VERBATIM MINUTES

Se we're gonna bring this meeting to order for the Green Bay Sexual Offenders Residency Board for February 19th. We're gonna start off with the agenda, can I have a motion to approve the agenda?

- I'll make that motion.
- I'll second that.
- Also then need to approve our minutes from our January--
- [Rachel] We're still waiting on one other vote.
- Finally.
- [Rachel] Okay, we're good.
- Need to approve our minutes from the January 8th meeting, can I have a motion?
- I'll make that motion.
- I second.
- [Rachel] Motion approved.
- Okay, our first person up is Mr. Santos.
- [Interpreter] Senor Santos.
- Okay, Mr. Santos, we're gonna review your documentation of where you're at.
- [George] Mm hm. Okay, the letter he has is from Wisconsin Department of Corrections indicating that he has signed up for treatment but right now there is no, there's a waiting list for a Spanish interpreter to begin his assessment.
- [George] Mm hm.
- I don't need to.
- You don't need to see it. You can have that back. Okay, I'm just gonna review your case here before I make some comments and thoughts.
- [George] Mm hm. Do you guys have any questions for him, go ahead?
- Deanna, can I just ask you?
- Mm hm.
- 'Cause in November it said you received an email from his PO that said he was registered for classes.
- [Deanna] Right, but they need to have a Spanish speaking interpreter to do his assessment. I included an email exchange between his PO and I, where his PO said they are still trying to line up a Spanish speaking interpreter to do an assessment.
- Assessment, okay.

- [Deanna] Right, and they just have not been able to get anybody yet but he says Mr. Santos is willing to do it, and that he's wanting to do it, they just have to get the person lined up to take early assessment.

- So that's the holdup?

- [Deanna] Mm hm.

- So again, it's the last, the last 90 days they couldn't get basically, or no one to do the assessment?

- [George] Mm hm.

- Are they that booked up or they just can't find somebody?

- [Deanna] I just think they can't find somebody to do the assessment, is what I'm getting from it.

- That's interesting.

- So the first time we asked for this was back in July of last year.

- Mm hm.

- So we're working on eight months. Just some general comments here. I'm not willing to extend it anymore. Something isn't right here. Eight months is enough time to find a new interpreter, to get him either an individual class or through a group class. And I'm just, he was convicted of a first degree sexual assault of a child.

- [George] Mm hm.

- So, does anybody else have any more thoughts or comments?

- Well I agree, I don't know why there's nobody, in the city of Green Bay?

- [Deanna] Yeah, that's what they're telling me.

- Or Appleton or anywhere?

- Especially with Spanish being pretty common these days, it just doesn't seem right.

- [Deanna] It's the response I'm getting from the PO that they're still trying to line somebody up.

- Well, I'm gonna make a motion to deny Mr. Santos to 1713 Amy Street, is there a second?

- I'll second that.

- [Rachel] So this is a motion to deny, so a yes is to deny it. Motion passes unanimously.

- Mr. Santos, you've been denied to live at 1713 Amy Street. My suggestion for you is you've got to put some pressure on your PO to get somebody to help you. We waited eight months, this is too long. I don't know what to tell you, you've gotta get your PO to help you, this is just taking

advantage of the situation. And it's not you taking advantage of it, unless we know your status on where you're at, it's just, I thought we've accommodated this a lot. And so, unfortunately you're going to have to vacate that premise.

- [George] Mm hm.

- Do you have any questions?

- When?

- Immediately.

- One month?

- I can't do that, that's not my prerogative. I can't do that. So basically, under the rule he can technically stay there three days, but after that he'll be considered living there and then the person that he's renting from will be fined, and he'll be fined.

- Oh, can I say something?

- No, go ahead, finish. Okay, thank you very much. Next up is Mr. Brabbs. Have a seat, sir. Before we get started I just want a couple of quick ground rules. We're gonna talk about your case. I just want to make sure that when we do talk about it don't use any personal names of your victim. Just refer to the person as the victim. Don't refer to them as a family member or cousin or anything like that, okay? Second thing is if we go over your treatment programs, you have the right to do that either in public or private session, which would you prefer?

