VERBATIM MINUTES

- Go for it.

- I would like to bring to order the convening of December 11th Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board. Do we need to go through roll call?

- We can document it.

- Okay. All right, then let's look at approval of last months agenda. Approval of minutes, excuse me. Actually approval of the agenda, I apologize. Kevin Washner approved the agenda for the December 11th meeting.

- I'll make that motion.

- [Men] Second.
- Okay I'd like a motion to approve the minutes, from our November 13th meeting.
- Motion.
- I'll second.
- Could I get someone else to second? Renee's not logged in yet.
- I'll second that motion.
- Thank you.
- Okay our first appeal is Mr. Donald Schunke. All right Mr. Schunke we're gonna hear your appeal today to move to 2235 Imperial Lane, Apartment number four, is that correct?
- Yes.
- All right, as we go through your particular appeal, just please keep in mind that we just like you to, if we talk about the offense you keep it to a nondescript, just refer to the victims, not by name or by personal name. And then also if we wanna talk about any treatment programs you have the right to do that either in public or private session, which would you prefer?
- Public is fine.
- Okay. All right let's, your offense was distribution of child pornography, is that correct?
- Yes.
- Tell me what happened, how long you were doing it, and how you were caught.
- I was caught by the Canadians, Toronto Police Department I believe. They referred it to the FBI in Milwaukee, who then investigated it further. A couple of incidents in late 2009 I think, and then again in May of 2010, and then my house was the search warrant on my house in August of 2011. And then removed computers. I had been using a program called Beta Trime, to download mostly pictures from the internet and from other people, and some trading and that. Because I left my folders open, that falls under there federal definition of distribution, even though I wasn't running a website, I wasn't actively I guess what most people would call distribution but it was, I mean from that stand point I left it open so people could pull things from my computer.
- So you were doing this for approximately two years?
- Yes.
- Okay, how did you start watching this?

- I just was looking at other adult pornography, and it came up and then got into it more, kinda got caught up in it.
- Okay, in terms of this conviction, does that, Solom, do you have any information on it?
- Sounds very .
- Okay, okay great. So does anybody else have any more questions for him on the particular offense?
- The reason you were leaving the folders open was for other people on the website to look at it? I'm not understanding that term.
- To remember, trying to think what was the big music file sharing program.
- Napster?
- Napster. It's a similar program to Napster in that you could do a search by certain key words, and it would look across the internet and find those particular types of pictures. And then it would download them from multiple computers, and recombine them onto your computer. You left yours open so that other people could download them as well. So it was a file-sharing program.
- And so you were downloading from other peoples files as well?
- Yes.
- Okay.
- Okay, and when were you released?
- I was technically released on the 2nd, from the BOP I was in half-way house up till the 2nd. I'm still in the half-way house waiting on the opinion of this board, and I was released from the actual Milan May 22nd, and went to the Residential Center that day.
- Okay, so I guess the question is it says you haven't had any sexual tenure treatments, so far.
- Not yet. Because until I was under the probation department, they couldn't refer me out for treatment.
- If you'd been at the federal level, during your eight years of incarceration?
- On advice from my lawyer, he had said not to participate because of the way the federal system works. Anything I said could potentially be used to bring additional charges. So his recommendation was not to, I did other types of treatment. I did rational thinking class and some anger management type things, but I don't have proof of that 'cause it's in a box in storage. So I didn't include that on the list of things, I did do a transition program through the half-way house. That included anger management and some other transitional things, but not that yet.
- Are you currently employed sir?

- I am.
- Where are you employed?
- I'm at Alorica.
- Where?
- Alorica, for another month or so.
- What is that?
- It's an inbound call center downtown.
- Okay, what do you mean by you're there for another month or so?
- They just notified us on Monday that they're closing. So we're all being laid off.
- Okay. Is there any other questions for him?
- Are you gonna be on any kind of electronic monitoring?
- Not at this time.
- How often do you meet with your probation agent?
- I will be meeting with her, my understanding is at least monthly, I'm not sure, we haven't set up that schedule yet. She was gonna be meeting he here tonight, I don't know if she's come in, late or not. I don't see her. But I know she was coming from another meeting so she was planning on being here right about four but, apparently, I didn't realize I was gonna end up being first .
- I have a question for Commander Able. The gentleman's explanation about why he wouldn't take treatment in federal prison ring true?
- I'd have to look into that. With additional crimes that are uncovered it's certainly possible.
- Okay.
- If he's in the care of a psychologist, isn't that covered by the confidentiality, or not? Doctor patient confidentiality?
- In the BOP you actually sign a piece of paper that you waive all confidentiality. And they are guards first, and psychologists second, they will tell you that.
- And it's also my understanding that if somebody would reveal something during counseling, that is a crime against a child, that that can be brought forward.
- Okay, all right. All right any other questions?

- Are you originally from this area?

- Yes, I was born in Superior but my birth parents lived here, so I've been here since I was three months old. The only time I left was when I went to college in Oshkosh for a few years.

- All right is there anybody here that wants to speak for him, in support or against?

- I know his agent was gonna try to be here but I guess she's not, is there someone other?

- Sir could you come on up sir? Have a seat, I need your name and address for the record.

- Name is Roy DeRuyter address 1079 Butternut Lane, Onida.

- Okay .

- I'm a Circle's of Support volunteer and he's been attending regularly every week, you know he's there all the time. He participates, he shares, you know, I see him as, he's working to change himself.

- How long has he been a part of your Circle of Change?

- Circle's of Support, how long?

- Three months.

- Oh I'd say at least that, yes.

- Ever since I started accepting federal.

- Yeah we only could take state before. We have two federal guys at one time.

- Is there anything else you'd like to say?

- Not really, no, I mean he shows up, he's positive, he shares he contributes, that's just what I know.

- Okay, thank you. Sir before I ask for motions, is there anything you'd like to say as to, you know, why we should approve your application?

- I have long-time ties to the community, I've got lots of friends here, my family is in the area, they're not all in Green Bay but they're in the area. And so I would like to be able to put down roots by actually having a place that's my own. And so I hope that you'll support my application today.

- Okay, does anybody want to make a motion?

- Excuse me, can I speak for Mr. Schunke?

- Who are you, ma'am?

- I'm one of the case managers--

- Oh sure, come on up, sorry I didn't see you must've just came in.
- Sorry my hearts beating fast--
- Could we just have your name and address again please, work address? I'm Nicole Matchopatow and I work at 2670 University Ave.
- Okay go ahead.
- I'm sorry, what was your name?
- Nicole Matchopatow.
- Could you spell that last name?
- M-A-T-C-H-O-P-A-T-O-W.
- Thank you.
- go ahead ma'am.
- Like I said, I'm one of the case managers that have been working with Don, and he has been compliant with all of our house rules, the procedures. At this time we have no concerns with Don, as he's complying.
- Is there a reason why he wouldn't be, after he left, why his supervision doesn't have, not gonna have an ankle bracelet, or anything like that, that you know of?
- Well I can't speak to that, because that's something that Ms. Ladon, his agent would know.
- Okay, okay.
- And so he's been with you guys ever since he was released, right?
- Correct, yup.
- Okay.
- And then technically he is no longer a BOP inmate, he is now a US probation person, so Don's still kinda residing with us until he gains housing.
- Okay, all right, any questions for her? All right, thank you.
- Thanks.
- I do have a question for her, sorry.

- In your conditional release does address assessment and treatment. Would you say you're not in any program at this--

- I haven't been referred yet, but my understanding from talking with my probation officer that that will be coming here in the next month. It's just, until the 2nd, when I was officially released from the BOP, she wasn't able to do the referral yet. Because it's two separate programs, jurisdiction kind of things.

