VERBATIM MINUTES

All right, we'll call the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board to meet. Roll call.

- Let's see. We have all five members present. I will document that in the minutes.

- I need a motion to approve the agenda for the November 16th, 2022 meeting.

- Move to approve.

- I'll second.

- All in favor, aye?

- [All Members] Aye.

- I need a motion to approve the minutes from the October 19th, 2022 meeting.
- I'll make a motion to approve.
- All in favor, aye?
- [All Members] Aye.
- Okay. The first order of business is the appeal of James Sanford, requesting to move to 1533 Morrow Street, number three, Upper. Mr. Morrow, you're present? Or Mr. Sanford, you're present?
- [James] Yes, I am.
- Okay. You have been before the board on several occasions, correct?
- [James] Yes, I have.
- Okay. And why are you requesting to move from the Reeve Street address?
- [James] Oh, I never got to the Reeve Street address. I was denied.
- Oh, okay. All right, so where have you been residing?
- [James] I've been residing at 871 Lombardi Avenue. That's at Arena Motel.
- Okay.
- [James] I just went over two years there.
- Okay, all right. Yeah, I see that. Okay. So before we go any further, because you have been here so many times, I would just like to ask the board if they would like you to, you know, tell us your story, or if everyone has read all your documentations from previous minutes?
- I would.
- [Alex] I've read it, but right now I'm on the side of denying it, so before I deny it, I would like to give him the opportunity to speak to what occurred.
- Okay. So James, we're gonna ask you to tell us what you were arrested for and convicted of. When you talk about the offense, we ask that you not speak of the victim by name or relationship.
- [James] All right.
- All right, go ahead.
- [James] Yeah, I was charged, I was changing my granddaughter's diaper. She's the age of three. I got sexually excited, and then I kissed and licked her vagina, and rubbed my penis on her butt. And I was charged with a fourth degree child enticement. And I got 15 years for that. Five years in and 10 years on supervision. I'm still on 10 years of supervision, which is about three and some months left that I have to complete.
- When did that offense happen?
- [James] That offense happened back in 2011.

- Okay. And what about the offense from 1997?

- [James] 1997, that was a sleepover. My daughter had some friends over, and I fondled, and I was charged with first degree sexual assault of a child, and she was seven years old. Sleepover, and I was fondling her vagina while she was sleeping, and she woke up, and then I was turned in.

- And then you served one year in the county jail for that?

- [James] Yes, with Hubert, and then I was on a 10 year withheld sentence. And then I completed that, and I got done with that in 2007.

- And then four years later you had--

- [James] I had this one that, yeah, my latest one was with my granddaughter.

- Oh, okay.

- Alex, do you have any questions regarding that?

- [Alex] No, thank you.

- Okay, all right. Captain Richgels, can you confirm if those situations are accurate?

- You're muted.

- [Gary] Sorry, I'm having some computer issues here. You can hear me?

- Yep.

- [Gary] As I clicked on, we were talking about the 2011 case? That's accurate that that was the first one being discussed, correct?

- Yes.

- [Gary] I show the criminal charges of first degree child sexual assault, contact with a child under the age of 13. There was some discussion of the licking that had occurred, this document states that it happened multiple times, but it was a first degree sexual assault about that. And the 97 case, I show first degree sexual assault, and I have not had a chance to get through the details yet. Give one second. Woke up and someone was touching her private areas, referring to the vagina, opened her eyes and saw that it was Mr. Sanford. And that shows as one count of first degree sexual assault.

- Thank you. Mr. Sanford, what do you have to say about that it occurred, according to the Captain, several times?

- [James] With the last charge I got, that was charged with four degrees of child enticement, I got out of that one.

- But did it occur on several occasions?

- [James] With my granddaughter? Yes.

- If we wanna talk about treatment, do you wish to do that in closed session or public session?

- [James] No, we can do it public.

- Okay. When you were convicted back in 1997, did you go through any kind of sex offender treatment?

