?
- Yes, do you want us to mail that letter to the ATTIC, or do you want to mail it to your new address?

- Just send it to the new address.
- Okay.
- Just this way, I'll be make to get it.
- Okay.
- Thank you guys, you have a great day.
- You too, good luck.
- Okay. She's going to be withdrawing from the rest of the meeting.
- That's fine.
- Okay.
- Alright, next on the agenda is Brintell Bishop. Alright, you have been here.
- Yes.
- And I believe we just asked you to come back, is that correct?
- Yes, to comeback with one document missing and documents over my therapist that I been talking to.
- Yeah.
- I don't have any of my documents with me right now. The night I left here, meeting with you guys. I went back to County for the sentence, they gave me 60 days to return myself, to turn myself in, from the 15th.
- Of May?
- Of June.
- Oh.
- So I've been watching my daughter for most of the time. Spending time with her before I turn myself in. I have to go do four months for them in the county. I was supposed to do it here, they denied me to do it here. So I have to go there and do it. So I basically been spending time with my baby before I turn myself in, so I don't have any documents for you guys at the moment.
- So are you still wanting to reside at this address, when you get out in four months?
- Yes mam.
- And why couldn't you get it? Why could you not get any documentation?

- I could have got it, I just didn't bring it in because I was spending time with my daughter.
- But you knew you needed it for this meeting.
- Yes I did, mam.
- Well, that's why we were seeing you is to get that documentation, see the documentation.
- Yeah, I understand that and I was spending more time with her because her birthday was July 14th. I'm not going to be able to be here, for her birthday or anything. So, I was basically getting all the time I can with my daughter before her birthday comes up, on the 15th of July.
- But you understand that if you don't bring the documentation we can deny you, and you won't be living there.
- Yes, mam, I understand.
- But you didn't care?
- It's not, I didn't care. Right now, at the moment she was what I was thinking about. 60 days to turn myself in. Having to be gone away from her, she not even one, to be honest.
- Well a few hours, I don't know, this is my thinking, a few hours to come and get this taken care of, so you didn't have to worry after the 60 days, or after you come home, it will be all taken care of. Now you will have no place to go.
- Do you see where we're coming from?
- Yes.
- I mean you just sat her for almost two hours.
- Yeah.
- I mean, you know, that's two hours that you're away from her, the documentation that was requested back then, shouldn't have taken you that long to get.
- No, it wouldn't have taken me long to get. I understand this, I hear where you guys is coming from.
- Well is there any further discussion or does anyone wanna make a motion?
- I'll make a motion, much to deny, Mr Bishop, address specific to 118 South Van Buren Street.
- And I will second that motion.
- All in favor.
- Just a second we have to vote, first.
- So this is a motion to deny. So a yes vote is to deny, to clarify.

- Motion to deny passes, three to nothing.
- So you'll no longer be able to stay at that 118 South Van Buren Street.
- Okay, so what happens when I'm released.
- Unfortunately, that's not our concern. You'll have to find another place to reside and then come back before the board if you wish to live in Brown County, or Green Bay.
- Okay.
- Okay?
- Thank you.
- Next on the agenda is Alex Beard.
- This is a letter from Alex, he missed the last meeting, so this is an apology.
- Oh.
- I got the person to pass it out, so.
- Oh okay. Alright, so it looks like you were here before.
- Several times.
- Yeah, and we asked you to come back.
- No.
- No.
- I think you're at a new address right?
- Yeah this is my new.
- Oh okay, I apologize. All right, right now we have a letter provided by Mr Beard, that was sent on April 29th. Basically, it says he's writing in regards to his request to take up residence at 1840, 10th Avenue. On two occasions this board has approved my request to relocate within the community in order to improve living conditions for my family and myself. Last month I asked the board to permit me to move to a still better home than we currently reside. In fact, my landlord had suggested the move and offered reasonable terms to make it possible. I arranged for a babysitter to watch the children while I attended the meeting but unfortunately the baby sitter canceled at the last minute. With so little notice I was unsure who to call to inform of my situation. I understand the importance of this board, and I apologize for any inconvenience I may have caused. I would certainly appreciate your support of my current request to provide a better home. Okay, thank you.
- You're welcome.
- Alright so, on here it says 1840, 10th Avenue, our form says Street.