- Okay, does anybody want to make a motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Schunke to 2235 Imperial Lane, #4, address specific.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second that motion.

- Motion fails, three to two.

- Okay sir, you've been denied to move to 2235 Imperial Lane, #4. Doesn't mean you cannot reapply in the future. You know I can tell you that I voted no. And the reason is that you haven't had any sexual offender treatment program, yet. So that's the reason why I voted no. I mean anybody else can tell you if they so choose to. But again, at this particular point, you are not approved to live at that location.

- Okay, is it, I've watched some of the videos, is it possible to do a conditional? For three months or six months, until that happens?

- If someone wanted to bring it up they could have brought it up in the, you know in the motion and they did not, so we voted on the motion the way it stands.

- All right thank you.

- Thank you.

- Next person to appeal is Andrew D. Cross. All right Mr. Cross, we're here to hear your appeal to move to 837 13th Avenue, is that correct?

- Correct.

- And you're currently living there?

- I am.

- And you know you're in violation of the ordinance by living there, prior to coming here.

- I was aware, sorry.

- You were aware?

- I was made aware, yeah.
- Okay, how long have you been living there?
- A couple of months.
- All right, since you were released?
- No.
- Okay, all right.
- Were you living there before the crime?
- I was.
- Okay, who are you living with?
- My friend Perry.
- Okay.
- Does Perry own that property?
- He does.
- All right. Okay, so again as we go over your particular case, I just ask that you refer to the person as the victim, not by a personal name or a surname or anything like that. And if you want to talk about any sexual offender treatment you can that either in public or a private session, what would you prefer?
- public is fine.
- Okay, so tell us about the child enticement charge that you were convicted of, and what occurred, and how it happened.
- So I was on some dating apps, on my phone, and one of the girls I met on there was underage, and I just ignored it and continued to talk to them. And then when I went to meet them, I was arrested.
- Okay, so you thought the victim was 14 years old, correct?
- correct.
- And how old were you at the time?
- 31 I believe.
- So you knew what you're doing was illegal, right?

- I do.
- Okay, why'd you do it?
- I was lonely and depressed.
- How many of the other girls on the site were overage?
- All of them, as far as I'm aware.
- So in terms of the charge, does that sound correct officer?
- Yes.
- All right. So at this particular point in terms of treatment, you haven't had any, correct?
- Correct.
- okay, are you enrolled in anything, or anything that you're looking to enroll it?
- Not currently, my appeal hasn't made me aware of any.
- So are you currently employed?
- I am.
- Where?
- With Grand Central Station.
- All right, does anybody have any questions for him in regards to the charge, or his treatment programs?
- You were, it says you were in jail at Vindego Point?
- I was.
- For six months?
- And you went right from there back to the same address? Or was there an address in between?
- There was I was at some temporary places and I stayed with my sisters for awhile.
- All right, so how long have you been at this current address then?
- Two or three months.
- And your P.O knew about that correct?

- Correct.
- Okay.
- Why should we let you live here?
- What do you mean?
- Why should we allow you, as a child sexual offender, to live in the city of Green Bay at this particular location, give us a reason why.
- It's the only place I know. It's where I grew up, it's where I've always lived. It's where all my family is. I don't know anything else.
- Is there a reason why you weren't living with your family?
- At the time there wasn't the possibility.
- And there's still no possibility now?
- My sister passed away.
- Okay. All right, any other questions?
- Your agent accepted you as a transfer back into Brown County without any approval of housing?
- Yes.
- Okay.
- And the agent hasn't said you need any sex offender treatment or anything?
- No.
- Who's your agent?
- Tara Furig is my current agent, but I was with Brittany Martha.
- Who are you with right now?
- Tara Furig, I think it's pronounced?
- Okay, does anybody here speak either for or against this person? Okay, there's no one. Does anybody want to make a motion?
- I'll make a motion. To deny Mr. Cross at this specific 837 13th Avenue.
- Is there a second?

- I'll second.
- Does anybody have a discussion, or is everybody ready to vote? Okay let's vote.
- So this is a motion to deny, a yes vote is to deny.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay so you've been denied to live at 837 13th Avenue. In addition to that, I'm gonna have an officer set out there, to make sure that you're not living there. If you are not only will you be fined, your friend will be fined as owning the property as well, because he's in violation of the ordinance as well. It doesn't mean that you can't come back at a future time, in terms of your application. I would get with your P.O. as soon as possible, to talk about potential treatment programs that you could enter in that would make you more a viable candidate to live in the city of Green Bay. All right, thank you. So could we have an officer go out there and make sure--
- I got it covered.
- All right, thank you.
- Next is Mr. Joshua Westedt, did I pronounce that correctly?
- Yes, Westedt.
- Westedt, okay. All right Mr, Westedt, we're gonna hear you go over your case, looks like you wanted to move to 570--
- 615.
- Oh sorry it should be 613 Hubbard Street.
- 615, or whatever the address on the, it's 613.
- Yeah, Hubbard Street. And you're currently living at 702 Oakland Court, in the pier?
- Yes. And who you gonna be living with at 613 Hubbard Street?
- Myself.
- Okay. All right as we go over your particular case, again just refer to the person or persons as the victim, not by a personal name if you could. And second of all, if you do want to we wanna go over your treatment programs you're right to either a public or private session, which would you prefer?
- I prefer private.
- Okay. All right, so looks like you have two different convictions.
- It's two, one case, two convictions.

- One case, two convictions, okay.
- Or two charges.
- Two charges, okay. Tell us what happened, go ahead.
- When I was 17 I sexually assaulted a 14 and 15 year old male, in a foster home. In Denmark, and I reported it.
- You actually reported yourself?
- Yes sir.
- Okay. So obviously you pleaded guilty to that.
- Yeah, no contest, yes sir.
- And you served 13, no 4 years?
- Yup, I've had multiple probation revocations.
- revocations?
- Forgive me, I'm so nervous right now.
- No problem, no problem.
- What were the revocations for?
- Multiple reasons, few in adult pornography, drinking, have sexual contact without agent approval. I've been violent, I used to have an anger problem. I've receive anger management counseling for that. I exposed myself to a neighbor.
- So after you were originally released, how long, so have you served about 13 years in total then?
- Yes sir.
- And when's the last time you were released?
- I was released most currently January of this year. January 8th, I believe.
- And you've had no other violations since then?
- I have had two P.O. holds within the last month. One was for viewing adult pornography, which I served four days for. Then the second one just happened last week, I was in jail for having contact, sexual contact and not reporting.
- This is a conduct with a minor?

- Yes.
- Okay. Did you know that minor?
- Yes I did. May I explain myself?
- Absolutely.
- What happened I was at, sorry.
- Take your time.
- I was at the Marcus Center, for a birthday gala, their five year gala. And a foster, people that I used to know through a former foster family were there with their child. And I struck up a conversation, and I found out she was still a senior in high school so I quit talking to her, and I failed to report that. Then it came out in a lie detector test last week, and so I was in jail for two days.
- Okay, all right. Are you currently on an ankle bracelet?
- Yes sir.
- Okay. Are you--
- I'm on lifetime GPS.
- You are lifetime GPS, okay. So tell us about, actually are there anymore questions relating to this crime? Okay, I need a motion to move into a private session to talk about his treatment programs, could I have a motion please?
- I'll move.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second.
- If there's anybody here that's family, you are allowed to stay.
- I'm gonna go shut the door and notify Annie that her client has done.
- No, no this is part of the process.
- I'm not biological family but one of the former foster parents.
- Absolutely, you can stay sir.
- And he's staying at my house right now so. Part time I should say, I guess. And that's my wife.

