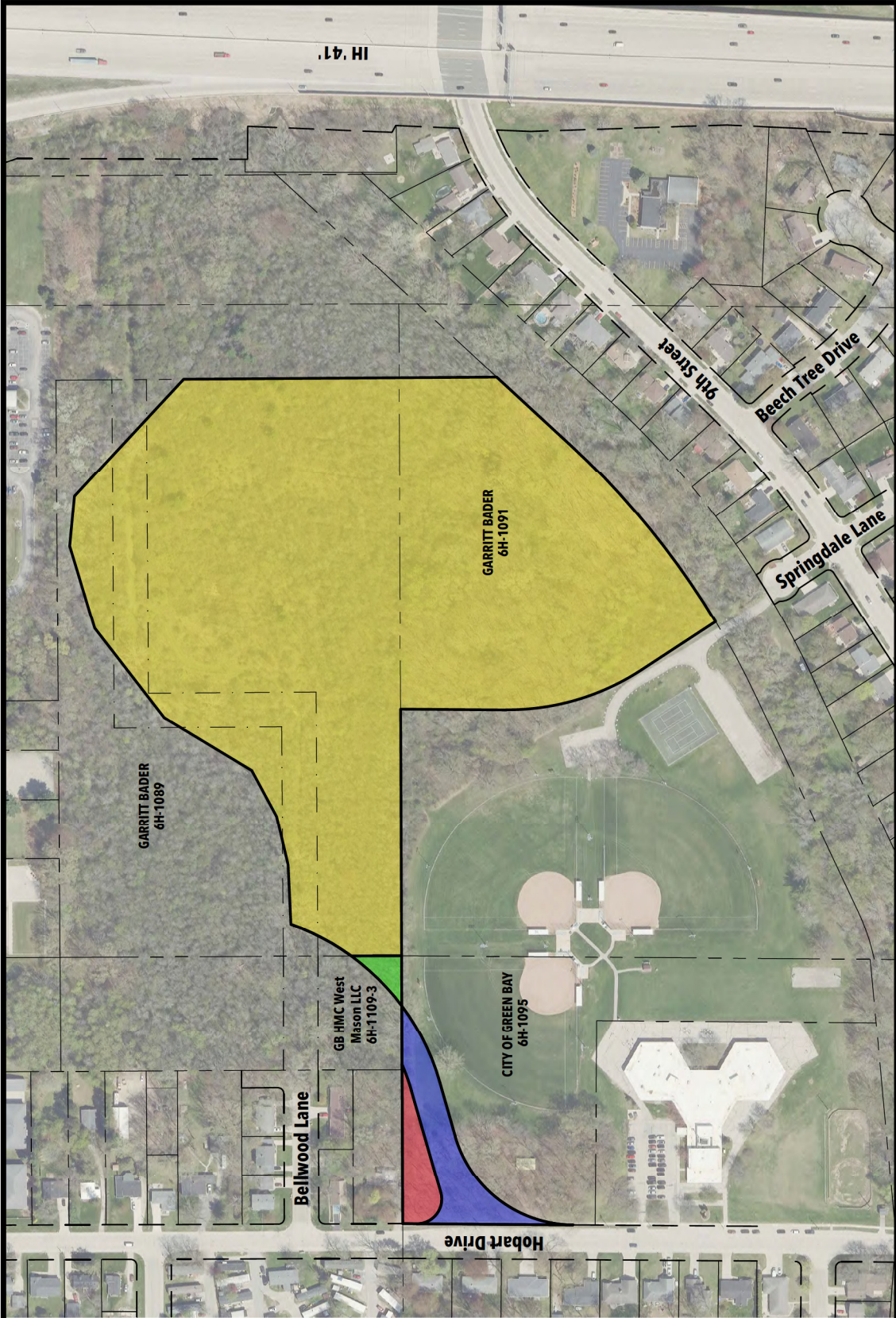

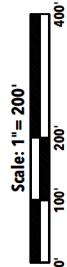

Neighborhood Habitat Improvement Program Partner Agreement

This agreement outlines the terms and conditions between the Lake Michigan Bird Observatory (LMBO), and partner, City of Green Bay Parks, Recreation and Forestry's, participation in LMBO's Habitat Improvement Program (NHIP).

