VERBATIM MINUTES

- All right, okay. All right, I'm going to bring to order the meeting of the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board here for November 13th, 2019. Just a quick roll call of everybody, just sound out your name, please. Dean Gerondale.

- Renee Keehan.

- Ed Dorff.

- Melissa Cheslock.

- Okay. Next thing on our agenda is approval of the agenda, agenda for November 13th. Is there any changes anybody has, or can we vote to accept that agenda?

- So moved.

- Second.

- Do we need to vote on it?

- [Rachel] It's coming up.

- Okay.

- And I'll just say yes.

- [Rachel] There you go. Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, next up is approval of the October 9th minutes. Do I have a motion?

- Move to accept.

- Second.

- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, before we get into our regular business, I'd just like to let the audience know that we're here to hear over 13 appeals today. I ask that you allow the agenda to go through without emotion or unless you're called on for comment. If we have any issues, you will be asked to leave. So if you do wanna ask or make your point, a question, you need to fill out a slip of paper, and bring it over here, and then you will get time on the agenda to state your case either for or against any of the sexual offenders. So does everybody understand those rules? Okay, great. We're gonna go hear our first appeal of George Santos. All right, Mr. Santos. We've seen you several times. The big thing is we were looking to get you into a sex offender course, so where are we at with that?

- [Interpreter] I went to see my agent, and he find me a place, so I went to fill out some paperwork. I asked for him to give me some copies so I can have with me, and he say don't worry about that, I'm gonna say no paperwork.

- With the?

- [Interpreter] To do the course.

- From the course.
- But the P.O. is with Santos?
- [Deanna] It's in his packet. There's an email from his P.O.
- Is that the referral?
- Is it the referral?
- [Deanna] Mm hm.
- But it was received in July?
- [Deanna] No, there's another one.
- There's another one? Okay.
- Yeah, there's an email from George in his.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- So has he started the course yet?
- [Interpreter] Not yet.
- When is it supposed to start?
- [Interpreter] I don't know.
- [Deanna] I spoke with his P.O. this morning, and he told me that he has been enrolled, and they're hoping that the class will start some time in the next month. And he said he's been very cooperative in that he knows he needs to go to it.
- Okay. Does anybody have any questions relating to his acceptance in the class?
- Do we know how long it is?
- [Deanna] He didn't tell me how long it's going to be. He said he did have him in an English speaking one, but Mr. Santos wasn't getting anything out of it because of the language barrier, so that's, and it took a while to get him into the Spanish one. He's gonna be in it as soon as it starts up.
- Okay, I'm gonna make a motion to allow Mr. Santos to stay at his current address for a period of 90 days in which time he would come back and tell us how he's doing in that course. So stay at 1713 Amy Street.
- I'll second that.
- If I append the amendment to your motion, ask that he provide proof of attendance as well.

- Yeah, absolutely. Is there acceptance of that addition to the motion?
- Yes.
- Okay, all in favor of the motion?
- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, Mr. Santos. You're accepted for additional 90 days at your current location, at which time when you come back, you have to bring documentation as to how many classes you have attended, and we're gonna ask you questions on what you've learned.
- Okay.
- Very well.
- All right, thank you very much.
- [Interpreter] Thank you.
- Next up is Mr. Isaiah Woods. Okay, Mr. Woods, we're here to hear your appeal to move to 891 Shawano Avenue, is that correct?
- [Isaiah] Correct.
- All right. When we go through your appeal, I'd ask you that, when we talk about your victim that you just refer to that person as your victim.
- Okay.
- Okay. And then also, if we want to talk about any of your treatment programs, you have the right to do that either in public session or in private session. Which would you prefer?
- [Isaiah] Private.
- Private, okay. All right.
- [Isaiah] Sir?
- Yeah, go ahead.
- [Isaiah] I'm still incarcerated in Huber.
- Okay.
- [Isaiah] And there's a piece of paper that has to be signed by you guys so that they know for sure I came here, and stuff.
- Absolutely, I'll take care of that.

- [Isaiah] Okay.
- All right. I'd like you to tell us what happened with your victim, and why you were convicted of your crime.
- [Isaiah] Well, me and the victim, we knew each other for a long time. And I guess maybe I didn't do my homework as well as I should have, in seeing what her age was. And we had sex twice, and I did not know anything until her mother said, well, she's only 16 years old. And by that time it was too late.
- And how old were you at the time?
- [Isaiah] 33. Actually 32, sorry.
- And how long were you supposedly dating this girl?
- [Isaiah] A few months, you know like, she was really cool. Like I said I used to know her a long time ago. I used to, me and her mom used to be mutual friends.
- So you knew the mother prior?
- [Isaiah] Yeah.
- Okay. And how old did you think the victim was?
- [Isaiah] I thought she was going on 18.
- Okay.
- [Isaiah] No excuse.
- All right, so Officer, is that how the case reads, that he did not know that the victim was under 16?
- The criminal complaint states that the victim had informed that she was 17 going on 18.
- Okay.
- And eventually he was informed of her real age.
- Okay. So did you have sex with her after you knew her age?
- [Isaiah] No, once I found out, I immediately stopped it, and I said this relationship cannot continue at all. You know this is illegal, it's bad, I'm gonna get into a lot of trouble, and it was already too late.
- Okay, and did you, how did you plead in the case?
- [Isaiah] Guilty.
- Okay. Are there any more questions on the offense?
- Yes, regarding the other offenses, let's see... With regard to the offenses that occurred back in 2002, do you recall those?

- [Isaiah] Yes.
- Can you tell us a little bit about that offense?
- [Isaiah] I was young, you know, pretty rebellious. Me and my friend and his brother had decided to sneak some alcohol from my stepfather. And we had something to drink, and we had ran into a mutual female that we all knew, and we got drunk with her, and one thing kinda led to another. You know, and also, foolish, you know. I realize now it was very wrong. And you know, it's just pretty much the gist of it.
- And how old was the victim?
- [Isaiah] 15.
- 15 at the time?
- [Isaiah] Correct.
- And you were how old?
- [Isaiah] 17.
- What does one thing led to another mean? How exactly did it happen?
- [Isaiah] We were drinking, and we, she lived in an apartment, like in an apartment complex in Howard. And like we were drinking, we were just being young men and being foolish. And we ran into her, and we asked her if she would like to get drunk, and she said yes. And then it led from that to well, would you like to have sex, and would you like to do sexual activities? And she also said yes. And I was totally unaware of her age. But at the same time, it's no excuse. And I realize it was wrong.
- So this was 2002, when was the other one, the further offense.
- There was one in 2003.
- 2003, okay.
- Well the offense occurred in 2002.
- The conviction--
- This is it.
- The conviction was in 2003.
- Okay.
- Yes.
- The other one was 2017, offense date?
- Right.

- [Deanna] Do you have records?
- I don't have any eligible records.
- Okay.
- Okay, any more questions as relating to his offense? Okay. A criminal code here in the second.
- I think you have to go back to the agenda page.
- Go back to the agenda page.
- Isn't it usually on it? No, it's not there.
- No it should be--
- The most recent offense?
- No, no, just doing the private session. Well, I'm gonna--
- [Deanna] I think you need, yeah, it's on the top of it, it's like right there.
- Okay, pursuant to Section 19.85 of the Wisconsin Statute, we have a right to go into private session pursuant to 146.82 of the Wisconsin Statute, so I need a motion to move into private session.
- So moved.
- Is there a second?
- Second.
- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, everyone, except for if there's anyone here that's a direct relative, everyone has to leave the room at this particular point. We are going to go into private session. So again, if you're a relative, you can stay. I know you guys all want to stay in private session the whole rest of the way.
- That would be awesome.
- Folks, we just need you to stay quiet as you settle back in, please. Okay, we had an opportunity to talk to Mr. Moore.
- Woods.
- Woods, sorry, Mr. Woods about his sexual treatment programs, and got an application of where he is currently. I guess you said that you do have a job, what job do you have right now?
- [Isaiah] I work at ProSolutions, full-time, from 6:00 o'clock in the morning to 2:00 in the afternoon. I've been trained in multiple positions there. They're trying to give me a raise. And I've been working there since January, and I just started full-time in June.

- Okay.

- How long have you been living at 891 Shawano? You're there now, right?

- [Isaiah] Yeah, shortly after I was convicted, I was kind of temporarily homeless, because the apartments, I could not get a landlord with a pending charge to want to rent. And then I found out that I was going to have to sit some time in jail. So I just asked my auntie if it would be okay if I stayed there. At least until, like I said, like maybe, I'd say two, or maybe three months at the most to try to just get some money saved up and get my own establishment.

- And a quick question, just for clarification, you're not, are you physically, you're not physically living with her right now?

- [Isaiah] No.

- He's in jail.

- Okay.

- Okay, any other questions relating to his current status? Okay, does anybody want to make a motion to his appeal?

- Motion to deny.

- At the current address?

- Yes.

- And I'll second. All right, we have a motion to deny at the current location, which is 891 Shawano Avenue.

- [Rachel] Just to remind people, a yes vote is to deny. Motion to deny passes three to one.

- Okay, sir, you've been denied to live at 891 Shawano Avenue. Okay, here's what you can do. I think part of the reason why you were denied is your current status with your treatment programs.

- [Isaiah] Okay.

- So I think the best thing to do is to get those assessments completed. You can always re-appeal to this particular location. But obviously, not having any information on where you're at currently is probably a big reason why you were denied today. Okay?

- [Isaiah] Can I ask what you guys would need? Like I can provide anything that's--

- Well, I can tell you in general, but I can't speak for anybody else on the board. I think having your assessment so we know where you're sitting from a sexual offenders tendency and the potential to re-offend. If you've gone into other treatment programs and actually started a program, that would help, so that's what we're kind of looking for.

- [Isaiah] Okay.

- 'Cause we just met you, we don't know a lot about you. So the lack of information, kind of just, for me, personally, is why I denied you.

- [Isaiah] Okay.

- All right?

- That's fair.

- Thank you. All right, oh, we'll need this done for later. All right, there you go. Next up is Mr. Ryan Pulley. Have a seat, Mr. Pulley. Okay, we're here to hear your appeal to move to 324 Quinton Street, is that correct?

- [Ryan] Yes.

- All right. As we go through your particular case, again, we just ask you to refer to the person as the victim, and not apply a personal name, or it was my cousin, or anything like that. Second of all, if we do want to talk about your treatment programs, you have the right to do that in public session or private session. Which would you prefer?

- [Ryan] I'm fine with public.

- Okay, great. All right, so it looks like you were convicted of first degree sexual assault of a five year old victim. Is that correct?

- [Ryan] Correct.

- All right. And you were convicted in February of '18?

- [Ryan] Yes.

- And you served two years, right?

- [Ryan] Yes.

- All right, and you're on 20 years probation.

- [Ryan] Yes.

- Are you currently on an ankle bracelet?

- [Ryan] No.

- All right, so tell us what happened in regards to the victim and what you actually did.

- [Ryan] I went to a family get-together. And my victim was there. And I was playing around with the kids, and when I picked her up and molested her.

- And you what?

- [Ryan] Molested her.

- You brought her some place and molested her?
- [Ryan] No. It was out in the open.
- Okay, so how were you discovered doing this?
- [Ryan] It was not discovered. It came out in a confession in the interrogation by police.
- Okay. What were you being interrogated for?
- [Ryan] Possession of child pornography.
- Okay, all right. And so when this came out in the interrogation did you actually, when the case came to the court, did you plead guilty, or what did you do?
- [Ryan] No contest.
- Okay.
- [Ryan] I believe, that was a plea deal.
- All right. So, Officer, just from the standpoint, is that essentially what happened in terms of the?
- Correct, arrest, yes.
- All right, okay. The first question that comes to my mind is what was going through your mind? Why would you do that to a five year old?
- [Ryan] The only thing that I had thought of at the time was to satisfy a curiosity. That's what I've determined through therapy is that's the best description I could have for why I did it.
- And how old were you when you did it?
- [Ryan] I think it was 28.
- So you were curious. That seems odd for a 28 year old man to be curious in regards to, you said you also had child pornography, correct?
- [Ryan] Yes.
- How often were you looking at child pornography?
- [Ryan] That I'm not sure. It was I think a phase that I went through at some point. I just never got rid of it after the fact.
- Okay, so like how old were you when you started looking at it and when did you stop?
- [Ryan] Let's see, probably around the time I was 26, for starting and stopping. That's my best guess. And was it always child--

- For how long?
- I'm sorry.
- For how long? Beginning at 26?
- [Ryan] Maybe a year, I don't think it was that long.
- Was it always child pornography?
- [Ryan] No.
- So how did it develop to that?
- [Ryan] There were discussion boards, some kind of boards that were talking about it and other things, and that led me to finding torrents that I would download it for them.
- Okay.
- If I may ask, just for clarification. Did the child molestation occur before, during, or after when you were viewing child pornography?
- [Ryan] After.
- Okay, so you were looking at child pornography first, then the molestation.
- [Ryan] Yes.
- What is the time-frame, in between the possession of child pornography and the child molestation?
- [Ryan] A year or two.
- All right.
- So the child pornography was in 2015. It's got multiple instances that were read into the record at that time?
- [Ryan] That was my arrest, yeah.
- Okay. And you said that the offense of the child was when?
- [Ryan] In 2012.
- 2012?
- [Ryan] Mm hm.
- So basically he was caught with child pornography, and then when he was interrogated he admitted to molesting a child at the same time.
- Okay.

- How were you caught with the child pornography? If you say you did child pornography first, then molested the little girl, how did you get caught with the child pornography?

- [Ryan] It was on my computer, and... I'd say a week or two before I was arrested, I turned on my old computer and started up my torrent program and they were on there. So that's how the police downloaded or found the files on my computer.

- Okay. All right, any other questions relating to his crime?

- Just one. Could you remind me again, I'm sorry, you may have mentioned it, the age of the child?

- [Ryan] Five.

- Five, okay, thank you.

- So you had briefly talked about treatment, but yet you listed no treatment on your application. What treatment did you actually receive?

- [Ryan] I'm currently in sex offender therapy.

- With who?

- [Ryan] With, I know his first name is Pablo, but he works for the Henger.

- Okay.

- What agency is that through?

- [Ryan] The Henger?

- Where is that located?

- [Ryan] It's on University.

- Did you bring any paperwork to show that you are in fact enrolled and attending?

- [Ryan] I don't think I have anything from them. I have something from the previous company.

- If we can see that.

- [Ryan] From Attic.

- Attic.

- [Ryan] There's a disclosure.

- What did you, what were you attending through Attic?

- [Ryan] The sex offender therapy, but midway through my therapy they switched contracts, the city switched contracts to another company.

- Okay. So you weren't let go for any?
- [Ryan] No, the contract expired.
- Okay.
- This is just the disclosure of his record, and it doesn't say how long you were involved or at the program.
- [Ryan] I filled this out when I first started Attic.
- How come on your appeal form, under sex offender, you have none, if you have this?
- [Ryan] I've completed none.
- Oh, okay.
- Because of Attic, they changed contracts on everything. So after that contract was canceled, you decided not to go back to any type of treatment program?
- [Ryan] No, I'm currently attending the new company's treatment program.
- Henger.
- Henger.
- Henger, okay. Now how many classes have you been in for that one?
- [Ryan] Since May 28th I believe it was, and it's once a week.
- Okay. So what have you learned?
- [Ryan] It's, I've learned about taking more responsibility for my thoughts, and my feelings, and more reflecting on my past lifestyle, even though I never really thought that my past lifestyle was wrong, it was risky. And I've done a lot to change how I act in interacting with other people since coming out of jail.
- Which other people?
- [Ryan] Coworkers mostly.
- What about adults versus children?
- [Ryan] Well I can't have any contact with children.
- But have you, what have you learned regarding your interactions with children, how to handle that? Have you discussed that at all?
- [Ryan] Well with no contact with children, the only thing that I've really done was avoid contact at any time.
- Have you had any discussions about in the future, at some point in time, how are you supposed to go about, or should not go about, or interactions with children?

- [Ryan] There was no discussion like that.
- Not yet?
- [Ryan] No.
- Okay.
- So are you currently employed, sir?
- [Ryan] Yes.
- Where are you employed?
- [Ryan] American Foods Group.
- Okay. Is that why you want to move to Green Bay versus De Pere?
- [Ryan] The house I'm applying for is the house that I own. I purchased it in 2010. Right now I'm currently renting it out.
- Okay. Are you living with anybody right now?
- [Ryan] I'm living with my brother.
- Okay.
- And will you have anyone living with you in your home?
- [Ryan] No.
- With regard to the question where it asked, how do you feel this sexual crime affected your victim, you stated the victim has no memory of the crime. Okay. But that wasn't really what the question was. It's how do you feel it's affecting the child, or will affect the child?
- [Ryan] Well, again, through therapy I've learned to reflect on that question, actually. And I feel that I know that I did hurt her. Both physically and possibly emotionally. There is, I am concerned that at some point in the future she might remember, or be reminded, and then have some sort of trauma. It's, you know, I think a good thing, that she didn't at the time that she was asked, remember it, because she doesn't need that sort of trauma. But that doesn't negate what I did.
- With regard to your support?
- Go ahead.
- Okay, it says you have your family network, and you have a friend, Yolanda Hernandez. How long have you known her?
- [Ryan] Well, she's my brother's girlfriend. So I think they've been together for 12 years.
- Okay, and she's aware of what happened?

