- You should see Andy go. You don't get a chance to breathe. Number one, consideration of possible action on approving a Leadership Green Bay project to improve the Wildlife Sanctuary 4K Outdoor Exploration play area with the construction of a new dock and shelter, along with providing funding to set up a scholarship fund for bustling Wildlife Sanctuary 4K students.
- So for those of you who aren't familiar with Leadership Green Bay, so that's a group that was formed I believe in 1985. They usually take about 40 participants in the program each year and switch 'em out every year. And these participants are professionals within the community of all different backgrounds, different professions, and different fields of expertise. And what they do is they take these 40 individuals and they split 'em into groups. And each group is then tasked with kind of doing some sort of a community project. And each one kind of tailors their project to the members in their smaller group. And they kind of search out the community for projects to initiate, which will then help them grow in their field of expertise, get out to meet people and just kind of grow in their profession. So that's a real brief summary of Leadership Green Bay. Every year we were approached by at least one or two groups. We have a potential project with Green Parks. This year we had a group come forward who was very excited about doing a project at the Wildlife Sanctuary. So from here what I would recommend is we open up the floor. We have several members of this group who just want to give a very brief presentation of their proposal. And then you can ask questions from there.
- Sounds good.

- Well, it's a good project. It's ambitious.

- [Sherry] All right. Well thank you for the introduction about Leadership Green Bay. We're really happy to be here tonight and be able to present this to all of you. One of the things we're challenged with in Leadership Green Bay is to really do a project, not only to the benefit of Green Bay, but also to further all of our passions. So there's eight of us in our group. Four of us couldn't make it here tonight. And the way we started thinking about this was what are we all passionate about? Because as you know, passion drives achievement and accomplishment. And we went around the room, we talked about it and we kind of synthesized our passion into four areas. One was the environment, the outdoor areas that we all live in. A second was youth and education. A third was accessibility and a fourth was sustainability. Those were definitely the themes that came to the top from all of us. So looking for projects in those areas that could meet those passions that we all had. And we explored pretty in depth about eight different passions that are, we split off in groups and went and looked at different areas and Allie brought this one to our attention at the Wildlife Sanctuary. A place where we all love and appreciate having in Green Bay. It's quite the gem I have to say. I haven't lived here for 30 years. I grew up here but came back in the last three years and I can't tell you how much, how many hours I've spent out there. I just, I love the place. So we met with the staff of the Wildlife Sanctuary in the Green Bay Parks Department to see, you know, were there projects there that needed to be done. And they brought our attention to the Oak Learning Center where they have their 4K program and they also host summer camps and then various groups from around the area and the region actually come and use it. And it's primarily for children's education 4K through about third, fourth, fifth grade. You can see in the pictures here, we looked at what might be needed and what could be used by the children. And they have a dock right now in their 4K outdoor learning area. And the dock leads out to the pond for the kids to go out on, perform experiments, see the wildlife, the fish and the dock right now is closed, because it's about 10 years old and it's definitely running into structural issues. So it's not safe for the kids to be out there. So what a great opportunity for the kids to be able to not only be in the Wildlife Sanctuary but be out on the water and be able to have additional activities. Another spot we noticed leading down from the main path is there is a pathway, but right now would be pretty difficult for someone on crutches or with braces or in a wheelchair to get down there to use that dock. Another area you can see in the picture too, they have kind of an area for the kids with the stumps to sit on, to learn, if you're gonna have group time. But one of the ideas expressed by the Wildlife Sanctuary was maybe having a more familiar or formal pavilion area or structure where they could lead different types of activities, have different types of seating, maybe have tables for the kids to eat their lunches there. So when talking among our group and what we would like to do and what we think we could do would be three phases to this project. We hope to accomplish all of them, but we broke them down in phases because like everything else that relies on funding. So the first phase would be to replace that dock and to get an accessible pathway down to the dock and learning area. We think that phase could be completed by about May of this year. So it'd be available for the summer and cost somewhere in the range of \$10,000 to \$15,000, based on some original estimates. Phase two would be replacing those stumps with a more permanent structure. And we've kind of researched some structures. You can see the pictures there on the second page about what that, or the last page, what that might look like. We have not researched into that, too much of the cost of that. But again, we possibly around \$15,000, \$20,000 that could cost. And the third phase, which if we don't have enough money to do phase two, it's still possible to do phase three. This is utilized a lot at Green Bay Area schools, and we learned some of the hesitancy to get the kids out there is they have to pay the busing company to bus the kids. So we'd like to have some funds left over that we could make a scholarship for the Wildlife Sanctuary to provide to schools when they wanna come, but if busing costs are an issue. So those are the three phases that we are proposing to do. Between the employers where we work and contacts that we have, we feel pretty confident that we'd have the funding already for phase one. So there wouldn't need to be a lot of work to put that in place. Phase two, then we are prepared to go out to the community to raise some more funds to see if