Program Purpose:

The Neighborhood Habitat Improvement Program (NHIP) works with communities to protect birds, pollinators, and Lake Michigan. We know native plants support more insects, birds need insects, and native plants protect water and air quality. With NHIP we engage Wisconsin communities to reduce bird hazards and improve habitats in their neighborhoods and through participation in community science. We work to reduce barriers to planting natives. We promote changing behaviors to more widely increase adoption of the [Seven Simple Actions](#) that will reverse the trend of bird population declines. To achieve our work, we host native plant sales with reduced rates, offer native plant giveaways, host workshops; and together with partners and volunteers we study how to improve habitats for birds.

Programmatic Goals

1. To improve habitat for birds and other wildlife in residential areas of the Lake Michigan Basin.
2. To improve water quality of (sub)urban streams.
3. To improve scientific understanding of how urbanization affects bird population.
4. To nurture and promote a community of engaged, motivated and knowledgeable community scientists in the Lake Michigan Region.

Scope of Work:

With financial support from the Daybreak Fund, LMBO and the City of Green Bay Parks, Recreation and Forestry, will work together along with 4 other municipal and 2 nonprofit partners, to produce, educate about, and utilize biochar in municipal and nonprofit tree plantings in at least five lakeshore municipalities. Biochar sequesters carbon and provides slow release of water and nutrients to trees increasing their growth and survival rates; the trees will result in an estimated 1,296,720.2 lbs. carbon dioxide equivalent sequestered, and 5,415,226 gallons rainfall intercepted from 313 trees, while biochar will sequester ~90,000 lb. of CO₂ equivalent. Additionally, the Observatory will pilot a replicable process for municipalities, nonprofit, and for-profit entities to produce and use biochar in the Lake Michigan Basin.

LMBO Deliverables:

In the first year, Observatory staff will manufacture biochar kilns and receive training on their operation. Observatory staff will also train nonprofit partners and municipal governments in biochar production. Through these trainings and biochar burning sessions with Observatory and partner staff, biochar will be available for fall planting of trees in 2024 and 2025. Trees will be ordered and purchased by the Observatory from awarded SOGL funding that will be planted in fall 2024 and/or spring 2025 that will be planted by the partner agency will be the first planted with biochar, expanding the benefits of this project to include increased impacts on climate change. Observatory staff will collect and prepare biochar and soil samples for testing at the UW-Stevens Point's Scharenbroch Lab. Staff will test several methods to determine the optimal method to infuse biochar with nutrients. The observatory will order and purchase \$9,000 native tree whips (with Daybreak Fund dollars) to replace the native nursery stock from the City of Green Bay Nursery that will be planted in 2025 (a minimum of 120 1.25" caliper native trees from current stock) that will be planted by the partner agency with biochar produced through this community-partnership program. The partner agency will provide LMBO with a native species list (cultivars are not acceptable species), quantities, sizes, and a preferred vendor identified for their project(s). LMBO will handle placing the order and paying the invoice. Plants will be delivered to our partner directly. LMBO will provide a template for tracking in-kind contributions pledged (a minimum of 8 hours of staff time at \$20/hour for two staff people) and recording biochar production metrics. As requested by the partner, LMBO can provide guidance on selecting the most appropriate native species to plant, list of preferred nursery vendors and help with planting. Biochar will continue to be produced for municipal and nonprofit projects through 2025.

The Observatory agrees to monitor the health of trees planted with biochar. The Observatory will collect the following data but not limited to, qualitative tree health, diameter at breast height, crown health, height, and microbial soil data for up to 5 years following planting.

