You start it.

- Hello.

- Hello.

- Yeah, my name is Sergeant Markowski from Green Bay Correctional Center. I'm calling for Mr. Jason Cross.

- Thank you. Okay, thank you.

- Okay, you need him on the phone?

- Yes.

- Okay, just a sec.

- Hello, this is Jason.

- Okay, Jason, just hold just a moment. And the board will call you when they're ready, they're about to start the meeting. Okay, Heidi, you can start the meeting.

- Okay, we'll go ahead and call the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board to meet. Rachel, do we need to do roll call?

- I'll document all the committee members that are present.

- Okay, if I could get a motion to approve the agenda for the June 22nd meeting.

- Move to approve.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second.
- All all in favor, aye.
- Aye.
- Okay.
- If I can get an approval from the minutes from the May 18th meeting.
- I'll make the move to approve.
- I'll second.
- Okay, all in favor, aye.
- Aye.
- Okay. All right, the first order of business is the appeal of Jason Crows. Requesting to move to 408 New Hall Street. Jason, you're on the call?
- Yep.
- Okay, so we're gonna go ahead and we're gonna ask you some questions. Any time we do not want you to name your victim or your relationship to the victim, do you understand that?
- Yeah, I do.
- Okay.
- And we will be wanting to talk about treatment and at that point you have the option to go into closed or public session. Do you know what you would like to do?
- I'm not sure, actually.
- So closed session would mean everybody that's currently on the Zoom call would need to leave the call and it would just be us, the board members and you. Open session would be, everybody would be able to hear about your treatment.
- All right, open is fine.
- Okay, all right, so right now it looks like you're currently at WRC, is that correct?
- It's actually WCC, Winnebago Correctional Center.
- Okay, all right. And you're requesting to move to 408 New Hall Street. Is that correct?
- That's correct.

- Okay, if you could go ahead then and tell us what you were convicted, how it came about.
- All right, I was convicted of possession of child pornography. The conviction happened in July 17th of 2019. Was initially arrested in 2018, I can't remember the exact date of it. But it was for mention of, it was for pictures and pictures were of naked children, girls from, I don't know the exact age were around between ages 10 and 15, I guess.
- And how did you end up, oh I'm sorry, go ahead.
- Yeah, I found them, it was sent from a website, it was legaleightkarens, it's a forum and someone was posting some pictures. I downloaded some, I went to some link for them. I downloaded these images, that's how I came across them.
- Okay. And then how did the police get involved?
- They showed up at my parents' house where I was living, for New Hall Street. They showed up with a search warrant, for electronics in the house. They said, I believe they said the IT provider or something, notified them that the images were downloaded.
- And how long were you doing this for?
- At the time, it was, I don't remember exactly. It was a few months I believe, was about three or four months I believe if I remember right from the first time, I downloaded the images and the time I got arrested.
- And how many images did you have downloaded?
- I don't remember exactly. I think the total amount was around 50. I think it was 10 separate downloads. So it was 10 counts, total that I was charged with.
- And you received three years initial confinement and three years extended supervision, is that correct?
- That's correct.
- Scheduled to get released in July?
- Yes, the 12th of July.
- Okay. And will you be on any kind of monitoring?
- Ankle bracelet.
- Okay. All right, Captain Richgels, is that version pretty accurate as to what he stated?
- There was certainly one video. I was just looking at the description of it. There were a number of photographs. I was looking in the complete for what it's worth if the board wants to know, if there is more than 10 typically that's what the district attorney will charge. Whether there's 11 of them or a thousand, they usually pick 10 that are indisputable. But it was 10 counts as said, one video of the same nature. But other than that, yes accurate.
- Okay, thank you.
- All right. Jason, why and how did you get involved in this?

- Why, I'm not sure, it happened at night was when I was tired and bored and I just wasn't thinking clearly at the time.

- How old were you?

- I was 25.

- Okay. Does the board have any questions for him?

- Yeah, Jason, were you able to get any treatment while you were in prison?

- Not while I was in prison, no. When I was at Dodge for assessment, for the psyche evaluation. So two I believe is called over there. Sorry, I can't remember the exact name, but when they talked to me about that, they determined that treatment wasn't necessary for me. It wasn't recommended.

- Is your probation officer gonna be recommending any treatment?

- Not that I'm aware of, no.

- All right. And so you want to reside with your parents?

- That's correct?

- Correct, okay. All right. And let's see.

- I have a question.

- All right.

- Jason, I noticed out of the 10 charges, eight of them were dismissed. Do you know why?

- I took a plea deal.

- Okay.

- I took a plea deal and the district attorney I believe, agreed to drop eight of those charges.

- Okay, thank you.

- Yep, you're welcome.

- And Jason are your parents okay with the fact that you're not allowed to have any electronics in your possession? Are they gonna comply with that?

- I'm sure they have no problems with that.

- Do you know, are they here to speak on your behalf?

- I believe my dad is gonna speak after me.

- Is he on the call?

- Not currently, no.

- Yes, Heidi, he's on here, this is Deana.
- Oh, okay, he is on, okay. Alright. And let's see here. Okay, well, nobody has any other further questions?
- I do, Jason do you plan to work when you get out?
- Yes, down the street from that address that I wanna move at, my parents' place. Yeah, right down the street there's T and T Crust. So I believe, it's just a factory they're always hiring. So it shouldn't be a problem to get the job there.
- Thank you.
- Yep.
- All right, if there's no further questions, I guess I'd like to talk to his dad.
- Yep, I'm here.
- Okay. So Mr. Cross, do you understand the stipulations of your son coming to live with you?
- Heidi, Heidi, before we get into the commentary, could we get a name and address for the speaker?
- Yes, I apologize, Mr. Cross, we need your full name and address for the record please.
- Okay, Danny Cross, 408, New Hall Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin, 54302.
- Okay. And are you aware all the stipulations too?
- Yes, we have to have all electronics, that he can't have access to.
- Okay. Are there gonna be any children living in the home?
- No.
- Okay. And how do you feel that this incident occurred in your home and now you're going to come and allow him to live back with you?
- Well, I feel confident that Jason definitely learned his lesson with this incident and definitely knows enough to never do anything like that again, I'm very confident of that. So I feel comfortable that he's gonna stay on the right track now.
- Do you plan on issuing him any kind of rules?
- Well, I'm sure, yeah we'll have to go over that with him to get to him by. Yeah, I think he's gonna be under quite a few different rules with probation also.
- Right, but you and his mother, what kind of rules have you thought about laying down the law for him?
- Well, we haven't really gone over it much yet, but yeah, once he gets home, we'll have to go over it with him. What kind of time, timeframes that we want him home by and just have, yeah, just try to help him stay on the straight narrow. His mom's home all the time. She doesn't work, so, but yeah, otherwise we really haven't gone over anything with him.