we could get the funding for that phase two. We could talk to the Friends of the Wildlife Sanctuary, the Greater Green Bay Community, and the Crest Foundation. And we have a lot of really great nonprofits here that we'd like to, you know, reach out and propose our project to and see if they'd be willing to fund it with us. So that's our plan at the moment. I mean our next steps is to get it approved by you all here and then the Green Bay City Council and then we'd work with the Wildlife Sanctuary to go ahead and solicit bids to get the dock built first and the pathway. We also have several connections with companies in our group around town that may also be willing to provide some in-kind services as well too. So we'd like to get it all scoped out and then get to these companies and see if they'd be willing to donate some labor materials.

- [Sherry] What did I miss? I feel like I talked too fast. So wait five minutes, so we're gonna-

- Anybody else wanted to comment or do you mind taking any questions if there's?

- [Sherry] No, and I have one more comment unless you guys wanna-

- [Eck] No, go ahead.

- [Sherry] If you approve it and the City of Green Bay approves that, one thing we wanna work with you on is like who the funds would go to. Because some of the corporations that are donating may wanna make a charitable contribution. So that's something that would be deductible for them, and if we could go to them and say, hey, you can contribute this too and it'll be a deduction for you. So it's one kind of open question mark we have about where the funds could go that, you know, it would be more beneficial to corporations. It would give them another incentive to contribute.

- So that one's the one up. Dan, do you wanna answer that right away?

- Yeah, I mean we can either donate those directly to the city. We've done that in the past and they've been able to use that as a tax write off-

- [Sherry] Oh, good.

- To the city but if that is a concern, we can also coordinate it with the Friends of the Wildlife Sanctuary-

- [Sherry] Okay.

- And they can accept the donation too. So it can go either way.

- [Sherry] Either way.

- So really what we're looking at doing is just approving the project and then we'll work through the details on quoting out the materials, hiring a contractor, you know, getting the funds to the city, whether or not they want to participate in the construction or not. You know, we've done that before with other volunteer groups. There's a process we have in place to do it. So we don't have all of those details worked out. So what we're looking for is for you just to approve the project and then we'll just work with them on finalizing it and implementing it.

- Thanks Dan, then Mark you had a-

- [Sherry] Okay, yeah, I would, thank you.

- [Eck] It's a great project and it's so awesome for you to be willing to do that. So with the shelter idea possibilities, can you tell me, I guess the, this kind of looks like a garage, which I obviously can close. What are the differences in the reasons, I guess for the types?

- [Erica] So the two different styles were, you know, one's outdoorsy, right, completely open. The second one, which has the garage doors, could be something that the Wildlife Sanctuary could store things in during the winter times when that pond area is not used as well. So like if something, they could stick their, you know, tables or chairs or things that are outside, inside for the wintertime. So it's just two different options to kind of look at, to see, you know, where is their best, our money gonna be best spent on an outdoor pavilion area.

- We haven't selected a particular model, these are just two examples of the types that they could purchase and install. But we'll work with them and we'll work with the staff at the sanctuary to select the shelter that fits the use the best.

