Verbatim Minutes

- It's stuck, oh wait, here we go.
- Okay, we'll call the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board to meet. First thing is roll call.
- I've got everybody logged in and present already.
- Okay, and then we'll need a motion to approve the agenda.
- So moved
- Second
- All in favor?

- [Group] Aye.
- We'll need an approval for the minutes from the August 14th, 2018 Sex Offender Residency Board Meeting.
- I'll make that motion
- Second
- All in favor?
- [Group] Aye.
- The first appeal we will hear is Roy Saldana. You can step forward, come on up.
- Where should I sit?
- Right here.
- [Roy] Can my nephew sit over here, he's representing me?
- He's representing you like he's a lawyer?
- [Roy] No, he's here with me I mean.
- Oh he'll have an opportunity to speak.
- Is this the first time you've been here to see us?
- [Roy] Yes.
- Okay, so what we're gonna ask is that you tell us what you were convicted of, how it came to light. We'll ask you some questions. The one thing that we ask of you is to not name the victim or the relationship of the victim. So go ahead and tell us what you were convicted of.
- [Roy] Sexual Assault
- And did you know the victim?
- [Roy] Yes, I did.
- Okay, and tell us what you did.
- [Roy] Just touched her and all that.
- What does all that mean?
- [Roy] I rubbed her parts that I wasn't supposed to.

- Through clothes or on skin?
- [Roy] Huh? Through clothes or on skin?
- [Roy] Skin, no clothes.
- Did this happen more than once?
- [Roy] Yes, it did ma'am.
- How many times.
- [Roy] I can't remember. Don't get me wrong, I've had seven strokes. My brain I can't go way back.
- Are you okay?
- [Roy] Yeah.
- Are you with him?
- [Man at Table] No.
- He's an interpreter in case we need one.
- Oh, I see.
- Sir, would it better if we called you, if you had time to rest for a minute and we call you again?
- [Roy] No, no, no, let's get this done ma'am.
- How old were you when this happened?
- [Roy] About 21 or 22 ma'am.
- And how old was the victim?
- [Roy] I think she was 16 or 17.
- What I'm looking... Well the case is out of Marinette County, correct? So you're not gonna have anything?
- I have the criminal complaint.
- Oh, okay, is he at least somewhat right?
- Somewhat would be yes.
- Is there any more that you can elaborate on?

- What about the charge?
- With two counts incest, count one was sexual assault of a child under age 13, count two was incest, count three was incest, count four, count five the same.
- What year did these incidents take place?
- First count July of '98.
- Sir, what year were you born? What year were you born?
- [Roy] '52 ma'am.
- Okay, so it would seem as though you were closer to 46 when this happened.
- [Roy] Ma'am I'm not gonna lie to you, I can't remember ma'am. If that's what it say well maybe.
- Can you tell us anything else?
- The incidents occurred and stopped in 2006 and the victim in this particular case is between 11 and 17.
- And how did it come to light?
- I believe she reported it to an acquaintance who then called the police department.
- Sir, did you fill out this application yourself? To do the appeal, did you fill it out or did somebody else fill it out for you?
- [Roy] Somebody else but I can't remember who it was.
- Heidi?
- [Heidi] It was his nephew. He came to the office and he just had limited information.
- Okay, okay. Are we correct that you served five years in prison and then did you serve five years extended supervision?
- [Roy] I was clean, everything, I mean, clean. No, what do you call it, no harassment. My P.O. calls, my first client that I ever had. Never got in no trouble, not even a ticket, nothing.
- Lieutenant, lieutenant I'm sorry if I got that. Commander, I demoted you, I'm sorry! Commander can you tell me what the year is of that complaint?
- This was filed in 2006.
- 2006 and the offense years?

- Offense years were between July of 1998 and March of 2006.
- And 2006
- Correct
- So you were convicted in Marinette County on all of your cases that you've had. Why do you want to live in Green Bay?
- [Roy] Because that's where I'm born. I mean I'm born in Oconto but I've been in Green Bay, that's where all my family's at.
- How long have you been in Green Bay?
- [Roy] Well I'm born in Oconto and I've been in Green bay since the 50's.
- Okay, so where have you been living the last 20 years?
- [Roy] Green Bay.
- So how come you're just coming to us now?
- [Roy] What I mean is now, well because the case I got.
- I have a question sir. In the paperwork that was submitted with your appeal specifically it says that you want to move to 332 South Madison Street, Number Four in Green Bay, is that correct?
- [Roy] Yeah.
- Okay, if you don't live there, do you live there now?
- [Roy] Yes.
- Okay, how long have you been living there?
- [Roy] A couple of weeks.
- Okay, where did you live before that?
- [Roy] In a halfway house.
- For how long?
- [Roy] Oh, first I was in a nursing home, I take it back, for maybe about a month but then they took me out because I had a stroke and I had which made it six strokes. And then I went to a nursing home, I had another stroke and I'm up to seven strokes already which they say that my brain is paralyzed on the right and on the left one more stroke again like that I won't be here no more.

- Mr. Saldana what I'm confused about, maybe you could explain it to me, is almost every one of your offenses, your convictions occurred in Marinette County. That goes from 2006, all the offense dates for the incest were in 1998, '99, 2003, all of which were in Marinette. So when these offenses occurred they were in Marinette, not in Green Bay, not in Brown County.

- [Roy] I lived in Wausaukee, if you know where that is.

- So you've lived in other places, correct?

- [Roy] Yes.

- Okay, you have family here in Green Bay?

- [Roy] Yeah

- Who

- [Roy] My family's in Green Bay.

- Who?

- [Roy] My brothers and sisters.

- Is you nephew in Green Bay.

- [Roy] Yeah, he lives in, what street is it?

- [Morrell] 332 South Madison Street.

- Okay, and I guess my confusion is you had said that you've lived here, other than being born in Oconto, you've lived here your entire life. But that's not exactly accurate is it? You've lived other places, right?

- [Roy] Well yeah, I travel, I used to be a migrant worker, I travel. But we ended up in the 50's in Green Bay.

- Understood, it's just on your paperwork that was submitted it said that you used to live in Green Bay between 1950's and the 1980's. It doesn't list anything about recent time.

- [Roy] Oh, we went to Texas and all that, with my parents and all that. To Wyoming and then we come back to Green Bay and that's where we stayed. And we told our dad we didn't want to travel no more, so we stayed in Green Bay.

- Okay.

- Mr. Saldana you also said that you never got a ticket for anything.

- [Roy] When I was in prison, nothing. Even when I was on probation.

- Yeah but when you're out of prison but you have several OWI's.
- [Roy] Oh that yeah, that I'm not gonna deny yeah. That's the reason I went to prison.
- The reason isn't for the incest?
- [Roy] Yeah that, but what I mean, for drunk driving was the first I got put in jail and then for there.
- You've got a few.
- [Roy] Yes I did. I'm now, like I said, I've been clean for 17 years. Clean without a ticket like when I was in prison too. No tickets, no nothing, I was on a monitor. Like I said my P.O. she never had no money to follow the rules and prison made a man out of me.
- So since you've been out of prison you've been in Green Bay?
- [Roy] Yeah.
- Why did you have a sex offender program report done on you in 2017?
- Sorry you can't ask that.
- We'll wait, I'm sorry.
- Do we have any more questions regarding this case? Okay, Mr. Saldana, we would like to talk to you about your treatment that you may have received. You have the opportunity to do that in open or closed session. Open would mean everybody remains in the room. Closed would mean everybody has to leave and it would only be us. How would you like to talk about that?
- [Roy] To me it doesn't make no difference I guess.
- Okay, then we'll remain in open session.
- Okay, so my question is you had a sex offender program report done in February of 2017. Were you in treatment all the time after you got out of prison?
- [Roy] I can't remember where the hell I did it. I forget a lot of stuff. I can't remember where I did it, I know I did in prison I did some. Once they were done I was released. And then, when I was on probation, I went to Texas.
- Well this was done in Wisconsin.
- [Roy] Okay.
- And you were saying it didn't happen. You absolutely denied that it happened.
- [Roy] I can't remember that I'm not gonna lie.

- It looks like you did this program at Off The Couch. Does that sound familiar as the group?
- Would your nephew, does he have any of these answers?
- [Roy] He might, I don't know how many answers.
- Okay can we please have you step up here?
- [Roy] Wait for the chain of command.
- Come on up.
- Please step up here. If you could just please state your name and address for the record.
- Full name is Morrell M Saldana Jr, 332 South Madison Street.
- Okay, so are you familiar with the treatment that he went through?
- [Morrell] I've got something here.
- Okay this is...
- [Morrell] That's all the treatment he did that I know of.
- Well, no, this is Libertas is alcohol and AODA.
- [Morrell] Right, that's all he was provided with as far as treatment.
- Really? This is exactly what we have.
- [Morrell] That's all I have.
- So you do you have any clue why in 2017 he would've done treatment?
- [Morrell] No idea, I didn't have any contact with Roy, Mr. Saldana, at that time. I just recently got involved in his situation.
- So do we have any idea, so in 2007 you were convicted of this case and were sentenced to five years. So that would put you in prison til 2012. And in 2012 you were released back into community?
- [Roy] Yeah.
- And where did you live at that time?
- [Roy] Wausaukee.
- Wausaukee, and at what point did you have to go back to prison, in what year?

- [Roy] I never went back.
- You never went back.
- [Roy] No.
- So you served your five years extended supervision on the streets?
- [Roy] Yes, like I said, I never got no ticket, never got in no trouble, nothing.
- I think we're all just extremely confused as to why you would do a treatment in 2017 when basically you would've been off paper, give or take by that time.
- [Morrell] Mr. Saldana didn't get off paper til August 8th of this year.
- Which is beyond his 10 years.
- [Morrell] He was released from the Department of Corrections in Marinette on that day and he's been with me ever since.
- Okay, so did you help your uncle complete the paperwork?
- [Morrell] I orchestrated it, yes I did.
- So it seems as though we're missing some information in between this year and 2012. Meaning something happened that caused him to go back to the Department of Corrections, back to prison.
- [Morrell] Well originally Mr. Saldana was up for charges for drunk driving as you mentioned. And then, this happened, so that's what caused him to go back, those charges were pending.
- Okay, but then still it would only place until 2012.
- [Morrell] I'm pretty sure Mr. Saldana was incarcerated at that time. He was already convicted. He got released, I believe, in 2013 he's been out ever since.
- Never back in custody anywhere?
- [Morrell] Never, nothing.
- Correct me if I'm wrong, I may have misheard you, you said that you've only recently been in contact with him?
- [Morrell] I mean I've developed a relationship with him because of the situation.
- And when did that begin, your relationship?
- [Morrell] It's been going on for a good year.

- A year, okay.
- [Morrell] Prior to that Mr. Saldana lived in Wausaukee like he mentioned. His roommate passed away so the kids took over the house so he had to relocate. So he's kinda been bouncing around during the last year.
- Do you have any idea why that report was.
- [Morrell] This report that I have handed to her is what was given to me from his ex probation officer from the Department of Mental Health. That's all he had on his file, it's the only treatment that he received during the whole time he's been in this.
- So just the alcohol, the Libertas alcohol and drugs.
- [Morrell] He was never offered anything else so he didn't have to do anything other than what that paper says.
- Melissa, the incest sentence was consecutive to the fifth conviction.
- Okay.
- That would be what the difference is.
- I didn't see the file
- I didn't either Okay, then that makes more sense.
- Do we have any more questions or would anybody like to make any kind of a motion?
- I'll make a motion, I'm going to deny Mr. Saldana, address specific 332 South Madison Street and basically because we obviously have a lot of offenders and this all happened in Marinette.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that but I would like to add that my concern is that according to that report, which was only two and a half years ago, it lists a lot of indicators where I am concerned about the risk of re-offending or triggers. There seems to be some behavior that is not appropriate. So based on the fact that, although I commend you Mr. Saldana for advocating for your uncle, that's very admirable a lot of people won't do that. I think there's a lot of information that we are missing and I know that you were only given that one document but enough of that information causes me concern. So I will second that.
- We'll vote on that. Could you just explain once how it works again?
- Yeah, so if you're voting yes that's to deny, no is not to deny.