- Okay, does any of the board members have any questions for Mr. Cross?
- I do not.
- No.
- Okay. Does the board have any discussion they'd like to talk about?
- I do not.
- Hey, were there any other speakers that wanted to speak on his behalf?
- Jason, do you have anybody else wanting to speak?
- No, I don't.
- Okay. Mr. Cross, Danny Cross, I see you've got quite a few people in the background there. None of them wanna speak.
- Well, his mother actually is limited English, so.
- Okay. You just kinda say how you're six years younger than him, have people over all the time, so that not a problem so.
- Okay, so does the young lady wanna speak?
- Yeah.
- Okay, so we just need your name for the record, please. And your address
- Alicia Cross, I live at 408 New Hall Street.
- Okay. All right, what would you like to say?
- I'm his little sister. I'm six years younger than him. So this all came as a surprise. He never really had these issues, that there show up before. So I talked to my parents about him coming home as well. We all agreed with it, we were okay. Kind of uncomfortable a little bit, but not much. We know about what he has to, what he can't do right now, but sometimes same boats with them to older brother and him come home.
- Okay.
- Have any of you gone to see him while he's been incarcerated?
- Yes, all three of us have gone. Well, we were going three times a week until COVID kicked in and then we were resuming weekly and we've been back to going each week now. And then they opened up the in person visits again.
- Okay. Have you noticed any kind of change in him since when he first went to today?
- Seems like he's matured a little bit, takes things through a little bit more. It seems like before he does or says things.

- Okay. All right. Anyone have questions for Alicia?

- I do not.

- Okay. All right, thank you. All right, so is there anyone that wants to, I mean, nobody said they wanted to talk about it. Does anyone wanna make a motion? I'm gonna just kind of say how I feel right now. I understand that he wasn't ordered any kind of treatment, but it does say that, you know, he needs to comply with any kind of recommendations from his agent. It does look like he has to have a chaperone. Is that correct? Mr. Cross? Jason?

- Jason, are you gonna be required to have a chaperone when you're out and about in the community?

- I'm actually not sure. I don't see that on my supervision rules. I do have a curfew though.

- Okay. Yeah, according to your judgment of conviction, it says no contact with anyone under the age of 18, unless prior approval given by agent and you're to comply with any chaperone agreement recommendations. So I wasn't sure if they discussed that with you at this point yet. Do you have an agent assigned to you?

- Yes, I believe I do, but I can't remember what her name is off the top of my head. I don't have all paperwork, but.

- It says Tracy Heini here.

- Yeah, I'm sorry, thank you, thank you, Craig.

- Okay. So typically I'm a little bit leery approving anybody when they haven't gone through any kind of treatment, you know, your response to why you did it was, you know, you weren't really sure why, you were just kinda tired and bored. That happens to all of us throughout our life. And you know, we have to look at other avenues and I think typically with treatment that allows you to find other resources. So that's kind of where I stand right now as to approving you or not approving you to reside at 408 New Hall. But if the board members have anything further to say or wish to make a motion, we can go from there.

- Move to approve address specific.

- Is there a second?

- I have another question for Jason.

- All right.

- I noticed on community ties and support, do you have any other support other than you? Do you have any church you're with or other groups that you're gonna be in?

- Not specific groups or anything, no.

- Okay, thank you.

- Okay, we have a motion from Craig to approve address specific. Is there a second for that?

- I'll second it.

- All right. All in favor, aye.

- Aye.
- Opposed, opposed. I'm sorry Faye, what was your vote? Mine was oppose.
- Okay, so right now we have a two to two vote. If Craig or Pete would like to say why they are okay with him residing at 408 New Hall.
- I'll speak it. He's a 28 year old man, he's obviously got excellent family support. He has a plan of what he's gonna do with his time to go get a job and be a productive member of our society. A lot of times these guys don't get treatment while they're in prison for other reasons. And what he's said, and I do hope that his PO orders some form of treatment and I'm sure she will. So that's kind of my reasoning.
- Okay, if I could say something.
- Sure.
- And Jason was in treatment before he was actually incarcerated. He was in treatment for I think it was nine or 10 months.
- What kind of treatment?
- He was going to see a psychologist.
- Okay, and what was that for?
- It was just to kind of deal with what was going on in his life and trying to straighten things out and stay on the straight path. I don't remember where exactly where it was. It was Downtown though. James Drake was his name.
- Oh, so Jason, you did see Dr. Drake? Jim Drake at Family Services?
- Yes, before I was incarcerated, yes.
- And was that court ordered or did you go there on your own?
- I went there on my own.
- And did you graduate that class?
- It wasn't a class, it was just psychology sessions with him.
- And it was specifically referencing your charges?
- Yes, it was by my charges, yes.
- Oh, so can you tell us what you learned from that class or from that treatment?
- Yes, it was basically to help me understand, basically help me understand why, what I did was that, because when I initially downloaded those images, I didn't really understand any of the ramifications or anything. I didn't, 'cause that time there were just images, but the psychologist helped me understand what actually happens. What goes on in those situations, how, whenever someone goes to view those images, that actually that's not a victimless crime, basically, That it does affect them directly, even though it's something that happened a long time ago, when some view those images, they get notified and that just brings back all those

memories for them and just hurts them even more. Just makes it worse. Feels, yeah, we were basically talking about that. Just understanding what I did and why it was horrible.

- Okay, I didn't see any documentation in your packet that you sent in regarding that treatment. Did you include that?

- I don't think so, no. I didn't have it on me with me or anything.

- Okay. All right, Fay you wanna discuss why you don't want to approve?

- I'm worried about the treatment part also, and I guess I would be comfortable with making like let's say 60 days, and then see if we can get that documentation. Or that his probation officer starts him in a treatment class.

- Okay, would you, oh go ahead, Mr. Danny Cross?

- It was actually Jason had sent me the paperwork and I actually sent it in for him. I would've included that paperwork from James Drake and so I actually also seen one other counselor also with the report, but I didn't even think to put that in there with the paperwork 'cause I was, I don't know, I just forwarded what.

- Okay.

- If you didn't actually have access to it, I dunno.

- Okay, Fay, would you want to make a new motion?

- Yes, I would. I would recommend that we approve for, could be, okay. Let's approve, it's not like he even has the documentation and let's see, well 60 days I'm gonna say, make a recommendation approve for 60 days and then we wanna see the documentation. And we want to know, you know, whether his probation officer recommended treatment.

- I'll second.

- Is that motion to approve address specific?

- Yes.

- I'll second.

- Okay. All in favor, aye.

- Aye.

- Opposed.

- Okay, Jason, we've approved you to reside at 408 New Hall for 60 days. You must come back to our August meeting and provide that documentation that you saw Dr. Drake, and any other treatment that you had and if your agent is recommending any other treatment.

- Okay.

- All right. Would you like us to mail that to the New Hall address or would you like us to mail that to the present?