- [Eck] This one probably is more expensive, I think.

- [Allie] I feel like neither of these are, I mean we might not go with either of 'em, they're just-

- [Eck] Just ideas right now.

- [Steuer] I would think the more open concept was part of the line of what we're trying to do, the outdoors thing. Why would you close 'em all in and make no windows in it?

- [Eck] Right, right.

- [Sherry] I think the concept would have like garage doors at least on two sides, if not four, to kind of make it open. But, yeah, that's a good point.

- [Chair] Got questions, complaints?

- [Steuer] I'm trying to picture where this is.

- [Sherry] The first picture is actually

- [Campbell] And the map for this one. That's, where's the entrance to the-

- [Sherry] It's just if you, oh go ahead.

- I'm sorry. Do you know where the 4K entrance is for the new addition to the nature center? So you know where the amphitheater is? The outdoor amphitheater is where we have a fire pit.

- [Campbell] No, haven't been there in a while.

- Oh, okay-

- [Eck] You know where you're drive in and you park-

- The nature center? The nature center is the primary building that you go to for activities.

- I know where.

- If you go past The Nature Center.

- [Steuer] It's built on a lot there so.
- If you go past the Nature Center, it's a private access, so the public can't drive there but there's an old road that actually goes through there. You take that road and go down.
- [Campbell] It almost looks like this picture was taken today 'cause I seen a truck driving down there today. I never see a truck driving. I live right down the street from it so, sorry I don't know, but my kids are grown up now.
- [Sherry] It's okay.
- [Campbell] So that long road that goes to Dan's mean?
- Yeah, I think it does.
- 'Cause there's a pond that's pretty dried up now, but it has been wet for years.
- It's-
- And I saw a city truck there, and I said that's where you go.
- [Chair] That's a truck. That picture looks pretty fresh. Okay, thanks Steve. Go ahead.
- [Steuer] I'll be right there, thank you Chair. Ladies, thank you very much for coming in. I think it's a great project. I can't see any detriment or any fallback from any of this. So I guess we always look at it as a committee looking at finance, you know, how it's gonna be taken care of, you know, whether it be taxes or not, or money that is raised. I think that it goes very well with us. But you know, I'm thinking you've talked about this for a while it seems, and it seems like you have a pretty good idea. I appreciate you coming in and stating that. So, I'm all in favor.
- [Sherry] And one thing to add, the dock would be made out of sustainable materials instead of wood. So hopefully it'll last longer.
- Sounds good. Me.
- [Chair] Go ahead.
- [Campbell] Why is it just 4k? I don't understand.
- So there's a 4K play area. We do use that pond and the dock for other uses too. So when the 4K isn't out there using it, the public will have access to that dock and can use it. Right now it's closed to everyone because of the condition of them, but it will be used for 4K and the general public.
- [Campbell] So I've learned about the 4K project all along through my wife's business. She runs the cerebral palsy center and so I know how the whole 4K thing has been established over the years and that's why I'm just trying to bring some light to a discussion with her, you know, whether it be funding it teachers, where are the kids coming from then? Are they coming from daycares or are they coming from homes or where are they coming from?
- [Allie] So there's a 4K school at the Wildlife Sanctuary.
- [Campbell] The school at the sanctuary.