City of Green Bay Parks, Recreation and Forestry Deliverables:

The partner agency will participate in biochar production training offered by Observatory staff. The partner agrees to operate a kiln once partner staff feel comfortable and confident with self-execution. The partner will follow the protocol framework provided in the biochar production training. Partner agency staff will be responsible for tracking biochar production metrics in the template provided by LMBO. Biochar will continue to be produced for municipal and nonprofit projects through 2025. The partner will properly store all biochar produced for their service areas tree planting in an approved and appropriate facility and container that follows best management practices established by the [International Biochar Initiative](#).

The partner will provide LMBO with their plant order of native species (cultivars are not acceptable species) for LMBO to place with vendor and to pay the vendor directly. The plant order will include a native species list (cultivars are not acceptable species), quantities, sizes, and a preferred vendor identified for their project(s). The partner will receive the order directly. The partner will plant a minimum of 120 1.25" caliper native tree species approved by LMBO (cultivars are not acceptable species) and valued at \$75/tree of their current nursery stock with soil that has been amended with biochar. The funded native whips will also be planted in the nursery by the partner. The partner will be responsible for all tree care maintenance in accordance with their policy and standards. As requested by the partner, LMBO can provide guidance on selecting

the most appropriate native species to plant, list of preferred nursery vendors and help with planting.

The partner agency staff will track time in the template provided by LMBO. A minimum of 8 hours of staff time at \$20/hour for two staff people was pledged as in-kind support.

The partner agrees to allow the Observatory to monitor the tree health of trees planted with biochar. The partner agrees to allow the Observatory the following but not limited to, qualitative tree health, diameter at breast height, crown health, height, and microbial soil data for up to 5 years following planting.

Grant Period: 01/01/ 2024 – 12/31/30

Grant Award Total: \$9,000 for the purchase of native tree whips to replace current native nursery stock being planted during project.

Permits:

LMBO does not anticipate the need for any permits for the work outlined in this agreement. If permits are required, LMBO will acquire and keep up to date any permits necessary to conduct the proposed work. The local fire department should be notified of any production days by the kiln supervisor of that workday.

Communication:

LMBO will notify the host at least 7 days in advance of all planned activities at the site(s) and will check in as required. LMBO will notify its partner once the order is placed and they are notified by vendor of delivery timing. LMBO will provide the host with an annual progress report summarizing the project and their role within it and ensure they are properly acknowledged for their contribution. LMBO would appreciate any photographs of the site before, during planting and after to include in our annual progress report and final grant report to the funder.

**PARKS COMMITTEE
DIRECTOR'S REPORT
WEDNESDAY, MARCH 13, 2024**

PARK DIVISION

- Park crews are continuing to mulch park landscape beds throughout the city due to the lack of snow cover.
- Park crews are also cleaning up the parks. This involves picking litter, picking up sticks, fixing bumper blocks for car parking and repairing sod damage from snowplowing.
- Ball diamond crews took advantage of the drier weather and lack of snow to roll a number of athletic fields throughout the city.
- Park crews have refurbished a number of bleachers including a fresh coat of paint and new seat and feet boards.
- Park carpenters have finished with the Fisk Park bathroom remodel. It is now receiving a fresh coat of paint.
- Park Staff have been having interviews to hire Park Maintenance Seasonal positions for the summer of 2024.
- The Park Plumber has been installing new water heaters that will supply hot water to our bathrooms at four park shelters.

FORESTRY DIVISION

- The pruning crews are focusing on oak and elm tree pruning before spring pruning bans take place in March.
- Staff continue to mark trees for the winter removal cycle. We anticipate 700-800 ash trees and a few hundred more non-ash trees on the winter list. It is still a large removal number, but fewer than the 2023 list.
- The winter tree removal operations continue. Crews are working on the far west side of town. Eastside removals will start up again in the coming weeks after oak pruning is complete.
- Staff have been interviewing applicants and filling positions for summer seasonal positions. We are approaching full staff levels for seasonal positions.
- Staff have been working with IT staff on transferring our tree inventory to a GIS format.
- Staff are beginning to mark sites for spring tree planting.
- Forestry was able to put its new 50' bucket truck into operation this week. This truck gives us 6 bucket trucks for 9 Arborist II positions.