- The new hall address, please.
- Okay, thank you.
- Yep, tomorrow.
- Thank you.
- You're welcome.
- All right, next on the agenda is going to be, let me get there. Jason, the appeal of Ryan Cloud, Mr. Cloud, I see you're on the phone.
- Yep.
- Sorry.
- Oh, Jason, we're done with you, you can exit if you want.
- Okay, okay.
- Alright, thank you.
- Thank you.
- Yep.
- All right, Ryan?
- Yes.
- Okay, so we are going to ask you about what you were convicted of, and when you talk about your crime, we don't want you to name the victim by name or by the relationship. And then eventually you'll need to tell us how the police got involved in the situation. And then if you heard me tell the previous candidate, you have the option when we talk about your treatment to go into private session or remain in public session, what would you like to do?
- I'll do public.
- Okay. So, all right, it looks like right now, am I correct, you are currently at Kettle Marine or are you released?
- I'm released.
- Okay, and did you get released yesterday?
- Yes, I did.
- Okay, and where are you staying right now?
- I'm at a TLP on the west side, the ATTIC place.

- Okay, on Shawn?
- Yep.
- Okay, all right, so if you could go ahead, and oh, and you're requesting to move to 2041 Manitowoc Road, is that correct?
- Yes, I am.
- Okay, and who lives there? Is it just gonna be you?
- No, it'll be my stepfather and my two sisters. Charles, Kevin, Nicki, and Rachel. She's transitioning to a bully, so it's Jasper, Kevin but her real name is Jessica Kaki.
- Okay, and how old are your sisters?
- 18 and 20.
- Okay. All right, so if you could go ahead and tell us what you were convicted of and the circumstances surrounding that.
- On December of 2017, I was convicted of a second degree sexual assault. It was for a touching case. So what happened was I drank and I came home, knocked out and according to the report from the victim, I found with her while she was sleeping, her breasts and her butt. And then the police got involved after 'cause I woke up, when she woke up and she went to go use the bathroom and I woke up not understanding where I was, just got up and left and went by my girlfriend. And as I was gone, I got contacted that the victim, contacted her parents and then her parents contacted the police.
- Okay.
- And you were how old?
- I was 27.
- And she was 15?
- Yes.
- Okay.
- All right, and did you know the victim?
- Yes, I did.
- Okay.
- Do you have any contact with the victim?
- No.
- Okay. All right, Captain Richgels, is his story accurate?
- Yes, it is.

- Okay, thank you. All right, so Ryan, you were sentenced to what is it? Four years confinement, and then six years extended supervision?

- That's correct.

- Okay. All right. Does the board have any questions regarding this offense?

- No.

- Okay. So then we would like to talk about treatment. It looks like you maybe must have taken some classes for anger management, domestic violence while you were incarcerated.

- Yep.

- Okay, and why those type of classes?

- Well, I had problems at a younger age with my baby mama where we ended up getting a fight and had a domestic issue. So I didn't still had to do treatment for, was recommended by Amy.

- Is that your probation officer or who's Amy?

- The staffer, staffing from Dodge.

- Okay, when did the domestic situations happen because you didn't list that on your criminal history?

- It was a misdemeanor. It turned into a misdemeanor battery and it happened in 2008.

- All right, and you didn't receive any kind of sex offender treatment while you were in the institution?

- No, but I have contacted my PO and we had it already set up to start as soon as Thursday, I finished the paperwork for it.

- And do you know where you're gonna be going?

- What is it called, I think something I'm not sure, but it's through my PO, he's got it figured out.

- Okay.

- We just went over it yesterday.

- All right. Well you indicated that when this offense happened, that you were drinking and that you had blacked out, do you have an issue with alcohol or drugs?

- Yeah, I have a problem with drinking and a lot of it centered on my mom drinking, which is a good thing because my mom will not be living at the residence that I'm at.

- All right, have you received any kind of treatment for your drinking?

- I did AA and MA, but while I was doing domestic violence, they offered me AODA. So it was do one or the other, and I was already in domestic violence.

- Okay. All right, do you think you'll continue to take any classes while for AA when you get out?

- Well, I am out and I've been looking around with my PO suggested a few places and until I start my treatment for a ODA, which will be also be within the next couple months, I will be starting that also.
- Okay, looks like you also completed Thinking For Change while you were in custody, is that correct?
- Yes, it is.
- Okay. All right. Board, do you have any questions?
- I got something to say too real quick.
- Yeah.
- I also completed a vocational for college who were incarcerated, for masonry.
- Masonry? Okay.
- Yeah. Is that kind the kind of to get a job?
- Huh, yeah, it was vocational, so it was choose between cabinetry and mason, I figured masonry be beneficiary because I like that type of work. So that's why I chose it.
- And are you looking for that type of work now that you're out? I mean, I know you've only been out one day.
- Yeah, well, you know, I don't have no experience and a lot of those places need experience, so right now, I'm just looking for temp agencies to put me through to a job, which hopefully by next week I can be working.
- Okay. All right.
- And I also did it's called Windows to Work Program, so they will also help me. I had a coach and it's kind of like a key proceed thing, pre-release and they help out with like, any type of classes that I need to get in. Helping me with food and you know, anything that has to do with clothes or hygiene. And so I gotta report to them every month also. So it's kind of like a sponsor or I would say something to help guide me.
- Okay, good, good. All right. I see that you have, probably wanna speak on your behalf, is that correct?
- Yes.
- Okay. I believe is it Tara?
- Yes, it is.
- Okay, Tara, can you unmute yourself? There we go. Tara, if you could please state your name and address for the record.
- My name is Tara Chopenya and I'm at 1435, Emily Street, Green Bay, Wisconsin, 54301.
- Okay, and what would you like to say about Ryan?
- I want to speak on his behalf because I wanna let you guys know that I really, truly honestly believe that he has changed and that he is gonna get help and that he's gonna be a different person this time than the last time.

And that he has so much time to think about it. And before a lot of our family members weren't in positive positions, I'm in a very positive position now to help him out. I've been working at a job for eight years where he has no problem getting in there. I've already talked to supervisor in the HR and he is more than welcome to start at any day, as soon as possible. There's a lot more places hiring for a lot more money than which my company pays for. So as the wellbeing right now, he is able to come work there. My husband drives, I don't drive mark you due to a car accident. So he will have transportation to work every single day and home, and to treatment and guidance and anything that he needs I'm gonna be here. Last time I was not in a position with myself to have positive, you know, reinforcement towards him. So, but I have overcome that in the last four years and know that it's very important for me to take care of my family and make sure that my brother is in the right position. So I promise that I'm gonna be highly in it, and make sure he is good and let him know that it's easier being a better person than a wrong person in life. And I wanna teach him that and I want him to feel how good it feels to be positive and live a good life. I want him to experience that.

- Okay. You made a comment that you think that he's changed compared to the last time. What did you mean by that?

- I know he has changed from the last time. So I hear it in his voice, the things that he tells me.

- Okay. Like he was incarcerated previously prior to this incident happening?

- Yes, once, yes he was.

- Okay, and was that in prison?

- Yes.

- Okay, and how much time was that do you know that he served for that offense?

- I have no clue because like I said, before I wasn't in a really positive position myself, so I really didn't pay attention to how much time and the place that he was at.

- Okay, and where is it that you work that he could maybe get a job at?

- I currently work at, WPI Wisconsin, Plastics Incorporated.

- Okay.

- I've worked there for eight years now, so.

- Okay, does the board have any questions for Tara?