- [Allie] Yeah, at the sanctuary. That was an addition maybe a year ago though.
- [Council] It's been there for like eight years.
- [Allie] Oh, eight years. So there is a 4K there. So those kids use it probably three or four times a week. But then there are additional schools from all over the region that come in that also use that.
- [Campbell] So many hours a day. Is it just the 4K?
- Just to give you a little background, so this is a program that we teamed up with the Green Bay School District. It's a city program that we run out of the sanctuary. It's not a school district program, they just help us with it and they actually fund it also. So we actually have a teacher in the classroom and a naturalist in the classroom. And we have a morning class and an afternoon class. And this runs throughout the entire school season. But these are city programs. This is a school that the city operates and maintains with help from the school district. So we can take up to 80 students per semester in this program and it's a nature-based program. So it's a very unique program.
- [Campbell] I'd like to conversate with her a little bit.
- [Allie] Even if you-
- [Campbell] But I'm sure she's gonna say, well I could have told you that and I'll be able to learn a little bit more about it. So, you know, I didn't even know it existed there.
- [Allie] And the third bullet point on the front page, it has like all the stats on the learning center.
- [Campbell] Yeah, I was kind of briefing through that when you said 40, it threw me and then it says 16 different sessions of 40.
- [Sherry] Oh, like a summer class-
- This is summer, so.
- [Sherry] It's a camp that they have.
- [Campbell] Is it an all year-round thing, no?
- [Sherry] The 4K is all year-round, school year.
- [Campbell] Okay.
- [Sherry] And then they have summer camps that the Wildlife Sanctuary puts on. But then they also have, you know, right now a school, you know-
- [Megan] Field trips.
- [Sherry] Field trips, any local school can come out and take a field trip and they would also be using this area. And that happens, those numbers are in there. I mean there a hundred every year, schools come out there to use it as well.
- [Megan] My daughter went there last year and I was a chaperone for it. So this would've been a great place to bring the group after lunch, sit down and talk about some of the things. We used the nature center for that field trip. So that was also awesome. But it'd be great to have an outdoor place as well for those kids.

- [Campbell] Cool, all right.
- [Chair] Any other questions for the committee? Thank you.
- [Eck] Motion to close the floor.
- [Chair] Alder Eck will close the floor.
- Second.
- [Chair] Campbell. Those in favor?
- [All] Aye.
- [Chair] Oppose, motion carried. Thank you for coming today, it's an excellent proposal. It's really, really nice. And this is really what helps build a community and keep it strong as these types of thing. So, especially parks department, we always need all the help we can get.
- [Eck] A motion to approve it.
- Motion bail direct to approve.
- [Campbell] I'll let Kilmer do it, it's your district.
- [Chair] Alder Eck.
- Sorry, I-
- [Steuer] Probably let Alder Campbell.
- [Chair] Alder Campbell, do you second? You have a second on this one?
- [Campbell] Yes.
- [Chair] Okay. You have a motion the second. Any discussion those in favor?
- [All] Aye.
- [Chair] Opposed, motion carried. This will go to council next week Tuesday for full discussion, I would think approval. Can't see anybody vote against it. But one more step to go, thank you.
- [Sherry] All right, thank you.
- [Allie] Thank you so much.
- Thank you.
- [Chair] Number two. I think there's a table on number two consideration of possible action. I'm purchasing playground equipment for John Muir Park. I'm pretty sure that meant Colburn. It was supposed to be Colburn.
- [Eck] I already motioned.

- At Game Time for total cost of \$25,674.89. Director, is there a tape over there?

- [Chair] No, there is not.

- All right.

- [Eck] We had had storm damage. Okay, this is just replacing.

- So that's what this is. So when we had storm damage over the summer and that one big storm, a tree fell on this piece of playground equipment and damaged it to the point where we couldn't repair it. So we took the whole piece of equipment out and we are going to, we're in the process of, we'll be filing an insurance claim with the city's insurance to fund everything that was damaged within that storm. So this is the last thing that's left to purchase out of all of the storm damage items. So in this situation, we're proposing a sole source for this equipment because of the insurance claim, because we're replacing like for like, and so the company that originally supplied this piece of equipment was Game Time. What we're proposing to buy is identical to what was there previously, which just happened to be a donation by the Packers. So that was actually a Packer-installed and donated piece of equipment. But again, this is sole source from Game Time for \$25,674.89. It is being paid for out of contingency. The finance committee gave, or is allowing, the parks department to use up to a hundred thousand dollars of contingency money to pay for all of the storm damage items. When we filed the insurance claim, which we'll be doing in the next month or so, any money that were reimbursed will go back in to replenish the contingency fund.

- [Chair] Thank you sir.