DESIGN & DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

- Staff is working with the consultant on planning for the HVAC upgrades for the Bay Beach Amusement Park pavilion.
- The roof replacement of the Bay Beach Amusement Park pavilion was awarded to a contractor. Work will be completed in the spring of 2024.
- The stairs of the giant slide will need to be replaced prior to opening due to rusting concerns. The project has begun.
- Staff are planning for the installation of the all-inclusive playground at Bay Beach Amusement Park. The project is currently under construction.
- Construction has started on the underground utilities to the new concession stand/restrooms at the Finger Road Ballfield Complex.
- The engineering of the site work, shelter and stage is progressing at Leicht Memorial Park. A subconsultant was hired for the audio-visual design of the stage. The consultant will be submitting the 90% complete set of construction plans soon.
- Shipyard Phase 1 construction continues. Work is scheduled to be completed in the summer of 2024.
- Staff is working with the consultant on the design of the JBS park/boulevard/barn development.
- Staff is working with DPW on the Seymour Park west side storm water management design, which is near completion.
- The Farlin Park redevelopment construction project is planned to be bid soon.
- Planning continues for the Joliet Park habitat restoration project. A public input meeting is being held March 21, 2024, at 5:30 p.m. at the UW-Green Bay, Christie Theatre.
- Staff attended the East River Flood Solutions and East River Trail Master Plan Open House on March 6, 2024.

GREEN BAY CONSERVATION CORPS

- Members continue to remove buckthorn and honeysuckle from Newberry Conservancy, Red Smith Park, and Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary.
- Members have begun taking the herbicide certification test.
- Members have begun planning the Earth Day celebration events to be held in April.
- Staff continue to attend recruitment fairs and interview for summer members.
- Staff have been working with Astor Park Neighborhood Association to plan a native planting for the park.
- Staff and members attended the Seed Library Launch on Saturday, March 2nd to promote the program and make native seed bombs with attendees.
- Members assisted Baird Creek Preservation Foundation with site prep for a potential burn unit this spring.
- Members have begun training in frog and toad surveys and conducting site visits.
- Members partnered with the OAK Learning Center to make seed bombs with the kids.
- Native plants are growing in the greenhouse with an additional donation from the Botanical Gardens which put the greenhouse at maximum capacity for plants.

- Staff are working with the Botanical Gardens to plan the installation of 2 large native plantings at Perkins and Danz parks. Members will remove sod and prep the plant beds in mid-March for a late-April planting.

RECREATION DIVISION

- High school and youth baseball and softball field permits have been released.
- The adult softball league registration has begun. We will be offering men's slow-pitch, co-ed slow-pitch and women's and men's modified softball leagues at Beaver Dam Park. The season is scheduled to begin the week of May 6th. We currently have 3 teams registered.
- Registration is currently taking place for our recreation summer day camps at the WLS. The camps will run M-Th for 8 weeks. The recreation summer day camp at the WLS is scheduled to begin the week of June 17th. There are 8 weekly camps being offered from 9 a.m. – 4 p.m., Mondays-Thursdays. Field Trips will take place on Thursdays. Classes are limited to 15 participants.

- We are currently taking registration for our Youth Soccer Skills Program. The program will be held at Edison Middle School beginning April 1. We have 20 participants currently registered.
- We are taking job applications for Summer Playground Leaders, Camp Instructors, Softball Umpires and Site Supervisors.
- The Youth Dance Program concluded their season on Wednesday, March 6th with a Dance Recital at Lombardi Middle School. Close to 400 people were in attendance to watch dancers perform their Tap, Ballet, Hip Hop, Poms and Mommy & Me routines. The costumes looked amazing, and the dancers performed beautifully. We're looking forward to next season already.
- Planning is underway for the 2024 Mayor's Kids Day to be held Tuesday, June 25th.