- [Curtis] It doesn't, public I guess.

- Public's fine? Okay, so it looks like you're at the TLP and you're looking to move to 1950 Fiesta Lane, is that correct?

- [Curtis] Actually I was removed from the TLP. They had given me 60 days. I had been released on December 10th. I had been granted from prison an early release. I actually had two years left remaining on my sentence. So they didn't have time to set me up because I had got granted the release the day before Thanksgiving, and then they released me on the 10th, so the PO put me in a TLP because they didn't have a residence at the time. They gave me 60 days, but I was able to find a place in January, which is being held right now for me, but I haven't been able to move in it because I have to clear this residency board.

- Okay, so technically are you homeless right now then?

- [Curtis] Well, I was approved to stay at my mom's house. They removed me on February 7th. And the PO gave me six days because the board meeting was postponed. So the day of the board meeting I contacted SORP and I contacted my probation agent, and you guys, I think you guys contacted my probation agent too, because she had let me know that it was postponed, but they had said they would extend me another week until this hearing. So technically I've been staying, I'm at 314 South Fisk Street.

- Okay.

- [Curtis] But SORP said that you're gonna write down the address but put me on a homeless status, which I don't know what that means, but that's what they did. I do have the...

- Documentation from the state?

- [Curtis] Well yeah, this is from my PO about me being removed from the TLP.

- Okay, all right. Okay.

- [Curtis] I do have the lease to the place that they were gonna allow me to rent. I did turn it in, it was signed by the landlord on that paperwork I turned in. That I sent in.

- All right, so let's talk a little bit about your case. So the offense date was back in 2007, right?

- [Curtis] Yes.

- Okay, it was second degree sexual assault of a child, correct?

- Yes.

- Okay, so tell me what happened and what did you actually do?

- [Curtis] I had met the victim the same day at a mutual person's house that we both knew. We ended up having sex that evening. After it was over we went our separate ways. Like seven, eight months later the police came and talked to me and said that she was pregnant and that she was underage. I took a paternity test. After she had the baby it turned out to be mine. I pled guilty to the offense in, I believe, it was December of '08, and I was sentenced to prison. During my incarceration I didn't get in to any trouble. I completed two college courses. I also worked the entire time even though I was going to school, I worked the entire time. I did bring documentation about all that. In October of 2019 I petitioned the Brown County Court, which was, I had a different judge at the time but the judge who heard my petition for release based on my behavior while I was incarcerated was Judge Zuidmulder, I believe. And he granted me an early release from prison. While I was incarcerated they never offered me the program while I was in there, it's just at the time they had, it had been backed up because it was short staffed, a lot of different things were going on. I assumed that I would've been offered because my release date was getting close, it was getting under two years. After I got out I did reach out to a guy by the name of Tor Cornelius-Adkins of Oneida Behavioral Health. Now I didn't get any paperwork, but they have been in contact with my probation parole. They are waiting for an assessment which should be this upcoming week. We had to sign some papers for... For my PO it released files, like my paperwork or whatever, for him to get it, and then he's gonna do an assessment. But just based on the crime itself he said that assessment isn't really gonna matter because I'm gonna do the program anyways. But he hasn't scheduled me for an actual date yet, but it is Mondays from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., and he said I'd be starting here within the next few weeks just after he gets in contact with my PO. I just seen my PO before I came over here. She did give me her card if you guys needed to contact her for any questions related to programming or anything.

- So my question for you is when you were in this party, you were basically 26 years old?

- [Curtis] Yeah.

- Okay. Didn't you have a clue this girl was underage?

- [Curtis] Physically, no. I didn't really know really much about her at all. That was the first time I ever met her, was at that party, actually it was the first time I had met her and the last time I had met her 'til I was released. I don't have like a no-contact thing with her. I actually see my daughter on the week-end. Me and my daughter go out to eat every Friday. Our daughter is now, she's 11 years old. My PO is totally fine with it. I do see the victim. Pretty much once a week I pay child support. We have an agreement that's worked out through child support, I pay her cash. I do have a job.

