VERBATIM MINUTES

- Okay.
- All right, I'm gonna bring to order the meeting for the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board for June 12th, 2019. We'd like to just start off with roll call.
- Okay, we have, Mr. Gerondale is here. Mr. Dorff is here. Ms. Cheslock is here, and Ms. De Cremer is here. So we have four.
- All right. Next, looking for approval of our previous minutes. If I have a motion, please.
- I'll make that motion.
- Second.
- All right. Okay, so I have a motion. Yes, you forgot to give the agenda. So we'll do this first.
- Okay.
- Okay, so that's all going second. All right. We'll go back to the agenda.
- If I could have a motion to approve today's agenda, please.
- So moved.
- Second.
- Okay. All in favor?
- Aye.
- Aye.

- Aye.
- All righty. On to regular business.
- Could I have a motion to approve the minutes of May 8th, 2018?
- So moved.
- Second.
- Okay. All in favor?
- Aye.
- Aye.
- Okay.
- Okay, first up on the agenda is Mr. Christopher Flory, by phone.
- [Man] Oshkosh Correctional?
- Yes, this is Dean from the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board. I was looking for records, please?
- Sure, hold on one second.
- [Sue] Records, this is Sue.
- Hey, Sue, this is Dean from the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board. I need to speak with Christopher Flory, please.
- [Sue] All right, hold on.
- [Christopher] Hello?
- Yes, is this Christopher?
- [Christopher] This is Christopher.
- All right. Christopher, this is Dean from the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board. We're here to hear your appeal to move to 1494 Morrow Street.
- [Christopher] 1494 Morrow Street, yeah.
- Okay. Before we begin, just wanna let you know if we wanna talk about any of your crimes, just refer to the person as the victim, not by any name or, like, it was my sister, or my daughter, or

anything like that. Second thing is if we wanna talk about your treatment programs, you can either do that in public or private session. Which would you prefer?

- [Christopher] It doesn't matter.

- Okay, we'll do it in a public session, then. Is that all right?

- [Christopher] That's fine.

- Okay, great. Okay. First of all, looks like you were convicted of five counts of pornography. Is that correct?

- [Christopher] Correct.

- All right, can you tell us how it became known that you had child pornography, and did you, when you were convicted, did you plead guilty to it or not?

- [Christopher] I plead no contest.

- Okay. So how did it become known that you had child pornography?

- [Christopher] From what I understand is, Verizon Wireless checked some photos that were in my background, as the cloud, that I didn't know I had. And they came up as possible solutions and they referred them to the police department.

- Okay. What do you mean, you didn't even know you had?

- [Christopher] I hadn't found out about 'em. I didn't see 'em until a month and a half after that, and when I saw them, I wanted to report it, but how do you report a crime like this? I went to try to talk to my wife's grandfather, and, so he's a retired police officer. At the time, he wasn't able to make time to talk to me about it, so I forgot about it. Kinda let it go. Deleted the pictures, it's like, okay, this'll all go away. And it didn't.

- So, are you saying you never downloaded those pictures?

- [Christopher] Not intentionally. That's why I plead no contest to it.

- Okay, I mean, but, did you view child pornography?

- [Christopher] The images I saw were inappropriate. They were not considered child pornography as a state law. The ones that I saw. The ones that these detectives saw apparently were, and they believed them, that's why I pleaded no contest to the charges.

- Okay, so in your opinion, you didn't watch child pornography? Is that correct?

- [Christopher] There was no video or anything like that. No, it was just an image.

- Did you view child pornography, in your opinion?

- [Christopher] Considering the images that I saw that were inappropriate, 'cause no one's child should be exploited like that, yes.

- Okay.

- Go ahead if you have questions.

- I'm sorry, this is Melissa Cheslock. I'm confused about your responses. The images that you were prosecuted for possessing on your computer. Did you see them prior to being contacted by the police?

- [Christopher] Not the ones I was convicted for, no. The two images that I did see, I did report to the police officers the ones I did see, and also the ones opted to delete.

- Is there a record that you contacted the police?

- [Christopher] No, it was during my interrogation, I had talked to about 'em and told them the images that I saw.

- Okay.

- Okay, I'm sorry. Did you contact the police and notify them that you had child, you located child pornography on your computer?

- [Christopher] It was on my cellular device, not my computer, and my intention was to talk to 'em about it.

- So is that a no?

- [Christopher] But I figured when I deleted the images that I saw, everything would go away, because I was hoping it would just all go away.

- Okay. So is that a no? What I'm trying to, I'm trying to figure out exactly what happened.

- [Christopher] My intentions were to, yes.

- I don't know, I'm not concerned about your intentions right now. I'm concerned about what exactly happened. Did you contact the police to let them know there were pornographic images of children on your, one of your electronic devices?

- He's saying no, he did not.

- [Christopher] Well I was, no, no, I was, during my interrogations, when they asked me about it, 'cause I had no knowledge of it, other than the ones that I had saw.

- So he's basically saying no.

- Okay.

- So, officer, do you have anything on the case in regards to how this played out?
- The formal complaint is what we refer to.
- Okay. So, in the criminal complaint, does it state that you found child pornography on his PC or his phone?
- Instant that he was talking about specifically right now is that there were images on his phone that he did admit that he had deleted a couple of them.
- Okay.
- But he had not reported them to the police department. prior to his arrest. Or his interrogation.
- And then, but you found images on his PC, correct?
- [Christopher] No.
- No?
- [Christopher] No.
- Cell phone.
- Just the cell phone.
- [Christopher] Which I hand over freely and gave 'em full access to.
- Okay.
- Well?
- All right, okay, does anybody have any more questions relating to his actual crime?
- Yeah, I do. This is Ed Dorff, and, yeah, my question is, you said that these images were downloaded onto your phone without your knowledge. How does that happen?
- [Christopher] The files I was downloading were, I was downloading manga comics. Which is essentially animated stories. They're quite large files, and many, multiple images in them. Because they're multi-page books. They were attached to those files. And I would download 38 different files, and I didn't go through all of them, 'cause I didn't read all the books I had downloaded. I only came across the two that I saw in one of the books I had saw.
- Extremely large files, and you download on your phone, not your computer?
- [Christopher] Correct. These are up to, some of them may have 2,210 images in a file. Depending on what kinda book I was reading.

