VERBATIM MINUTES

- Okay, we will call the Green Bay Sex Offender Residency Board to meet. Let's see here. We've got roll call?
- I've got that captured.
- Okay. I need a motion for the approval of the agenda.
- Move to approve.
- I'll second.
- All in favor, aye?
- [All] Aye.
- Okay. I need a motion for the approval of the minutes from the December 21st, 2022 meeting.
- I'll make a motion.
- Second.
- All in favor, aye?
- [All] Aye.
- Okay. First appeal is... and I'm sorry if I hack your name, Simfon Quinele?
- Yes.

- Okay. You can please step forward. All right. So you are currently requesting to move to 1116 Stewart Street, correct?

- Yep. Yes, ma'am.

- Okay. And this is your first time before the board?

- Yes.

- Okay. So, we are going to ask you to tell us what you were convicted of. We ask that you not mention the victim by name or relationship, and then we'll wanna know how the police got involved.

- Okay.

- Okay? So if you can go ahead and tell us what happened.

- Well, it started back in 2007, and it was... two very young- and it just... I happened to get into drugs, and then that is how it started, it started from there. But it was just only like one time, like one time things- and then... it just went into another. And then it just, like- after that day, that day that it happened, I like, thought about it, and then think about it and it was like really wrong, what I did. It just, it shouldn't have happened. I can't change things back. So I'm just like, moving forward.

- Okay.

- I am very remorseful for what I did.

- Okay. How old were you?

- I was like, I believe like... 20? I can't really tell how much. I'm between like 25 to like 30. Between that age.

- Okay. And how old was the victim?

- Eight.

- Okay. And what did you actually do to the victim?

- Well, she's having- I was in the room, I was watching, you know, and I was drinking... and I was... I was on bad drug. Crack, crack cocaine. And that's what I was addicted to back then. And then she's having to come in and visit. And then she came in my room, and then she was playing. Then she sat on me, and then... I haven't- I don't know why, but I kind of did it to like touching. And she was just... then she just let me. Then I thought it was nothing wrong, but it was wrong with the first thing. I shouldn't have did that in the first place. But that- it led to that and then it just, kept going and she didn't say anything until it happened. And then that's when she was like asking me, what am I doing? Then that's why I was like... I kinda snapped out of it and I was like, "I shouldn't have, what am I doing?" too, like, what am I doing? Like, I shouldn't have done that. But I was not in the sense of mind at that time. I was-

- Thank you.

- Oh, okay. So you're being a little bit vague, so we need to know. So you touched her?

- Yes.

- Okay, where did you touch her?
- In the legs.
- Okay.
- And then she let- and then it happened, I just kept on going, and she didn't do anything. So then, but...
- Did you have sex with her?
- Yes. And it shouldn't happen, yes.
- Okay. And you said it only happened one time?
- Yes, just once. That's it.
- Okay.
- That day, that's it.
- Okay. And then, how did the police get involved?
- They didn't get until 2014. And then that's when she got a little older, and that's when she like, thought about it, what I did was wrong. And then that's how the police got involved with it. So she went to the police station and then gave the statement.
- Okay. And then when the police came and talked to you about it?
- I did- at first, I denied about it, that it had happened. Until like, I was just sitting there and then I was like, you know what? I need to upfront with it, cause it had been so long. So I just, yes. And I said, yes, it happened.
- Okay. And then when you went to court, did you plead guilty, or did you plead not guilty? No contest?
- First, I didn't plead guilty, cause I did try to deny it. But then when I went to the court, and then when- hell, the jury or whatever, then they convict me. And that's when I went to prison, and that's when I realized that it was- I needed to be upfront with it.
- Okay. So, we have a captain from the Green Bay Police Department who we're gonna ask him if this is all accurate information that you're telling us.
- Yes.
- So, everything you're telling us is accurate?
- Yes.
- Okay. Captain Prester?
- [Alex Prester] I think I'm back in business out here.
- Okay. Were you able to hear what he gave for his version of the event?

