Rat related statistics

Year = # Of Rat related complaints

2014 = 51

2015 = 29

2016 = 49

2017 = 208

2018 = 277

2019 = 78

2020 = 69

2021 = 48

2022 = 78

2023 = 129 (as of 9/7/2023)-(note typically complaints spike in August to early November)

Total Rat related complaints in last 10 years = 1,016 (average is 101.6 complaints per year)

Compliance Inspector complaints (garbage, litter, etc just for this year 2023 = 774 through 9/11/2023) of those 774, 106 are still pending. Note- John and Nate closed out 86% of those complaints this year thus far. These types of complaints all contribute to the rodent issue we are battling.

Total number of all of the Rat related complaints our office has received. Of the 129 complaints received, 27 of them are still pending, 79% close out rate thus far.

Summary of our Inspection approach

We continue to educate on food, water and shelter resources we observe in the neighborhoods during our inspections, which has helped a good deal. Generally it's the same issues we are working on as in the past. The further the resources are restricted and removed, the more success we have at bringing the numbers down in the specific neighborhoods.

Residents are doing an excellent job of reporting concerns now, so we can investigate the sources of the problem quickly and then take steps to address it. As you will see with a further breakdown from Compliance Inspectors John and Nate, they are both performing extensive proactive surveys in each area where concerns are substantiated.

Both Compliance Inspectors spent a good deal of time making sure all residents that have chickens have obtained the proper permits and are educated on the importance of rodent restrictions, (i.e. food, water, habitat cleanliness, etc) These areas are monitored by our staff regularly to ensure ongoing compliance with ordinances and if the rodent population increases, timely response to that is addressed.

Feeding of wildlife/animals and garbage storage issues still tend to be our biggest contributors as we analysis our complaint data. So if residents see those issues in their neighborhood, we encourage them to reach out to us here <http://is-sp:411/requestforservice/> (***City of Green Bay website, Request for Service is in the center of the page***) so we can respond and investigate quickly.

There are a number of privately licensed, professional pest control companies that have been very active in numerous neighborhoods and are assisting residents on both a pro & reactive basis.

Rat Complaint Process-From Compliance Inspectors

This is a brief summary of the process we go through on a typical rat complaint.

The first thing we do is contact the complainant to discuss the situation and get more background information. We try to set-up on site meeting so we can survey the property and further discuss the situation, gathering any additional information that could be helpful in identifying a possible source or contributing factors which could cause an increase in rodent activity.

We survey (look around for signs of borrows or activity), consult and educate while on the property. We instruct that any possible food, water or shelter need to be removed. That includes things like yard waste, composting piles, bird feeders/baths, gardens, ponds/water features, etc. for example. Basically, anything that a rodent could feed from, any open water source and any place that could conceal a borrow or allow shelter. If borrows are found on site, we advise to have them filled and to monitor them for activity. We will also advise to have traps placed on the property and monitored. If the rodent situation escalates or borrowing is severe, we recommend the property owner hire an exterminating professional.

