VERBATIM MINUTES

- **Sexual offenders residency board meeting for May 13th 2020. Like to start off with first, our roll call. Looks like we have three members present of the board, is that correct?**

- **We have four. Let's see. We have Dean, Heidi, and Melissa, and Renee.**

- **Okay. Okay. First meeting on the agenda is approval of the agenda. Does anybody wanna make a motion?**

- **[Melissa] So moved.**

- **Is there a second?**

- **I'll second.**

- **All in favor. [Both] Aye.**

- **Aye.**

- **[Melissa] Aye. Next up is approval of the minutes of May 13th 2000, excuse me, approval of minutes of March 11th, 2020. Is there a motion to approve?**

- **[Melissa] So moved.**

- **Seconded?**

- **Second.**

- **All in favor, say aye. Aye**

- **Aye.**

- Rachel, we ready to go on to our regular business, or do you need a second?
- I'm just marking all as yes for that last one. Regular business, all right we're all set.
- Okay, our first person is Jose Polar Cruz.
- Is that the person I'm translating for?
- Yes.
- Okay, okay. Jose, . Oh, okay, yes. He's present.
- Is present, okay. Mr. Cruz we are gonna be looking at your appeal to move to 1309 Irwin street, address specific, in Green Bay, Wisconsin. And as we go through your application here, we ask that as we ask you questions, that you just refrain to referring to the victim by personal name or surname. You understand that?
- [Jose] Okay.
- Okay, sir, looks like your conviction was for soliciting an underage teenager at the age of 15. You received three years probation.
- That's correct.
- Okay, and who does he plan to live with when he's here in Green Bay?
- My sister-in-law.
- Okay. Do you currently have a job prospect when you come into town, or not yet?
- Yeah, I've been looking for different type of jobs, yeah.
- All right, sir, can you describe to us your conviction and how it came about?
- It happened via text message.
- Right, and you knowingly solicited to meet a 15 year old, is that correct?
- So just, I was new in town, I was new here. And so when we were texting back and forth it was just regular conversation till the point that she start talking with sexual conversation. So at that point I ask what was your age, she say I'm 15. So he said well I don't wanna have any problems with that so I don't want nothing to do with it. So she say to me, no, you're not gonna have any problem. I'm very independent, I'm having a job already, I'm babysitting kids. And then she make it a point to get together. So at that point is when the police got there and they took me.
- Sir, I read the police report as it states in terms of how this event occurred. And that's not the way that the officer indicated it happened, that he actually, the officer who was

pretending to be the girl was the one that actually told you her age. And then you asked specifically how you could make her feel good, and you said that you could do things that would make her feel good.

- Uh, okay, so. You know you have all the back and forth texting though and she asked me things. You can see the text.

- But you did knowingly go to meet her even though you knew she was underage.

- Yeah, that correct.

- Rachel, real quick question, in regards to treatment programs. Do we still have to go through our process we normally go through since we're in this format?

- Yeah, if people chose to go into closed session I can just put everybody else in the waiting room. And the rest of us just stay in the zoom session.

- Okay. Sir, I'd like to talk to you briefly about sexual treatment programs you may or not have been involved with. As a result, you have the right to talk about that in closed session or in a public session, which would you prefer?

- No, it doesn't matter.

- Okay. Sir, as part of your conviction and conditions for release you were supposed to get a psychological evaluation and treatment follow the recommendations of the psychological evaluation. That was not attached. Did you actually go through that process?

- I haven't had a chance to do that because they were trying to find some translators for me. So that's why we were waiting on that.

- So how long have you been released?

- You can talk to my probation officer, I'm with her right now.

- I think he's only sentenced to probation. I don't think he got jail time.

- That's correct. So I guess my question though is he was supposed to have a psychological evaluation and treatment following the recommendations of the psychosexual evaluation as part of his condition for parole.

- [Tiffany] This is Tiffany Ribbard, I'm his probation officer. Am I able to?

- Go ahead, yes ma'am.

- [Tiffany] Okay, he did have the psychosexual eval as part of the court order. He has not had treatment due to two things. We have not had the ability to have a translator as part of treatment because we are in a very rural area. So that has provided difficulty to

secure that for our treatment facility. We have one treatment provider in our area. And they have not been able to because they travel to us. We don't have like a, we are an off site satellite treatment place. So they come to us, and it's been difficult to get a translator because of that to bill insurance. Due to whatever those reasons are. And then he's been wanting to move to Wisconsin, so then that has been because I did not want to start him in treatment here knowing that if he does move to Wisconsin then he would have to start treatment there. And it's a kind of a fluid process and then he'd have to start all over.

- Right. I notice that the evaluation though was not part of his paperwork that we have in front of us.

- [Tiffany] And I didn't know it needed to be sent with, I guess that's my fault. I did not know it was needed to be sent with.

- Well it's just, not that it necessarily had to be sent, but in terms of us making an evaluation whether he should be an exception to our ordinance it'd have been good to know what that examination said about his potential for re offending and his current condition.

- [Tiffany] Well I guess I can tell you based on my knowledge of I have his eval with me. I you want me to read you what the recommendations said?

- Normally we won't accept that, but since you're his parole officer I'm okay with it as long as the rest of the board is okay with it.

- Okay.

- Fine.

- Can I explain to him that he did the evaluation so that what you guys are doing right now, so he knows?

- Go ahead.

- Okay, great.

- [Tiffany] So I can read what it says. In regards to, it says with regards to recommendations recommended, Mr. Cruz follow all conditions of his probation, given that he's placed in a level two and considered below average risk, intensive sexual offense specific treatment is not recommended. He would, however, benefit from brief treatment to provide education regarding healthy sexuality and appropriate sexual boundaries. This will be brief in nature, and can be done by a treatment provider who specializes in treating individuals with problematic sexual behavior. If no such provider is available, this can be done by a treatment provider comfortable with providing psycho education related to healthy sexuality, sexual boundaries. Mr. Cruz should have no unsupervised contact with adolescent females until he receives approval to do so from his probation agent, or treatment provider. He should also have no unsupervised access

to social media. Additionally it is recommended Mr. Cruz work toward achieving and maintaining stability and engaging in pro social behavior such as maintaining employment and stable housing as well as engagement in pro social, age appropriate relationships in an effort to mitigate risk of re offense.

- Okay, thank you.

- [Tiffany] You're welcome.

- Is he currently employed where he's at?

- He is, as a seasonal worker at our, it's called the Northern Pride Turkey Plant. And he's been there for a couple seasons now.

- Okay. And he's an approved resident of the United States?

- [Tiffany] He is.

- Okay. Other questions the board may have?

- Is he married right now, and how long has he been married? If he is.

- It's gonna be a year about June or July I believe.

- Okay.

- [Melissa] Hi, have you ever been in Green Bay?

- Excuse me?

- [Melissa] Has he ever lived in Green Bay?

- Yes.

- [Melissa] When?

- From 2013 to 2015.

- [Melissa] His paperwork says that he was in 2013, and then there was a break in time, and then 2015 and 2016. Is that correct?

- Yeah, I know I was here in 2015 because I was a father, and I have a kid. Not in '16, no '16.

- [Melissa] Okay. Also, besides the two individuals that, your sister-in-law and brother-in-law, is there anyone else in Green Bay that you know?

- Yes, I have cousins.

- **[Melissa] Are they aware that you are a sex offender?**
- **Yes.**
- **[Melissa] I'm sorry?**
- **Yes, they are.**
- **[Melissa] Okay, and what about your wife? According to your paperwork she is not in Green Bay right now?**
- **She's in Mexico.**
- **[Melissa] How long has she been in Mexico? And when do you anticipate that she'll come to Green Bay?**
- **I'm not sure if it's two or three years. She is having done surgery, bone marrow transplant.**
- **[Melissa] Okay, so she will stay, remain in Mexico for approximately two more years?**
- **Yeah. Two years for sure and I don't know if it's gonna be more than that. We don't know yet.**
- **[Melissa] Okay, and also you mentioned you have a child?**
- **Correct.**
- **[Melissa] And where is your child right now?**
- **[Jose] In Ohio.**
- **Ohio.**
- **[Melissa] Okay, thank you.**
- **Does he have any family members where he is now?**
- **[Jose] No.**
- **No.**
- **Okay, any other questions anybody else has? Mr. Cruz, would you like to say anything before we ask for a motion?**
- **[Jose] No.**
- **No.**

- Okay, with that then I'd like to ask for a motion if any of the board members wanna make a motion.

- I'll make a motion to deny Mr. Cruz to 1309 Irwin Avenue.

- Is there a second?

- I second.

- All in favor of the motion to deny Mr. Cruz to the address he's put on, say aye.

- Aye.

- Aye.

- Opposed? Sir, you've been denied access to live in Green Bay. This doesn't mean that you can't apply sometime in the future, but at this particular time you have not been approved to move to Green Bay.

- Okay?

- [Jose] Okay, thank you.

- Next up is Mr. Derek Van Roy.

- [Deanna] Hi, this is Deanna, I have him on the phone on my desk phone here in my office. So I am unmuted right now. So Mr. Van Roy, are you still there?

[Derek] Yeah.

- [Deanna] Okay, can you hear him?

- [Derek] Yes.

- I can hear him. All right, Mr. Van Roy, we're here to hear your appeal to move to 1344 East Mason Street in Green Bay, is that correct?