- [Eck] There shouldn't be any reason why it wouldn't be covered, right? With insurance?

- No, from what our risk management office has told us, they've had conversations with our insurance provider, there's a \$25,000 deductible and everything else should be eligible for replacement costs. But we haven't filed the claim yet to get a definite response to that. So in total, when it's all said and done, we'll be spending about \$95,000 for all of the items that were damaged in that storm. So we'll get about \$70,000 back to replenish the contingency account.

- [Eck] And you were able to replace that 'cause the swing got crushed too.

- That's already been replaced, and we already have that built into our claim. We've already paid for that.

- [Chair] Any other questions or motion?

- [Eck] I make a motion to approve.

- [Campbell] Second.

- [Chair] Motion approved by Alder Eck, seconded by Alder Campbell to approve. Any discussion on this one, those in favor?

- [All] Aye.

- [Chair] Opposed, that carries. Oh, I think there's a typo. That's fine. We don't have anything.

- I just wanted to wish the committee a happy holiday season. A Merry Christmas, Happy New Year. Thank you for, you know, participating this year in our committee, it's been fun. It's been a good time and I really, really appreciate the time you've put into it. So really I don't have much else to add other than at the last meeting we talked about an event at Colburn Park, which is tentatively scheduled for tomorrow and it's kind

of showcasing our new holiday light display. I believe that's scheduled for 5:30 tomorrow. Is when we're turning the lights on to the public, so.

- [Chair] So should we have cocoa? Hot cocoa at Chris Wery's house.

- Cinnamon rolls, Santa, Southwest marching band.

- Oh man.

- [Eck] Cinnamon rolls.

- A good, good night.

- So if you're able to attend it'll be a great night.

- [Eck] You said tentatively but if the, I'm sorry.

- [Chair] No, go ahead.

- [Eck] If there's a storm, is that gonna affect it?

- Yeah, we'll make that decision tomorrow. Based on the weather, it looks like we're probably gonna have the event but if for some reason we cancel it, we'll reschedule it for an alternate day and notify the press.

- It'd be nice if there is little snow on the ground.

- I would say it's likely we're gonna have it based on the forecast. I looked at it right before this point.

- Compliments to whoever designed it and put it together 'cause a lot of neighbors, even from farther away, are walking through there and sending pictures and they're just loving it. So, great job.

- [Steuer] We'll relish in Colburn, we'll do it.

- We'll hand you back to Colburn. Just keep it there for, all right.

- So I just wanna say something too.

- Yeah.

- Thank you both for all the work you do cause it's appreciated, so thank you. I think it's been a great committee and obviously we have next year to go.

- [Steuer] For next year?

- Well, 2023, 'cause January 1st is our last meeting of the year.

- [Campbell] I'd like to say that too. Also, Dan, like lately at last council meeting I said if this remaining funds and stuff and if everybody in every department works as hard as what I think Dan did and when everyone sees it, I think they'll agree and hopefully every other department worked on that. I just wanna say that again 'cause sometimes I guess, you know, we've all been tied up in our own learning, learning everything and time and I know it takes a lot of time to put everything in on both ends. So, you know, and I look forward to getting to know more about my duel and my neighborhood and getting more involved with it too. 'Cause you know, you delete some stuff, I said I will be moving my business to that side of town. So that's one of the things that I

look forward to getting a lot more time to be able to be right there literally, you know, doing it. So that's part of the process of where I'm going to. So hopefully we'll be able to learn more about that giant area over there to do some stuff with 'cause I got some ideas too.

- [Steuer] I'd like to piggyback on that too and just say thanks for everything on that. And I think one thing that I find is that wanna go to council many times, we have our committee reports many times, it goes through quickly 'cause I think, you know, we do care and we work hard on it and I think that reflects very well on you folks. We also, you know, many times that, over the years, you know, I think with the ARPA funds that came forward too. You know, we pretty much decided that Bay Beach was very important and you know, we understand the dynamics of how that fits into our community and how big that is. So, good job. Happy holidays.
