VERBATIM MINUTES

- We're all set?
- Okay, proceed.
- Calling to order the meeting of the Sex Offender Residency Board for October 9th, 2019. Roll call.
- I will document who's here.
- Okay. Does that mean that we're ready?
- Yeah, go ahead.
- And moving on to approval of the agenda. Do I have any motions?
- I'll make the motion to approve the agenda.
- Second.
- All right, the motion passes unanimously.
- Thank you, and moving on to the approval of the minutes. Do I have any motions?

- I'll make a motion to approve the minutes.
- And I'll second it.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, thank you. And moving on to regular business. Is Xavier Teller here? Xavier Teller? Regarding a, should I just put him? What is he? I think he just comes later?
- I don't know. I think we motion to deny, don't we?
- Or just a motion to deny, right?
- Yeah, it's typically a motion to deny.
- Okay, do I hear Mr. Teller about answering up? Do I have any motions?
- I move to deny.
- Any second?
- Second.
- All right, this is a motion to deny, so a yes vote is to deny. Motion passes unanimously.
- Thank you, now moving on to the next in order. Number two on the regular business, Theodore Blazek. Is Theodore Blazek here?
- Hi.
- Hi, Mr. Blazek.
- [Theodore] Excuse my attire, I just got done with work.
- Okay, no worries. So Mr. Blazek, you've--
- I'd like to.
- Okay, can I just? Just wait one moment. Okay, Mr.?
- [Theodore] And I also have this from James Drake.
- Okay, and Mr. Blazek just handed us a letter from a... His personal letter on his behalf, and a letter from doctor, or excuse me, James Drake with Family Services. Okay, Mr. Blazek, would you please go back and explain or tell us a little bit about your underlying criminal offense?
- Sure.

- Not referring to relationship with the victim. Just referring to the victim--

- There aren't any personal people to name.

- Okay.

- M'kay.

- I was working at an insurance broker for a number of years. I was alone a lot of the time, driving and things. I had problems at the time that were undiagnosed with depression. Since I've had it all whole life, it was just normal. So I didn't really realize how bad it was. The ways I remedied that was I collected a lotta things, bought a lotta things, and the other part that was not good was I was into online pornography. And if you delve into online pornography, sooner or later, you're gonna get things on your computer that are illegal. And I knew they were illegal, after a while, and they were there. I didn't know what to do. I sought counseling, but I kinda had it in the back of my mind, if I mentioned anything, I'd probably end up getting arrested. So I didn't, and that still weighed on me. It added into the depression. A lot of it had to do with any way to get out. I would go into this downward spiral.

- Can I stop you right there?

- Sure.

- Now before you get into anything that may be in line with your treatment, you have the opportunity to go in closed session. So for now, why don't you just stick to the underlying facts. How did the police become aware of--

- Oh, from what I understand, I downloaded some things off of what are called... We downloaded bunches of material on, I can't even think of the proper name within the computer. I'm not a real computer genius. Anyway, I had downloaded things that they must have been tracking. And so, they monitored it, and then came and did a bust, did a search of my computer.

- Okay. Officer, is that the same lines of what you have?

- Yes, that's accurate.

- Torrent, torrent sites. That's what they call 'em.

- Okay, does anybody have any questions about the underlying offense?

- How often were you doing this?

- Towards the end, quite a bit. I was downloading all sorts of things. Movies, these pornography picture packets, basically, music. It was anything to get away from just sitting and delving into problems that I was having. It was anything to just put my mind onto something else.

- And was it all child pornography?

- Oh, no, most of it was just basic illegal things, but there were things that were underage pictures of girls who were underage teenage girls.

- So were you purposely looking for child, or did that just show up when you were on the other pornography sites?

- At first, it just showed up. But, I mean, later on, yeah. I knew that some of the stuff was illegal.

- And you didn't care?

- Unfortunately, no.

- 'Kay. 'Kay, that's my question.

- Okay, any further questions?

- Okay, go ahead.

- The address that you're requesting to move to, tell me about that.

- I've owned the house since '96.

- Okay. Who's living there now?

- Right now, no one. The renters have moved out and I've been refurbishing it. They did a lotta damage.

- Let's see. And you're currently not in the city of Green Bay, correct?

- No, I'm living with my parents outside of De Pere.

- I don't know where that is. And where is your son living now?

- My son's in college at UW La Crosse.

- Oh, so he'll just be with you when he's home from school? Is that it?

- Right.

- Okay.

- And then he'll be, he graduates, hard to tell exactly when, I think in a year, a year and a half, something of that nature.

- Okay.

- And, Mr. Blazek, you're employed now?

- Yes, I work for Little Rapids Corporation.

- 'Kay, what kinda work do you do?

- I'm a machine operator. I have worked extensively in the paper industry over the years before I went into the insurance business. And that was one of the things, just before I had gotten arrested, I had kind of self-diagnosed that I was having a lotta problems. I was suicidal and, like I said, anything to break myself out of that. Realistically, if it wouldn't have been for my son, our relationship, if he wouldn't have been around, I wouldn't be here. I would've ended things back in, you know, before. I don't know, in the 20's. You know, 2010, in that area? The medication that's been prescribed to me is very low dosage of citalopram.

- Okay, let's--

- No, I don't have any problem with, you know.

- You don't mind if we talk about your treatment or anything like that in open session?

- No, I'm open. Completely open to what's happened. I mean, I made a huge mistake and I've paid a huge price, and I'm continuing to pay a huge price. But I understand it, I own up to it. I know what I did and I've made all the changes that I can, and I will continue to do that. The citalopram, like I said, it just stops me from, like I said, chasing down that rabbit hole. I don't have that anymore. I haven't had it since I began taking it in 2014. I'm now back to normal.

- And with regard to your sentence, you are on paper until 2015, or excuse me, 2025?

- No. Wait. '29, I think. I think they gave me originally 10 years.

- Yes.

- After five, I want to see if I can get that reduced, but I did four in at Oshkosh. And I just got out this January.

- Okay. Let's see.

- And I've been spending time helping my parents out. And getting things back in order. Getting a good job and everything, so I got a really good job, and I'd like to move back into my home.

- And how long have you worked there?

- I just began this month, or last month. But it's full-time, like I said, I've got extensive background in paper making and everything.

- Did you live in this home before?

- Yes, that was my home. I've lived there--

- That's where you were arrested.

- Yes, I lived there from '96 until 2015.
- Okay, and so you know the neighbors, the neighbors know who are, they moved?
- Most of them. Well, yeah, I mean, people move in and out and stuff, but there are quite a few neighbors that I talk to that are still around. It's a very nice, quiet neighborhood.
- [Man] None that want him there.
- Okay, sir, if you could just wait until, okay. Let's see, any other questions?
- I have none.
- Veronica, any other questions?
- Well, yeah, with what treatment and stuff.
- Yes.
- Oh, okay. So how often do you go to see James Drake?
- Every two weeks.
- And then how long are you expected to continue with that?
- I don't know. I mean, there isn't a set thing, but I will be continuing to see him. It's been very good. We've gotten a very good relationship. I saw him--
- Oh, I'm sorry, go ahead.
- I began seeing him in 2014 before I went to prison and then I went and sought him out right away when I got out.
- Before you went to prison, but were arrested?
- Correct. I had gone to the Family Services a couple of times to seek, when I was having the problems, the suicidal problems. But that was just where you just walk in. I wasn't seeing anyone as a regular therapist. And like I said, I talked about other problems I was having, but I stayed away from the child pornography because I had it in the back of my mind, and no one has ever given me a solid yes or no that if I'd have brought it up there, if I would have been immediately... They would've referred it and I would've been arrested, so I didn't know what to do. It was a major problem for me emotionally. But I didn't know what to do. I didn't know where to turn.
- Okay.
- And how many times a week are you seeing or--
- Every two weeks.