- [Derek] Yes sir.

- Okay. Just to let you know the process, we're gonna go over your sexual offense, we ask that you just keep it to, refer to the person as the victim and not by personal name or surname. At some point in time we may want to talk about your treatment, you have the ability to have that in private session or public session. Which would you prefer, sir?

- [Derek] I really don't know the difference.

- The difference would be in private session the only people that'd be present would be yourself, along with the board members and that is not part of the permanent record. Whereas public session is, it is part of the permanent record.

- [Derek] Public record, public hearing would be fine.

- Okay. All right, sir, looks like you have two offenses. One that occurred in October of 2001, and the second one November of 2018. Could you first talk to us about the one that happened in October of 2001 and tell us what happened?

- That-

- Sir, I can't hear you.

- [Derek] What's that?

- [Deanna] He said he was in a relationship, they were both in high school.

- Okay. The second one, victim age was eight years old in November of 2018.

- I think that's '13.

- Oh, '13? Okay.

- [Melissa] Can we get clarification on when the offense occurred?

- He was convicted in 2015, so it couldn't have occurred.

- Yeah, it must have been 2013.

- [Melissa] Okay, thank you.

- Sir, can you tell us about it? We're not hearing anything.

- [Deanna] He was in a bad place in his life, and he started to talk to?

- [Derek] Started to talk to my daughter-

- [Deanna] Oh, please don't identify the victim.

- [Derek] Oh, I'm sorry.

- [Deanna] He started to talk to the victim as if they were an adult.

- [Derek] Yes.

- Okay, go ahead sir. Keep on talking, I can hear you.

- [Heidi] I can't.

- [Melissa] If I can interrupt, it sounds like you're either moving around. If you're on a cellphone you need to stand and stay in one place cause you're going in and out.

- [Deanna] I actually have him on my desk phone, that was the only way of getting him on to the call.

- [Melissa] No, no, no, I mean him. Him, he needs to stay in one place cause we'll hear him at one point in time, and then he goes out.

- [Deanna] Okay. Okay continue, Derek. Thank you.

- I can't.

- I can't hear a word he's saying.

- [Deanna] Okay, I cannot get the phone any closer to my laptop. He said he started treating the eight year old as if it was a relationship, and it became kind of relationship that shouldn't have been. Is that what you're saying, Derek?

- [Derek] Yes ma'am.

- [Deanna] Yes, that's what he's saying.

- Deanna, do you have your cellphone up against the microphone?

- [Deanna] I have the desk phone up against the microphone.

- Cause we're not hearing anything.

- [Deanna] And I have it up as high as I can.

- Is it on speaker?

- [Deanna] Yes, it's on speaker, I have him up as high as it can go. Okay, can you repeat what you said, Derek?

- [Derek] Yes, I was, I was treating her as an adult and-

- [Deanna] Can you hear that?

- That was better for a second.

- [Deanna] Okay, here let me flip the phone upside down and hold the receiver on. All right, can you talk now?

- [Derek] Can you hear me now?

- [Deanna] Can you hear him now?
- Nope.
- No.
- [Deanna] Okay, do you want me to just relay what he says, then?
- [Melissa] I don't think that's a good idea.
- [Deanna] Okay. Yeah, this is-
- Can't he just call in to the Zoom meeting?
- [Deanna] He cannot. I had checked with the prison and they said that he couldn't, we have to call him. He's at Red Granite. I can try on my cell phone, if you want me to try on my cell phone I can try and call him back using that.
- [Melissa] Is that a work cell phone?
- [Deanna] No, it's my personal one.
- [Melissa] I don't think that's a good idea. Unless you can block it.
- Block your number, *67, and then call the prison.
- [Deanna] Okay, all right. Derek, I'm gonna try you again, okay?
- [Derek] Okay.
- [Deanna] All right.
- While we're waiting, Dean, please remember to ask if there's anyone who's looking to speak on behalf of anybody.
- Okay, I didn't know if there was anybody from the public in the call.
- They're invited, so there might be.
- Okay.
- So just ask.
- Okay, I will. I didn't know that.
- [Deanna] Okay, I'm back. Derek, you wanna talk?
- [Derek] Can you hear me?

- [Deanna] Can you hear him?

- It's better, I can hear. Sir, so can you describe the sexual assault, the second one that happened in 2013, and what occurred?

- [Derek] It was two times.

- I can't hear that.

- I can't hear a darn thing.

- [Deanna] I'm gonna try on this side. Can you speak again, Derek?

- [Derek] Can you hear me now?

- [All] Yes.

- [Deanna] All right. Okay.

- [Derek] Okay, it involved the touching of her, her vagina and .

- Now it went out again.

- It was good for a second.

- I guess at this particular point, unless the board members feel differently we're gonna have to put his appeal on hold until we can clear up how we can communicate with him. Does anybody have an issue with that? If they do, let me know, or else we'll make a motion to postpone his review.

- I have no issue.

- [Melissa] No problem.

- You do have a problem?

- [Deanna] He's supposed to get out in two weeks. He just wanted you to know that.

- Yeah, I mean but if we can't hear from him then I just don't feel comfortable making a decision on this one.

- [Deanna] Okay.

- I'm gonna make a motion to push Mr. Van Roy's appeal to our next meeting. Second?

- Second

- [Melissa] Seconded.

- All in favor say aye.

- Aye.

- [Melissa] Aye.

- Opposed? Okay, Mr. Van Roy, you're gonna have to appear for us at our next meeting. And hopefully we have, at that point when you're released you can call in on directly into the meeting and we can hear your appeal. I don't know if you will be released directly, would you be homeless if you're gonna be going to some sort of facility, but at this point we can't make a recommendation on your appeal until we can actually communicate with you.

- [Derek] Would it be possible to-

- I didn't hear what he asked.

- [Deanna] He's wanting to know if he can get temporary permission until the next hearing.

- Nope.

- No.

- [Deanna] They can't.

- [Derek] Okay.

- Okay. So we'll have to move on to the next person. Mr. Holland. Mr. Gary Holland, are you here?

- I would, I'm Ashley I'm his niece. I'm here to speak for him.

- Is he on the phone? Or is he-

- He's supposed to be on this call. He is incarcerated at Sanger B. He said that he has not seen the social worker all day. He just called me. So I don't know if there's a possibility for him to be dialed in? I did watch a previous meeting, granted it wasn't a Zoom meeting.

- Well it looks like we do have the phone number here. It says Heather Stern?

- Yeah, that is his probation officer.

- Oh it is.

- [Deanna] I'm sorry, he's possibly with someone named Scott, I think, Profiter. I thought I saw him sign in earlier.

- Oh. It's possible. He didn't say who he was gonna ask. He was supposed to be calling in with the social worker of Sanger B prison, but he said that he thinks that he didn't come in to work today. So I told him that he needed to talk to a correctional officer to see if somebody could dial in with him because this is his last window to get residency approved.

- Well, I tell you what, at this particular point I'm gonna make a motion to move him to last to give you an opportunity to maybe try to get a hold of him and see if we can do that. So I'm gonna make a motion to move Mr. Holland to the last person on our agenda. Can I have a second, please?

- I'll second.

- All in favor say aye.

- Aye.

- Aye.

- So moved.

- Thank you very much.

- Next up is Mr. Joshua-

- [Deanna] This is Deanna, I have Mr. Holland's person at the prison on the phone. They were on but they said that he couldn't hear any volume or anything. So do you want me to have him call in to the meeting right now?

- Yeah, yeah.

- [Deanna] All right, I'll have him call in, okay. He's dialing in now.

- Mr. Holland?

- I still see the same number of participants. I don't see anyone having joined. Okay, one person just joined.

- Mr. Holland? Who just joined us?

- Deanna, do they know that they have to enable their sound?

- [Deanna] I do not know if he knows that. He was gonna dial in, he wasn't gonna log in through Zoom. I think that's it right here, this number that just popped up, that's him.

- Hello, who just joined us?

- [Gary] Hello, this is Gary Holland.

- All right. Mr. Allen, are you logging in for Mr. Holland?>

- [Gary] Yes.

- Okay, my name is Dean, I'm the chair of the Green Bay sexual offender's residency board. If you could put Mr. Holland on, we can start his appeal.

- [Gary] Okay, this is him.

- Oh, I'm sorry. All right, Mr. Holland, we are gonna go through your appeal form for residency in Green Bay. Couple things before we get started, just wanna make sure we have the correct address. You want to move to, which is 2245 Imperial lane, is that correct?

- Apartment one.

- Apartment one, okay. Sir, we're gonna go over your conviction and what happened. We ask that you just refer to the person as the victim, not by personal name or surname. In addition to that we would probably go over your sexual offender treatment or any type of treatment program that you've had. Because of that you do have the right to have that either in public or private session. Which would you prefer?

- I guess you can leave it open, that's fine.

- Okay. All right, sir. I want to know, you have a first degree sexual assault of a 12 year old child. Could you tell us what happened, how long you were engaging it with this victim, and how it came to fruition that you were assaulting her.

- It was a one time thing. It happened once. Well, I lived in the house where she was mostly. Yeah, it happened one time and the outcome of it was a pregnancy that was given up for an adoption.

- Okay. Sir, I'm reading the criminal history under your assessment. It said that you had started these sexual assaults that occurred approximately 25 to 50 times.

- [Gary] Yeah, that's what the, that was in the police report.