- So, when the phone company saw these, were they going through the entire file, or were these images, these five or 10 images, by looks of it here, were they separated out from the rest of the pages of the books on the file?

- [Christopher] They were all in the same thing in the books in the file. When I had saw the images I did, I deleted the images I did. I wanted that folder away. I didn't want to see it, I didn't want to deal with it, I didn't know how to deal with it. 'Cause I was looking for advice on how to deal with it. I didn't get the the advice I wanted, 'cause I didn't, obviously, pursue it further.

- Did you have an attorney?

- [Christopher] I was represented by George Pappas, yes.

- Okay. I don't have any questions.

- Okay. Sir, I'd like to talk a little bit about, 'cause in looking at your file that you submitted, in terms of treatment programs, it looks like you said you were gonna try to get with SO two training. Have you not done that, or have you?

- [Christopher] Good, well, once again I'm toward, I'll work on it, the facilities here, we cannot, they cannot accommodate me for my treatment here.

- Okay.

- [Christopher] I've been trying since last June to try to get in and the last class I could've tried to get into was September of last year. But they start on time for these police programs.

- Okay. So when you get out, what are your intentions?

- [Christopher] Well, I fully intend to seek the treatment, 'cause the treatment is required. And follow the rules I'm given by my probation officer. And still work with police departments. 'Cause I have no ill feelings against the police department or anything like that.

- Okay. What was your, what position or what type of job did you hold prior to this conviction?

- [Christopher] I was an auto parts manager. I was basically assistant manager of the O'Reilly Auto Parts on, over by Walmart there, on the west side.

- Okay.

- [Christopher] I've been doing that for the last eight years. I worked for AutoZone, Advance, and O'Reilly's.

- Okay. And you're gonna be living with your spouse?

- [Christopher] Correct.

- And is she currently employed?

- [Christopher] Yes, she is.

- Okay.

- I have a question, if I may. The house, you knew about the restrictions on where you could live. Apparently, that's what came across to me in the letter you wrote. Is that correct?

- [Christopher] That is correct.

- And you and your spouse bought the house prior to coming to the Sex Offender Residency Board. Is that correct?

- [Christopher] At the time, we didn't know we had to come to you about that. That's the reason why we did it. But we did pick a house that we figured it was best suited for Green Bay as a whole. And it was worked on together while she was, I was incarcerated, and while she was on the street searching for the houses.

- I'm a little confused. I'm sorry. So you knew about the restrictions you would have upon your release, correct?

- [Christopher] Correct.

- Okay. And how were you made aware of this? Of these restrictions?

- [Christopher] There is an access to information here in facilities where we can look up directories and stuff to find this information out. And communicating with my wife, we have a further guess.

- Okay. And with regard to the restrictions, you found out that the city of Green Bay had an ordinance that prohibited you from residing in certain areas within the city?

- [Christopher] Correct, and we even had a map of it as well. She and I were going over that as well.

- Okay. I believe it's within the language of that ordinance that states that you, if you're going to reside within certain geographical portions of the city, that you have to first come before the board before you can move there.

- Right, which he's doing today.

- [Christopher] Am I currently not doing this now, then?

- Okay, but when did you buy the house?

- [Christopher] Last year, five seven, five 18 of last year.

- And you were incarcerated at that time?

- [Christopher] Yes.

- And you decided to buy that house because you realized that you were living too close to Firemans Park, is that correct?

- [Christopher] That was our, my wife's and I, general consensus, yes. Because I was less than 1,000 feet from the park. I could walk down the little alley there and be at the park. And I didn't think that was fair to the city of Green Bay.

- Okay.

- [Christopher] Otherwise, the purpose of this board would be pointless. Correct?

- Yep.

- So, right now, I'm assuming that, I'm assuming.

- [Christopher] And if you look at the map of Green Bay, there's like no place you can live except for one street in the pier.

- I mean, we know what the ordinance, we understand what the ordinance is right now on terms of the restrictions for housing. Another quick question for you. Is the house in both your wife's and your name, or just your wife's name?

- [Christopher] Currently, due to my incarceration, we both decided it would be best to be in her name.

- Okay.

- [Christopher] But there is a rule within your city ordinance as well stating that if I have a spouse and or a family member living at a residence for two years, I wouldn't have to come in front of you anyway. So if I bought the house in five eighteen of last year, my release date is nine seventeen of nineteen, I have eight months, technically, and I wouldn't have to talk to you guys, anyway. Is that not also in your ordinance?

- Actually, the ordinance was modified, so that rule no longer applies.

- [Christopher] When was it modified, 'cause currently my date of it is 2014, and that was the closest ordinance we could get at the time.

- It was modified, I believe it was in 16.

- 16?

- 16. I'm pretty sure. All basically it is, it took out what, that was considered a loophole, and so that was taken out of the ordinance.

- [Christopher] Can you please mail me a copy of that ordinance?

- I mean, the city can do that, no problem.