- I'm about to start a job through Advocates, for healthy transitional living. It's gonna be a good part-time custodial.
- Okay, do you know what particular building you're gonna be working at? Or anything like that?
- I don't recall, but I do have the representative here from Advocate if you'd like to speak to him.
- So, a question that runs across my mind here is you're gonna be living by yourself, correct?
- Yes sir.
- Okay. So who's gonna help monitor that you know you're taking your medication, and that you're sticking on that right path, not getting in front of a computer and keeping yourself clean during this process?
- I have multiple people for support. I have Advocates, who , who is here. I have my foster parents which, Bill and Nancy, and I have Transitions to Success, which is like a program for people like youth out of foster care which I was just recently accepted. And then I'll be responsible for myself, I've been medication compliant on my own.
- So is the court, does the court mandate that you take that medication?
- No sir, I am not court ordered.
- Okay, all right. Does anybody have any more direct questions for him? All right does anybody want to speak on his behalf? Or against him? Sir why don't you start.
- Just come on up?
- Sure.
- Can we just have your name and address again?
- My name is Bill, Bill Mathias at 702 Whole Plain Court.
- Okay, go ahead sir.
- The two incidences that most recently happened, just wanted to reiterate some of the details that he left out. The one where he was viewing adult pornography on a tablet, I believe it was, cell phone, occurred at the bus station. And within 24 hours he reported that to me. The next day he reported what he had done, and then he reported it to his P.O. That would not have happened, for whatever it's worth, you know four or five years ago, when he was out, so I see, we see that as progress. As bad as it was, we see that as progress. And then he described pretty well the incident that happened at Mica. What looks like a family came in, he struck up a conversation with them, he failed to report it to his P.O. It came out in a recent lie detector test. It's my understanding from talking to the P.O. That those are the only two things that showed up in the lie detector test, which again four or five years ago would not have been the case. He would've been up to a lot more. So we think, my wife and I think, the medication has been very helpful. In addition to that, when he got out of prison this

time, he just seemed different. Less, I don't know what the right word is but, more agreeable, cooperative, to the point where we, when he's not staying in a motel, so he's on disability right now. So he has disability money, uses that money for a motel, when he's not there then we open up our doors for him to live with us. That would not have been the case four or five years ago. So we saw that change as well. He has the trial that's in the works with Advocates, as you noted, Transitions for Success aims to assist former foster youth and adults up to age 35, which he is, he's 35 so he's right on the cusp of that. I think the interesting thing about that is they as a program, so the grant program, recognized that people that have been in foster care tend to grow up later, if you will, than people who haven't been. Hence the 35, 'cause that's very unusual for a grant program that assists kids get on their feet, if you will, to go up to age 35. So I think maturity, the medication, his finances from the beginning when he got out he's been responsible with his finances, he had some back pay, for example. Social security back pay, I suggested he put that away for first months rent, security deposit, you know, despite being homeless, cause he was homeless at that time. Maybe at the TLP, I'm not sure. But facing homelessness, 'cause we had not approved him living with us at that time. He agreed, and he agreed. So that started us thinking hm, something looks different this time around. Although I would concur, it's been many times around and around and around and it's been frustrating for all of us who are trying to assist him get on his feet.

- So are you concerned that, about him living alone and the fact that he's gonna have less structure in front of him?

- That has crossed our mind, we've had that conversation, that he living alone raises certain risks, if you will, there's no doubt about that. I think though, with his work, with my involvement I'm retired so I'm available and available often with him, and his P.O. is still on paper for I think about two years--

- Couple of years.

- Two years. Monitor-treated, he's not allowed internet, he's not allowed a cell phone, you know, some of those things have been put in place by his P.O.--

- But he's still getting on it.

- Yes he did, that's correct. He's still gotten on it through somebody else's phone. And he self-reported it, in tears I may add, to me. Which I asked him about that, I said why, I mean he didn't have to tell anybody I mean there was no way I don't think to put him in a future lie detector test that he didn't know about that he was gonna be caught. Why did you tell me about it? Why'd you come in and tell me about it? And his response was "Out of respect for you." That was different, that wouldn't have happened four or five years ago. So I am concerned, although I would add that two weeks a month he's in a motel. Two weeks a month he has nobody looking over his shoulder, two weeks a month, you know the motel has cable, that has R-rated movies, that he's prohibited from watching. So in some ways yes I'm concerned, but it's not too much different than half a month anyway, when he's onto the streets frankly. Yeah, 'cause he has no where to go or he leaves our house in the morning, he has his appointments down in the Green Bay area, he stays down here all day long, either at Mica, the bus station, wandering, walking, if he had a place to stay it just seems that that would be advantageous on balance to his mental health, living alone, that's crossed our mind.

- Anymore questions for him?

- Why don't you allow him to stay with you full time?

- Yeah I've asked myself that. Well when he first got out, back in January, keep in mind he lived with us when he was 17. He's 35 now, right. So a big time gap, and he's been going around there. I mean I knew him, know him, but not really, when he first got out. So I was pretty much convinced that living here's not an option, I had to have that conversation with him. In part because I wanted him to have that incentive to get his own place, you know. In part because it's my wife and I, we like our privacy, it's a relatively small house, open kind of concept. And so that was the closed door. Saw some changes, saw some progress, frankly he lived on the streets for a couple nights. I'm not accustomed to tough love, I mean accustomed to tough love. You live in the streets a couple nights, and said okay, you can sleep here, but you can really like live here. You gotta get your own life, you gotta get back on your feet, gotta get your own friends, gotta get much of that. Although he does participate in family functions, with my family, my family functions. So it's sort of that tension between, I'd say a little bit of a hug a little bit of a kick to get going and become independent. He found this place, the landlord is familiar with people who have committed sex offenses, he's got a number of people there. Or in his other units, he told me. I kinda see him as a grandfather-type figure. The rent is something that he can afford, you just can't find that when you're looking into Pier, you're looking and looking and looking. And so he has kind of a unique opportunity I think to get some stability, some predictability, avoid the motel, get some outside monetary from those different support systems. It's probably the best opportunity he's had since he went in. I hope I answered your questions--

- Yeah, you did. But then you sparked another question out of me. So you said, if I remember, he was there until he was 18.

- And then he moved out.

- Moved out, and then you really had no contact with him?

- Oh no we had contact with him. When he moved out, he moved into, correct me if I'm wrong here, but he moved into like a program that was designed to assist, again, former foster kids to getting on their feet. And so he had that structure, we had contact with them. And then he went into, oh it was probably two years later he went into prison when he was 19. So that happened at 17, he went to prison at 19. And we've made time to contact the whole time. We'd visit him in prison but what I'm saying is, he never really, other than that year, lived with us, and afforded us a chance to get to know him.

- All right, the reason why I asked that is 'cause you kinda made a comment that when he got out, you really didn't know him. So that's why I was wondering how much contact you've had--

- Yeah, yeah, yeah thank you for follow up. We didn't know him like if he had lived with us, or I raised him you know. Basically he moved in when he was 17, moved out when he was 18 and completed high school, no problems no hassles there. Some time later when he was on his own, the charges were brought and it's been a merry-go-round more or less. As you can see, you know, since.

- Okay, thank you. All right, does anybody else want to speak either for or against him? Sir, come on up.