- Where are you working?

- [Curtis] At American Foods, and I started working there on December 26th. Three days after I was released I went and got my driver's license. Like five days after I got my driver's license I purchased a vehicle, I got it registered, I got insurance.

- So in terms of your support group, who do you have? Your family, brothers and sisters, mom and dad, or?

- [Curtis] Well, my dad's passed away, but I have my mom who's here. I have my grandma who couldn't make it 'cause she's gotta work, and I also have the victim. But unfortunately two of her children have the flu, not my daughter, but two of her children have the flu. So unfortunately she wasn't able to make it either.

- Okay.

- [Curtis] But I do have aunts, I have uncles.

- Okay, just real quickly, in terms of how he described the case, is that's what's in the record?

- Based on the criminal complaint, he held the victim down, and removed her clothes, which I don't think he had stated. They did have sexual intercourse and it resulted in a child.

- And so did the victim indicate, basically, it was forcible then, right?

- Correct. The victim did state stop, please, and no. But he didn't stop.

- Okay. So do you agree with those statements or not?

- [Curtis] I wish she was here to speak on her own behalf, but I'm gonna agree with what the criminal complaint states. It's unfortunate the situation that we were in, or I was in. But I'm not gonna disagree with what the criminal complaint says, but I... I do wish that she was here to also speak too because she is in support of me and stuff like that. But I'm not gonna disagree with what was said in the criminal complaint, and if you guys want to contact my PO at some point too, me and my PO had a discussion about what had happened, what took place. I was completely, 100% honest with what happened. When I had gotten out of prison I was the one who reached out to sign up for the program. That's why my PO didn't set up a thing through the state or anything like that. I already paid for the application process of the program.

- You're talking the sexual offender program, correct?

- Yep.

- Okay.

- [Curtis] I've already paid--

- Do you have any documentation that proves that your assessment is gonna be, like in a week or so, or anything like that?

- [Curtis] No, but you can contact my PO.

- Okay.

- [Curtis] When I had first gotten out, like I said, I got out early so everything kinda happened kinda quick. I had actually contacted him while I was in prison, the guy who runs the program, his name is Tor Cornelius-Adkins. I had stated to him that I had got a hearing with a judge about a possible early release, and that if I was released that I would need to do the program. And he had sent me a letter back stating that there's an application fee just to sign up for it and that the cost of it is gonna be--

- So a stipulation of your early release was to do sex offender training?

- [Curtis] No, it was not.

- It was not?

- [Curtis] No, there was nothing. When I got the early release from the judge, there was nothing stated about what was to be done or anything like that. The only thing that happened at the hearing was that the victim, my daughter, my mom, my grandma, my uncle, I had family show up. The judge actually at the time only asked me two questions. Other than that he spoke the entire time and he had the district attorney, which was, I think his last name was Lasee, he had spoken with the victim prior to that and the judge and the district attorney were both in agreement about an early release on that.

- All right, any other questions that either of you have for him?

- I don't.

- I don't either.

- Okay, obviously he hasn't had any sex offender training at this point. You said your assessment was gonna be next week?

- [Curtis] He's supposed to be setting up, he's actually waiting for the probation parole to get him the file because he didn't have it. So I had to sign like a waiver of confidentiality or whatever it was. He said once he reviews the file then we'll go from there. But I was straightforward with him about what had happened. And he told me based on what I had told him that the evaluation isn't gonna change anything for having me do the program.

- Right, it'll just give you a baseline of where you're at.

- [Curtis] And then he had just told me that, 'cause I had told him my work hours, but his program runs Monday nights from 7:00 'til 9:00. I told him that I would be all on board with it and that I'm ready whenever he's ready.