- [Christopher] Okay. I wouldn't mind have a copy, or have my wife have a copy as well.
- Okay.
- [Christopher] I mean, it's not that I'm trying to find a loophole, I'm just stating that that's what it was in the ordinance.
- No, no, I get that. So, I guess, is there any more questions that anybody has for him in regards to treatment programs, or his conviction?
- No.
- I have a, just a question on the release date.
- You've got a span of time from this September, all the way through mandatory release. Are you anticipating release this September?
- [Christopher] I have an ES date where I would go to supervised, extended supervision this September, yes. So I will be out on probation or parole, whatever you wanna call it, on September, and I will be released. I'm hoping that.
- Has that been confirmed, or you're just anticipating that?
- [Christopher] That has been confirmed.
- Oh, Ed? I was given a release date, expected release date of September 10th.
- Okay.
- I'm gonna call the prison.
- Okay, thanks.
- [Christopher] Now, my MR date is 2021. Or 2022, and that is when I'm completely off probation or any other services that are required for my component to stay.
- Yeah, I see that, 2022. Yeah, okay. Is there anybody in here that wants to speak either for or against him?
- I'm his wife.
- Sure, do you wanna come up, ma'am, just give your name and your address, please?
- My name's Bonnie Flory. I live in 1494 Morrow Street.
- Okay.
- Chris is my husband.

- Take a, sit down?

- I want him to come home. So we can try to move past this and build a family. And just be together again.

- Okay. How long have you been married, ma'am?

- This year, it will be nine years.

- Okay, okay. I mean, do you think that, that the downloading of the child pornography was accidental, or do you think he did it on, with notice of it?

- I honestly feel it was accidental, or with no notice, because if it was a habit, it would have been caught sooner. It would have been reported sooner, just like this was. It's never been an issue before.

- Okay. Anybody else have any questions, or anything else you'd like to say?

- I just want to say, the reason I picked the house that I did was because I tried to follow all the guidelines that were out there that I had access to. I did call here and ask if I could bring an address to the board and go through the process. But they said "no," that I couldn't because it was not my home. It was not an actual address that I was residing.

- Well, which you, he would have had, here's how it would have had to work. So, in other words, if he, when you were looking at the home, if he filed at that particular time, this application, saying, "hey, I'm looking at moving to this particular home, "I'm looking at buying it." He coulda done it that way, and then we could have, given it prior to you purchasing the home. Just from that particular standpoint. But, I mean, he's still incarcerated, so you're still in the, look, obviously you purchased the home prior to us giving you notice to it. So there is an opportunity that we could deny you at this point. But that's the way to do it, ultimately, is that, we've had people come and say, "hey, I wanna move to this location, "and I wanna buy a home, but I'm not doing it "until you give me the okay, obviously." So, okay, is there anything else, or else we'll let you go. All right, thank you.

- I have a question about the, I'm sorry ma'am, for your husband. There was a question on the form that you filled out, sir, and it was regarding, how do you feel the sexual crime affected your victim? And you left that blank.

- [Christopher] I believe I addressed that in the letter. It was easier to address in the letter than it was on the form. Essentially what it is is, I don't feel any kind of kid should be exploited like this, or anything like that.

- I'm sorry, can you, you went really fast.

- [Christopher] I don't feel any, someone should be exploited, period. I have never condoned child pornography. Anyone that touched a child, to me, is worse than a, is just, someone who doesn't know what they control, or don't know how to handle themselves in any way. That drives me up a wall. And being in here right now is probably the , it's very difficult sometimes. When you hear some of the stories that some people have done. With their victims.

- Thank you.
- [Christopher] It would actually horrify you, ma'am, believe it or not, some of the stories I know.
- Actually, probably not.
- We've heard a lot of 'em, unfortunately.
- Yeah, we've heard 'em, many.
- Okay, does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to Mr. Flory? I guess where I'm at at this is, obviously he hasn't had a chance to do any sexual offender treatment, which to me is always an issue. And the fact that, I think, they didn't come to us prior to purchasing the home, which was probably not the smartest thing to do, but it looks like they took some time to try to mitigate, if you wanna call, the distance to a park. So they understood that being close to parks, or churches or schools, is not a necessarily good thing. My feeling is, like we do with a lot of ones, is we wanna make sure we follow up, from a standpoint that he does get into treatment. And so, I think that's probably the one thing that I'm kinda thinking about right now, is to give him preliminary okay for a term of 60 days in which he has to prove that he's either signed up or got into treatment. That's what I'm kinda thinking right now. I don't know what everybody else's thoughts are, or, someone to make a motion to that effect.
- Yeah, it's just the not knowing for sure. He probably won't, but on our side, if he doesn't, at least he's got that investment to go to his classes and.
- [Christopher] No, I do fully plan to take the treatment.
- Okay.
- [Christopher] And I plan on signing up as soon as I can get out. I plan to work for my even mark off as soon as I can. That's never been an issue, my wife and I, that was the first priority I think I wanted to get done, when I come home.
- Okay. Well, I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Flory to 1494 Morrow Street, address-specific, for a term of 60 days from his release date, September the 10th, at which time he'd have to come back to us to prove that he's either in sex offender training or has been confirmed signing up to that effect. Is there a second?
- I'll second that motion.
- Okay, we have a second. So we need to vote on that.
- Oh, sorry, start vote.
- [Christopher] My vote count?
- No, it doesn't.