- [Alex] I think I caught the tail end. Just reviewing the criminal complaint, there are two charges, two counts, which would lead me to believe that there was more than one offense. I believe in part of his explanation, he said this only happened once.
- Yeah. And did you hear, he said he touched her and then they did have sex. And then it was about seven years later that she came to report it to you guys?
- [Alex] Correct, according to the criminal complaint that she was delayed report. But he did have- he did penetrate with his fingers and his penis in her vagina.
- Okay, okay. Thank you.
- [Alex] Yep.
- Alright.
- Does anyone have questions for him regarding the charge?
- None here.
- Okay, alright. Alex?
- [Alex] I do not.
- Okay, alright. So, I'm sorry. Is it- how do you say your first name, Simfon?
- Yes, Simfon Quinele.
- Okay. So you're currently- is that the motel you're staying at?
- Yep, I got-
- Okay. When did you get out of prison?
- 2021, June, I think the 10th or 11th.
- Okay. And where have you been all this time? Have you been staying at the motel this entire time?
- At first I stayed at that TOP, and then after that then... I guess I got to stay for like 90 days, so I gotta find a place. And then I went by my friend for like, not within a month of that. Then that's when I moved to the motel. And ever since that, that's where I've been staying, the whole time.
- Okay. All right. And so you're gonna- you want to move to 1116 Stewart, you're gonna live by yourself?
- Yes ma'am.
- Okay. So, we might wanna talk to you- well, we will wanna talk to you, about any treatment that you have received. And you have the opportunity to do that in closed session, or remain in public session. Do you have a preference?
- Not right now. But I did complete my SOT, I completed that.
- Okay. So you're okay if we talk about treatment with everyone present?

- Yeah, I don't care.

- All right. So it does look like you did treatment while you were incarcerated?

- Yep.

- Okay. And did they give you any recommendations for after you were released, to continue any kind of treatment?

- Mm... not really, no, not that I know of. Like my appeal didn't never- they never said anything to me. Like, if I knew or not. But he never mentioned, but... I don't wanna say like, from my personal, you know, I'm like, I don't think I really need it. I don't... like I'm, I don't know, probably like- if y'all like, recommend to do another treatment, I'd volunteer to do a treatment. But for myself, I don't really think I need it.

- Okay. So you just did the SOT one?

- Mm Hmm.

- While you were incarcerated?

- Yes, ma'am.

- And how long of a program was that?

- Like three months? It only lasts for like 18 hours, so I don't know how long is that. But that's what they did. They gave me for like, 18 hours and then they kind of like stretch it out.

- Okay. So can you tell us what you learned in that class?

- It's all like self-thinking, and like think before you act. You know, like stuff that if you think that's wrong, you gotta think about it first before you, like, gonna do it. Like you know, do an action or whatever. And like, that's the reason why. Then just... just sometimes like- they do tell me, like, I know that it is the past, you know, the past, but sometimes you just gotta move forward, and then try to do better for yourself. And then ever since that I've been doing very good. I haven't get into any trouble, or get into anything with the law enforcement, none of that. So like, I never... come in contact with any minor or none of that. Basically, I just kind of do things by myself, and keep myself positive. And then stay away from the negative stuff. Like, try not to get involved in any negative things.

- Okay. So during that class, did they discuss with you what, like triggers you might have?

- Well, it was the drugs.

- It was the drugs.

- You know, I'm not trying to mention the drugs, but that's what it... it triggered me to do that. And that's why I haven't like, do any drugs. You know, I like... But I do drink, I'm not like denying about it. But that's all I do, I only drink, I don't do any drugs, none of that. Because I don't want to go back and relive that moment again, or even think about doing that again. So that's why I've been like, all I can just do is work. I work.

- And you did- did you do AODA treatment also?