- Is that not the case?

- [Gary] Correct. I mean when I was going through court, my attorney told me to just leave that alone. Just don't bring it up. I mean fight that, or anything. We just let it go because she said it wouldn't change the outcome of anything. But it didn't go on for a long period of time. I mean I've known her for a long period of time, but. The actual, the sexual part of it was a one time thing.

- **[Melissa]** According to the report that is not what the victim stated. She said that it happened on more than one occasion.
- **[Gary]** Correct, I know what the police report read. And my judgment conviction also read that.
- **[Melissa]** And if you could, again, without mentioning your relationship to the victim or the victim's name, can you tell us a little bit more detail how this happened?
- **[Gary]** I lived in the home with her.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, that's kinda vague.
- So in other words she's asking you how did it occur? I mean how'd you get the victim alone to do this?
- **[Gary]** Her mother was at work. So I mean I lived in the house with her, her mother was at work, it was just us.
- So how long after this occurred did she, did the victim give notice that this had occurred?
- **[Gary]** It was about a year later.
- **[Melissa]** If we could step back. Question for you, did you live, was this a house with one big room?
- **[Gary]** No, it was a three bedroom house.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, did the victim have her own bedroom?
- **[Gary]** Yes she did.
- **[Melissa]** Did you have your own bedroom?
- **[Gary]** I did.
- **[Melissa]** Where did this assault occur? What room?
- **[Gary]** It would have happened in my room.
- **[Melissa]** It would have happened in your room, or it did?
- **[Gary]** It did.
- **[Melissa]** Okay. And was it customary for you to be in your bedroom with her?
- **[Gary]** Yeah, I mean she's been in there on more than one occasion.

- [Melissa] Okay. And what was your age at the time?
- [Gary] 27.
- [Melissa] You were 27 years old at the time, and the victim was 12?
- [Gary] Correct.
- [Melissa] Okay. And you were in a relationship with the victim's mother?
- [Gary] Yes I was.
- [Melissa] Okay. Did you disclose to the victim's mother that you had a sexual, that you sexually assaulted her daughter after that occurred?
- [Gary] I did not.
- [Melissa] Why not?
- [Gary] I don't know. I never did though, I never brought it up until I was arrested.
- [Melissa] Okay. And according to the police report, there was a child?
- [Gary] There was.
- [Melissa] Okay, and did you know that the victim, well first of all, when the child was born were you still living with the victim and her mother?
- [Gary] Again, I'm sorry, I didn't hear it?
- [Melissa] Sure. When the child was born, were you still living with the victim and her mother?
- [Gary] I was.
- [Melissa] Okay, did you know that the victim was pregnant?
- [Gary] No I did not.
- [Melissa] Okay, and were you present when she gave birth to the child in the residence?
- [Gary] I was not, I was at work.
- [Melissa] Okay. And at some point in time, did you find out that she delivered a baby?
- [Gary] I did.

- **[Melissa]** Okay, and then how were you notified of that?
- **[Gary]** Her mother.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, and then what happened next after that?
- **[Gary]** After that, that's when they set up like adoption stuff. People were coming to the house. I wasn't a part of that. That's when the baby was given up for adoption.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, when did you find out that you were the father of this child?
- **[Gary]** Had DNA administered by the police department, and then several months later I was arrested.
- **[Melissa]** And was the before or after the adoption?
- **[Gary]** I do believe that was before.
- **[Melissa]** Okay. I don't have any additional questions right now.
- **[Dean]** Yeah, sir, again according to this record it said that you had intercourse with her once or twice before she was 13 and once or twice after she was 13. And you're saying it only happened once.
- **[Gary]** Correct.
- **[Dean]** Okay. Like to talk about your sex offender treatment program. Looks like you completed, at least you're saying you completed SO2 training, is that correct?
- **[Gary]** Correct, I did that at New Lisbon Correctional Institution.
- **[Dean]** Okay, we have no documentation assigned to this, that you had completed that.
- **[Gary]** I mailed the transcript in that packet.
- **[Dean]** Well there's, I don't think that was part of the SO2 training, was that? I thought that was just an evaluation.
- **[Gary]** That should have been from a Dr. Ribble at New Lisbon. That's what we get when we graduate the class. That's like her final report where she writes in there how you did.
- **[Dean]** Oh Jean Ribble?
- **[Gary]** Yes.
- **[Dean]** Okay. I didn't know that was the report.

- [Gary] Yeah that's all we get when we complete it.
- [Dean] Okay, okay. One of the things it says here that you still have a medium degree of impulsivity. Could you explain to me your thoughts on that relating to impulses you still have?
- [Gary] Well that was many years ago. I don't feel like I have any. I mean I know what I gotta do and I know... I still like read through notes from back then and I know she wants me to do like an after care. So I mean I plan on doing that.
- [Dean] Okay. Sir how long have you been out?
- [Gary] Out of what?
- [Dean] Well it says here, I got a letter from Builder's First Source that you've been working with them since August 26th?
- [Gary] I'm still incarcerated until July 7th. But I'm on work release.
- [Dean] Okay, so you're on work release. So you go to Builder's First each day?
- [Gary] Correct.
- [Dean] All right, okay.
- [Melissa] I have a question regarding that. Is Builder's First located in Green Bay, or De Pere?
- [Gary] It's located in De Pere.
- [Melissa] And-
- [Dean] Is it, go ahead.
- [Melissa] Go ahead, I'm sorry.
- [Dean] No I was gonna say is there a reason, De Pere versus Green Bay?
- [Gary] My niece's been looking for places for me she's looked at about 50 different places, we didn't have any luck. And then she found this place on Imperial Lane. The landlord was willing to work with me. And it's something that I can afford.
- [Dean] Okay.
- [Gary] Because I mean I tried to get Howard Hobart area but it's just, it wasn't gonna happen for me.
- [Melissa] Mr. Holland, have you ever lived in Green Bay?

- [Gary] I have not.

- [Melissa] And who, it said in your paperwork that you're support system consists of your, I believe your niece, your daughter, and your sister. Is that correct?

- [Gary] Correct.

- [Melissa] Where do they live?

- [Gary] My daughter and my sister live in Antigo, Wisconsin. And my niece lives in Wisconsin Dells.

- [Melissa] So none of them live in the Green Bay area?

- [Gary] No.

- [Melissa] And do you have any support system here in the Green Bay area?

- [Gary] Just a guy that I met through work. He's an older gentleman, but he's been real good to me. His name is Gary Dubois.

- [Melissa] And does Mr. Dubois know that you are a sex offender?

- [Gary] Yes he does.

- [Melissa] Okay, I have no further questions.

- [Dean] So I have a question for the Lieutenant. It looks like this offense occurred in Antigo, so why is he being released into Brown County? Would we know why? Officer, are you there?

- [VanEgeren] Yup, I'm here. I guess I'm not sure why he's being released into Brown County.

- [Dean] In regards to, we have his criminal history here do you have the report in front of you that the victim says she had intercourse with him more than once, or not? As far as what you're seeing.

- [VanEgeren] Yeah, so I have the criminal complaint here in front of me. And it doesn't specify the amount of times that this occurred.

- [Dean] Okay. Sir, is there a reason why you're being released into Brown County versus up in Antigo?

- [Gary] No, I put in for a transfer. To keep my job over here, and try to keep my employment.

- [Dean] Okay, okay. So at this particular point you don't know if your transfer to Brown County's been approved at this point.

- [Gary] Well I was told I had to wait till I had this meeting with you.

- [Dean] Okay, all right. Does anybody else have any questions for him?

- I do. On March 16th there was documentation in your classification report that the release resident plans over requesting residence with your niece or sister in Wisconsin Dells or Antigo. What happened to that? Why are you not going there?

- [Gary] It was my choice to try to stay over here so I can keep the job that I have.

- Okay. All right, I have no further questions.

- [Dean] All right, is there-

- Can I just add something to that?

- [Dean] Who is this speaking?

- Ashley, his niece.

- [Dean] Ashley, just wait for just a moment. So there's no further questions? Then again, Ashley, okay you can go ahead and make your statement.

- So that, what you were just speaking of, the release addresses, those were requested by his social worker saying that he had to have release addresses put in otherwise he was going to be released to. Who at the point had not had an apartment lined up for him yet. And they said we were out of time. So he had to give tentative release addresses at that time.

- [Dean] Okay, is there anything else you wanna say on his behalf?

- Yes, there is. So first I would like to say thank you guys for holding the meeting. I know last month's was canceled because of everything going on. I am familiar with Gary's charge and why he's in. I was present for most of the court dates and sentencing. I realize that what he did is not excusable, and it should have never happened in the first place. But I know deep down that as some might see it Gary is not a monster. The Gary that I know is loving, he's a son, a father. He's outgoing and a hard worker, and a peace keeper. He really is a good man. He did make a mistake and he regrets it every day of his life. I know we keep in contact a lot, and I keep his spirits up and tell him life isn't over yet. You still have time to pick up the pieces and move on. I think that him going back to Antigo would be a mistake. It's a very small town. When we went through processing, or sentencing he was plastered all over the Antigo newspaper. I don't know if any of you are familiar with Antigo, but it's a very small town. Everybody knows

everybody's business. And my concern is that if he goes back to Antigo, the victim and victim's family will do anything in their power to try and get him locked up again. They've already made it very apparent that they would do so and they've already caused issues with all of us. Even now, 12 years later. It's very much been one of the situations where we have all suffered from this, and us as his family have received backlash from this. Which I get, and I'm sure a lot of families situation. But honestly, I stand behind him 100%, and I know that he's changed, and I know that he can do well in Green Bay. And I've talked with Gary Dubois, his supervisor, and I've talked with Matt Tremmel, who is the operations manager, I believe is his title. And they very much would like Gary to stay there. They said that he's one of the hardest workers that they've ever had. And I think that him being able to have a fresh start, and be in an area where people aren't looking at him badly because they know what he did, and things like that would definitely help him move forward in life. So I just hope that with all of the stuff that Gary and officer Melman sent in for him with his treatment and he did receive his GED while he was in prison. I hope that you can see that he's worked really hard at earning a second chance. And that he will definitely succeed when he's out.