- [Christopher] I had to try.
- And tap me.
- Did he lawyer?
- You're trying.
- I know.
- How would you like me to mark you?
- Yes.
- Okay. So that motion passes, three to one.
- Okay, sir, you've been approved to 1464 Morrow Street for a term of 60 days, in which time you're gonna have to come back and prove to us that you've entered sexual offender training. If there's any documentation on how that treatment is going, you should bring that as well. So that would put you in our, probably, our November meeting. And so at that time, if you don't show up, you will automatically be revoked, and a police officer will go out there. So, we will send information to the 1494 Morrow Street. Okay?
- [Christopher] Okay, and can we get a copy of that new city ordinance as well?
- I've got a note.
- Yep. Okay, thank you.
- [Christopher] All right, thank you.
- The next is to Michael Sinclair.
- Present.
- Believe it's a Brown.
- Oh, this is a Brown?
- Sinclair's my middle name.
- Oh, I'm sorry.
- I didn't think everybody would know that.
- Mr. Brown, Michael Brown. Okay. Looking to appeal your appeal to 1864 Eastman Drive, correct? Eastman Avenue.

- Eastman Avenue.
- Okay. So, again, as we go over to your case, just refer to the person as the victim.
- Yes, sir.
- And then also, in regards to if we wanna go over any of your treatment programs, do you want to do it in public or private session?
- Public is fine.
- Okay. All right. Just check something here. Okay, so why don't you tell us a little bit about what happened with your victim, and then how it was brought to light.
- I guess the best way to say is direct, so, I sexually assaulted my eight-year-old.
- The victim?
- My victim. And it got brought to light by her going to her grandmother, I believe. I'm not sure, this was a long time ago, but as far as, like, in detail, so, the sky's kind of tough, but, that's the direct, I guess.
- So the victim was eight years old?
- Yes, sir.
- And how old were you at the time?
- I think 23.
- Okay. And it looks like you also had a conviction.
- That's the same victim.
- It's the same victim?
- Yes, sir.
- Okay.
- That was actually, I was actually one, when the case was brought to light, it was all together, but they split it up, and there was no way I could argue it, and I.
- Okay, and how did you plead in the case?
- Guilty.
- Okay, so, first question comes to mind.

- Okay.

- Is why would you do something like this?

- At the time, even now, I wanna say, which is, maybe. It was just a bad decision. I can't, I'm not going to sit up here and make an excuse for it. I'm not gonna sit here. I'm not one for, to go out and prey on young children, that's not my, and this was a isolated incident, so. But, and always, it was wrong altogether, so, I mean, I can't, I can't make excuses.

- But there was more than one incident. So it was the same victim.

- Right.

- Months apart.

- It was the, right. Yes, ma'am.

- So it's more than one decision. Doesn't make sense.

- Well, you've been seeing Mr. Drake here for, since January of '17?

- Yes, sir.

- So, have you not gone over in terms of treatments, gone over.

- Yes, sir, I've actually completed the, I'm in aftercare right now.

- Okay, but.

- We're in the, we in the process of, actually, me finishing it.

- Okay, so, I guess my question is, in that particular treatment, did you not try to find the root causes of why you did something like that?

- Okay, okay, as far as, okay. In that, in respects to that, that's, I have issues, I had issues, with my ego, so to speak. And the lifestyle that I lived before was very promiscuous and since then, I'm not that person. And I know the triggers to maybe lead me going back down that road, because I've heard the saying, "oh, I'm not like that anymore," but it happened in the beginning, it happened before. So who's to say that it couldn't happen again? So I know the steps to, I know the things that whip up, and the necessary steps to take so it doesn't happen again.

- And what would those be? Give me a couple examples.

- Well, one is to, I have cleared communication with my wife as far as our relationship and our marriage, and I'm not living that lifestyle anymore. I don't go out. I'm very closed off person. I go to work, I work 70 hours a week, and I come home.

- So, where were you living prior to this?

- We lived in Little Chute.
- Lived in Little Chute.
- And we went to the board there as well.
- Okay, so what ultimately decided to move up to Green Bay?
- Well, in the beginning, when I first was released from prison, my wife had already had everything established to us to live in an apartment in Green Bay. And I guess the, I was using the address from, as far as the mailing address and the apartment complex got wind of that and said that they didn't want sex offenders on their property. And we came up with a, I guess, a solution that we would move out and with no conditions of a criminal, but they couldn't sue us for breaking the lease early. So we moved out and we thought we would get a place. We moved to Old Town, thought we would get into a place kind of soon. And that never happened. We stayed in a hotel for five, about five or six months. And finally, we moved to Little Chute, we found the place out there, with a landlord that actually gave us a shot. And I didn't even know that we had to go up to the board there. But we did. We stayed there for a while, but I work right here in Green Bay, as well as my wife does, too. So the commute, 35 minutes every day, back and forth, the wear and tear on the car. I mean, sometimes, I get off six, seven o'clock at night and then turn around, drive 35 minutes, by the time I get home, get something to eat, take a shower, it's time to get right back, get a few hours of sleep, it's time to get right back up. And then, the winter times in here is kinda harsh, so. We moved back, we put a plan to move back to Green Bay.
- Okay.
- How long have you and your wife been married?
- [Woman] Five years.
- Okay.
- And when were you released?
- June 6, 2016.
- Okay.
- So, you were married while you were incarcerated?
- Yes, ma'am.
- Okay. And how did you meet?
- Through a friend.
- Okay.

- What time did this happen? You had US Army for everything.
- This was when I was in the Army.
- So it's considered a federal crime at that point.
- Okay, so that.
- Yeah, I've been on base before, Polk, Louisiana. I believe that would be Leesville? I'm not sure.
- Okay.
- If I had to put a county on it.
- And since that time, you've had no other interaction with the police or any other issues since you've been?
- No, sir.
- Is that true? Nothing out there? Okay. Any additional questions for him? All right, does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to Mr. Brown?
- I'll make a motion. To approve Mr. Brown, 1864 Eastman Avenue, address-specific.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second it.
- Any discussion anybody wants? All right, we can go ahead and vote.
- All right.
- You need to press A again?
- I do.
- There you go.
- Learn how to shake hands.
- That motion passes three to one.
- All right, sir, you've been approved to move to 1864 Eastman Avenue, address-specific. You do move again within the city of Green Bay, you will have to come in front of us. Where do you want that sent? In terms of the paperwork. 1864?
- Yes, sir.