- Hi, my name is Nick Kaler, 2281 Oliver Lane, Green Bay, Wisconsin, 54303. I'm a career service specialist at Advocates. So I met with Josh three times, he's been consistent with his desire to work. Pending approval, we're looking at five hours a week with supervision as a custodian. So he's been motivated, he's been clear about his past convictions, his most recent violation too, he told me unprompted what had happened. So I can tell you that Josh is one that self-reports just as Bill has stated. So I can just speak to, you know, what I know from three appointments that he wants to move his life forward, as Bill stated, he also wants independence. He wants a chance.

- Sir is there a reason why it's only five hours a week?

- I have a disability and I haven't worked in a while, so I want to get myself used to it.

- Okay, so I think one of the big things and barriers, you know, and I've worked with community employment many years is testing out his work tolerance after, you know, not working for such a long period of time. And he's been open with his past and what he thinks in terms of environment, what a work experience would look like. We can certainly probably build to more hours, or even finding, there's significant legal barriers, obviously, with his past. It's just finding him the right environment at this point. We're gonna be supportive, I'm gonna have three-point check-ins with him. I've contacted his probation and parole agent with DOC to make sure that everything is coordinated appropriately. Josh is cognizant and aware of roles, supervision, I'll have frequent check-ins with him to check on his job skills, life skills, our custodian will always be with him as well, as he learns some new cleaning skills.

- Okay, any other questions for him? All right, thank you. All right does anybody have any more questions, or does anybody want to make a motion? You know, sir, I'll be kinda honest with you, I'm really kinda in the middle here, as to what's your best way of looking forward, as well as what's best for the city and it's residents on this one. I know, at least from, I'm not comfortable approving you to 613 Hubbard Street, you know, a la carte right now. Because in other words, just hey you're approved and you go on, 'cause I'm not sure where you're gonna be and how you're gonna react to it. So I'm just, give me a chance to finish, then other people can chime in. I see that there's a benefit to you to have a place to live, a consistent place to live, rather than being on the street. Considering your, what that'd do for your medication and your mental health though as well. That's where I'm kind of sitting right now.

- May I?

- Well does anybody have anything else to say?

- I agree with what you're saying, and I'm also looking at that particular address being a block and a half away from Fort Howard Elementary school, it gives me a little bit of concern as well. Along with the number of violations that you've talked about. Go ahead.

- Sorry.

- No, go ahead.

- I'm gonna, I believe my P.O.'s gonna have restriction zones, safety zones, on my GPS for parks, day cares, and schools throughout that area. I have no intentions, I have no reason, as a grown man have no reason of being there. I have no desire to go over there.

- I understand I mean you step out the door you're probably than less than 1000 feet away from the school just by virtue of being outside there.

- Do you have your own transportation or do you take the bus?

- I take the city bus, sir.

- That's an elementary school, right? Any other thoughts before anybody wants to make a motion?

- Can I propose--

- go ahead.

- What about a temporary approval?

- Well that's all up to the board in terms of a particular motion that somebody makes.

- Sorry.

- So--

- That's exactly what I was thinking about. Making a motion to approve a specific is it 613 Hubbard street for one month. At which time come again, see how you're doing, and whether or not there have been any other concerns. I'd like to hear from your P.O. and how things are going with the things that you're working with.

- Okay, so do you want to make that motion?

- Lot of words there. So how about, you wanna make a motion to approve him to 613 Hubbard Street, address specific, for a term of 30 days till our next meeting at which time he should present evidence as to what his parole officer and his status is.

- Yeah, so moved.

- Okay, is there a second to that?

- I will second it.

- Okay, we have a motion, address specific, 613 Hubbard Street, for a period of 30 days. At which time he'll have to come back.

- Motion passes four to one.

- Okay sir, you have been approved to move to 613 Hubbard Street, address specific. You will have to appear at our next meeting. Failure to appear will automatically void that, and you'd be asked to leave, okay?

- Thank you.

- So the other thing you need to do is that I would have some sort of documentation from your parole officer, written, okay? Or if they wanna appear that's fine too. As to what they've seen over the last 30 days in terms of your status and where you're sitting. This is as big gift, in my opinion for you. So make sure that you work hard and stay clean, and you'll continue to move forward, all right?

- Thank you sir.

- By the way, where would you want it mailed to? To that location?

- The Oakland Court.

- At Oakland Court, okay.

- From the P.O. do you want that a week prior to this meeting, or the day of?

- He can bring it the day of, that's fine.

- Sorry just to make sure we're clear. All you want is a letter from my P.O., no other treatment letters or anything like?

- Anything that you have that you're continuing to do, for instance you're one-on-one with your other psychologist, a letter on status would help, to see how you're doing. Anything more that you can do to state your case and how you're approving with your treatment programs, your job, how your jobs gone, would be very important for us to see if this is the right thing to continue or not.

- Yes sir.

- All right?

- Yup.

- Thank you.

- Next up is Bruce Verhaagh. Verhaagh.

- Verhaagh.

- Hi Bruce, we are here to review from your last time here. So you're at the Cure program. Partly since January, so that's what we're looking for, let's see what you got for us today. Well actually I'm not sure honestly my court date has been, I just found out, has been pushed back to May 28th. So I'm not sure how relevant this is, this information. But here's the, what I got from.

- All right. So before we talk about this, are we okay staying in a public session or would you a private session since this is related to your treatment program?

- Specifically--

- If you're public that means the audience can stay, or if it's private than everybody has to leave.

- What was the topic?

- So if we wanna talk about your treatment programs, you have the right to do it either in public or private session. So private means we have to clear the room, it's just us, or public is, which would you prefer?

- It can be public.

- Okay, all right, thanks. So this is Patrick and Associates. It just says "Upon his discharge "agency will continue to provide "sex services treatment to Mr. Verhaagh." So it doesn't really say how you're doing. Which is one of the things that we wanted to kinda know, basically in regards to, in regards to your aftercare programs. You know, we gave you 90 days. No 90 days failed.

- It failed and you wanted him to come back this month with a plan for his aftercare.

- Correct, so the only plan right now is that you're gonna continue with it. Now is that something you're gonna have to pay for? Or is it part of, you know, how you're gonna be able to continue with it after your release? There is, I'm gonna have to pay like maybe \$5 a session, but I'm not exactly sure how it works. My therapist said that I can, I think, use my benefits, there's a certain, I would have to check to see how that works.

- Okay, so right now you're not gonna be released until May, correct?

- Yes.

- So basically during that time you have to continue your treatment program, right?

- Yes.

- Is it once a week, once a month, how often?

- Once a week.

- And when you say your court date has been pushed back, is that so you can get off of the conditional release?

- No, it's been pushed back because Shelia Fields, there's a death in her family. Okay, so because of that, the court date will not be able to meet on December 16th.

- What is the court date for?

- For getting discharged.

- Okay, okay.

- And the only way for me to get discharged is for me to be doing good on supervised release. If it the judge sees that I'm not doing good on supervised release, and you know, sees that I am a risk to the community, no discharge.

- Okay. Do you know, if you would be approved to move, are you able to move to this location or do you have to wait to move out of your current location until the judge approves that discharge?

- I believe it varies. I've been told that as soon as the judge says discharged, I have 24 hours to leave supervised. But there have been other cases, well one case in particular, where he has a month. So what I'm saying is that it varies.

- So I guess another question would be so now that you're not gonna be released until May, I mean the odds of that location at 1331 Division Street being available is probably not gonna happen. I would say someone's gonna rent that place out and not wait for you.

