- You guys all have copies that have sent to open with the agenda?

- Not much change. Traffic stops are going up. Crashes are going up. Some of that is because of the weather is turning nice, people getting out more. Let's see. And the traffic enforcement unit being more fully staffed. So we're able to get more stops in there. Our traffic analysis gave us three areas of concentration for this month and where there's gonna be a potential for injury, accident. Packerland

and Mason was listed in there but because of the redesigning of that route and blocking off the frontage roads, I didn't include that because we don't have enough data to determine. So far, crashes have dropped significantly in that area due to that frontage road being blocked off. So hopefully that continues into the construction period and then they reconstruct that. Then we'll have to wait some time.

- Do you know how the negotiations are going with the Oneida Tribe on that issue?

- I heard that it went through and they're, I don't know how they're acquiring the land. Are they buying the land or are they?

- No, it's just a temporary limited easement, is my understanding,

- Okay that they need from one of the quadrants. But we were at the Brown County Traffic Safety Commission meeting last week and Director Fontecchio had said that the negotiations have proven successful now.

- Oh good.

- But it's going to delay, you know, they can't get it done with this year's project. They purposely separated them, you know, after they got that news back in December. So sounds like it's on board for next year.

- Oh good. That's a major headache up there.

- Yep.

- It's needed for the U-turns apparently. I mean, well Tom, you can probably speak to that, that you're getting a lot of U-turn violations. I know we, the county had signed it. No U-turns at Trojan

- Yeah, there's several signs.

- And some of the driveways too.

- Several signs going down at each intersection along the way. So people have to travel down in order to make the U-turn. It's actually easier to take a left if you're coming out of McDonald's or the gym over there. Take a left to go down to Country Club to go East on Mason. So that's actually an easier route for people. But I think people are just either creatures of habit, or they're lazy, or they just don't care and they come down and do the illegal U-turns. And actually, the only, I think the only accident in the last quarter that was at that intersection was a U-turn violation. They U-turned in front of another car. So, we have done heavy traffic enforcement over there with the traffic unit. So we're trying to catch everybody. At first, we were trying to educate everybody that this is a new thing. Don't be doing the U-turns here, you can't do it. A lot of written warnings. And now we're focusing more on enforcement and actually writing citations. 'Cause people have had enough time to get used to the intersection over there. So, traffic complaints, we've had a lot of complaints with the parking around the schools. Each school has their own traffic plan for drop off and pick up of kids. It seems like at the beginning of the year, people follow that, and then they, kind of, as the year goes on, kind of, just become more lackadaisical with it. And we've gotten a lot of complaints from the

crossing guards regarding people parking or stopping in the crosswalks to pick up their kids. The speeding, parking in areas where they shouldn't. There's no parking signs and they're getting out of their cars and going over to the schools. And also the double parking, letting the kids go walk into traffic. So we're doing heavy enforcement, kind of randomly around the schools where we have received a lot of complaints. So we have been sending out both the patrol units, and the traffic enforcement, and our community police units. So they're gonna continue to randomly do that. I think by putting it out in the traffic safety plan, putting it on the website and the Facebook page. Hopefully people will read through that. They're doing heavy enforcement, they're writing citations actually. Not a lot of verbal warnings because by this point everybody knows the traffic plan around the schools and they're just straight up, you know, not following the directions. So, the other things are that traffic construction coming up. The Leo Frigo bridge is already underway, doing the painting up there. It's down to one lane each direction.

- And that's gonna go onto the fall.

- That's gonna go onto the fall, according to the website. Of course backing onto Mason And then this summer, the West Mason Street over Beaver Dam Creek, they're, the bridge over there that's gonna have, be doing a lot of work. I don't know David, are they replacing the entire bridge or are they just going work on it?

- Replacement.

- Replacement. So it's gonna be, there's gonna be a period where West Mason is completely closed for traffic over there. So it's gonna be people either going up to Shawano, or that Shawano gonna be the official detour, go up north to Shawano and then East or West from there. But I have some concerns that people are gonna be cutting through the neighborhoods. So we're gonna have our traffic enforcement unit in the neighborhoods, you know, for people cutting through and of course speeding to try to make up the time that they lost by having to go around. So that's about it.

- Okay.

- Anybody got any questions?

- Any questions?