- It's every two weeks?
- Every other week, yes, ma'am.
- And is it up to you for how long you go? 'Cause he doesn't say anything in here.
- No, there isn't. I don't think there's a set thing, but he's in contact with Brittany Marquardt, my PO. They speak all the time. So it's not like I'm just gonna stop going. I don't wanna ever go down this road again. I mean, I ruined my life once. I'm not gonna do it again.
- Okay, any other questions?
- Not right now.
- Okay, let's see. We have a few people who are signed up to be speakers. Is Kaye VandenBranden?
- [Kaye] Yes, ma'am.
- 'Kay, if you could come up please. And if you could, do you need anything spelled or--
- Just name and address.
- And what is your address?
- P.O. Box 222 Kewaunee, Wisconsin.
- And your name again is Kaye VandenBranden?
- Correct.
- And what is your relationship to Mr. Blazek?
- I am his sister.
- Okay, and go ahead, you have three minutes.
- Okay, I'm not sure what I'm supposed to speak other than the fact that as a family, we have all dealt with this. My parents, once Ted was arrested, everyone came together as a family unit, he has a strong family unit. We took his son, he was still in high school. We got him through that, got him braces, took care of him very well, so he didn't have to go into Child Services or the system. We did that, we took care of the home, got it rented out for him, packed up stuff. We're still a strong family unit, and we realize a crime's happened. We're supported of him. We're supported of his son, who is doing very well, considering all the stuff that he's been through. My parents are in their middle 80s to late 80s, and they're very supportive. He does live there with them now. He's got the monitor on and they have that in the home. They had people come in the home to make sure it was safe for him to live there, and that was all taken care of. Now we will continue to support him. Mental illness is not a easy thing. None of us knew, many people hide that very easily. So once this was enlightened to us,

we came together as a family unit and stuck with him. He's my brother. I mean, he's blood, and that will always, always be. Thank you.

- Any questions?

- How long will you have the monitor in?

- According to the way that the law's written up right now, which came into effect last fall, anyone with two charges of any kind of sexual crime has to have the monitor on for life.

- Okay, okay.

- Now that's going through the courts. But as it stands right now, that's the way it is.

- Okay. And has your PO visited the home, on Lawe Street?

- No.

- Okay.

- No, she's open to it.

- Okay.

- She knows that's I'm here and everything, so I would assume then, she would come and take a look at the house.

- And with regard to, you have your sister, who else do you have that supports you? Any other family or friends?

- Oh, sure, my parents. But for medical reasons, I didn't wanna ask them to come. Yeah, my mother's--

- They might get lost coming down here.

- Yeah, my son, who I keep in contact with all the time. I have friends. No one could come today because work problems, and my son couldn't be here, obviously, 'cause he's in La Crosse. And other friends of mine that live in Minneapolis, we're all very close, and I have friends in the neighborhood, too.

- Okay. Okay, all righty, thank you.

- [Kaye] Mm-hmm.

- Let's see. Next, Tom Ysebaert?

- Yes, ma'am, Ysebaert.

- Ysebaert?

- Yes, ma'am.

- Could you spell that please?

- [Tom] Y-S-E-B-A-E-R-T.

- And if you could have a seat over here, that's fine.

- Right here?

- That's fine. And you have three minutes. Oh, where do you live, I'm sorry.

- I live across the street at 1169 Lawe Street.

- Okay.

- We're here, me and some neighbors and family, that are all around where Mr. Blazek is trying to move back into, trying to say that we don't want you there. In all due respect, I feel for you. I understand you're going through some things. I think it's pretty obvious from the get-go from what you've said already, that you do not take responsibility for this. I've dealt with mental health issues and depression and anxiety my whole life, so has a lot of my family, and I think it's shameful that you're hiding behind having mental health issues for being a sexual deviant. There's two very different lines--

- Excuse me, if you could address us--

- [Tom] Fair enough.

- Instead of Mr. Blazek.

- Fair enough.

- As an individual and if you could, specifically, remain focused on why, I take it, obviously, that you don't want Mr. Blazek to return to--

- No, I'll get to the facts of what we see and outside of the feelings we have. But I think it's important to go on the record here that what he's saying is Psych 101, not responsible. You say you're taking responsibility, I don't feel he is. Furthermore, he is way within below the 1500 feet from a park, over on Astor Park. A beautiful, amazing family neighborhood with children everywhere around there. Second more, I believe that he's been picked up for two parole violations since he's been out already. He's been "Green Bay Crime Reports" twice in the last month. I'm not sure why. Maybe you guys could find that out.

- I could explain that.

- Okay, let's not talk--

- Clearly, he's not following the laws already.

- No.

- Sir, if you could just--

- And that's just the gist of it, you know? I mean, I hope you get better. I believe in redemption. I'm a God-fearing person. I believe in second chances, but there is just too many good families over there with kids all over right next to him, right across from him, all up and down that area. Why should we have to pay the price? I understand you're paying a price, but why should we have to pick up and move when a multiple-repeat sexual offender who is clearly outside of the ordinance that Green Bay has in line, why should we have to pay the price? I'm not sure why we're even here. I mean, I've been researching this for months, finding ordinances, finding the laws. None of it adds up. He's over there, and one of our neighbors will talk to you that lives next to him, music blaring loud, cutting down trees to bother the people that live next to him to open privacy lanes. I mean, he's already over there causing trouble, why would we ever even think to give him a chance or to welcome him back into the neighborhood? That's my piece.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Ted] May I respond?

- Okay, with regard to response, please no cross-talk. If you could just direct your comments to us.

- Sure, yeah, I will. All right, the two arrests that he was talking about, they've both been because of the battery has malfunctioned. Other than that, you can call Brittany Marquardt. There's never been any problems. I have never missed any appointments. I have nothing. It's the battery in these units that are remarkably bad. They have problems all the time.

- Can you attest to that? Do you have anything?

- I do not have those cases here in front of me, so I was unaware of those cases.

- Okay.

- I was brought in and, by 8:30, I was out because Brittany gets in at 8:00 and was able to clear both warrants. All they were were PO holds because of the battery malfunction.

- Okay.

- Now as far as cutting down trees, there were, in the past four years, all sorts of little trees have grown up along the area because, obviously, the previous owners, who was renting, wasn't gonna be taking care of that stuff. My dad was too old. So I cut down some scrub trees. The neighbor who he's talking about threatened me, acted like he had a gun. It was quite a scene. I told him that if he wanted to talk to me, that was fine. But, otherwise, just to stay on his own side of the property line.