- No, they-

- You didn't need to do that?
- They didn't recommend.
- Okay. And you are on supervision, and it's okay with your agent that you drink?
- Yeah but I don't... I don't drink a lot. Like when we have a family function, like we go to restaurant or whatever, no. I go there and drink with them, like a couple beer, whatever, you know. Drink, and then after that, I go home. And then that's it. I'm not really- I'm not alcoholic.
- I don't...
- No, I'm not saying that. But typically when someone's on probation, you're not allowed to consume alcohol. So that's why I'm asking.
- Oh. Cause on my rule thing, I don't have that.
- Yeah, that's not one of your rules.
- Yeah, it's not.
- Okay, okay.
- Like, I don't know if it is like, what's wrong with it. I didn't know.
- Do you have a bridge supplement?
- Yes, I do, I'm on GPS. Yes.
- And are you on GPS because you're living in the motel?
- Yes.
- Like if we would approve this, then the GPS gets removed? Or are you on lifetime GPS?
- No, I'm not on lifetime GPS, no.
- So, just because you're at the hotel?
- No- well, it depends on them. They say it's gonna come off, but I don't know when.
- Okay. Okay. And you're currently working, correct?
- Yes.
- And where is that at?
- At University American Food.
- Okay. And what kind of hours do you work there?

- From 3:00 til like 2:00... sometimes it depends on 12:45 to 1:00. Three o'clock in the morning, to 12:45 in the afternoon.

- Okay. All right. Okay. Any questions from the board?

- None here.

- Okay. So when you're not working, what kind of things do you like to do?

- Well I usually go to the gym. I'm like, athletic, I like going to the gym. Or sometimes my friends come and see me, and we just sit and talk. But I do want to go... Like fishing, I love fishing. But I know there's certain spots that I can't go. Especially like downtown, you know, there's certain areas that I can't go. But yeah, I do like fishing, like riding, but just now I can't do that.

- Mm Hmm. Okay. And how long are you on paper til?

- Eight, eight years? I don't know, like 2030?

- Okay.

- Okay. Oh, that's the wrong one. All right. And you're not currently participating in any kind of treatment, whether it be AODA, sex offender, personal?

- No.

- No. Okay. Alright, just to confirm. All right. Is there any discussion from the board?

- Well, he's been through SOT, he is working a full-time job, done what he's supposed to do. The clients are both for him.

- Yeah. I would have to agree with you on that. Plus it doesn't look like he has any priors, or any current open cases. Correct.

- I have a question.

- I don't have anything else.

- Okay, go ahead.

- Can you get- if you want to do something, like say you want to go fishing certain places-

- Yes, I would love to.

- Do you know if you can do that if you have a chaperone?

- If... yeah you know, if I can go, and then even if I go- cause I'm kind of scared, like if I go to certain places and when they see me and they know about my case and they call somebody, say "He's over here", this and that. But even though I got a chaperone, whatever, just like, That's why I don't go out that much because like, I don't... want it to come to that.

- Are you part of any social groups? You know, like a church or something?

- I'm not like... I never been to church, so it's not- I'm not a religious person. Like I've never been to the church.

- Thank you.

- Okay. Alex, do you have anything?

- [Alex] I do not, I'm comfortable with it.

- Okay. Does anyone wanna make a motion?

- Move to approve, address specific.

- Is there a second?

- I'll second.

- All in favor?

- [All] Aye.

- Opposed? Was Alex opposed?

- I think he did.

- No, I said aye.

- Oh, okay thank you. Okay, so Simfon, you're approved to move to that address. Now, if you do decide to move from that address, you will need to come back before us.

- Yes.

- Alright? Would you like us to mail that letter to the Lombardi Ave, or the Stewart Street?

- Or we could email it.

- Or email.

- Yeah, that'd be perfect. Because I got until like, last month to move out of there. That's why I want to know like, where am I going? Like if I don't, then I have to end up staying there.

- Okay.

- But y'all approved me, thank y'all very much.

- Okay. Thank you.

- Thank you.

- Yep. All right, you're good to go.

- Yes, thanks.