- It should be Avenue, that's my fault.
- Okay, alright just to make sure.
- You want this.
- Okay.
- I'll put this back in.
- So, let's see, when was the last time you were here? So, October 10th, of 2018, it looks like we approved you to move to Elmore Street.
- 1726 Elmore, yes.
- So you were living there up until.
- I'm still, I reside there.
- Okay, but you want to better your family and move to 10th Avenue.
- Uhuh, it's actually it was a house that my landlord, or myself, my family, my landlord were first looking at. Unfortunately at that moment, they had other plans, the other house, and I ended up taking the 1726 Elmore.
- Okay.
- So, he contacted me, he is also one of my friends as well. He contacted me, letting me know that place is actually open to be able to move in to. He is also trying to figure something out on his end as well, his and his partners end, for there business, to sell the home I'm at now and if that's the case, if I could move to the other place, he is able to sale that house and then I get what I wanted from the beginning. So, it's more of a trade off.
- Okay. Before we got any further, I know you been here a few times, do we want him to go over his crimes or.
- I don't need to.
- Okay, yeah we've got the documentation from previously. So, we understand why you wanna move. Are you working right now?
- Yes.
- 'Cause where are you working, you don't have it on your application.
- I should.
- I don't see it on here.
- Me neither.
- Wow, I apologize.

- That's okay.
- I work at Rum Runners Bars. I'm actually working to be part owner of that bar as well.
- Do you bartend?
- Yes, I'm a bartender, yes. I manage it right now.
- Okay.
- Alright, are you doing any, I'm sorry, if we wanna talk about treatment or anything, are you okay if we're public.
- Yeah, that's fine.
- Okay, are you in any kind of treatment at this moment.
- Not anymore.
- completed all of that?
- I completed all of that, it's been a while since I did all that. And I honestly do not really know where all my certificates were. So, I completed sex offender treatment, and C.G.I.P, C.G.I.P. was in Appleton at ATTIC. Tor Atkins for sex offender treatment here, well he's in Oneida, I was living in Freemont at the time, when I was going through that.
- Have you been in any trouble?
- No! I finished my sentence, I mean including my probation, everything in 2014.
- And you'll be living at this residence with your fiance and is it two children?
- We have three.
- Three, okay.
- I have a six month old now.
- Okay. Anybody have any other questions, or to make a motion?
- I will make a motion to approve Mr Beard, to 1840, 10th Avenue, address specific.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Okay, all in favor?
- You didn't ask if he had anybody here to speak on his behalf.

- He didn't, I looked at the agenda this time.
- I do actually.
- You do?
- Yes. Yeah, I'm sorry.
- We apologize also.
- That's fine.
- The motion approved three to one.
- Okay, well you're good to move to 1840, 10th Avenue.
- I appreciate that, thank you very much.
- Okay, good luck, thank you. Alright, next we have Bobby Rudd.
- Please tell us if you have somebody.
- Yes, he has no speakers listed.
- How do you see that?
- Right here, on the side.
- Oh!
- It's only for attorney's, so.
- Oh, okay. Alright, so you are looking to move to 2625 Humboldt Road.
- Yes.
- Okay! And you are currently homeless, correct?
- Yes. And have you ever been here before? Back in 2010 after my release from prison I had to see you about going to Suburban Ave.
- Okay.
- And then where have you been since.
- Back in 2013, I went back to prison.
- For what?

- Aggravated battery.
- And how long did you serve for that?
- Four and a half years.
- Four and a half, okay.
- Just look here.
- No it was due to revocation and elusiveness, but it was consecutive.
- Okay.
- Alright, well I'm thinking that you, oh well lets see, do you want him to talk about his sex offense that existed from the previous time he was here. We can talk about, If you wish, if you wanna.
- No.
- You're good?
- I'm okay.
- Okay, are you currently working?
- Yes.
- And where do you work?
- I work at Wisconsin Building Supplies. I before that I was with US Tech Force.
- Okay, how long have you been there?
- I have been there now, two weeks, I was working over there for three weeks.
- And what happened with that Job? It was too repetitious, I generally work as a mason, so I like to be outside.
- Okay.
- They offered me a position out on the yard to do stacking, banding, and circular receiving. It's better paid as well.
- Okay.
- I wana bring it, the quotes.
- Two months.
- I been working on and off through temp. Agencies since my release, I've had mostly masonry jobs, there's been a lot of lay offs due to the season. So, just take short term contracts, from temp agencies to get by.