- [Morrell] Well this creates a problem here because currently Mr. Saldana housed at 332. He's been there since I filled out all the necessary paperwork. So what do you suggest, as the board here, I do with Mr. Saldana in the meanwhile?
- Well we first have to see what happens with the vote.
- Motion to deny passes unanimously.
- Okay, so that means he's not allowed to live at the address 332 South Madison. So if he continues to live there he will be fined and you will be fined. So he needs to move somewhere else.
- [Morrell] Is there a time frame as far as relocating him?
- Now, he should not have been living there until he got permission.
- [Morrell] Well that was the question I brought up when I came here and the lady sitting over there.
- I told him I couldn't tell him what to do.
- [Morrell] She said as long as I let the Police Department and the Department of Corrections, fill out the paperwork. They know where he's at, he hasn't been hiding from anybody. All parties are aware of where he's at. We haven't done nothing wrong.
- While an application is pending, at least, I advise the police not to issue citations. But now that the board's made a decision.
- [Morrell] Right, this puts a whole light on what's going on here. So that means I gotta go home and do some homework.
- Yeah and he's gonna have to find another location to live.
- [Morrell] I call it brainstorming. I could go over by Brothertown.
- As long as it's not in the city of Green Bay.
- [Morrell] Lost my train of thought here. So I gotta soon as possible make some arrangements to have him removed from Green Bay, is that what you're telling me?
- From your address.
- The restricted section of Green Bay map is available on the city website.
- [Morrell] I do have that map.
- Yeah, if you have questions.
- [Morrell] It's red all over.

- And that's why we supply...
- [Morrell] Where's the guy supposed to live around here?
- Well if you can get answers to some of the questions that we had and maybe he could come back with a different address. It's possible if there's changes.
- [Morrell] There are a lot of questions unanswered here but unfortunately I was sitting over there. I didn't have the, you guys were in charge. I understand the chain of command.
- Sir, the board has voted. If you have follow up questions we can answer them in the Law Department.
- [Morrell] Well we got a lot of people here that are here for the same, I mean, I don't want to take no more people's time.
- Right
- Exactly
- [Morrell] But my question is is this over with? There's no coming back?
- Not to this address.
- [Morrell] So do you have any suggestions where we can go from here as far as?
- We're not allowed to give legal advice or make recommendations like that.
- [Morrell] Now you're forcing me to brainstorm again.
- Thank you.
- If you have follow up questions you can find us at the Law Department.
- [Morrell] Okay.
- Okay, thank you.
- Next on the agenda is Faustino Navarro.
- Heidi, I received a phone call today that he is not going to make it that he has a
- Oh, could we have a motion to take the matter off the schedule?
- It's either approved or denied.
- Denied, motion to deny

- Second
- Brittney was that you that seconded?
- Yes. Again, a yes vote is to deny an appeal. Okay, why don't you pass those down to me.
- Next on the agenda is George Santos. And it's my understanding George that you needed to bring documentation of enrollment and/or attendance in a Spanish-speaking sex offender treatment program to the meeting. But, before I go any further, first do we have any questions? I mean, this is the reason why he's coming back.
- Yeah, the only reason.
- Okay, he has the option to go into closed session or remain in open session to discuss this.
- [Interpreter] I don't have anything to hide.
- Okay, let's see the documentation that you have.
- [Interpreter] This is what they sent me.
- That's what we want to see.
- That may be the letter from me.
- Included in the packet is a referral to purchase offender services that we received from his P.O. So he's been referred to receive these services but he hasn't gotten these services yet.
- Okay, so we have the referral
- [Interpreter] Hmm?
- The P.O. did tell me it's going to be difficult to get him into a Spanish-speaking program.
- Time!
- What's the question?
- [Interpreter] He went yesterday to see the P.O.
- [Interpreter] I have a business card.
- No, that's fine, we're okay.
- So it looks like your appeal is attempting to find you some treatment.
- [Interpreter] There's nothing available at the moment.

- Just for clarification that's treatment with a Spanish-speaking facilitator, yes?
- [Interpreter] My son says if there is any questions they can call him.
- [Interpreter] P.O. I'm sorry, P.O.
- So, do you have insurance?
- Health insurance.
- [Interpreter] Forward Health
- [Interpreter] I have it with me.
- I'm just wondering if there's an opportunity for him to find a facilitator through his insurance versus going through the Department of Corrections.
- It would be like one on one treatment for a sex offender.
- [Interpreter] To who, to who?
- Department of Corrections?
- Yeah, no, instead.
- Insurance.
- [Interpreter] So that would be one to one, right?
- Mm hmm, is that possible for him to look into that?
- [Interpreter] I have insurance for my medications and stuff.
- [Interpreter] But not for whatever you're asking me.
- Not for treatment?
- [Interpreter] But I don't know, I don't know.
- Has your probation officer asked you about insurance?
- [Interpreter] He never asks so he doesn't know did he have insurance. But I do have insurance to get medicine, to see the doctor.
- Is this something we could make a phone call like you to his P.O. to see if his P.O. could go through his health insurance?

- I could give them a call tomorrow. I'm almost positive that Catholic Charities does have a Spanish-speaking person that facilitates. I know at least a DV.
- I could reach out to
- Oh yes, that a good, yeah.
- Okay, so I think what we're going to do is we're going to try to see if we can make some contact to see if his agent can try to make some insurance but we'll probably have to have a motion here to make sure that's acceptable with the rest of the board and give him a time frame, unfortunately, to come back again. Does anyone want to make a motion?
- [Interpreter] I mean I will go right away and find a place where somebody speaks Spanish and can do that.
- Motion to approve address specific for a time period of 30 days, 60 days and with the return with information from the probation officer regarding contacts or what efforts the probation officer has done to locate a Spanish-speaking facilitator for sex offender treatment.
- [Interpreter] So 60 day?
- 60.
- Is there a second on that?
- I'll second that motion.
- Okay, we'll take a vote on that.
- You can still tell him.
- Motion to approve passes unanimously.
- Okay, so we're going to approve him for 60 days on the condition that the P.O. assists him in looking for some referral and/or going through his insurance.
- [Interpreter] I wouldn't know if the insurance is through the insurance I can do all this. I don't know if it will be a possibility if they do that.
- The probation officer will.
- [Interpreter] I don't meet with him until October 10th.
- We're gonna call him.
- [Interpreter] Not right now.
- Tomorrow.

- Okay?
- [Interpreter] So you're gonna send me a letter so that way I know when to come back here, right?
- Yes.
- November 13th for now. So you're gonna send that letter out?
- Yes.
- [Interpreter] We have September covered.
- Return in November.
- [Interpreter] Before Christmas, right?
- Yes
- Okay, thank you.
- Next on the agenda is Daniel Fulton.
- All right Mr. Fulton you are requesting to move to 904 Colonial Avenue, is that correct?
- [Daniel] That's correct.
- All right, and this is your first time before us?
- [Daniel] That's correct.
- So, as you've heard me indicate, we'll ask you about what happened. Again, not to list the name or the relationship of the victim. So what were you convicted of?
- [Daniel] Child Enticement
- Okay, and what happened?
- [Daniel] It was a police sting on the computer. They said they were 15. I deleted the email the first time. They kept messaging back and ended up meeting and getting arrested. Nothing happened physically with any person.
- Were they offering anything?
- [Daniel] Yes.
- And were asking for anything in return?
- [Daniel] I never asked, they were offering.

- Okay So you went there with the intent to possibly have sex?
- [Daniel] I kind of figured it out but I'm not challenging it.
- Okay, and this was in 2017?
- [Daniel] That's correct.
- And you received nine months in the county jail?
- [Daniel] I'll be serving that at the end of the month.
- Oh, okay.
- In Shawano County?
- [Daniel] That's correct.
- Commander is that accurate?
- It appears to be.
- So if you live in now Algoma.
- [Daniel] That's my temporary address right now. When I ended the court case they told me I could not live in Brown County. I currently own a house on 904 Colonial. So I've been living out of the area at my sister's house since then.
- Can I ask you about that, one thing doesn't make sense. This is a Shawano County case correct?
- [Daniel] Yes.
- And you lived in Brown County.
- [Daniel] Yes.
- Why did they tell you you can't reside in Brown County?
- [Daniel] The Shawano County Probation Office, when I got out of court I was ordered to report over there and they asked me where I lived. And they said I cannot live at my residency here in Brown County because of the ordinance you have here in town.
- Just at the 904 address?
- [Daniel] That's correct. Well, they said anywhere in Green Bay.
- Correct.

- [Daniel] So then I made arrangements to live out with my sister.
- I have a question, you said you went on the site, they sent you emails and then you sort of thought it might go to sex. Why were you on the site in the first place?
- [Daniel] Originally I was on Craigslist looking for some stolen property that was stolen out of my driveway, a set of speakers out of my truck, and cruised over to the personal area and that's where it started. I wasn't initially looking for anything.
- Why did it take so long for them to actually convict you of it?
- [Daniel] Good question. It seemed like every time I turned around it kept on getting moved out, moved out, moved out. It looks like while your child enticement case was pending, there was another case that you picked up on bail jumping.
- [Daniel] Yeah.
- Can you tell us what that was about?
- [Daniel] I used a computer, I wasn't supposed to use a computer.
- And so both cases you pled guilty?
- [Daniel] Yes.
- In April of this year and you're going to surrender towards the end of September?
- [Daniel] Yes, correct.
- One thing I want to make clear. You didn't know, you didn't go looking for this, correct?
- [Daniel] No.
- But you're on Craigslist and you were perusing and then you found the ad?
- [Daniel] Yes.
- You made contact?
- [Daniel] Eventually.
- And reached out and then where were you living at the time?
- [Daniel] At my residence at 904 Colonial.
- In Green Bay?
- [Daniel] Yes.

- And where were you arrested?
- [Daniel] Shawano.
- So you had to drive all the way to Shawano?
- [Daniel] Yes.
- And your sentence is nine months at Huber?
- [Daniel] Nine months jail with Huber, yes.
- With Huber, okay.
- And you were just living with your girlfriend.
- [Daniel] Yes, she's present here too.
- You don't have to say where you work, but what city do you work in?
- [Daniel] Here in Brown County.
- Oh, Brown County, in Green Bay.
- [Daniel] Yes.
- Is Shawano County going to allow you to commute?
- [Daniel] As far as I know and I'm working on a possible transfer to Brown County for that. It was approved by the judge and all.
- Yeah, I believe they're full.
- [Daniel] Yeah.
- All right, does anybody have any questions about his crime?
- No.
- We'd like to talk to you about your treatment and you have the opportunity to do that in open or closed session, which would you prefer?
- [Daniel] Open's fine.
- Okay, so it looks like you had an assessment already completed.
- [Daniel] Yeah, I had one by the state and one by myself and the lawyer.