- [James] No. If I had any, it was like about three weeks or four weeks with Jim Drake down the street, when I was in the Brown County Jail down there with Hubert. And I went to that, and then that wasn't really much treatment at all.

- Okay. So you spent one year in the county jail, you were on supervision for 10 years, and then four years after getting off supervision, you decided to assault another child. Is that correct?

- [James] Correct.

- And what would provoke you to do that again?

- [James] I had, like I say, I found out later down the line that I got, like I say, I was pedophilia, I was diagnosed with pedophilia.

- When was that diagnosed as?

- [James] Well, that was done after, you know, between when I got out of prison. In 2016 I went through some psychiatric evaluation with my VA clinic.

- Okay. And it looks like you were in sex offender treatment from 2018 to just up until September of this year?

- [James] No, in prison I had 22 months of S04 treatment, which is the higher level of treatment. And I was about two months completing that, but it wasn't working right because I was not addressing some issue that I couldn't seem to put my fingers on. And I just didn't make it. So I dropped out of that, and then I went, and I got out of prison after that. And then I started regular treatment of SO2, which was fine. It was great because it was just like SO4 in prison, but something wasn't working right yet either. So my time, then I got with Jim Drake, the Dr. James Drake, and then I went with him, and that's when I started figuring out that I still had a problem with my, it's called the DB arousal, and I wasn't addressing that, right? Or nothing could address that until I actually, I finished at 76 weeks, and I was put in with Marshall Kirkpatrick's program, and that was in my 2018. And once I started that, he introduced me with SAM, and that's sexual arousal management program. And it's intense with punishment of my arousal when I had the arousal ever come on. And that's using a bottle of ammonia for smelling. Okay, I started that with him, and then I was working with that, and I found it was working very well, but I didn't want to give up my deviant arousal, because I've had it all my life and I liked it so much. So I started getting very disturbed, discouraged, and got in trouble with treatment. And I got kicked out of treatment, and I was heading to prison. I got jailed, and that was when I was going for that Reeve Street apartment, after I got onto jail. And I got back in program with Kirkpatrick, and that's when I went back, and I started getting with that SAM program. And I knew it worked and I had to make the change. I made the change to take and do the program really intense, and work on myself. So once I started working on myself with that, I then, like I say, I completed my SO4 treatment with Kirkpatrick, and graduated from it. And now? Now I just, like I say, I'm taking my life serious, more serious than I've ever had, because everything's falling into place and I've got more control with everything, with my deviant arousal. And when I do have that problem, I use SAM yet, and I also call my support group that's with me yet. And like I say, it's my new family. You know, so that's where I'm at right now. And at the time, I didn't put a value on myself, and when I was having trouble keeping the past with myself and living in the past, and that was hampering all the treatment. I was sabotaging my own self. So that's why I had to make a quick change, and a big change. So when I got out of jail back in a little over two and a half years ago and started my life, I started on a better track, and that's where I'm at right now. And

everything's working fantastic. So like I say, you know, and I got more to, you know, answer if you wanna ask me the questions, but that's where I'm at in my life right now.

- Are you working?

- [James] Yes, full time.

- Where do you work at?

- [James] I got a fantastic job with American Foods.

- Does the board have any questions for him?

- I do. Are you on any medications right now?

- [James] I take Paroxetine for my anxiety and my depression, and that's working very well.

- Okay, thank you.

- What do you do outside of work?

- [James] Right now I'm trying to, like I say, better my place of stay. Getting a bigger place, 'cause that hotel room is just a little small yet. And like I say, I'm building my network of friends, and making family. I got a very good friend now that I still, you know, keep in touch with and I visit daily, and he works with me at American Foods. Like I say, he's a very good support. And I got support people still from my group that I was in. And like I say, I like myself, and like I say, I got a little bit more to add for this. The questions would be, like you said, from once a week visits with my agent to once a month. I passed my most recent polygraph, and my curfew is getting much lesser too. So that's how I'm getting. I mean, like I said, I'm doing much better and I feel better for myself too. I'm taking more interest in liking myself, because I did not like myself for many years.

- Okay. And how long, when will you get off of probation?