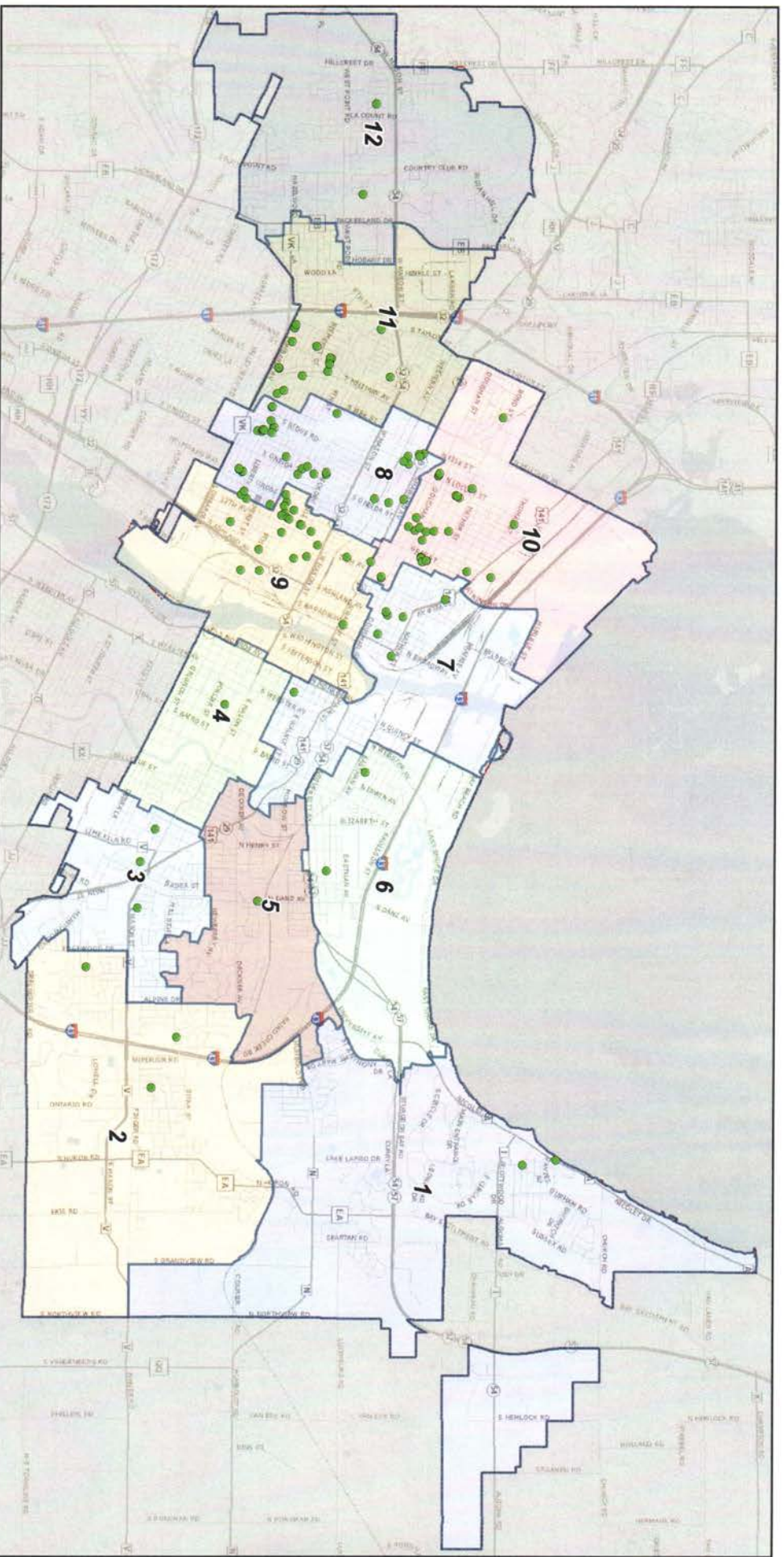
Following the consultation, we will walk the neighborhood and surrounding area to see if we can identify additional sources of food, water and shelter that could be helping or harboring rodents. We will speak with neighbors to see if they have seen any rodent activity or if they have heard anything from others in

the area. We let everyone know that if they see something to let the city know so we can try and better track where rodents are coming from.

If we identify a property that has violations that could be contributing, we document with pictures and send orders the owner/and tenants to have them address the issues. Included with the orders is an informational letter outlining rodent prevention and best practices. In some instances of extreme borrowing, we will require proof that a professional has been hired to address the infestation. We will follow-up with those cases and submit reinspection fees if needed for non-compliance or perform lost clean-ups when needed to remove the infractions.

Post survey of the area a post card will be sent to what we have determined is in the affected area. It is similar to the letter sent with orders but is more concise and goes to everyone. This post card outlines proactive solutions to address/prevent rat issues.

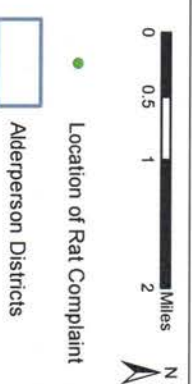
With the initial survey completed, contributing properties identified with orders sent and the postcard mailed we continue to monitor the area and follow-up with additional enforcement as needed. This can be nuisance abatement clean ups, hiring pest professionals and billing back that service to non-compliant properties who are contributing to the issue.

RODENT FACTS

Being familiar with rodent behaviors will help determine the best suited prevention program.