- I do not.

- Okay, is there anyone else with you Tara that wants to speak on your brother's behalf?

- Yes, this is my brother, my sister, Jessica, Kim and Nicky. She will be one of the siblings living with him at 24.

- Okay. I'm sorry can you state your name and address for the record?

- My name is Jessica Kaminaky and I live at 2041 Manitowoc Road.

- Okay, and Ryan is your stepbrother?

- Yes.

- Yes.

- Okay, what would you like to say?

- I feel like he's gonna do it better this time, because we're a lot stricter on the rules in the house as well, my sister just turned 20 and I just turned 18 this past year. So my dad's kind of been a little harsher on the rules and he's doing that with like, just me and my sister, because he didn't trust us being out because we come home late. So now he has a curfew for us and he says that applies to my brother as well.

- Okay, and did you see your brother at all while he was in prison?

- No.

- She doesn't have her driver's license and I don't drive and we, so.

- Yeah.

- And we have kind of a little family here in Green Bay, there's only five of us, including my brother, so we can't get there.

- Okay. All right. Any questions from the board?

- I have a question.

- Go ahead, Keith.

- I noticed here back in 2007 as court ordered to get your GED or HSED. Did you ever complete those?

- Yes, I did, I got my HSED.

- Awesome, thanks.

- Yes.

- All right. Thank you Tara, that wants to speak?

- No, my other sibling is currently sick.

- Okay.

- She is here, she is here for support, for him, but her voice she's got a really sore throat.

- Okay.

- But she's here to support him also.

- All right. Is the board have any discussion they would like to talk about before we ask for a motion?

- Just would want to encourage Ryan to make sure that you address that alcohol issue, I think that was probably biggest problem there. And if you don't address it, it might resurface. So I really encourage you to go to AA and go to treatment and learn what you need to learn, so.

- I definitely will.
- Okay. Does anyone wanna make a motion?
- Move to approve address specific.
- Is there a second?
- I'll second it.
- Okay, all in favor aye.
- Aye.
- Aye.
- Opposed.
- Okay, Ryan, you are approved to reside at 2041 Manitowoc Road. If you decide to move from that location, you will need to come back before the board.
- All right.
- All right, you have a good support system.
- Thank you so much.
- Thank you.
- God bless you, thank you.
- All right, next on the agenda is the appeal of John Collins. Mr. Collins, are you here?
- Yes, I am.
- Okay, and you are currently residing at 1624, Forest Glen. And you want to continue to reside there.
- Yes.
- Is that correct?
- Yes.
- All right. So I have a note here that says you've been temporarily housed at that location, which is ran by Genuine Hearts, and now you wanna stay there permanently. How did you get to live there temporarily? What's temporarily.
- I was in a TLP and due to the fact that I haven't went in front of the board 'till now, it's that's there temporary.
- How long have you been residing there?

- 30 days.
- 30 days.
- Okay. All right, so you've never been before us, correct?
- Nope.
- Okay, so again, I'm gonna ask you to tell us about what you were convicted of and how it came to light. And when you talk about it, we don't want you to name, list any names of the victim or your relationship to the victim.
- Okay.
- Okay, so go ahead and tell me what happened.
- I have a secondary sexual assault of a minor for inappropriate touching and fingering. I was just recently kicked outta my father's house and I was in a very crappy state at the time. I did not know the age of consent and I am now, I'm going through the process of starting SOT treatment. I just signed the release forms today with my agent.
- I'm sorry, did you say you're signed up?
- She had me sign the release of information forms for SOT treatment.
- Okay. All right. So it looks like you were convicted out of Allegheny County, is that correct?
- Yes.
- Okay, and so I'm gathering, you got released from prison sometime in 2019?
- When I was sentenced, I did a year in county with 15 years probation sentenced with health, and then I had a revocation for my break, a previous charge that was not a sex case. It was just a breaking and entering. I relocated, I did three in, three in three out the years of custody credit. So when I got out, I went to a TLP and I reside here.
- So when did you actually get outta prison?
- I got out prison January 4th of this year.
- And so you've been at the TLP since January 4th?
- Yep. And outta Allegheny County.
- Oh, in Allegheny County? Okay.
- Yeah, it's through ATTIC Correctional Services.
- Okay, and why is it that you want to go to this address here?
- That's one of the group homes that I was approved to go for because there are very few group homes that approve to have sex offender residents.

- Before we talk any further. When we talk about your treatment, do you wanna do that in private session?
- My SOT treatment?
- Yeah, all of that kind of treatment.
- I prefer to do it in private, if there's only an opening for public, then I'll do it that way. I wanna, you know, my preference is private, but if there ain't an opening for that, I will do public treatment. I know I need to get this treatment done with, it's-
- Okay, let's just stop there. You have the option, so we'll go. I need somebody from the board to make a motion to go into private session.
- Move to go into private session.
- I'll second.
- Okay, all in favor aye.
- Aye.
- Okay, all right just gimme a moment so I can put people in.
- Okay.
- You'll know, when everyone's back in.
- Okay thank you.
- Everyone's back in.
- All right, go ahead, Pete. You can ask the question you were going to ask him.
- Yes, it was saying that you're to obtain your GED or HSED, have you done that yet?
- When I got out of prison, I had enrolled for, and I was in from my HSED through the Fox Valley Technical College. Due to the fact that I moved up here, I am waiting on further permanent placement before I finish. I am currently lively enrolled. All I need is that I'm right here, and I will get everything from the Technical College, transferred up here, and I will finish my HSED up here.
- Okay, also I noticed on your community ties and support, you don't have anything listed as far as family work, church or friends.
- I have a couple friends that are keeping me on the right track. My family mostly is basically ever since my parents divorced, the whole family basically fell apart. So there really is no support from the family side. I do have every staff at the group home here. I have a couple friends that keep me in a straight narrow.
- Do you have any plans at joining any churches or anything?
- I'd have to look in to see which churches, I'm not actively religious, but I might go to a couple churches. I did when I was with my one friend, I went to his church a couple times.
- Okay, thank you.

- I just wanted to go back to your charges, how this occurred,
- I was 19.
- And do you know how old the victim was?
- 13.
- 13. Okay, Captain Richgels, I don't know if you have access to the Allegheny case or not.
- I'm sorry, no, I was not able to obtain that, just to see what was on CCAP. That's all I could see.
- Okay, all right, thank you. Does the board have any further questions for John?
- None.
- None.
- Okay. It appears that Monica wants to speak on your behalf, is that correct?
- Yes.
- And is Monica there?
- Yes, she is.
- Okay, Monica, if you could please just state your name and address for the record.
- Yep, my name is Monica Herbis. And do you want my personal address? 'Cause I'm stick.
- If you wanna give your business address, that will be fine.
- Our business address is 1566 West Mason Street, Green Bay, 54303.
- Okay, what can you tell us about John?
- So John is very new with us. He's only been with us for 30 days. In the short amount of time we have gotten to know John, he is a go-getter ,always willing to help out. Loves chatting, has been getting along well with everyone in the house. Very compliant with all medications, very compliant with his PO. You know, we kind of explained to him, you know, different steps that you have to do in order to get certain things approved, like outings and all that. So we're here to help him out. We're here to guide him through this process. And I really feel like he has a good support team, that has his back, that will help him out as much as we can help him out.
- And is he accurate when he says the facility is 24/7 staff?
- Yes, we do have staff around the clock, 24/7. There is a manager on call after business hours. So if an issue arises, all of us managers live within 10 minutes of all of our group homes and we do come. So he's never without a staff member. And that's just for everybody's safety, even our other residents and not because of him, but just, that's the kind of business that we run.
- Okay.