- [James] I will be off of probation in 2020, 6th of August.

- Are you on any kind of GPS?

- [James] Lifetime.

- Lifetime GPS?

- [James] Right now, yes.

- All right. I don't have any further questions unless anybody else does?

- None here.

- Nope.

- Would anyone like on the board to have any discussion before somebody would like to make a motion?

- [Alex] I would just say that I have concerns over the fact that it's a repeat offender. They were crimes of opportunity. Seems like they're still having some issues with telling the truth. If I look at those minutes from

2020, looks like he failed his polygraph when talking about an issue with speaking with teens when he wasn't supposed to. So for those reasons I would not vote to approve.

- Make a motion, Alex.

- Make a motion to deny the appeal of Mr. Sanford at the address specific.

- Is there a second? Okay, it looks like that motion has failed. Do any of the board members feel that you're okay with allowing him to reside at that residence? And if so, why?

- There's some questions, you know, about being a repeat offender. I get it. He's gone through an awful lot of therapy. He is on the GPS for life. So I would be inclined to move to approve address specific.

- I do have to agree with you. The GPS does make me, it's a safety net in a way, and I do feel a little bit more comfortable knowing that he'll be on lifetime supervision for that.

- [Alex] If I could ask a question, Heidi, so with the GPS, and maybe you could chime in, but the fact that they're on GPS watch, is there like a limitation on where they can go? Can they not go to parks? And will the GPS go off if they're in that park? You know, how does that GPS system actually work? What is their restrictions?

- From my understanding with the GPS is they'll be allotted certain hours out, and then to certain locations. Is that correct Mr. Sanford?

- They put inclusion zones where I can go, and if I'm not in that inclusion zone, or in places like schools, parks, playgrounds, they will know, and I will get a buzz, like three buzzes on my thing that I'm in the wrong area at the wrong, you know, at any time. But yeah, I know where not to go and where I can go. So like I say, I'm fine. Like I say, they know where I'm at, and I know where I'm going, and I know where I'm not going. So this is where, like I say, that's my protection too, so.

- Correct.

- I had a question. Do you belong to any church?

- [James] No.

- Okay, thank you.

- I'd like to make a motion, Heidi.

- Okay.

- Move to approve address specific.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second it.

- All right. I'm sorry, before we go any further, I probably should have asked this before. Did you have anyone to speak on your behalf or?

- [James] Yeah, I have my new landlord if possible. She's right here.

- Is that all right if we do that at this point? Or should we continue with a motion?
- Well, since the motion would be dispositive, I think it would be more appropriate to hear from the speaker before making that vote.
- Okay. Are you all right with that? Okay, let's table that motion. I'm sorry, if you could just state your name and address for the record.
- [Brooke] Yep, Brooke Juedes with Nicoklay Properties, and address is 131 South Ida, in Green Bay.
- Okay, and what would you like to say?
- [Brooke] So we actually have known Jim for approximately two years. And like he had said, I would be very shocked if, like, we would not accept him, flat out, if he would've been that person, you know, prior to his most recent jailing. But since knowing him, we have kids of our own, and we work with sex offenders regularly. The majority of our, I don't wanna say the majority, but good portion of our attendants are sex offenders. And we have never, never had an issue with him. We've always reported things. There's not been any arousal of any sort, or even uncomfortability being around any of the kids. And it was never planned, it was always accidental, always reported, things like that. But some people, you get that vibe. With Jim, I do not get that vibe. I feel very comfortable around him. We offered him the unit because it's definitely larger than what he's at. He's at a place where he can't grow. He very much so loves to cook. He does not have a kitchen. If we want him to continue flourishing, he needs to have a space that he can actually call his own. And the hotel worked for a great time, but I would hate for him to go backwards because he can't grow personally. So we do have another, this is an approved location from a previous person who actually got off papers. A very good success story. I guess we just don't have concerns. Like, this is really what we put our time and effort into. We are always a support system for any of our SO's, or any of our tenants really, at all. So he knows that he can call on us, either my husband Jason or myself. The person actually is, the friend that he currently works with, is another one of our tenants who has called us at 10 o'clock at night, and we've been over there. 'Cause we'd much rather you call us if you need something instead of re-offend or anything like that. So that's always a thing. We are here, no matter what. We're not just collecting rent, we're not just normal landlords, and we kind of pride ourselves on that really. So I think he has some great goals, and he definitely has a new path that he is excited about, and I would really hate for a unit or a place that he wants to live in to really stop that, 'cause he's had some great growth.
- Okay, thank you. Do you have anyone else that wants to speak on your behalf, or was she the only one?
- [James] She's the only one. She's the only one.
- Okay, thank you. Okay, so we had a motion on the table to approve address specific. Was there a second motion, a second to approve that?
- Yes, we have.
- Pete? All right, so we'll vote. All in favor for the motion to approve Mr. Sanford address specific, aye?
- Aye.
- [Board Member] Aye.
- Opposed?
- [Alex] Nay.