- 1331 Division Street?

- That's with his father.

- Oh that's with his father, okay I'm sorry, okay. So just going back here to where, okay that's right, I'm sorry, you're right. Okay, so at this particular point you're still gonna say on New Franken Road, in New Franken, right?

- Yes, until the judge--

- Documents.

- Yeah until the judge determines that I am no longer a risk to the community, then he'll give me discharge.

- Okay, so let's, do you know when you're court date is in May?

- I thought he said the 28th.

- It's the 28th.

- It is the 28th?

- May 28th, okay.

- So, I guess my thought process here is that you come back for our May meeting. At which time, to be honest with you, I think we'd really like to see how you've progressed in your program, not just a letter that you're gonna continue with it, after you're released, yeah. So we need, we want something more than saying "Hey you attended 22 session", and we wanna know how they feel in terms of your

progress, whether you're a risk or you're not a risk, something that they would give to the judge, basically, because the judge is gonna look for that too, right? When they meet with you, so that's what we're looking for is what are they gonna submit to the court, in your behalf, to say whether you should be released or not released from supervised supervision. Is that possible or not, am I asking too much?

- I don't think its--

- Okay.

- I'm not sure if my therapist does this for anyone, I don't know.

- Again I'm just saying, you should ask. You have to say listen, what I would like is the information you're gonna provide the court in regards to where my status is at the end of May. I need this for my board to see if I can move to 1331 Division Street.

- Oh so I write those specifics so there's no problems.

- I guess my thought is, if the court date isn't until May 28th, I think personally we should wait till the June hearing to make sure that he's actually discharged. Otherwise--

- We still don't know if he is.

- Right, could still be in the program.

- Well the only question is is that if we wait till then, he has a chance to be on the street for 14 days I guess. Because if they kick him out of there, you know 24 hours, that's the only reason why I thought of May. I'm assuming at that particular point his therapist is gonna be sending something to the court. I mean I'm okay waiting until June, I'm just saying that he has potential of being homeless for a couple weeks. I mean--

- Yeah I mean I guess I just think the state kind of gives them some opportunity. I mean that'd be basically two weeks, I can't imagine say hey, you're out, unless they have somebody ready to, do you live alone, or do you have a roommate?

- I have a roommate, yes.

- So unless they had another offender waiting to get into that residence, I think that would be the only reason why he would have to leave.

- Okay so why don't we make it our June meeting. And so what we're looking for is the information that your therapist would give to the court on your condition.

- Okay, so basically how I'm doing--

- Yup.

- Okay. That you would give to the court?

- Correct. All right, thanks very much.
- Sorry, could I speak on?
- Sure, come on up ma'am.
- He doesn't need to get a motion?
- No because he's still living in Franken, which is out of our area.
- We still need to dispose of the, the agenda item.
- Okay, well do that.
- So I have some more information to provide. So regarding him being discharged in May, there is a chance that he could be discharged and they say you have to be out within 24 hours. That's becoming less common over time, but that has happened before. So it really depends how the lawyers work with the judge that day. Sometimes they give a stay for seven days, sometimes its a month, sometimes its six months or more. But there is a possibility that he could be discharged right then and there. Additionally, so the therapist, he wrote this letter because we thought that you just wanted information he'd be continuing treatment, so that's why he phrased it like that. But I think he'd be more than happy to share what kind of progress Bruce has been making. In addition, so I know this therapist in particular doesn't always like writing those kind of statements just because they can be misinterpreted so easily. So I guess if you have any additional advice on what to look for, so I can pass that message on.
- I mean what I'm looking for is that in his particular program, is what's his risk level, high, low, medium, of re-offending, and two has he learned his triggers in terms of prevention, you know, and then does he feel that what he is gonna say to the court in terms of discharge is accurate in terms of his risk to the community.
- So Bruce undergoes a yearly 9-80 evaluation, that has that kind of information in it. Would it be helpful if Bruce brought that with?
- Yeah.
- Okay, it's very thorough.
- Okay great, perfect, perfect, awesome. Okay great, so how do we need to dispose of this since technically we're not, should we just at this particular point say a motion to bring him back in June?
- Is that approval or is that denial?
- It's neither.
- Well I think technically we're denying him right now to move to this address.

- I mean he's been approved for a set time period, so if it's not a motion to approve, then that time period lapses, and he just comes back in May.
- Okay, all right, let's make a motion to deny him to 818 Linden Drive, #6.
- Sorry, it's the Division Street--
- 1331 Division.
- Or Division Street I'm sorry, yes. I was looking at the next one.
- I'll address.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- So a yes vote is to deny.
- So then he'll be on the June agenda, for this same location, and then he can provide the information where's at.
- Motion to deny passes unanimously.
- Okay, awesome, thank you. Mr Mitchell Pamonicutt.
- Here's the order provided from a community, so.
- Okay, all right. Okay Mr. Pamonicutt. Okay so you found a new location, correct?
- Correct. Your files just really long. So, when we used to have paper this was actually a little faster. So right now at 818 Linden Drive, or is it Linden Street?
- Linden Drive.
- It's Linden Drive. Green Bay is where you wanna be, correct?
- Correct, correct.
- So just some follow up from a stand point, everything going good with your job?
- Yes sir.
- Okay, no interaction with any law enforcement?
- No sir.
- Does anybody have any questions about this particular location or questions specifically for him?

- We had talked last month about you getting into treatments, did we ask about?
- Nope, so again if you wanna talk about treatment programs, we can do either public or private session?
- Private please.
- Private, okay. So I need a motion to move to a private session.
- Moved.
- Second that.
- Okay go ahead.
- It's not a go ahead.
- I'm still waiting on the, there we go, motion passes.
- My fingers are often .
- Okay, we were just in a private session going over Mr. Pamonicutt current treatment program in which he informed us where he's at at this particular moment. In regards, we have a letter here from Linden Point Apartment Homes regarding your request to move to 818 Linden Drive. They just reiterate the fact they express an objection to possible approval for you. Under the city ordinance, and they ask that they reject you as part of that, 'cause they don't feel you're a good fit for that particular neighborhood.
- I believe that's the complex next door to where he's requesting to move.
- Yeah that's across the street, yup. Is there anybody else here that's either for or against him, that would like to speak?
- I mean would you like to speak, you spoke last time I remember. Do you need to speak again, or would you like to? Come on up.
- What's your name and address again please?
- Melody Horcher, 2107 Ontario Road.
- Okay go ahead.
- The understanding was--
- So it's a letter basically by the owners of Linden Point Apartments, which is across the street from where he's living. And they're expressing concerns that they would not like him to live at 818 Linden Drive. They don't feel it's a good fit, and under the ordinance, again under the ordinance he wouldn't

be able to live here, but again he's here as coming from the board for basically an appeal, to the ordinance, that's what he's here for.

- Oh, okay--

- They're saying not to approve his appeal, is what they're saying.

- Okay, that was my question. Mitchell's been doing great. He's been completing everything that he was asked last time. It took him, like I said, his transportation. When we went to the Brown County, for his ALDA Assessments so that he could get a driver's license. One thing that she said to him that I know really helped both of us, stay focused on the now. Don't worry about tomorrow, stay focused on right now, what you gotta do. Stay busy, stay focused on right now, and that's what he's been doing. He's been staying busy. Working third shift .

- Okay.

- I don't know what else I can say I mean, except I'm here for support.

- Okay, appreciate it, thank you.

- Oh sure, go right ahead. I don't have any more questions for him, if anybody else does?

- I don't now.