- I have one dumb question for you, and it's only because it came up last week. For a school zone, when it says when children are present, I take that as like from eight to three. Some people think it is just when kids are visible.

- As I understand it, it's when kids are visible, but

- I take that more seriously, okay.

- I know the state statute on this, it means when children are in the right of way, so they could be walking along the sidewalk, they could be crossing the street. So that would qualify when children are present in the school zone. So contiguous anywhere that would require them the speed reduction. So yeah, we do get questions on that. And you know, like for example, like Aldo

- Aldo was what was being talked about
- Right, right
- When the kids are like playing on the playground.
- When they're playing on the playground they have a fence there, that does not qualify. Then the 25 mile an hour is actually active.
- Okay. Because that was the exact question and I was like, I don't actually know, okay.
- Yeah. State statute does clarify that.
- The same thing's true, like if there's a, if you have an emergency vehicle coming towards you, and you're supposed to pull over and stop and let the emergency vehicles go past. But if it's a divided way, you don't have to because there's no way for that fire truck to be crossing over into your lane with traffic. So in the same respect it would be like with kids if there's a dividing area that if the kids are inside the school building, then it wouldn't be, it wouldn't qualify as being children present.
- So, I know that there's, speeding fines are higher in a work zone. Is that the same case for a school zone?
- Yeah, there's a school zone, increased fines for that.
- So is like a multiplier or
- It goes up, the dollar amounts are set by municipal court. So I can't tell you what they are offhand.
- Okay.
- Any other questions?
- No, thank you for the education.
- Okay, thank you Tom.
- Yep.
- Okay, item B, report of the police department of the

- We only have one accident to really report on. I had mentioned at the last meeting the on January 10th a Jeep was traveling on Mason Street near Laura. 74 year old man stepped off the curb in front of the vehicle. He had no time to stop and was not at a crosswalk, was not at an intersection. Just stepped off the sidewalk and was hit by the Jeep. Alcohol and speed were not a factor. It was merely a, he stepped off the curb in front of the car. He was rushed to the hospital. He was then transferred to Milwaukee and eventually to UW Madison. He died on March 20th. So two months and 10 days after. You're looking at 70 days afterwards. So technically, according to the Department of Transportation, for statistical purposes, a fatal accident, the death has to occur from the injuries from the accident within 30 days of the accident. Because this was outside of that, it's technically not a fatality according to the D.O.T. statistics but it is still an accident resulting in a death, so.

- Okay.

- Other than that, it's been not too serious of accidents on injuries in the city this year so far.