- Can I ask you, do you live in Antigo or Green Bay? Where do you live?

- I live in the Dells. I did live in, yup, we did live in Green Bay for about 10 years. I have a lot of my in-law family lives in Green Bay. And I do plan on going to see Gary to see him at least once a week once he's out to make sure that he falls into a routine nicely, until he kind of gets settled into society. Cause I realize that 12 years is a long time and a lot of things have changed.

- [Dean] Okay, any more questions anybody else has in regards to his case?

- No.

- [Dean] Sir, would you like to say anything before I ask for a motion?

- [Gary] I mean I know my answers weren't that good, but I kind of got confused when you said I couldn't mention the victim or like how I knew her. I didn't know if I should, you know, say that I was the live-in boyfriend of her mother, I didn't know if that was going too far. So I just answered it the best way I could.

- [Dean] Okay. All right, does anybody wanna make the motion in regards to Mr. Holland moving to 2245 Imperial Lane, Apartment one?

- [Melissa] I will go ahead and make a motion, I'll explain why. I'm making a motion to deny. My concern is that Mr. Holland has no support system here. Work is one thing, but you can't work 24 hours a day. It's not as though he has any treatment or other means of support, family or friends that's lined up and knows of his circumstances. So for those reasons I am making a motion to deny.

- [Dean] Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- [Dean] All in favor of the motion to deny Mr. Holland to 2245 Imperial Lane Apartment one, say aye.

- Aye.

- Aye

- [Dean] Aye. Opposed? All right, sir, you've been denied residency in the city of Green Bay at 2245 Imperial Lane. Does not mean that you cannot try again, but at this particular time you've been denied residency.

- [Gary] Okay.

- [Dean] All right, thank you. Next up is Mr. Joshua Doran. Mr. Doran, are you here? All right, I'm gonna make a motion to deny Mr. Doran request to-

- I do see a Josh Doran. It looks like he just unmuted.

- [Dean] Mr. Doran?

- [Joshua] Can you hear me now?

- [Dean] I can hear you now.

- [Joshua] All right, thank God.

- [Dean] All right. So we're here to hear your appeal to move to 334 South Chestnut Street in Green Bay, is that correct sir?

- [Joshua] Well I've actually been approved already on here as a request 'cause my last time I was approved they said I need to come back 30 days to let you know how my treatment was going and stuff. I got approved the beginning of April.

- [Dean] Okay, yeah, I do see that, yup.

- [Joshua] So right now I'm just calling to, I've been in contact with I believe Deanna. Just calling to say that as the Covid virus, since there's been no treatments I have not been living at that address because of the Covid. As I stated in the first time my approval that it was under construction, and construction stopped when the Covid started. The contractors aren't working on it, so I'm still homeless. Basically I'm just going through the meeting to say that it's still my residence, the landlord's still gonna rent to me, it's just a matter of waiting until the stay at home order is removed so the contractors can work on the apartment.

- [Dean] Okay. All right, does anybody have any questions? In regards to this particular case. I wasn't here for his particular case. But it looks like you granted him 30 days.

- [Melissa] Actually, yeah, it was actually because we had to postpone and cancel the last meeting, it's been 60 days. I am probably not a good person to ask, I voted against approval. But given that there was, he was approved for a 30 day period of time I would suggest that we put it over for maybe another 60 days. Or if there's another address that he's interested in moving to in the meantime, if that's within the area to go ahead and submit different paperwork. But I would suggest putting it over for another 60 day period. Because there's no guarantee when the stay at home order is going to be lifted. I know there are some contractors that are building homes. I can see that in different neighborhoods, but every place is different.

- [Dean] Sir is your landlord giving you any indication of when it would be completed?

- [Joshua] He said he's trying to get them to come in but they don't have to work right now, he's saying. Cause the government's taking care of them. So people who don't have to work aren't working, so they're probably just taking advantage of that. But the house needs to be rewired, a licensed electrician and plumber so the city can approve the house for residency. I'm currently looking at other places and like I said it's really hard to find a place. I've been looking in De Pere and Bellevue, and even Green Bay just to submit another address so I can find one before that one gets done. Cause right now I'm living at the hotels and spending a lot of money. So I do appreciate the 60 days which was I was gonna ask just because we don't know what Evers is gonna do with the stay at home order, he's gonna keep extending it. I can't, treatment isn't gonna go back into place until then. So I would have no update on that. And the same thing with the apartment. I can tell you that I'm cooperating with SORP, my PO, I meet with her weekly over the phone and stuff. I'm doing good, I'm still employed working 40, 50 hours a week so. So yeah, I really appreciate the grant for 60 days.

- [Dean] Well it hasn't been approved yet, sir. So I'm gonna make a formal motion to allow the 334 South Chestnut for 60 days at which time you come back again and let us know if he's actually moved in and well as treatment program. Is there a second to that?

- I will second that.

- [Dean] All in favor say aye.

- Aye.

- Aye.

- [Melissa] Aye.

- [Dean] No opposed. Okay sir, you've been approved for 60 days again. And again, I think you should take the approach that it's not gonna be ready and see what you can do to find another location.

- [Joshua] Yeah, I'm doing that. Thank you.

- [Dean] The other thing, sir, I'm gonna ask you to do it next time before our next when you come up in 60 days. If you're still not being allowed into a treatment program we're gonna need some sort of documentation to that effect, okay?

- [Joshua] All right, I'll have my PO email, Deanna, City Hall.

- [Dean] All right, thank you very much.

- [Joshua] Thank you, have a good day.

- [Dean] Next up is Mr. Dustin Andre. Mr. Andre are you there?

- [Dustin] Yes, I'm here. I'm here.

- [Dean] All right, sir.

- [Dustin] Can you hear me?

- [Dean] I can hear you. Hang on one moment, just trying to get your case file up. Okay, last time we'd given you 30 days in regards to, in terms of address specific. I'm just reading here. So we wanted documentation of your current treatment program. So where at right now, sir?

- [Dustin] Actually I did speak to the treatment specialist. And she considered that I was completed with the IOP I was in, and she did send me a letter which I have here, I can mail in to your guys. That says, per our telephone session on 4/21, you have been referred to the relapse prevention program beginning 6/1 of 2020. It's a 16 week, meets weekly as group for two hours each session. I can forward that letter and as well as the sex offender treatment you guys required a letter about, I did that in 2005 through family services with Jim Drake. And I've spoken to everyone and they don't keep any records after seven years. So speaking with my agent, along with Deanna, I really just don't know where to go with that. So that's pretty much where I'm at.

- [Dean] Okay. Who was ever present at the last meeting, do you want to this?

- I wasn't.

- [Dustin] Excuse me?

- [Dean] Members that were here when you agreed to a 30 day approval, any comments in terms of where you want to go with this?

- [Melissa] I was present. We were supposed to have Mr. Andre provide proof of AODA treatment in progress. I believe that was one of them. What I would suggest is because we don't have it in the official file for the city, I suggest that we put it over so that he has an opportunity to make a copy and send that in to the law department. And with regard to, I don't remember this part, with regard to the SOT, did you not have a copy of that or what happened?

- [Dustin] Honestly, it's been a solid 15 years and I've had so much paperwork and moved around. I just honestly can't find anything. My agent did say that she was looking in the file and it does show something, but she can't give that to anyone because I can't sign the paper in person right now. So we're kind of all kind of deadlocked, and that's my issue.

- [Deanna] This is Deanna, I have been in contact with his PO and she has advised me that she can't release anything to me without Mr. Andre's signature.

- [Melissa] Oh. Then I think Mr. Andre will have to somehow get to his PO and sign off, or get a document, sign off on it, and get it to his PO so she can turn that in.

- [Dean] So Melissa do you want to make a motion to carry him for 30 days? Is that what you want to do?

- [Melissa] Yes. The motion is to put this matter over, approve the appellant to the address, specific address, and 30 day return date and provide proof of, I believe it's AODA and sex offender treatment.

- [Dean] Is there a second?

- Second.

- [Dean] All in favor say aye.

- Aye.

- Aye.

- [Dean] Aye.

- [Melissa] Aye.

- [Dean] Opposed? Okay sir, you've been approved another 30 days. At which time you're gonna have to bring back that documentation, so you're gonna have to make some sort of appointment with your PO to make sure you can get that signed. And then if not you probably will not get in. So please make sure you take the time, and we'll send out notice to that.