- [Ryan] Yes, she's here to speak if you want.
- Okay.
- Okay, any more questions for him? Do we have anybody to speak in regards to him, that filled out a form, for or against?
- We do.
- Go ahead and call them.
- [Deanna] Yolanda.
- Yolanda Hernandez.
- Yolanda, if you can come up, please.
- You just state your name and address for the record, please.
- [Yolanda] Yolanda Hernandez, 562 South Huron Road, Green Bay.
- Okay, go ahead.
- [Yolanda] Yeah, Ryan is kind of like my unofficial brother-in-law, my little brother. And I've known Ryan and the family for about 14 years, 13, 14 years.
- Okay.
- [Yolanda] And Kevin Pulley is one of his older brothers, and he lives with him, he's been living with him for about three years. And he's not here. Their father passed away recently, he's in Arizona, but he did forward me a statement. I'm not sure if that's something I can send to the board?
- Yeah, you can read it.
- [Yolanda] Okay, and I've got also an email from his stepmother. This is from Kevin Pulley. It says, "I am Ryan's brother, Kevin. "Ryan has been residing with me in De Pere "since shortly after his release from jail. "I am requesting that the board allow Ryan "to move back into the home he lived in prior to his arrest, "located at 324 Quintin Street in Green Bay. "Ryan has Asperger's Syndrome. "However, with the support of his family, "Ryan has responded exceptionally well "to the professional therapy "he has received over the past year. "He now understands the gravity of his actions "and the negative and lasting effect "it has had on his victim and, "to a lesser degree, his entire family. "Since his release, Ryan has maintained "a full-time job with zero absences, "has not missed a single parole visit "or therapy appointment, "has not been involved in any altercation "with law enforcement, neighbors, or coworkers in any way. "And this is not an uncommon behavior "for a person with Asperger's, "and it is no surprise to anyone who knows Ryan. "I have witnessed Ryan's remarkable progress "over the past 19 months, and believe he is ready "to move on to the next stage of his rehabilitation, "living independently in his own home. "I hope you will agree." And I have copies also.
- That's fine, unless anybody needs a copy.
- [Yolanda] Okay, thank you. And then should I read his stepmother?

- Go ahead.

- [Yolanda] Okay, this is from Mary Brown Pulley. And she is in Arizona. "I am Ryan's stepmother. "I have known him for over 30 years, "and have never known anyone as open and honest. "I believe Ryan is actually incapable of not being truthful. "It came as no surprise that he earned an award "for completing a whole year on parole "without a single infraction. "I believe this was the first in history of Brown County. "It was not surprising to anyone who knows Ryan. "He follows the rules to the letter. "For these reasons and because he has gained understanding "through his counseling and therapy, "I believe Ryan is now an excellent candidate "to resume life in the home where he lived "prior to his arrest. "If you review his past and present behavior, "I think you'll agree that allowing Ryan "to return to his home is the right thing to do."

- Thank you.

- Thank you.

- [Yolanda] You're welcome.

- All right. Is there anything else you want to tell us?

- [Yolanda] I think we all agree. This has been kind of a learning experience for all of us. And we've bonded, we've all got a lot closer. We keep closer ties with each other. Ryan, I think, is ready to resume his life that he had before. It's been tough because this is the location where he was arrested, so he's had to work through some feelings of what are the neighbors going to think, some time has gone by, he's gone through some therapy. So I think he's done a good job of being accountable for his actions. Asperger's makes him uniquely qualified to follow rules, and that's why he does exceptionally well with his therapy and also on the job with his jobs. Also, he's very intelligent, he's very funny. We get along really well, we share a lot of jokes, he's very quirky, so I think he would be a good member of the community if he's allowed to get back into his former neighborhood.

- Okay, all right, thank you.

- [Yolanda] You're welcome, thank you.

- Is there anybody else?

- [Ryan] Nobody else.

- Okay.

- [Yolanda] Well, his mother.

- She's right here.

- His mother?

- Shirley Pulley.

- Did she fill out anything?

- Didn't I hand in two forms?

- Oh, yeah.
- One should be for her.
- [Rachel] Shirley Pulley.
- Yep, come up, ma'am.
- [Shirley] Okay.
- Just have a seat, right here.
- Thank you.
- And so, can I just have your name and address for the record.
- [Shirley] Shirley Pulley, 1965 Harold Street, Green Bay.
- Okay, go ahead, ma'am.
- [Shirley] I just want to say that Ryan is my youngest son. I have nine children, well, he's a twin. And I just want to vouch for him that he is ready to go back and live independently at the home where he lived before. No problem with the neighbors ever, no problem with, he's kind of kept to himself with this, when people talk to each other when they're shoveling snow or raking lawns or whatever, that was about the contact he had with them. And I think pretty much the same people live in the neighborhood that lived there before. I don't believe anybody ever had a problem.
- So, let me ask this for the testimony that we receive in terms of follows the rules to the letter.
- [Shirley] Yes.
- And is conscientious of what's going on. So why did he do what he did?
- [Shirley] I can't get into his mind. I believe that the person who was his lawyer had written a long, long article about Asperger's and child pornography. His name is Mark Mahoney from New York. And that probably had something to do with it. Asperger's people tend to keep to themselves, and they learn about sex and things like that more on their own, and computers kind of fill the void of having other friends and people tell, you know how kids tell each other things that he learned that way.
- Okay, all right, anything else, any questions for her?
- No.
- All right, thank you for your time.
- [Shirley] Okay.
- All right, if there's no one else to speak either for or against him, does anybody have any more questions, or I'll ask for a motion. All right, does anybody want to make a motion? Hey, Ryan, this is where I'm at right now. I appreciate the testimony, what was given by you and the other people for you. I believe that you have attended your sessions so far, although I don't have any documentation to that effect. Part of what we have to

do here is we have to see documentation for the record to understand where things are. We can't necessarily take you at your word. And obviously, because you molested a five year old, which is a pretty heinous thing, to be honest with you, my feeling is is that I can't approve you to this location at this time because I haven't seen that evaluation or any information relating to your treatment program, okay, from their perspective, not your perspective. So, it doesn't mean that I wouldn't approve you in the future for this location. It's just without having that, and the nature of your crime, it gives me reason to pause. So that's where I'm at right now. Again, it doesn't mean that I disbelieve what you told me. It's just I don't have an independent perspective on where you're at.

- I would feel more comfortable voting in your favor if you provided us with documentation from the programs and from the therapist that you're attending on a regular basis, you're participating in the treatment, and what goals you've set, and what you've been working on, okay?

- [Ryan] Okay.

- So that's where I'm at right now. And again, you can apply even next month if you have that documentation, but just to let you know, a form letter that just says, hey, I attended 12 sessions, isn't gonna help us. We need to get something that says how you're doing in that program as well. So unfortunately I'm going to make a motion to deny you to 324 Quinton Street in Green Bay, Wisconsin. Is there a second?

- Second.

- [Rachel] Motion to deny passes unanimously.

- Okay, so do you understand what we're talking about, in terms of getting that information? So if you get that, and you get an opportunity that your therapist writes something on your behalf on where you're at, then I would come and reapply for us, and then we'll definitely take a look at that and take that into consideration.

- [Ryan] Okay, should I try to contact my previous therapist too, for?

- Yeah, any more information that you can give us the better.

- [Ryan] Okay.

- 'Cause that just allows us to see in their perspective how you're doing. I think your witnesses were credible. I believed what you told me. But just because of the heinousness of your crime I really think that we need to have that information.

- [Ryan] Okay.

- All right, thank you.

- [Ryan] Thank you.

- Next is Bruce Verhaagh.

- [Bruce] Verhaagh.

- Come on up, Bruce. Okay, Bruce, you're looking to move to 1331 Division Street, is that correct?

- [Bruce] Yes sir.

- Okay. Again, what we're gonna do is we're gonna go over your appeal today, ask that you just refer to the person as the victim, and second of all, if we do want to go over your treatment programs we can either do that in public session or private session, which would you prefer?

- [Bruce] Public.

- Okay, great. So why don't you begin by telling us about your offense and what actually happened?

- [Bruce] Well, my offenses... Well the first one was in 1991.

- Okay.

- [Bruce] Three counts of--

- '91 or '81.

- [Bruce] '91.

- Okay.

- Okay, go ahead.

- [Bruce] Three counts of first degree sexual assault to a child. She was nine years old. I knew her from church. I touched her in a sexual way.

- Okay. How long did this go on before you were caught?

- [Bruce] About a couple of months.

- Okay, all right. Why don't you tell us about the other instances.

- [Bruce] 1987, first degree sexual assault of a child. They were six and seven year old girls whom I was babysitting. I touched them in a sexual way.

- How old were you at the time?

- [Bruce] I was... 1987, I think... I was 24, I'm guessing, I'm terrible with math.

- Yep, that sounds about right, 24, okay.

- [Bruce] Okay, 1983, enticing a child for immoral purposes. I knew him from the Boy Scouts. I had him sit on my lap in the bathroom, he was six.

- What did you actually do with him, other than having him sit on your lap? Did you do anything else?

- [Bruce] No I did not.

- You didn't ask him to do anything, or touch him in any other way?

- [Bruce] Well, I probably would have, but before I had a chance another kid opened the door.
- Okay, all right.
- [Bruce] And I right away got up.
- Okay, and how about the last one.
- [Bruce] 1981, fourth degree sexual assault of a child. lived near a friend, who was six.
- And what did you do with that victim?
- [Bruce] Well, I, um... I was wearing jeans, and she was wearing shorts. I put down his shorts, laid him on top of me and rubbed him against me in a sexual way.
- Okay. All right. So it seems like you have a propensity to offend with younger children.
- [Bruce] Yes.
- So what do you think is going on? Why are you doing this?
- [Bruce] Because I think ever since the age of I think 12, 13, I'm not really sure, I had an attraction towards children.
- Okay.
- [Bruce] And that was why, 'cause I was very attracted to them.
- Okay, so what are you doing today to manage that?
- [Bruce] What I'm doing today?
- Mm hm.
- Well, I see a therapist, I got documentation.
- Okay, well, why don't you tell me about what you learn in, go ahead?
- Is he doing treatment?
- He said he would do this in public.
- Okay.
- Yes.
- Thank you.
- Yeah.

- [Bruce] I am now seeing Marshall Kirkpatrick.
- Okay.
- [Bruce] I see him now on Wednesdays in Appleton. We have worked on behavior therapy, which is lowering my attraction towards children, and increase my attraction towards adults.
- Okay, and how is that working?
- [Bruce] Excellent. Also, even before that in Sand Ridge. I was into behavior therapy, and in fact the reason that I'm on supervised release is because I did really good in groups, and really good on the penile plethysmograph.
- Do you have any documentation of that, what you did?
- [Bruce] Doc?
- Any documentation on that? You said you did really well, is there any documentation to show us?
- [Bruce] It's online, my therapist book there, at Sand Ridge, penile plethysmograph.
- Do you have any paperwork from your therapist?
- [Bruce] Yes I do. This is it. And there's copies.
- Thank you.
- Can I have one too please?
- [Bruce] Yes.
- Thank you. Okay, is there anything else you have from anybody else that you've received treatment through. I think I see you have something from the Attic.
- [Bruce] Yes.
- So we're just taking time just to read through this information that was provided to us.
- [Bruce] Yes.
- Thank you.
- So, sir, where are you currently employed?
- [Bruce] I am currently employed at... It's in back of Curative Connections.
- Yep, okay.
- [Bruce] I forget the name of the place.

- How long have you been there?
- [Bruce] I've been there for I think over a year. I've been laid off a few times.
- Okay, so moving to 1331 Division Street.
- [Bruce] Yes.
- You're going to live with your dad, right?
- [Bruce] Yes sir.
- Okay, and who are you living with now, in New Franken?
- [Bruce] Now, I am under the supervised release law, Chapter 98.
- Okay, but, do you live with anybody in New Franken?
- [Bruce] Yes, I have a roommate.
- Okay, and is the roommate not a relative, it's just another person in the program?
- [Bruce] Yes.
- Okay. Are you being asked to leave the program now?
- [Bruce] No, I am not.
- Okay. But you've been approved to move with your father?
- [Bruce] I'm hoping that I'm approved to live with my father.
- No, but is there, from a probation standpoint, it's, they've okayed it?
- [Bruce] Yes.
- Okay.
- Yes.
- All right. Does anybody have any questions related to--
- [Bruce] Oh.
- Go ahead.
- [Bruce] Sir, in fact, I am now able to visit my dad. I do this once a month to help get things ready for when I move in.
- Okay.

- [Bruce] Get all of my junk out, and create space to put my bed, and make the basement nice.
- All right.
- [Bruce] Yeah, so I've been, me and my dad have been putting a lot of work into that. And I know that in the supervised release program allows me to do this. But actually my dad has become my chaperone.
- All right. And are you on any medications?
- [Bruce] Yes I am.
- What are you on?
- [Bruce] Okay, I remember the iron pill, because I'm anemic.
- Okay.
- [Bruce] I also take levothyroxine because I have... A slow thyroid gland.
- Okay.
- [Bruce] I'm on re-nin-a-tine, mel-au-di-dine.
- And what are those for?
- [Bruce] I forget, sorry.
- All right. Okay, all right. Is there anything that you're on, anything medication for behavioral issues, or anything like that?
- [Bruce] Oh, no, no, no.
- No, nothing?
- [Bruce] No.
- Okay. Does anybody have any more questions on his treatment programs?
- Is your dad here today?
- [Bruce] Yes, he is, he's right there.
- Okay, and another question, how do you get, currently, how do get from New Franken to Curative Connections?
- [Bruce] A monitor brings me.
- Okay, and if we approved you to go to your father's home, how would you get from your father's home to Curative Connections?

- [Bruce] Oh, they have a bus.

- Okay.

- [Bruce] And transfers are pretty easy. I used to do that all the time when I was a kid.

- Okay, any more questions directly for him? And then we can hear testimony from people that have signed. Okay, is there anybody that signed up to speak on his behalf or against?

- [Rachel] Yep, Rosanna Kenote.

- [Deanna] Alex, number four, yeah Alex.

- [Alex] Should I come forward?

- Come on up. Can I just have your name and address for the record, please.

- [Alex] Yes, it's Alex Kreie-Yang, and it's 101 North Webster Avenue.

- Okay, go ahead.

[Alex] All right. So I am the one who wrote the letter about Bruce's placement in the SR program. I'm currently with Attic Correctional Services and I've been his case manager for about two years now, but I've worked with him about three years. And I just wanted to speak to his progress that he's made while he's been in the SR program. It's been exceedingly well. There's been no issues with role violations. He's been active and engaged in treatment. He attends treatment every single week, and he has for the last four years when he's been out. Beyond that he has over 10 years of experience in treatment at Sand Ridge. And we haven't had any behavioral concerns whatsoever. So Bruce is definitely one of our star clients. So I can't speak highly enough of him.

- So, can you give me a little background as to, obviously he's had multiple convictions, okay. Did he have any treatment between those particular offenses? Or this truly his first longterm extended care for his problems?

- [Alex] I think this is the longest one.

- [Bruce] Yeah, I had some minimal ones.

- [Alex] Okay, I'm sorry.

- So between your offenses, did you have any sexual treatment programs, between the four different offenses that you had?

- [Bruce] I had some minimal stuff, not much.

- Okay, all right.

- [Bruce] We didn't talk about much.

- Okay.

- [Bruce] We didn't talk much at all about, it all starts with a single thought, you know, thought, feelings, behavior, you know, outcomes, they didn't talk about that stuff.

- And now you've been doing that for the last three years.

- [Bruce] Yeah, we didn't talk about how, like, knowing my attraction to kids will raise me towards adults, you know. We just chit-chatted, and asked how're things going, you know, stuff like that. But now it's like I am very, very aware of my thoughts. I now know that it is what I practice thinking throughout the day, that is where it's at.

- Okay.

- [Bruce] Okay, it's what I focus my attention on. Also, Buddhism. I brought my "Dhammapada", my favorite book. It basically teaches the same thing. Can I read one of my favorite scriptures?

- Well, actually, I'd appreciate not at this moment.

- [Bruce] Okay, all right.

- But I have one other quick question for you, in regards to, if he moves here, how long does this treatment continue?

- [Alex] So treatment would end once he's discharged from the SR program. Now Bruce would be able to sign up for additional treatment that he could pay for out of pocket if he were able to afford that, but through the SR, like the provided treatment, that would end in January if he's discharged at that time.

- When you say if he's discharged, what do you mean by discharged?

- [Alex] Discharged from the SR program, which is through the court process.

- So the court would have to approve his discharge.

- [Alex] Yes.

- So even if he moves here, he's still in the program, unless the court says he no longer needs the program.

- [Alex] No, he would still be, if the court denies discharge then he would still be with us.

- Okay, so he can't move to this location until his discharge would be in January.

- [Alex] Correct.

- [Bruce] If it's, no, if the judge says discharge, then I can live with my dad.

- Right, okay, that's what I'm trying to understand. Okay, all right, does anybody have any more questions for her?

- Yes, are you on electronic monitoring?

- [Bruce] Yes, I'm wearing it right now.

- Okay, and will you still be on electronic monitoring even if you move back to your father's home?
- [Bruce] Absolutely. Monitoring, GPS monitoring is a lifelong thing. There's no way I can, the only way I can get off of it is when some day I die, that's the only way.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- Any other information for us that you think we need to know?
- [Alex] No, I don't think so.
- All right, thank you for your time.
- [Alex] Yep.
- [Rachel] Alex--
- [Deanna] No.
- That was Alex.
- [Deanna] That was Alex.
- [Rachel] Then-- Yep, that's it for number four.
- That's it, just for that one, one person, okay. I thought his father was here.
- Yes.
- I thought there were three people.
- Yes, there is.
- Sir, did you sign up to be heard today?
- No, I don't think so.
- Okay, I'd like to make sure we add him.
- [Rachel] Okay.
- Sir, why don't you come up, I'd like to speak with you, please.
- Oh, can I say something?
- Go ahead.