AQUATICS

- Off season projects include:
 - Updating staffing plans at all three facilities to become compliant with the updated DATCP 172 Pool Operating Code.
 - Create an updated database on staff certifications to comply with the new requirement that lifeguards must recertify their CPR certifications annually (versus every two years).
 - Research scheduling options to accommodate the increased need for flexible scheduling for our seasonal staff.
- Rehire information has been sent out to all eligible staff in November. Many staff have already committed to returning for the summer of 2024.
- A seasonal recruitment fair will be held on Saturday, March 23rd from 10 a.m. – 1 p.m. at the Wildlife Sanctuary. Staff will be on hand to educate about our positions and to conduct interviews on site.
- Staff will be heading out to a few middle schools over the next month to talk to 7th and 8th graders about future pool jobs, how to fill out applications, and interview tips.

BAY BEACH AMUSEMENT PARK

- Staffing
 - Interviews for seasonal staff will begin on March 11th and will continue until we are fully staffed. Each season we employ nearly 300 seasonal staff.
- Concessions and shelters

- Concession product pricing has been received from vendors and we are working on setting the sales price for each item.
- Souvenir apparel and hard goods have been ordered and have begun to arrive.
- Site work has been completed to prepare for a new grill arrival in the kitchen.
- Crews have been working hard to give the inside of the pavilion a new paint job.
- Rides
 - Work on replacing the slide stairs has commenced.
 - East end train track has been repaired and will be ready for opening day.
 - Electrical work on the Beast continues.
 - Documentation is being revised and updated.
 - Rides will begin to be set up in the coming weeks.
 - Ride signs will be updated.
 - Manager and Maintenance Foreperson attended the annual AIMS safety conference in January.

Metro Boat Launch

- Docks have been placed and the boat launch is ready to go for the season.
- The MBL will be hosting an annual walleye tournament on April 7th.

Triangle Sports Area

- The hill is closed for tubing for the season.
- Disc golf will be set up in April.

WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

- The Web of Life Interpretive stations have been updated and new stations were added. Staff is actively developing new signage for the entire park, starting with the Woodland Building.
- Coordination is underway to complete the Leadership Green Bay dock project. All that is left to do is install an ADA walkway to the new dock at the Whirligig Pond.
- Planning is underway for free summer public programming offerings. Specific programming is still being developed. The tentative schedule includes programs daily Monday through Thursday at 10:30 a.m. & 2 p.m. – Friday at 10:30 a.m., and every Saturday and Sunday at 2 p.m. Full schedule and promo materials will be out soon.
- WLS Summer camps are scheduled for 16 sessions over 8 weeks with many spots already filled. Summer seasonal positions in maintenance, animal care, and educational departments are all nearly filled.
- The purchase order has been placed for the new security system upgrades.
- Extensive buckthorn removal continues at WLS led by the Green Bay Conservation Corps. Crews have made a visible difference in these invasives and have also been incredibly helpful in assisting the WLS team with ensuring public trails are safe and maintained.

- WLS admin staff visited the Horicon Marsh Nature Center to explore some of their improved signage/exhibits/offerings. We met with their admin staff behind the scenes, getting ideas and gathering resources for the improvement of our onsite offerings.

ADMINISTRATION

- Reservations for shelter rentals are now open for the season. We have had a large number of reservations already.
- Staff are continuing to support special event requests.
- The 2024 rehire of seasonal staff has been completed and we have a great response from our returning staff who are filling out their paperwork. We are encouraging returning staff members to get their paperwork completed.
- The 2024 seasonal positions are now up and we're accepting applications for our upcoming season. We have received many applications already and a few positions are almost full.
- The Brown County Annual Boat Launching Permits are now available for 2024 in our office. The pay station was reactivated March 6th, a special thank you to DPW for assisting with the dock placement.
- Gift cards, Metal Detecting Permits and Pool passes are on sale in the Parks and Recreation office.
- Staff are working on Baseball and Softball field reservations as well as other special facilities.