- [Dustin] Okay, I just want to say one thing. I can contact Deanna here tomorrow morning and I can get the address to mail in the letter from the AODA therapist. As far as the sex offender treatment letter, or whatever she can provide me signing the paper is solely based on I'm doing FaceTime video right now. They're not allowing any of us unless it's an extreme matter at the office. So until that is lifted-

- [Dean] Well, no, there's a way around that, sir. Have her send you the release form, and if she needs you to sign it you can sign it in front of a notary and then she should be able to release it.

- [Dustin] Okay.
- [Dean] They're started doing notarization.
- [Dustin] Well I will do that then. I will get on top of that tomorrow too so I'm fully prepared.
- [Dean] Okay, thank you.
- [Dustin] Thank you.
- [Dean] All right, next up is Mr. Vondrak. Vondrachek?
- I just unmuted him.
- [Vondrachek] Hello? Can you hear me?
- [Dean] Yes, Mr. Vondrachek?
- [Vondrachek] Yeah.
- [Dean] All right, again, we're here to hear your appeal. Let me just open up your record here real quick. All right, sir. Okay so this is your first time in front of the board. It looks like you want to move to 426 South Maple Avenue, is that correct?
- [Vondrachek] Yes sir.
- All right, again, when we hear your appeal we just ask that you refer to the victim as the victim not by a surname. As we go over your case, and also if we want to talk about any treatment programs you have the right to do that either in public or private session. Which would you prefer?
- [Vondrachek] It can be public.
- [Dean] All right. All right, sir. Looks like you, the offense date was in January of 2015. Was it . How you came into possession of that, and how you were caught.
- [Vondrachek] I was just looking around online at different stuff searching out various kinds of pornography. And I stumbled on to child pornography and I was using a file sharing program to acquire it and the Brown County Sheriff's Department apparently downloaded something hooked up with my computer and downloaded part of a file that I was downloading.
- [Dean] How long were you doing it, sir?
- [Vondrachek] I just, a couple of months. One or two, three.

- [Dean] Why did you think that you needed to do this?
- [Vondrachek] Well for me it was just pushing the boundaries of watching all this different sorts of porn and stuff. And living out fantasies that I had as a child of having sex with an adult, and using this child pornography to kind of relive my childhood sort of thing.
- [Dean] Okay. Does anybody have any questions related to the offense?
- Yes, you say you started the pornography three months, that correct?
- [Vondrachek] Yeah, I downloaded it for somewhere around three months or so.
- And did you start with adult pornography and then move into children?
- [Vondrachek] Yes. I'd been watching adult pornography for years.
- Oh so the child pornography was three, it wasn't just three months of pornography, it was just three months of the child porn?
- [Vondrachek] Yeah, yes.
- Okay. Could I ask why you wrote, "It caused my victim to feel stress and anxiety "and to relive the trauma all over again." When you have to write about how it affected your victim.
- [Vondrachek] Well because I found out while I was doing counseling with Jim Drake and reading victim impact statements that the viewing of this pornography, which at the time I wasn't thinking about consequences, I come to realize that it was causing the victims of these various videos to know that people are out there watching it. And it causes them to feel the trauma all over again.
- [Dean] How long have you been seeing Mr. Drake?
- [Vondrachek] I had seen him from 2016 early on until 2018.
- [Dean] Okay.
- Were you not in custody during that time?
- [Vondrachek] No I was out on bond.
- [Dean] So how long, what were the dates you were incarcerated, sir?
- [Vondrachek] From March 23rd I believe it was, March 23 of 2018 until March 10th of 2020.
- [Dean] Okay. Sir are you currently employed?

- **[Vondrachek]** I was employed two days ago, now I'm not.
- **[Dean]** Okay.
- **What happened?**
- **[Vondrachek]** What?
- **What happened?**
- **[Vondrachek]** Well I got a job with American Foods, and I went in and they do a medical history on you and I told them that I have carpal tunnel, which I do. And they said, well you have to get to a doctor, have that examined, and come back with a letter saying you have no restrictions for work. Well right now trying to get to a doctor, but I had already set up an appointment so I went and saw the doctor this morning. He gave me the slip saying I have no restrictions for work, I called them up today and they said well we decided to terminate you because it took you too long to get that slip. And it's only been two weeks since I had that first day where they found out I have carpal tunnel.
- **Okay.**
- **[Dean]** So sir, are you gonna be able to afford this location, sir?
- **[Vondrachek]** Yes. Right after I got the job with American Foods, JBS had called me for a phone interview which I told them I already have a job so but I'll be calling them tomorrow to set that phone interview up. I should not be unemployed very long.
- **[Dean]** Okay.
- **[Melissa]** Quick question, are you, when did you live in Green Bay?
- **[Vondrachek]** Around 2006.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, for how-
- **[Vondrachek]** I've been, for just a year. I've been living in Suamico.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, and do you have any family or friends that live in Green Bay?
- **[Vondrachek]** I have a brother that lives in Suamico.
- **[Melissa]** In Suamico, okay. And do you have any other support in the area?
- **[Vondrachek]** I have a father that's in Reedsville, about 40 miles south. And a mother also.
- **[Melissa]** Okay, all right. Thank you.

- [Dean] Sir, I noticed in your application you put under treatment programs you put none. But you're saying you did have some with Jim Drake, is that correct?

- [Vondrachek] Yes, I had counseling for that year and a half to two years.

- [Dean] Do you have any documentation of that?

- [Vondrachek] That's why I put down none, I don't have any documentation of it.

- [Dean] Okay. All right, is there any other questions for him? Is there anybody that would like to speak on his behalf? All right, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to his particular case?

- I'll make a motion to approve Mr. Vandrachek to 426 South Maple Avenue address specific.

- [Dean] Is there a second? I'll second that motion. All right, all in favor of that motion say aye.

- Aye.

- [Dean] Aye. Opposed?

- Opposed.

- [Dean] All right, sir, we have a tie which means your motion did not pass. So at this particular time, unless any of-

- Dean, Melissa was muted. I don't know how she voted.

- [Dean] Oh.

- [Melissa] Oh, opposed, I'm sorry.

- Okay.

- [Dean] So based upon that, sir, again your motion fails. So you have not been granted access to move to 426 South Maple. Unless anybody is willing to change their particular vote at this time. You're gonna be denied, doesn't mean you can't reapply but at this time you would be denied to 426 South Maple. Is anybody wishing to change their vote or give an explanation?

- [Melissa] My explanation is I am concerned because there is no proof of treatment with Jim Drake. And also with regard to support in the community, Reedsville is quite a ways away, there is no other support in the area other than mister, oh forgive me. Please forgive me I forgot your last name.

- [Dean] Vondrachek.

- [Melissa] I am sorry. And other than your brother. And let me ask you this, do you have constant contact with your brother?

- [Vondrachek] Yes.

- [Melissa] And do you have a relationship with him?

- [Vondrachek] Yes.

- [Melissa] Okay. And is he someone who-

- [Vondrachek] He's actually living at my house right now.

- [Dean] The house that you're intending to move into?

- [Vondrachek] Huh?

- [Dean] The house that you're intending to move into?

- [Vondrachek] No, I have owned a house in Suamico for the last 10 or 15 years. And I went before the Suamico board the day I got out and due to not having the treatment, and not having a job, and being across the street from a church they denied me.

- [Dean] Okay, all right.

- And I just wanted to say something. Melissa, I'm not sure, do you know Suamico is not that far? I mean so it's, I don't know what, 10, 15 minutes away.

- [Melissa] Understood. But it doesn't sound like there's a lot. I mean Mr. Vonder, I'm gonna slaughter your name and I apologize. Vondrachek, is he, your brother, on the call to offer any words and support? Anything about what you're doing to, are you in circles of support, are you belong to a church, do you have people that you can go to if you're having issues? Things like that.

- [Vondrachek] He would just be getting off of work right now. He works until five to six o'clock at night so he couldn't be on this call unfortunately for me.

- [Melissa] Writing you a letter in support, sending it into the city, as law department. There are a lot of things. It just doesn't sound like you have a lot of support. And when you have these, in situations like this you need support. You need people who you can rely on when you're facing triggers. Whether or not you're seeing a therapist or anything like that. Those are my concerns.

- And my concern, I'm sorry, my concern was having no treatment and years of pornography that developed into child pornography, I wanted to see some treatment. That's my thought.

- [Dean] Okay, I appreciate the comments. Sir, so essentially it sounds like to me there's a potential for people to change their vote depending on if you're able to get documentation. But at this particular time you've been not approved. At some point if you do have that documentation and want to reapply you definitely can do so.

- [Vondrachek] Yeah.

- [Dean] All right, thank you very much.

- [Vondrachek] All right, thank you.

- [Dean] Next up is Mr. Curtis Brabbs.

- [Curtis] Hello?

- [Dean] Mr. Brabbs, are you there?

- [Curtis] Hello?

- [Dean] Mr. Brabbs?

- [Curtis] Yes. Hello?

- [Dean] Hello. Mr. Brabbs, last time you were here to see us was on February 19th of 2020. And so at that time we were waiting to see for your assessment to be scheduled and the board would like to see if you come back with that assessment, hopefully enrolled into a class and bring in documentation. So I just wanna go back to your records here, see if that was attached. Anybody see that?

- No I did not.

- No.

- [Dean] I did not either. So sir, did you have that documentation for us?