- He threatened you with a gun?

- No, he threatened that he had a gun. He was walking holding his hand behind his back like he had a gun in the back of his waistband. I didn't wanna call the cops. I didn't wanna make that big of a deal. But I did document it with Brittany Marquardt right away that day and, again, if you wanna call her up, that has all been documented.

- Okay, any other questions.

- And I don't have any problem. I understand if these people would like to talk to me and get to know me a little bit and find out. I had some problems, I admit that. But these things, they're behind me as far as, is it ever gonna happen again? No, there's no way. I'm not gonna ruin my life. My son had to pay far too heavy a price for what I did. I'm not gonna do that. I'm not gonna put him through anything like that again.

- All right, thank you, sir.

- One other question, Mr. Ysebaert. Have you or the neighbors talked to Mr. Galvin at all?

- Yep, I talked to Bill.

- Okay.

- Yes, sir. I called him for information on this early on just to see what our options were, how to proceed, how to figure out the proper channels to let our voices be heard. I mean, people are scared. Neighbors are scared all around that amazing neighborhood, and one of them that lives right next to Mr. Blazek is here. Hopefully, she'll speak here in a minute with the husband who that altercation happened. I have a very different view. My family and my daughters and my wife unfortunately heard it and saw it. 8:00 in the morning, he was out there doing yard work. He's not the kinda guy to act like he has a gun. Apparently, there was a lotta--

- He did.

- Okay, please.

- Hollerin' and swearin' going on. It started from him, so everybody was scared and goin', "All right, we're gonna have to look into this." So I called Bill and to his credit and for the record, I couldn't believe it, he answered his phone. He talked to me, he was very informative. Found out from my brother, Bob Gagan, a lawyer here, that highly-regarded person, and a voice of reason in a lotta these meetings. I was hoping he'd be here today. I know his name was on the board, but I know he's busy. But, yeah, indeed that was me that called him and talked to him, and that's kinda how we started getting together to be able to come down here. And, again, I wanna apologize for, I'm amped up, naturally, over this. It's a very scary time for us. We just moved in a couple years ago. Spent a lot of money building a house and getting to know our neighbors and fixing things up. And, again, I understand that we all have issues and I'm no angel, but I just feel there's too many things that are lining up here that don't look like it should be allowed. Thank you.

- Thank you, sir. Okay, Nicole Anderson?

- [Nicole] Yes.

- Ms. Anderson could you tell us where you reside?

- I live at 1231 Lawe Street.

- Okay, and you have three minutes.

- Okay, so it's recently come to my attention that this sexual offender is trying to move into our neighborhood. And it's just really disturbing to myself because we live so close to this beautiful park, and I kinda felt like living so close to this park, I'd always be in this bubble within the legal 1500 yard parameter. So I just kinda felt like I should have this natural safety, and our neighborhood is full of young families with children. Right across the street, there's two young girls, there's neighbors who have young children, I myself do, and we just want to make sure that our neighborhood is protected because not only are the kids going to the park, but they're walking to and from school every morning, every afternoon. And like Tom said, it's just kind of a scary time in our neighborhood. A major area of concern for me is, I've been made aware that he has been at the residence at 1162 Lawe. I don't know if he's been staying there, but we do know that he has been there. He admitted that he's been there at the home. And what's concerning is it kind of seems to me like returning to the scene of the crime without following the proper channels of being here in front of the Board to get the approval to be there. And I don't know what the law is, and if he's allowed to just be there because he says he owns the home, but it's still concerning that going through the proper channels didn't happen. So it makes me wonder, if you're not going to go through the proper avenues and follow the law, what makes us feel reassured that he's going to keep complying with the law? Especially, with the nature of his crimes. So we just don't really have that reassurance or safety in our neighborhood. So I'm just here with my neighbors to really urge the Board to deny his request to reside at 1162 Lawe.

- I would like to... Sure, go ahead, I'm sorry.

- I just wanna make it abundantly clear. We have no information at all that Mr. Blazek has violated the ordinance. The ordinance is specifically with regard to living somewhere, okay? People come and go at different, you know?

- [Nicole] Mm-hmm.

- But it's regarding whether or not he lives there. Mr. Blazek did?

- Sure. I checked this all out with Brittany before I even went. I have every legal right to go there and work on my house and be there during the day. I haven't been staying overnight at all, or anything of that nature. Everything I've done is completely legal within the law.

- Okay, thank you, Ms. Anderson. And Darlene Esquivel?

- Yes. Esquivel.

- Esquivel?

- Yes.

- Okay. And if you could spell your last name please?

- Yes, it is E-S-Q-U-I-V-E-L.

- And where do you reside?

- I 166 Lawe Street.

- And you have three minutes.

- Yes ma'am. We live right next door, and when we bought the home, it was our first home. We had just moved here from Florida. I have a nine-year-old daughter. First of all, I would never have bought that home if I knew that a sex offender was gonna be living right next door to me. Unfortunately, the home was not in Mr. Blazek's name at the time. So we had no idea that any kind of crime had occurred there in regards to that nature. Secondly, since we found out that he wished to move back, I've had to tell my nine-year-old daughter, "There is absolutely no reason for you to have any contact with the gentleman that's gonna be next door." And it's put a fear in her 'cause I had to tell her why. When we moved from Florida, we couldn't let our daughter go out, walk to the park, participate in a program that we weren't really there. But since we've moved to Green Bay, that's one of the things that we absolutely love about our neighborhood, is that we have the freedom and the carelessness to allow her, because we felt safe. Our neighbors approached us and say, "Welcome to the neighborhood. "By the way, there's a park program. "Your daughter can go with the other kids "in the neighborhood." There's kids riding bicycles down our street. There's kids out after dark. It's almost stepping back in time a little bit, and we never had that where we came from. So I would just hate for my daughter, this is a nine-year-old girl, I would hate for her to have to live in fear every day because she's afraid that something's gonna happen or he's gonna be looking at her. It's just very fearful for her, and I just don't feel that that's fair. I don't feel that it's fair, if he has a supportive family, then let his family continue to encourage his health and well-being and support him. But I don't feel that everyone within a-so-many-block radius has to be punished because of his crimes that he's committed. Secondly, I just had to undergo a program to participate. My daughter attends a Catholic school, and to volunteer, we have to take a program on sexual predators. I don't believe that there's any rehabilitation. I think that it's always gonna be a problem that he has. That's my personal opinion. That's very fearful for me. That's very fearful for me to have to live with that every day. There's so many other places where he could live. Why he must return to that home is just beyond me. I just don't understand why he has to move back there knowing that there is tons of children all around him all the time. I just don't understand that.

- Thank you.

- And I would just urge the Board to please do not approve his residency there.

- Thank you.

- Thank you.

- Do you have any questions?

- I do not.

- Any questions?
- No.
- Thank you, Ms. Anderson.
- Thank you.
- And I don't believe there is anyone else that has signed up to be a speaker. Am I correct? Okay.
- If I may?
- Mm-hmm.