- Okay.
- [Daniel] I had turned in the one from the lawyer because that's the one I'm allowed to turn in.
- How come you can't turn the one in from?
- [Daniel] That one was ordered by a judge and I was told he's the only one that's authorized to give it to anybody.
- Oh.
- [Daniel] That's what I was told.
- All right.
- [Daniel] Part of a PCI agreement.
- Is that true?
- PSI
- PSI
- [Daniel] PSI.
- Pre-sentence Investigation.
- Okay.
- So you really actually just had this assessment done but you really haven't had treatment?
- [Daniel] Treatment, yes.
- Are you going to be required to do any kind of sex offender treatment?
- [Daniel] According to what I remember from the sentencing it's supposed to be individual counseling. The judge didn't want me in a group counseling situation because he said with my scores on the PCI and also my attorney's psychology assessment. He said people with the scores I have, if they're in a group, it's more likely to be a re-offender.
- Okay.
- [Daniel] On the test I got 2N with my age and it goes down to like zero basically.
- Have you made any efforts, have you done anything to get the treatment, the one on one counseling yet?

- [Daniel] I'm still working with my parole officer on the intake stuff. In Kewaunee County I met with her today, did more paperwork today.

- So your probation officer's looking for treatment in Kewaunee County?

- [Daniel] I'm not exactly sure. I meet with her next Wednesday again and we're supposed to go from there.

- My concern, I'll tell you honest right up front, is you have so many counties and you haven't been approved for anything yet as far as changing supervision to Brown County. You don't know if Huber and Shawano County is going to approve you working in Brown County. And you don't have any sex offender treatment lined up yet. And if the probation officer's looking in Kewaunee County then you see what I'm saying? You may end up having to be all over and that's a concern because what happens is based on my review of your other evaluation, I'm not gonna get into detail, but that creates stress when you have to sit there and formulate all that stuff. So that's my concern right now.

- [Daniel] What was supposed to happen is I was supposed to be transferred to Brown County but then with this being in place that's why I had to relocate to Kewaunee County for the time being cause I didn't want to break any more laws or anything. I'm just trying to cooperate and do what I'm supposed to do to get the ball rolling and serve my time and become a productive citizen again.

- Well I guess I'm concerned, and I'm gonna have to disagree with you a little bit, I mean they're really recommending you not to have a sex offender treatment. That you really need education about sexual behavior, relationships and that kind of thing correct?

- [Daniel] That's correct.

- And based on your past history, military and all that I think you have some wide resources available to you maybe possibly would be a clinic. Okay, have you reached out to them yet?

- [Daniel] I worked with a guy at the Vet Center for a little bit. I need to get in contact with him some more and go from there.

- Okay.

- [Daniel] Which I can do as soon as tomorrow.

- Okay. Does anyone have any other questions? Would anyone like to make a motion? I'm sorry, did anyone want to speak on your behalf?

- [Anna] If you need us to I guess.

- I mean, that's your call. Well, yes, you would need to come up here and state your name and address for the record.

- [Anna] My name is Anna Meert and I'm at 904 Colonial Avenue, I'm his girlfriend. I just wanted to say that this wasn't behavior that he had done previously. Obviously it's been going on for a long time as far as the case and everything. He works in Green Bay, he does band stuff, he works a lot. So it's

not like he's just sitting around not being a productive member of society. He's trying to get on with it and get on with things. And, again, I wouldn't still be with him if this was a pattern of behavior. So I really hope you just know that he would like to move on with his life, it's not gonna happen again. So I guess that's all I have to say ma'am. I mean, even my mother's here on his behalf so.

- Do you wanna say anything or you're good?

- [Anna] So that's all I have to say.

- Okay, thank you. Oh, got it, sorry. Okay, I'm sorry, it was showing that I was still on the other person. Anybody want to make a motion? I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Fulton address specific 904 Colonial Avenue.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second that.

- Okay, we'll take a vote.

- Motion passes three to one.

- Okay, so you're approved to live at 914 Colonial.

- [Daniel] Okay.

- You don't need to come back unless you decide to sell and move somewhere else.

- [Daniel] Okay.

- Would you like us to send you the letter there or to.

- [Daniel] My address is fine, the 904.

- Okay, all right thank you.

- [Daniel] And that's as of today?

- Yes as of today.

- [Daniel] Thank you.

- Okay, next up we have Kevin Jicha.

- Okay Mr. Jicha this is your first time appearing before us, is that correct?

- [Kevin] Yes, it is.

- And you are requesting to move to 521 South Oakland Avenue?

- [Kevin] Yes.

- Again, we'll ask you what you were convicted of, the circumstances surrounding the offense, and then how it was brought to light. Again, please don't state the victim's name or your relationship to the victim. Okay, go ahead.

- [Kevin] I was charged with First degree sexual assault of a child under the age of 13. Climbed into bed with her, fondled her breast, buttocks, vagina and groped her. And it came to light because her mother called the police on me.

- Did she tell the mother?

- Yes.

- And how old were you?

- [Kevin] I was 30 years old.

- And she was how old

- [Kevin] 12

- What were you thinking.

- [Kevin] Sexual gratification. I've always been attracted to younger people. But that incident I was not thinking and it was something that ruined my life and ruined her life. And I am really, really trying to move on with my life and I screwed up her life in the process.

- And were you in a relationship with her mom?

- [Kevin] Yes.

- Commander is that correct?

- Yes

- Yes, okay And it appears as though you had... So it looks like you must be currently residing at the TLP.

- [Kevin] Yes.

- When did you get released from prison?

- [Kevin] July 16th of this year.

- Okay, and you have a job?

- [Kevin] Yes.

- And where are you working?
- [Kevin] Out in Denmark, I'm working through a Temp Service SEEK in Green Bay but I'm working out at Salm Partners in Denmark full time.
- Okay, and have you signed up, oh we'll get to that question. Are you required to wear any kind of ankle bracelet GPS?
- [Kevin] Ankle bracelet.
- For life?
- [Kevin] No.
- Just for your probation?
- [Kevin] Just until, while I'm at the TLP. As soon as I find a residence I won't be on the bracelet anymore.
- And you have 20 years of supervision?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Any more questions for him regarding his case? Okay, so we'd like to talk to you about your treatment and you have the opportunity to do that in closed or public session, what would you like to do?
- [Kevin] Open.
- Open, okay we'll continue, does anyone have questions about his treatment?
- It appears from the paperwork that you submitted that you completed the SOT2 treatment. Have you looked for any additional treatment or are you?
- [Kevin] No, according to well I got a letter from my agent stating that I completed the program while I was incarcerated and that there's no further treatment that I need. And just for the record I am an alcoholic so I am attending AA meetings. I have my paycheck stubs, I have a copy of the AA meetings where everybody in the group signed it.
- Oh no, that's confidential, we don't need that.
- [Kevin] But I've got paycheck stubs too. But as far as any kind of treatment they're not recommending it.
- Where did you do your treatment at?
- [Kevin] Oshkosh Correctional.

- Okay, how long of a program was that?

- [Kevin] It was a year.

- Okay, can you tell us what you learned out of that?

- [Kevin] I learned everything. Just about emotions, about feelings, about how to deal with different situations, how to deal with relationships. Triggers, what my triggers are, just about myself. Who I was, who I wanna be and how not to get out of prison and re-offend. I learned, I tell everybody, that when I was in there, that has to go through group that they're like oh, well I'm thinking about not taking group and I said do it because it's the best thing that you'll ever do while you're incarcerated I said because everything you learn is just so good.

- Okay, so tell us what are your triggers?

- [Kevin] Just young, young girls under the ages of 18. I'm not, this is my first sexual case. I don't have a past of it, I'm not gonna have a future of it. So just different things like things on TV and stuff just to look out for and just to know who I am. My drinking was a big problem back then. I've been sober for 10 years. Just putting myself in different situations and staying out of those situations is the best thing for me.

- And your support system?

- [Kevin] I have my dad, mom, brother. My immediate family, aunts, uncles. I have friends at work now that I'm getting to know better. I haven't been working that long but I have the people at the AA meetings to reach out to if I need support. So the support system is there, a lot of support.

- And the people who support you, where do they live? They live in Illinois.

- Okay, who do you have here?

- [Kevin] Here I have nobody. My daughter is in Green Bay but I don't have, I talk to her on the phone and that's the only contact I have. So I want to stay in Green Bay. I want to start my life over. I want to try to rebuild my relationship back with my daughter. I know it's gonna take a long time, it may never happen.

- How old is she?

- [Kevin] She is 16. I know it's hard on her, hard on me, hard on my victim. I'm just trying to move forward and better myself by keeping a steady job, by doing the right things. 10 years in prison just made me realize everything that I've done wrong before I committed my crime.

- What do you do in your off time when you're not working?

- [Kevin] AA meetings, I go to AA meetings three or four times a week. And well, since I've been released, I've been looking for apartments, places to live, and just watching TV, reading books. I don't really, I have a couple friends in Green Bay that I hang out with. Go over to their apartment and just watch TV or play a video game and that's it. I like to keep to myself. I like to hang out with friends

and stuff but for my free time I just like to relax. Especially working 6:30 in the morning til 2:30 in the afternoon. I'll get home, I'll cook something to eat and just relax, watch some TV, read a book, just to keep my focus on what I need to do.

- How do you get to work? SEEK offers a van that picks me up at the Green Bay Plaza and drives me to work. And then, as soon as I get off work, the van's there to pick me up and drive me back. And, just to make a note, the company has been talking to me the last couple of days about hiring me on because I'm supposed to work 400 hours through the temporary service but if the company want to hire me on before that they can. So I filled out the application, my kind of supervisor at the company came to me and told me to fill out an application and turn it in because he wants to get the ball rolling on getting me hired on to the company.

- Do you ever have to take the city bus?

- [Kevin] Yes, oh, out to work?

- Anywhere.

- [Kevin] Yes, yes.

- So my concern is you made the comment that you're attracted to younger women.

- [Kevin] Yes.

- How do you handle that on the bus?

- [Kevin] I don't pay attention to them. Even like walking down the street if they're on the same side of the street, cross over to the other side of the street. I avoid situations at all costs.

- If, for example, they do hire you full time...

- [Kevin] Yes. And you live in Green Bay, you said you work in Denmark?

- [Kevin] Yes.

- How are you going to handle transportation?

- [Kevin] I've been talking to one of my friends I met at the company that lives in the West side of Green Bay that will be more than happy to give me a ride to and from work because he knows my situation to getting to and from work. I don't have a vehicle or anything.

- Does anyone have any other questions? Is there anybody who would like to make a vote? Oh, I'm sorry, do you have somebody to speak on your behalf?

- [Kevin] Yes, I do.

- I'm sorry, if you'd just state your name and address for the record.

- [Ed] My name's Ed Jicha, 9942 Constitution Court, Orland Park, Illinois. Kevin's biggest problem was alcohol. That was the root of all evil. His mother was a alcoholic and she would hallucinate and Kevin, he's not a predator. He has support, we visit him every month, every couple of weeks in prison for 10 years. My wife, his stepmother that he calls mom, as soon as he got out of prison we were here for a week looking for apartments, looking for jobs with him, helping him, facilitate because he doesn't have a driver's license but we are trying to get that. He just went to Illinois for evaluation for alcohol and so we're trying to get that into the works. He's working, he's worked six days a week, not five, six days a week. So the only day he has off is Sunday and after work from three o'clock to eight o'clock to try and look for an apartment, look for another full time job if this doesn't work into a full time job. He did choose to come back here because he lived here for six years before he was incarcerated. He did plead guilty so that the girl that was involved would not have to testify. People have said that maybe if he wouldn't have he might not have got 10 years because it was a first offense, but that's hindsight. He just wants to move forward, we as a family want to help him move forward. I have a relationship his daughter. We see her birthdays, Christmas, things like that. So, hopefully, in time with some counseling they can get back together and that's why he wants to live here in Green Bay.

- Sir, one thing that you mentioned is you had said that your son was evaluated in Illinois.