- [Curtis] I don't have anything on paper, but I did get the assessment done and everything was taken care of with my PO. And his name is Torr Atkinson Corneleus, he's the treatment specialist. Today was actually the first day that he had gotten back. I did the assessment a few weeks ago and then he had some medical things due to Covid or something like that. And he did respond back to my PO. I tried to contact him this past week to see if I can get something. And then I contacted my PO to find out if she had gotten anything back from him and she had responded to me and told me that he had responded back to her with that right now that we can start doing the phone conversations and via Skype if possible with any type of one-on-one treatment programs. And my PO has documentation about it and all of that stuff. So I just wasn't able to get anything in time to send to you guys, but I have completed the assessment.

- [Dean] Okay.

- **When did you have that done?**
- **[Curtis] Huh?**
- **When did you have the assessment done?**
- **[Curtis] Roughly about three weeks ago. Maybe even almost a month ago.**
- **[Dean] Well it sounds like due to Covid-19 he hasn't been able to get a copy, or at least a copy to us.**
- **Correct.**
- **[Melissa] My suggestion would be then to approve Mr. Brabbs address specific for a period of 60 days so he can get all the information to send into us by either himself or his probation agent, parole agent. And then also provide proof that he's now actually attending or participating in treatment.**
- **[Dean] Is that a formal motion?**
- **[Melissa] Yes.**
- **[Dean] Is there a second?**
- **[Curtis] I just have one thing before any vote.**
- **[Dean] Go ahead.**
- **[Curtis] When my PO had sent me a text today about speaking with him via email she had said to me that because of the situation that's going on with the Covid thing that like there's nothing scheduled at this time. So maybe within 60 days I can bring something in, that's fine. But I'm just saying as of right now that's what he had said to my PO. That we could do stuff via phone and Skype, but what type of documentation can I get from that? Is it just something saying that that's what we do right now? Or is it something else?**
- **[Melissa] Something that describes that you had the assessment, what the results of the assessment were, the conclusions, and if you're meeting via Skype telephonically, how often. Just so that we're all on the same page.**
- **[Curtis] Okay.**
- **[Dean] All right, so there was a motion. Is there a second to that motion?**
- **I'll second that motion.**

- [Dean] All in favor of the motion to allow Mr. Brabbs to move to 1950 Fiesta Lane for a period of 60 days, at which time he has to provide documentation of his assessment and any courses that he has been engaged in, say aye.
- [Melissa] Aye.
- Aye.
- [Dean] Opposed? Opposed. Did everybody comment? Was it three to one?
- Yeah.
- [Dean] Okay, sir, you've been approved to move to 1950 Fiesta Lane on a vote of three to one for a period of 60 days at which time you will have to come back to us and provide the documentation of your assessment as well as the current course you're in and what you're doing in that course.
- [Curtis] Okay.
- [Dean] All right, thank you.
- [Curtis] Thank you, bye.
- [Dean] Next up is the appeal of Kevin Jereczak.
- Kevin, if you're on you have to unmute yourself.
- [Kevin] Can you hear me now?
- [Dean] Yes.
- [Kevin] Can you hear me now?
- [Dean] Yes we can.
- [Kevin] Okay, sorry about that.
- [Dean] Okay. Just wanted to come back, so last time we approved you for 120 days. You're seeing Mr. Drake?
- [Kevin] That is correct, yes. And even through the Covid-19 crisis here we've been able to continue therapy by telephone every week. You should have a copy of his updated letter.
- Board, that is not in the packet, but I did email that to you separately. I received it after the packet was sent to you.
- [Melissa] I've got it.

- [Dean] Yup, I've got it.

- Me too, yeah.

- [Dean] Okay, does anybody have any questions in regards to his current status? Or how he's doing with Mr. Drake?

- Well I'll ask, how are you doing with Mr. Drake?

- [Kevin] I found that working with Jim, I actually look forward to it every week, almost every week. It is a real good check every week just how I'm doing. If any triggers have arisen, how my coping strategies are working. And also during this time just a general psychiatric check for me. I've accomplished a lot in these 120 days in addition to the therapy. But my belief is that my therapy has been one of my greater accomplishments.

- [Melissa] And how is your employment?

- [Kevin] I, in end of February this year, I got a full disability, permanent disability approved and I'm under SSDI now.

- [Melissa] Okay.

- [Kevin] And I've been able to, with this living arrangement that you approved temporarily, have been able to save money, paid off some of my family for the loans that they gave me during the first six, seven months of my release. Paid off my fine to the court in this case, which was about six months early. And been able to start a new MS drug therapy, and really be consistent with seeing my medical treatment doctors also.

- [Dean] Okay. All right, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to his particular case?

- [Melissa] I'll make a motion to approve mister, this whole thing.

- [Kevin] Jereczak.

- [Melissa] Jereczak, thank you, I'm sorry.

- [Kevin] That's very good.

- [Melissa] To address specific to 716 Bodard Street Number 18, Green Bay. A permanent approval.

- [Dean] Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- [Dean] All in favor, say aye.

- [Melissa] Aye.
- [Dean] Aye. Opposed? All right, sir, you've been approved permanently to 617 Bodard Street, we will send that notice to that location.
- [Kevin] Thank you and thank all the members of the board. I appreciate your help.
- [Dean] All right, thank you.
- [Kevin] All right, bye-bye.
- [Dean] Next up is Mr. Leo Sanchez. Mr. Sanchez?
- [Leo] Yes. Yes.
- [Dean] I can hear you. Give me a second here, your file's just taking a little longer to load here.
- [Leo] Okay.
- [Deanna] Board, he is another one that I received documentation after I had completed the packet. You should have a certificate of completion for him.
- Yes.
- [Dean] Just give me a quick second. Gonna take a look at the document. Has everybody else seen it?
- Yes.
- [Dean] Does anybody have any questions with regards to this case, Mr. Sanchez?
- [Melissa] What I see is that he must provide proof that he's enrolled and attending sex offender treatment, correct? Or did I write that down wrong?
- That's what we wanted to see. But that's the certificate we got.
- [Melissa] Yeah, I see that the certificate of completion is for 80 hours of logistical professionals training?
- Yes.
- [Dean] So that doesn't seem to be SOT training, am I missing it here?
- [Leo] No, if I may interject, I was told to come back with proof of my participation in the CLT training that I mentioned last meeting. And I was also to update you guys on the SOT thing. And my parole officer had just gotten back to me a few days ago and they are actually starting the SOT back up again. And I have a phone conference

evaluation on the 22nd or 23rd of this month. So as soon as I get run through that I should be right into treatment.

- [Melissa] I know I'll feel more comfortable once I see actual proof of enrollment and attending SOT. Since that was my primary concern.

- [Dean] Right, so I guess my thought here is to give a tentative 30 day extension so long as that documentation is to the law office this week. Does that seem appropriate, or not?

- [Melissa] I would suggest 60 days at least because if everything's just starting up again and yeah.

- [Dean] Okay, I could see him coming back in 60 days, but he has to provide proof that he's in the program right now, do you agree with that Melissa, or not?

- [Melissa] Yes, enrolled and attending.

- [Dean] Okay, so I'm gonna make a motion to approve him for an additional 60 days at which time he'd give us an update as to how his treatment program is going. But by the end of the week he has to provide proof that he is enrolled in a program. Is there a second?

- [Leo] By the end of this week?

- By the end of the week, it's Wednesday evening.

- [Melissa] Right.

- [Dean] Well he just said that his parole officer had proved that he's gonna be in the program. So he should be able to say, I'm just looking for him to say that he's been approved to go into the program. That's all I'm looking for.

- [Leo] No, I only have a phone evaluation over the phone. Cause they're still pretty worried about the Covid-19 situation. But my evaluation appointment is next week, so I couldn't possibly get to you the confirmation on that by the end of this week.

- [Dean] Okay.

- [Melissa] And I would like to see something from the probation agent, or parole agent. From the treatment program.

- [Leo] Yes, I have the email for that.

- [Melissa] I mean showing you're enrolled and attending.

- [Leo] Oh okay, so when I'm actually enrolled in the classes?

- **[Melissa] Yes, for the 60 days. 60 day, day.**
- **[Leo] Okay.**
- **[Dean] Okay. So Melissa, so really the motion is approval of 60 days at which time he has to prove that he is enrolled in a treatment program along with the documentation of the evaluation.**
- **[Melissa] Enrolled and attending.**
- **[Dean] Right. Okay, is there a second to that motion.**
- **I'll second.**
- **[Dean] All in favor, say aye.**
- **[Melissa] Aye.**
- **Aye.**
- **Aye.**
- **Opposed, I am opposed. So sir, you've been approved for another 60 days at this current location at which time you will have to provide proof that you are enrolled and attending, and also the evaluation that should occur within the next 30 days or so.**
- **[Leo] Okay so would you like me to forward you an email of my evaluation status after I do it?**
- **[Dean] No, no. So we want a copy of the evaluation. So once they complete the evaluation of you they should sent that to the law office, and then we're assuming that within 60 days you're gonna be into some class and we're gonna need proof that you've been enrolled in that class. And then if it started that you're attending.**
- **[Leo] Right, I see no problem with that one. But for the first 30 days you just want me to have him forward you the information of my evaluation?**
- **[Dean] Yeah, as soon as you get the evaluation get it to us. But you for sure have to get it to us before the 60 days.**
- **[Leo] Okay, I can do that.**
- **[Dean] All right. Okay. All right. So on to our next one. Mr. Joshua Lemerond.**
- **[Joshua] Hello?**
- **[Dean] Mr. Lemerond?**