- Sure.
- [Alex] Hey, sorry guys, I gotta run again, I got kid issues.
- Okay, thank you.
- Thanks Alex.
- Thanks very much.
- Okay, next on the agenda is the appeal of Collin Thomashek. Come forward please. All right. And Collin, you have been before us. Correct?
- I have, yep. So you were here last in April of 2022, and at that time we approved you to reside at 2548 Manitoach Road, which you're currently still living at.
- Correct.
- Okay. And why is it that you are looking to move to Limekiln?
- I'm currently living with family, and I'm just looking to move out on my own.
- Oh, okay. Alright. So you would be living alone?
- Yes.
- Okay. Do you guys want him to go over his offense, or..?
- I recall it very well, so I don't need it.
- I don't need it.
- Okay, okay. Alright. And then I just- I guess wanna quick ask, so if we wanna talk about treatment, are you okay if we do that in public session, or do you wanna go into closed?
- Yeah, we can do that here.
- Okay. So are you still in any kind of treatment? I know you completed some treatment back in 2021, but are you doing anything now?
- Yeah, I'm currently in SOT, I have a letter from the facilitator here.
- Oh, could you hand that to us please?
- Yeah. All right, I'll just share that with the board. He's handing us a letter from Hangar Enterprises, dated January 18th. States that he started treatment with this individual on November 2nd of 2022. He's attended all of his session, and admits to his offense. And that's signed by Pablo Cerna. Okay. So how is treatment going?
- I think it's going well.
- Okay. So how come you started that in November of 2022?

- While I was incarcerated, nothing was recommended for me as far as SOT. And then after my release, my agent recommended it, and it just took a while to get something going that lined up with my work schedule.
- Okay. All right. And you're currently working at Wisconsin Plastics?
- Yes.
- Okay. And what kind of hours do you work there?
- I work 2:45 PM to 11:15 PM.
- Okay. All right, good. You guys got questions or..?
- Mm, can you tell us anything that you've learned in SOT so far?
- I guess, I only started it recently, so a lot of it was just kind of preliminary stuff. We recently went over ways that people often might distort their offenses, and kind of justify them to themselves. Which really helped me look at my thought processes at the time, and what was wrong with them. And now we're starting to go into identifying what sort of situations are risky for us and why.
- What kind of situations are risky for you?
- I mean, like I stated the last time I was in front of the board, I had an addiction to pornography. So just anything where I might... come into contact with that again. My agent helped me to realize that a lot of times, I'm prone to getting into trouble when I'm bored. So just finding ways to occupy my time I think is key.
- And what do you do to occupy your time?
- Lately I've been doing a lot of reading, watching TV here and there. I'm still working towards getting approval to get the internet back and start doing some of the things I used to enjoy.
- Which would be?
- Mainly just playing video games, or just browsing the internet for recreation or information.
- Okay. What do you think would stop you from looking at pornography again if you got your internet back?
- I know my agent brought up monitoring software, at least at the start. I think that'll help while it's there. I mean, obviously it'll come down to my own self-control eventually. I do think that the risk of going back to prison is a very big deterrent for me.
- Because you were in there for, was it three years?
- Three and a half.
- Three and a half. And was that your first time ever going to prison?
- It was.
- Last time going to prison?
- I plan for it to be, yes.

- Okay, okay. All right.
- I've got a couple questions.
- Sure, go ahead.
- You still have transportation?
- I do.
- And are you familiar with Covenant Eyes?
- I am.
- You are? Okay. Do you- are you part of that or..?
- No, my agent brought that one up. He said there's another one that they currently prefer to go through, like a different program that offers monitoring software. I forget the name of the one that he gave, but he said it's been their preferences of late.
- I'd like to find out that one. Other than that, how have things been going with you and your grandparents?
- I think that they've been going well.
- I'd like to add to that, he's going along.
- Hold on. If you wanna speak, we just need you to- you can come up here, and then state your name and address for the record please.
- My name is Ronald Hoffman, H O F F M A N.
- And your address.
- And address is 2548 Manitoach Road. And I'm married to Collin's grandmother. And we set down some guide rules for him when he first moved in. And he's been following those very well. Things like, making sure his bed's made every day, make sure his area's clean, his bathroom's clean. He has his own separate sitting room, bedroom, and bathroom downstairs in our house. And he's followed that. He's also... I wanted him to learn how to cook, and stuff like that. And he spends a tremendous amount of time with his grandmother when he can. Not only learning how to cut up carrots, but they go shopping together. So he's learning where values, you know, not buying things at eye level and things like that. So he's learning the shopping part as well as the cooking. And they'll come up with recipes with three or four ingredients, and they started a recipe book for him on that. So he'll have that wherever he moves to that he can take care of his own meals, that he doesn't have to rely on McDonald's. And he seems to really enjoy that. So... cause those things, I think he's come a long way in the last eight months. When he first got out, as far as transportation, his parents had an old beater of a car, front end was banged up and air conditioning didn't work and stuff. Since then, he has given that back to them, and he has purchased a used car that he's been making monthly payments on, and not falling behind on any of the payments. We also charge him to stay at our place. The parents feeding him and doing things for nothing. And he's been making all of those payments as well, on time. He hasn't missed any work because of anything made-up. I mean, I think he was sick one day or something. And he's taken two or three days vacation. But other than that, he's there on time early every day and back right afterwards. So he's not chasing around, and doing things after work. So he's always very prompt.
- Do you have any concerns with him moving out on his own?