Mice

- Cautious and most active at night
- Sporadic eaters, nibbling here and there throughout the day
- Can jump from a height of 12 feet without injury
- Can jump straight up at least 12 inches
- Can walk wire and other thin objects without falling
- Can enter an opening the size of a dime

Rats

- Very cautious and nocturnal
- Opportunistic feeders - eat what's available usually in one sitting
- Can gnaw through wood, plaster, plastic, lead pipe, aluminum, cinder block, porous concrete, adobe brick, metal conduit, soft rubber, cardboard, paper, and cloth
- Can enter an opening the size of a quarter
- Can fall 50 feet without serious injury



CONTROLLING RATS AND MICE

Rats and mice pose a major health threat by spreading potentially deadly diseases to our children, adults, and animals. In our homes, farms, and businesses, rats and mice find the food, water, and shelter they need to thrive. Any rodent problem, however small, can become a major health and safety threat, if left untreated.

Rodent control is more than putting out bait or traps, and by following the four basic steps, greater success will be achieved at keeping homes and businesses free of rats and mice:

STEP 1

INSPECT FOR RODENTS

Rodent Sounds

Gnawing, scratching, squeaks, particularly at night

Gnaw Marks

Holes in bags or boxes of food, piles of sawdust, shredded paper

Burrows

Holes in earth banks, along walls or building foundations, under rubbish, by bird feeders, by dog houses, in wood piles

Droppings

Small, round feces: 1/2 inch for mice, 3/4 inch to 1 inch for rats

Tracks

Usually observed by pest control professionals



STEP 2

KEEP THE PREMISES CLEAN

Control Measures

- Store pet food in sealed containers
- Regularly clean up spilled bird seed from bird feeders
- Keep garbage, litter, and debris in sealed containers. Pick up food scraps.
- Keep water sources to a minimum (e.g. bird baths, fountains, drain spouts, ponds)
- Clear outside debris/clutter and trim vegetation that could provide protective cover (e.g. brush piles, overgrown shrubs, wood piles, discarded equipment)
- Consider trimming vines from buildings and fences
- Remove food from areas that have signs of rodents
- Wipe up spilled food and store loose food in sealed containers in cupboards
- Clean food particles from under the stove and refrigerator

Clean Up Droppings

Rodent droppings can carry the Hantavirus. It is transmitted when dried droppings particles are inhaled. Although the disease is rare, it is fatal. Use precautions when cleaning:

- Use rubber gloves
- Mist area with disinfectant cleaner prior to contact
- Use paper towels to wipe up droppings or urine
- Dispose of towels in a sealed plastic bag
- Dampen any nesting materials or dead rodents with disinfectant and dispose in the same manner



STEP 3 PREVENT RODENT ENTRY

The most effective form of rodent management is fixing a structure so that there are no easy paths for rats to enter from the outside.

Build Rodents Out

- Repair torn screens, fix or replace broken or missing windows, fix non-functioning doors
- Plug up holes, cracks and gaps in walls with coarse steel wool, galvanized sheet metal, or heavy-gauge hardware cloth
- Weather-strip doors leading from the garage into the house
- Seal openings around pipes, drain spouts, and vents
- Fill interior and exterior holes
- Cover floor drains with mesh

Monitor the Outdoors

- Keep grass mowed to about 2 1/2 inches and prune shrubs - rodents avoid open areas
- Remove woodpiles and building materials - rodents hide or nest in these



BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

You can help prevent rodent problems in your neighborhood by maintaining your property in a manner that is unattractive to mice and rats. Rodents do not stay long in places where there is no food, water, or shelter.

STEP 4 SELECT AND PLACE CONTROL PRODUCTS

Baiting

- Place bait close together where there is rodent activity: every 8 to 12 feet for mice, 10 to 30 feet for rats
- Maintain supply of bait for 10 to 15 days
- Keep bait stored separately from other products with odors that would affect bait acceptance
- Store bait away from children and pets



Glue Boards and Glue Traps

- Non-poisonous product
- Only use indoors



Mechanical Traps

- Both indoors and outdoors

Tamper-Resistant Bait Stations

- Keeps bait away from children and animals
- Remove unused bait when baiting is no longer necessary