- [Ed] Yes, because he had a DUI and lost his license and he can't get his license in Wisconsin until he clears up the case in Illinois.

- Okay, gotcha.

- [Ed] The first thing is to do that so he has to have an alcohol evaluation and then he has to go in front of a hearing before Illinois. Once he gets that cleared up then hopefully he'll get his license and he will have a vehicle to drive to work and have a function in life and be a productive person.

- Thank you. Since he said he got released in July, how often have you been back here?

- [Ed] This is my third time.

- Third time.

- [Ed] We were here for a week the first time. Then we were here two weekends ago. And then I was here yesterday and today again.

- Do you think you'll be able to maintain coming back here for him.

- [Ed] Yes, because we went to Oshkosh at least once to twice a month and we visited our granddaughter up here in Green Bay which is only 45 minutes further north than Oshkosh on a regular basis.

- Okay, anybody else, further questions? Okay, thank you. Anybody want to make a motion, comments?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Jicha address specific 521 South Oakland Avenue Apartment Two.

- I'll second.
- We'll take a vote on that.
- Motion to approve passes three to one.
- Okay, so you're approved to move to 521 South Oakland address specific. If you decide to move from that location you will need to come back here.
- [Kevin] Okay
- Okay?
- [Kevin] Yes.
- Good luck.
- [Kevin] Thank you very much.
- Can we send the letter to Oakland?
- [Kevin] Yes, please.
- Next on the agenda is Joseph Kopke.
- [Ed] Thank you.
- You're welcome.
- I'm on the appeal docket, can I run to the bathroom real quick?
- Oh sure.
- Mr. Kopke is that the current way to say your name?
- [Joseph] It's Kopke but that's close enough.
- Okay, so this is the first time you've appeared before the board?
- [Joseph] Yes, ma'am.
- Okay so, again we're gonna ask what you were convicted of and please don't state the victim's name or relationship. So, go ahead.
- [Joseph] I was convicted of Second Degree Sexual Assault of a Child here in Brown County and also two counts of 2nd Degree Sexual Assault of a Child in Winnebago County.
- What county?

- [Joseph] Winnebago

- Winnebago.

- And how old were you?

- [Joseph] I was 22 at the time.

- And how old were the victims?

- [Joseph] The victims were both 13 years old.

- And what did you actually do?

- [Joseph] With the victim in Brown County, I'm not used to calling them victims but, the victim in Brown County I had sexual intercourse with. I befriended her, she was a co-worker and so I groomed her in that manner. Met with her on one occasion at her house during which we had sexual intercourse. I kissed and fondled her breasts, this during intercourse. And in the Winnebago case, I met with the victim on two different occasions. One time I met with her in my apartment in Oshkosh cause that's where I was going to college and the other time was at her house. Both times we kissed and I fondled her breasts and buttocks and we attempted to have sexual intercourse but were unsuccessful. And I was promptly arrested after I told the victim in Winnebago that I no longer wanted to see her. And then she contacted the police and I was arrested. The victim in Brown County was the first case and she told a friend, the friend told the counselor, the counselor told her to contact the police. So I actually talked to a Green Bay detective in February cause the Brown County case happened December 30th of 2003 and then I talked to the detective on February 10th, 2004 and gave a full statement confessing to the whole incident. And the case in Winnebago happened in late April and beginning of May. And when that came to light that's when I was arrested in Winnebago County.

- So you were basically told an investigator that yes, you sexually assaulted a 13 year old and then you went and did it again. Is that what you're telling us?

- [Joseph] No she was a 14 year old.

- A 14 year old

- [Joseph] Yes ma'am.

- Why, I mean, why?

- [Joseph] I was in college, I was being very promiscuous. I was sleeping with several different women and just not really caring anything about the women. It was just all about the fact of having sex.

- Young women, but if you're in college there's women there too that are of age.

- [Joseph] Yes ma'am and I was sleeping with them. I was sleeping with several different women. In college I was an opportunist. So, if the opportunity presented itself I'd have sexual relations with that person.
- And you were well aware that both these victims were 14 years old?
- [Joseph] Yes ma'am.
- Commander is that correct? At least for the Brown?
- For the Brown County case yes.
- Okay. So for the Brown County case it says you got 15 years but you served six years, 10 months. I'm assuming the 15 years includes your extended supervision or what happened?
- [Joseph] Well, Winnebago County case actually sentenced first.
- Okay.
- [Joseph] So they sentenced and then Brown County sentenced theirs consecutively so I actually served eight years straight during the incarceration.
- And how long are you on paper for?
- [Joseph] I'll get off paper in 2024.
- And is your probation agent in Brown County or Winnebago County?
- [Joseph] Brown County cause that was my permanent residence.
- Okay.
- [Joseph] I was only in Oshkosh for college.
- Okay.
- And when did you get out of prison?
- [Joseph] 2012, May 29th, 2012.
- So where have you been for the last, how many years, five years, seven years?
- [Joseph] When I got out I was actually allowed to, I was grandfathered in to the residence at 1031 Clayton Place because that was my permanent residence prior to being incarcerated.
- The original version of the
- Okay, and then you lived there for how long?

- [Joseph] I lived there, well my mom passed away in '92 living there until the house went into foreclosure.

- Which was when.

- [Joseph] That was actually the end of 2016.

- And where have you been since then?

- [Joseph] I went back on revocation.

- Why?

- [Joseph] Because I was caught on a dating site. And that's the reason I have a no social media restriction on my rules of supervision.

- Did you know you weren't supposed to be on social?

- [Joseph] At the time I had a rule where I was not allowed any internet access of any kind.

- So then why did you go on it?

- [Joseph] I went on it because I justified it by well, there was thinking there, but I justified it by well, it's not illegal, I'm not doing anything wrong. So it was the wrong way of thinking.

- And you were revoked for how long?

- [Joseph] I was revoked for a little over two years.

- No, go ahead.

- [Joseph] And I got out in January.

- In your letter to the board it states that your intent is to get a Civil Engineering degree?

- [Joseph] I'd like to progress to a Civil Engineering degree. Right now I'm laborer with the Local 330 and we've been working on the Green Bay Packaging 600 million dollar expansion. So I'm thankfully there at the moment but laborers only last so long. So my body's not gonna last that long so if I had further education then I'd have something to do when my body's no longer able to do what I'm doing now.

- And it also says that you have four approved chaperones? What is that?

- [Joseph] Chaperones are trusted people by the probation officer that hold us accountable for our actions and people that we rely on. They're key people in our support system.

- Are you only allowed to be outside with one of these four people or what is that?

- [Joseph] Oh no, chaperones, let's say I wanted to do special things like go on a vacation. And it would not be approved without a chaperone.
- And when you were on the dating website what, you put who you're looking for, what did you put?
- [Joseph] I was just, well, females.
- Age
- [Joseph] Around my age
- Do we have any other questions about his case? So we'd like to talk to you about your treatment would you like to do that in closed or public session?
- [Joseph] Public session.
- Okay, so what kind of treatment have you received?
- [Joseph] I've had treatment at Family Services. I started with James Ray Group and also had treatment with corrections and also with Redgranite Correctional. So I've had a total of 291 hours of treatment.
- When was your last?
- [Joseph] It was with Redgranite Correctional.
- How long was that program?
- [Joseph] That was one year.
- Do you have documentation that you can include with that?
- [Joseph] I have documentation from my P.O. saying that I completed it successfully and have no further needs right now.
- Okay. Do you know when you were released from prison if you were and SBN?
- [Joseph] Yes ma'am.
- Where have you been staying since you've?
- [Joseph] I've been jumped around hotels and friend's houses, my chaperones, Brandon Linsley and other friends.
- And what's your support system now?

- [Joseph] My support system is the two fellas I just mentioned and also Aunt Bonnie who's in the back of the room, my Aunt Rosemary's in the back of the room Leah from work, she's also here as well. She helps me out with things I need for work or anything like that.

- And where do they all live?

- [Joseph] They all live here in Green Bay. That's where I was born and raised. Where I graduated high school.

- Do you have any issues with alcohol or drugs or had you in the past?

- [Joseph] No ma'am. It's not even a rule of my supervision.

- It's not a rule?

- [Joseph] It's not a rule of my supervision.

- So if you wanted to go have a beer right now it's okay?

- [Joseph] Yes.

- Wow.

- [Joseph] But I'm not a drinker.

- Okay.

- So there was no alcohol or drugs involved in the.

- [Joseph] Commission of the crime.

- Any accidents?

- [Joseph] No ma'am.

- Nothing?

- [Joseph] No.

- When did you last go on the dating site?

- [Joseph] When the last, July of 2016.

- Okay, so this is after you've already done all your treatment?

- [Joseph] Mm hmm.

- And then still went on it.

- [Joseph] Well I've had further treatment at Redgranite after that as well.
- Okay.
- [Joseph] That was the one more year after that in Redgranite that I had the treatment.
- So, along those lines, maybe you can explain to me. You're released, you know what your conditions are, what you're allowed and not allowed to do, but and knowing you don't want to go back to prison and you've had all this treatment, right?
- [Joseph] Right.
- But you knowingly go on an app, create a profile and look at profiles of young women. What have you learned? What was your trigger? What have you learned so we know that you're not going to do it again.
- [Joseph] My trigger was isolation. I'd withdraw from my support system. And, when I did that, I got on the computer. And that's where I proceeded to make the profile. So like right now for example, I really don't isolate myself. I talk to my support system daily. And my buddy Adam we're always doing stuff on the weekends. Helping Brandon renovate his house. My advisor's constantly calling and texting me to make sure I'm doing what I need to be doing. Even my cousin Stephanie she's been big as well. She's a, I've been over her house many times and help her with various projects and that.
- Your support system, does everybody understand why you were in prison?
- [Joseph] Yes they do. All the chaperones that I mentioned, they all have to meet on a one on one with my P.O. and they're actually read the criminal complaint.
- Okay. Does anyone have any further questions? Is there any of those people that would like to speak on your behalf?
- [Joseph] I also have a letter from Family Services. Leah from work wrote one as well.
- Okay. He's providing us a letter from Family Services. Talks about him being in the Windows to Work re-entry program. Basically it's about job retention, resume's, community resources.
- [Joseph] And I also have a CJIP course from the program too. Cognitive Juvenile Intervention.
- Okay. All right, if you could just state your name and address for the record.
- [Bonnie] Bonnie VanVonderen, 2374 Nicole Ann Circle, Green Bay.
- I'm sorry, what's your name?
- [Bonnie] Bonnie VanVonderen, do you want me to spell it?
- Yes please.

- [Bonnie] V-A-N capital V-O-N-D-E-R-E-N.

- Thank you.

- [Bonnie] Yeah you go from Belone to VanVonderen it's a lot. That's why my kids are Amy, Paul and Sara. I'm sorry.

- That's okay.

- [Bonnie] Since Joe's mother, Joe's dad died when he was in prison, we went down there to tell him which was very devastating. He died of a massive heart attack. And then, five years later, his mother died of a stroke. And since then I have pretty much taken care of Joe and his brother, they're like my kids. They lost their parents at a very, very young age. Too young. And so I still give them Christmas presents because I feel sorry for them at Christmas time because they don't have any parents. And Joe's the kind of kid, smart and he knows how to do stuff and he knows when I ask him to get something done, it's done immediately. He knows Aunt Bonnie doesn't want it yesterday, she wants it now. And so when I do call him and say Joe get over here come on and help me he is there immediately. And my husband and I are 71 years old so any help we can get. Our big project is gonna be a bridge over our crick cause we lost it in the flood. So he's gonna be over there almost every weekend helping out. And he's working his job 42 to 50 hours a week. When he gets home, in fact, I called him last Friday night at six o'clock cause I usually call him almost every day either text him. I called him and he didn't answer so then I called back. And he said, "Aunt Bonnie I'm sleeping, I am dead tired, I worked all week." I go sorry Joe, goodnight, talk to you tomorrow. So he is a very hardworking kid and I know he's on the right track. And this company likes him so much what he's doing they want to keep him on for the winter so that's wonderful. And he's putting money away, opened up a savings account. I'm on the account with him so I pretty much keep thumbs.