- I understand everyone's mistrust and fears. I get that. I'm not gonna bash anybody for that. I can understand that. The crime that I committed was downloading child pornography on the internet, basically. I've never done anything to any children, never would. It was simply a way to, as I said, break that cycle. I went at it and I got into something that I should never have gotten into. I admit that completely and it's never gonna happen again. I don't have desires to have little children. If these people would get to know me a little bit, they'd find out, yes, I admit everything that happened. I'm completely open with it. I'm not trying to pull the wool over anyone's eyes. I bought that house in '96. That's my home, I'm not selling my house. I just wanna move back and live my life. They're never gonna talk to me. If they never wanna talk to me, that's fine. But I'm not gonna bother anybody. And if they would like to get to know me, I'm more than happy to, like I said, and be as open and honest as I absolutely can. Because that's the only way that anyone's ever gonna trust me again is if tell them straight out what I did, and what's gone wrong and what I have done and what will continue to do to change that and pay for the crime that I committed. I just wanna move back into my home.

- Okay, thank you very much. Anything else?
- [Alicia] Can I speak?
- Is that?
- Just need a name and address.
- Your name and address please?
- I'm Alicia Loehlein. I'm 1154 Lawe Street and I--
- Can you spell, you need to come up.
- Loehlein, L-O-E-H-L-E-I-N.
- Yeah, could you spell that one more time for me?

- L-O-E-H-L-E-I-N. Sorry, I'm nervous.

- That's okay. And you have three minutes.

- I live right next door. I have six children. Four of 'em are girls. He said that it was girl porn. I don't know that. He also said we've never gotten to know him. I've lived next to you for at least six years. You've never tried to get to know me. And when you did, you were never very nice to me. You might talk to my husband about sports and stuff. That was it, Ted.

- You were very--

- Please, okay, excuse me. Excuse me, excuse me!

- She's been very off--

- Sir, shh.

- I'm just telling him--

- Ma'am, stop.

- I'm sorry, I'm sorry.

- No, I'm talking to you guys.

- No, I understand but let's direct all, and please no cross-talk.

- I'm good.

- Thank you.

- I'm good.

- I'm just explaining, some of the things he said don't add up. There's different things now where people do other things, like put cameras in people's bathrooms. Things go through my head like that. Not saying that he's done that, but who freakin' knows. I don't know what he's capable of. We've had Time Warner Cable come to our house and put two or three locks on it because we were getting weird, random porn charges. Isn't that ironic? That's just so weird. He lives right next door. He says he's not tech savvy, they were pulling out computer after computer when the SWAT team came to check out the house. I mean, I don't trust him. I don't trust him. I won't trust him if he moves back. You say that it's fine that he comes over and does whatever he wants. I don't think that's okay. You can't just come over and do whatever you want. And then when you ask him or address him, he blows up. He approached my husband and said something like, "Oh, yeah, sometimes you do stupid things, "but in two years, when I'm off probation, "I'll move back home." And then the people that are renting there, they had no idea who they were renting from. The dad told him that him and his wife are building somewhere outta town or in Swanakoe, maybe even outta state. Nothing was factual. And I get maybe they don't want us to know why, but come on, we're gonna find out. It's not okay. Just even watching his expressions and him getting angry, there's no emotion other than, "I got

caught, oh, well. "I'm gonna tell you what I want to tell you. "I hope you believe me 'cause I want my house back. "I'm gonna do what I wanna do," because he always has. He's always done what he wanted to do, and if he doesn't get his way, he has a hissy fit. The only time I've ever had experiences with him is when he got in my face to yell at me about something; when he didn't like my dog, he didn't like something. It was like, in the beginning, when I first moved in, there were notes on my fence. I never felt like he was, it was always about him. And I don't trust him, and I am not gonna be happy. Like I said, I have six kids. Four daughters. Whether he's watching girls or boys, I have six kids. Boys, girls, whatever. I am not okay with this.

- Thank you, ma'am. Thank you. Any questions?

- Real quick, the things about, she mentioned the dog and stuff, that is from our next door neighbor Denise.

- [Tom] Thanks, Alicia.

- Okay, okay--

- I know, but I'm--

- We're only here for--

- There's so many things that are just being said and thrown out that are just factually inaccurate and so .

- Do you have anything else, though, to add with regard to your appeal?

- No.

- Okay.

- No, I just... Thank you.

- Okay. Does anybody have a motion they want to--

- I just have a question.

- Sure.

- Are you gonna feel comfortable living there, knowing all around you, they're not friendly to you, they don't like you? How is that gonna make you feel? How do you handle that?

- I'll live my life by working. If they don't wanna talk to me and stuff, I can't force them to. Alicia and I, for whatever reason, no, I got along with her husband Bob, but I never got a... She didn't like me from the beginning. I'm a little upset because the only person I know is Alicia. Everyone else who's coming in and assailing me, who I've never met before. But I will be as good a neighbor as I possibly can. I keep to myself. I don't hassle my neighbors. Getting my house back in order, like I said, I had problems with renters, kinda destroyed it. But I just wanna be a good neighbor again. I wanna live in

my house. In time, I'm sure, as people get to know me, they'll find out that I'm not the Boogeyman. I had problems at the time. And, as I said, I'm paying that price. But I also would like to return to my home, and they're never gonna have a problem. Not with me.

- Okay.

- Already have.

- Excuse me.

- [Tom] There's already been problems.

- Excuse me, sir, you're not helping. Please.

- I'm sorry.

- Thank you.

- As I said, these problems are from not getting to know me.

- Sir, can we just--

- Okay, yep, yep, I get ya.

- Do you have any motions to entertain?

- I am gonna make a motion. But before I say it, I'm just gonna verify that... No, I'm not going to. I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Blazek to visit 1162 Lawe Street.

- Address specific?

- Yes.

- And any time parameters?

- No.

- Okay. Any second?

- Well, I'm throwing a monkey wrench into the works. I can't second, I can't vote on this. I have grandchildren very, very close to that address, as well, and I don't believe I can vote on this fairly.

- M'kay.

- Can we vote then?

- Nope, we don't have quorum.

- Oh, okay.
- We'd have to hold it over to next month.
- Okay. So, Mr. Blazek, what's going on is this. You only have the three of us right now. Mr. Dorff is abstaining.
- [Ted] Yes, I understand.
- And so, what we'll have to do is put this matter over until next month, continue this hearing for a vote.
- Okay.
- Okay?
- We have three members of the Board who are not here today for various reasons.
- Sure, I understand.
- We'll have a different--
- Jesus Christ. You fuckin' people are baffling.
- Sir.
- What a waste of time.
- [Ted] At that time, would I be able to bring in some other people to speak for me?
- Sure.
- Okay, thank you.
- You can bring in other people in to speak.
- Thank you.
- Yes?
- Yeah.
- Yes.
- I mean, it'd just be added to the agenda.
- Okay.