- Okay.
- The job I'm working now is a temp hire so.
- And this is to stay, it's the Tower Motel, right?
- Yes.
- And they like rent rooms, like permanently?
- Yes, they do do long term.
- Oh! I didn't understand what that bottom part meant. And so, I mean, have you just been staying on the streets? Have you been staying with friends?
- In my car and I have some in-laws here. We have a ten day grace period, we can stay from place to place. So I been kinda dossing around.
- Okay. And how long have you been doing that?
- About a year now.
- Okay.
- Some pretty cold nights up there.
- Yeah.
- Was it that you needed, the better paying job to get to the motel, or you just found it now?
- I needed a job that was consistent, that was stable.
- Sure.
- That's what I needed.
- Okay.
- That's what I've had a lack of.
- okay.
- The pay's been great on a lot of jobs, but you're working three weeks here.
- Just temp.
- They didn't wanna build you would find the best of us was laid off for two to three months until they could clean it all out of.
- Okay.

- With masonry there's seasonal lay-offs, 'cause of the weather.
- Alright, anyone have questions?
- Was there any treatment during the.
- Yeah.
- I sure did, after my last release, through Jim Drake Family Services.
- You did do Jim Drake, okay. But you didn't submit any paperwork, right?
- I did not, no. He said he was going to write me a letter. I tried to get a copy for my file, but he said he generally writes a letter sends it to you.
- Yeah.
- He said it would take up to 14 days.
- Oh, you just recently asked for it.
- Yeah, the day I submitted the application form.
- Okay.
- A lot of times when they've previously been approved they must have had documentation, to approve them, I know that was back in 2010.
- That was before I began treatment. I was only in prison for two years. I didn't have time to do the treatment in prison.
- Okay.
- Since my last incarceration I've done anger management, thinking for a change, I've received a.
- Okay, we'll take a look at those and we'll work with those, read them into the records.
- I was trying to find my masonry.
- Sure.
- I did my masonry diploma.
- Okay, so this is anger management through Kettle Moraine, we have a social service chronological history of recording through Kettle Moraine which is dated May 15th, May of 2015. Basically, scoring 96%, passed successfully. We have a tutor training through Wisconsin Literacy.
- I also received out there, completed a masonry diploma too.

- Okay, 2016 Thinking for Change at Kettle Moraine. And the Offender Performance Evaluation for Cognitive Interventions program, phase one and two completed. Everything was satisfactory or good. So, it says here, this is dated, must be this two 26 of 16. It is recommended that Mr Rudd be aware of the following risk factors, warning signs, while in the community. Anger, resentment, hostility. If Mr Rudd demonstrates any of these risk factors, it is recommended Mr Rudd re engage in C.G.I.P, to address his thinking errors and criminal thinking. What do you have to say about that?

- I think I been doing pretty well. I have had a situation, I recently had a lot of losses in my family, and I thought in terms of I haven't acted out in any of it. I think, I am growing as a person.

- Okay.

- I made a lot of changes because, I built a pretty care free, apathic life. I was reactionary and very selfish.

- Okay.

- How long, if we would approve you to stay at the Tower Motel, how long do you think you wanna stay there?

- It's just 'til I find a place. I can't exactly put a time on it. And it's kinda expensive to stay there. But, I'm hoping soon I'll be back soon.

- Okay.

- And as far as your support in Green Bay, you have a, under family, a Tara, is that the only support?

- No, she is my kid's mother. I have in-laws here, they play a big part of my support system and think my main support comes from my P.O, Myrtle.

- Myrtle?