- That's good

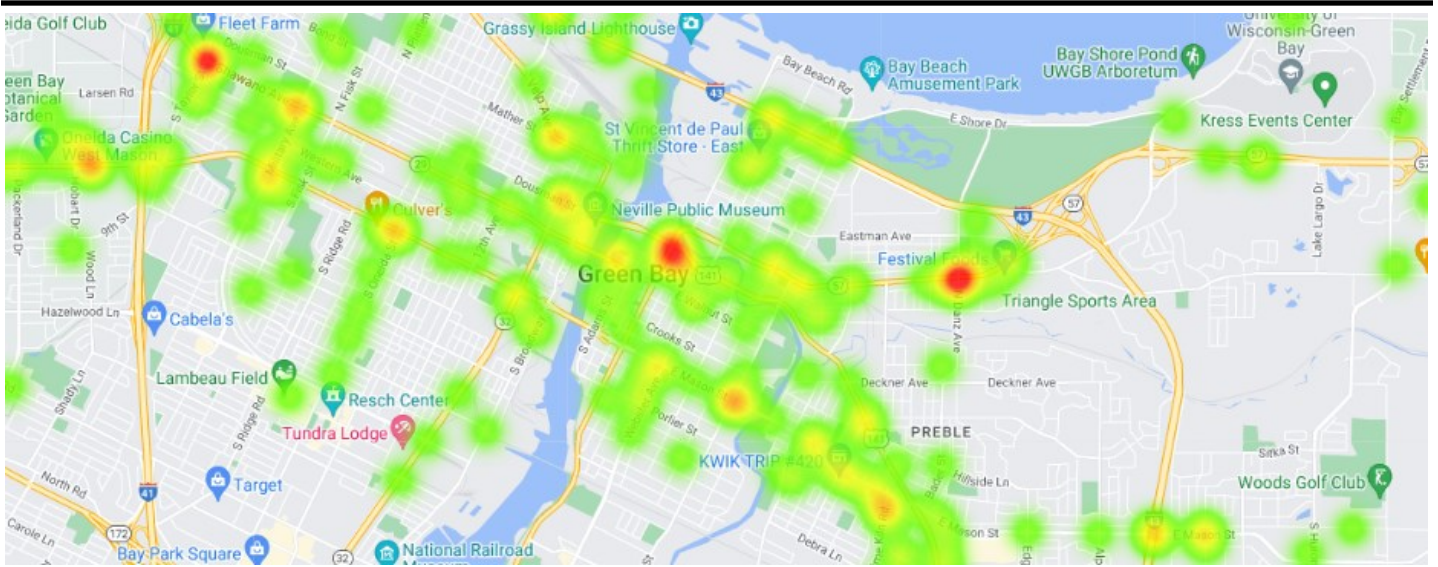

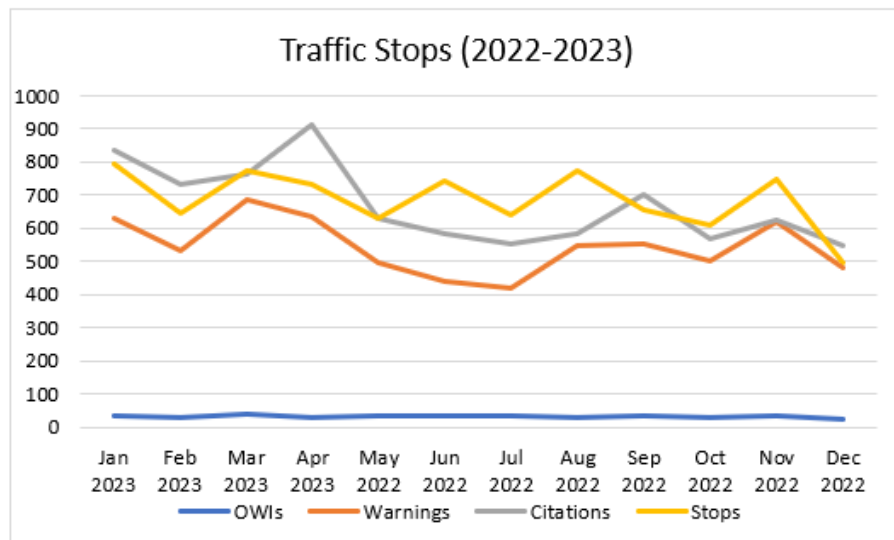
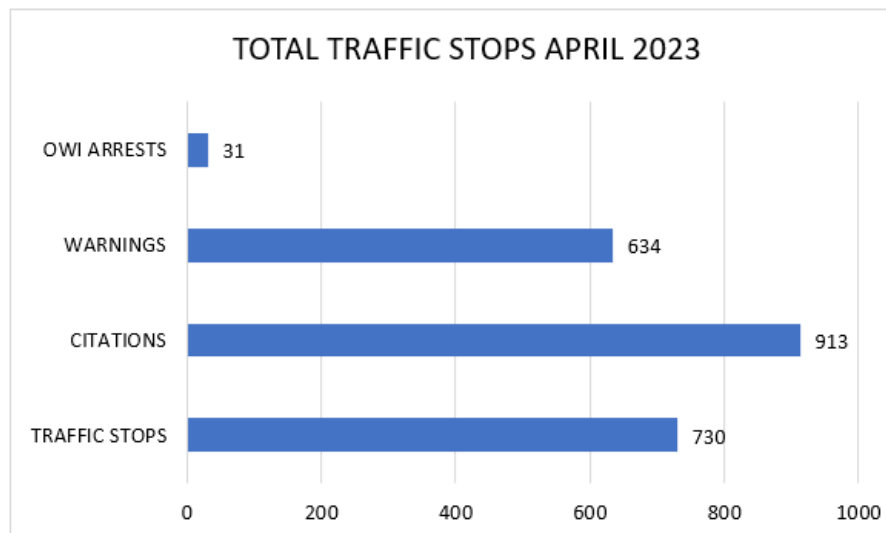