- When I get discharged, I have, I will be going to counseling. And John Nemick is my counselor.
- Okay.
- He's at Power For Change.
- Power For Change, okay.
- One thing--
- Yeah, we know.
- Yeah?
- Yeah, we know about it.
- Okay.
- Okay, sir, can I just have your name and address for the record, please?
- [Ray] My name is Ray Verhaagh. And I'm 1331 Division Street, Green Bay.
- Okay, so based upon the testimony of your son, so you are now his guardian, is that correct?
- Chaperone?
- Or chaperone?
- [Ray] Not now, well yes, I am his chaperone when I pick him up.
- Okay. So obviously he wants to move in with you. How do you feel about that? And how do you feel that that relationship is going?
- [Ray] I feel it's going good.
- Okay, and do you want him to move in with you?
- [Ray] Yes.
- Okay. Do you think, over the last three years, that the progress he's made is enough to stop him from committing another crime like this?
- [Ray] I... I feel it is, but there's no way that anyone could know that. I mean, it would be hard for me to know that.
- Mm hm.
- [Ray] But I feel, yeah, I feel he's made a lot of progress.
- Okay.

- [Ray] And I feel that he, I don't think that he'll do that again.

- Okay. Does he have a lot of friends right now? Would he be more socially active if he was living with you or not? Or do you know?

- [Ray] Well... I'm really not associated with any of his friends, because his friends are from, like, when he goes to the...

- ADRC.

- [Ray] ADRC, which is a senior place where they do things. And other than that, my associating with him does not involve any friends or anything.

- Okay, all right.

- [Ray] Because he just comes to my place, and I just bring him back. So I don't really know much about his friends.

- Okay, is there any other questions anybody else has? All right, thank you for your time, I appreciate it.

- [Ray] Okay.

- Go ahead.

- So other people came to speak on my behalf.

- Is there anybody else here yet for him?

- No.

- No.

- Does anybody want to hear any more testimony?

- I would feel more comfortable if I had testimony from the therapist.

- Sure, okay, thank you for your time, sir.

- [Ray] Thank you.

- Sir, would you like to come up and testify or not? And just so you know, your name and address for the record.

- [John] My name is John Nemick. 123 North Oakland.

- Okay.

- [John] And to be clear, we don't have, really, a therapeutic relationship. Bruce sought me out about a year and a half ago, 'cause I lead a meditation group in town. So when he found me, found our group, we began to talk, and he would come in periodically, and now he's become a regular member of that meditation group. So

in some sense is each week we have some time, I'm sure it's therapeutic in its own way, but it's not a formal therapeutic relationship.

- Thank you for clarifying that.

- [John] But he's a regular member of our group.

- Okay, all right, is there anything you want to say on his behalf?

- [John] It put a smile on my face when I heard his case manager say he's a star, 'cause he really has shown up well in our group. He fits in nicely with people that he'd never met before, and doing things he's never done before, in an environment he's never been in before. A very helpful, personable, I have nothing but good to say about him. I feel very confident that he's safe in the community.

- All right, yes?

- Well when I get discharged, you will be my therapist, right?

- [John] Maybe, we'll have to talk about that.

- Okay.

- All right. All right, thank you for your time.

- Tracy Teller.

- I'm sorry?

- Tracy Teller.

- That's for the next one.

- That's for the next one.

- That's for the next one.

- Oh, the next one?

- Okay, all right, if there's no one else, then we are going to, does anybody have any more questions for him, or does anybody want to make a motion? Just to let you know, the house is about a block away from Chappell School Park, where he wants to live. Just off of Shawano Avenue. And then this park is about three blocks away, and Murphy Park is about three blocks away as well. And Perkins is about five blocks.

- As well as Chappell School, and Elmore School's not far from there either.

- Yep, yep. Okay, does anybody want to make a motion? I'm gonna make a motion to approve him for 90 days at this particular location, at which time you come back and tell us how he's doing in this location, if he's continued on his additional treatment programs, and to see how this change is working with his father.

- I have kind of a sensitive question, he won't be living there until after he's discharged, correct?

- Right, so it'd be 90 days after discharge. So it'd be March.
- 90 days after January.
- Yeah, after January.
- Okay.
- Is there a second to that motion?
- Second.
- Rachel? I didn't get it.
- I got it.
- [Rachel] You're the only one that didn't get it.
- Okay. I'm sorry.
- Do you want to--
- You're at the end of the table, it takes a little bit longer to get this far.
- A little farther away.
- Yeah.
- [Rachel] The motion fails, two to two.
- Okay, so sir, we had a tie, two people voted yes for the motion, two people denied it. So is there any discussion the board wants to have in regards to the motion, or a change of the motion, to see if we'd want to change anybody's ideas or thoughts on this? Here's my concerns, as well as where I think he's at. I think over three years of treatment programs, along with the testimony from the current program manager has led me to believe that he's made enough progress to have an opportunity. I think it's real important, though, once he moves in with his father, and he goes out from a very regimented program, that he gets into something else. Because of your history of molestation, is a big concern, although, again, over this time frame, you've had a very long extended chance to improve your thought processes. So although the risks I think are there, I'm willing to give you an opportunity to see how you transition with your father, and how you transition into other treatment programs, because I think you are going to need that. So that's why I voted yes for this temporary status. So I don't know what other people's thoughts are, or are you just unwilling to take the risk?
- I voted no just because I was not sure about the discharge in January from the program, I wasn't sure how that all worked, I wasn't quite comfortable with that.
- It is with the court, and the court has to make the decision based upon basically everything we've heard here in addition to other requirements before the court will decide to discharge.
- And I voted no on that, looking for more, as you mentioned, regimentation, in terms of something in place, so it might be putting the cart before the horse here, if the court hasn't dismissed him from the SR program at this point.

- But if he's not discharged, it's moot, correct?

- Right, it'd be moot. So, I guess the question, I guess, for everybody here, that for the two that voted no, do you think it's best for him to come back after he's been discharged? Because then technically, if he's discharged, he's gonna ask to leave his current place, and he's gonna be--

- [Bruce] Homeless.

- He would be homeless until our next meeting. Go ahead.

- My suggestion would be to have Mr. Verhaagh file another appeal, maybe in December, but at that time provide additional information regarding to what programs or treatment or therapy you're going to have in place in the event the court discharges you in January, okay. So a completion on, not a completion, but more of a consistent level of services so that we know they're in place, okay?

- Does that make sense? So what she's basically asking is is that refile your appeal in December, and then show us some documentation that if you are discharged that you're gonna be in X, Y, and Z programs when you get discharged, you've set them up already, okay, with a certain therapist, or discussion groups, whatever it may be, 'cause obviously you reached out to somebody you didn't have to, which tells me that you feel that you want that continuity in your treatment. So I think what we're looking for is the documentation that you have that in place, okay?

- Ms. Yang, is that something that is workable?

- [Alex] Yes.

- Okay.

- Okay, so what we'd like to do is just put him back on the docket for December.

- All right.

- All right. So we'll send you a letter saying that you're back on for our December meeting, okay?

- Would that be before I go to court?

- It would be before you go to court.

- Yes.

- Oh good.

- Yep, but again, you're gonna use the next 30 days or so to get those programs lined up so that when you come back in December we know you're going to have this continuity in your treatment, okay? And I would say you're probably still gonna get a temporary assignment to see how you've transitioned, from the very regimented into something that's a little less regimented.

- [Bruce] A temporary assignment?

- I'm sorry?

- [Bruce] What do you mean by temporary assignment?
- So in other words we would grant you 90 days and then we'd want to come back to see you again, you'd come back and see us again and tell us how the transition with your father is working, how your new programs are going, to make sure that we understand how you are progressing, that you're not having a lapse.
- [Bruce] Sir, I am all for this. I can be open and honest. I'd like everyone to be on the same page so everybody knows what's going on.
- Okay, great. Thank you very much.
- Thank you.
- So we'll see you next month.
- [Bruce] Yes.
- Next is Mr. Xavier Teller.
- [Xavier] Good evening. How is everybody doing?
- Good. Okay, I'm just trying to get your record up here, it's kind of jumping around on me. Okay, you're looking to move to 1213 12th Avenue? Is that correct?
- [Xavier] Yes sir.
- Okay, and you're currently living there?
- [Xavier] Yeah, I'm on the GPS monitoring, because I'm on probationary with the Department of Corrections right now.
- Okay, how long have you been living at that location?
- [Xavier] Since... I've been on this GPS monitor since at the beginning of May, June... August, and I was homeless because I'm from the Menominee Indian Reservation up in Keshena, Wisconsin. I didn't have a residence down here because I'm from the reservation, and I didn't have my family at the time. So when my probation officer told me that I needed to come down here to be supervised for probation for my current case, which is a drug offense, she told me to come down here, and I didn't have no where to go. So... I'm engaged to be married with my fiancée, who is the homeowner at the residence that I'm proposing, and so she told me after going back into custody on a probation violation, she said, she opened up her home to me and said you can come here, but my probation officer, her name is Kim Schultz, from the Department of Corrections, she said, well are you willing to go to her residence until you get approved with the board? I said yeah, but she said, but you're going to have to go on GPS, so I said, okay. So they put me on this GPS monitor, and I've been there ever since.
- Okay.
- Can I just intercede?
- Go ahead.

- So when did you have a probation violation?

- [Xavier] In, so in July, August, I was absconding from probation for a couple of months.

- And when was that?

- [Xavier] And that was from June until I believe the end of August, early September, and then that's when I got taken into custody, and I told them my situation, I'm homeless, I got no where to go here in Green Bay, and she was like, well your girlfriend had contacted me, and she opened up her home and said you can go there until you're approved. And I had put in the paperwork downstairs for to come in for this meeting, or this board meeting, and the reason I had missed last month was because I dropped 30 for drugs, and I got taken back into custody, so I had missed it last month, that's, I wanted to make that clear, that's why I missed last month, because I was in Brown County Jail, in custody, on a probation violation again. So because I am a recovering addict, I'm a recovering addict, an alcoholic. I come from Menominee Indian Reservation where drugs and alcohol abuse is very rampant up there. And so I'm struggling, however, but I'm going to treatment right now. I'm currently on an alternative revocation, and I'm during urinalysis three times a week, I'm droppin' clean. I was addicted to opiates, heroin, marijuana and alcohol.

- Okay. So before we get into that, just a couple of quick things. We are going to go over your case a little bit. Just make sure you refer to the person as the victim when we talk about it. And then second of all, if we do want to talk about your treatment programs, we can either do that in public or private session. What do you prefer?

- [Xavier] We can do it in public.

- Okay, all right, great. So tell us a little bit about what happened in 2007, and what you did with your victim.

- [Xavier] In 2007 I was 18 years old, and I was really into drugs and alcohol, you know, and I was drinking with some underage girls, myself, my cousin, and we were drinking. I was drunk, and then... I had made a sexual advance towards my victim, and...

- How old was the victim, do you know?

- [Xavier] She was 12 or 13 at the time.

- Okay. And did you have sexual intercourse with the victim?

- [Xavier] No I did not.

- What did you do with the victim?

- [Xavier] I made a sexual advance, and I pulled my dick out, my penis, I'm sorry.

- Mm hm.

- [Xavier] Um, and uh, and uh...

- All right. Have you had any treatment programs in regards, as you're currently seeing Jim Drake, is that correct?

- [Xavier] Yeah. I got a letter here from Jim actually right now.

- Okay, could I have that please?

- [Xavier] Yes sir.

- How did you get caught?

- Um, uh. I was walking down the street, and the police had stopped myself and my cousin, Christopher, walking down the street, doing nothing wrong, but they said that there was a police call for a sexual assault. And that was, I believe it was April 1st, 2007.

- Okay.

- Okay, and so it looks like you've seen Mr. Drake three times?

- [Xavier] I've actually, I was on federal supervision, after I got out, I was 21 years old when I got out, and I started seeing him at the time through federal supervision. And that's when I first met Jim Drake. And I started going to assessments with him then. And that's when I was on federal supervision through the bureau of prisons, federal bureau of prisons, and then at the time I went back for multiple drinking incidences again. And I went back to prison to the federal bureau. I went into custody, I believe, three times, three times until finally Judge Griesbach, the federal judge down here in Green Bay, of the Eastern District, he said he was going to terminate my supervision with the federal bureau of prisons. So I sat nine more months. But because I never finished my assessments with Jim Drake at that time, in that termination provision, I never had to go see him again. So now that I'm on, so I went a long period, so I got off of federal supervision, May 24th, I got out of federal prison May 24th, 2013. And then I got out, I started going to NWTC down here in Green Bay. And I met the mother of my children, I had three children, and then I was good all the way until I caught my drug offense December 2017. I was in compliance with the sex offender registry the whole time, the period that I didn't have no offenses, and then I caught a drug offense in Forest County, Crandon, Wisconsin, December 2017. So I sat my year. I was sentenced to three years probation with the Department of Corrections, and then I sat with a conditional year term of one year. So I sat that and I was released this May. So upon my release, this May, like I said earlier, I was supposed to come down here to Green Bay, and I told my probation officer, because my first address that I had proposed is the place that I had been living for the whole time that I had mentioned, that I was, that I had my children, that I didn't get into trouble for that whole time period since 2013 to 2017, and they denied that. They denied that place back on the reservation. So because I had a felony bail jumping down here in Green Bay, my probation officer said, hey, you need to come down here and live homeless until we find a residence for you. And you need to file with the board to live down here, and that was my first instance to where I was ever gonna try to live in Green Bay, because I've never been down here. I've been down here to visit, you know, stuff like that, and I got family scattered about, the Fox Cities, like Appleton and here and there, but I never had a residence in Green Bay. So when I came down here, she said you need to find somewhere to live. And in the meantime I had met my fiance, and we started dating. I gained custody of my children back again, and Kim Schultz, my probation officer had told me, she said now you need to file, now that, you need to file with the board and get approval to live down here. And so I did, and that's when, I didn't anticipate that I was gonna be in custody again last month, when I first missed the board meeting. So that's what led to this.

- So, are you currently employed right now?

- [Xavier] Yes, I work at Taco Bell on West Mason, West Mason Street or Avenue. And I'm a service representative, a cashier. Prior to getting that job down here, I worked at a Taco Bell in Shawano, Wisconsin, through tull-in-zing, but it's a Taco Bell, and that was from 2015 'til 2017. And I was a cashier, service representative there. And I like my job, I like talking to people, as you can see.

- So right now, you're, how long are you gonna be drug-tested for?

- [Xavier] Currently I'm getting, this is a, I'm in a group right now. Would you like to see my schedule?

- Yeah.

- [Xavier] So that's my treatment for my alcohol and drug use. So it's pretty intensive right now. I see them a lot, like I just had, that's the group that I'm starting. They're gonna be evening groups so it'll balance out with my work, and plus on top of that, I take care of my three children. I have a five year old, a four year old, and a two year old. And I have all girls, one daughter from a previous relationship that is around me as well.

- So right now they're living with you at this location?

- [Xavier] Yes they are.

- Okay.

- So just to be clear, you had started the group, recently, correct, this week?

- [Xavier] Yeah, I'm going to be starting that group, but I've going to one on ones with Christy--

- I'm sorry, I said that wrong. You started individual this week, and you'll start group next week, correct?

- [Xavier] Yeah, I've been seeing Christy for about a month until she could get me into that group, so she just issued me that because we had to wait for another group to start up because there was a lot of--

- Thank you.

- So besides that, you gonna, are you still, how long are you going to be seeing Jim Drake?

- [Xavier] Right now he gave me a packet of self-assessment, it's about this thick, and he told me, he was like, look, because I was seeing him like weekly, but we were talking about, because right now, my sex offender unit with DOC, as far as the probation and everything, my probation officer, Kim Schultz, she said that, she said that her goal is to get me off of that unit, and get me to beyond a regular probation wing, because I do, you know, and so she said, but before she can do that, she'd like to hear from Jim Drake. And so Jim Drake, him knowing this, so he was like, well look, he was like, do this packet, and he's like, I'm not gonna schedule for another two weeks, he's like, just come back in two weeks. So I don't know if he's gonna wrap that up, but I'm willing to continue to see him if he says so, but we really don't talk about, like um, like it's sex offender treatment, but when I go we don't, to be honest with yous, all yous, we really don't talk about like sex offenses and things like that, I just tell him how my life is going, I be honest with him about what's goin' on in my daily, how I'm copin' with work, how I'm copin' with my kids, how I'm managing balancing my life because I really made a big, a huge transition in the last, in the last, me going to prison, or not prison, jail, again, for another drug offense, and... so I've been tryin' to grow up, mature, because I don't want to leave the side of my children ever again, because their mother is addicted to heroin and stuff like that, and she's just in and out of jail, and I'm just trying to change the cycle right now.

- Quick question, are you, just for clarification, are you on probation, you're in Brown County, yes?

- [Xavier] Yes.

- What about Shawano?

- [Xavier] I'm not on probation in Shawano, no.

- Okay.

- [Xavier] Not currently.

- Were you on, okay.

- [Xavier] No, I was never on probation in Shawano, no. I've only been in trouble twice in my life. For the sex offense in 2007, and then for the possession of a Schedule II narcotic as a party to a crime in 2017.

- You also wrote down that you've seen Christy at Options, Anger, Alcohol, and Drugs, you have that checked. Are you still doing that?

- [Xavier] Yes, that's this right here.

- Oh, I'm sorry.

- That's for the 22 weeks.

- Yep, okay.