- All right, thank you.
- Is Green Bay your home town? Are you from Green Bay originally?
- No. I'm originally from Virginia.
- All right.
- Thank you.
- Yep. Next up is Mr. Christopher Oatman.
- [Woman] That's you.
- Looks like you're moving to 1730 Badger Street.
- Yeah.
- Apartment two? All right, just give me a second, please.
- You know, for him, this is a 60-day follow-up.
- Yeah.
- This is a 60-day follow-up, okay.
- I'm currently living there now.
- I'll just get to the bottom of this, I was just gonna check. While I'm looking, does anybody have any questions for him?
- How's it been going, with everything?
- Good. I'm currently, I'm still in a Thursday group. It was in Appleton. Marshall Fitzpatrick, I think is his name.
- Okay.
- And then he found a place, we're working in the Micro Center. So I go over there on Thursdays for two hours.
- Okay.
- And I haven't missed a day yet. Been to every one. And I've been working. Haven't missed a day at work, haven't been late. And, 'cause I was working through a temp service, through SEEK. And then after I got my \$400, I worked 60 days, probation and whatever. And that was up on Friday.
- Oh.

- So I'm full-time, and.
- Good.
- All my insurance is now kicking in, so, it's cool.
- Do you have your documentation that you're still in the program?
- I didn't know I needed anything.
- It says appeal of Christopher Oatman, request to submit, actually bring day-to-day doc, will bring in documentation for treatment. That's what it says right here in terms of the notes I've got.
- I just got the letter from you is, I got two of 'em in the mail about, just.
- You would have been told that at the last meeting.
- Okay.
- Six months ago, so.
- I'm sorry, I didn't.
- It's in the letter we sent him on the 21st, please bring documentation of the treatments.
- I have the letter in my van, too, so. I got the letter.
- So it's in that letter.
- Okay, I'll have to reread it, 'cause I don't remember seeing it, and I really apologize.
- Was that the only condition?
- It says to bring back the documentation, yeah.
- Then my suggestion would just be to put this over till next month's meeting. And have him bring the required paperwork.
- What would you like for the paperwork, I mean, do you.
- Well again, it says, we asked you to, if you're in the treatment program, bring documentation for how that treatment is going. So it can't be just, say, "yeah, I'm here and I attended 10 sessions."
- Like I said, it's.
- How you doing? So if you wanna make that motion, that's fine.

- Motion to table this until next month's meeting for Mr. Oatman to bring in the requested documentation.
- And allow him to live at 1730 Badger Street.
- For an additional 30 days.
- Is there a second to that motion?
- Yes.
- I'll second that.
- Okay.
- So, send to Kathleen. All right. Start that one.
- Okay, that motion fails, two to two.
- Okay. So, basically, we're just telling, 'cause we had a two to two tie.
- So, that's, for clarification, a vote for yes means, yes, we're going to put it off for another 30 days and allow him 30 days, okay.
- Okay.
- That's correct.
- Yeah.
- So it failed, two to two.
- So, I guess, I'll tell ya, I voted no, because, to be honest with you, we did, the board gave you six months, they asked for one thing.
- This is not six months, it was only six weeks.
- Or 60 days, okay, that's even worse then in my opinion, because it wasn't, 60 days, we asked you to bring back one thing.
- Well I'm, like you said, I didn't.
- But that's not my problem.
- I know, I understand that.
- And so I'm just frustrated that.

- Well, so am I, 'cause like you said, this is, like you said, it's just one thing.
- Well again, they accommodated you based upon that treatment. And now we don't really know if you're really in it or not.
- Well, like I said, I'm in it. I got homework, and I got everything over there.
- Well, I have nothing to base that on. There wasn't anything for the first one.
- I mean, I can go get it right now, and I can come back before your meeting is done.
- Couldn't hear him, can you hear me?
- I mean, I would be willing to do that, like I said, and I said I got your letter in the mail, I wanna read that, too, 'cause like I said, I don't remember reading it in there. It just said that, come back and it's just meeting in this place. I could be wrong, I'm just.
- Okay, I'm gonna make a motion to move Christopher Oatman to, from number three on the agenda to number five on the agenda. Anybody wanna second that?
- I'll second that.
- Okay, hold on. Okay.
- I'd leave right now and make sure you're back.
- Oh, you need to have a vote, right? Quickly vote. And this is to move his item down. Let's see. Okay, that passes.
- Okay, and next is Mr. Santos. Okay, Mr. Santos. We're just here to go over a 60-day review in regards to your treatment programs. Again, I'm assuming that you're okay if we talk about it in public session?
- Yeah, sure.
- All right. Go ahead, tell us how it's going.
- Good.
- Tell me what you're learning.
- Wow. On the second let me out, I gotta go to a Spanish section. They got a, I got difficult understanding the words. You know, the big words.
- Okay.

- And I talk to my agent, and they, well, "don't go there no more, I gonna give you on the 14th." The day 14, I gotta see him again at nine o'clock. I wanna talk about that section that, that Spanish section. But they charge me \$12 for that section.

- So wait, have you gone to any treatment programs over the last 60 days?

- Yes.

- Okay.

- But he took me out.