- Yes, her and Dominic, because Dom was my P.O when I first got released, and I worked with the guy for two years. They have office right next to each other so, I can talk to both of them. They both have a familiarity with me.

- Okay. Anything?

- No.

- Anyone wanna make a motion?

- Yes, I'll make a motion. I don't wanna make it for days, and then you don't like that. But I guess, I'm gunna make a motion to approve to, 2625 Humboldt Road, address specific, for 90 days. Just come back and give us an update on how things are going and what's going on.

- Hopefully I'll be coming with an address.

- Well yeah, and you can come before that if you find somewhere to live. You can come before that 90 days if you have an address.

- Yeah, I don't know much about the ordinance until I came and lived, because last time I was released I lived in Pierre, it was actually Hobbard, and there was only 250 people.
- Yes, your agent told us that, explained that to us.
- Yeah, each municipality has their own guidelines.
- Right.
- So you would have to reach out to that community. Okay, did we get a second on that motion?
- I'll second that.
- Alright, all in favor.
- Motion to approve passes two to one.
- Okay, you're approved to live there for 90 days. Did you request anything?
- Well, just his overall.
- Let us know how you're doing when you come back in 90 days.
- Okay.
- Okay, thank you.
- Thank you.
- Okay, next on the agenda is Michael Gryske.
- [Michael] Correct.
- Okay. Have you ever been here before?
- I have, yes.
- Yeah.
- Okay so, you're asking to move to 1687 Deckner Avenue, number zero?
- That is correct, it's a basement apartment.
- I did confirm that with the landlord.
- Okay.
- I had never seen that before.
- Alright, and you're currently living in Du Pere, correct?

- That's my address, I currently don't have a residency.
- Okay, right. You've been here before, I don't see why I can't find the?
- It was last year.
- Last August.
- Yeah.
- Its the outstanding thing.
- Yeah. So, unfortunately I don't know what occurred back then, so we're going to ask, at least I'm going to ask, for you to talk about your offense. Just make sure you don't list the name of the victim or the relationship of the victim. So, go ahead and tell us what happened.
- I was convicted of repeated first degree sexual assault of a child. The victim, I should say, I forced the victim to touch my penis and masturbate me, oral sex, and attempted penetration. She informed her counselor of that and legal proceedings started and I was found guilty. Sentenced to 13 years in prison, 17 years on supervision. Recently go out, last year, so it's been a year since I been released.
- And how old were you?
- I was 29.
- And the victim was?
- She was eight at the time.
- And what were you thinking?
- Nothing, it was a low point in my life. I was going through a lot of things and I just didn't have the coping skills or know how to communicate what was going on. And it was a bad decision and a bad choice at that time. I guess that was 16 years ago, I'm not that person that I was back then. I'm better now than I was in the past. Like I said I'm going through treatment. Learning, why I did what I did, and you know, having healthy coping skills and you know, because I broke the trust of adult and child. That was my belief, that no children should be harmed, and I broke that trust, I'm trying everything I can do to repair that, and it not happen again.
- And was it several incidents that occurred. Or was it like a one day thing.
- No it was not, it happened over a period of time.
- Like how long a period of time.
- Months.
- Okay.
- How did it come out.

- She told the counselor, and the counselor obviously reported it.
- And then did you plead guilty, or did you take it to trial.
- Took it to trial, based on legal advice.
- Okay.
- I didn't know anything about the legal system. So that I was told, plead not guilty. And at the trial was found guilty.
- Okay. Alright. And then where did you spend the majority of your time in prison at?
- I was at New Lisbon and Kettle Moraine.
- And did you receive treatment through them there.
- No I did not, after asking repeatedly to get into the treatment program, as I did have 13 years.
- Yeah.
- So, the Department of Corrections, failed. And they have never given me an answer, so I can't give you an answer, why they did not give me my treatment, but I'm currently in treatment.
- Before you go on, I forgot to tell you, that if you wanna talk about your treatment.
- Oh yes, yes, that's fine, public is fine.
- Public is fine, thank you. So then, you got released last year.
- Correct, in a year.
- And have you been doing treatment then.
- Correct.
- And where's that through?
- It's through, it was through ATTIC Services, I do have a letter from the facilitator.
- Oh, lets see that please.
- From her, but like the other individual said, they're in the process of.
- Contracts?
- Yes.
- Okay, so we have a letter here dated April 22nd, from Rebecca Carson at ATTIC, indicating that, she's providing a letter that he is, you started sex offender treatment group on August 27th, of 2018 and have