- [Joseph] The company I work for is

- I'm sorry, you said you lived in Green Bay, correct?

- [Bonnie] Bellevue.

- Bellevue, can I ask why you wouldn't let him live with you?

- [Bonnie] Because I have grandchildren and until I'm a, what is I need to be, chaperone I cannot have him, he cannot come near the kids. And Bellevue's ordinance is a little stricter too and she lives right by Josten Park.

- [Bonnie] I live right by Josten Park. The first time he came home after he was out of prison the first time he came to visit us right away and he's gonna be on the bracelet for the rest of his life.

- Oh, you are a lifetime GPS?

- [Joseph] Yes, ma'am.

- [Bonnie] Lifetime GPS.

- [Joseph] There's two different.

- [Bonnie] And so he came over to our house and he's sitting there and we're talking and I made his apple pie cause he loves apple pie. And he's eating and all of a sudden his beeper goes off and he got arrested that night because he was by the park and he didn't know he couldn't.

- [Joseph] No, it was because of the time.

- [Bonnie] Oh that's right yeah.

- [Joseph] P.O. didn't adjust the time so that's why.

- [Bonnie] It was alarming that he was back in jail.

- [Joseph] That was shortly after I got out in 2012. There was three GPS malfunctions within the first month I was arrested.

- [Bonnie] Yeah and one time after that it was the GPS the battery went dead. And then when you get put back in jail it's a week before you get out. It's very hard but he will have to deal with it the rest of his life.

- Thank you.

- [Bonnie] You're welcome, oh!

- Does the board have any further questions or would anybody like to make a motion?

- Motion to approve address specific for 90 days?

- Come back for what?

- What do you want him to come back for?

- Just to check in, my concern is this. It's one thing that you had the two offenses and you pled guilty, everything is taken care of. It's the fact that you went and violated having all those things going so well for you and you violated. And now that you're going to be by yourself and your issue is isolation that's a concern.

- [Joseph] The landlord I'm renting to is a former co-worker of my mother and so he knows me and knows to check up on me as well.

- So that's my concern, I just want to make sure everything's going well, no violations. Because when you're couch surfing you're with people that you know that you have the camaraderie, you have the interaction. So when you go back to being on your own again there's that draw to be by yourself again.

- [Joseph] Yes ma'am.
- Is there a second?
- I will second that.
- Motion to approve for 90 days passes three to one.
- Okay.
- [Joseph] Thank you very much.
- So you're gonna come back in 90 days, we'll send you a letter. And whatever she's requested that's what you'll need to bring back.
- [Joseph] Okay.
- Okay?
- [Joseph] Thank you very much.
- Next on the agenda we have Ricky Bridges.
- [Ricky] How are you guys doing?
- Good, and yourself?
- [Ricky] I'm okay, appreciate you for guys meeting with me.
- This is the first time you've appeared before us correct?
- [Ricky] Yes.
- Okay, so as you've heard we're gonna ask you to tell us about what you were convicted of, tell us about the offense, how it came to light, and then we ask that you don't list the victim's name or relationship.
- [Ricky] Okay. Okay, so what happened.
- [Ricky] Well, I was charged with First Degree Sexual Contact with a child under the age of 13. Two counts of that and also two counts of disorderly conduct.
- We don't care about the disorderly conduct just the sex offenses.
- [Ricky] Just the sex offenses. Okay, well see I'm not really sure so the other three charges were read in but dismissed. So I think I was only convicted of the one charge. So that's what I was convicted of that one charge.

- What happened, what did you do?

- [Ricky] Well in altered state of mind I was at a park and I inappropriately touched a person, a young child.

- And how old were you?

- [Ricky] I was 27. And so the child I was convicted of touching was seven, the other child was 10.

- How did you inappropriately touch them, what did you do?

- [Ricky] Well the one child I inappropriately touch her on the butt, the second person I inappropriately touched him in the groin area.

- Were they both girls?

- [Ricky] No, one was a male, one was a female.

- And was this on one occasion, one instance?

- [Ricky] This was all in the same instance.

- And you said you were in an altered state of mind, what does that mean.

- [Ricky] So, after being evaluated by a bunch of different medical teams I realized that I had schizophrenia, or schizoaffective is what they're calling it now, and that was due to a long history of chronic homelessness. So I was going through a period of auditory hallucinations. I was hearing voices and things like that. And while at this park I was getting the impression I had been through, I had tried, instead of going to get help I take full responsibility for that. I should have went out and tried to get help instead I tried to fix it on my own. So I tried a bunch of different coping methods and the main thing was trying to ground myself back into reality. So while at this park I got under the impression these voices gave me the indication that if I did, if I took such an extreme action as to inappropriately touch these young children that would shock my system back into reality cause that's what I was doing. I would go around and try to ground myself. So it was poor judgment, it was. And, ultimately, it did work, it just gave me a much harder path to take. But that is the reason why it happened.

- Commander is that correct?

- Yes.

- Okay, thank you.

- And how were you caught?

- [Ricky] Well I guess after this happened I walked home. They caught me about two or three days later I was caught walking from a Walmart. Officers pulled up on me and came down and asked me some questions and then they said that some kids said that they saw me chasing some kids which is

what I was given the disorderly conduct for I was scaring and chasing kids. So those kids said that they witnessed me doing that and that's why I got arrested to begin with. Everything else came to light when I got taken to the jail and had to go to court and things like that.

- And so, you were sentenced to a period of two years?

- [Ricky] I was, I did one year in Brown County and then I also did one year in prison in Oshkosh. That one year in Brown County was going through the motions of the trial.

- And when did you get released from prison?

- [Ricky] I believe it was July 9th.

- Of this year?

- [Ricky] This year, yeah.

- Are you currently at the TLP?

- [Ricky] I am, yeah.

- All right and you're looking to move to 921 Harvey, correct?

- [Ricky] Upper.

- I do have a question on that because when I looked up that address there was a gentleman living at the upper and then when I looked him up, he was verified there in May but nothing since but he's still listed as living in that upper.

- [Ricky] Yeah, I can actually answer that for you. The thing is the landlord, I actually had two other options before this one. So, some of them were kind of risky. I did some consulting with my support team and we came to the conclusion that this third option, which is 922 upper, would probably be the best option to come and bring to you guys. So, with that being in mind, the landlord it was kind of a last minute but the landlord felt that the tenant that was staying, which is the tenant that you looked up he wasn't doing what he was supposed to do so the landlord came to the decision to move him out and move me in. So I think at the time that you looked him up he's probably still listed on there but after everything in this process is over with if I'm approved then I will sign the lease and he will be moved out. I will be moved in and we're looking to do this by October 1st.

- Okay.

- And where are you working at?

- [Ricky] Green Bay Plastics.

- You work third shift, is that correct?

- [Ricky] I do, yeah.

- And it says here that you go to the Micah Center and the Circles of Support.

- [Ricky] I do, yeah.

- How often do you go to the Circles of Support?

- [Ricky] It's every Wednesday, right before work.

- All right does anyone have any further questions regarding his crime? So we'd like to discuss treatment with you. You can do that in private, open or closed session, which would you prefer?

- [Ricky] Open, yeah.

- So it looks like you have not done any kind of treatment yet. You were referred but you didn't get in yet.

- [Ricky] Yeah, this is true, the fact is I was only sentenced to one year in prison so by the time I got to Oshkosh they was telling me that I didn't have enough time. But while I was at Oshkosh I did do schooling. I did schooling and so now that I've gotten out being that you only have two months at the TLP the main focus was trying to get to you guys in time. But I did, my probation officer was able to help me put a rush on things. So at first she was able to give me this letter. She typed up this later stating that she referred me but the time and date but that letter is actually relevant now because just yesterday she was able to come up with a time and date set.

- Oh, so when is that gonna be?

- [Ricky] So, I wasn't sure if you guys actually take letters from probation officers but she sent this. I wasn't able to read it so.

- Yeah, well can we just maybe read it on the record?

- [Ricky] Yeah, you can do that.

- Is that all right if I do that?

- [Ricky] I appreciate that.

- All right so this is dated September 10th. Ricky's SOT Assessment is scheduled for Tuesday September 17th at 8:55 a.m. with Pablo, 2311 University Ave in the back of the building up the metal stairs. You'll out time to complete it on this day will be 2:00 p.m. Show this to the board tomorrow, Agent Barbara Villanueva-Matta.

- [Ricky] Now we know that's uncommon but she is, the fact is, I asked her to put a rush on things and I guess she felt like it was a last minute thing so she just tried to what she could for me.

- All right, on a different note, that I kinda maybe have some concerns. So you indicated that you were schizoaffective.

- [Ricky] Yes.

- Do you take medication for that or who officially diagnosed you with that?

- [Ricky] So, as far as being schizoaffective I was officially diagnosed with the name of it by Dr. Michael Lind, Mitchell Lynn, I'm sorry, Mitchell Lind at Bellin Health. But before that, prior before that, when I first went to Brown County I was seen by a bunch of different nurses and things from psychiatric nurses from crisis hospital. So what they diagnosed it as was paranoia disorder and unspecified psychosis. So I took that, I went to Mendota for a period of time, got evaluated by them. And, by that time, when I made it into Oshkosh I was being put on medicine. One was Citalopram, the other one was an anti-depressant. So, I'm sorry, I actually was administered those medicines in Brown County. So I was taking those throughout the whole time. And by the time I got to Oshkosh I was seeing another psychiatric nurse and she was telling me that we can start to wean down off the medicine if I felt a little bit better because of the structure of the environment and the medicine I was coming back down to reality. It was easier for me to cope. So, at the end of my term, I might be jumping ahead but, at the end of my term I received help from Leah which is the Windows to Work program. It deals with job readiness but it also deals with cognitive thinking. So with that helped me refresh and familiarize myself with the outside, get prepared to come back to the outside. Once I did I signed up for Bellin Health. I see Mitchell Lind and we first did a physical check, physical care, and then he also evaluated me for psychiatric help, mental health, and he told me it was schizoaffective disorder. That's what it sounds like which also runs in the family. But he referred me to a psychiatrist and this is the letter that he gave me to give to you guys.

- Okay so this was dated September 5th and he's placed referral to psychiatry. Is he doing that referral, do you know, through Bellin or is that through Brown County?

- [Ricky] It's through Bellin, Bellin Health.

- Okay, did he prescribe you any medication at this point or is he waiting for the psychiatrist?

- [Ricky] I think he's waiting for the psychiatrist. I told him that I was told by the doctors at Oshkosh that I'm good on the medication now but if I ever need it they gave me a bunch of different documents to show so I can just go get the medicine, I can give it to pharmacies or things like that and get that medicine back if I ever need that medicine again. But right now it's just if I feel like I need it. As far as to answer your question he said he's just waiting for the psychiatrist to figure that out.

- Do you think that you'll know when that moment happens?

- [Ricky] I will, yeah, I think the biggest problem was not being aware of it. That's the reason why I tried to handle it on my own. Like I said, I take full responsibility for not going to get help but at the same time if you're not aware of exactly what's going on with you you might think that the decision you're making is the best one. The judgements that you're making are the best ones. So I'm fully aware of it now, especially after doing so much time, after doing a year in prison, fully aware of my condition and I'm learning more about it. So I do know that, with the support team that I have, I do know that if any symptoms came about it would be a lot easier for me just to go and reach out to someone and get that taken care of.