- When did he take you out?

- I think about three weeks ago.

- Okay. And so when's your next meeting?

- The 14th.

- So, in a couple days here?

- Yes. Tomorrow is 13, the 14. At nine o'clock.

- Okay. Do you have any documentation that we asked you, or to move, or what do you have?

- Well, I got these letters that they tell me. I've got another one here.

- This is just from the city.

- I got other one here.

- Yeah, this is just because you were living some place illegally per our ordinance.

- And, uh.

- Do you have any documentation of, that you went to any treatment?

- I got it all in my house. I get all my notebooks.

- Sir.

- I didn't know, if I could brought 'em with me.

- Well, again, I'm just looking from the notes, okay? Because I wasn't here for this particular meeting.

- Uh huh.

- Again, we asked for a 60-day check-in, and usually when we do that, we ask for documentation. Is the plank wrong in that, or?
- I don't think they asked for documentation.
- No, they didn't.
- I don't remember them asking for anything. It was just to come back in 60 days to check in.
- Yeah.
- I can look.
- Well, Kathy, you were here. Remember or not?
- Yeah, I think, I mean, should've been documentation. I remember talking about, we're asking the same questions as you're asking right now.
- Okay.
- At that time, that's a reason we wanted him to come back. 'Cause we weren't getting anything.
- But if it wasn't in the minutes, it didn't.
- Yeah, it doesn't.
- There's a difference between this one and the previous one that the minutes don't say anything about documentation, but the previous one did.
- Oh, you're looking at the minutes?
- Yeah, so, I don't, even if that's what is normally requested, if it wasn't specifically requested, we can't hold him to that standard.
- Right.
- And in addition, the meeting on the 14th, who is that meeting with?
- George Jimenez?
- And who is Mr. Jimenez?
- My agent. My PO.
- Okay, and is.
- He wrote down this number in the back.

- Sure, and Mr. Jimenez, is Mr. Jimenez going to find you a Spanish-speaking group?
- Right.
- Okay.
- I got it right here. But I gotta go with him to.
- Sure, you have to go to him first, and then he'll find a program where they speak Spanish.
- Yes.
- Okay.
- He got, I do understand a little bit his English.
- Sure.
- But not that.
- That's fine, understood.
- I didn't went to school about, to the third grade. And I went to the fields.
- Okay.
- Okay. I'm gonna make a motion to table this until our next meeting, at which time Mr. Santos should bring documentation that he's in sexual offender treatment.
- I don't, okay, just.
- Go ahead.
- I don't think that's a good, simply because in the past, it's very difficult to get enough people in for one Spanish-speaking group.
- Okay, I don't know, that's all, okay.
- 'Cause they have to have somebody who is an interpreter, who's qualified, who can relate. What I would suggest is maybe getting an update from the PO and Mr. Santos as well. If he's enrolled, he's enrolled.
- Right.
- That's great. But if he's not enrolled, he should still come and bring some documentation from his parole.
- Like what? What kind of paper?

- Okay, so what we're asking, then, is that, we're gonna make a motion, okay? That you come back in 30 days and tell us if you're enrolled in a sexual offender treatment class, Spanish one. Okay?
- Uh huh.
- All right? So if you're enrolled in that, you have to bring the documentation that you're enrolled in that particular class.
- Papers, saying that I going.
- That you're in that class.
- Yeah, next month.
- And when it's going to start.
- In 30 days, I can bring the other ones that I have.
- Bring all of them.
- Yep.
- Okay, I will.
- Bring everything.
- Yep.
- But I need my sex offender on the go, but yeah.
- No, we're asking you to.
- To go.
- To a class.
- Uh huh.
- Okay, a Spanish-speaking class, okay? So you have to bring documentation that you are enrolled in that class.
- On 30 days.
- In 30 days.
- When you come back.
- You gonna send me a letter?

- We'll send you a letter.
- Okay.
- Okay?
- That mean I.
- All right, so I'm gonna make a motion for Mr. George Santos to allow him to stay at 1713 Amy Street until our next meeting. In which he needs to bring documentation that he is enrolled in a sexual offender treatment program. And if he has, if you are enrolled, if there's any information on how you're doing.
- Enrolled and or attending.
- Enrolled and or attending. Is there a second to that motion?
- And is it address-specific, 430?
- The 1730 Amy Street.
- Okay.
- Second.
- All right. Okay, so, motion back in at the next meeting.
- Next meeting.
- This may not be.
- July 10th.
- Right. Excuse me.
- Yeah, I was in, my other agent. Jeanne Doll, something like that.
- Jeanne Delane.
- Yeah, Delane. But I had a very good understanding of what said. So he put me with him.
- Okay.
- But on the 30 days notice, I will bring that, two folders with me. I got two folders with me.
- That's fine.
- You can all see it.

- Plus any of the new stuff. That you're enrolled in a new class.
- Uh huh.
- Okay. I'll set the vote.
- Deanna, is it possible to copy Mr. Jimenez on the paperwork you send, or do you do that anyway?
- Is that his new parole officer?
- Yes.
- Yeah, I do anyway.
- Okay.
- I'll call Jeanne and make sure he's added.
- Okay.
- To all this.
- All right, thank you.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- That has passed four to nothing.
- I'll see you then.
- Next is Mr. Verhagen.
- Ended, come on.
- Okay. So it looks, back in December of this year, you were looking to move to 1319 Day Street, but you did not show up.
- Yes.
- Okay. So now you want to go back to 1319 Day Street.
- Yes.
- Okay. Was he approved to live at 2670 University Avenue?
- No.