RODENT PEST MANAGEMENT CONTROLLING RATS AND MICE

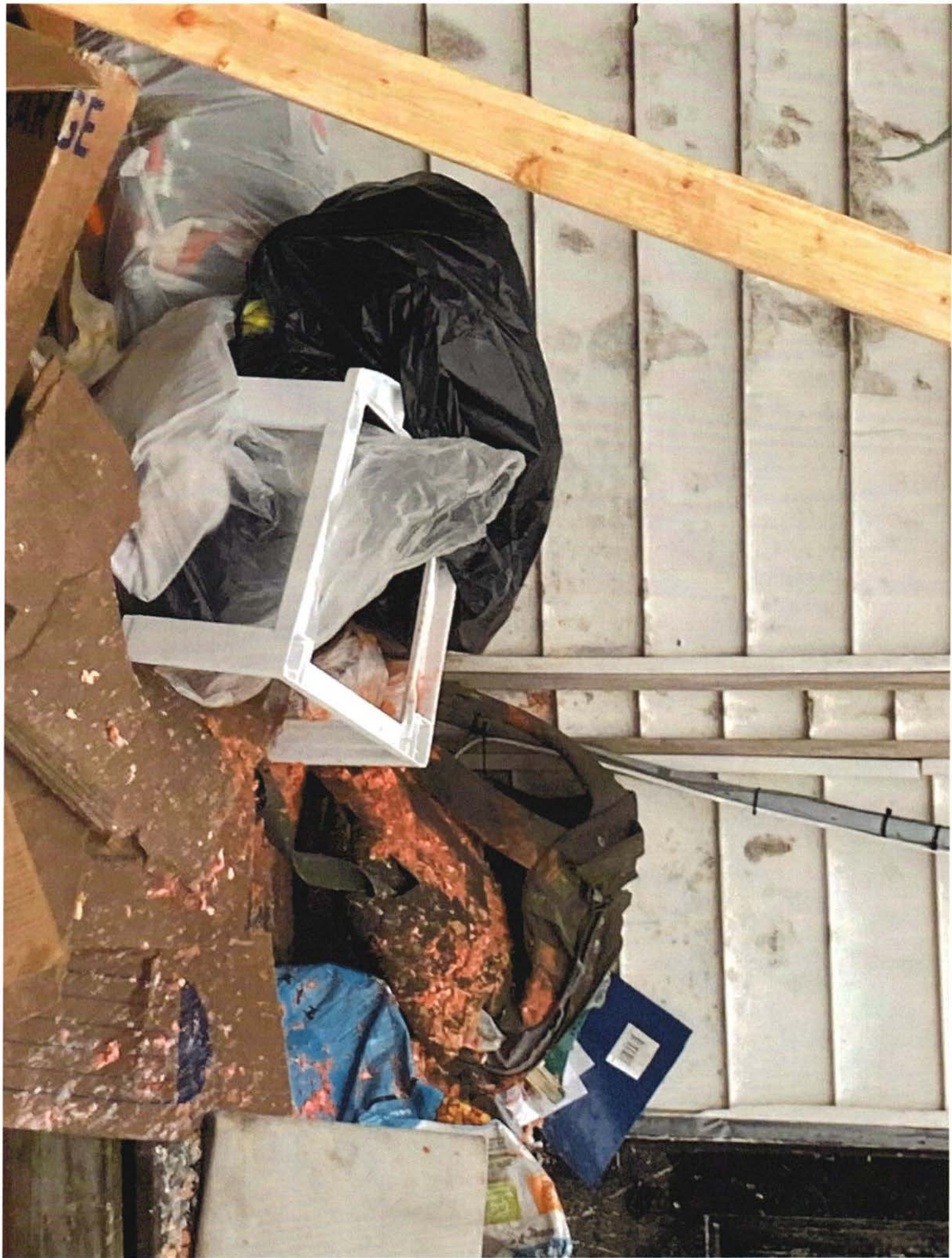

Summary of Licenses Granted and Issued for Class “B” Beer & “Class B” Liquor Licenses:

The City of Green Bay has a quota of 172 available “Class B” Liquor and Class “B” Beer licenses under state law.

The Clerk’s Office cannot take any more applications for available liquor licenses at this time.

The City granted 6 license that has not yet been issued (see page 1).

The City has 3 pending liquor license applications (filed but not yet voted on by Council).

The City of Green Bay may only take the number of applications to number of licenses available. Applications are considered to those who apply with fully completed application and first in time.

Summary of Licenses Granted and Issued for Reserve Liquor Licenses:

The City of Green Bay has a quota of 32 Class B Combination Liquor and Beer Reserve licenses under state law.

The City of Green Bay has 2 Class B Combination Liquor and Beer Reserve issued.

The City of Green Bay has 1 granted “Class B” Liquor and Class “B” Beer license that has not yet been issued.

A Reserve liquor license in the City of Green Bay costs \$10,000 (one-time non-refundable issuance fee) plus the license fee prorated. The license shall not be transferred or surrendered.