- [Xavier] She placed me in an anger thing because it deals with like cognitive thinking and problem solving and, so, because it says anger I don't want you to misinterpret that and be like, oh, he's got anger problems, you know, like.

- I would agree with Christy that that was--

- [Xavier] Yeah, oh, I'm sorry.

- No, that's my fault.

- [Xavier] So yeah, I'm currently in drug and alcohol treatment, and then I'm currently seeing Jim Drake for sex offender treatment until he decides that he wants to--

- So tell me why we should let you live in Green Bay?

- [Xavier] The most important job that I have, aside from having employment right now, is maintaining my sobriety in order to remain an influence and a positive father on my children. I grew up in poverty in Menominee Reservation. I was raised by my great-grandparents because my father was in prison, and when my mom, my mom raised me as well, but we all lived at my great-grandparents' home, and I have a strong belief in parents, you know, being there for their children, because my dad wasn't there. And right now, I'm really trying for my kids. And I just ask for the opportunity to live down here, because now, I left the reservation, and to be honest with everybody here on this board, things are going positive for me, very positive, like since I left my environment. My environment back home on the Menominee Reservation. I'm happy, I'm very happy. I'm on my way to being married. I proposed to my girlfriend a few months ago. Like full on, I never actually gave someone a ring. She's a stepmother to my kids, now, and my kids love me and her, and I'm being a big influence on them now. I want to continue that. And right now I don't have anybody in Green Bay, aside from my fiancée who opened up her home, and I ask that you consider me for approval because I don't want to go back to the reservation, I'll just be frank with you, I don't want to go back to that environment, and I feel like me moving down here to a bigger city where there's more jobs, more opportunity down here for me, and I'm doing good now.

- Okay.
- How long have you been with your fiancée?
- [Xavier] I've been with her since my release from custody in May, on May 1st.
- Okay, so it's a relatively new relationship?
- [Xavier] A relatively new relationship, yes. But we're not rushing things, as far as like, well, yeah, we are, as far as like we got engaged, but I told her just 'cause we're getting engaged, we're gonna wait until everything is right. We can be engaged for three, four, five years, you know.
- Okay. Any more questions for him? Is there anybody here to speak for him?
- Tracy Teller.
- Okay, is Tracy here?
- Hello.
- Hello, Tracy, can I just have your full name and address, please?
- [Tracy] Tracy L. Teller, 1410 Weisner Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin.
- Go ahead.
- [Tracy] I think Xav would be a good candidate to live here, I'm with him almost on a daily, I spend a lot of time with him and his children. He calls me when he's having problems.
- What's your relationship with him.
- [Tracy] He is my second cousin.
- Okay, all right.
- [Tracy] He is a good kid that is finally getting a chance. I'm a lot older than him, excuse me if I cry, I get a little nervous, I just, wouldn't like to see him lose an opportunity, that he's doing really good, the girlfriend is good for him, he's happy. I've seen a lot of change in him as far as his anxiety. As far as his depression goes, things like that. I talk to him a lot, and we have a lot of conversations. Anytime anything's bothering him. He'll text me or he'll message me. And I'll call and we'll visit, and we'll have family time. I have children that are, my children are the ages of 11, I've got a one year old son, a 13 year old daughter, a 15 year old son, and a 16 year old son. He's a really good influence on my sons. I'm a single parent, he's family, we're family, we're a close-knit family, you know we're really close. My kids enjoy his kids. My sons look up to him. My sons see the positive because I just brought my sons back from Kansas recently too. So it's all kind of relatively new to everyone, but for me and him, as far as me knowing him, I've known him all his life. I've held him when he was a baby. I've seen him go through all of his strifes throughout his life, I've always talked to him. I have lived the same type of life. I came out of that life. I have good children. I think that this is a good opportunity for him, as far as change in the life, and changing the lives of three other children that wouldn't be changed if he isn't here to be the responsible one for his children. And he is responsible for his children all the time, 'cause I'm the one, when he needs to do something, he's gotta go to counseling and all of that stuff, I'm his babysitter, I'm the one who watches his kids, and helps him with his kids, and teaches them how to cook, teachin' how to cook all kinds of

stuff. We're always together, I spend a lot of time with them. He's doing really good. I seen a whole lot of change in him in the last three months, a lot, a lot of change. He used to be where he, when he would do things, I knew he would be not being right because he won't message me for a couple of days, then I might be like, hey, what's up? And I say to him, oh I want to come over and visit, go visit him, and he'd be like, yeah, I've been kinda depressed. So in the past three months before, after that, now he's like everyday, everyday, good morning, how're you, how're feeling today? If anything's bothering him he'll let me know. So I see a lot of change in him, and good change, you know, and before this, bouts of what he had, I would see the procrastination a little bit, if you would call it, like I'll do that, I'll do that, I'm gonna get at that. But now it's like, he's like, boom, boom, in the past three, four months, he's been on it. He's staying on what he needs to do to keep himself intact in what his goals are, in life, and his goals are to be a good father, and to be there for his children, and that's a lot more of what we want to see in this society. And so I think it would be a good opportunity for him to not to have to go back to the reservation and to live in Green Bay with his children.

- All right, thank you.

- [Tracy] Thank you.

- Any more questions for him?

- We have one more speaker.

- Oh, one more speaker, okay.

- Rossanna Kenote.

- Can I have your full name and address, ma'am.

- [Rossanna] Hi, Rossanna Kenote, P.O. Box 1311, Keshena, Wisconsin.

- Go ahead.

- [Rossanna] I am Xavier's mother. He is the oldest of my six children. In the past two months he's had a major life change. I've seen great leaps and bounds from him, I'm very proud of him. He's went from, excuse my language, but this little thug who thinks he's gonna be Scarface, to a good father, and that's all I've wanted from him, he's taking responsibility for all these little kids, and my grandchildren have lived a hard life on the streets, everything else. Since he's had 'em, they have brand new clothes, they have shoes, they have boots, they have everything. And it's all because of him and his fiancée. He has had a great effect on my younger children. Like I said, he is the eldest of six. He even helps me out with my 13 year old. All my other kids are adults now, and everything, but I still got a 13 year old, and he has a profound effect on his younger brothers. He's just been a different, a different son. He's somebody I can be proud of right now, extremely proud.

- Okay, thank you very much.

- [Rossanna] You're welcome.

- All right, does anybody want to make a motion?

- I will, I make a motion to approve to the address listed, 1213 12th Street.

- I second it.

- [Rachel] Motion passes three to one.
- Okay, sir, you've been approved to stay at 1213 12th Street, address specific. If you do move again you will have to come in front of our board. Do you want that letter sent to the home.
- [Xavier] Yeah, that'd be awesome.
- All right, thank you very much.
- [Xavier] All right, thank you.
- [Rossanna] Thank you.
- [Tracy] Thank you.
- Next up is Michael--
- Mitchell.
- Mitchell
- Mitchell, I'm sorry, Mitchell Pamonicutt.
- Yes.
- Sorry about butchering your last name there.
- [Mitchell] That's all right, you wouldn't be the first.
- All right sir, we're here to hear your appeal to move to 428 South Maple Avenue, is that correct?
- [Mitchell] Yeah.
- Okay, and again, as we go through your particular case we just ask you to refer to the person as the victim, and if you do want to talk about any of your treatment programs, you have the right to do it either in public or in private, which would you prefer?
- [Mitchell] Private.
- Private, okay.
- Okay, so why don't we start off with, tell us about your offense, what you did, and how you were caught?
- [Mitchell] Well, I wasn't exactly caught, I just kinda went to the police station.
- Okay, you turned yourself in?
- [Mitchell] Yeah.
- Okay, tell us about the offense that you did.

- [Mitchell] Second degree sexual assault.
- What did you physically do to the victim?
- [Mitchell] I guess I penetrated her orally and digitally, and anally, I guess, that's how you'd refer to it, in the garage.
- Did you have a victim prior to this, or not?
- [Mitchell] Yes.
- Okay, and how many times did you do this with the victim?
- [Mitchell] Just that once.
- Okay. And how old were you at the time?
- [Mitchell] 42.
- So why'd you do it?
- [Mitchell] I had been drinking all day at my mother's house, and taking prescription medication that was prescribed to me by a doctor, Xanax, Vicodin, Codeine, for my knees and my back. And I was drinking all day long, you know, whatever I could get my hands on. And she was there following me around, getting drinks, you know, here, And honestly, I only remember parts of it, because I blacked out at a certain area. And I'm not denying that it happened, you know, I'm taking full responsibility. I feel bad. And I wish I could take the time back and change it.
- So, obviously, you have a problem with alcohol, it looks like, based upon your additional record.
- [Mitchell] Yes.
- Is that correct?
- [Mitchell] Yes.
- Okay, so have you, so basically you say it was an alcohol related issue that happened.
- [Mitchell] Yes.
- Had this type of offense occurred that hasn't been, you know, you went to the police and you said you did this, and so is that actually the case too, does the record show he came to the police.
- It doesn't say in the criminal complaint.
- It doesn't?
- No.
- Okay. All right.

- I have a question about that. Why did you go to the police? If you're saying that you had a blackout, part of it was blackout, and you only remember bits and pieces, what caused you to go to the police?

- [Mitchell] Well, the next day, my fiancée told me that my mother had told me that the police was looking for me, and they wanted to talk to me about it, down at the police station. So I said, okay, you know, I'll go down there and talk to them. So I went down to the police station in Green Bay and talked to them.

- Did you know what they wanted to talk to you about?

- [Mitchell] At the moment I didn't. I had an idea, a general idea from what I was told. So I didn't know exactly what the full story was because I was still hungover and stuff, but.

- Is this put all in the complaint?

- Yes.

- Okay, any more questions as it relates to the offense? Okay, pursuant to Section 19.85 and 142.82, the board may convene in closed session to discuss health and all treatment related issue information. So I'd like a motion to move to private session, please.

- So moved.

- Second.

- Again, anybody who's a direct relative can stay. Everybody else is gonna have to leave.

- Again?

- Yep.

- [Tracy] Motion passed unanimously.

- Keeping the buggy well-used.

- I know.

- [Deanna] {speaking faintly} passed yet?

- [Rachel] She's been working for the clerk's office temporarily, like December to February.

- Really? Can't get away. Grandma, she's a grandma?

- I like to stay .

- Okay, we are now back in public session. Just another quick question for you. Since you don't have steady employment how do you plan to pay for your current location?

- [Mitchell] Where I'm living now?

- The one you want to move to?

- Shh, excuse me, we're still in.

- [Mitchell] I have an inheritance, my mother just passed.

- Okay.

- [Mitchell] So I'd be receiving that inheritance. And at the same time I'll be employed, working, at the same time.

- Okay, okay. So in the private session we talked about Mitchell's programs in regards to his treatment programs and more heard his testimony and documents relating to that, those particular programs. Is there any other questions relating, that anybody wants to speak to him before we call any witnesses? Are there any witnesses for him?

- Yes, Melody Harcher.

- All right, just have a seat right here, Melody. Can I just have your name and address for the record please?

- [Melody] Melody Harcher, 2107 Ontario Road, Green Bay, Wisconsin.

- Go ahead, ma'am.

- [Melody] Do you have any questions for me?

- Well I think that the thing that, you know, obviously, his offense occurred when he was in an alcoholic situation, and his previous record, he's had multiple DWIs. So the biggest question that's running through my mind is, is he truly not gonna go back? What's your thoughts in terms of him going back to alcoholism again, going back to alcohol?

- [Melody] That's a good question. I mean, if I was God, I'd be able to answer that one for you right on, nail on the head, you know. But, I don't think that Mitchell's gonna go back to using alcohol or drugs or prescription medications or anything like that because of what it's done to his life and how it's affected the victim's life. And not only has it affected the victim's life, because of the action that happened due to the alcohol, mixing it with opioids, Xanax or whatever the heck else he had in his system, your body can black out, your mind can black out, but your body'll keep moving. If anybody's ever been in an emergency room or has every experienced that here, that's how our minds protect our bodies. That's how our minds protect our hearts from having an attack and dying, or curling up in a ball, pulling into such a depression and grief for what we've committed to other people, in a stupor. If you're all understanding what I'm saying.

- So then--

- I think--

- Go ahead, I'm sorry.

- [Melody] That Mitchell, he had an appoint now, that monitor that's on his leg, he was at work on Friday, or Thursday, this past Thursday, and that thing, the battery went low. And he was way out there by NWTC, somewhere out there, I can't think of the name of it, where was you working at, at a warehouse?

- [Mitchell] B & D Warehouse.

- [Melody] B & D Warehouse, he's taking the bus, showing me that he's making every effort to get his life back on track, and that that thing died, and then the parole officer, they had him put into Brown County Jail Thursday night, he went Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Monday, didn't get out 'til Tuesday morning. Five days of work that he coulda went to, and has been willing to go to, he's been riding the bus, riding a bicycle. He had an appointment at Oneida Behavioral Health's treatment program so that he can get whatever is necessary to take him forward in a positive manner in his life. We recently lost our mother on September 27th to alcoholism. And that was a nightmare. She drank herself to death. And so it hasn't been a piece of cake. We grew up in an alcoholic home in Chicago. We're Native American Indian of the Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican Tribe and Nation. But we don't get no help. So we have to help ourselves, and we have to learn from the mistakes that we make in our lives, because when it comes down to it, at the very end, this life is over in the blink of an eye, like I'm saying, and we stand before the Holy Trinity. And that's where I'm at with my brother.

- So do you have a good relationship with him? And do you expect to be with him and help him through the transition?

- [Melody] Every step of the way.

- Okay.

- [Melody] Because he's one of God's children too, as we all are in this room.

- Okay, any other questions for her? All right, thank you for your time.

- [Rachel] Gerald Harcher.

- [Gerald] Hello.

- Hi.

- [Gerald] This must be a long day for you guys? You started early in the morning?

- No.

- Can I have your address, sir.

- [Gerald] 2107 Ontario Road.

- Go ahead.

- [Gerald] I think Mitchell's on his way to starting life over. I'm married to Melody, so I've been a part of the family for 25 years. Mitchell had a drinking problem. I did too when I was younger. And I quit drinking. Mitchell can call me anytime for if he needs anything, help. Our goal is to get him into housing. Due to the crime that he was charged with, we have three children, we have grandchildren, and all of our grandchildren's stuff has to come out of the house, apparently, for him to stay with us. I trust him around my kids, and I trust him around my grandkids. He's had issues with alcohol, but not really as a sexual predator. His issues are with alcohol. And I bet if he stays sober, he'll do okay.

- All right.

- [Gerald] We need to, what the objective is, is to get him to work where he can get a place so he's not homeless. Staying at the Village Inn is a \$1,200.00 a month hotel room. We were gonna have him come by us, but our daughter's with us with the grandkids, like I said, so he, my wife watches our granddaughters, so we've gotta get him into an apartment.

- Okay.

- [Gerald] So if you approve him, I don't believe he would be a threat. If he needs to talk to somebody he can always call me, my wife, my family.

- All right, okay. Any other questions or comments for him? Or we can let him go? Okay, thank you for your time. All right, any other people?

- No.

- No.

- Okay, anybody want to make a motion?

- I will. I will make a motion to approve Mr. Pamonicutt to move to 428 South Maple Avenue.

- Is there a second?

- Second.

- Okay, let's go ahead and vote.

- [Rachel] The motion fails two to two.

- Okay, let me tell you the reason that I voted no is I didn't like the motion from a standpoint of the fact that he hasn't had an opportunity yet to stick with a program after he's been released from alcoholism. I personally believe that once you're an alcoholic you're an alcoholic for life. And I think not only do you need help with your family, I think you need to be around people that still need help as well because in, like through AA or something, other programs like that, to help you stay on that narrow, because as more people move into those programs you'll see someone who's just starting, and people that have done it for 25 years. And I think that would help a lot, because obviously your offense took place because of alcoholism, and you have a long track record of alcoholism.

- [Mitchell] Okay.

- So I'd be willing to have a motion that would temporarily allow or grant him, upon, that he seeks additional treatment and proof of that treatment on a longterm basis. So I'm kind of thinking in terms of like AA or something like that.

- Are you making the motion address specific and with a return date?

- Yeah, that's what I'm thinking.

- And additional proof, okay.

- Yeah, that's where I'm kinda at. So I'm willing to make a motion to approve Mr. Pamonicutt address specific for a period of 90 days at which time he has to come back and show us information as to additional treatment programs or AA that he's joined and attended meetings to continue in his sobriety.

- I'll second that motion.

- [Mitchell] I'll third it.

- I'm sorry?

- [Mitchell] I'll third that motion.

- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, so just to be really clear, okay, so you're gonna have to come back to us in 90 days, okay, and what we're gonna be looking for is proof that you've joined, whether it's AA or additional groups, and how often you're attending those meetings, to know that you have additional support to stay sober, okay? If we see that, then there's a chance that we may extend it one more time, just to make sure you continue that process, but eventually you'll get to the point where you won't have to come back and see us. All right?

- [Mitchell] Okay.

- Thank you.

- [Gerald] Excuse me?

- Yes?

- [Gerald] So he can, he's approved for the apartment?

- For 90 days and then he has to come back to us and prove that he's in these programs.

- [Melody] Thank you.

- [Gerald] Thank you.

- [Mitchell] Is that it?

- That's it.

- [Mitchell] Thank you very much, guys. Have a good day.

- Next is Mr. Adam Snow.

- Are they going to send you the letter?

- Huh?