- But for the time being--
- And I respect--
- Can you wait?
- I understand the situation you're in.
- For the time being, there is no approval.
- I gotcha.
- Right.
- Yeah.
- Okay.
- Okay, so you need to--
- But, legally, I can go to my home and work on it and things of that nature. I just can't reside there.
- Correct.
- M'kay.
- Okay, thank you.
- So Renee's motion fails for lack of a second, and is there a motion to?
- Deny?
- Yeah, I mean, deny for--
- Yeah, motion to deny. Do you need him to resubmit?
- We wouldn't have a forum for that motion to deny.
- Right, it just has to be.
- Continued until the next period.
- It just has to be continued or tabled for now, yeah.
- Well, tabled until the next time.
- Yeah, I respect that. So that would be the second Wednesday again?

- Well, you'll get paperwork in the mail.
- Oh, okay, okay.
- Do you want it sent to the De Pere address?
- Yes, yeah, 'cause I'll still.
- We can't vote on anything that we don't have on forum.
- Oh.
- Do you just wanna table it?
- We can't just ?
- All right, so there's no motion, there is no vote. We'll have to revisit next month.
- Okay, thank you sir.
- Thank you.
- Oh, here you go, yeah.
- Oh, okay, you want me to take everything?
- Yes, hold onto that.
- Actually, if you want me to take those, then I can add them to the packet for next--
- Oh, sure.
- I just need them .
- And then the one letter from Janice.
- Sure, and the letter from Janice?
- Yeah, I've got one piece. Oh, yeah--
- Can you pass me that?
- Okay, you just need one?
- Yeah.
- Okay, next on the current calendar is Wallace Walker.

- Thank you for your time.
- Thank you.
- Mr. Walker, if you could have a seat please. And when you discuss the underlying offense, if you could please make sure not to mention your relationship to the victim or identify the victim based on your relationship, or the victim's name.
- Right.
- Okay. So can you tell us about the underlying offense?
- [Wallace] Repeated sexual assault of a child.
- Okay.
- Is that your only offense?
- [Wallace] I've had one. Yeah, pretty much. I had one 17 years before that.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- [Wallace] I can't remember how long ago. It's gotta be about 15 years before that. Something like that.
- Okay, and can you tell us some facts about the underlying offense?
- [Wallace] I put myself and the victim in the position that should never have happened. It never should've happened.
- And what incident are you speaking of? Which one?
- [Wallace] Well, this is the one I was convicted of, this last one right here.
- Okay.
- [Wallace] Well, I could say the same for both of these instances.
- Can you go into the facts? You're saying you put yourself into a situation. What exactly happened?
- [Wallace] Well, I was laid off. I was hurt, I actually got hurt from work, and I was spending a lotta time at home and I just never was able to connect with the victim. I couldn't establish my boundaries. I didn't know how to handle her. And things just got outta hand and I just did completely the wrong thing in that situation. She reported that to her mother, and then that escalated from there. I moved out and I went right away, I just sought therapy, and I got that here if you want, but I don't have copies of these things.

- That's okay, if you wait on the treatment. You have the right to have a closed hearing when we're discussing your treatment. If you wish to do so in open public, you can. If you wanna have it in closed session, you can. You just have to let us know. But before we get into that, do you have any questions about either incident? If I may, how old was the victim?

- [Wallace] She was I believe 10.

- M'kay, and was this one incident or--

- [Wallace] I think they were both the same age.

- Okay, and two different victims?

- [Wallace] Two different ones, yeah.

- And with regard to the most recent case, was that one incident or more than one incident?

- [Wallace] That was two or three, two or three times.

- Okay.

- The paperwork that you filled out, and I just lost it here, the appeal form, you cited the 1994 and '95 situation, but you did not, the most recent one was 2008. That was a repeated sexual offense? A repeated sexual assault?

- [Wallace] Right, yes.

- Okay, and talk about that one a little bit more. The victim was, you said 10 or 11?

- [Wallace] Yeah, 10 or 11.

- Related to you?

- [Wallace] No, no relation to me. I was dating her mother. Her and I have a son together, but he wasn't born at the time.

- What exactly happened?

- [Wallace] Well, I spent a lotta time on the computer when I was off. When I'm not workin', I'm on the computer, I'm usually gambling or playing games, all right? Well, the mother would go to work, and she would come down and want to associate with me. I didn't know how to associate with her and all that. And I didn't wanna be bothered, but she persisted and the next thing you know, she's sitting on my lap. She just would not leave me alone. But did I handle it wrong? Definitely handled this wrong and things got outta hand. I went the wrong way with that. I felt terrible after that, but I couldn't stop it. The next time, it seemed to work. I seemed to control her a bit so that I wouldn't have to... She always wanted to do stuff. I don't play. I don't play with dolls.

- Well, you wouldn't have gotten in trouble for her sitting on your lap.

- [Wallace] Well, right. Well, that's just it. Her hands started roaming, and I don't know if it was just inquisitive woman or a girl, how do you handle that? I didn't know how to handle that. Then it just escalated from there, but it never got to the point where I was sexually aroused, it never got to that point. But it seemed to keep her, I don't know how to explain it. Keep her busy? Keep her from annoying me so much.

- What did? I'm missing the connection. You're saying something happened, and it kept her from bothering you. But what happened?

- [Wallace] Well she put her hands on my groin. And it was like she was learning something, it was like she was, I don't think she knew what she was doing, but she was probably that's never happened to her before either. And I just kind of let it happen. It kept her busy, it kept her mind on that, just leave me alone.

- Now with these incidents, you said two to three times, did it happen all on one day?

- [Wallace] No, no.

- Over what, what's the time period?

- [Wallace] No, 'cause she would get too, it got to the point where she was like you got to go--

- Who? Who's--

- [Wallace] And I would send her upstairs.

- Okay and it bothered you that she did that?

- [Wallace] It did. And I should've said something to the mother, but I never did.

- Why not?

- [Wallace] 'Cause I was, right then I thought that was it. I think I screwed up so bad, I can't say something.

- But then it happened again.

- [Wallace] But then it happened again.

- And then again.

- [Wallace] And then again.

- Okay, is this what you have in your records?

- Yeah. It's more graphic than that, I don't know what you want to maybe get into the graphic nature of it, but.

- If you explain any, what we have Mr., I'm sorry, Mr. Walker, is that sounds as though there's just merely touching by the victim on Mr. Walker's clothing over clothing on top of his groin area. Is that accurate?

- So what I have is that he showed his penis to the victim. This occurred numerous times over a two month period. Also grabbed the victim's hands and forced her to touch his penis.

- Okay.

- [Wallace] That would've been the second time. She wanted me to play in her room together, and I just sat on the bed in order to keep her from, I don't know how to explain it, to keep her mind busy, that's when I put her hand on my crotch.

- Okay.

- [Wallace] But it only lasted maybe few minutes and then she were done.

- With regard to this incident, do you know how the police became informed of what happened?

- [Wallace] I think she, her mother was informed by her. Then she must've called somebody, I'm not sure who. I don't know if she called the police or...

- Any questions about this incident?

- No.

- No questions.

- What about the incident from 1994? That occurred in Darth County?

- [Wallace] Door County, yes. And that one was, I was actually really pissed 'cause he left me sitting at home.

- Who is he?

- My friend.

- Okay.