- It doesn't conflict with your work?
- [Curtis] No, I work from 4:00 in the morning 'til 2:00 in the afternoon.
- Okay.
- Okay. All right, if there's no other questions, does anybody want to make a motion?
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve you address specific 1950 Fiesta Lane for 90 days to give you time to get your assessment and hopefully into a class, to come back just with that documentation.
- [Curtis] Okay.
- Is there a second? I'll second the motion.
- [Rachel] Motion passes two to one.
- Okay, you're approved for 90 days to this specific location. At that time you have to come back and provide the documentation that was asked for. In addition, if your victim wants to be here for your support, that's awesome. If that person cannot, if you have some sort of letter, that would be helpful.
- Yeah.
- Okay?
- [Curtis] I would ask that you guys take my probation parole agent's card. She's been in constant contact with the victim also. I've been approved to be around my daughter, be around the victim. I didn't get to show you guys any of my stuff, but I've got a certificate of recognition from probation of parole, just about everything I've been doing since I've been out, I've been paying all my fees, all my restitutions on time. I've been doing very good since I've been out. I appreciate everything.
- I believe you, I think the thing here is, again, we want to make sure you get some treatment and we understand where you're actually assessed from a professional standpoint.
- [Curtis] Okay.
- All right?
- [Curtis] All right.
- All right, you'll get notice, do you want the notice sent to this location, 1950?
- [Curtis] Yes.
- Okay. All right, thanks very much.
- [Curtis] Thank you very much.
- Next up is Erin Bartels.

- Hi.

- Okay, Mr. Bartels, we're here to hear your appeal to move to 1511 14th Avenue in Green Bay, is that correct?

- [Erin] Yes.

- Okay, and you're on Lost Dauphin Road in De Pere right now?

- [Erin] Yes.

- Okay. First thing is we're gonna go over your case and just refer to the person as the victim, not by proper name or any type of relation. Second thing is, if we do talk about your treatment programs you have the right to do it either in public or private session, which would you prefer?

- [Erin] Public.

- Okay. So it looks like you had child pornography, five counts.

- [Erin] Yes.

- All right, how did it, you to be discovered with the child pornography, what did you do to get caught?

- [Erin] Well, there were folders of child pornography sent to a Dropbox account under my name, which then Dropbox itself, the company, reported it to police after they had discovered it.

- Okay. How long did you look at child pornography?

- [Erin] I didn't actually. The report said that there was 10 times that I logged in, however that was in an old account that I had used for schooling. I did not use it anymore because I had switched over to Google Drive. So I think what happened is I knew about it at one point and I didn't tell anybody, although I was not looking at it.

- Well who got it to Dropbox in your name?

- [Erin] I don't know who it was, but I know that it was a link that was sent to me, I think on, I don't remember what app it was, Kik Messenger maybe, and the link contained the files which it was then saved to the account on Dropbox, under my name.

- So you've never looked at child pornography?

- [Erin] Not intentionally, no. I did not seek it out. But like I said, I think that I did, I think I saw it once, I didn't tell anybody because I didn't know what to do with it.

- Okay, so just a quick question for you. It looks like it says a contested plea, so what does that exactly mean?

- Can we say what about the trial?

- Did you go to trial?
- [Erin] No.
- No.
- It said guilty due to a no contest plea, I'm sorry. So you pleaded no contest, right?
- [Erin] That was what the public defender suggested that I, and I just did everything he suggested.
- Okay. Is the account he's saying correct? That you have there, in terms of the detail?
- Yeah, from what he has represented, yes. He did not talk to our detective. Said the email account was an old email, the Dropbox account, that's what he said to the detective.
- Okay. All right. So are you under the intent of doing any sex offender training at all, or not?
- [Erin] I had already completed the sex offender treatment program that was ordered by the court. However I don't have the certificate for it because just before we finished the entirety of the treatment program I had moved to Florida to live with my grandparents, help them out. I ended up having to move back a week later just because a conflict of where they were living was too close to a park even though all the back and forth I did with the authorities there, they approved it until I got there.
- Okay.
- [Erin] So I completed the minimum amount of time I had to be there, I just never got a certificate.
- And what is that there?
- [Erin] This is for Thinking For Change, which is another program that I did, if you want to look at it.
- So do you expect to get a certificate?
- [Erin] No, it was a while ago, I don't know, my probation agents all know that I have done it. I had done it under Jeanne Delain.
- Delain. Okay, it says here that you're gonna be basically buying a house through a land contract, is that correct?
- [Erin] Yes, I will be purchasing it.
- Okay, where do you currently work, sir?
- [Erin] Capstone Logistics.
- And what do you do for them? I pretty much just unstack pallets and separate boxes. So does your income support you buying a house?
- [Erin] Absolutely.