- Will they send you--

- We'll send a letter, where do you want the letter sent? To this address?
- To our address, 2107--
- [Deanna] To your address, I got it.
- Okay. Mr. Snow?
- [Gerald] You got it, 2107 Ontario?
- [Deanna] Yep, 2107 Ontario Road.
- Oh sure, okay. All right, Mr. Snow, we're--
- [Deanna] I'll do that tomorrow.
- [Gerald] Thank you very much. Thank you.
- We're here to see the move, your appeal to 839 South Oneida Street.
- [Adam] Correct.
- Is that correct?
- [Adam] Correct.
- All right. We are going to talk about your sexual offenses, just please refer to the person as the victim.
- [Adam] Sure.
- If we do want to talk about your treatment programs you have a right to do that either in public or private. Which would you prefer?
- [Adam] Public is fine.
- Okay. So why don't you tell us about your offenses, what happened, and what you did, and how you were caught.
- [Adam] So, around the time of the offense I was off of work due to medical reasons. I was going to have hernia surgery. So I had it off in preparation for that. Had the surgery, and then was off for an extended period of time for recovery because I couldn't go back to work under restrictions. So during that time while I was off my wife and I had also been trying to have a child. Had a miscarriage right around that same time. And was having a very low point in my life with everything, with the surgery and not being able to work, and it was around the holidays, and then the miscarriage, it really brought me to a low point, and I had sought out... other people to communicate with, females to communicate with, and was using an online messaging app to communicate with those females. I was on a group, joined the group, and started talking to an undercover officer who in turn was impersonating a 15 year old. And during that, there was an exchange of pictures and messages and all with the intent to meet with... With the intent to meet, and I drove down there and met, and then was arrested.
- Drove down where?

- [Adam] To Kimberley, Wisconsin.
- And you knew she was 15?
- [Adam] Yep.
- Okay.
- So was your intent to have sex with the girl?
- [Adam] Yes, at the time.
- Okay. So did you plead guilty to this or not? Or did you fight it in court?
- [Adam] I had just got convicted on October 14th.
- Is that due to trial or a plea?
- [Adam] A plea deal. I believe the plea was no contest, guilty to no contest, or not contest.
- Okay.
- [Adam] So I am still new to the probation, still going through intake, but during this time that I was out on bond I did seek out my own treatment, and I am currently seeing a counselor and have been seeing him since December of 2018. Once I got released on bond I did seek out my own help to see him, and we've started talking about, or we've been talking about since December of 2018, sexual deviancies and depression, which I was also medically diagnosed with shortly after the incident occurred.
- Okay, so are you currently employed too?
- [Adam] Yes.
- Where are you employed at?
- [Adam] Matthews Tire.
- All right.
- This counselor, was this someone that was referred to you? Or you found on your own?
- Yeah.
- Is this someone that is licensed to--
- [Adam] Yep.
- For?
- Yep.

- As a sexual offender training, or counseling, rather?
- [Adam] As of right now, I'm still going through the intake process with my probations officer. So we're still trying to determine the treatment plan. But Tony and I have a treatment plan set up that's not, that wasn't court ordered. Him and I started our own treatment plan.
- I think what she's asking, though, is, is your current counselor, is he certified--
- [Adam] That I don't know.
- In sexual--
- Sexual offender training.
- [Adam] That I don't know.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- And I do have electronic copies of a letter from him that my wife has, and she'll be speaking on my behalf as well, has electronic copies saying that I've been in treatment with him since the time.
- Were you incarcerated the entire period of time between your arrest and the date you plead guilty no contest?
- [Adam] No, I was out on bond. So I was able to be at my home on 839 South Oneida Street. And I've owned that home since June of 2018.
- Since June of '18?
- [Adam] Yeah.
- And have you been residing there this whole time?
- [Adam] No. Currently I reside in the Outagamie County Jail.
- Huber?
- [Adam] On Huber, yeah, on Huber.
- Okay.
- [Adam] So I'm looking to get approved so that way I can go home and take care of my five week old child because growing up I did not have a father, so I've always told myself and my wife that in order to not have happen to me what happened to, or you know, what happened to me not to happen to her, I'd like to be a father and go home and help with the fatherly things.
- All right. Any more questions relating to either his treatment program or his offense?
- I do have just, how long are you going to be on Huber for?

- [Adam] Huber is 18 months. So if I get approved, basically what happened was, I was going to get out on GPS, but my P.O. said that because I reside in the City of Green Bay I'm in a restricted area right now, so she said in order to get approved to be on GPS monitoring, I have to apply for the board of appeal, which is why I'm in front of you guys today.

- So essentially if we approved you, you'd get off Huber and be able to probably stay at home.

- [Adam] Yeah, if I get approved, I will be able to be on GPS monitoring through the Outagamie County Jail to live at my residence, but still report weekly, and continue treatment, and employment.

- All right, okay. Thank you. So I guess we'll hear from our first witness, Andrea Snow.

- Sorry .

- No problem, understand.

- [Andrea] And then I actually, so Rich Noffsin, he's the other one, he's my dad. He was here, he had to leave, but just in case, he wrote a letter, so I don't know if you guys want that or not?

- Sure, why don't we just hear from you first--

- [Andrea] That's fine, yeah.

- And then we'll allow you to read it in. Go ahead.

- [Andrea] So, obviously Adam is my husband. I stayed with him through all of this. He did live with me, we had another baby. And I guess what I just want to talk to is that Adam has a history of online chatting. It's never branched into the teenage realm as it did this time, but for many years I've always asked him to get treatment on his own, and it really wasn't until this point that he finally did. So I really, I mean, I would think that this really was like his rock bottom. I don't think that he would ever do it again, especially with Addison, our daughter, he's really changed. And I believe him when he says he wants to be the best dad that he can be, and the best husband that he can be, and never do something like this again.

- Can I ask you to clarify?

- Yes.

- You said for many years you asked him to get treatment, but you said that the thing with the--

- [Andrea] The chatting?

- The teenagers had, was just starting, so what were you?

- [Andrea] Correct. So he probably has suffered from depression for many years and was never diagnosed. And one of his coping skills is seeking the attention of other people, preferably in a sexual manner. So he would reach out to people that we knew, it would be like trying to flirt with the, trying to get the sexual attention that he wanted. So, we, yeah, we've been dealing with that. We've been together for eight years. But so he sort of saw counselors, they just never worked out or it was never the appropriate treatment, and he's made a big difference with Tony, which I also have a letter from him, it's just on my phone, 'cause he sent it right before this meeting. And he, like he said, he's gonna be seeing if he has to go through any group treatment or anything, it just depends on what the P.O. decides.

- Okay. I would like to see, I know you're holding your baby.
- [Andrea] It's okay, yeah, do you need the--
- I would like to see the letter of the therapist.
- [Andrea] It's just in my email, so.
- Would it be best to send it email so you have it for your records, and then we can look at the phone?
- [Andrea] Send it? Okay, I just need to know what the email is.
- [Rachel] Whenever you're ready.
- [Andrea] I am ready.
- [Rachel] Rachel M A.
- [Andrea] Is Rachel, R-A-C?
- R-A-C-H-E-L.
- [Andrea] H-E-L, okay. M-A?
- [Rachel] M-A, at GreenBayWI.gov.
- [Andrea] Okay. And it was M as in Mary, A as in apple?
- [Rachel] Yes.
- [Andrea] I am sending it right now. And then there's the, whoever wants it first.
- Thank you.
- Go ahead.
- [Andrea] Yeah, oh, sorry.
- Thank you.
- For us blind people.
- That, two of those ago, that letter was so bad it was making me blinder.
- So tell me what you're getting out of the treatment, as they're reading right now.
- [Adam] Like Andrea said, I have learned a lot from treatment, coping skills I never knew existed before treatment. My coping skill, like Andrea said, was to reach out to people and fulfill gratification, Tony and I have called it crappy-happy, to fulfill my crappy-happy up, and then I'd be happy. But realistically it wasn't a true happiness, it was just a fulfillment to the other problems that were going on outside in the real world. So

through treatment I've learned coping skills. I've applied them, and then I learned some things to enhance our relationship as far as love languages and different things like that. So let me ask you a personal question. Now that you have a child, how would you feel if someone tried to molest your daughter, and how would you treat that individual who did that?

- [Adam] I would treat that individual, I would hope that that individual, like me, is open for change, is open for treatment, because unfortunately in today's society, the necessary treatment for some of these mental illnesses is not as readily available as you would think it would be. You can't just stand on the corner and somebody's gonna help you with your depression. You have to reach out and talk to somebody. So if this were to happen with me talking to that individual, would hope to open a new door like I did with myself, the door was opened, and brought the light onto the situation. But as a father, I would be upset, as I am upset with myself that I went down the road that I did, and I still deal with that everyday.

- Okay, all right, any other questions for him or her?

- Did you want to read the letter from him.

- [Andrea] Oh, I can read it, yeah.

- Or whoever.

- [Andrea] If you want to read it, or I can read it aloud.

- Go ahead, please do.

- [Andrea] Okay, so this is from my dad, Richard, so he says, "To whom it may concern. "Adam Snow, my son-in-law, has been "a part of our family unit for more than eight years. "I have watched him with kids of all ages "and there have not been any red-flag moments. "Adam is not a pedophile. "Adam is not a child sexual predator. "What Adam did do is make a life-changing bad decision, "life-changing for not only him, "but for his wife and daughter, "respectively my daughter and granddaughter as well. "Adam has been, and will continue to be, "a good husband and father, a good citizen, "and a good neighbor, when able, helpful to anyone "who asks something of him, willing to give it "until he goes without, steadfast almost to a fault. "Adam's action has caused him to step back "and take time to reflect on himself through therapy. "He has embraced counseling "and continues to seek the help and advice of his therapist. "I have witnessed Adam moving his life into the direction "that will make him the best husband, father, and son-in-law "that he can possibly be. "Adam has been a homeowner in Green Bay since June of 2018, "and he and our daughter lived with us "while they prepared for home ownership "for almost a full year prior to then. "At no time has he given anyone cause for concern or reason "to be fearful of him living in their neighborhood. "I would argue that he is the neighbor "that most people would wish for, "the kind of neighbor that makes your day a little brighter. "As a resident of Green Bay for almost 40 years, "speaking on behalf of some other residents, "I believe Adam should be allowed "to continue to live in the house "that he and his wife are now raising their daughter in, "instead of encountering the further burden "of having to move their family due to a poor decision. "Thank you."

- Okay, thank you for your time.

- [Andrea] Thanks.

- All right, does anybody else want to, any more questions, or do we want to make a motion?

- I will tell you right now that as it stands now, I would vote against, I would vote to deny, because you have not, you've only been recently, did you plead guilty or no contest. You haven't had the type of mental health

counseling and or sexual offender treatment that's necessary. Because here's the thing. I understand depression. But there's depression. And then there's opening the computer. Going to a particular website. And then there's next step is engaging in a conversation with someone, whether it's a real person or not, who is under the age of consent, and driving 30 miles to meet up with that person, knowing that the person is under the age of consent. That's a concern for me, because that happens far too often. And far too often, that 15 year old, is not doing those things because he or she wants to. There's coercion, duress, and things like that. So my motion would be to deny until there is a recommend, not a recommendation, but an assessment, and you've actually started treatment, and have some of the treatment under your belt.

- When do you anticipate intake to be completed?

- [Adam] Within the next 90 days.

- I agree with what was said there, and this is really premature, prior to intake being completed, a program being set up for you, and some degree of success being shown imminently. I realize the burden for your family, but I think it's too soon. You made the motion, I will second it.

- Okay.

- [Rachel] Again, a yes vote is a motion to deny. Motion to deny passes three to one.

- Okay, so here's what I think they're saying, guys, correct me if I'm wrong. So you can obviously come back to the board and reapply for this particular location. I think in doing so you're gonna have to have that assessment complete. And then have hopefully your P.O. has selected or help you select a treatment program that makes sense for you. The quicker you can get into that from a sexual offense standpoint, the quicker you can have some information for us that makes your, the treatment you had already, comparable to where you're going right now, and then it would give us a good process to let you know where you'd need to live, okay with your family, okay?

- [Adam] Okay.

- All right, thanks for your time.

- [Adam] Can I get that signed, pleas?

- Oh, yes.

- [Adam] I just need a signature on the bottom.

- That line, okay.

- [Adam] Right there.

- There you go.

- [Adam] Perfect, thank you, sir.

- Yep. Next is Mr. Theodore Blazek. All right, Mr. Blazek.

- [Theodore] Good evening.

- All right, it's my understanding that you were here last month.
- [Theodore] Correct.
- And we're at a point we have enough people to give you a quorum into your case, so that's why you're back here again.
- [Theodore] Yes.
- So I have reviewed your case. But I just want to make sure, does anybody else have any particular questions for him in regards to the particular conviction?
- No.
- No.
- Okay. So just so I have it clear, so you served four years out of 10, correct?
- [Theodore] I have four years in, yeah, I have 10 years of probation.
- Probation, okay. Just a couple of quick questions from my standpoint. Too, and if we want to talk about your treatment programs, we can do that either in public or private session, which would you prefer?
- [Theodore] Public is fine, and I do have a note on, Jim Drake had given me from the jail, so as a follow-up.
- So are you currently employed?
- [Theodore] Yes.
- Okay, where do you work?
- [Theodore] I work for Little Rapids Corporation as a machine operator.
- Okay, how long have you worked for them?
- [Theodore] A little over two months now.
- Okay.
- [Theodore] I have a lot of experience in the paper industry, and that's why I was brought on.
- Okay, all right. Any more questions relating to his personal situation? And then we'll go ahead and take your letter in regards to--
- [Theodore] I think that's original one.
- All right.
- [Theodore] And that's the addendum.

- I'll let you guys read that addendum while I read the first one.

- [Theodore] Thank you.

- Oh, is that the addendum?

- No, that's the original, I've just got the addendum right here. So he's currently with Jim Drake. So there's no end-date to your treatment currently, right, in terms of an end-date, or do you know if there's an end-date?

- [Theodore] No, there isn't.

- Okay, all right, okay. As they're reading this, did you have anything to say to us in regards to why we should let you live at the location you're looking for here?

- [Theodore] Well, as we've gone through before, I made a huge mistake, there's no doubt about that. A litany of things that went into my pornography addiction and that eventually led into looking at underage pornography, and I have no excuse for that. I made the mistake, I'm never gonna make it again. I destroyed my life once, I'm not gonna do it again. I had gone through... I was going through some very dark times. I was suicidal to the point of looking up ways of... taking pills and things, what would, the only thing that ever stopped me was my son, and my parents, I didn't want them having, first of all finding me, and second of all, just having to go through life with that. A friend of ours committed suicide, that I coached baseball with, my son and his son played baseball together. And that was, do you remember what year that was?

- [Vladimir] 2012.

- [Theodore] 2012. And there were a lot of things that contributed to it. Through Jim's help, I just lived with that all my life, that kind of underlying depression, that I just thought it was normal, it had always been there. And Jim had told me to go to a doctor and get a prescription for citalopram, and it's just, it's been, I couldn't believe the difference.

- So why do you want to move to Green Bay? Now you're in De Pere.

- [Theodore] I own the house in Green Bay, I've owned the house since 1996. My son was born and raised there. It's my home, I have a huge garage with a huge painting studio up on the top. I have a degree in fine arts, I want to resurrect my painting career, it's convenient for me, it's five miles to work and everything else. I'm living with my parents which is, my parents are in their late 80s, and it's not conducive there. My mother's got Alzheimer's, and my dad is starting to get forgetful and things. I like helping out, but it's not a great environment, it's very stressful. Also, with my work, I own a small car. Where they live, I'm gonna have a hard time getting to work when it starts to really snow, it's not, and the last thing I want to do is to lose a great job. And I work all the time, I'm putting in well over 60 hours a week.

- Okay. All right, any other, more questions for him?

- I don't have any.

- Okay. All right. We have some speakers that either want to speak either for or against you, so the first person is Robert Gagan. Sir, could I just have your address please, for the record?

- 231 South Adams Street, Green Bay, is my office address.

- Okay, go ahead.

- Well thank you for your service. I know you have a tough job being here and taking time away from your families. I am a local attorney and my specialty is municipal law, so I've been to these meetings more advising board--

- [Theodore] May I, may I?

- Sure.

- [Theodore] Does this gentleman live within the neighborhood?

- He doesn't have to. Anybody can come and can have comment to any one within the city borders.

- [Theodore] Okay, I've, so me the stress is he's pro bono. His people are getting representation, and I'm not.

- Well, so--

- No, let me just finish though. The thing is is that anybody that wants to speak can get their three minutes to speak. And so the best thing to do is let them speak, and then afterwards we'll discuss, okay?

- Thank you.

- [Theodore] I'll abide.

- And the reason I'm here tonight is my twin nieces live across the street from the residence. They're my God-daughters, and that's why I felt the need to come and weigh-in on behalf of them. The ordinance was adopted by the city council, and it's goal is to promote the, you're supposed to consider factors that promote the health, safety, and welfare of the community. I don't think this appeal would further those goals. I think it should be denied. It's one block from Astor Park. There's kids that walk to and from Aldo Leopold School. There's a lot of kids in the neighborhood. I've been there for a Packer game a few weeks ago, there were kids all over the place. There's a lot of families where both parents have to work, and they leave their kids alone from 3:30 to 5:30. His offense was against children. You know there were 10 counts of child pornography. He plead to six, four were read in, which means the judge can use them for sentencing. This isn't a situation where it was somebody was 19, somebody was 16. It was child pornography. You just had a case earlier tonight where somebody started with child pornography and it turned into something more. That's what all the residents here are concerned about, and so am I as an uncle and a God-father. This wasn't 20 years ago, it was only five years ago, so that isn't a lot of time. A lot of the cases that you see before you were something that happened 20 years ago, that's not the case here. So I recommend you deny it, and here's why. There was 10 counts of child porn, that's serious stuff. One block from Astor Park. The city's trying to promote young families coming back to the city to neighborhoods and revitalize them. If you approve this, this does not further that interest that the city council, and the city wants. I think the safe choice, the right choice is to deny this. There's a lot of neighbors here to speak, some don't wanna speak, have them raise their hands of how many are here, but there's just a lot of young families. I just don't think this is the right fit, it's just not the right location for somebody with these offenses, and this soon out. It's not that far out from when the offenses occurred.