- [Wallace] The victim's father. And he went out and left me sitting there, and I was like what I'm babysitting? I'm babysitting now? So they were already in bed, and I was just watching a porn, and then I was getting drunk. And then she was spying on me, watching me. She must've woke up and come and look into the room. And I was masturbating, and I actually saw her. So back then, I don't know if I was angry at him, and I just let that happen. Well fine, I'm just gonna let you watch. I don't know if that's, but that's what happened.

- Is that accurate?

- [Wallace] Yeah.

- So what I have here is that, forced a nine year old female acquaintance onto a bed he was lying on. Making her watch a pornographic movie.

- [Wallace] Yeah I was watching it. So she came to sat down, I didn't really make her sit there, but she just came and sat down after a while.

- Okay let's just hear what else he has to say first.

- Then he placed a pump on his penis in front of the victim, causing it to enlarge, continued to rub his penis until he ejaculated in front of the victim. Afterwards he told her not to tell anyone.

- [Wallace] Right, pretty much.

- Okay. Any other questions about the second incident? Okay. And with regard to your application, you wrote that you have your support system of your niece?

- Well she sort of, she's the closest relative to me. That's just why I used her. She's been helping me find or locate places. She didn't help me find this one, but she's pretty busy all the time. She's got a kid of her own. I used her because she was close to me, I used to live with them when she was first born. They see me as a father figure because her parents are dead. And then Rosalie, she's the next closest to me. She's my cousin. I don't know if, I probably should've used her, 'cause I spend a lot of time with her.

- Okay. Any questions about support system?

- [Wallace] And my family's close, they're not that far away from me. I got a lot of cousins.

- But you didn't list them. Are any of them here by chance? Okay.

- You have the VA listed, are you a veteran?

- [Wallace] I'm a veteran, yes I'm working with them. They're trying to help me because my kidneys are failing, they're trying to figure out if-- Because of Camp Lejeune or the . But they're trying to figure out what's wrong I mean, there's lots of things wrong. Trying to get a disability claim going. They're helping me with this place. They're helping me with a lot of different things. I think they can help me with this but I know I'm gonna be getting the, and this might be going off topic but my PO has got me signed up for sex offender treatment. I know when I went through the course the first time they had you do anger management, right. I was like what's that got, 'cause they knew I was pissed off because he left me there in the first place. Did they do that because I was angry at him? I don't know, we never figured that out. The anger management, I learned how to control my anger, right. And I did it, I finished it. The courts are saying I didn't, but I did. And I don't know how they don't have the records of that, but that's so long ago.

- When did you, did you complete the anger management prior to your second case?

- [Wallace] Did I finish it?

- Before your second case.
- [Wallace] Before, yeah, 15 years before.
- Okay.
- [Wallace] And I don't even think that place is there anymore. I tried to stop see if I could get records from it, but there's nothing there. And then I have this, which I have--
- Can you just wait one second? We'll get here, we'll get through everything okay. Any other questions about that, support? And you now work at Bay Industries? How long have you been there?
- [Wallace] Bay Fabrication, yeah Bay Industries.
- How long have you worked there?
- [Wallace] I just been there for two weeks, going on three weeks.
- Okay, and when were you released?
- [Wallace] August 20th. Or 18th.
- Is it full-time, or part-time?
- [Wallace] It's full-time right now, in fact, I don't know how long I can stay there. I'm gonna stay there until I find something else, but because of my back I'm having a hard time standing for that long doing what they got me doing. So I'm working with the VA, they're gonna find me a job where I'm not standing on my feet so long. Hopefully they're gonna work something. But that's all I do is sleep and work, it's always been that way. I did a lot of boilermaking, I was always traveling so not used to being home.
- Any other questions regarding work?
- Not work.
- Okay and let's see, now with regard to your treatment, do you want to speak to that?
- [Wallace] Well treatment, I knew I did wrong. I knew from the moment--
- Okay I need you to say yes or no, is it okay to speak about your treatment in front of in public, or do you want closed session?
- [Wallace] I guess we can have, it doesn't matter.
- We need?
- Yes.

- Yes, okay. In public's fine.

- [Wallace] Yeah.

- Okay, okay what about your treatment?

- [Wallace] It's been a long time, it's been 15, 15 or 17 years since I had this treatment. It was for the first case.

- Right. Did you have any--

- [Wallace] I take that back, no it wasn't. No it wasn't, I didn't have nothing that, I only had anger management. That's right, this was the second one. So as soon as I committed it, as soon as I moved out, I knew I had to go, I had to get therapy. So I went and did it right away.

- Now with regard to--

- [Wallace] You probably know him, Dr. Willins Center, Gerald Mullins says he used to be on this Board.

- Okay. Let me ask you this please. With regard to your treatment as a sex offender, did you complete any sex offended treatment while in prison?

- [Wallace] I did not, they would not let me. I was appealing the case, I'm appealing my case so as soon as you tell them you're appealing your case they don't let you in anymore. They won't let you do it.

- Okay.

- [Wallace] And when my first PO which was just credit due, but my other PO I have yet to put it in. And I'm still working on it because they, it's hard legal stuff that's just impossible. I got it to a point where I think I can put it in, but I'm too scared to because I don't want to make a mistake. If you make a mistake, you lose out on things, you can't just bring it up later. And I think I got everything I need. The problem that's not, the appeal and my need, right, to address my problem is two different things, all right. So I'm not appealing saying, I'm not saying I didn't do this, I'm saying the process was bad. And what they did should never have happened.

- Okay.

- [Wallace] And what they did is against the law in fact.

- Sir we're here to discuss the ordinance, not your appeal.

- [Wallace] I'm just saying, I understand, I'm just directing that to my need for therapy.

- Okay, so you're not undergoing any, did you start sex offender treatment yet?

- [Wallace] No I haven't.

- Okay.
- [Wallace] She said she's got me signed up for it.
- Who is she?
- [Wallace] My probation officer.
- Okay. And with regard to, let's see, I don't have anything else. Do you have any other questions?
- I do not.
- Any other questions? Okay. Would anybody like to entertain a motion?
- Was there a speaker?
- Oh, no speakers, are there any speakers?
- Yeah someone was listed as a speaker.
- Oh I'm sorry, I missed that. Mrs. Rosalie would you like to come up?
- [Rosalie] Thank you.
- And if you could spell your last name please?
- [Rosalie] Soucek, it's S as in Sam, O-U-C-E-K.
- And your address?
- [Rosalie] 1748 Elford Drive, Apartment 1F Luxemburg, Wisconsin, 54217.
- And you have three minutes.
- [Rosalie] Okay, I'm not exactly sure where to start. When I listen to him talk about his offenses, I would like to pipe in all the time, you know, from back there. I'm sure I shouldn't do that, but first of all on the first offense, which was ridiculous, the only reason that was blown up and out of proportion, was because the person, his friend, that left him there babysitting was in a custodial battle with his wife at the time.
- Okay ma'am, we're not litigating this, we're not litigating this. What we're focusing on is the ordinance. And Mr. Walker wants to live in an area in which he's prohibited from living, that's why he has this appeal. What do you know about his treatment, or about his character or anything like that?
- [Rosalie] Okay. Well I've known him all his life. And he was right when he said we have tons of first cousins. And we're all quite strung together, we pretty much all back him up. Except he's having a little problem with his brother, but he's made his mistakes, we've forgiven him. I will tell you that he's lived with me several times, and during that time, because I am a great grandmother, I have kids in my

pool at all times when I lived in Oklahoma and there were boys but mostly girls and I've gone to every one of these kids, and said has Wally ever approached you on anything. Besides the fact he's got tons of nieces and nephews. And every one of them said absolutely not. He does get childish. He's like a little kid when he's with them. He almost brings them to his, he goes to their level and runs around and stuff. But he's always been good, he's paid me for living with me. And he helps around the house, 'cause I say I'm not doing all this alone. So it's a team effort, cleaning the house and everything. And I'm kind of picky. So it's like, and I don't mind running around and doing things for him, but I'm doing it more for his mother. His mother that was raised like sisters. And she loves him greatly but she's already 80-years-old. So I guess I even look older than she does. He's technically, he's a good kid. And like I said, he's only three years older than my own son. And as a rule, this stuff shouldn't have happened.