- Okay. So Mr. Sanford, you're approved to reside at the Morrow Street address. If you do decide to move from there, you will need to come back before the board.
- [James] Yes.
- Okay. Would you like us to mail that notification to the Morrow Street or the Lombardi Street?
- [James] To the Lombardi Street, if possible, because that'd be alright. I'm gonna be collecting mail there for a little while yet afterwards, so.
- Okay, thank you.
- And I believe you're gonna send something to my agent too, right?
- Yes, yes.
- [James] Okay.
- All right, thank you.
- [James] Thank you so much.
- [Alex] And sorry guys, I gotta jump off, but I'll be back in the December group.
- Okay!
- [James] You too!
- [Alex] Thanks, you too.
- All right, next appeal is Adam Youra, requesting to move to 842 Redwood Drive. You can come forward.
- [Brooke] I think that we can drop off.
- Yes, you can. Right here, it's fine.
- [Brooke] Excuse me, is it okay if we drop off?
- [Board Members] Yes.
- [James] Okay, thank you.
- Okay, Adam, so this is your first time appearing before the board, correct? All right. So as you heard us indicate earlier, we're gonna ask you to tell us what you were convicted of. Again, please don't state the victim by name or relationship, and then how it got to the police's attention.
- [Adam] Okay. In 2008, I was charged with first degree sexual assault of a child under the age of 13. I went to trial, I lost. I was found guilty of going into her room and having sex with her. That's pretty much it.
- How old were you?
- 16.

- And she was 13?
- [Adam] 11.
- Oh, 11. Okay. And so you went to trial and you lost, and you were sentenced to how much?
- [Adam] 12 Years in, 13 out.
- Okay.
- He pretty much almost maxed me out.
- Do you know why?
- [Adam] He said 'cause I was a career criminal, and I was 19. Or 20, actually, when I finally got sentenced.
- And how did the police get involved?
- [Adam] Oh yeah, I forgot that bit. Well, the police got involved because of another crime. And then while investigating that crime, this crime came on.
- Do you have any more details?
- [Adam] Yeah, I went to trial for a gun case also, and the police got involved and were asking her about guns. And then after the detectives questioned her about the guns, they also, well then they charged me with this.
- 'Cause she must have said something at that point? And was this a one time situation, or had this occurred on multiple occasions?
- [Adam] One time.
- One time. Okay. We have Captain Richgels here from the Green Bay Police Department. If you can confirm the accuracy of that?
- [Gary] Yes, she was 11. It was reported to the lesser rule, and it was non-consensual.
- Okay, but it did only occur one time?
- [Gary] According to the criminal complaint, yes.
- All right, thank you. When did you get out of prison?
- [Adam] September 6th.
- Of this year? Okay, and then you've been staying at the halfway house, is that correct?
- [Adam] Yes, it is.
- Okay. And are you currently working?
- [Adam] Yes.
- Where do you work at?