- Okay, one quick question for you, and I'll let you go.

- Yep.

- Do you think anything should, in terms of weighing your particular fears should be, in regards to his treatment programs, it definitely sounds to me that he's made significant, I don't want to say improvement, but

significant change in his life in regards to why he did what he did, and understanding it. Should any of that leeway affect you in terms of your thought process in whether he should or should not be in that neighborhood.

- No, I don't think so. I mean, it's child pornography, that's serious stuff. And all these people have young kids in this neighborhood. And like I said, you're trying to revitalize neighborhoods. This is gonna go against that. So it's not promoting the health, safety, and welfare of the community.

- Okay, thank you.

- Thank you.

- [Theodore] Sorry there, Robert.

- Next person is Nicole Anderson. Ms. Anderson, can I just have your address, please.

- [Nicole] Yep, I live at 1231 Lawe Street.

- Okay, go ahead.

- [Nicole] So I was here last month, and I let you know that I do have two children. And I moved to this house because I am a single mom, and I thought that I would have the protection of living by Astor Park because I thought that people who had been convicted of sex crimes couldn't live within 1,500 feet of the park. And I know that that is a rule, but I kind of have been taught some of those zoning laws that you can override that, but at the same time, that just worries me because I looked up on Google Maps, and he is .2 miles from the park, if you go from the front of his house, circle around to the middle of Astor Park, is .2, and 1,500 feet is .28 miles, just within that, he's too close to the park, and I just don't understand why we would, excuse me, I'm nervous, why we would have that law in place if we're not gonna follow what your rules are? Because then it's kinda like, well, if we don't have to do rule-abiding in the first, like, why is he gonna continue to follow the law if we're not gonna set that precedence in the first place? Do you know what I mean?

- So you understand there is that law?

- [Nicole] Mm hm.

- But there is also a law that, and the city has it, that someone who has been convicted of a sex offense, can make an appeal. So Mr. Blazek is following the law by filing an appeal to live there. So the law's being followed.

- [Nicole] Okay.

- Yep, that's exactly what I was going to say.

- And there's an open hearing, and everybody has the opportunity to speak, whether they live there or not, so.

- Right, thank you, go ahead.

- [Nicole] Oh, I was just gonna say, it's concerning also because I spoke to a friend of mine who works for the police department, and he told me that he was looking at images of children as young as age five, and there are, I mean, children from infants to 17 years old who live in the neighborhood, and they are coming to and from school, and it's just, we're all just here because we're scared and concerned for our children.

- And I ask you the same question I asked Mr. Gagan, so does the fact that he's taken the time to go through sex offender treatment weigh any issue, any concerns for you, that he's actually taking the time to try to change his attitude and why he did the crime in the first place?

- [Nicole] I feel like I'm naturally a compassionate person, but I will say I was bothered last month when he blamed his anxiety and depression on reasons for why he did, what he did in the first place, because I'll admit, I've had depression in my life and I just take to my bed, I don't want to go searching out creepy images online, like that is, I don't know if that's taking a responsibility, I think it's excuse-making, in my opinion.

- Okay, I just wanted to get your take on it.

- Now, were you listening to the other individuals who came here?

- [Nicole] Mm hm.

- And the ones who were denied had not done anything, or had done very little in order to comply with the legal requirements of being a sex offender.

- [Nicole] Mm hm.

- Same thing with regarding counseling, and had really not made much of an effort.

- [Nicole] Mm hm.

- So is there anything, this goes along with what Mr. Gerondale said, is there anything in particular that he has not done that would warrant him not living there?

- [Nicole] I don't know if I quite understand what you're asking me?

- Well what could he do?

- What could he do to make you feel comfortable to live there, that's her question.

- [Nicole] I don't know if I'll ever feel comfortable living there, with him in our neighborhood. I just, I know it's difficult to find placement for people, I understand that, but I just don't know if I'll ever feel comfortable.

- And that's okay, that's what you're here, to state your opinion. So all right, thanks for your time.

- [Nicole] Thank you.

- [Theodore] May I?

- No, we're gonna run through 'em all, okay. Vladimir Blazek.

- [Rachel] That's .

- [Theodore] Fair enough.

- [Vladimir] Hi, Vladimir Blazek, 5841 Nicholson Road.

- Go ahead.

- [Vladimir] Yes, this is my father. I've lived with him since I was born at 1162 Lawe Street. And he divorced my mom in 1999, and he has raised me since. And, yeah, I just, yeah...

- It's okay.

- Take a breath.

- Take a breath, yep.

- [Theodore] My ex lives in California, so it's just been the two of us.

- I think what I'd like to hear from you is, obviously, we have people here today who have concerns about your father, okay?

- [Vladimir] Mm hm.

- What has he done to alleviate, to give you some solace that he's changed his ways?

- [Vladimir] Well, first of all, since he went into prison, he went to, actually before he went to prison, he went to see Jim Drake, and he has spoken with, he has gone to meetings with him since. And then once he went to prison, he continued to go to weekly, how many meetings?

- [Theodore] For a while, there was a program there.

- Okay.

- [Vladimir] Yeah, to meetings all the time within prison. And I would visit him at least a couple of times a week while he was in prison. But I believe he has changed because of those, all of his therapy within the last five years, and also the prescription that he now takes. And I also think... that I'm, I might be an example of... Of why he... Because...

- It's okay, take your time.

- [Vladimir] Yeah, well, I go to college in La Crosse, UW-La Crosse, and uh... Yeah, I just don't really get it.

- Let me ask you this. How old were you when your father went to prison?

- [Vladimir] That was 2014, I was, just before, I was 17.

- Okay.

- [Vladimir] Well actually, just before my 17th birthday.

- Okay, and what have you noticed, if anything, with regard to changes in his behaviors that would either make you hesitant about him moving back, or make you feel more comfortable of him moving back into the family home on Lawe Street.

- [Vladimir] Mm hm, since he's taken the prescription, he's been a lot more open, and I noticed that, thinking back on when I was younger, that I didn't notice some of his things that caused his depression, or symptoms of

his depression, until after I thought about it, and I realized the change within him. And when I spoke with him all the time when I visited with him in prison, and especially now since I actually get to spend so much time with him. Of course I'm in college right now so I can't, but--

- [Theodore] We had the whole summer together though.

- [Vladimir] Yeah, for the whole summer, we've lived together at my grandparents house, and there's just really a difference that I've seen with how the way he acts, his positivity, and that kind of thing.

- Okay.

- Thank you.

- All right, thanks for you time.

- [Vladimir] Actually?

- Go ahead.

- Actually...

- What?

- [Vladimir] Are there any more questions you would have, like, just, I understand these people's frustrations, and, I mean as, thinking if I was a parent too, like I would be very concerned, especially if I had small children. But like I said, he has lived within, he has lived at 1162 Lawe Street since 1996. And there was never a problem before that, before he made his mistake, and which he has said he admits, and that it really did change our lives, obviously for negatively, but what he's doing right now is just trying to move past that, and just trying to rebuild our life so he can just be happy, I guess.

- Okay. All right, thank you.

- [Vladimir] Thank you.

- Thank you.

- Jan Sitzman.

- There's another one in between?

- Oh, did I miss?

- There's an A.J. Blazek.

- A.J. Blazek.

- Oh, right, I'm sorry. I didn't mean to skip you there.

- [A.J.] That's okay.

- Can I have your address please, sir.
- [A.J.] 3562 County Road OO, De Pere, Wisconsin.
- Go ahead.
- [A.J.] Okay, I just have two points.
- What is your relationship?
- [A.J.] That's my brother.
- [Theodore] He's my--
- Oh, okay.
- [Theodore] That's my little brother.
- [A.J.] My two points would be, the crimes that were committed, he's already served the jail time, and served the punishment to fit the crime. How much more can be done? Because he's going through the treatments, and all sorts of things like that to correct all this stuff. And my other question is, where in the City of Green Bay could you be located that you're not that far from a park or a school, or a thing, you'd be pretty hard pressed to find an area like that?
- There is only very small areas within Green Bay that you could live, and stay the 1,500 feet away, there is. And the citizens vote their aldermen in place, and then they vote for a law, and that's how democracy works.
- [A.J.] Oh, yes.
- And so, but then they also said, is that, hey there is exceptions to every rule, and that's why this board was created.
- [A.J.] Yes.
- So, is there anything else you'd like to say?
- [A.J.] Since he's been on, as far as the medication stuff, for the treatments for depression, he's a lot more even-keeled, so that's, 'cause I know, so living with some other folks that have depression, yeah, it's, there's ups and downs, and once you're on your specific medication, and you have it dialed in, life's a lot better.
- All right, okay, thank you.
- [A.J.] Yes sir.
- Okay, Jan Sitzman.
- [Jan] 735 Dauphin Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin.
- Okay, go ahead, sir.

- [Jan] I guess I'm not near as prepared as everybody. Literally called me up yesterday and said hey, you wanna come down, and I'm like. All I can do is vote for his character, most of the time. I think, I didn't know he was on, depressed and stuff like that, but I don't think he's using that that much. I think he's taking responsibility for his actions, and stuff like that, and as far as I know, I don't think he's, besides this, he's ever been in trouble with hardly anything. I've known him and his family for like 40, 50 years, we grew up out together and stuff like that. And I don't know, there's not much I can say, I just, you know, feel that there's really no, there shouldn't be any problem or anything. He's lived there for how many years, 16, how many years?

- [Theodore] I bought the house in '96.

- [Jan] Yeah, '96, and stuff like that, and I've known him since then, and I was just, when this came up I was just actually, he was really hesitant about even telling me anything, that something had happened and everything like that. And like I said, so I just, you know, I don't see that there would be any major problem. He seems to be following all the stuff he has to do, and he's got a job and everything like that, and yeah, he's lost like four years of his life outta this too.

- I have--

- Yeah, I was, oh I'm sorry, no go ahead, go ahead, I'm sorry.

- I have a few questions for you. When did you find out about the crime that Mr. Blazek committed.

- [Jan] Yeah, you told me, after I was up at that one day, you said you might? How many--

- Did you know before he plead guilty, or no contest?

- [Theodore] Yes.

- [Jan] Yeah, I knew before, were you pleading guilty, or you were going to trial or?

- [Theodore] Yeah, well, because I went directly to county.

- I need him to answer, and, yes.

- [Jan] Okay, well I wasn't sure exactly if he was--

- I don't need an exact date. Was it before he went to prison?

- [Jan] Oh, it was before he went to prison, he told me, but it was after, I know it was after a while because I think he was going through this--

- I know, but I just need, just when, was it before he went to prison?

- [Jan] Yeah, it was before he went to prison.

- Okay, now, what is your relationship with him? Are you friends, are you friends of the family and you happen to know Mr. Blazek?

- [Jan] We are friends and family, we both grew up, out, we were a mile or so away out in the country and stuff like that. So I know him, him, his sisters, brothers, family and stuff, I know most of the family and stuff like that, friends.

- And where you live, how close is it to where, the Lawe Street address?
- [Jan] I live over in Allouez, so I would say, one, two, two, three miles?
- [Theodore] A couple of miles.
- Okay, I need him to answer, thank you.
- [Jan] Oh, I'm sorry, I'm looking at him, so it's my fault too.
- Yes.
- [Jan] Yeah, two, three miles I would say.
- Okay. And my other question for you is this. Do you have grandchildren?
- [Jan] No, I'm single.
- Okay. No further questions.
- Okay, thank you for your time.
- [Jan] Okay, thank you.
- [Theodore] He was actually the best man at my wedding.
- Sir, that's not really relevant. It's not relevant.
- Again, we're just trying to get through all of them, and then I'll give you an opportunity. So Tom Ysebaert.
- Hello again.
- Can I have your address real quick.
- Tom Ysebaert, 1169 Lawe Street.
- Okay, go ahead.
- First of all, a very sincere apology to the people who were here last time. I know I recognize a couple of you. I was in here pretty hot. It was probably a hot room for a lot of people in here that day, and I was part of that, and I apologize. I've had a lot of time to reflect on it. Sitting here, and seeing other cases, and hearing what you guys put up with is, quite frankly, baffling. It's desensitized me already in the last couple of hours, and I can't imagine how you guys feel in some of the stuff you see and what you have to rule on, so thank you for that. We live directly across from where Ted's trying to move back in. My wife and our twin daughters, all as the same as the many people we have here. And last time I didn't really get a chance to state the facts. Bob is my brother-in-law. He stated probably as eloquent as anybody would be able to, but, you know, the big concern for me is I hear talk about being depressed and taking medicine and that everything is better, and I think you guys have probably seen and been through enough and heard enough to know that taking citalopram does not change someone from whatever may make them want to do these things. I've had depression, anxiety a lot in my life. Have in fact been on citalopram at one point in my life. And it's not even that, but it's just hearing that it doesn't sound like there's really taking onus on what has happened. And I understand that life has been very

hard. There's a lot of changes, it sounds like he is going through all the treatments and doing the things he's supposed to. That is good to hear, and I do believe in being an empathetic person and second chances. I just don't want them around our house. You can take a look at that map, and there's a safe zone. You guys know where we're trying to do this here. There is no red flags in this area here. Why should there start now? Why should my children suddenly have to be afraid to live in the home that we just bought a few years ago, a home which I don't know how or why, but the sex offenders registry did not pop up a blip on here. I believe there was some time of quick claim deed or something on the property that kept us from seeing that information? 10 counts, 10 felony counts, of child pornography. Again, as mentioned before, this is not light stuff. This is not something that was just clicked on, or a minimal thing. Other charges as well that with the plea deal, who knows what they might've been. I've seen first hand, as well as a couple of neighbors, that it seems to me that the person is very aggressive, very angry. We had actually a one-on-one incident, in fact the day after the last meeting here. There was a, he had come over to that home, for whatever reason, and I feel looking back that maybe I took a little bit of a bait, but he had parked directly in front of our home that day. Why? I don't know. All of a sudden, the day after our meeting, he parked directly in front of our house. He'd never done that before, he's never done it since. It concerned my wife and my daughters. My daughters ran and my wife came to me, and said dad, you know, that guy's in front of our house, and parked right in front of our house. And so I went outside. I will admit, realizing now, that I engaged in the initial conversation. He was coming down the driveway with his garbage cans. And I had said, you know, it's an interesting choice to park today. He immediately got extremely aggressive, angry, swearing, mother-F-er, bitch, this and that, what're ya gonna fucking do about it? I then tried to keep my calm and mention that he was driving a vehicle that was not registered at that time. Now I see it is. And he continued to be extremely aggressive, and I mean, I couldn't believe it. I've seen and dealt with some people in my time, and this guy snapped.

- Okay, kinda wrap it up, we're going about three minutes, so.

- [Tom] So subsequently he got in the vehicle, and took off saying something to the effect of your family can blow me. I had called the police. Have an incident report. It's my understanding he went down there and tried to head it off as well. But my main points, over four years in state penitentiary. Special bulletin notification on this guy. This is not on everybody that's released from the Department of Corrections, there's a special bulletin notification. Wisconsin law does not record special notifications for all offenders released from prison. They are released from prison for mental health facility, moved to Wisconsin, they are served only for people that are pose a greater risk to the community, and a threat to their community. This is not on every sex offender that you guys deal with. It is on him. I don't feel like he's a safe person to be around the area. I don't want him around our family in our area, and I hope you guys see it the same. I understand you deal with much worse than what we're dealing with here, but I really don't feel like it's a safe, in the matter of safety and building that area, I don't think it's a good call.

- Okay.

- I really don't.

- Thank you for your time.

- Thank you.

- Tim Hattendorf.

- How're you doing?

- Can I get your address, Tim.

- Tim Hattendorf, 1145 Lawe Street. I've lived there for about 15 years. And I'm also a firefighter for the City of Green Bay, and my wife is a nurse, so we work odd hours. So I'm gone for 24 hours, my wife is at work, she works at Bellin, so there's times when my kids are at home by themselves. I've got a 14 year old, I've got a 12 year old, and I've got an 11 year old, two girls, one boy. So the fact that he's moving into a house catty-corner from me, directly across the street concerns me, a great deal.

- Did you know him prior to his?

- No, no, did not.

- Okay,

- But you lived at the same time he lived there.

- Same time, I did not know him, I never saw him before, had no idea that he lived there. So I, no, I had no idea.

- Okay.

- The uniqueness of Lawe Street is that it's not a through street. So the kids that are on our street, and there's a ton of kids, feel safe in the front yard as much as in the back yard. We have huge back yards, but they play in the front because they go from house to house. My kids are friends with their kids, there's kids down the road, they all traverse to the cul-de-sac that's at the end of Lawe Street, that's one block over, it's a street where we see people coming, there's not a steady flow of traffic, we know exactly whose kids are there. This is why I lived in this house. When they opened up residency for firefighters, I had the option to move out of the city, I chose to stay in that house because we loved that. It was the old part of the town that I was used to growing up in, where the kids ran from house to house under the street lights. It felt like community. That's why we're there. If he moves in, there's gonna be the talk with me and my wife as to whether or not we're gonna put that house up for sale, I've gotta be honest with you. And I don't want to do that. Because right now, that neighborhood is going in the right direction. We got young families moving in. We've got brand new kids coming up. All these kids are friends. And to have someone like this in our neighborhood, that deeply troubles me. Yes, there are little itty bitty pieces of the city that are only set up for people with his history to live in, it's that way for a reason. Because the people of the City of Green Bay chose to elect people who would keep us safe. That's why there's only tiny slivers of areas where these people can live. And I like it that way. I wanna keep it that way.