- Well, right, it is...

- [Rosalie] It's my time. So like I said, he's a good kid. And he's almost too friendly sometimes. He'll go out of his way to help you, doesn't always, he likes to talk a lot, but yet he doesn't really have the gift of gab 'cause he doesn't say the right things sometimes. Says crazy, dumb things.

- Alright, thank you.

- [Rosalie] Sure.

- Any questions?

- No.

- No.

- Anybody else speaking on behalf of Mr. Walker? No, okay. Would anybody like to entertain a motion? Or have any questions?

- I'm gonna move against.

- [Rosalie] On behalf of him against?

- Oh no, I said speaking for him.

- [Rosalie] You didn't want to speak, okay.

- [Wallace] Sorry.

- That's okay, no thank you for correcting me.

- I'm gonna make a motion to deny Mr. Walker to 2241 Imperial Lane, address specific.

- And I'll second.

- And this is a motion to deny, so yes it's been denied.

- I kept looking.
- Yeah, got it.
- Oh, I don't, I didn't, nothing came up.
- Oh!
- Okay.
- Yes.
- Alright, motion passes unanimously.
- [Wallace] Can I ask why?
- You can share why, you don't have to.
- Okay. I made the motion because you've not had any sexual treatment of any kind.
- [Wallace] But I have.
- You had anger management.
- [Wallace] No, this is not that. This is my sex offender treatment that the doctor gave me. It's pretty extensive, it says it right here.
- Well you never showed us that, when we were talking and you just talking about it.
- [Wallace] I kept asking to give it to you.
- Well okay, but anyway, I'm not sure you're rehabilitated to live in Green Bay. Is my thought, that's my feelings.
- My concern is in listening to you talk, there's a lot of victim-blaming, and these are children. And that's a red flag for me. And living in an area within the ordinance where there will be children, it's either around a school or a park, that's very concerning to me. So that's why I chose to deny your request. However, if you can maybe after a certain amount of time, if you--
- You can try for another address too, you can come back with a different place.
- [Wallace] Okay, thanks.
- Next on the calendar is Chong Vue. Hi Mr. Vue, it appears that--
- Morning.
- Oh it just popped up for me.

- Oh really?

- It appears we're back here to provide, let's see. You're going to bring documentation on your progress in sex offender treatment. Is that correct?

- Yes.

- Okay. And what do you have here? Okay a letter from Henger, H-E-N-G-E-R, Enterprises Limited dated yesterday's date, October 8th. Are you going to continue with this?

- [Chong] Yes, yes.

- Do you have any idea when you're going to stop or is that up to--

- [Chong] It's up to him, so.

- Oh it's up to, okay. Up to the therapist.

- [Chong] Yeah. Well it's not a, the provider.

- The provider, okay. How are you, do you like the treatment? Are you getting anything out of it?

- [Chong] Yes.

- Okay. Any questions or comments for Mr. Vue?

- And you still continue to go weekly?

- [Chong] Yes.

- So this is just a follow-up?

- Right.

- Yes.

- Okay.

- And the address at issue is 3191 Windland Drive. Appearing there are no additional questions, does anybody have a motion?

- Is there anyone who wanted to speak?

- Oh, was there someone? Was there anybody here to speak?

- [Veronica] I'm the one in that district, there was initial concern when this first came up months ago. I haven't had anyone follow up since.

- And could you say your name for the record?
- [Veronica] Veronica Corpus-Dax, sorry.
- That's okay, can you spell, I'm sorry.
- [Veronica] Veronica, V-E-R-O-N-I-C-A. Corpus-Dax C-O-R-P-U-S D-A-X.
- Got it, thank you so much.
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Vue to move to 3191 Windland Drive address specific.
- I'll second.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Thank you for coming.
- Okay so Mr. Vue you are free to move there, or stay there rather. Is there any other documentation he's going to get or?
- I'll just need an ,
- Okay, okay.
- [Chong] In the mail?
- Yes, mailed to your address at 3191.
- Thank you.
- Good luck.
- Have a nice day.
- You too. Let's see, okay, and next is Albert Ruleford. Okay Mr. Ruledford it appears as though we're back. You were last here on August 14th of this year, and today you're supposed to bring in documentation of attendance in treatment and with a number of treatment sessions and your documentation's supposed to address how you're doing. Do you have that for us?
- I do.
- Thank you.
- [Albert] It's through the same agency as Chong.
- Okay. This is a letter dated yesterday October 8th from Pablo Cerna, MS. And so are you getting anything out of the sessions?

- [Albert] Oh yeah I go to a group session, it seems like when you get feedback from other people it seems like, giving you a different perspective. Like when you're, I don't know how to explain this great, but when you look at your own life and then you have somebody give you feedback on it, it does help out a lot to be able to figure out different reasons that certain things happened, because you can only see one perspective. Somebody looking in, it does help a lot. So I've been learning quite a bit about myself, and about what I did, why I did what I did.

- Okay. Any other comments or questions? Okay, anybody here to speak on behalf of Mr. Ruleford? Hearing nothing, does anybody wish to entertain a motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Ruleford to 1240 Harvey Street address specific.

- And I second it.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay Mr. Ruleford you may stay at your address, and I'll get something in the mail from the law office. And that'll address that this has been approved.

- Okay, thank you.

- Thank you. Okay next on the calendar is Baylan Lewis. Baylan Lewis? Nobody is answering up. I will make a motion to deny.

- I second.

- Motion to deny passes unanimously.

- Okay. Next is Christopher Butler. Hi Mr. Butler.

- [Chris] Hi.

- Let's see here. You are here.

- [Chris] Just needed to write--

- Oh a landlord, okay.

- [Christopher] And then you want some check stubs or--

- Okay, let me get that. Yes, last time you were here was on September 11th of this year. And as you stated, let's see what you have here. Thank you.

- [Christopher] That's just where I worked the last month, show I've been paid.

- Okay. And I'm holding...