- [Adam] At UPS, I should be at work right now.
- Is it full-time?
- [Adam] No, part-time.
- Part-time, okay. And you plan on living with your grandmother, is that correct?
- [Adam] Yes, it is.
- Okay. All right. If we want to, well, first of all, does anyone have questions about his offense? Okay. If we would like to talk about any treatment or anything that you've received, do you wish to do that in closed session or public session?
- [Adam] Public.
- Okay. So it says right now that you're currently enrolled in treatment? And do you have documentation there with you?
- [Adam] No, my PO said he was gonna get a letter from Pablo and give it to you guys.
- There's a letter in the packet.
- Oh, yes, yes, yes. I see that, I'm sorry. Okay, so you just started treatment?
- [Adam] Yep.
- And how long are you gonna be attending?
- [Adam] Until I finish.
- Sometimes they'll tell you, like, you're gonna be in like a 26 week, or a week?
- [Adam] Yeah, Pablo didn't go over that with me.
- All right, and you attend once a week?
- [Adam] Yes, on Tuesdays.
- Okay. So you've only had, what, two sessions?
- [Adam] Three.
- Three? Okay. Why don't you tell us what you've learned so far in those sessions?
- [Adam] I mean, as far as treatment goes, he's just getting to know me. So he just, the assignments, well, I've learned that he wants you to do a lot of assignments about, you know, the crime that you've committed, and just talk about it a lot. That's what they do a lot. I mean, I haven't learned any, like, you know, high risk situations or, you know, terms like that though. He hasn't really, it's just a lot of people getting to know each other at first, as far I could tell.

- Okay. Okay, kind of just wanna go back to your charge. So you took it to trial, because you said you pled not guilty. Are you saying that the offense did not happen?

- [Adam] Do I have to answer that question?

- Well, I mean...

- I mean, there are legal conclusions and verdicts that have been found. One of the three factors that the board considers is remorse, one is rehabilitation, and one is likelihood to re-offend. So any input you have regarding those three factors is what the board is making their decisions off of.

- [Adam] That's what I mean. So if I don't answer that though, so it won't hurt me?

- Well, it might hurt hurt you.

- [Adam] If it doesn't hurt me?

- It might hurt you.

- It will.

- I mean the board members can infer whatever they feel is appropriate as far as what that says towards your remorse and rehabilitation for the offense.

- [Adam] All right, so it happened.

- So you are admitting that it did happen? Okay. All right. And so why do you think it happened?

- [Adam] Because it happened.

- Like why, why would you do this?

- Oh! I have no idea. Young and stupid, I guess? Just didn't think about any consequences. I had no, I was just, I didn't, I was just a fool.

- I'm gathering that because you were a juvenile when it happened, but you weren't convicted of it until you were an adult, is that correct?

- [Adam] Correct.

- That's why it's an adult case. Okay, all right. Okay, does anyone have questions for him?

- There's a lot of drug convictions in here.

- [Adam] Yeah, I was a drug addict.

- Now, have you decided to take care of that now?

- [Adam] Oh yeah! There could be drugs right by me, I wouldn't use them.

- You'd go to any?

- [Adam] Nope, never had any treatment. I was walking back from recreation in prison one day, and I had drugs in my hand, and I was just like, what the heck am I doing? And I threw it. That day I lost all wants or needs to do it ever again. And it feels so good, 'cause it was like a huge weight was lifted off my shoulder. And ever since that day, I never had any problem again. And that's the truth.
- But no need for treatment?
- [Adam] No, I definitely have to take treatment eventually.
- For drugs?
- [Adam] Yeah, the judge ordered it.
- Oh, okay. Okay.
- [Adam] But I have nothing for the past 15 years.
- Been in custody for how many of those 15 years!
- And from somebody who knows something about that, the faster that you get treatment is probably better for you.
- [Adam] I mean, I did it as soon as I could when I got out. They never offered it to me in prison.
- You know the reason to do that, to make that choice?
- [Adam] Yeah, absolutely. Only for ALDA, yeah.
- Okay, so no questions? Would we like to hear from your people that wanna speak on your behalf?
- Yes.
- Okay. Actually, I think before we do that, what kind of documentation? You said you had paperwork here?
- No, just people that wrote letters on my behalf.
- So he's presented one, two, three, four letters. I'll kind of share 'em. I'm sorry, Dominique, you're not gonna be able to see these letters, unless you want us to read 'em aloud?
- [Dominique] No, that's fine.
- Okay, I'll let you each read one. We'll kind of pass 'em around. We'll just take a moment to read these. So the four letters are all in support of--
- I can take them and scan them for my file. I can mail them back to you with whatever letter.
- But just to build the record, if we could just say who wrote the letters?
- Oh! Do you wanna do that since we have them down there now?
- Sure.
- Okay, thank you. I'm sorry.