- Okay, so do you give any credence to his treatment programs?

- No, it's too close. And you got, it's only been five years, right? It's only been five years.

- Mm hm.

- He's gotta do it because he has to do it. He doesn't have any other choice, right? You guys being on this board know that sexual predators have the biggest recidivism rate of any criminals out there, right?

- Yep.

- Mm mm.

- [Tim] Yes, that is true. They're huge recidivists.

- As are drug addicts.

- [Tim] Well that's true.

- And alcoholics.

- [Tim] That's right. And when you, like he said, he made a mistake, and it changed his life. Well, people that drive drunk, they make one life mistake, and it costs somebody their life, right? There are consequences to their actions.

- Mm hm, and, as, just so it's clear.

- [Tim] Sure.

- I don't want to go off on too much of a tangent here, but I was a prosecutor for over 20 years in LA County. And I handled sex offenses.

- [Tim] Mm hm.

- Various types. And the one thing that I had to be aware of, is that given the nature of the crime, and given the type of conduct as to whether or not there was actual physical conduct on the perpetrator and the victim, is something that I had to take into consideration.

- [Tim] Right, but that's always in the progression, right, it starts with what he did?

- No.

- [Tim] And then it moves up.

- But we don't have anything else right now--

- [Tim] Well I know, that's because he got caught.

- Don't interrupt me, please, sir. What we're getting at is this. This is what we have before us.

- [Tim] Mm hm.

- We can't punish people for what they might do, unless, for example, we're saying no, we don't think you're a good risk to move into this area if you haven't done everything you're supposed to do. Right?

- [Tim] Mm hm.

- And when you're talking about sex offenders, yes, some do commit new crimes, as do drug addicts, and people commit OWIs, and lives are taken, right?

- [Tim] Mm hm.

- Now, knowing that you have someone in your neighborhood who has 11 OWIs, and has killed someone, would that be alarming to you?

- [Tim] It sure would. But what alarms me more is my children, and we put them in a much higher regard than anything else, correct?
- And your child--
- [Tim] So I'm trying to protect my children.
- Understood. What more can anybody, similarly situated, do?
- [Tim] Find a house that isn't in the City of Green Bay that's right next to a park where there's a ton of kids, that's what they can do.
- Okay, where would that--
- I don't care.
- Not within the Green Bay--
- [Tim] I don't know, where? Find a spot that is not around kids.
- And what about the fact that he already--
- [Tim] That's part of the consequences.
- No that is not part of the consequence within the City of Green--
- I believe it is.
- We've already told you that there's the general city ordinance, and then there's the appeal process.
- [Tim] Right, and I'm appealing to you to make the decision.
- No, he's appealing to you. And you're telling us why you're uncomfortable with that.
- [Tim] And that's what I'm doing right now.
- Right. And what we would like to know is what else?
- [Tim] What else what?
- What else, is that that as long as they don't live right by you? Is it okay if they live near someone else?
- [Tim] Well it's okay if they live somewhere where they're not around kids, yeah.
- But there are other--
- [Tim] I think he needs more time, I mean, Five years?
- How much time?

- [Tim] I don't know, you tell me, I'm not his counselor.
- Right. And we're telling you, based on what we've seen, that, you've heard the other individuals, correct?
- [Tim] Mm hm.
- And they didn't do, a lot of them didn't do anything. At all. Would you be concerned about them?
- [Tim] Well, yeah.
- Okay.
- [Tim] Yeah, I would be concerned, just as I am concerned about him.
- Okay, let's move on because we have only so much time.
- Okay, yeah.
- Thank you, sir. Michelle Yseabaert.
- She had to leave, she had to go back to work. That's my wife.
- Okay, Autumn Baumler.
- [Autumn] Baumler.
- Sorry, I can't. This is way too small, sorry.
- Well it was pencil, I'm not used to pencils.
- No, but I mean, even on this, it's way too small.
- Oh, 1023 Lawe Street.
- Okay, go ahead.
- I, everything that's already been said, I was here to say the exact same things. The only thing that I can add differently is I work from home, I have for two years now. So I see kinda what goes on during the day in this neighborhood, at night in this neighborhood. School's on, school's off, this neighborhood is filled with kids 24/7. And it isn't like that everywhere. I have actually, my ex-husband, he lives in De Pere, so my first son has a neighborhood that have no kids in it. I mean literally, they don't trick or treat, they don't play, they're not super close to a park, you don't see kids walking around, so not every neighborhood is like this neighborhood. I've been here since 2011. It is extremely unique. People bring their kids into this neighborhood for trick or treat, people bring their kids to this neighborhood because we have a beautiful huge park that includes a pool. So there's kids coming and going from this pool all day long. Some of the kids are in their swimsuits, they've got their beach bags around their, I mean, it's constant. And that's not an exaggeration to, it is what it is. And so do I believe that people make mistakes, yes. Do I believe that people can rehab themselves, and go through the treatment and go through the steps and become a productive member of society, I do. Do I think this is the right fit, this neighborhood, where people purposefully come to this neighborhood because it's safe and it's fun and there's activities for kids, we have party on Lawe Street for Halloween, where people bring, there's carloads, there's cars up and down our roads because people are bringing their kids to our neighborhood. So

it's not just the kids that live there, which it's full of, it's also people purposefully coming to this neighborhood because it is known for the comradery and the kids and the fun and the events, and that has nothing to do with the park, this is other stuff that goes on. We have a kiddie carnival at the park. We have a fireworks show at the park, there are several events, it's different.

- So you've lived there since 2011.

- Yeah.

- Did you know him prior to his conviction?

- No.

- Okay.

- No.

- Okay.

- So yeah, that's all I wanted to add, is I do think there is a place for him. I do think he can work towards everything you guys were saying, I'm not sitting here saying, no he should be exiled on an island, I'm not saying that. I'm saying there are neighborhoods that probably aren't as filled with kids as this neighborhood is.

- Okay. All right, thank you.

- Yep.

- All right, I believe that was--

- May I speak, I'm sorry, I didn't fill out a form. It would just be one or two minutes. Okay, thank you so much.

- Can I have your name and address.

- Darlene Esquivel, 1166 Lawe Street.

- Go ahead.

- Can you spell the last name?

- E-S-Q-U-I-V-E-L. I was also here last month, and I spoke. I just, when I went home from that meeting, I just kept thinking to myself, the right, I know that we can't punish Mr. Blazek for something he hasn't done. But the risk, that's what we're here talking about. We're talking about the risk. And do you know what the risk is to me? The biggest risk? Is my nine year old daughter who lives right next door. My nine year old daughter knows what Mr. Blazek did. She doesn't, when she sees his car pull up in the driveway, she will come inside. She was across the street playing, she immediately saw him pull up, and she ran inside. And you're telling me that my nine year old daughter has to live like that, in her own home, because of the risk, that is the risk.

- How long have you lived in the home?

- We bought the home April 9th of 2018.

- Okay, just want to know how long you've lived there.
- So not very long.
- Okay.
- When we originally bought the home it was being rented. So we had no idea.
- Okay, I just wanted to know if you had known him prior to his conviction.
- No, I did not.
- Okay.
- No I did not. And like I said, I do believe that there maybe is a place for him, I just don't think, I don't understand why he wants to return there. I understand it's his home. But why would he want to go back to the place where A, he's more than likely gonna be alone, again, which is one of the things that he was so-called depressed about, because he was by himself, he didn't have anything else to do, he was, you know, I just don't see where circumstances are set up to make this a positive thing for him to continue forward. I just don't understand that. And I just don't understand how his right to appeal, which he has, is greater than my right to appeal for him to not live there.
- It's not, that's why you're able to speak.
- But I just feel like there is, like I have this burden to, you know, I don't know, that's just how I feel. I'm sorry, it just gets--
- I think the thing that most people don't understand is that the vast majority of our meetings, no one attends.
- I was very surprised that everyone prior to Mr. Blazek didn't have anyone...
- Against.
- No.
- From their community, yep.
- And I don't know if it's they're not informed, or they just don't care, but obviously our neighborhood cares.
- Yep, okay, thank you for your time.
- Thank you.
- Thank you.
- Okay, we're gonna end testimony in regards to your appeal. And so I promised you an opportunity to speak after all the testimony was done, so go ahead.
- [Theodore] Okay, first of all, I understand that people have misgivings about sex offenders moving near them. I get that. I've lived in that neighborhood longer than all of these people. The next door, the house that the Esquivels lived in used to be owned by my friend, Denise, who brought up two children, two girls, who were

my son's age. One was only three weeks younger. And there were kids, these kids didn't just appear on the Lawe Street area. There's always been kids around. Now, if I never had any kind of hands-on crime or anything of that nature, what I did was wrong. But I never did anything with any children and never would. If I didn't do it then, when I had such a clean record that I could be an insurance broker, you've gotta be just squeaky clean, if I never did anything then, why would I do it now when I'm under a microscope. I understand that, and I have to live by all those rules, and I will, I have and I will. There is no way I'm ever gonna do anything to anybody's children. And the Esquivels, when I had discussion with Mr., you can ask him, have I, he said he didn't want me talking to his family, that's been five, six weeks at least, closer to two months, you can ask him, have I addressed any of them? No, I abide by their request. If Mr. Ysebaert, who has pretty much brought everyone here together, and that is his right, and his characterization of the night after last time, is laughable, but if he doesn't want me to talk to him, to anything, I won't. I'm not looking for trouble. I just want to move back into my home and move on with my life and do the right things. I'm working, I'm working all the time, I'm hardly gonna be home anyway, but during the summer, to be able to paint up in my painting studio, resurrect my painting career and that, I have no interest in being a problem. That's just, it would end for me like that, if I get in trouble... My P.O.'s gonna know about it. And I'd, you know, probably end up getting, what's the term?

- Revocated.

- [Theodore] Revocated, I certainly don't want to get revocated.

- A question for you.

- [Theodore] Mm hm.

- So why do you, well let me say, let me rephrase this. Is it a problem for you to live in a place where no one wants you there?

- [Theodore] There are people around who are friends of mine and stuff, but that, frankly, no. And I don't mean that flippantly, but there's always people in neighborhoods that someone else doesn't like or whatever. And this idea that it's this pristine neighborhood that nothing has ever happened, Mr. Ysebaert's home, and this is nothing on him, because he bought the home just within the last few years from my understanding, but 10 years ago, that was a drug house, that the owner was a slumlord who used to rent out rooms. They had locks on every door, 'cause I talked to the guy who bought it finally from him. And I'd seen drug transactions. There was two doors down from Astor Park on Clay Street, used to be a crack house. So this idea, and I've had cars, my cars broken into a couple of times over the years, and there's always things that happen in a neighborhood. This idea that nothing ever can happen, that it is pristine, it's just not reality.

- Okay.

- [Theodore] But I can guarantee you, I'm not going to be a problem.

- All right, appreciate--

- I have a question.

- All right, go ahead.

- Sure.

- Has Alderman Galvin talked to you, or have you talked to him, your alderman?

- No, no.
- Okay, I'm just curious, thank you.
- [Theodore] No I didn't, was he alderman before 2015?
- No, since your conviction?
- No, not since 2015.
- Since your conviction and release?
- [Theodore] Okay, no, I--
- He's on his second term right now, so he was...
- [Theodore] No, I have not met him.
- Okay.
- Okay.
- All right, thank you for your comments. Is there any more questions directly for him? All right, then I'm going to ask for anybody to make a motion in regards to his application.
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve Mr. Blazek to 1162 Lawe Street, address specific.
- Is there a second?
- I second.
- All right, let's go ahead and vote.
- I will be, yeah.
- Okay.
- Mm hm.
- [Rachel] Motion passes two to one to one.
- Okay, sir, you have been approved to move to 1162 Lawe Street, address specific. If you do change that address, you would have to come back to this board for approval.
- [Theodore] Okay.
- Where do you want the information sent?
- [Theodore] To 1162, please.

- Okay, thank you.
- Good luck.
- Next appeal is Mr. Joseph Coppersmith.
- Mr. Blazek? Just, I just want to make sure that you...
- Oh yeah.
- Walk out.
- Okay, Mr. Coppersmith. We looking to hear your appeal to move to 1145 University Avenue, upper?
- [Joseph] Yes.
- Okay, and you're currently living at the TLP?
- [Joseph] No, I'm living at the--
- [Deanna] He just has to bring documentation.
- Oh, his documentation, okay.
- [Deanna] Pay stubs.
- [Theodore] Thank you very much.
- Okay.
- [Joseph] I got everything.
- I'm sorry, I moved back to the bottom here. Okay, so we want to have proof of your completion of your AOD program, pay check stub and documentation showing he has been referred to an aftercare. Okay, so we do have a copy of his AOD residential program completed.
- Okay.
- All right.
- Pay stubs.
- [Joseph] Pay stubs.
- The most current one is 11-8 for American Foods. And he is referred to aftercare, let's see here. Okay, can, you guys on the internet right now?
- [Rachel] Yeah.

- Okay, can you just verify that this Pablo Serna M-S-L-P-C is an actual individual. Just 'cause it's handwritten, it's not on any stationery, I just want to make sure that's--

- [Deanna] I think it's the same Pablo.

- Is it the same Pablo?

- [Deanna] I think it's the same one, it keeps coming up.

- Okay.

- [Joseph] I just go that today, 'cause, today was the first day I got to go, the first chance I had to talk to him about getting something to present the board for--

- Okay. All right, does anybody have any questions for him?

- No.

- How are things been going?

- [Joseph] Very busy. I've been working from 4:50 'til 4:30 everyday, and then on the weekends I help out my cousin and my sister. So I keep myself very busy.

- Okay.

- All right. Okay. Are we good?

- [Rachel] I'm looking up Henger Enterprises, and seeing if there's a Pablo Serna. I looked up Pablo Serna, and it didn't get a hit.

- [Rachel] I just did. I was spelling the last name incorrect. The person is a licensed therapist.

- Okay. All right, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to Mr. Coppersmith.

- Motion to approve, address specific.

- I'll second.

- [Rachel] So that was issued by?

- Melissa.

- Melissa.

- [Rachel] Thank you. Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, sir, would you like that sent to that address?

- [Joseph] Yes, please.

- Okay, will do. Thank you for your time.
- [Joseph] Thank you, have a good day.
- You too.
- You too.
- Next is Mr. Christopher Flory.
- I'm trying not to sneeze.
- Okay so we're looking to get some information to you in terms of documentation from your treatment programs.
- [Christopher] Yes. I have, this is the folder they gave me, that I got from them. Those are the two therapists that I'm seeing at Dynamic Family Solutions for MRT, which is Moral Reconation Therapy. I was reevaluated through the DOC. At this time I do not need sex offender treatment.
- [Christopher] Based on COMPASS.
- Do you have anything to prove that?
- [Christopher] That's what my agent told me. She goes, based on your COMPASS evaluation, and based on your pseudo-psycho evaluation that she gave me as well, she recommended MRT right now. So that's what the program she started me on.
- Yeah, I see it's 7:30, so there's no way--
- [Christopher] Yeah, so there's no way to contact Moira right now. I was hoping we could talk earlier.
- What do you guys want to do here, because this is--
- [Christopher] I did see her this morning.
- That's--
- [Christopher] And talked to her, this is what she told me to bring because she didn't have time to prepare anything for me as well.
- Well see, we're kind of just stuck.
- Okay, I can, to move things along, I would make a motion to deny. And we need formal documentation from the same--
- [Christopher] From the therapist and from her, and I had explained that this morning when I was talking to Moira. She said bringing my book would be working, showing that I was actually working the programs, having therapists sign off on the program. And I said I don't think it's gonna be enough for them. But I did at least try.
- Yep.

- I understand, it's just... Would you be okay with--

- 30 days?

- 30 days, sure. Motion to approve address specific for a period of 30 days, and to return with documentation on letterhead from both the parole agent and the therapist that address the issues of treatment, number of times you've gone, your participation level, in addition to the COMPASS evaluations based on--

- [Christopher] Yeah, that's more or less the law. I mean, I remember seeing the computer screen when she showed me that's as much as she could do.

- Okay.

- She needs to state that.

- Yeah. Okay, so I'll second that motion.

- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, sir, it is super important you do this, next time you may not be so lucky. It may be just denied next time. So they need to come through with you on this information.

- [Christopher] Like I said, I saw her this morning, I was trying to get this done, because she knew about this too. But with the office switching in the building, that what's screwing me up with her.

- Then you need to go in quicker.

- [Christopher] Yeah, and I was trying last week even. But like I said, we did start the MRT program which is what she recommended at this moment, so.

- Okay, next up, thank you for your time. Mr. Pitt.

- One second, Mr. Pitt. Okay, last time we had seen you...

- [Bryan] It's been a long time.

- It was July of 2011.

- [Bryan] Yes.

- So why are you looking to move?

- [Bryan] I actually have been homeless ever since, shortly after that. I seen you guys in 2012 as well.

- Mm mm.

- No, we don't have that.

- No, 2011.

- 'Cause in 2011 I was approved to move into 1949 University Avenue, and then in 2012 I was approved to move to 1157 University Avenue.

- No, we don't have that. So why have you been homeless so long?