- And the community 90% of the time he will have staff. I believe he's been approved to do small solo outings on his own, taking little baby steps to build up to that. But big outings, like going to Walmart, things like that, he will have the staffing to go with him.

- Your staff will go with him?

- Yep.

- Okay. All right.

- And as far as his treatment, they are looking into it and he was very accurate to say, like, even with counseling and all that, a lot of it was depending on until he got a stable home to start all those treatments back up again, and to get all his care transferred over to Green Bay, his SOT, they were unsure. So he's very accurate when he says that.

- Okay, thank you.

- Yes.

- Does the board have any questions for her?

- None.

- Okay. Do we have any discussion before a motion is made?

- Well, I just think this man is in the best situation possible for him. He's receiving medication care and is about to receive SOT treatment. He's in a good facility with 24/7 care, and I think we should approve him.

- Okay.

- I kind of agree with you, Craig. I typically don't approve out of county residents because I feel Brown County has enough of their own residents that we need to try to find housing for. But I do agree with you with the 24/7 staffing that does make me feel more comfortable. All right, does anyone wanna make a motion?

- Move to approve address specific?

- Is there a second?

- I'll do a second.

- Okay, all in favor aye.

- Aye.

- Opposed.

- Okay, Mr. Collins, you are approved to continue to reside at 1624, Forest Glen. If you do decide to move from there, you will need to come back before the board.

- Okay.

- All right, thank you and good luck.

- Good luck John.
- Have a great day.
- You too.
- All right, our next appeal is Michelle Shilts. I think we just lost, oh no I see her. All right, Michelle, can you unmute your phone?
- Okay, how's that?
- Yep, there we go.
- Okay.
- Okay, so right now, Michelle, it looks like you are homeless.
- Yes ma'am.
- Is that correct?
- Yep.
- And you are really requesting just to move anywhere in the city that will approve you, is that correct?
- Yes, ma'am, I am.
- Okay. We've never heard of this before.
- I came to see your board, mid thousand or a couple times, like three or four different times.
- Yeah.
- I've always been approved where I was living, I've always raised my kids. I'm raising a grandson right now. I can't be homeless, I'm sick, I need to use my oxygen daily. I can't plug it in daily, you know what I mean? I need this to be able to move anywhere. I've talked it over with, I discussed it with the city attorney and she's the one that helped me fill out the application.
- Okay, well, Rachel is our city attorney. Is that who you met with?
- Yes.
- No, that's Deanna. I've sat down with her to help her fill out the application.
- Oh, Deanna.
- Yeah, I'm the legal assistant.
- The legal whatever.
- All right.
- I have two kids.

- Michelle I understand your situation, but I need to get the advice from our attorney for the city, because typically we have to publish your address of where you're going to reside in case anyone in the community objects to that. So before we even talk any further, I need to get the attorney's opinion on this situation.

- Oh, okay, when will that be?

- She's on here

- I'm right here. I'm trying to give her my input.

- Okay.

- So it hasn't happened anytime recently, but the board is capable of approving an applicant to pretty much have park launch. Basically it's an approval to live in the city. That's the effect if we don't say address specific, when we make our motion, that would just be approving someone to live in the restricted area. So it's possible to approve someone not address specific, but our whole policy is to have an address so that we can notify anyone who may want to appear to speak either out either for or against the applicant. Now, as indicated, there is history with the board, with this particular applicant, but it's at the discretion of the board, whether this applicant is trusted enough or is a viable candidate for that kind of approval. But it is possible.

- Okay, can I tell you some of my background then with all of this?

- Oh, sure, just a minute, Michelle.

- Okay.

- Before you do all that, I do wanna ask the board, If any of you have ever, I know some of you may have, or have not been present for previous hearings with Michelle. I know I have. So if you would like her, to go about and tell you about her, you know, what she was convicted of, how it all came about. We can start with that.

- I read it was in 1991. We're not here, that's what we need to be talking about here. What happens if we don't approve Michelle without address.

- She could reapply with a specific address. Anytime somebody is denied by the board, they can reapply if circumstances change. So if she's applying and the circumstance change, is that she has a specific address she's looking at, the board could consider that application as well.

- Michelle, is that a problem for you not having the board approval to find an address?

- Yes.

- Do you have a criminal illness?

- No, I don't have, I have a terminal illness. I have lung disease, and my daughter would be able to explain it more.

- Okay, hold on. Before we even talk about any kind of like medical information, I think we should see if we should go into private session or if she wishes to remain in public session.

- I agree with you.

- No, I'd like to go into a private.

- I don't think it really matters, does it doesn't matter.
- There's nobody else here.
- Nobody is there?
- But the recording does get paused when we go into closed session.
- Correct.
- And we do have another individual who's in to hear his appeal, so.
- Yeah, let's pause it so I can do it in private.
- All right, so we'll need a motion to go into private session.
- I'll make a motion go into private.
- All right, all in favor aye.
- Aye.
- Okay, Michelle, just wait for everyone until-
- Okay.
- Okay, it looks like everybody's back in.
- Okay. So as we're back into public session, Michelle, you have been in front of the board on several different occasions, and we have approved you on every occasion.
- Yes, also, if you remember me, I brought a note in and had you guys reseal it from the victim herself?
- Yes.
- I don't have that letter no more, 'cause it was in storage and due to move, I lost it off. So I don't have that currently. But if you remember the letter, you only know what it said. I don't even know what it said. So I mean, I'm not saying, I'm just letting you know that I remember I had that letter, so.
- Yeah, I do remember that and it was documented in our notes, referenced that letter.
- Okay.
- Okay, I do have a question for Captain Richgels. Obviously this is something that's a little bit unheard of or not common for the board to say, if we would potentially approve her to live in the city with no address. Does the police department have any concerns with that?
- It's kind of a hard question to answer. I mean, obviously we want to do what's gonna be easiest or best for one to further care for herself, but also follow the ordinance, put in front of us. It's probably one of those questions that I bother Rachel with, on an email or a phone call. I mean, we enforce the ordinances as they're written and you know, it's one of those things where it says where they can or can't live. And we follow that unless they prove differently by this body. So I apologize, I don't have a better answer, but.

- No, I guess I just wanna ask, you know, if say an officer was called to a disturbance where Michelle was staying, and they know that she is, a sex offender who has to follow the ordinance, if there was documentation that she could just live there, is that acceptable to the police officers?

- Because that's so unique, I couldn't guarantee that a citation wouldn't be issued. Certainly that's something that could be cleared up in court at the city attorney's office. I've never come across that in my time here. Sorry, what's came out.