- [Joshua] Hello?
- [Dean] Yes, can you hear me?
- [Joshua] Yeah.
- [Dean] All right sir, just give me a moment to bring up your file. Okay, last time you were in front of us on March 11th, proof that you were in a treatment program.
- [Joshua] Yeah, I had an assessment on May 1st and the guy said they're not doing anything right now. And that when he cleared my assessment he was supposed to tell my PO what the results were. And I haven't found out yet. And I have to call her, my PO, Friday.
- [Melissa] If I may, assessment, was this SOT or AODA?
- [Joshua] SOT.
- [Melissa] Okay.
- [Dean] So it took you 60 days, essentially, to get just the evaluation done?
- [Joshua] 30 cause I got out in April.
- [Dean] Okay.
- [Deanna] Dean, when he appeared in front of the board in March, he was currently incarcerated.
- [Dean] Right, right. I see that. Okay. I guess, Heidi, do you think 30 days he should be able to get that evaluation or not?
- I think that with everything that's going on everything is so postponed. I don't know if he'll be able to get it in there in 30 days.
- [Melissa] I agree. I think it'd be safer just to put it, he's had the evaluation, or the assessment. It's a matter of is he going to be enrolled and attending. So my suggestion would be to put this over for another 60 days, temporary approval.
- [Dean] Okay, does anybody want to make a motion?
- [Melissa] Okay. I make a motion to temporarily approve Mr. Lemerond, address specific to 201 Hooth Street, Apartment C for 60 days. And on that 60 day date he should bring in to the hearing proof of enrollment and attendance of the sex offender treatment.
- [Dean] Is there a second? I'll second that. All in favor, say aye.

- [Melissa] Aye.
- [Dean] Aye. Opposed?
- Opposed.
- [Dean] All right, so you've been approved for another 60 days.
- [Melisa] Wait, wait, Renee. We didn't hear Renee.
- Oh, I said aye.
- [Melissa] Oh, okay.
- Yup.
- [Dean] All right, sir, you've been approved for another 60 days at which time you have to bring us documentation of your assessment as well as if you're enrolled and attending a treatment program. Okay?
- [Joshua] All right. Thank you.
- [Dean] Next up is Mr. Sanford. Mr. Sanford, are you there?
- [James] Hello there.
- [Dean] All right, Mr. Sanford, I can hear you.
- [James] You can't, or you can?
- [Dean] I can. So what we-
- [James] Am I coming in clear?
- [Dean] Yup, I can hear you just fine.
- [James] Okay, thank you.
- [Dean] So what we were looking for you, sir, is... Business which clarified a statement in a prior letter.
- That was from 2017.
- [Dean] Oh, I'm sorry. You're right, I apologize.
- [Melisa] What I'm showing is that the board previously approved Mr. Sanford, to 1730 Badger Street. And now Mr. Sanford wants to move to 1263 Reber Street.

- [Dean] Yup, you're right.
- [Melissa] Sorry, I don't know which apartment, upper or lower?
- [James] It's upper.
- [Melissa] Upper, okay. Also so, well go ahead.
- [Dean] No, hey Renee, have you had a chance to look at this location? I have not.
- Look at, I'm sorry, what did you say?
- Have you had a chance to look at this particular location?
- No I have not.
- [Melissa] Well I will tell you that Mr. Sanford and the next appellant are, it's the same address. One's upper, one's lower. I'm getting, requesting approval to move there. So that's an issue. But I guess my first question is why Mr. Sanford wants to move. Or where is he residing now and why he wants to move?
- [James] Oh well I'm right now been staying hotels and a friend's house for a little while. Then I've been staying, kind of like camping out just a couple days at a time too at the residence that I've got the keys to right now where I'm trying to move into. And I've been keeping up with SORP and letting them know where I'm at, and my agent. And I just need, like I said, move to a different location because of my increase of the rent. And I had some problems prior too by losing that apartment, I lost my 1730 Badger Street cause I had some problems with my PO and polygraph, and I was incarcerated for 30 days and my last landlord at that 1730 Badger Street he had me moved out before I could do anything. And my family had to get some of my things out of there so like I said, basically lost that. And he ended up he was gonna raise my rent to a staggering \$700 for a month's rent. And that was just a little bit too much. And I lost it because of the incarceration that I went for 30 days in March. And I had paid for March rent and he had me out of there before, you know before I could get back there and get my apartment. And I was released from Brown County just around the 29 days and then I was already moved out of that apartment. So that's why I've been running around trying to figure out. And I've got this address and I found that landlord would like to rent to me. And I have no problem making rent, I've been still a good citizen. And in the community I've got a full time job going on four years, and I just had a little quirk, it was a couple of rule violations that I got in trouble with.
- [Dean] What were those rule violations?
- [James] Lying to my agent. I was producing my own type of masturbation porn on TV and that was, you know like using my cellphone and the camera and Screen Beam. And I got a bad habit for masturbation, yet. So I was doing that for self pleasure and I had lied to my PO about buying porn which I never purchase porn. So and then talking, interacting, at one time I didn't report my talking to minors. I was doing a looking at a

truck. At the same time two kids, two boys that were just getting their driver's licenses, they were looking at it too. So I was talking to them kind of not realizing that I was breaking that rule. So I didn't bring that up in my polygraph. And like I say, the three things. The pornography thing that I was doing, the lying to the agent, and also talking to minors.

- [Dean] Okay. I did bring this location up on Map Quest.

- [James] It's about a block away from Eastman Park, and about two blocks away from Farland Park. So everybody knows where it's at right now. Does anybody have anymore questions for him?

- When was this, not passing the polygraph? Was that just recently? I missed that.

- [James] Oh, the polygraph was in February.

- Okay.

- [James] Middle part of February. And I had a, I tried to say cover up my masturbation problem with that and I lied. So then I went a couple weeks there and then I tried to explain more and then it just, she was fed up so she incarcerated me for a month. And then, like I say, that's when I started having problems like losing my apartment and my family getting involved moving some stuff out. But now I'm just trying to relocate just because of that problem that I made myself in.

- [Melissa] You're on lifetime GPS, correct?

- [James] Yes.

- [Melissa] Now are you allowed to have a smartphone?

- [James] Yes.

- [Melissa] And you're allowed to have a computer?

- [James] Yes. With approval, I don't have a computer. All I have is a cellphone.

- [Melissa] Okay. I'll be quite honest, the fact that you have in the span of one month, February and March, you have untruthfulness on the polygraph, you lied to your PO, and then you were producing your own porn for your own pleasure?

- [James] Yes.

- [Melissa] That based on your criminal history makes me very concerned that you are, I mean are you seeing any therapists right now? You seeing Jim Drake?

- [James] Yes, I'd be seeing him here real quick.
- [Melissa] No, no, no. Are you? Are you or have you been seeing him?
- [James] Well I quit seeing him back about a year ago. Like about 12 or 13 months ago. And then I joined, I got into my program. I'm still currently in SO4 with Martial Patricks.
- [Melissa] So you're currently in SO4? Let me back track. You were in SO4 at the same time you lied to your PO?
- [James] Yes.
- [Melissa] Okay, I'll be honest, I'm very, very, very concerned that you are a high risk of re offending. And you are definitely, in my opinion, a danger.
- Are you still involved with circles of support?
- [James] Yes I am.
- And what about the veteran's program?
- [James] I'm still seeing a psychiatrist at the veteran's VA clinic. Dr. Metropolis.
- [Dean] Okay, are there any more questions for Mr. Sanford? Anybody want to speak on his behalf? Okay, does anybody want to make a motion in regards to 1263 Reber Street, upper.
- I make a motion to deny Mr. Sanford to 1263 Reber Street, address specific.
- [Melissa] Seconded.
- All in favor say aye.
- Aye.
- [Dean] Aye. Opposed? All right, so you've been denied to move to 1263 Reber Street, upper. So that location will not work for us at this point in time so you cannot live in the City of Green Bay. All right?
- [James] All right.
- [Dean] Thank you.
- [James] Thank you.
- [Dean] Up next is Mr. West.
- [Darrell] Can you hear me? Can you hear?

- [Dean] Mr. West can you hear me?
- I can hear you.
- [Dean] Having a hard time hearing you. Can you speak up a little bit more?
- [Darrel] Yes I can hear you.
- We can't hear you very well.
- [Dean] We can't hear you.
- [Darrell] Let me take you off my Bluetooth speaker, and do the regular phone, okay?
- [Dean] Okay. Can you hear us now?
- Can you hear me?
- [Dean] We can hear you.
- [Darrell] Okay, good evening.
- [Melissa] Good evening.
- [Dean] So sir, you currently at 580 Spinnaker Lane? And you want to move to 1263 Reber? Is that correct?
- Correct.
- [Dean] Okay, and the lower or upper?
- Lower.
- [Dean] Okay. All right, sir, why do you need to move?
- Why, so that way I can be in compliance with the city. I'm doing everything that I'm supposed to do as a healthy adult given the circumstances that is just happening today with me just finding out that my father passed away. The man that raised me, my step-dad, he passed away. So I'm dealing with that at the moment. Not only that, to keep my gainful employment at JBS. I've been there for over 10 years, moved up in the company, became a manager. I mean not a manager, but I'm in management. I'm a trainer there. And continue paying back society the debt that I owe.
- [Dean] No, sir my question is why do you want to move from 580 Spinnaker to the Reber address-
- Oh too close to the school. Too close to the school, sir.