- [Bryan] I have been homeless since 2014 after I got out, after I lost my place that I originally thought you guys would still have record of from 1157 University Avenue. I had lost my place, I was homeless at that time. I had lied to my P.O. and I had got put up for an ATR. After that I was put into the TLP, which at the time made it that, that the new ruling made it that I didn't have to come in front of you.

- Right, yep.

- [Bryan] So with that I was just able to stay there, and then when my three months was up in July of 2014 I was put onto the GPS monitoring and I've been on GPS monitoring ever since because of me being homeless. I have worked periodically through that. Every time I start getting, to where it gets to where I feel I'm gonna be, I'm finally gonna be able to start putting money away and getting myself put back to a different place, to get another place to live, I either botch it up because I fail to go to work or the place that I was working for I quit because they start messing around with my hours or they start asking too much of me and I can't perform. The address I'm asking you for today is the address of my ex who also has my eldest child who is nine years old. The reason that we are putting this application in right now is because my nine year old would love, my nine year old wants me to be able to live with her. She wants to have her daddy at home. I see my daughter every single day right now. And it kills her every time I have to leave because she goes, daddy, when are you going to be able to stay here? Like, I don't know yet, honey, I have to wait to see.

- So are you, currently have a job now, or not?

- [Bryan] I am currently not employed through an actual job. I am actually right now helping a lady that lives on the reservation, to help clean up her yard. I have been putting applications in, I have not heard anything back yet at this point in time.

- Which reservation?

- [Bryan] On the Oneida Reservation. The only reason I'm actually able to put this in is because my ex is actually not really asking for me to pay her any money right now, just to help her with snow removal, grass cutting, and stuff like that. That is the reason we are putting this request before you today, and because of my nine year old daughter.

- All right. Any other direct questions for him?

- Are you in any treatment?

- [Bryan] I have gone through whatever treatments, I have gone through other treatments that my P.O. has asked of me. I completed my sex offender treatment back in 2012. I do not have any proof of that with me right now because Attic failed to contact me to tell me whether or not they could just print off a copy off at the, down at Attic, or if they have to had it mailed to me from Madison. I had spoken with them about a week and a half prior to this meeting. They said they'd get back ahold of me within a couple of days and they never did. I have been dealing with a car issue, which made it so I couldn't get over there today, I apologize. I've also gone through the aftercare program through Attic. My SOT treatment was done with Rebecca some time ago. My SOT treatment, I cannot, my aftercare treatment, I can't remember who the facilitator was, it has been a few years since I have completed that one. I have, when I did submit my application, present you with the most recent thing I have completed, which was a cognitive thinking class in which we went through, much like

the SOT treatment, that it was looking at the cognitive thinking of your thoughts, feelings, and behaviors, that your thoughts and feelings directly correlate with your behaviors. I learned that you can find ways of changing your thinking dealing with certain things as of you don't always have to put it into--

- So besides being on GPS, have you done any drug testing, are they doing any drug testing on you or anything like that?

- [Bryan] I have not been drug tested since the last time they updated the stuff on the GPS monitoring. I have gone through my AOD assessment. It was determined at that point in time that I did not need it.

- Okay.

- [Bryan] That was through Options back in what is it, 2011, 2012, I can't remember off the top of my head. I'm sorry.

- Okay. All right, any other, more questions for him? All right, Alexandra Maquire.

- [Bryan] Yes.

- Ms. Maquire, can you just give your address for me, please, real quick.

- 434 South Baird Street, Green Bay.

- Go ahead.

- I can hear the, you guys are probably wondering why I'm letting him, or want him to move in with me. He's been really active in our daughter's lives more and more, and I've seen beneficial stuff. She's being harder for me, she's special needs. So it is a struggle, 'cause with the struggle of being a single parent. I think all around it would help her. It has helped her because he has spent every day, as he's stated. I think it would be beneficial for him because being homeless, no one wants to be homeless, and it's very hard to get out of. And so I'm trying to give him the opportunity to better himself, and to... I won't be charging him anything because I think that until he can get himself off, I won't discuss that I think, and it benefits me because I can finally go hey, you're here, you can step in and be the parent. So anyway, I don't feel that he's a risk or danger to my daughter or to any other child. And I think he's learned from his lesson. And he's almost done with his probation and all that, so.

- [Bryan] Oh yeah, I actually completed my probation in February 17th of this very next year.

- Okay. All right, thank you for your time.

- Thank you.

- Any more questions for him, or does anybody want to make a motion? I'm going to make a motion to allow Mr. Pitt to stay at 434 South Baird Street, address specific.

- I'll second.

- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.

- All right sir, would you want that sent to that location?

- [Bryan] I actually have to ask one question with that, do you also send the verification letter to my P.O. as well?

- Yes.

- [Bryan] Okay, then, yes, send it to the address then, that is put onto the application please.

- All right, thank you.

- [Bryan] Thank you.

- Next is Tammy DeBeck. I'm just reading of your last time you were here, so. Okay, so the last time you were here you were trying to move to 1730 Badger Street?

- [Tammy] That's correct.

- And now you're looking to move to 812 Lincoln, right?

- [Tammy] Yes.

- Okay, and so what have you been doing in between?

- [Tammy] I have been working and trying to find more employment.

- No, where have you been living?

- [Tammy] I have been couch-surfing between friends' houses.

- Okay.

- [Tammy] The first address that you read off I had to let pass because I had just literally started a job, and I hadn't gotten any paychecks at the time.

- Okay.

- [Tammy] So I've been house couch-surfing ever since.

- So how long have you had your current position?

- [Tammy] I'm not, what do you mean, as far as work?

- Yes.

- [Tammy] I'm currently not working right now.

- Okay, so how are you going to afford this location?

- [Tammy] It's with my best friend. And, I mean, she stays there. And I help out with food and stuff like that. so I basically it's like I'm staying there rent-free until I can save up money to get my own place.

- Okay. When's the last time you worked?
- [Tammy] In October.
- Of this year?
- [Tammy] Of this year.
- And how long did you have that position?
- [Tammy] I was there for three days and they said it was not a good fit for me.
- Okay.
- And anything before that, then, was there?
- [Tammy] Before that, I mean, I've worked like six and a half months over at Salm Partners in Denmark.
- Okay. All right, is there any other questions for her? You know, I guess, why do you think you're having, one of the issues that people have that are child sexual offenders, that they can't have consistency in their life, that's what leads to problems and potential re-offenses. So I'm a little concerned. It seems like from the last time we saw you you had a lot of turmoil in the last six, seven months.
- [Tammy] Right.
- How are you going to break that cycle?
- [Tammy] Well, I'm actively meeting with my probation officer working on a relapse prevention plan, and I'm also seeing Dr. Drake and working with him.
- How often do you see him?
- [Tammy] Every week, once a week. In fact I see both of them tomorrow. And we're, you know, he's helping me realize what the difference between PIGs and SUDs are and stuff like that, and I believe that my crime was a PIG, which stands for Problematic Immediate Gratification. And so as far as turmoil goes, I'm learning skills on how to deal with all of that through my probation office and with Dr. Drake.
- Okay, I'm sorry about asking about your treatment program. I didn't mean to do that, only because you have the right to do that in private session.
- [Tammy] Oh, I don't mind, I'm open.
- Okay. Any other questions for her?
- None.
- Okay, does anybody want to make a motion?
- Is there anybody here on her behalf?

- [Rachel] No, I don't show--
- [Tammy] My friend just walked in actually.
- Oh, okay, I thought there was somebody.
- I didn't see anybody.
- Okay. Motion to approve at address specific.
- Okay is there a second?
- Yes, I second.
- [Rachel] Motion passes three to one.
- Okay, ma'am, you have been approved to move to 812 Lincoln Street, do you want that sent there?
- [Tammy] Yes, please, thank you for giving me a chance.
- All right.
- [Tammy] Have a good night.
- Next is Dean Garcia. And just a second, Mr. Garcia, as we look at your file. Okay, so last time we saw you was in January. And you were at 1681 Deckner Avenue.
- [Dean] I was, yes.
- Yep, and now you want to move to 2301 Manitowoc Road?
- [Dean] Yes I do.
- What's changed?
- [Dean] Well, if you remember, when I did ask for that approval for that location, you had stated that it wasn't enough, that I didn't have enough time under my belt to show that I had grown away from relapse and from going back into prison.
- Yep.
- [Dean] And since then I've been totally dedicated to a lifestyle change. I have met all the requirements I need for probation and parole, when it comes to doing my immediate AODA anger management and Thinking for a Change treatments. I am still involved in Jim Drake's treatment program every two weeks. I've maintained employment, actually I've got off disability and took on employment, because I'm a skilled tradesman, I'm a mason, and I work for a tradesman out of Oshkosh, and I've worked out of town either in Manitowoc or in Appleton. I've just been dedicated towards my recovery and my return back to the community.
- So I guess, the question I was asking though is, okay, so this whole time you were at 1681 Deckner Avenue, right?

- [Dean] No, you denied me that location.
- No, you were approved.
- No.
- You were approved.
- You were approved.
- [Dean] No, I was denied.
- Well you were approved for 90 days. That motion failed, and then basically it says here, moved by Dean Gerondale, seconded by--
- Oh, you were--
- Okay, yes.
- You were denied.
- Yes, apologize.
- Yep.
- I'm sorry.
- So where have you been living?
- [Dean] I've been a roommate to a lady in De Pere on 836 North Webster in De Pere.
- Okay.
- [Dean] It was only a temporary thing until I found another place to live. And since then I've found this location, it's a small house on a corner. It's affordable rent. It seems to be a nice location for me to commute out of town for work.
- Are you going to be living by yourself?
- [Dean] Yes, I'll be living by myself.
- Okay. And how long have you had the current job?
- [Dean] I've have it for over six months, 'cause I got off disability about, a little over six months ago.
- Okay. I see that you haven't gotten into any trouble.
- [Dean] No, absolutely not.
- So, that's good. Any other questions for him?

- I don't have any.
- Okay, I'm going to make a motion to approve him, address specific to 2301 Manitowoc Road.
- I'll second it.
- [Dean] Thank you.
- It hasn't been voted on yet.
- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, so you've been approved to move to 2301 Manitowoc Road, address specific. If you do move you have to come back in front of us again.
- [Dean] Yes.
- Okay, I applaud you taking the time to continue with your efforts, and continue down this road, so good job.
- [Dean] Yeah, it's all about recovery and healing the community, and that's what I want to be a part of.
- All right, great.
- [Deanna] Do you want the letter sent to the Webster Ave or the new address?
- Send it to the new address, please.
- [Deanna] Okay.
- All right, thank you for your time.
- [Dean] Thank you.
- Alex Beard. All right, one second, Alex.
- [Dean] Thank you.
- You're welcome.
- Okay, so last time we saw you was in May of '19. And that was a move to 1840 10th Avenue?
- [Alex] Correct.
- And you're looking to move to 1113 Alvina Street?
- [Alex] 113.
- 113, so, why the change?

- [Alex] The place on 1840 was actually not really fit for a family or anybody in general. There is a sewage leak underneath the house. I lived for almost three months, well not, two and half or so months or whatever it was, with half electricity in my house. And the landlord... basically just wouldn't really fix it, and he said that nothing could get fixed until I get out. So that's kind of the whole point of leaving now.

- Okay, all right. So are you currently employed yet?

- [Alex] Oh yes.

- Where do you work?

- [Alex] I'm actually currently working into being a partner in the business I work at.

- Which is?

- [Alex] Is RumRunners Bar.

- Okay. Okay. How long have you been working with that?

- [Alex] Oh, off and on for, since they took over on December 5th of 2014 and then I've been there straight on for at least two and a half, three years.

- Okay. So are you gonna be living there with your family at this new location?

- [Alex] Yes. Yeah, there is no way I could have my children in a place like that.

- Okay, is there any other questions for him?

- Does Brittany Paynter?

- [Alex] Paynter.

- Is she here?

- [Alex] That's my fiancée, yes, she's right there.

- Okay.

- Do you want to speak?

- Do you want to say anything?

- Sure.

- Can I just have your address.

- 113 Alvina.

- Okay, go ahead.

- Yeah, it's really just, we were happy where we were. This is not something we had planned. Alex works very hard to keep me and our kids healthy and safe, and to have to have him do all of this for so we can live together, I mean, it's been hard. I mean, we couldn't even find a place. There's nobody renting, we couldn't even find a place, so to find one, and the landlord's be like, yeah, you do what you gotta do, find out. So I mean, he worked really hard to get here. And losing the house on 10th Street was hard.

- All right, okay. Everything going good though?

- Mm hm, yeah.

- All right.

- Yeah, he works really hard.

- All right, good, appreciate it. Anything else?

- A question for her, who's your favorite principal?

- I mean, it's been a really long time, 'cause I'm like 28 now, and I have three kids now.

- Probably been busy.

- But his name might've been Mr. Dorff.

- Yeah, there you go.

- There is an absentee vote.

- You look the same, I've got to tell you you're the same.

- I was like sitting back there, I'm like, that's him, right, that's gotta be him. And then I heard you talk, and I'm like, that's him, right. I have three kids now.

- You do?

- I do, yeah, in school.

- Yeah, I recognized your face right away.

- Yeah.

- [Alex] And now she works in a school area, a public school too.

- What are you doing?

- I'm in the food service at Preble right now.

- Is that, you know what, I think I did know that.

- I tried to get into Edison for monitoring, but they were full, so I went to Preble for food service.

- Okay, well good for you.
- So food business.
- That's good to see you.
- All right, Jeff Hunter?
- Oh, we gotta vote.
- No, is there a Jeff Hunter?
- I don't think you need to hear from me. I'm just here in support of him.
- Okay.
- I'm Alex's employer. I own RumRunners Bar. And Alex has worked for Matt and I for six years, first with our landscaping and lawns, and then when we took over the bar he was part-time in and out when we needed him, and now for two years he's been completely full-time as our bar manager. And we have a lot of confidence in him. And I think the biggest thing for me is seeing this family, as they move through Green Bay, a couple of times, to make their lives better. And it's very significant what they're doing. And as advocates for people that have a little bit of a past, I know that you understand how significant that is. And I was here to point it out in case there were questions. I think you know.
- Okay.
- And thank you for what you do.
- All right, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to Mr. Beard?
- Motion to approve, address specific.
- Second.
- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay, sir, you've been approved to move to 113 Alvina Street, would you like that sent there?
- [Alex] Yes, please.
- All right, thank you.
- [Alex] Thank you.
- All right, next is Michael Perrigo.
- [Michael] Evening.
- Good evening. I think this is now, officially, our longest meeting. In my 13 years.

- [Rachel] So nice of Mr. Dorff.
- I'm sorry, Ed.
- You're fine.
- The thing keeps jumping on me.
- [Rachel] Okay, Dean?
- Yes?
- [Deanna] 'Cause the address he's applying to move to, the people that gave me the landlord letter, they do not own it quite yet.
- The 21st.
- [Deanna] Yes, they're closing on the 21st. They did send me the documents, and I sent that to you, so.
- Okay, all right.
- [Rachel] So if there is a motion to approve, it would be conditional.
- Contingent on that.
- [Deanna] That they go through with the purchase.
- That's what I figured, yep. Okay, last time we saw you was August the 19th.
- [Michael] Mm hm.
- And it looks like everything was fine there.
- [Michael] Mm hm.
- So why are you looking to move?
- [Michael] A long story short, my mother, which is the person behind me here. Put the house in my brother's name in, was it '18?
- It would be a year in January.
- [Michael] January of '19.
- Okay.
- [Michael] Everything was good when I moved home. I moved here from Kansas, you guys approved it.
- Yep.

- [Michael] I'm not really sure, but within the past month and a half he's completely flipped. He's disowned my mother. He's told me that I have to move out. He got my P.O. involved. He's pretty much evicting me for the most part. So he said if I wasn't out by the end of November that he would get the law involved. So I'm basically forced to find a new place to live. I would rather stay with my mother, in the situation she's got going on. She now has arthritis in her hip really bad. I'd rather be home with her to help her, but I'm being forced to find a new place to live.

- All right. Check something here real quick.

- [Michael] Still work full-time at Festival Foods. Been there since July 8th. The Doyles, which are the owners of the house, they do know my situation, I've told them. They were actually the only one out of probably, roughly 100 phone calls, of landlords and apartments and everything else that would even give me an opportunity.

- Okay. Does anybody have any questions for him?

- None.

- I don't have any.

- All right, does someone want to make a motion?

- Motion to approve, address specific, contingent upon escrow closing on--

- The property.

- The property.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- [Michael] I am showing my P.O. the apartment on the 22nd, it's already been arranged with the landlord and my P.O. If that helps.

- [Rachel] Motion passes unanimously.

- Okay, so where would you like this sent?

- [Michael] To the 1206 Marshall.

- Okay. All right, that's it, thank you very much.

- [Michael] 'Cause I won't be there until the end of the month. All right, thank you, guys. Have a safe drive home.

- Our next meeting is December 11th at 4:00 p.m.

- So do I need to?

- [Deanna] I will email the Doyles to let them know that you're approved. I'll email them in the morning.

- All right, awesome, thank you.
- [Deanna] Mm hm.
- [Michael] Thanks for getting me in, too, by the way.
- [Deanna] Yeah, and I'll just have them email me once the closing is done.
- [Michael] Okay, thank you.
- So I just need a motion for adjournment.
- Oh, so, move.
- Second.
- All right, all in favor?
- Aye.
- If someone votes no on this?
- I already logged off.
- Oh, voice vote is not--
- [Rachel] Vote passes unanimously.
- [Rachel] There will probably be a riot.
- Oh my God.
- [Rachel] I have to turn this camera off.
- Please do.