- I don't think so.
- I was not. That's a treatment facility.
- Yeah.
- Oh, okay. Okay, well why didn't you show up back in December? 'Cause I went to inpatient treatment, which was at that address.
- Okay. Okay, so. Let's, I guess, we're gonna start off from the beginning, then.
- All right.
- All right, so, again, we're gonna talk about your case.
- Yes.
- Just refer to the person as the victim. And then if we want to talk about your treatment programs, can we do that in public, or do you wanna do it in private?
- Public works.
- Okay.
- So, tell us about your crime and what happened.
- I had sexual intercourse with my victim. It was at a party. We were both using.
- Using what?
- She was drinking, I was on Xanax.
- And you weren't drinking either, or you were drinking too at the same time?
- I, I'm gonna be honest, I don't think I was drinking. I wasn't, I don't think I was drinking, 'cause I had court that day, and even though I've been an addict since I was 10, I shouldn't have been using, but I did. You know, she was, she wanted to have sex, said no on the first couple times, and then eventually I gave in to her. And I went to jail from that court appearance. And then the next day, the party, detectives said that I raped her. And then I said, "what?" And then I thought the police officers were gonna stay here, 'cause they made me have this, but, like, she said I held her down and, like, viciously raped her, I was like, "that's not true." And then the officer said it's my word versus hers, and then I had proof, 'cause all the messages she sent on my phone. I don't know if you guys have a copy of the police reports. But, so there was that, and then they went, they got my phone, then he went back and he questioned her. And then she said that she made it all up. She just thought that I was leaving her and kinda used her. And she felt bad, but. And then because she's under the age of 18, the state picked up the charges.
- So, did you know how old she was when you had sex with her?

- Oh, no, I did not.
- How long did you know her prior to that incident, that time, that party?
- I had met her, I just met her there.
- Okay. When were you released?
- For that? Or for, what do you mean? I was released from prison in 2010. For that, well, for that I didn't go to prison. I was under probation. But I got revoked and went to prison. Because of revocation, I did three years, which I got out in 2015.
- Okay.
- I was sentenced to a withheld sentence for that.
- So, okay. So then you had, you also had possession?
- Yes.
- In 2015?
- Yes.
- And that's why you were revoked?
- Yes.
- Narcotics, okay.
- Were you on a prescription, or is that street?
- I was on prescription, I abused it, but I was also using street drugs. I mean, I've been, like I said, an addict since I was 10. I've, I have a problem.
- How long were you in inpatient treatment?
- This last time, for 120 days.
- Are you sober now?
- Yes.
- How long?
- I've actually just completed the program for two weeks. But I've been sober since November 8th.
- Good for you.

- Okay. So, you, okay, nevermind, I answered that question. Anybody have any more questions relating to his offense?

- How old were you at that time?

- 19.

- And your victim was how old?

- 14, he said.

- 14.

- 14, okay.

- Sir, are you currently employed?

- Yes, sir.

- Where do you work?

- I work at American Foods.

- How long you been working there?

- This time, three months, I've been at there for the past three months. I worked there before I got incarcerated, though. I lost the job because of incarceration. And when I went through treatment and I finished my first probation OBA, my primary OBA, that's when they allow you to get a job. And you went, you went aftercare. And that's when American Foods, they hired me back.

- Okay. All right. Anybody else have any more questions for him? Does anybody wanna make a motion?

- Are you still, if I may. Are you still attending NAs or anything like that? Any additional treatment?

- Actually, I'm gonna be honest. I don't think NA and AA are really good at helping me. 'Cause I've been doing that since I was 12.

- Doing what?

- AA, NA, AODA, CGIP, anger management, T4C. I've done them all and I have stacks of completions. And I always complete those perfectly fine. My problem is, and which, I have just got insurance with my work, I think I need mental health things. Because I've been through a lot, being in foster care and things like that. So I think that's where my drug problem comes from. And I had just signed up at options I discovered for my insurance to go through. And I'm trying this new thing, it's called brain spotting.

- Okay.

- I don't really know how it works, but I've, from the inpatient treatment I was just at. Like the AODA facility, my POS, what she recommended, she says, he can teach you to do this by himself. He's, he knows all the material. And she's the one that recommended mental health.

- Okay.

- And then she told me about this brain spotting, and I said I was gonna try it, 'cause I mean, I've been doing mental health for a long time, too. Dual diagnosis, all of that, but I've never heard of brain spotting. So I mean, it's worth a try to try something new to try and better myself. So, but that doesn't, I put a, I went there last week and there's a waiting list. So I won't start that until possibly August.

- Okay. And in the meantime, what are you going to do?

- Usually, every Thursday there's a, it's not really a group, it's like a talking circle. Called the Wise Men's.

- Is that at Wise Women Gathering Place?

- Yeah.

- Okay.

- Yeah, it's right next to Babcock.

- Is that with Mr. Redhawk? Is it red?

- James King, Wesley, I forget his last name. Rick Lace and Ron Kelly. Ron Kelly used to be a social worker at the junior correctional facility.

- Okay, so you're going there once a week?

- I mean, I go there, I'm not gonna say it's a once a week, but when I can make time because I work a lot, being at American Foods. So I mean, I've gone. I can't say it's every week, though.

- Okay. I would feel more comfortable, until you get started with your mental health treatment, for you to go to continue what you're doing, the Thursday night meetings.

- Yeah.

- So you have some support.

- So, does anybody have any more questions for him before anybody wants to make a motion?

- No.

- So go ahead if you wanna make a motion.