- Yeah.

- And they've gotta follow the laws that's written. I don't know if you're looking at issuing a letter signed by, you know, everyone here or permission to call Rachel at any time of night to verify this is legitimate. We certainly don't want to put anybody out or cause any extra time on Michelle's part. But you know, my officers follow the ordinance as is, and we can certainly get that paperwork, if you were gonna sign something, then we could attach it to Michelle's file in the police records and do our very best to make sure that they would research that and find it prior to it. I know this is a long answer, but I'm trying to be helpful. I'm more than happy if I would get something signed by you that had, probably an expiration or good for this timeframe and put it in there. And if Michelle had police contact and was in this situation, depending on the time of day, she could request that they look it up, even though it's a odd situation. There's a chance they could come across that and let it be based on the ordinance decision, if that's what they decided to do.

- Okay, thank you, I appreciate that. I know that's a difficult question.

- Can I say something?

- Go ahead, Michelle.

- I was gonna ask the board if they could have me, if they did approve, if I could have a letter stating that you guys did approve myself so I could cover my own basis.

- Sure. All right.

- That way if I got running with any police officers or anything, which I won't I promise, but if I do, I would have that in hand.

- Okay. All right, so before we go in for a vote, does the board have any discussion?

- Well, Michelle, if we gave you 60 days to find a place, would that be adequate?

- I could try within 60 days, it's really hard to get a place, I'm on limited income. It's really hard to find a place. None of that, if I had a letter from you all saying it was okay, I think I would be able to get a place in 60 days.

- Okay.

- That would give landlord acknowledge that I'm doing the right things.

- Like I said earlier, I have heard Michelle on many occasions here and she is right, we have approved her every time she has moved. And I guess I'm not normally one, who's a fan of having people come back in so many days, because I think it clogs down our agendas. But in this kind of a situation, I guess, I wouldn't mind looking at like Craig how you said maybe 60 days letting her stay out there. But you know, maybe every 60 days she just has to check in with us to see if she did indeed get an apartment. So we at least has something officially on record. That's kind of how I feel about it.

- I agree.
- Okay. Rachel, do you think that would be too difficult to do that? I'm watching your facial expressions there.
- I think, I think that it would work, and then that way it's not an open ended park launch forever and always. The one hiccup that I could see doing it that way, is if a landlord says, "Oh, well you're only approved "for 60 days then what?"
- Yeah.
- So I mean, from an administrative standpoint, it's not an issue, we could approve for 60 days, not giving an address. And then once an address is found, she could reapply with the address and then that address could be approved, that that application could be approved address specific.
- Okay. All right. Based on all of that, does the board have anything they'd like to say or make a motion?
- I'll make a motion, and Michelle, this is your responsibility to let landlords know when you're applying that you're approved for 60 days, but can be approved as long as you have an address longer than that. Okay, that's gonna be your responsibility.
- Okay.
- So I'll make a motion to approve non-address specific for 60 days.
- Wait, can I get a question for you? And if you guys could write me a letter stating that with all of that in there.
- Yeah.
- We'll get you something, but first the vote has to go through Michelle.
- Okay.
- All right, is there a second on that?
- I'll second it.
- All right, all in favor aye.
- Aye.
- Opposed. Okay, Michelle so you are good to stay wherever you want for 60 days.
- Okay.
- And then we want to hear back from you in August, if you did find a place.
- Okay, is there any way that the city attorney, or is it the city attorney, the one I like to see?
- Yes.
- Is there any way that she could write up that letter for me too, that I could have for potential landlords?

- This is Deanna, I can take care of the letter, but I am working from home tomorrow and then I'm out of the office on Friday so I could do it on Monday.
- Okay, all right.
- Deanna, if you had something that needed to be printed off, I'm in the office.
- Okay, I could work on it tomorrow and just put it in.
- You guys could email it to me?
- I could do that, that's fine.
- Yeah, my email's on the application, right?
- Yes, I have it.
- Okay, if you could do that, that would be great too. So that way it's in my phone, I won't forget.
- That's fine Michelle, I'll send it to you in an email.
- Okay, do I have to, go back in 60 days. Do I make that appointment the month before or the month of, or how does that work?
- When you have an address.
- When I have the address. Okay, as soon as I get it, I call you guys?
- Yep.
- Okay, all right, thank you.
- Thank you Michelle.
- All right, thank you.
- Thank you, God bless y'all.
- Yep.
- All right, next on the agenda. Is Robert Landco, Robert, you're present?
- Robert?
- Hello.
- Yep, okay Robert, we can hear you, all right-
- Okay, I got my Bluetooth earbud in, so I just wanted to make sure you guys are cool with it.
- We can hear it.

- Michelle, if you could maybe either exit or turn your-

- I'm trying to exit out I.

- Oh, there we go.

- Okay Robert, so it looks like you're currently living at 130 South Webster Avenue. And you want to continue to reside at 130 South Webster Avenue, is that correct?

- Yes, that's correct.

- Okay, and how did you get about living there?

- So I've never lived in Green Bay before. My offense originally occurred in Allegheny County. The closest I gotten to living actually in state was appeared, and that was quite a few years ago and they didn't have an ordinance or like a border or anything like that. I just had to register at the local police department and I've actually been outta state for the past five over in Westlin. And I just now moved back to live with my brother. This is my brother's house. And when I moved here is when I first heard of those ordinance because I went to the Green Bay Police Department to register like I always do. And they told me that I had to get a hold of city hall. And that's when city hall told me that I had to fill an application to apply to live at this address. So it's really new to me, I knew absolutely nothing about it when I first moved in. When I went to city hall, I told 'em that I was staying here, I gave them my address. They didn't tell me that it was a problem, they didn't say I had to move and then come back after I got approved. They didn't say that I was gonna get put into custody for violation or anything like that. I've actually been to, I was actually at city hall today, earlier today because I misplaced my paperwork and the phone number for the Zoom phone call call. But from my understanding is that the city has been home, I've been living at the Sander's for about a month now. And like I said, they didn't say I had to move, they didn't say I had to, there wasn't anything specific. So, I mean, I'm here.

- Okay. All right, so this is the first time you are appearing before the board? So we need to-

- Yes, that's it.

- Yeah So we need to have you tell us what you were convicted of, and how it came about.

- And when please.

- Okay, so I was originally convicted of first degree, sexual assault as a child under the age of 13. And that was in 2005 I believe, I may have my days wrong, I spent a really long time in a really horrible date. But yeah, I think it was like 2005, I think I was convicted. After hearing some of the other people speak. I know you guys both CCAP and on CCAP, you're gonna see my felony and then also two misdemeanors on there. And that's actually all one case. My trial, I did a, what was it called? So they dropped the charges 'cause I played, I'm pretty sure I pleaded no contest. And so they dropped the felony and they turned it into two misdemeanors and they gave me two years probation. And if I completed my two years probation, then that's all that would be on the record. But if I didn't complete my two years probation, not only would I get charge for the misdemeanors, but they would raised the felony and charge me with theft as well. So that's the reason why you see a felony and two misdemeanors on there, but it's all encompassed in just one case.