- Okay. Does the board have any further questions?

- How long, you may have said it and I apologize I don't remember, how long are you on supervision?

- [Ricky] For six years.

- Six years, and do you have, what about support in the area?

- [Ricky] As far as support goes, I do have a strong support system now, way more than I did before. As far as professional support, I have Windows to Work which is Leah and she's been helping me out throughout the year. Circle of Support, which is Terry. The Micah Center I have a case worker named Lisa and I meet with her during different weeks sometimes every week. Right now, there's a recovery group at a church called Living Hope Church. That's a recovery group so it's not like going to church which I can't really attend right now cause of the situation but that's in progress. I've had my probation officer talk to the pastor and everything and this recovery group is for addicts and things like that just getting out of jail so they're being a support system once I get established with them. Green Bay Plastics has a free support line for everybody who works there. The last person who would probably be of some help would probably be my agent, Mrs. Matta. She can direct me to any resources that I might be looking for. Family support I have Timona which is my cousin and Diamond. They both live separately in Green Bay. They've lived here for a few years. I have a cousin Darnell he lives in Milwaukee and I also have an auntie named Susie who lived in Wabasha. And they're just a few minutes away so they could drive drive up.

- That's a lot longer ride than a few minutes. That's a lot of minutes! Okay, any further questions? And it looks like Larry wants to speak on your behalf?

- [Ricky] Yeah, so instead of Terry Larry is here. I also have Leah from Windows to Work, she wants to say a few things. She also gave me a letter too.

- I'll take this letter first, so this is a letter from Leah, Case Manager through Family Services indicating that you are participating in the Windows to Work program. Basically talking about job retention, resumes. You're working one on one with the case manager including individualized case management support and limited financial assistance for up to one year after you're released. Okay, Larry if you could just state your name and address for the record.

- [Larry] Larry Hickock, Chestnut Lane, Freedom, Wisconsin. I volunteer with Volunteers of Circle of Support and just want to verify that Ricky's been with us offering a thoughtful positive contributor in the Circle of Support. He's there on a very regular basis. He has a thought out plan of what he's gonna be doing. His actions of getting a job, getting a place to live. And one interesting thing is that he always wants to rebuild his reputation and bring that back to the table. So I just really want to emphasize that he's on the right path, he's doing the right things and has been a great contributor with us. So that's really what I want to share.

- Okay, thank you. Okay, anything further?

- Anybody else, do you want to speak or the letter's good?

- [Leah] I think I don't have anything else new to add. If anyone has any questions about the Windows to Work program I can answer those.

- Okay, would anybody like to make a motion?
- I'll make a motion for Mr. Bridges to move to 921 Harvey Street Upper address specific.
- Is there a second
- Second
- Okay, we'll take a vote on that.
- Motion to approve passes three to one.
- Okay, so you're approved to move to 921 Harvey Street Upper. If you wish to move from that location you will need to come back here.
- [Ricky] Okay.
- Okay, would you like us to mail that letter to the Harvey address or to the TLP?
- [Ricky] How fast does it come, do you know?
- In a couple of days.
- [Ricky] Oh yes then send it to the TLP would be good. 1761 Shawano Avenue.
- Okay, all right, can I just make a suggestion to you? Please continue with the Circles of Support. I really hope that you do, they're a very good program.
- [Ricky] Thank you.
- Can I withdraw at this point? How do I, what, do I need to remove myself, close out?
- Yeah, I can log you out of that.
- Okay, I apologize, so go ahead and take over. Sorry ladies, I will not be here next Monday I have a training.
- I'll walk you out
- Oh, thanks
- Okay next up Nicholas Verhagen. Mr. Verhagen did you bring documentation of enrollment attendance of mental health treatment program?
- [Nicholas] Yes.
- Do you have that with you?

- [Nicholas] Yes, here's the registration fee, here's the paperwork and I was supposed to go to Options but my insurance wouldn't take that and it was like \$2,000 for the year. So, instead, I got into this treatment which is a lot less and it's called of Wisconsin.

- Are you registered now?

- [Nicholas] Yes, I'm registered, here's my registration fee. My first meeting was supposed to be last week but they couldn't move from into Hauer on Woodale. So that means my actual first meeting is gonna be this Sunday.

- And this program is equal to what you were originally?

- [Nicholas] Ah, yes, it's not as long. This one's only like nine months, the other one's a year but I did this on my own. I'm not required to do this by anyone.

- Okay.

- If I may, and this is for the mental health?

- [Nicholas] Yes.

- Okay.

- [Nicholas] And I am still working, I brought my last paycheck stub so you guys know I'm still working.

- Okay.

- How's that going for you.

- [Nicholas] It's hard, they were gonna make boots

- Have you been looking for something else.

- [Nicholas] No, it's hard but I like it there. There's a lot of good people there.

- Which shift do you work?

- [Nicholas] I work second shift. Actually I have to go there right after here.

- Otherwise everything's going okay?

- [Nicholas] Yeah, everything's still going good. Haven't had no violation, been doing good, staying out of trouble. Everything's been going good.

- Good. Anyone else have anything? Okay, I'll make the motion to approve Mr. Verhagen to 1319 Day Street, address specific.

- Seconded.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Good luck.
- [Nicholas] Thank you
- You're welcome David Coopman. Okay, Mr. Coopman you're supposed to bring your documentation as planned SOT and volunteer work.
- [David] This would be my plan. This would be my sex offender treatment. And this is verification from my volunteer work in the Oconia County Jail.
- How often do you do that?
- [David] Once a week, every Tuesday.
- You separate these Melissa?
- Oh yeah, that's good, thank you. So you're going all the way up to Oconto once a week?
- [David] Oconto, yes.
- How else is everything going?
- [David] Everything's going great.
- Okay, anybody else have any questions?
- No
- I don't either
- Motion to approve address specific to 709 Pine Street, Green Bay.
- I'll second.
- Motion to approve passes unanimously.
- Okay, you're all set sir.
- [David] Thank you, thank you.
- Joshua Henke.
- [Joshua] How are you?

- I'm fine.
- [Joshua] I did send stuff in, recommendations and stuff.
- Everything you gave me I sent to her.
- [Joshua] Okay, thank you very much.
- I just have to review because I wasn't at the meeting.
- Oh, he's moving, he's due to come back.
- What?
- This isn't why he's coming back. He's moving to a new address.
- Oh, okay.
- [Joshua] My father in law passed away and we didn't know that he had a reverse mortgage so when it was time to pay the mortgage we went downtown to see if we could transfer and found out there was a reverse mortgage and there was a large sum that we couldn't afford. So, I got married and everything October 29th of last year and my wife is at that address and everything now and that's who I want to move in with is my wife and my stepson's.
- On the Chestnut address?
- [Joshua] On the Chestnut, yep. For the last week I've been, cause I know the rules and everything, like a week and a half I've been staying at my storage unit for four days. And then at the apartment for three days and then I've been going back, cause no more than three days. I know the rules about that so today, hopefully, a blessing. I've been in that Pioneer Meadow now for a year and a couple months. Janitorial to work for that's where my letters of recommendation came from.
- Okay, are you still enrolled, are you attending NWTC?
- [Joshua] No, I was, but then my father-in-law passed away and stuff like that. So it kind of emotionally going there, and then, some people were older also, so it kind of hit me hard. But my plan is to obtain the GED way before I'm done with supervision. As of today I've been on probation for eight years. I have not been incarcerated, re-offended, been in jail once. No tickets, nothing. Constantly talking to my P.O. every two weeks. She's been wanting to do once a month but we'll find out after today. So I've got a good relationship with her. If something really bad is bothering me that's the first person, besides my wife, that I actually call. There's ups and downs, emotionally, here and there. On my bad days sometimes I don't want to wake up in the morning and deal with life but that's how it is.
- What gives you the motivation for what you just said.
- [Joshua] My wife and my stepson. I have a beautiful stepson, he's 19. The last five years he has taught me patience and diversity. I have two regular sons I don't see due to their mother. One's autistic, had

a good relationship with him and my other boy. One moved out of town so I don't see him as much. And the child with autism, the mother kind of veers off that she doesn't really want him alone. Not because of my case but she coddles him. It's understandable, he's 14 now and his mindset is like a child. So very understandable that don't want him left alone. My motivation is literally my family now. Like I said, my 19 year old has really showed me diversity and patience along the way. He has made me grow into a better man. We're really able to talk, hadn't been and to do that in the past. Like he would do something and I would brush it off, it's not my damn child, sorry for my language, he's not my child, don't need to deal with it. She deals with my crap every day. Talk about how bad work is and how good work is. Stuff like that. So it's been a great year married with this woman. So the past five years have been awesome.

- Okay, anybody else have any questions?

- No I do not.

- Would your wife like to talk on your behalf?

- [Joshua] Take your time sweetheart.

- State your name for record.

- [Janeen] Josh has done really good. Please state your name for record.

- [Joshua] Say your name honey.

- [Janeen] Oh, I'm sorry, Janeen 1315 South Chestnut Apartment 1. Josh has been good for the last five years to register and do this. No re-offenses, done really good from when he first began. Life was rough, to where he is now. You would not think that he was the same person, growing. Our time was when my day died but through that we pulled together, grew as a family, grew stronger. I don't know what else to say. He had his job, he's make me proud. To where he got to this point right now. I'm just very proud of him.

- [Joshua] I have a hard time trusting people when I first got released because I had a target on my back. But I'm a sex offender so I thought automatically people knew and they had it out for me.

- [Janeen] So he learns to deal with that really well. He knows about that and that everybody has their opinion but he knows who he is as a person and the offense happened and it doesn't define who he is today. It's how you move forward and learn from your mistakes and everything that's happened.

- How long have you lived at this address?

- [Janeen] This I have lived at a month.

- We were on the verge of being homeless and I needed to find a place to go because I'm diabetic and I have two dogs. So I had to find a place earlier so I could be out of the heat and I didn't have to lose my dogs.

- [Joshua] They're her emotional support dogs.

- [Janeen] They're my emotional support animals. So he's pretty much been in the storage.
- Okay.
- [Joshua] I can have a letter from the landlord stating he knows my case and he would easily rent to me.
- Okay, anybody else want to speak? Okay, anyone want to make a motion?
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Henke 1315 South Chestnut Avenue number one address specific.
- Seconded.
- [Joshua] My whole life I was going through is it Hinke or Henke, if it starts with an H I answer.
- Okay, motion to approve passes unanimously.
- Okay, thank you.
- [Joshua] You guys have a beautiful day. Thank you very much for your time.
- [Janeen] Push the chair in, thank you.
- Oh, it just popped up.
- Oh my gosh.
- Okay, Cory Merryfield. Hello.
- [Cory] Hello.
- I have a question, I wasn't here at the last meeting, were you requesting to move to 706 North Broadway and now it's 708?
- [Cory] Correct, the upstairs opened up. So I'm gonna be moving to the upstairs instead of the lower unit. So it's a separate unit so it's a different address.
- And then the last time we just wanted some proof of treatment documentation?
- [Cory] Correct, I handed it in.
- Power for Change?
- [Cory] Yeah, that's who I was seeing for my counseling.
- Everything else is going okay?