- Okay, I did jump in there, didn't I.
- It's all right.
- I'm sorry.
- No, no, don't be, no.
- Okay. How about approve address-specific to the Day Street address for a period of 60 days. And when you return, 60 days will be August. When are you supposed to start in August, with your.
- They didn't give me an actual date, they just. Well, like August, somewhere in late August, I think it's the 24th. But it's not really quite set in stone yet. Depending on when my insurance goes through.
- Okay, so let's do it then for 90, I'm sorry. 90 days, to address-specific, and to, when you come back, bring proof of your enrollment and attendance in the mental health treatment and proof that you are going every Thursday to the Wise, what was the?
- Wise Men.
- Wise Men.
- I have a question. Is there any way I can send you guys a letter, also? 'Cause I miss work for this, I work second shift.
- No, you gotta be here. You know, it's 90 days, so it's gonna be one shift you're gonna have to miss in September.
- It's only gonna be one more time, you're not gonna have me come back, keep coming back over and over every time?
- Well, so long as you provide us the documentation.
- Oh, I have documentation.
- Documentation that proves that you're in treatment and you're doing okay.
- And my thing is.
- I can't guarantee anything, but that's, would be the intent.
- Oh no, that's fine. I just, I don't wanna keep missing work, 'cause we only have so many points.
- Yep, understand.
- Yeah, so I don't.
- Can you switch a day with anybody? Do they allow that?

- Well, I mean, this, it's a, there's really no switching days. And like, working second shift, it's not like you just go in. I have to relieve someone. So my starting time changes every day, like, one day I'ma start at two. One night I be three, one night I be three thirty, so I mean, it's different every. I get a email every day for what time I have to come in.

- Okay.

- Okay.

- So I just, you know.

- Yep, so that's fine, just telling ya some.

- And then can I, I don't know if you sent me a letter or not. You know, all those guys before me got letters.

- Yeah, I sent one out to the University Ave address that was, so that's where I mailed it.

- Oh, okay, that's why I didn't. Okay, yeah, probably sent it back.

- Yeah, I haven't gotten anything back yet. So, I don't know, maybe they're still holding it there.

- So we have a motion. So is there a second to the motion?

- I'll second that motion.

- Okay, so let's go ahead and vote.

- Okay. Okay, that motion passes, four zero.

- Okay, so now, where do you want this paperwork sent? Do you want.

- The Day Street.

- Day Street?

- Yeah, it's my father's address.

- Okay, so we'll do that for ya, okay?

- Yep.

- All right, thank you. We'll see you in 90 days.

- All right.

- Next up is Mr. Christopher Oatman.

- Christopher Oatman. Okay.
- Make sure we're here, this is.
- This is the letter that I got. It don't say nothing about no documentation or nothing. That's why I said I didn't know I had to bring it in.
- But, again, if it was documented in the notes, it clearly had said something, so, you obviously have to come back, so this is a notice to come back. So, do you have anything or not?
- Yeah, this is the homework that I just did. This is all our assignments. I have, like I said, I wasn't sure about, I sent my PO notes. I brought that to her, I saw her this morning. This is his meetings that I go to. I don't know if you can call him. You know, to verify it, too.
- Well, he's probably not going to do anything over the phone because of confidentiality with HIPAA. So, it would have to be in writing.
- That's the group book was here. And this is another book that I, one of my assignments there on the first page. Book two. Assignment I just did that my PO's gonna want.
- Okay, what he's given me, and I'll let everybody take a look, is obviously a workbook. But on the front, it has basically homework and number of sessions and dates completed and so forth in regards to the treatment programs. What assignment number is the one you just handed her?
- That's the first one.
- The first one.
- And this is the second.
- Okay. And when did this start?
- Not sure.
- Well if it's only your second assignment, you must have been only to a couple classes.
- Well, he did not give me that workbook until maybe like four weeks after the intro.
- Okay.
- So my PO even emailed him to see if he could print it off for her, so she could give it to me, so.
- Okay. Anybody wanna see the assignment or the book?
- I do.

- And then he said that, one of my group members, I just called him on the way there and so, and he was there for that meeting, too, he had to go for 60 days. And he said the same thing, he don't remember anything about documentation, so.
- Okay. All right.
- Like I said, otherwise, I definitely woulda had it. Have any stuff. I mean, I know it's in your notes and stuff, but, like I said, I don't know, 'cause we never discussed that with my family and stuff, we just, like I said, I never, I don't think it came up.
- Well, here's what I'm gonna make a motion. I'm gonna make a motion to approve Christopher Oatman to stay at 1730 Badger Street, apartment two, for an additional 60 days, at which time, when he comes back, he has to bring written documentation from the plan provider of how many classes you have attended and your progress within those classes.
- Okay, sounds good. Is there a second?
- Second.
- I'll second.
- So the motion, and the person who seconded?
- It's one of us.
- Kathy or I.
- Second planned. So that motion is to approve Mr. Oatman for 60 days, the 1730 Badger Street address-specific to bring proof of attendance.
- Class attendance from provider, as well as documentation as to his progress.
- Okay. I have Kathy as the move, yep. And progress, second.
- Like I said, Mike Neo knows I'm going, otherwise I'd get rerevoked, something could happen, so. I'm just saying.
- Okay, that motion passes, four zero.
- Okay, so we'll see you in 60 days.
- All right, thank you very much.
- All right, our next meeting is July the 10th. Is there any new business anybody has?
- I, just so it's clear, I am not gonna be here on July the 10th.
- Okay. Could I have a motion to adjourn?

- So moved.
- Wait, hold on. Not so fast. Okay, motion, so Dean and then Melissa to adjourn. Okay, I'm just gonna mark you all as yes.
- Yes.
- Yes.
- Who wants to stay? Nobody, okay.
- No one else, no takers.
- There we go. All right, thank you.
- All right, thanks.
- Thank you.