completed 30 sessions. You have attended all of your sessions. And you've made significant progress. You take responsibility for your offense, and challenge your past unhealthy sexual beliefs and behaviors. You've realized understanding of all concepts and how others often help explain them to others. Give examples of how you're applying concepts to your lifestyle. You have established how healthy coping skills, you have not had any issues following your rules of supervision, following through with sexual offender guidelines. Do you want to read that.

- Yeah.

- Okay so, tell us what you've learned in treatment.

- It was how I went in my beliefs and communicating how I was feeling, like I said, I didn't have those skills or know how to verbalize them and to find out what happened in the past when I was growing up and understand why those issues happened. So, where I'm now, if I feel those emotions come up again I know how to deal with them. Through the support system, through what I've learnt in class.

- I'm sorry, how many sessions do you have to attend?

- This is currently 60, so I'm half way.

- Half way there, okay. Once a week?

- Correct.

- Alright.

- Why are you moving from Du Pere?

- That's his mailing address.

- That's my mailing address.

- Oh a P.O box.

- Correct! It's just a P.O box.

- Is that the mail Post Office address? 123.

- Correct

- Oh okay, I'm sorry I thought it was.

- No, just a Post Office box. I'm looking to move into an apartment because it would give me more of a stability thing. I'm currently just living in my truck for work. And I'd like to, like I say, just have an apartment. Have the basic needs of food, water, shelter. Just to help me with, you know, I would like to volunteer, I'm looking to doing that, just something I can do to get back to community, as much as I can being a sex offender. A place to eat or shower, you know, things like that.

- Okay.

- I've been working, following my rules. Recently passed a polygraph in treatment. Basically, I'm doing everything I need to do. I think having an apartment would help that.

- Okay, in your application you indicate that your support system is your wife?

- Correct.

- So, where's she?

- She is in Florida.

- Okay.

- On vacation?

- No, no, live down there. Originally, I was going through a Near Safe Compact, to move to Florida, circumstances have changed, that's not an option. So, that's another reason for me to get the apartment up here is to establish myself more here in the community. Because I was planning to go to Florida, but, you know circumstance have changed.

- And why? Like what circumstances changes, that you can't go back?

- Because I would be considered a predator down in Florida. Lifetime monitoring, the rules would be really intense, for our lifestyle, would suffer for that. So, that decision was made for me not to move down there. Eventually, they will move up here. When my daughter graduates high school.

- Okay. How long will that be?

- Four years.

- When was the last time you saw your wife?

- I see them once a month.

- Oh!

- I go down there once a month or she comes up here once a month. So, we have that system in place and we do everything we can to make it work. She has been with me for almost 17 years.

- Okay.

- So, it's hard, but we make it work.

- Sure. So, I'm gathering your agent gives you a travel pass.

- Yes, correct.

- Okay.

- It's a privilege.

- It sure is.
- It's not given, like I said, by me doing what I need to do by following the rules. You know, by being honest and open. They recognize that, and I am grateful, because you know, it's my family, I have other family here in the area. You know, aunts, uncles, and grandmothers.
- okay.
- But, to go down there, you know, to spend time with my family, my wife and my daughters, it's big thing for, you know, support.
- Okay.
- And where do you work, you didn't have that filled in.
- I work for Veriha Trucking, out of Marinette.
- What is it?
- Veriha.
- Is that like a semi?
- Yes, correct.
- And you drive a truck?
- Yes, I do.
- Like.
- Those semis you've seen.
- Yeah, but I mean do you do it like.
- Out of state?
- Out of state?
- Correct, yes.
- Oh you do? How often do you do that?
- Everyday. I'm usually gone during the week. And back where I park the truck on the weekends. So that's part of the reason I'm working to get an apartment. So I can, you know, get out of that truck. You know, that lifestyle is fine for while, but sometimes you just need to sit in front of the TV, and relax and vege out. So that's what I am looking to do.
- So you are generally gone Monday through Friday, over the road, and then you come back on weekends?