- [Cory] Yeah, in fact, yesterday I was offered full time employment.
- Very good, where?
- [Cory] Graybar.
- Graybar, I don't know what that is.
- [Cory] Up in De Pere so I've been working there as a temp for two months.
- What do you do there?
- [Cory] Warehouse work, it's fill orders, stuff I enjoy.
- Do you like it?
- [Cory] I worked in truck parts for 15 years so it's not much different.
- How often are, you, do you have upcoming appointments with Mr. Nemeck?
- [Cory] I've got to call and set up my next appointment with him. So I see him periodically when my schedule allows it.
- So where are you staying right now?
- [Cory] I am going from motel to motel. Just all I can do, enough to get by.
- And what is your work schedule?
- [Cory] I work 11:00 a.m to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- Why weren't you staying at the 706, didn't we?
- [Cory] I wasn't approved.
- Oh, to deny, I'm sorry.
- He didn't have documentation for treatment.
- Got it. When does your contract end?
- [Cory] For
- Work
- [Cory] For work, in October. I've got an email that I can show you that I got from Graybar extending the job to me. If you want to look at it I can show it to you. I just received that yesterday.

- Any more question?

- Thank you.

- Last time you were here my concern was the treatment. And you've seen this, I'm sorry I forgot the person's name, Nemeck four times since July 1st. Okay, but you don't have any future appointments.

- [Cory] I'm not seeing him about my offense. I'm seeing him to help me re-establish into the community. I was having some issues with comfort level like the last gentleman was speaking about. Knowing that I'm a sex offender, people are out to get me, that kind of thing. I guess it was misinterpreted that I was seeing him as far as my case or what have you. I'm seeing him more on a personal level.

- And there's the document from Mr. Kabowski.

- [Cory] Yep, my agent.

- Okay, about your proof of completion.

- [Cory] Yeah, he re-evaluated me today, declared no more at this time. I have no problem going if he wants me to.

- And are seeing your family, your wife, are you having counseling.

- [Cory] Yep, I speak with her daily. My wife is here and my two sisters.

- Yes, yes, I read that.

- Any more questions, a motion? Did anyone want to speak again? No, we're good? I'd like to make a motion to approve Mr. Merryfield, address specific 708 North Broadway.

- I will second that.

- Motion to approve passes unanimously.

- Congratulations.

- [Cory] Thank you.

- Is it okay if I mail the letter to the Broadway address?

- [Cory] Yeah.

- Okay, Baylan Lewis.

- [Baylan] How is everybody?

- Good, how are you.

- [Baylan] A little sick.
- Sick?
- [Baylan] I have a cold, I'm okay.
- sit down there.
- [Baylan] I'm not doing anything for it.
- Oh no. There is no way, sometimes the pills can be habit forming. I use cough drops.
- Muddle through the cold.
- [Baylan] Absolutely muddle through it.
- Okay so you're looking to move to 2625 Humboldt Road?
- [Baylan] Correct, 2625 Humboldt Road in the Tower Motel.
- And you're there now?
- [Baylan] No, I was there, they needed my room because of the Packer game. Every room was booked solid so I moved across town to a Motel 6 on Shawano. The main reason why I wanted the okay to stay there is number one, I always have a backup plan that's safe and for as long as I need to. And I am looking at trying to get a job on the East side at Bay Industries skyline. Through I'm working with Remedy for that, Intelligent Staffing. And being at the motel would help me to work and back cause it's relatively close. I can get the bus there or ride my bike back. So it's accessible. And my support people live on this side of town anyway. And they're all rooting for me but couldn't be here, they didn't have time tonight. But I have been able to work. One of my support people is a boss, he owns his company, roofing and flooring company. So I've been doing that as much as I can. But I can only work for him two days, it's for shift work, because I do AODA class three days a week, Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays at Options. One of those days I also have a one on one with my counselor. Which is a dual AA program called Safe Harbor. I get to see my paper too, we don't do it on Tuesdays. So I only get two days out of the week to work the flooring job which isn't gonna cut it for long. But I do it whenever I can cause it's cash flow and I know I need cash. So I'll be working at Bay Industries hopefully before Friday.
- So the last time you were here was in 2012. What has been going on since then?
- I've been couch surfing here in Green Bay basically three days at a time and just motel hopping.
- For seven years?
- [Baylan] No, no, no for seven years I've gone back prison and jail and currently on probation. Got out last April, been clean now for two and a half years. Big improvement.
- You mentioned your support system, who are they?

- [Baylan] Well one of them, like I said, he's my boss too. If I am feeling a little bit risky let's say I could call him and he'd bring me to a job site and let me work it out, work it off, whatever. He just wants me to call him Jay. And then, Mark, we're both spiritually related people. We share the same spiritual beliefs. It's not a secret it's Christianity. And they're really good supports. They hold me accountable, if they see something out of character, they're gonna question me about it. And they're older than me so.

- Anybody here?

- [Baylan] No, they're on jobs right now. I tried to get them to show up but there is no one.

- I have a question, if we approve him to the motel but then he has to get out because of a Packer game and then he goes back, is he approved to be? If we just approve him to that address could he?

- He's approved.

- Back and forth doesn't matter?

- He's approved to live at that address. He's got a waiver of residence restriction.

- So if someone lived at somewhere on Pine Street, they left and they wanted to move back, they could move back to that same address and not come before us?

- Correct.

- I did not know that.

- [Baylan] I didn't know that either.

- If someone is in an apartment, if they move back to that same apartment, they've been approved by the board to live there.

- I can see a hotel or motel but I didn't realize a house.

- I have a question, since you were here the last time you picked up a new offense. A sex offense?

- [Baylan] It was failure to report. I was in a homeless situation and I didn't call Madison like I should've. I was so anxious about finding a place to live I wasn't able focus on a lot of things that I should've been.

- So I have that you went someplace you weren't supposed to.

- [Baylan] I was walking through a park that day, I wasn't sitting at the park, I was walking through the park and somebody must've recognized me and called the police. The police cars showed up at the end of Crooks Street when I was passing through and I had marijuana on me and I was also, I think there was a bail jumping charge too. If I remember correctly, I believe that I got bonded out of jail. I was on probation and I think there was a bail jumping charge too and possession of marijuana.

- When were you released on that?
- [Baylan] April 14th, I believe, 2017.
- 2017, okay.
- [Baylan] I don't know the exact date anymore. I'm trying to look forward.
- I know you had the THC charge in August of 2017, is that right?
- [Baylan] Still in 2017, yeah.
- It's all on the same date, that's August.
- [Baylan] Yes, it was right after my birthday or during the time of my birthday, yeah, that was in August.
- So have you had any other AODA assessment treatment and follow through it says.
- [Baylan] Yes.
- I'm sorry, I'm early again. I apologize, don't answer that.
- [Baylan] Okay.
- I'll get that through my head.
- How long have you been working for this company?
- [Baylan] I'm working on getting a job.
- Getting a job, okay.
- [Baylan] Remedy is a fairly new temp service that I applied for. I got a text from them saying they had a second shift job. I can only work second shift because of all my appointments during the day. Second or third, I don't want to go to third shift and go to group all tired and go to sleep. So second shift it is.
- Do you have family here that are supportive?
- [Baylan] Yes, my mother, my brother, are both are major supports for me. They live on the East side of Green Bay too and right close accessible to the motel too. Close by I should say, Victoria Street.
- You don't want to live with them?

- [Baylan] They're on housing allowance and there's strict regulations for that and I obviously have a sexual crime on the record. That automatically bars even if I were to call them and ask permission from them. Just like I don't qualify for any of the housing programs.

- The last time that you were here you, I believe, Mr. And Mrs. Klika?

- [Baylan] Yes.

- Are you still...

- [Baylan] Barb Klika and Bob Klika. I haven't, I've been out of contact with them now for some time. But if I needed to call her she's an available resource, she'll gladly talk to me. Bob too, she's a social worker herself. I'm probably gonna call her for additional treatment if she's able to give it to me.

- If we go over and ask you about treatment question do you want us to do it in private or?

- [Baylan] We can do this open.

- Open, okay. What treatment are you, you said you were going AODA?

- [Baylan] Yes I have two AODA related classes. One is SUBESA, the other one is CPOP and they're both at Options Treatment Center.

- Do you have documentation of that?

- [Baylan] I have my folder right here along with all my work we're working on. This is where we're at right now in session. It ends on Thursday week so tomorrow would be my last session of the week. It goes for 40 sessions.

- Do you have anything from the counselor?

- The CPOP is I'm going until I'm done with probation or if I still want it. I don't have that letter on me but I do have a letter somewhere that says. Let's see if I have anything here. So you just want something that she signed.

- Yeah, that you've been going so long whatever.

- [Baylan] I don't have anything here that says that but I do have a... No, that's not it, I do have a piece of work that we had to do that she actually gave me constructive criticism on. I don't have that letter that she sent me saying that I was admitted into this program.

- And how often do you go to this?

- [Baylan] Three times a week. Three times a week, Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:00 to 12:00.

- And this is for alcohol and drugs?

- [Baylan] Yes.

- Are those triggers for you?

- [Baylan] I've identified my triggers. I've identified my bodily sensations leading up to a relapse. So I'm pretty good plus I've had two and a half years of sobriety already. However, I'm just learning tools so I have tools in my toolbox so that I can. It helps me to learn new things that apply to me like my triggers, what leads up to my triggers. What am I feeling, what am I experiencing? It's cognitive based.

- I will tell you my concerns. Because of the repeated violations, drug related, I would feel much more comfortable approving you to the address if you can provide that to us a letter from your counselors.

- [Baylan] I could do that, I could probably do that, I can probably get something as early as tomorrow when I see her for group.

- We won't be here tomorrow.

- [Baylan] Where would I send it to otherwise, should I drop it off here?

- Well I was gonna make a motion to approve for address specific for 30 days and return in 30 days and provide proof of attendance and a letter from your counselor for the AODA. Is it three or two programs that you do?

- [Baylan] Two programs CPOP and SUBESA.

- For both of those programs, okay?

- [Baylan] Documentation.

- How long you've been attending.

- [Baylan] How long I've been attending.

- How often you attend, what you're working on.

- [Baylan] All right I'm sorry.

- I make that motion.

- And that was that address specific?

- Yes.

- Motion to approve 30 days passes unanimously.

- So you can stay there for 30 days, just bring the documentation back.

- [Baylan] That'll get some more anxiety off of me, thank you.

- You're welcome and as soon as you get that you can bring it to them. Okay, can I give you my mailing address to get that sent to, that's my mom's address.
- Yes, what's the mailing address?
- [Baylan] 615 Victoria Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin 54302.
- Okay.
- [Baylan] So you can send it there. I'll get it as soon as possible.
- And then you'll get a letter telling you the date to return. All right, thank you, good luck, feel better. Mr. Steven Lemerond.
- [Steven] Right here.
- How are you doing today?
- [Steven] Not too bad, how are you guys doing?
- Okay. So you were here last month.
- [Steven] Right.
- How have things been going since then?
- [Steven] Pretty good, I got my letter from Pablo. We meet every Tuesday at 11:50, I'm still working.
- So last month we made a motion for 90 days?
- You know I was looking at that. The motion for 90 days did not pass. And this I guess is the 30 days.
- We wanted to see what else happened then. We did another motion of 90 days and it failed and we told him he could reapply.
- He had to go back for documents.
- Okay, so that motion failed and another motion wasn't done.
- So this is a new appeal. Okay so this is from Hanger Enterprises. As a license professional counselor this writer has known Steven Lemerond since August 6th of 2019. This writer currently treats him in a sex offender treatment group. He has attended all scheduled groups, accepts responsibility for the offense and has been completing assignments as assigned.
- So you go down to Milwaukee?
- [Steven] No, no, no, he comes up from Appleton.