- That's okay.
- Okay, so we have a letter from a Douglas Youra, which is Adam's paternal grandfather, in support. We have a Ryan Soldana, a lifelong friend who's in support. Brian Fralick. Adam, what's Brian's relation to you?
- [Adam] A lifelong friend.
- Another friend, okay. And then Aaron Peterson, a friend for 20 years. So those are the people who have written supporting placement.
- Okay, all right. Now if we would like to have your people speak on your behalf? You can come forward.
- Who wants to go first?
- I can!
- Are you Bobbie Jo?
- Okay, go ahead and have a seat. All right, what would you like to say?
- You can have a seat as well.
- Oh, okay.
- [Bobbie Jo] Yeah, I would just like to say, you know, to be honest with you, not seen him for a long time. I was kind of, how is everything gonna go when he gets out, but I've been pleasantly surprised. He's been trying to do his best and, you know, little trouble with getting employment, which goes with the territory, just getting outta prison. But he's made great effort on securing employment, and so that's why we were willing to go ahead and secure the place for him to live.
- Are you related to him?
- [Bobbie Jo] He's my son.
- Oh okay, yeah. Sorry, I didn't know that.
- [Bobbie Jo] So yeah, after so many years, you know, I mean, you know, even if I went and visited him, you don't get the okay, he's coming out, what's gonna happen type thing.
- And how often did you visit him while he was in prison?
- [Bobbie Jo] Oh, not too often. Only because I have a lot of responsibilities of the kids. I know he wasn't happy with me about that, but. And it's, you know, a good couple hours away. But I would whenever I had a chance.
- And when he was arrested for this, what were your thoughts?
- [Bobbie Jo] I was devastated, actually. But in another fact, I knew. I knew he was getting into drugs, and trouble, and a lot of other things and, you know, so maybe it was a blessing that everything just all came down at one time, or else he might not even be here to this day. And I think through the years he figured that out also.

- All right. Anybody have questions for her?
- No, ma'am.
- Okay, and then you wanted to speak also?
- [Carol] Yes, I'm his grandmother.
- Okay, and your name?
- [Carol] Carol Weist.
- Okay, and are you the one that he's gonna be living with?
- [Carol] Yes.
- Okay, all right. So what would you like to say?
- [Carol] Oh, I certainly don't have a problem with living with Adam. He's a very nice kid, actually. Deep down he's very helpful.
- Do you have rules at your place?
- [Carol] Pardon?
- Do you have rules at your place that he'll have to follow?
- Well, of course I have rules. I always have rules!
- What are some of the rules that you're gonna have for him?
- Well, clean up after yourself, which he does anyway. You don't really have to tell him that. And you know, just, I don't want any trashy friends around, and just things like that, you know? Just common sense things. You know.
- Curfew?
- [Carol] Well, I think he has a curfew.
- [Bobbie Jo] Yeah, he has curfew so she wouldn't have to.
- [Carol] Yeah, I think he does for a while anyway.
- Does he have a bracelet on him?
- [Carol] Yeah, he does.
- [Adam] Lifetime.
- Oh, you are a lifetime bracelet?
- [Carol] Oh, I didn't know that.