- Correct.
- Okay! Alright. But when you said you slept in your truck I just thought.
- I should have clarified that, I should have clarified that, my apologies.
- Alright.
- Then I was surprised you were going state to state.
- Yeah.
- That's another privilege I've earned.
- Absolutely.
- My company is flexible to where I can work either local or do that and I approached my agent regarding that, and she said, you know, I don't have a problem with it. You are following the rules, you do what you need to do. I wish everyone was doing that. It's a kind of a reward. I do not take that for granted, one bit.
- Okay. Anybody have any other questions?
- I do not.
- No.
- Anybody like to make a motion?
- Sure. I'll make a motion to approve Mr Gryske, address specific, to 1681 Deckner.
- 86.
- 1687.
- Oh okay! I'm sorry, 1687 Deckner Avenue, number zero.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second.
- Okay, all in favor.
- Motion passes, three to nothing.
- Okay, so you're approved to move there.
- Thank you.
- Do you want us mail that there or to your P.O Box?

- To the P.O box is fine.
- Okay, so you're good to go.
- Thank you.
- Yep, good luck.
- Thank you.
- Okay, next on the list is Justin Zellener. And I see we have somebody who would like to speak on your behalf today. We'll get to that. You're looking to move to 241 Jacob Street.
- Correct.
- And have you been here before?
- Yes.
- And when was the last time you were here?
- Uh.
- Quite a while ago?
- Yeah.
- 226 Hillside, December 14.
- Okay! Alright, do we want to go over his offense? Again, it's been a while, or you okay from the reading?
- No, I'm okay.
- I am too.
- Okay, is it okay that we do that, or do we have to talk about it.
- You ask for whatever information you need to do.
- Okay, perfect.
- Discuss whatever information you need.
- I should have asked that earlier, I apologize. Okay so, we're not going to ask you about your offense because we've gone through that in the past. So, you've been living at the Hillside.
- Correct.

- We approved you then to live there. Why are you wanting to move?
- Because my grandma passed away.
- I'm sorry to hear that. And that was her home on Hillside?
- Yes.
- Okay.
- And then so, are you going to be, you'll still be living with your brother, is that correct?
- Yes, that's my.
- Okay! Alright! And are you currently working?
- Yes!
- And where are you working?
- Marquis Yachts, my parents carvery, it's kind of the same thing. They build boats out of Pulaski.
- Okay. Alright!
- Did you just start there?
- No, I probably been there, two years. A little over.
- How come you didn't put that in the work section? No one writes there work there.
- I know they leave it.
- That wasn't in there?
- No.
- No.
- Nothing written.
- You're not the only one.
- Yeah!
- I was curious to know.
- Alright, I'm sorry.
- That's alright. So, a couple of years you've been there?

- Yeah.
- Okay.
- Yes.
- Does your brother own the house? Who owns the house that you're moving to?
- Apparently, my uncle.
- Oh, okay. I just saw the same last name, so I was just curious. Okay, and then if we wanna talk about your treatment, are you okay to remain in public session, or you'd like to go to closed.
- Public.
- Okay, so it looks like you completed S.O.T back in 2016, and you haven't had any treatment following that?
- No!
- Okay! Alright! When did you actually get released from prison on your sex offense?
- Well, I wasn't in prison, I was actually in jail.
- You got jail?
- Yes.
- It's been quite a long time, right?
- Yeah! I can't even remember when it was , yeah it's been a while. It was supposed to be one year, I did nine months.
- Yeah, okay. So, it look's like 2014 you would have, been released from prison, I mean from jail, yeah sorry. And then how long were you on probation for?
- They give me ten years, I think I got four left to go.
- Okay, so as I'm looking at your judgment of conviction. It looks like there was an order filed on September 24th of last year, amending the J.O.C, Indicating no contact with any minors without prior agent approval and without the D.O.C's approved chaperon present, no personal computer, or any device with internet without prior agent approval. Did you have some kind of violation that order came through at such a late time?
- No, I don't even remember having.
- I don't know who would have filed that order.
- Yeah.
- But they did amend your judgment of Conviction to reflect that. I mean, or are those just general rules.