- Okay. Well, I sure would like to see that documentation that you, through Jim Delain, you said was his name?

- [Erin] Jeanne Delain.

- Jeanne Delain?

- [Erin] Yes, I don't, I am not with her anymore. As of the last time I saw my PO I was with Eric Kobetler, although that's the last time I went to see him. Next month I'm getting a new probation agent and I'm not aware who that is.

- Okay. Does anybody else have any more questions for him?

- How long were you on probation for?

- [Erin] Until October.

- Of this year?

- [Erin] Yes. I haven't really had any... I don't know what the word is, but like faults or anything, I've been following all my rules. There was one time I left the county by accident. But that's really the only time I had done anything wrong. So I'm following everything, just trying to get it done.

- Is there a reason why you're looking to move to this location?

- [Erin] I'm trying to buy a house. That's pretty much it, that's the only house, it's hard to find a house that fits in De Pere, and that house works really well with where my family lives too.

- Why would you consider buying before appearing in court, everything's kind of influx right now?

- [Erin] What do you mean, I'm sorry.

- You don't have approval yet.

- Yeah, you don't have approval for one thing.

- [Erin] This is the order that my probation agent suggested is to just get approval for a loan through the bank, which I am approved, I have everything that I have to do. If I wasn't approved here I would buy a house in De Pere as soon as one is available. However, this house in Green Bay works really well for me.

- So basically how I read it in your, the person that's selling is gonna buy a land contract until it gets approved by us, so that's how I read that email.

- You did, no, it's not a land contract.

- It's not gonna be a land contract.

- [Deanna] If the board approves him then they'll sell him the house.

- Gotcha.
- They only want to do what's necessary.
- All right, I'm sorry.
- [Deanna] It's okay.
- Okay, this would not be a land contract, you're right. Okay, yeah.
- And are you with your parents right now, at Lost Dauphin?
- [Erin] No, that's a family friend of my parents.
- Okay.
- Okay, how long have you been working at the current job?
- [Erin] Since November of 2017, or 2018, I believe.
- Okay, so about a year and a half?
- [Erin] Yes.
- Okay, all right, I don't have any more questions. Does anybody else?
- No.
- Anybody want to make a motion? I'll make a motion, well here's the thing, I really need to see that documentation that you attended the class, I just, that's where I'm kinda at, so I was gonna say, well hey, I was gonna approve you for 90 days, but hey, that's ain't gonna work.
- Yeah, you're buying a house.
- That ain't gonna work for buying a house, until you can get the documentation, you know.
- [Erin] Is it possible that I could just contact Attic Correctional Services and have it sent to you?
- Oh yes, yeah, that's what I'm kind of thinking is if I have proof you attended the class and completed the class, then I'm okay, I am, I don't know about these two, but I'm okay with you living where you want to buy your home.
- [Erin] So would it be possible to get approval with that condition that I send it to you, without having to come back?
- Bring it in to?
- Yeah? He say, you're saying yes, right?
- [Rachel] If you put a deadline on it that it's conditional, and if it's not provided to the Law Department by that date, then it would--