- Oh, okay.
- [Steven] That's just their main office.
- So what have you learned?
- [Steven] I've learned quite a bit. I brought what I'm working with here.
- Are you okay to ask you questions in public or private?
- [Steven] That's fine, it can be open.
- Okay. How long are you going to continue? Is there an end date or is it?
- [Steven] I think it usually goes about a year, that's what I've been told. Each time you complete an assignment you get some credits.
- Is it one on one or group?
- [Steven] No, it's a group, there's seven of us in there. It helps me a little bit to talk to people, it helps. The last time I was here I was nervous. It helps me open up a lot more. I'm still not the greatest at it but I'm working at it. Any other? You asked me what I learned so far. This last time we worked on life traps. He had us pick out 10 of them. And I picked, emotional deprivation, dependence. What he had me do was write an instance from your childhood and what that was. And then after that we wanted you to do a decision change with those where it happened when you were an adult. I'm learning a lot about that and about myself. It's helping, I've been in there, I think August 6th is when I started. I've learned quite a bit in that little bit of time. Right now we're working on aversion. It's an alternative, well not an alternative, it's what do you call it? It's like a consequence of your crime. So I had to write out what happened after my crime. Like things I couldn't do, things I could do. Like I had to sit in jail. And talk about how you're sitting in jail because of what you did. That helped and it helps you to see what you did was not right. I think my next assignment is the escape. Where you have to say how you were thinking about what you're gonna do but instead of doing it you called a friend or called a family member and give yourself a pat on the back. But that's how you handle the escape. An alternative thought, an alternative behavior. Contact positive support and work it out.
- How long are the sessions?
- [Steven] We're usually done by 2:00.
- Is that like an hour?
- [Steven] Hour and a half. Well we start at 11:50 and we're done by 2:00 so, longest, two hours. And I go every Tuesday. And I'm still working with my agent on stuff, she gave me a journal.
- Anybody else have any questions? Okay, anyone want to make a motion?
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Lemerond to 1114 Stuart Street address specific.

- I'll second that motion.
- Did you hit enter?
- Yeah, I saw it come up, I hit it and it went away.
- Motion to approve passes unanimously.
- [Steven] Thank you very much.
- You're welcome.
- [Steven] You guys have good day.
- Would you like the letter sent to the Stuart Street address? I'll be sending it out in the next couple of days.
- [Steven] Sure.
- Joseph Coppersmith. Hi.
- [Joseph] Hello.
- Okay, so you're at the TLP right now?
- [Joseph] Yes, ma'am.
- How long can you be there?
- [Joseph] Til the 30th. And you're looking to move to 1145 University Avenue?
- [Joseph] Yes mam.
- Living alone?
- [Joseph] Mm hmm.
- Why are you at the TLP?
- [Joseph] I was just released from prison on July 2nd.
- Was that for a new offense or a violation?
- [Joseph] For violation, I had absconded and got a DWI, fleeing and eluding.
- And what?
- [Joseph] Fleeing and eluding. And when was this?

- [Joseph] '09. And failure to register.
- I'm not understanding. This was the eluding was in 2010 but then it says sentence was one year.
- Again, there's an additional.
- Concurrent?
- When you scroll down.
- Yes?
- Page eight of 14 there's a revocation in 2010 and was the sentence for 15 years?
- [Joseph] Yes, 10 in five out.
- I have page two of two. The next one, I don't have that.
- So how long did you fail to register?
- Okay, thank you.
- You're welcome.
- [Joseph] Eight days.
- And where were you living?
- [Joseph] I was hopping between family members.
- Okay, and the eluding, could you describe that.
- [Joseph] I got pulled over by police because my plates were suspended for a seatbelt ticket, failure to pay it. So they suspended my plates. So I figured there was a warrant for my arrest for absconding so I had a few drinks in me and I just panicked.
- Okay. Forgive us for all this hardware. Okay, all right, gosh darn this thing.
- So can you explain the, or do you know, of the breakdown of your sentence? So you had the failure to register, the eluding, and then the, what was the other offense? We're just trying to calculate.
- [Joseph] Failure to register, first DWI.
- Okay, okay, all right so I'm adding those in. So you were recently released.
- [Joseph] Yes.
- You're at TLP and how long are you on probation?

- [Joseph] Five years.
- And the address that you're requesting to move to you've lived there before?
- [Joseph] No, I haven't.
- I'm sorry I'm just reading back on your offense.
- I I 45 University Upper?
- [Joseph] Yes.
- You've not lived there before? I stayed there for a brief while when I was on paper but it wasn't permanent.
- Okay.
- It moves every time I touch it.
- It's touchy
- Very touchy to me.
- It keeps moving on us.
- Do you want to stop?
- I'm sorry?
- Do you want to stop?
- No, I've got it, it's coming in.
- Now is the landlord a relative?
- [Joseph] Yes, she's my cousin. She's fully aware of everything.
- Okay, that's why I'm looking for the letter from her. Here we go. Are you looking for a job now?
- [Joseph] I already have a job, I work at Market Foods. I started, actually today I did my orientation today. And I work six days a week from 4:30 to 1:30.
- And your support network, you're going to reside with your cousin?
- [Joseph] No.
- She owns the property.

- [Joseph] Yes.
- Who's your support network?
- [Joseph] My cousin Roger, his fiancée, my sister, the cousin that owns the house, and my nephew and niece.
- Okay, and where does everyone live?
- [Joseph] Right here in Green Bay. Except for Roger's fiancée, she lives in Lena. I'm in constant contact with everybody.
- Okay.
- But you're gonna live alone?
- [Joseph] Yes.
- Do you have any more questions that are related?
- I do not.
- [Joseph] I also have this from my P.O. proof of the SOT program.
- Can we keep this open session?
- I'm sorry?
- Open session.
- [Joseph] Oh, that's fine.
- So you don't mind if we talk about your treatment or anything like that in front of, okay?
- So what type of treatment or classes are you going to now?
- [Joseph] Right now I'm not taking nothing. They recommend after care which my P.O.'s, she's gonna set me up at a future date as soon as I get everything stabilized. As soon as I get set in my job, get this approved, my housing approved.
- So you said that your last violation you were under the influence of alcohol?
- [Joseph] Yes, I completed AODA in prison.
- Do you have any documentation?
- [Joseph] Not on me but I completed that in 2018. I do have the certificate and stuff at the TLP.

- Okay, here you go, sir. Did your P.O. tell you approximately how long before she's going to have you to the after care.

- [Joseph] No she didn't.

- Just depending on how things progress from here.

- [Joseph] Yes. She wants to see how I'm gonna work. How I'm doing at work, if I get approved for a place and stuff. She wants to make sure I'm stable before she gets me into the after care. She doesn't want to overload me too much.

- Do you feel like you're having any trouble with alcohol?

- [Joseph] No, not anymore. I don't even have an urge for it or the taste of alcohol at all.

- So my concern is that, I would feel more comfortable since you had that violation and it wasn't just one thing where you violated it was kind of cumulative where you had a bunch of things going on, I would feel much more comfortable approving you to that address specific without any time period if we had the documentation for your completion of AODA and your paycheck stub. And as well as getting some information from your P.O. Hopefully she will have referred you for after care because it's been so recent. Being on the inside's one thing, everything's regulated. And then so you do have to become accustomed to living on the outside. So for now I would have a motion of approving Mr. Coppersmith address specific for a period of 60 days. At which time I would ask that you bring in your proof of completion of you AODA program and also your paycheck stub and hopefully by then you will have some documentation from the probation officer, parol agent showing that you've been referred for after care.

- [Joseph] Okay, I've also got this from CBI for my rent and security deposit for three months.

- Okay.

- [Joseph] They're gonna help me with that so I can get on my feet.

- Okay, that's great.

- I'm gonna make a second to that motion. Thank you.

- Motion to approve for 60 days passes unanimously.

- Okay so you'll come back to us with that information in 60 days.

- [Joseph] Okay, thank you.

- You're welcome. Do you want your letter sent the University Avenue address.

- [Joseph] TLP for now.

- TLP, thank you.

- [Joseph] Thank you.
- [Roger] Thank yous, have a good day.
- You too.
- [Roger] We'll see you in 60.
- Uh uh, can't take that.
- Oh, thank you.
- Christopher Butler.
- Hi Mr. Butler.
- [Christopher] Hello.
- You're requesting to move to 2233, or your current address is 2233 Samantha Street Apartment 54, De Pere and you're requesting to move to 1125 South Chestnut Street Lower.
- [Christopher] Correct.
- Is that the same address.
- [Christopher] No, but it's right down the street though.
- So why do you want to move back into Green Bay?
- [Christopher] I lived in Green Bay, just the last two months I lived down south 823 South Oakland.
- [Christopher] And I was dating some girl for a long period of time and we just went our separate ways so I moved out to De Pere with my parents. And it's really far away from my work and everything I do so I gotta a roommate, I found a roommate that I want to move in with so they'll be a lot more access to everything for me instead of living with my parents. I don't want to live with my parents, just have to for right now.
- And where do you work?
- [Christopher] Pioneer metal.
- And where is that located?
- [Christopher] Right on Broadway right next to I 72 off Broadway.
- And the person you're gonna move in with has, one, two?
- [Christopher] Three kids, four kids.

- What is your relationship to the person?
- [Christopher] We're friends.
- Okay.
- [Christopher] Just gonna be a roommate. I got a letter from her brother that owns the place I sent it to.
- Joey?
- [Christopher] Yeah.
- Delcore. So my question is, so the property information's a little bit different than.
- He is the manager.
- Joey's the manager? Okay, so my understanding is it has to be actually from the property owner and not the property manager.
- Well we've had apartment managers before, not the owner's of the apartment.
- It has to be an LLC or something like that. It has to be an agent.
- So, long story short, it appears as though we would need a letter from the actual owner of the property approving you to move there okay? And this is helpful, what you sent, but we actually need it from the owner.
- [Christopher] There are but I can get it, that's no issue, that is no issue. I understand, I can get it from them.
- Okay, so at this time what I will do is I will make a motion to deny and then you just resubmit the information as soon as you get it just bring it all back, okay?
- [Christopher] Okay, all right.
- Wait, wait, wait, wait. It has to be seconded because they may think I'm crazy.
- I'll second that motion.
- [Christopher] I wish I would've know that.
- I'm sorry, that is completely my fault. I thought it was okay with being the manager.
- So yes is an..
- A yes vote is to deny.

- Motion to deny passes two to one.
- So you heard us what we were talking about with everybody else so just keep that all in as far as documentation just bring that kind of stuff.
- [Christopher] What do you need?
- Where you work, pay stubs, things like that.
- [Christopher] You guys need all that?
- It just helps.
- [Christopher] Okay.
- Good luck.
- [James] Should I just come up?
- Come on up.
- James Belanger?
- [James] Belanger but that's close enough.
- And you were here in February of this year and you had requested to move to 1003 Wilson Avenue and you were approved.
- [James] Yes.
- And now you're requesting to move to 900 School Place in Green Bay.
- [James] Yes.
- Why do you want to move?
- [James] Well it was a temporary situation with me and it was my grandparents. That house I was staying on Division was the mother of my child. She ended up cheating on me and moving in her boyfriend so me staying there was not an option. So everything moved pretty fast. My grandparents let me move in and suddenly hinting for me to leave. They started moving in construction stuff downstairs by the door where my room is. So I'm just trying to get ahead of it beforehand.
- That is so cute.
- [James] Tripping over buckets of paint when I got done at 5:00 a.m. was enough of a hint.
- Has it not been good or is it just like?

- [James] No, it's fine it's just I know they get kind of grumpy and I can sense it. I try not to even be there when I don't have to sleep. Just to make it a little bit easier. Plus my girlfriend did buy her house so she wants me to move there.

- I was gonna ask if she's the landlord.

- [James] She's the owner and landlord. I completely forgot to give you the documentation so I brought more stuff.

- But they checked the county's updated so it should be on there.

- [James] Okay, awesome, do you have that paperwork I did the other day?