- [Christopher] I don't know why it was--

- That's okay.
- [Christopher] Before when.
- You have multiple copies and you have two--
- [Christopher] There should be three, but.
- Let's see. So there's a pay period ending September 1st, one ending in September 15. And a pay period for August, ending August 18th of this year.
- [Christopher] I coulda got a lot more, I didn't know you needed it.
- I think that should be sufficient. And do you have your landlord letter?
- Yeah, it's in the packet.
- Oh, it's in the, okay I missed that.
- And I called to confirm that he was aware.
- Oh, yes, I did see that.
- Thank you.
- 'Cause it should say in the letter--
- Yeah.
- Thank you.
- Any questions for Mr. Butler? No? Anybody here to speak on your behalf?
- [Christopher] No.
- Okay. Does anyone wish to entertain a motion?
- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Butler to 1125 South Chestnut address specific.
- Second.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- And so you've been approved to stay there, and you'll get a letter from the law office that will say the same thing.
- [Christoper] Okay.

- Do you want me to send it to the Chestnut address?

- [Christopher] Sure, that'll be fine.

- Thank you.

- [Christopher] Yep, thank you.

- Let's see, and then Adam Poquette. Good afternoon.

- [Adam] Good afternoon.

- And you are here, last time you were here was on November, quite a while, yeah. November... Okay. And let's see, why are you requesting to move?

- [Adam] Unfortunately, about almost exactly a year ago I lost the last place that was approved. The landlord initially told me that she was gonna sell the house, so I ended up having to move out and then turns out that she didn't sell the house. So I've been homeless the last year. I moved out literally November 1st. I've been homeless since, just going back and forth from approval from my probation officer between two residents making sure that not staying more than the nine days. And then going back and forth. It's been really troubling this past year, dealing with that, trying to find somewhere to go as I do have two children of my own. And then my girlfriend who is also here with me, she's got two kids as well. So just kinda trying to bring the family together. But last time I was here I was in a different relationship, and that's kind of where all the trouble had started with this past year. Struggling, I've just been trying to stay working, and keep busy. My vehicle went to crap twice in the past year, I've got two different vehicles I finally have a nice, reliable vehicle for the family. I'm just trying to get back on my feet, I haven't had any major issues since I been out, especially pertaining to my case, I did have a hit and run misdemeanor, but I owned up to that, I went to court. I got sentenced to another year probation.

- Is that consecutive to or concurrent?

- [Adam] It's concurrent. They're in a concurrent to what probation I do have left. I just recently got a job, I started again in August. I was unemployed for about three or four months, but I did just recently get a job at a call center called Ball City Communications. I'm a phone operator, I take calls for 800 different companies and businesses. That's all I've really been doing is just trying to focus on getting everything back together. Because when I was first originally released from prison, I didn't go through the struggles that a lot of inmates hear about while being in oh your PO's connected to this, Or you're not gonna find a house, you're not gonna find a job. I didn't face that until recently, you know. So it's been a struggle, but I'm doing what I can to get myself back on the right track.

- And how are you handling the struggles, do you talk to someone?

- [Adam] My girlfriend helps me a lot, I do have a large support system in family and friends and coworkers. And another big support is my probation officer Any time, any time I need to talk she's always available too.

- Okay, and the address you wish to move to is 1809 Shawano Avenue Apartment 10 in Green Bay?

- [Adam] Yes.
- Okay. With your girlfriend?
- [Adam] Yes, that would be with her and her two children.
- Okay, just her two children not all of them?
- [Adam] Yeah, not my two. I get mine part-time.
- Okay.
- [Adam] So they come to visit, stay the night or whatnot. But just residing in the house full-time would be us two and the children. And I do have permission and stuff to my probation to be around her children. I went through the right chains, I'm not trying to go back to prison for anything, it's not...
- And how long have you been working at this new job?
- [Adam] I got the job in August, like mid-August I believe. Before that I was with American Foods for about a year.
- And any particular reason you changed employers?
- [Adam] I was just having difficulties with other employees. Decided it wasn't for me anymore. I enjoyed the work, I just didn't enjoy the people I guess. But before that I was an assistant manager for the Dino Stop Show for two years. I got that job two weeks after my release from prison.
- How much time do you have left on probation?
- [Adam] This month will be seven and a half years.
- And when was that, I'm looking for the hit-and-run?
- [Adam] Yes.
- When was that?
- [Adam] It was--
- Oh last year?
- [Ed] It says 2018.
- 2018 here in Brown County?

- [Adam] Yeah, but I was just recently, a few months ago, was sentenced for it.
- Okay.
- [Adam] I backed up into somebody and didn't realize it. They had cameras. I did it, they had me on camera. I didn't realize I did it though, my trailer hitch is what hit into the vehicle.
- So it was hit-and-run of a vehicle, no--
- [Adam] It was a manned vehicle, there was a person in there.
- Okay, now with regard to your treatment, you can discuss that in close session or in public. What would you like to do?
- [Adam] In public.
- Are you undergoing any additional treatment?
- [Adam] I am not. The last time I went was here, I brought a letter, I did bring it when I turned in my paperwork as well, I was trying to get a letter of completion from the facilitator. She's no longer in Green Bay though, so I was waiting to hear back from her. They told me they would contact her, but I haven't heard anything. But the last time I was here I did only have five sessions left, so I have completed that.
- Okay.
- [Adam] And honestly I learned a lot from it, a lot about who I am as a person. A lot about stressors and triggers, and how to cope with them. And at first I was in denial, I'm not gonna lie, I was in denial about forcing my victim to do what had happened, but I realize from being in group that it wasn't so much a physical force, I forced her by making her believe that it was okay.
- Okay. Any questions?
- None from me.
- Is anybody here to speak on your behalf?
- [Elizabeth] Yes, I am.
- And if you could state and spell your last name.
- [Elizabeth] Elizabeth Burbe, B-U-R-B-E-Y. And this letter was originally because I wasn't able to make it initially, but then I found somebody to sit with my children so I could come and support him in person. I'm kind of anxious, I don't like speaking.
- Okay.

- [Elizabeth] So my name's Elizabeth and I'm Adam's girlfriend of almost two years. This year has been hard on him but he always manages to beat the odds, even when it seems like the world is against him. Adam's kind, funny, caring, and so smart, smarter than he gives himself credit for. He helps everyone and never expects anything in return. Adam has become an amazing man and father since being released three and a half years ago. He has proven not only to himself, but to so many people that doubted him that he can change. Adam has so many people that want nothing but the best for him. He has a good job with supportive coworkers and supervisors. He has a safe vehicle for himself and his children. Getting approved for this home is the last step in creating better lives for ourselves and our children.

- Thank you. Any questions for Ms. Burbe? Thank you. Okay, would someone like to entertain a motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Poquette to 1809 Shawano Avenue Apartment 10 address specific.

- I second.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- Good luck. Would you like the letter sent to--

- The new address or?

- We actually--

- To the Baird---

- To the Baird, okay.

- [Elizabeth] I thought you wanted to bring it to Rusty right away? 'Cause he wanted to see us.

- I can email him, I have his email address.

- [Elizabeth] Okay, yeah.

- Let him know that it was approved.

- Okay.

- Okay. Thank you.

- You're welcome.

- Thank you, good luck.

- Thank you.

- Thank you.
- There are no other matters on the calendar, is there a motion to adjourn?
- So moved.
- Second.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- You did very well, good job.
- Thanks!