- So it looks like the first offense was the first degree sexual assault of a child. And then it looks like you had a deferred prosecution agreement and-

- That's what it is.

- Yeah, you must have violated something within that prosecution agreement for them to go ahead and recharge your case.

- The first prosecution agreement yes. The deferred prosecution agreement was I had to write a letter to the DA, I think it was like every three months, I think. And pretty much tell 'em, "Yeah, I'm on probation," what I was doing, what treatments that I was taking and stuff like that. And when I revoked myself off of misdemeanor paper, 'cause I didn't wanna be in here no more. And so I signed saying that I revoke myself and when I went into court, my lawyer said that I may have violated my, or we both went off in misdemeanor paper, but he fought for the fact that I still had my deferred prosecution agreement. And apparently the attorney's office pretty much said that the letter that I wrote was 'cause I, I think only wrote what, while I was on misdemeanor paper, 'cause I didn't last that long. And I don't exactly remember the specifics. Like I said, it was a really long time ago, but the judge denied the fact that I could still, have cause of the fact that he said that he denied the deferred prosecution. So because of that, that's the reason why he raised the felony and charged me with that, that as well. I know it's really, really confusing, but like I said, I don't exactly know all the details. 'Cause like I said, it's been a really long time, so I really don't exactly remember all of it.

- Okay. Does the board have questions regarding any of that?

- Are you employed Robert?

- I am employed, yes. I am employed to Cooper Ready. As of right now, I am working at Teller Pallets in Pier. I work Monday through Thursday. They're 10 hour days. So I have probably Sunday off. That is, that job is temp to hire. So after I work there for three months, I have the opportunity to get hired off the fence.

- And are there any minor children living in the home that you're currently at?

- Yes, there is. There is a friend of mine. Her name is Crystal and she has some kids.

- I would like to-

- As of right now, oh, go ahead, I'm sorry I didn't mean to interrupt you, go ahead.

- It seems like you were probably about 18 when this offense happened. Can you describe the circumstances

- The circumstances behind that, I was homeless. I did have a place to stay, I pretty much ran from home. I didn't wanna be living with my parents anymore. So I moved in with a friend of mine, and I ended up meeting my victim through a friend's friend, my victim's mother, she knew that we had so, she was nice enough to let me stay in her home. And that is when the victimization occurred. I was living with them, and that was, and they were living in after this happened.

- Do you wanna describe the victimization?

- Oh, I'm sorry, I kissed her, I touched her, I take around her neck and, not quite sure what else to say about that.

- So you kissed her?

- I don't know for whatever.

- You kissed her and touched her. Where did you touch her?

- I touched her breasts, and I touched her between the legs.

- Okay. And did you penetrate her at all?
- No, no, no, no, there was none of that.
- Okay.
- And how did the police find out?
- She ended up telling her mother and then her mother ended up calling.
- Okay.
- I think if, when I got questioned by the police, it was my victim, a licensed officer from her school that did the interrogation.
- Okay.
- No, there were two miss, like, was this a one time and were there other times?
- No, there's only the one sex offense. Like I said, the way it's put is weird, it looks like I actually have three different offenses, but if you look at my quote record and the full proceedings with that, you'll see I just have one victim. And there was only just that, just the one victim. But like I said, the way they broke it down with it being a deferred prosecution agreement, and with it being a withheld sentence, that's how it ended up to be or that's how they put it down as far as my records show.
- And Captain Richgels, I'm gathering because this is another Allegheny offense, and quite old, you probably don't have access to that either.
- Did not receive this one. I wish I did to be able to provide some more guidance on this particular one. I'm a little confused, but I do not have the criminal record.
- Okay, yeah that's okay. All right, so Robert, you've been living in Green Bay for one month at your brother's house, prior to that, did you say you were living out of state?
- Yes, that's correct. I haven't been on probation or parole in almost, it feels like seven years. I don't exactly, I can't give you the date as to when I completed my probation. But about a year after, a little less than that after I completed my probation, I ended up moving to California. I was in California and then Oregon and then Washington, and then I came back here.
- And what made you come back to Wisconsin?
- I was just in a real bad situation in Washington, I was homeless, living on the street. I didn't have work or anything like that. Problems arose with my sister, we just couldn't get along. And so I just ended up saying pretty much forget it, I'm gonna move back home, and that's what I did. And I called my mom, and my mother lives here. It's my brother's house, my other brother lives here, and my mom does. They were living here before I showed up. And so, like I said, I got permission for my brother to stay here. And if the paperwork that I gave you, excuse me, the paperwork that I gave you should have his name on there. So I got prior approval from them. Yeah, I got prior approval from them to live here. And like I said, not until I actually got here that I even hear about the ordinance of Green Bay and how it all works.
- Okay. In the home where you're staying, can you tell us who lives there?
- As of right now, it is my two brothers, my mom, me and my friend Crystal and her two kids.

- What age is her kids?

- Her youngest is six months, and the oldest son is six I believe. Somewhere around there.

- Can she show up?

- I mean she's here, she's here now. If she actually said that she would be willing to speak on my behalf. So if you wanna talk to her and ask her whatever questions you want. I mean, unless she changed her mind, I'm pretty sure she's more than willing to answer whatever questions you have for her.

- Well, maybe we'll ask her some questions momentarily, but does the board have any questions about his case and what he was convicted of?

- I do not. It was 17, 18 years ago.

- Yeah, all right. And Robert, if anybody wants to ask you any questions, reference treatment, do you wanna do that in private session or public session?

- Public's fine.

- Okay, and you don't really have anything listed for any kind of treatment. Had you obtained any kind of treatment?

- Yes, I've actually had prior do treatment. I put a lot of treatment in different areas. I know according to the application, it said that if you don't have any of the paperwork to prove that you have had treatment, that the board is just gonna assume that you haven't done any treatment at all. And since I don't have any of that paperwork, 'cause like I said, it's been all going around and stuff like that, I don't have none of it anymore. It got lost or whatever it is, or I ended up feeling under away at one point in time or something like that. But that's the reason why I didn't fill any that stuff in, because like I said, I'd have to call Oshkosh, where I did my SOT and completed it. I would have to get a hold of Rio and Raycin, where I did my a LDA. I would have to get a hold of Fox Lake where I completed my HSED. And I know I did, now I have a brief, can't remember what it's called. I had another choosing too, sorry ma'am, I'm getting my brain pile scattered right now. My brain's panel was scattered, written out as far as what it's called. Oh, CJP there you go. I also completed my TJP, I don't exactly remember what prison I was under the date. But I completed that as well. And like I said, I don't have any of that paper work anymore, it's been so long and between moving and stuff like that, I don't have any of it. So I would have to get ahold of all the prisons to have them mail it to me. If they even still have it, I don't know how long you keep documents for or anything like that, so.

- Okay. I guess I wanna come talk a little bit about your criminal history. So it looks like you have this event. Was that in 2000? Back in 2009 it looks like you had a battery while you were in the Oshkosh Prison. While you were on west. Did you have any other offenses that you were convicted of out there?