APRIL 2023 TRAFFIC STOPS

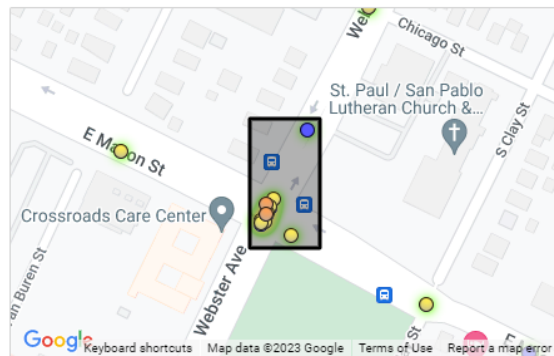

ENFORCEMENT PRIORITY AREAS



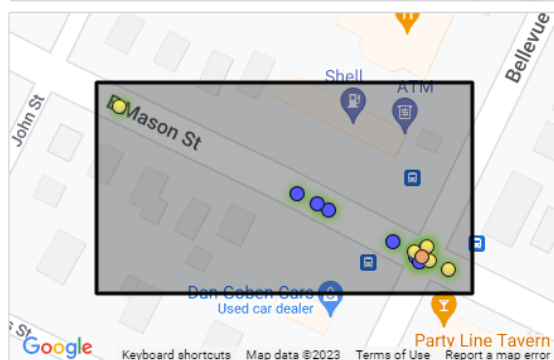

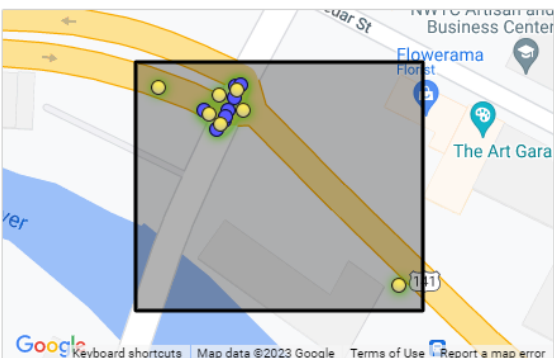

These areas are determined as the most likely to experience an injury traffic crash based on the last three years of crash data collected by the state of Wisconsin. Packerland & Mason was listed as Analysis Area #2, but since the road pattern in that area has been altered, it was excluded from this analysis until more data can be collected. In the short time the traffic pattern has been changed in the area, crashes have been reduced significantly.

FATAL AND SERIOUS INJURY ACCIDENTS

4/18/2023 1:13PM W. MASON ST./16TH AVE. GBPD CASE #23-220309

A 73-year-old Green Bay woman was crossing W. Mason St. on foot near 16th Ave. when a speeding car traveling Eastbound on E. Mason St. struck the woman. The pedestrian went up over the hood of the car and landed on the street. CPR was started by bystanders as the woman had no pulse, but the rescue efforts were unable to save the pedestrian. The car never stopped and fled the scene. It was found by a Green Bay officer several blocks from the scene. The vehicle stopped for police and the driver was arrested for homicide by intoxicated use of vehicle and several other charges. The driver was a 23-year-old Green Bay man who had been drinking at the casino all day.

4/24/2023 8:35PM ABRAMS ST./NEWBERRY AVE. GBPD CASE #23-221528

A speeding car that was Northbound on Main St. Struck a car that was crossing Main from Abrams St. to Newberry Ave. The collision sent the struck vehicle into the Wenz Home Furniture lot. The Green Bay Metro Fire Department had to work to cut the victims out of the car. The people in the struck vehicle were taken to the hospital with life threatening injuries but did survive the crash. The driver, an 18-year-old Green Bay man, was arrested for OWI (marijuana usage) and reckless driving causing great bodily harm.

CONTRUCTION/TRAFFIC CONFLICTS

Interstate-43 (Leo Frigo Bridge)

Interstate 43 Leo Frigo Bridge painting project and installation of new lighting on the bridge is underway. Work is expected to end in the fall of 2023. One lane of traffic in each direction. Expect delays and shut downs for any accident on the bridge.

W. Mason St. @ Beaver Dam Creek (Fireman's Park area)

Bridge over Beaver Dam Creek near Fireman's Hill (W. Mason St.) will be repaired this summer. Expect delays and a detour up to Shawano Ave. during times when Mason St. will be closed. Traffic Unit expected to have heavy enforcement near the area for cars cutting through the neighborhoods to avoid the detour.