- All right does anybody wanna make a motion in regards to the 818 Linden Drive location?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Pamonicutt toe 818 Linden Drive, #6, address specific.

- is there a second?

- I'll second that motion.

- Motion passes three to two.

- Okay sir you have been approved to move to 818 Linden Drive, address specific. If you do move, you will have to come back in front of the board in terms if you want to live some place else within the city limits of Green Bay. Would you like it sent to that location, or where would you like that notice sent?

- Presently, you can send I there, I'll be moving as soon as possible.

- Okay, all right.

- I just wanna make one comment here just for the record here that I did vote no, not that I would've approve under another set of circumstances, 'cause I looked at last month we approved for 90 days at the particular address, and I should've jumped in a little bit quick and suggest we approved for 60 days, just as a follow up just kinda in line with what we had approved in the past. But, so be it.

- Okay. All right, thank you very much.
- Thank you.
- Next appeal is Mr. Adam Snow.
- Do you have to come back in 60 days?
- No, it's good.
- Thank you all.
- Thank you.
- Just if he moves, if he moves to a different address then he would have to come in front of us.
- Okay, thank you, thank you.
- Have a good night, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Years.
- Cheers, bye now.
- Okay so last time you were here we denied you and we were looking to have some more, actually yeah we can say this in public in terms of, 'cause it's part of the record, in regards to additional treatment programs. He said he could be intake within the next 90 days he was encouraged to reapply once his assessments clear and he's in treatment. So before we talk about the location again you have the right to do it either in public or private session, which would you prefer?
- Private please.
- Okay I need a motion moving to private session.
- I'll move.
- second that.
- You can stay here.
- Yup you can stay here, yup.
- Yup, you can stay in here.
- Yup, any family and friends can stay.
- Motion passes unanimously.
- Okay.

- Okay, we had a chance to talk to Mr. Snow in regards to his treatment programs and where he is currently at, with documentation that he provided the board. So does anybody have any more direct questions for Mr. Snow, or does anybody like to make a motion?

- Just a couple of questions. Your sentence was for six months and you've been in for--

- My sentence was for a year on one charge, six months on the other.

- Okay.

- They are--

- Yeah, concurrent. So 18 months total.

- Oh consecutive.

- Oh consecutive, okay, okay. All right, so you're looking for approval for this address once you're released. When do you anticipate or when do you hope to be released?

- What I'm looking for in this approval today is to be able to get out on house arrest, GPS, throughout Outagamie County. The only reason that I was denied was because of the, yeah, because of the treatment and the city violation. I was all approved to live at the residence until it came to my P.O. that my address was a violation. So basically what I'm asking approval for is to continue my sentence on GPS, which would be house arrest, GPS, I'll do weekly check-ins, with Outagamie County jail, and I will be on GPS supervision through those 18 months, and then I'll be on paper for another four years after that.

- Okay, does anybody wanna make a motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Snow to 839 South Oneida Street, address specific.

- I second.

- Motion passes unanimously.

- All right Mr. Snow, you've been approved to move to 839 South Oneida Street, would you like the letter sent there?

- Correct.

- Okay, thank you very much.

- Could you sign that for me now? Thank you guys, have a Merry Christmas.

- You too.

- I'll take my pen back. I think I should withdraw at this point, because I don't wanna be in the middle of somebodies.

- Motion to let her leave.
- I feel we need to document fake motions.
- I'll see y'all next month.
- Yes, Merry Christmas, Happy New Year.
- Okay next up is Mr. Joseph Kopke.
- Yes sir.
- All right here.
- 'Cause I'm straddling a post here so.
- Sorry I'm reading the information from the last time you were here, back in September. Okay sir, how have you been doing over the last 90 days?
- I'm doing great, I've been still working for Winners, working on the packaging expansion. It's going great there, I'm a carpenter by trade, with the Local 30. No violations of any kind with the P.O. The residence is in the neighborhood I grew up in. It's actually just a few blocks away from my house I grew up in, actually. And I have one of my chaperones that lives literally two blocks away, 9206 Juniper.
- How's the community, how are you doing within the community, are you talking to your neighbors, are you keeping to yourself, what's your life like?
- The community I'm actually, well I talk to my neighbors because I actually have, not a detached garage but I have to walk out of my building into the garage. And their garage is attached, I have a little corner . It's the same community I grew up in, it's the Starlight community, but it's like I said I'm very friendly with neighbors. My landlord is actually a guy that used to come to my parents Halloween parties when I was growing up.
- Okay, okay. In terms of your social life, how are you doing in terms of just whether it's friends or family, what's going on when you're not at work?
- I bowl in the league at Village Lanes, I bowl 786 series last Saturday.
- 278, 264, and 244. The 264 actually I had the first nine strikes, and threw a split in the 10th frame.
- Oh!
- Okay.
- And then my buddy Adam, he's also, he's got a property up in the middle of inland area, so we go up there and ride four-wheelers, get firewood, he's got a wood burning stove, or fireplace in his house. I've known him since I was nine years old, I spend a lot of time with him. And like I said my buddy

Brandon who lives two blocks away, he's either coming over to my house or I'm going over to his place. And Bonnie, who's in the back of the room, she's always checking up on me . She's my . She's pretty much my mother figure.

- All right, does anybody have anymore questions for him?

- I do not.

- Does anybody like to speak either for or against him, before we ask for a motion. Ma'am.

- I don't need to, but I can.

- It's your choice.

- My name is Bonnie VanVonderan, I'll spell it. V-A-N-V-O-N-D-E-R-A-N.

- Go ahead.

- I live at 2373 Ecolan Circle, Green Bay. I've known Joe, I babysat him the first five years of his life, so I've known everything about him. He's doing very, very well. He's working 48-50 hours a week, he calls me once a day, whether he wants to or not, and he tells me that he's doing fine, or that he wants some food. You know, he came over for Thanksgiving, and we got done eating and I said Okay Joe, and he goes, I said would you like anything to take home? He said "I happen to have some empty containers in the car", so he left with--

- So I didn't have to take her containers for leftovers.

- But he's doing very well, we're real proud of him.

- Okay, all right thank you.

- Is there anybody else? Okay, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to his 1154 Abrams Street?

- I'll make a motion. To approve Mr. Kopke to 1154 Adams Street--

- Abrams.

- Oh I'm sorry. Abrams Street, address specific.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- Motion passes four to nothing.

- Okay sir would you like that sent to that location?

- Yes sir.
- Okay, good luck to you.
- Thank you.
- so you have an Aunt Rosemary?
- Yes, Rosemary Balong.
- I worked with her for a number of years.
- [Bonnie] That was my sister.
- I thought so.
- Yeah she was actually here at the last meeting.
- I missed that one.
- Have a Merry Christmas.
- Joe, Joe! I used to be at those Halloween parties too.
- Were you really, my sisters?
- Yeah, oh yeah, and I worked with you, I don't think you recognize me.
- Are you .
- Not at the same place.
- Yeah.
- Cathy DeCramer.
- Oh!
- We just got older.
- My sister had a, yeah never mind.
- Yeah I was there a lot.
- All right up next is Mr. Christopher Flory. Okay, so what we're looking for here Mr. Flory is some documentation that we asked you to get to us. Letterhead from both your P.O. and therapist addressing issues, again since we're talking about your treatment program we can do this either in public or private session.

- We can do public, that's fine.

- Okay, great. So he has two pieces of information regarding his therapist and from his P.O. So we're just gonna take an opportunity to read this information real quick.

- I apologize my copier ran out of ink at home.

- So how you been doing with your treatment?