- No, no, I have not had any police contact, resolving any kind of criminal activity at all since I have gotten released. If there was any police, it was because I got pulled over for speeding or working working with a seatbelt. Or there was an incident at the house and the police were involved, but it wasn't involving me, it was involving the incident at the house that I was at. But like I said, nothing criminal or anything like that. I don't have any charges, I have no pending cases. Excuse me.

- Okay. Does the board have any other questions they would like to ask? Or any discussion?

- None.

- Okay.

- Again, I typically do not approve people from out of county in this case, originated and out out Allegheny county. But I guess at this point, I mean, he's been living there for a month. He doesn't have any other criminal history listed on his case. And it was quite some time ago. I really don't have a problem if he would continue to reside there, that's just my thought.

- Agreed.

- Robert, I know you said that maybe somebody wanted to speak on your behalf, is that correct? Or you didn't have any speakers list. Deb?

- No, well, I mean, I didn't list any speakers, just 'cause of the simple fact that I wasn't quite sure who to put on there. And after I filled out that application and handed it in, I ended up talking to her and she said she wouldn't mind. So it was actually after the fact.

- Does she wanna speak now or?

- One second. I would have to take you off of my Bluetooth for one second and put you on speaker on the phone, is that okay? Give me one second. Can you hear me?

- Yep.

- [Crystal] Hello.

- Hi, if you could please state your name and address for the record.

- [Crystal] My name is Crystal Rein. My last name is spelt R-E-I-N. My address is 130 South Webster at Green Bay, Wisconsin, 54301.

- Okay, and how do you know Robert?

- [Crystal] He is my best friend's brother.

- Okay, and what do you have to say about Robert?

- [Crystal] Since I've known him what, five, six years now. I haven't seen any issues with him. He's been with my kids, he's really kids. I think he's doing an overall good job with his progress so far, he's working. He's trying to maintain a place to stay, which he's staying with mom right now, which I hope he plans on getting his own place. He does have a vehicle that needs to get fixed, but overall, I think he is doing really good and he's turned into a pretty decent person.

- And you know what he was convicted of?

- [Crystal] Yes.

- And you're okay with him being around your children?

- [Crystal] Yes. He is not giving me any red flags or anything like that with my kids.

- Okay. Board, does anyone have questions for her?

- None.

- None.
- Okay, thank you.
- [Crystal] You're very welcome, I will give you back to Robert.
- Does the board have any other questions for Robert or any discussion they would like to have? Or should we, does anyone wanna make a vote?
- Move to approve address specific
- Is there a second?
- I'll second it.
- All right. All in favor, aye.
- Aye. Opposed. Okay Robert, you are approved to live at 130 South Webster. If you do decide to move from that address and continue to reside in Green Bay, you will need to come back before us.
- That's not a problem, I'll do whatever I need to.
- Okay, thank you.
- Good luck.
- All right thank you very much, I appreciate that.
- All right, bye.
- Bye. All right, that's the last one that I have on our agenda, but I still see, we have somebody by the name of Scott on the meeting notes. Do we know what that is Deanna?
- They wanted to speak regarding Michelle. So if you wanna talk to them now, that would be fine.
- Oh, do we need to if we've already approved her?
- Absolutely no.
- She's only approved for 60 days right now.
- Oh, should we have done that while she was on the agenda?
- Yes.
- All right.
- Maybe Scott, could I just address you for a moment please? Scott?
- I tried sending Scott some direct messages through the chat function and he has not responded, so I'm not sure if he's there.

- Yeah, and I only saw her daughter listed as a speaker, I didn't see anybody else. So that's why I'd never addressed this man.

- Scott, if you'd like to make comment, please unmute yourself.

- He's unmuted now.

- I just wanted to say, I don't think she should be allowed to move anywhere she feels like in the city of Green Bay.

- Okay, before you speak, could you please state your full name and address for the record.

- It's Scott Eintein and I live at 2410 Hampton Avenue.

- Is that green bay?

- Yes.

- Okay. Do you know Michelle?

- No, I do not.

- How come?

- I just said, I try to make as many of the city meetings as I can. And when I saw that she was applying to moving and not giving an address, I'm like, "Why can she move, and not give an address?" You know, I myself would like to know where they are living.

- I understand that, and if you have followed, you know, the minutes for many years, Michelle has appeared before us, I think it started back in 2005 or eight, 2008. And every time she has requested to move, she has been approved to reside at the addresses that she had requested. Obviously, there are some concerns regarding her health at this moment. And the board discussed that in private session. And we felt at that moment, that we would take care of her medical needs while she was allowed to search for a home to live in. But we want her to come back in 60 days to let us know if she did find a home. So this isn't a free for all where she can just ignore us and ignore the ordinance, she should report back to us.

- I mean, the state does enough for that, for this, put 'em wherever they want. And don't give about you guys.

- I'm not really quite sure what you're referencing there.

- [Scott] The sex offenders, I've got one that moved into my backyard.

- Okay.

- [Scott] Until up, and I talked to him. He did not even know he had to register with you guys to request to live there. And when I brought it up, he requested to move there, but he had already lived, he's already living there.

- Okay.

- [Scott] He's a very nice person. I like him, but he did not know, but the state told him he could move there.

- And when you say the state, are you talking the Department of Corrections?

- [Scott] Correct, correct.

- Okay, typically I believe the department of corrections does notify their clients, that if they wish reside in the city of Green Bay, we do have an ordinance. So I can't speak for that specific case that you're talking about, but I do believe that is the typical response from the Department of Corrections.

- And the state Department of Corrections does place violent sex offenders, but that has its own set of notifications that go out and different levels of notification, depending on the specific offenses. This board is for sex offenses committed against children. So I mean, there's different kinds of sex offenders, and to us, is designed to address one specific type.

- Does that answer your questions Scott? You're still on mute. Do you have anything further you would like to talk about Scott?

- Can I make a motion to adjourn?

- Oh, well, hold on. We have to go to other business before we do that.

- Right, sorry.

- Okay, so the next order of business, oh, is that our next is going to be scheduled for July 20th at 4:00 pm. Is there any discussion that the board needs to have prior to that meeting?

- I just wanna let the board know that I am going to be on vacation the whole week before that. I will try to get as much of the agenda done before I go on vacation, but I will probably be posting it that Monday before the meeting.

- Okay.

- Just letting you know.

- Sure, thank you. All right, Captain Richgels, thank you for your assistance this evening.

- Happy to help.

- Yes, thank you.

- Bye.

- So now we could get a motion to adjourn the meeting.

- Move to adjourn.

- Second.

- All right, all in favor, aye.

- Aye.

- Okay, everyone, we'll see you next month.

- All right.

- Thank you.
- Have a night everyone.
- Who seconded the motion to adjourn?
- Pete.
- Oh, Fay, my bad.
- Okay, we'll put Fay.
- It was both at the same time, pretty much.
- Okay, thank you everybody.
- All right, have a good night.
- You too, bye-bye.