- Yeah, I didn't realize that either. 'Cause you just have the one sex offense?
- [Bobbie Jo] That's why I was kind of surprised with all that, but.
- [Carol] But I didn't know that neither.
- [Bobbie Jo] But especially making, you know, this a little more difficult with everything.
- [Carol] But if Adam had a place of his own, I know he'd be happy. You know, a lot happier. I wouldn't have to worry about him running around, you know what I mean? He wouldn't want to.
- [Bobbie Jo] That's what he wants, somewhere to call his own place instead of--
- [Carol] And I understand that.
- Okay. All right. Any questions, Dominique?
- [Dominique] No, not for me.
- Okay.
- I just have a question for Adam.
- You guys can go and head back. Thank you.
- [Bobbie Jo] No worries.
- What do you do at UPS?
- [Adam] I'll unload trailers. Just keep unloading trailers, and load 'em onto the belts. That's it. That's all I do for four to six hours.
- Did you get an okay from your boss to miss tonight?
- Yeah, I texted him. We get a group text of when be to work, and I text him back. I said hopefully I'll be there around five. That's why I keep looking at the clock.
- Oh, okay.
- I just wanna say one thing. In prison, I wasn't completely nonproductive. I earned two associates degrees in there. I got an associate in the science and associate in the arts from Milwaukee Area Technical College. Took calculus one, calculus two, physics one, physics two. I mean, I did everything that I could, basically, to actually better myself.
- What prison were you at?
- Kettle Marine Correctional Institution. I was there for my entire time.
- Okay.
- And I never got in trouble in prison. Never went to the hole. I mean, I got tons of minor tickets, but none, I never, never got into fights or anything like that.

- Okay. Before we go into anyone wanting to make a motion, is there anybody who has any discussion they would like to say?

- Well, I think that this young man paid his price, and he wants to get out there and better his life. So I'm inclined to make a motion for the move, address specific.

- I just have to say, I'm a tad bit worried that you don't have much treatment under your belt. You've been in prison for a really long time, and you've only been out for two months. And so that part, I think it can be overwhelming, I mean, for anybody to get out after that long, and only three classes of treatment? That makes me a tad bit nervous, but. Anybody else?

- I kind of agree we'd like to see more treatment. Do you have transportation?

- Yeah, I have my license and a vehicle. That's what I spent my release grant on.

- Did you actually make a motion?

- No, I didn't, but I just wanna say he's got good family support, he's going to classes, he hasn't missed any, so I'm gonna make a motion to approve address specific.

- Okay, is there a second?

- I'll second it.

- Okay, all in favor. Aye?

- [All Group] Aye.

- Opposed? Opposed.

- Okay, so you're good to reside at the 842 Redwood Drive. If you do decide to move from there, you will need to come back before us. Okay?

- [Adam] Thank you.

- Do you want us to send the letter to that address, or do you want me to just email it to you?

- [Adam] Email is fine.

- Okay.

- [Adam] Thank you.

- All right, thank you.

- [Adam] Have a good night, you guys.

- [Carol] Thank you, have a good night.

- Okay. Is there any other business that we have to take care of?

- Actually, yes.

- Okay!

- Starting next month, we will not be in this room. There was a conflict with another group, so we will be in the room, not directly below us, but if you're on the second floor, it's kind of around the corner. It's the committee room that Protection and Policy meets in. I believe it's 207?

- 207.

- So we'll be down there for the in person portion, and that should be our new home going forward.

- Just send a reminder of that.

- Yep.

- And it'll be on the agenda too, the new, whenever we are now.

- It'll be on the second floor, not the third floor.

- Okay. So that meeting is scheduled for December 21st at four o'clock. At this point, I'm gonna say that I am probably going to be appearing via Zoom. But I will, as that date gets a little bit closer, I'll keep everyone informed. All right, if there's nothing further, then if we can get a motion to adjourn?

- Move to adjourn.

- Second.

- All in favor, aye?

- Aye.

- Aye.

- [Board Member] Aye.

- Alright, thank you. Thank you, Captain Richgels!

- [Dominique] Happy Thanksgiving, guys.

- You too! All right. Thank you.

- Nice to see everybody in person.

- Yeah!

- You're not really just little squares on my computer.

- We're real people!

- We really exist.

- I know, right?