- Be revoked?
- [Rachel] Correct.
- Okay, all right.
- That would make me feel better.
- That's where I'm at. Okay, so I'm gonna make a motion to approve you to 1511 14th Avenue, Green Bay, address specific under the condition that within 30 days we get a copy of your completed certificate of SOT training.
- 30 days.
- Well how long is it gonna be before, like when is the?
- Well I'm just saying, we have to get it by 30 days. If he gets it earlier.
- Yeah, but what if moves in already, or he goes ahead and then we don't get it at all.
- Then he's out of luck.
- [Erin] I won't have the house within 30 days anyway.
- Okay.
- So all we're saying is that, if you would move in, that's your risk, but if we don't receive it in 30 days, you're not gonna be granted the right to be there.
- [Erin] I'm sure it would be perfectly fine for me to get it to you.
- Okay, that's the mo--
- [Rachel] Mr. Bartels, I just want to make sure that you understand that he's saying you have to provide the document, his motion is to approve you to be there, the 30 days is just for you to get the proof of completion to the Law Department here.
- [Erin] Yes.
- [Rachel] Okay.
- Yeah, and if you don't, then you will not be approved to be there.
- [Deanna] So you would just need to bring the document to me or Rachel.
- [Erin] Okay.
- Is there a second to that motion?
- I'd make it 15 more, but.

- I'll second it.
- [Rachel] Motion passes two to one.
- Okay, you've been approved pending that certificate getting to the city law offices in 30 days.
- [Erin] Okay.
- All right?
- [Erin] Thank you.
- Next up, Mr. Quentin Welch. Okay, Mr. Welch, we're here to hear, to look at your appeal to 2190 South Point Road.
- Yes, that's correct.
- As we go over your case, again, just refer to the person as the victim.
- Yes.
- And then if we want to talk about your treatment programs, can we do that in public or private session?
- Public.
- Pardon me?
- Public.
- Public, okay. All right.
- How long have you been at this address already?
- I've been there since the first week of December.
- Yeah, you were here in 2015.
- Yes I was.
- So you knew about the ordinance, obviously. But yet you chose to move there without getting approval.
- It's 'cause of my agent, my agent and his supervisor forced me to move to my mom's house, because I was considered homeless back then. And I was temporarily living at my mom's house last year.
- On December 19th, you said he moved there?
- Yeah.

- [Deanna] I can answer it, Dean, he had applied, but because the way the property is titled we didn't put him on an agenda until now because the land is owned by the Oneidas, but the house is owned by, I believe, his sister.

- Yeah.

- Okay.

- [Deanna] So there was some confusion there, so we didn't get him onto an earlier agenda, 'cause we were waiting for documentation for that.

- Okay, so he tried.

- [Deanna] He tried.

- I was trying, yeah.

- Okay, all right, okay.

- I wasn't trying to sneak in there.

- That's where I was headed with this one. I appreciate the information. 'Cause I was like, wait a second, here. Okay, so your parole officer asked you to move in with your mom, right?

- Yeah.

- Can I ask why?

- 'Cause at the time I was, my stay at the TLP was over, and I didn't have any other place to go, so I was considered homeless, so he put me up at my mom's.

- So why were you back in the TLP?

- Because I just got released last year.

- Yeah, but, 1740 Western Avenue, so that was back in 2015, so were you reincarcerated?

- Yeah, I was reincarcerated since then.

- Okay, what did you do?

- That was a multiple rule violation, contacting my ex when I wasn't supposed to.

- That was the only reason?

- No, I was drinking, smoking.

- And so your parole was revoked.

- Yeah.

- And you said you were released December 19th from the TLP?
- January, no, February of last year.
- Okay.
- February 5th.
- All right. So are you currently employed, sir?
- Not at the moment, I'm actively seeking.
- Okay, have you been employed since you were released?
- Yeah, I was working all of last year for Pioneer Metal. They hired me on, I started off as a temp. And right now I'm in the middle of trying to get back in with them, 'cause they've restructured their shifts, and since I was a new hire-on, they had to lay me off in the meantime.
- Okay.
- So I'm trying to get back in there again.
- All right.
- So far it's looking good.
- So, why should we let you live in Green Bay. We let you last time. Obviously your parole got revoked because you could follow the rules. So why should we believe you now, that you're gonna be a model person and not potentially re-offend?
- Well this time around I haven't broken any rules, and I've been out for a year now. No rules violations, and I've been doing my programs, and I just graduated from AODA a couple of weeks ago.
- Can I see that?
- Yeah. And I'm actively doing my Aftercare treatment once a week, every Wednesday.
- So, another question as I look at this report, why did you go back to drinking and smoking?
- The last time I was out?
- Yes.
- I don't think I was ready to quit back then. Now I am, I don't want to do that anymore. I don't want to risk not being able to see my daughter anymore, 'cause she's getting older now. My real daughter.
- So you say you weren't ready? Even though you obviously took that risk and got yourself back in prison?