- Good, it's actually been helping. Mostly on the lines of communicating, that was a big issue I've been working on. Being able to express that okay, I'm having a problem, I need to talk. Usually I just bottle it up and can't control it. So working with that has actually helped a lot. And Susan and Brittany have been very helpful with that also in my OCD issues.

- Okay. Are you still currently employed yet?

- I actually started the night of our last session, it was my first night of employment. So it's kind of rough being here at eight o'clock and having to be at work at 11.

- But you're still employed?

- Yes, still employed, I'm actually being offered a promotion so.

- Good, I mean--

- Where is it that you're working?

- I currently with StaffMart as a temp agency, temp-to-hire throughout two-hour online.

- Okay, and so when you're not working, what are you doing?

- Well when I first get home I sleep, obviously. Otherwise I'm always just putting around the house, making home repairs and everything else. 'Cause my wife and I bought a house while I was incarcerated. So that's what I've been doing in my spare time. If that doesn't happen, I've been hanging out with friends and stuff. But mostly at the house. Socializing, role-playing games such as Dungeons and Dragons and such. I will play on the Xbox but not online.

- All right, is there any more questions for him? All right does anybody want to speak for or against him? Come up ma'am.

- Name and address?

- Bonnie Flory, 1494 Morrow Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin, 54302. I'm Christopher's wife, and since he's been home, and he started treatment the communication between us has been a lot better. Before if there was something bothering him, he would not talk about it, he would just, you know, basically look a little pissy, and not discuss what was bothering him. But now we have that open line of communication. He has also, in his spare time, especially with the weather changing, I have a 70-year-old basically adapting grandmother, we call her my Grandma Lynn, and he goes over there and

he shovels the snow for her. And he openly offered, he wasn't prompted or anything, he just called Grandma Lynn, see if she needed help. And in between the defrost, when it got a little bit warmer, he went over there and he was helping clean out her gutters, trying to get ready for whatever snow fall might come. Before he wouldn't have done that, he would've just done his own thing, but he's looking for ways to put himself out there so that he's interacting with people more and more, which impresses me, we've been married nine years since this last September, and in nine years I never saw that.

- Okay.

- So having him home has been a big benefit, both financially 'cause he's working, you know it helps us be able to do the repairs. But I think emotionally for both of us.

- Okay great, thank you. All right does anybody want to make a motion?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Flory, address specific, 1494 Morrow Street.

- I'll second.

- Motion passes four none.

- Okay sir you've been approved to Morrow Street, address specific, if you do know, that's 1494, you would have to come in front of us again. You want that mailed to the Morrow Street address?

- Yes please.

- All right, thank you very much.

- All right thank you guys so much, you guys have a Happy Holidays.

- Thank you very much!

- Next is Mr. Bishop. I have your file here, Mr. Bishop, just give me a second. Okay, so, as I'm reading this, last time we saw you was in May of '19?

- Yes.

- At 181 South Andruin Street?

- Yeah.

- And you were denied because you didn't provide any documentation for work and treatment.

- Yes sir.

- So now you wanna move to 1857 Western Avenue.

- Yes.

- Okay. So I'm gonna ask the same question we did last time, so do you have any documentation, as it relates to, you know, specific treatment programs?

- I have 'em at school, and my work document, but I don't have 'em on me.

- Okay, you should've brought that, I'm trying to see if there's any, see if there's any information you provided here, within the packet. Let me just look.

- There was not, it's just the C-Cap stuff and--

- Okay, all right. So again, I think that what we're looking for is last time you were here you were looking to move to a different address, we were looking for that information that we had requested, and so, right now it looks like you haven't brought it again. I don't know what to tell you, unless you can tell me what circumstances have changed, I mean it's your open forum, so go ahead if you wanna say something.

- Well right now I just got released in October, I got out and then been working for a month now. In Brendago, so school full time. I'm working two jobs not just one.

- And what were you last in for?

- Forgery.

- So is that between May and now, that you were in for forgery? Since you were here in May.

- Yes I had to tie myself in June 15th, when I came and saw you guys.

- So where are you working?

- I work at Wyoming Falls and the partners at janitorial, in KPS.

- So where are you living now?

- Right now I'm still with my aunt, my mom moved right next door to my aunt, in a duplex, it's the same landlord, so she got the left side of the duplex, and my aunt got the right side of the duplex.

- So you're living within the city limits of Green Bay right now?

- At this Western address?

- I was will with my mom at the but she moved to the duplex, on Tuesday I think, but she has houses, so I can't stay with my mom now. So I put my aunt's address.

- So the 1857 is your aunt's address?

- Okay, well I mean to be honest with you sir I'm not, I'm not tempted to vote for you for this location because I still don't have you're treatment information, which was the reason we denied you last time. So I mean we originally gave you 60 days to do that, when you were on the VanDuriun

Street, and then you failed to show in May. And then obviously you were arrested, or back in prison in June. So I mean, I don't know how the rest of the board feels at this particular time but I think that's still something that we need to see from you. So you know, am I missing something, do you guys wanna say anything different, or am I looking at this wrong?

- No I'd say that too.

- So I guess what I'd like you to do is, if you're willing to come back next month, then come back next month with the documentation that we requested, which is basically, your current pay stubs that tell us you're still working, and then the documentation--

- I don't have any pay stubs, it's all direct deposit.

- Okay then we'll need some sort of letter that proves you're working there, from your employer, okay. But also then, we need that documentation as it relates to your treatment program, and what you did do. Because that's what we were looking for last time.

- And I'm gonna add also, because we've had a problem with the forgery of the landlord's signature, that we one time requested a certified letter from the landlord, and you never did bring that in, but I'm gonna request that for this time also.

- Well what if I bring 'em in, 'cause my mom and my aunt are very close to the landlord.

- If you're bringing him in that's fine, we just ask for his ID, okay.

- So that's him.

- Picture ID.

- Okay.

- You can get, request a deposit from your employer. Do you have email?

- Yes.

- They can email that to you, I understand most of this stuff is done electronically. But even with that, usually they do send you an advising deposit notice in the mail. If they don't do that, minimally they should be sending that to you by email. So you can bring that, I mean if you don't have the checks and check stubs that's fine, they just don't do that. But it does show that you had these deposits made in your account.

- Okay, so right now we're gonna deny you for today, because you didn't have that information. But we'll put you on the agenda for next month, okay?

- Okay.

- So I'm gonna deny 1857 Western Avenue.

- I second.
- It's a motion to deny so a yes vote is to deny. Motion to deny passes unanimously.
- Okay, we'll see you next month.
- You guys have a great holiday.
- Yup, you too. Mr. Langlay. All right, let's get your file open.
- You haven't been before since 2016?
- No wait, what?
- You haven't been here since 2016?
- So you're looking to move to 1115 Cherry Street, right?
- 1115--
- 1115, yup. Apartment number 15?
- Yup.
- All right so tell us how you've been doing.
- Really good.
- Really good? You're still employed?
- No, I'm on disability now.
- Disability, okay.
- It's cause of hernia depression, degenerate disc, herniated disc.
- Okay, so what are you doing with your days then?
- Smoking cigarettes and drinking coffee. There's really not much else, well then my family picks me up and I go and spend the weekend, Thursday through Friday, Thursday through Sunday.
- And where's that located?
- Sometimes Coleman, my grandmother's in Coleman, and my mom lives in Flasky.
- So why are you looking to move to this particular location?