- Yeah. Who's going to clean that room? No, uh...

- Who's gonna be my sous chef?

- What's that?

- Who's gonna be my sous chef?

- Yeah, who's gonna be your chef. No, I think it's the natural next progression for him too, to keep working his way, you know, from dependent, independent, now he eventually start being more and more interdependent with the community and things. And I think, I say I think he's come a long way. And we keep giving him little bits of information that we've learnt in our 70 plus years, and what he does with them, I don't know. But if I don't write 'em down, then I know they're not in the garbage yet. Nah, he's done a great job. Even just from the time he went in prison until he got out, it's a monstrous difference. And his physical being as well, his mental. And it's been growing ever since.

- Okay. Great. Do you guys have any questions?

- No.

- I got one more. Did you have to teach him how to maintain his car?

- No. Then we'd be in trouble. I can keep the tires when I go buy a car, but that's about as much I can handle it. But no, he does have places though, that he relies on for tire changes and oil changes and things. So that maintenance is kept up, even though we personally don't do it.

- Okay. All right. Did you wanna speak on his behalf?

- No, I think what Ron said, I agree with everything. I'm proud of him, and he's really doing a good job.

- Okay.

- And I think he's written well.

- Okay. Okay, so we'll have some discussion with the board.

- Yeah. Collin should be very thankful your grandparents love you so very much.

- Yeah, I most certainly am.

- The other thing is, I'm the cook in my family, and it comes with great power, so learn how to cook, it's smart.

- Yeah, I do, I have to commend both of you. A lot of times, when- you know, somebody's living with somebody else and we ask, you know, when they first move in, if there's rules or anything that's established, a lot of times we don't really hear those rules. So it sounds like you've really prepared him to be out on his own. So that's a good thing. That's a good thing, so...

- Yeah, I voted for him before, I'm gonna vote for him again.

- Okay. So do we wanna make a motion?

- I do. I make a motion to approve address specific.
- Second?
- I second.
- All in favor?
- [All] Aye.
- Okay, so you're good to go. You are able to move into the 633 Limekiln Road #2. If you do decide to move from that location, you'll need to come back before us again.
- Okay.
- Okay? Did you need this letter back, or we keep that?
- I don't think so no, yeah you guys can keep that.
- Okay. I'll give that to Deanna. Alright.
- All right.
- You're good to go, thank you.
- Thank you so much.
- You're welcome.
- Don't forget to stay connected with your grandparents.
- Absolutely.
- Oh yeah. He's still going shopping every week with me.
- I don't know about every week.
- And he'll be over for dinner.
- Thank you.
- Thank you. Okay. Is there any other business that we need to discuss?
- Come out on that new form?
- It's out. And I sent it over to probation and parole, for them to start circulating it. And it's on the website, and it's also in my little display by our door that people can pick up. So it might take it a few months to get it out there, but probation and parole has it. They said that they would share it with their team to get their people using it.
- Do you know anything of that program he was talking about?
- No, but I can ask. I'm familiar with his agent, so I can just shoot him an email and see.

- Yeah, I'd appreciate it if you get the information to me.
- Yeah, no problem.
- Okay. So then our next meeting is February 15th at 4:00 PM. I just need a motion to adjourn.
- Move to adjourn.
- Second?
- I'll second.
- Okay, all in favor?
- [All] Aye.
- All right. 4:30, I even felt like we talked a lot, or I talked a lot.
- Well... we helped you.
- Yes. Alright.