- Yeah, I did.
- How long have you been not employed? From today, two months, three months, four months?
- Well I had a temp job like three weeks ago. That was only about a week and a half though.
- So is your goal to just make enough money until you can find your own place or what's your intent?
- Yeah, 'cause I don't intend on staying there for a long time, just until I get a job and save up and get out, get to a place of my own.
- And this location is in the city limits of Green Bay?
- That's what I'm wondering too, is it?
- It's like off of Airport Drive.
- Okay. So let me ask just a, I guess, a procedural question. So it's my understanding that if the Oneida Nation buys a piece of land within their original boundaries, that's part of the reservation. So if the land that he's on is owned by the Oneidas, that's technically part of the reservation?
- [Rachel] Well, they can own it in fee or they can own it in trust. There's a process that it takes to reabsorb into the trust property, so once it's part of the trust, then it has additional protections, then it's reassimilated, like reintegrated into their reservation. If it's held in fee, they're the owners, but it's no different property rights--
- From a regular?
- [Rachel] Than anyone else owning that parcel.
- Okay, okay, so I'm assuming that's the way it is?
- [Rachel] Ownership in fee, yeah.
- Okay, all right. Okay, thank you. Does anybody have any questions for him?
- No.
- I guess I just want to go back to why do you feel so sure now things have changed?
- I'm just more focused this time around. I don't want to go back to prison anymore. I'm getting way too old for that, and I haven't drank in a year. I feel better, mentally focused.
- Do you go to AA or anything like that?
- Well I do, I go to my Aftercare treatment now, it's every week. And I'm learning quite a lot of skills from them. Keeping me from drinking. I don't even think about drinking anymore. Except when I'm talking about them there. All these role-plays that we do.

- Okay.
- So how long are you still on probation?
- About three and a half years.
- And you get a sobriety test when you go in?
- Yeah, I do.
- Okay, I guess from my standpoint, he's getting those sobriety tests which would tell us that he's gonna go back to prison if he does it, and he hasn't had any other run-ins with the law other than that.
- Right.
- That would tell me that there's a problem. So that's where I kind of see him right now.
- I'm just trying to reestablish myself now.
- All right.
- I'm making a lot better effort this time.
- Okay, does anybody want to make a motion?
- I'm gonna make a motion to approve address specific 2190 South Point Road.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second that.
- [Rachel] Motion passes two to one.
- Okay, sir, you've been approved to this particular location, address specific. If you do move again within the city limits of Green Bay you will have to come in front of us again.
- Yes.
- Do you want this sent to the 2190 South Point Road?
- Yes please.
- Okay, we'll do that. Thank you very much.
- Thank you very much. Have a good day.
- You too.
- [Audience Member] Thank you.

- That's my mother.
- No problem.
- Our next meeting is March the 11th at 4:00 p.m. Is there anything anybody else wants to talk about today?
- I will not be at the March 11th meeting.
- What type of life do you have if you can just plan it that far ahead?
- Retirement.
- All right. If there's nothing else, can I have a motion to dismiss?
- I'll make that motion.
- Is there a second?
- I second.
- I'm taking, I don't know, I'm taking three daughters-in-law to Waco, Texas. This could be--
- Waco, Texas.
- The trip from hell or it could be a lot of fun, we'll see.
- Three daughters-in-law, holy mackerel.
- Yes.
- They must like you.
- [Rachel] Can I get your votes?
- I voted.
- I did too.
- I did too, and I actually went out of it already, 'cause it showed up that--
- Kathy, I assume you voted yes?
- [Deanna] Unless she wants to stay you know. No. Yeah it went through so I thought--
- No, and they don't live near each other or know each other real well, so this is gonna be fun.