- Those are probably rules, yeah.
- So it looks like they didn't initially put them on there.
- At the time. I think that's what that is.
- Alright.
- I can't even have like no Facebook, no internet, you know, all that stuff. I'm fine with that, I don't want nothing to do with that stuff no more.
- Okay. Alright.
- I'm pretty much mainly busy at work now. I was on, excuse me, forty hours, but now we're on a mandatory 50 hours. So now I've got two houses, now for the new house I wanna get that house going, so I got a lot of work to do
- Okay.
- And your brother lives there now.
- Me and my brother live in grandma's house, 2061.
- Oh, your brothers moving, or he is also moving.
- He is also gunna move in with me at 241 Jacob Street.
- Okay.
- And if approved, when will that move take place?
- Tomorrow.
- We got a lot of cleaning up to do yet.
- We have a lot of emptying the house to do. So, I can't really give you a day.
- That's okay, just curious. Do you guys have any questions, or?
- No.
- Okay, and then if you wanted to come up to speak. We just ask that you state your name and address for the record.
- Okay, Tami Zellner, 3115 Carnoustie Way, New Franken, Wisconsin, five, four, two, two, nine.
- Okay, please have a seat.

- Justin's aunt, I would just like to say, as he said grandma passed away, my mother-in-law passed away end of February, so we're selling the house. He's been helping out a lot, him and his brother helping pack things up and move things out and moving them into the Jacob Street House with his brother. It will be a place we're going to help them out, make them pay rent, but not technically that they can save up money to, because technically the house is in our name, but Angie wanted it to make sure the house stayed with the boys so that's it's, the boys always have somewhere to go.

- Who's Angie?

- Oh sorry, my mother-in-law.

- Okay.

- Yeah, grandma.

- Okay.

- And what we would do is, kind of make sure to help them, everything goes well, that they would still pay rent, but it would be for their taxes and home insurance. So, make sure all that got paid. So, Justin's been doing, you know, helpful, we got him a cheque book to start getting things going, to start doing things on his own a little bit more, yes.

- Any questions for her?

- No, thank you.

- Okay, thank you.

- Because when I looked this up on family watchdog, it says Jason Zellner lives there.

- He moved out.

- He moved out.

- That's my other brother, my older brother. Yeah he lives there, and my aunt lives there. But they told my aunt she's got a certain time to move out because I was in grandma's will for us three boys to live there, but they told my older brother he didn't have to move, he could stay there, but he chose to move out with his girlfriend. So he's already packed.

- And that's Jason?

- Yes.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- He's gone already.

- Yes, he's gone already.

- Okay, thank you for clarification.
- Apparently he didn't wanna stay, he wanted to go with his girlfriend.
- Okay.
- Okay, that was my only question.
- Alright! Anything else?
- Not from me.
- Does anyone wanna make a motion?
- I'll make a motion to approve Justin, I wanna say Jason, sorry! To 241 Jacobs Street, address specific.
- Okay, is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Alright, all in favor? Is your other brother a J name also?
- Yes, and my dad. Just my mums not a J.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- All right, so you're approved to move to there, if you wish to move after that, you'll have to come back. Alright, thank you.
- Thank you appreciate it.
- Where do we mail the letter?
- Oh yeah, where do you want the letter to?
- The new address.
- Okay.
- 241 Jacobs Street.
- Alright, thank you.
- Thank you, have a good day.
- You too. Okay, our next meeting is June 12th at 4pm. I indicated that I will not be able to be present for that one. Public hearings, what's that all about?
- Just the next section. Move on to adjournment.

- Okay, if we could get a motion to adjourn the meeting.
- I'll make a motion to adjourn this meeting.
- Anyone second that?
- I'll second that.
- All in favor.
- Aye.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, so this is why I didn't, I denied that one. It's because we had all.