- [Dean] Okay.

- Too close.

- [Dean] Hang on a second here.

- It doesn't look like we ever approved you to live at Spinnaker.

- I had a hard time being homeless and then with the job that I have, I'm not making no excuses. With my position it was hard for me to leave work because I'm a vital part there. I'm in management and by us not having many people and stuff there, it was very, very hard. I mean by the time I get off work, I was doing 12 hours, everything is closed up and things like that. It's no excuse, but it was kind of hard working in a company like that where they expect you to be there and the bottom line is the profit. Not ragging on my company because-

- [Dean] So my question is, were you at 1369 Y Street?

- Yeah, I had been approved for that because my friend who I was staying with, his landlord he didn't get the letter from the landlord. But knowing the landlord, now that I know him, he would have gave me permissions to stay there because he said that I was good, you know, for the resident, I was good for my roommate there. But I wind up leaving there, bouncing around from place to place, living in a hotel, and my roommate lost his house because he had no one stable there to keep him on his toes. That's not-

- [Dean] So how long have you been living at Spinnaker?

- Spinnaker, just a little over a year.

- And is that in the Green Bay city limits? I'm not exactly sure.

- Yes it is, ma'am.

- [Dean] It is.

- Yes it is, ma'am. That's why I said it was too close. Like I said before it was hard for me to get off, to get time off to take care of my personal business because I was vital. I had people I had to train and supervise.

- [Dean] So you knew when you moved into Spinnaker that you were violating the law, correct?

- Yes, I even told my company that. And they was trying to make accommodations for me. But I was stuck between a hard place and a rock. So I'm doing this to-

- [Dean] I guess I have a hard time believing that over one year's time frame you couldn't find one day to get to us.

- It's hard, sir. It is hard, it is hard.

- You're on today.

- Well today I happen to . I pushed the issue, I finally got fed up with them. Told them, look, I'm doing all this for you guys I need to take care of this. If I can't take care of my business I can't take care of business here.

- [Dean] Okay, so was your landlord cited for having you at 580 Spinnaker? And that's the reason you're here with us right now?

- I think he was cited, I'm not sure. But I did speak with an officer and then spoke with my landlord. And we made preparations to get me to over on Reber Street. Over on Reber Street.

- [Dean] So are you currently in Reber Street now?

- Yes I am, sir.

- [Dean] How long have you been living in there?

- Just a little over a month. When I got the paperwork in and things like that. Cause I tried to come down there and turn in until I found out I had to put it in a dropbox. When the lady, the legal assistant called me and told me that I still needed to get the letter from the landlord in my packet. That was taken care of.

- [Dean] Well I don't know about the rest of the board members but I'm pretty annoyed, sir. You obviously knew the law, you knew the law cause you came in front of the board before. You moved-

- You've been cited for not being in the right spot. Dean, sorry.

- [Dean] Yup, at 580 you knew that you weren't supposed to be living there. And I'm sorry, I don't buy, and again, this is my opinion. I don't buy that you couldn't find one time to let us know that you're living at Spinnaker.

- It was, sir, I'm telling you the truth. It is hard. But I had to make a stand for myself. Had to stop letting my company treat me just as somebody that's always there.

- [Dean] But sir, I mean sir, you got basically taken out of Spinnaker. You still wouldn't have come to us if you were still living at Spinnaker.

- [Darrell] Yes I did, I went and made sure I got the paperwork.

- [Dean] No, no. You're only coming to us now because probably the landlord there says you have to have approval. And the fact that we didn't have a meeting last week, I can

grant that. But I think the only reason why you're here is because the landlord is forcing you to be here or else you're gonna be evicted. And I think if you would have been at Spinnaker and nothing changed you never would have came in front of us. That's what I think, again, I'm just annoyed right now.

- [Darrel] And I understand, and I'm not trying to annoy you, or be argumentative with you. I'm just telling you my position and how I'm doing right now. And society says, since all of that has came about back in 2003 when I was convicted for this crime. And how much I have learned from it and changed from it. I am a better person now, I'm a better individual, and I love being the person I am now. A grandfather, a member of my company, and people they're starting to respect me a lot more. And my support group, I can't say enough for them because they do check on me and check that I am okay, make sure that I'm all right. And they're supportive of me. I mean I have a lot of people supporting me. A lot of people.

- Can I just, I'm sorry to interrupt, can I just ask why you did not come on to our agenda for the April meeting before you moved in to Reber? Knowing you were leaving Spinnaker, knowing you were gonna move to Reber, and you never came before us even then.

- [Darrell] I was told, which was misinformation that with everything going on that city was shut down. And I been watching the door, and I seen the sign on the door saying that it was not open. But I went ahead and kept pressing on and made sure that I got the letter. I was able to get inside and get the letter from the clerk and filled it out from there and got it done. Just got it done, I mean it's time for this to get done. I mean I'm doing good, I don't want to do anything to impact my good behavior in society and what I'm doing. And things like that. I love the life that I'm living now, I mean not bothering anyone or causing any type of problems. I got to work 12 hours a day, I come straight home. If I'm not visiting with my grandchildren, or my family, or other support members. That's what I do, that is my life now. I don't even hang out with old associates. I don't even go to really any of the bars anymore. I'm comfortable with just being a grandfather, doing what I'm supposed to do as a rational man. That's what I'm doing, and continuing being the best person that I can be each and every day that I wake up.

- [Dean] All right. All right, is there any other questions anybody has of him.

- Oh, pardon me one moment. Also I had a couple documents here I just want to show you guys also to testify as to what, as to how I'm doing. Can you guys see me?

- [Dean] Well I saw the letters that you attached.

- No I have a few other things also that I could not put into the mailbox or anything. You know, with my letter. I have this right here which is all from treatment programs. And this also from my job, certificate of appreciation with me making sure that out of all the trainers, I had no turn overs. Also employee of the month.

- [Dean] Can you bring that one closer to the camera please?

- [Darell] Oh yes, yes sir.

- [Dean] A little closer.

- [Darrell] Can you see it?

- [Dean] Yup, I can see it.

- [Darrell] And also my prized possession, is my AODA here. And it's like I tell people all the time when they said for you to go through what you go through, what motivates you? I said what motivates me is that I knew that what I did was wrong. I've even told that to my victim's family when I trained them, I trained my victim's family. I've even trained my victim there and they charged me about it, they brought it in, they said it was no problem. I mean she said I was wonderful training her. Being patient, keeping it strictly professional, things like that. And I love to report that I'm getting on our son, that he's coming up. Third degree black belt, doing good in school on the honor roll. I mean I can't take credit for this, I give God all the credit for this. I give God the credit that I'm able to to think clearly and rationally, and think before I make a decision. I just can't, you know, get over this. I mean I'm just happy at the way things are going, I'm happy the way things turned out. I had to go through some things, had to learn some things, had to grow up, I had to grow up. And right now I'm-

- [Darrell] I'm here, I just want-

- [Dean] Rachel-

- Go ahead.

- [Dean] Sir, I need you to be quiet, please okay?

- [Darrell] I am quiet.

- [Dean] Rachel, just from a standpoint of this particular landlord, obviously he's allowed people to go into his building prior to getting approval. I guess that right now I'm struggling with if I hold Mr. West accountable to this, and/or hold the landlord accountable to this. Obviously I know we can cite the landlord because he's there right now. You'll follow up?

- Yeah, I'll follow up with the-

- Landlord signed the letter in March.

- ...with the police officers. Yeah I'll follow up with the community police officers, there was a citation issued for the Spinnaker address on March 8th so I'll follow up on the Reber Street address.

- [Dean] Okay. All right does anybody want to make a motion in regards to Mr. West?

- [Heidi] I just want to make a comment first. I understand that he has been in violation, but I think we also have to look at the fact that's the man's held a job for 10 years. He has committed no other crimes since he has been out. At first I was very hesitant about it because obviously he had issues following rules with the sex offender residency. But I have to look at the fact that, I mean he has not had any criminal history for quite some time now. And based on that I am going to make a motion to approve him to live at 1263 Reber lower, address specific.

- [Melissa] Seconded.

- [Dean] Is there a second?

- [Heidi] That's my motion.

- [Dean] All in favor of the motion. All of those in favor-

- [Melissa] I seconded.

- [Dean] ...say aye please.

- [Melissa] Aye.

- Aye.

- [Dean] All in favor of the motion say aye. Aye. Opposed? Okay Mr. West. You have been approved to address specific, address specific to the 1263 Reber Street, lower. You will receive notification of that.

- [Darrell] Thank you, thank you so much.

- [Dean] All right, sir?

- [Darrell] Thank you so much, and if I may also ask sir. If I may add on-

- Dean, how did you vote on that one?

- [Darrell] I would like-

- [Dean] I voted aye.

- Okay.

- [Dean] All right, the next meeting date is June the 10th at 4:00pm. Can I, if there's not anything else anybody has then I'd like to make a motion for adjournment. Is there a second?

- Second.

- [Heidi] Second

- [Dean] All in favor say aye.

- [Melissa] Aye.

- Aye.

- Aye.

- [Dean] All right, so we are adjourned, I would like to say just real quickly thank you to Rachel and the rest of the city for putting the-