- Because right now I'm living at Diversions, and now that I have a steady income, I have to move out on my own.
- Okay, so that's for Dan's Avenue?
- Yeah.
- Is Diversions?
- Yup.
- Okay. Just check something real quick. If anybody has more questions you're more than welcome to ask them while I'm looking for something.
- So you said you smoke cigarettes and drink coffee but obviously you do more than that.
- I go to the store now that I got money and buy soda and stuff like that, coffee. I get out . Few blocks to the store and stuff. And then in the Summer I take walks, it's just cold right now, I don't get out. I'll walk for about an hour and a half or so in the Summer time.
- Okay, does anybody have anymore questions for him? Does anybody wanna speak either for or against him? Come up ma'am. You're name and address?
- Amy Bozzacco, and my address is 11 Guns Road.
- Okay go ahead--
- could you spell your last name, Amy?
- B-O-Z-Z-A-C-C-O. I do case management for Jeremy, and so I've know him since 2017. Which is when he lived at the address you've disapproved him for before. Unfortunately at that point he had to move out of that apartment because of lack of funds, and so the county placed him at Diversion. And then for awhile, 'cause he was still on probation at that point, the probation officer put him in the TOB for a little while, again due to lack of funds. 'Cause he hadn't been approved for his disability yet. I'm really nervous, I don't know why. I think it's because this has been like a two and a half year process, and I feel like everything's riding on tonight. It sounds so horrible. And then you can only stay stay so long at TOB so they put him back in Diversion, and he just got approved in what was it, September?
- Yeah.
- For his disability. So once he was approved it's like okay, now we have money we can go find him an apartment. Which is very hard, I don't know if you guys have ever tried to help somebody find an apartment that is willing to take somebody that's a registered sex offender, it's almost impossible, and I have a lot of connections in the city with landlords, that just automatically deny him. So anyway, once he's in his apartment we will be going every single day to provide support to him, because we do have monitoring, so we'll go at least once a day, possibly twice, depending on the way his meds are scheduled.

- How long is that for, I mean how long would you be doing that for?

- I hate to say forever but in essence it could be forever, it's one of those things that, at this point, do you mind how much I tell them Jeremy? Okay so at this point he's on a mental health commitment, a chapter for mental health commitment, so he's court-mandated to have mental health treatment. And Jeremy wasn't officially diagnosed, or started having treatment till he was in prison. So it's kind of came up that he needed treatment. So at this point he's on the chapter for commitment. And he actually just chose to stipulate, to continue that, last Thursday, right? Yeah, so at this point it's mandated that he has to have us, at some point that could be the judge says he doesn't, but he could still choose to have us at that point, and I think he would, I mean I feel like he would, just because he chooses to stay on commitment. He doesn't choose to contest it. And then he see's a psychiatrist every two to three months, he gets an injection, as part of his medication. And he's always been compliant, even when he lived in the apartment before when we had him, he was compliant with all that. At this point, you guys are saying what does he do all day, I told the landlord if where he's at now is technically a of Diversion, I don't know if you guys are familiar with Diversion.

- No.

- so typically it's a place that people go that they maybe need a little bit of extra help but they aren't quite where they need to go to the hospital for mental health. But Jeremy had no where to go, that's where the county decided just to place him. But I told the landlord if they have a complaint, it's probably that he doesn't come out of his room, and he stays to himself. He's just a really quite guy that just stays to himself. I would like him to be more social.

- And I have my family to pick me up.

- And I say that as it shows he has problems, right.

- And so you said you're there once a day or twice a day or some representative is there. So is he then regularly drug tested to make sure that he is taking his medication? Or how do you know for sure, or are you actually giving it to him?

- So we go, for him at this point his meds are all prescribed at eight A.M. and eight P.M. So we would go every, eight A.M. in the morning and watch him take them. And then if the doctor chooses to move the ones that are eight P.M. 'cause a lot of times they will 'cause monitor at eight, then we monitor again at four. If they moved 'em to four we would go back at four and watch him take them at four. And then just based on symptoms and stuff we'd be able to tell fairly quickly if he's not taking the night ones, if the doctor doesn't move them. But Jeremy's been very forthcoming with me, it was just maybe a month ago you were feeling more depressed, and you asked for more medication? And I mean there's been other times where he's asked in the past that, you started hearing more voices, you asked for more Risperidone. So he's been very forthcoming about his symptoms, as far as that kind.

- Okay, and so is it most weeks he is with his relatives Thursday through Sunday?

- You go about every other week?

- Every other week.

- I'm asking, I don't know, is it about every other week you'd say you go see mom?
- And then the other week he's at grandmas--
- Well Grandma wants me once a month, so every other weekend I might go out to my family--
- someones, one of them.
- And I believe him too, I mean I talked to my boss with this, I wanna vouch for all my clients, like I would vouch for Jeremy, I wanna do that for all my clients. To me that speaks just 'cause like.
- Okay, all right, appreciate it. All right does anybody have any more questions for him? Anybody wanna make a motion?
- I will, make a motion to approve the address here, 1311 North Dan's Avenue--
- no, no, no, 1115 Cherry Street.
- Yeah, that's the one, oh I'm sorry. 1115 Cherry Street, #15. Motion to approve.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- Motion passes three to one.
- Okay sir you've been approved to move to 1115 Cherry Street, apartment #15. If you do move, you have to come in front of us again. All right.
- Yup.
- Next up is Mr. Ryan Pulley.
- Thank you.
- You're welcome.
- I don't see him.
- okay.
- So Mr. Pulley is not here, can I have a motion to deny Mr. Pulley to 324 Quinton Street--
- I'll take that motion.
- Second.
- all in favor?

- [All] Ay.

- One other thing I too I didn't wanna do with the person in the room, but Mr. Bishop we need to send an officer out there too. Obviously he's still living there illegally.

- And I had a conversation with him and told him he had to bring that documentation, and I also told his P.O.

- So okay, I just got a question, so you just said that and I agree with you, but lots of times we tell them to send an officer, like when people are in the room, why is it different this time?

- You know, I just I didn't want to basically say, you know, you gotta get out of there. It just didn't feel appropriate at that point. Rather than just say, hey you know, I'm gonna fine your grandma or his aunt or whatever, 'cause she's gonna get fined.

- Yeah no, I get that.

- One of the things too is, is there anything else here I just wanna bring up one other quick thing, to the board real quick. I was interviewed by Channel Five or Channel Two--

- I saw you on TV.

- And I did send information on those two individuals, I never got a response back from you. I emailed you, I scanned, they basically searched out people that have been denied, to see if they were living in those locations.

- You did send out a .

- And they were?

- Yeah we sent the detectives--

- You did, okay, I just never got a response.

- The detectives were aware, and the community police officers were also informed.

- The interview was just basically, the people that you deny, how do you know that their not living there and I said, well, if we believe they are we send an officer out, if not we don't. I said we can't follow up on every single one, every day, that's not.

- And some of those situations we do send officers out two, three times, they're not present when the officers go out there, so I mean if their not there, we've got nothing to cite on.

- And I do send an email to PD the next day after the meeting and let them know whose approved, and whose denied, and if they were approved for 90 days, it says on there, and what--

- And if they were denied from an address they said they're currently living at, we do request that an officer go out there.

- That's what I thought, you know.
- You just gotta catch 'em there.
- Right, right. Okay there's nothing else. Our next meeting is January 8th, at four P.M. Can I have a motion to adjourn?
- I'll make a motion to adjourn, but I'm already logged out, so I probably can't make the motion.
- You can make the make the motion, I can put your info into--
- I'll second the motion.
- All right, everybody in favor of adjourning?
- Yes.
- Aye.
